



A news commentary just a few days ago pointed out that the alarmists who keep blocking the use of nuclear energy are out of line, and the people who heed their dire predictions are equally at fault for failure to respond to the good reports on the other side of the issue.

A very significant fact is that nuclear energy already produces over 10 per cent of the power used in this country, and not one person to date is known to have been injured by it. Nevertheless the bureaucrats who have to give final approval to the projects keep hesitating because some alarmists keep saying "what if?"

Congressman Burleson's recent news letter refers to this ridiculous situation. He points to a 3,548 page report on a study headed by Dr. Rasmussen, professor of nuclear engineering at Massachusetts Tech, in which the lengthy document is rather well summarized by two statements. "Nuclear accident probabilities are so low that they are insignificant compared to the over all risks due to man-made and natural risks. All other accidents including fires, airplane crashes, explosions, toxic chemical releases, dam breaks, floods, earthquakes and tornadoes that have been examined in this study are much more likely to occur and have consequences comparable to or greater than nuclear accidents."

The study states that no one has ever been harmed by radiation from a nuclear power plant, and the odds against any American dying from a nuclear-power accident are about 300 million to one. This is a lot safer than the hazards we are living with every day. If the alarmists were logical they should be clamoring for a ban on electricity itself because of the fires it starts or people it electrocutes. Likewise they ought to demand a ban on swimming, boating, car and airplane riding, use of tractors and farm equipment and industrial machinery. They won't, of course, because these things are a part of our way of life. So why not stop the restrictions on nuclear power?

While this unfortunate misunderstanding continues, our authorities are still dragging their feet with regard to making better use of other energy sources. They discourage offshore drilling because of a scare about oil spills, and they discourage development of oil fields by meddling with prices. Gratefully we can note progress in the Alaska pipeline, but we recall that it was delayed a long time by the environmentalists.

The outlook is not encouraging when we consider that our demand for energy increases every day and we are dependent to a great extent on energy imports from other nations. Suppose those nations suddenly decided to quit shipping, or a country declared war on us and shut off the petroleum lifeline.

At this time, fortunately, it seems that the world generally needs our grain exports as much as we need the oil imports. That situation makes it less likely that hostile nations will shut off our energy supply, or that they will declare war on us. After all, it would be folly to bit the hand that feeds them.

But we have no assurance that these conditions will continue. Some day they may get the idea to shut off the supply and cause a really serious energy crisis.

While we are haunted by this possibility, and while we see daily that the hazards have been exaggerated, we have to wonder why cranks and environmentalists are still fouling up the program. What kind of characters are they? Do they really believe the scare stuff after expert scientists and long experience have contradicted them? Or are they power conscious guys gloating over their ability to halt a vitally important project? One even has to wonder whether some of them are on our side.

It is estimated that US at the turn of the century will have the demand for twice as much electricity as now. If that's the case a lot of people ought to be working together, and soon. We need every kind of

## Firemen Ask Help In Testing Range Of Siren's Sound

People on all sides of Muenster are asked to be alert next Thursday night at 5 o'clock sharp to a 30 second signal by the city's siren. . . then report in if they heard it and tell their distance and direction from the source.

Purpose behind the activity is to determine the effective range of the siren as a warning in case of storm. And that, in turn, is a part of the civil defense program now being developed by the Muenster CB Club. Reports may be phoned to Fire Chief Herbert Knabe 759-2930.

At their meeting last week Wednesday the members discussed the local defense plan in which cars are stationed at various points of the area in threatening weather to watch for tornadoes or other storm signs. The spotter sends a CB Radio message to the base station, which notifies the local fire station and also sends the message to Civil Defense personnel for their area and state watch. The fire department will use the siren to spread the alarm in the community. The signal will be a 30 second continuous blast at the same pitch.

## Farmers Praised in Creighton Address

As guest speaker at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet in the KC hall last Thursday night, State Senator Tom Creighton saluted farmers and ranchers as the heroes of America's economy.

He briefly reviewed the agricultural success story in which farmers combined their know how with this country's favorable climate and political atmosphere to become the envy of the world. In 1950 one farmer produced for himself and 14 others, today for himself and 52 others. Farmers made it possible for US exports to exceed imports by \$12 billion, to more than offset the heavy expenditure required by the energy crisis, and also to bring relief to millions of hungry people around the world — including those in many countries whose production is hampered by government controls.

In appreciation of those achievements, the senator recommended more official consideration for farmers and ranchers. He asked for a reduction of beef imports which depress the domestic market, also for a free grain market and priority for agricultural

fuel at reasonable prices. In conclusion he said that the golden age awaits us and the pathway to it is agriculture.

Also on the program, the Chamber's president, Bertha Hamric, reviewed the year's record, referred to current plans for the German Week festival, presented certificates of appreciation to retiring directors, named the newly elected directors and those who have another term.

WHEREAS, the term of office of Ray Voth, Rufus Henscheid, Norbert Felderhoff, Norbert Walterscheid, and Albert Danglmayr, members of the Board of Directors of this Hospital District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1976, said first Saturday being April 3, 1976, and on said date a director election will be held in said Hospital District.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said director election;

THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF MÜNSTER HOSPITAL DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said Hospital District on April 3rd, 1976, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Directors of said Hospital District five (5) directors.

2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be filed with the Secretary of the Board of Directors at the administrative office not later than 25 days prior to the date of said election. Said request shall be by petition signed by not less than 15 qualified voters asking that such name be printed on the ballot.

3. That said election shall be held at the following place and the officials named herein are hereby appointed officers for said election:

At Muenster Public School Building in Muenster, Cooke County, Texas, in said Hospital District, with Charles O. Cash as Presiding Judge, who shall appoint an assistant to such clerk as may be required.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. D. M. Bright is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Office of Administrator, Muenster Memorial Hospital, Muenster, Cooke County, Texas, within the boundaries of the above named Hospital District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the Election Code of this State, and this Board of Directors will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

6. Immediately after said election has been held, the officials holding the same shall return to the president of the Board of Directors in a sealed envelope a copy of the returns, poll list, and tally sheet for said election, and this set of election returns shall be used by the Board of Directors in canvassing said election.

Another copy of the return, poll list, and tally sheet for said election shall be delivered to the president of the Board of Directors in

an un-sealed envelope and this envelope shall be available in the office of the Administrator open to inspection by the public for 60 days from the date of the election.

7. The presiding judge for said election shall return to District Clerk immediately after the votes have been counted the ballot box containing the voted ballots and all other election supplies and said ballot box shall be preserved and kept in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Texas Election Code.

8. The Board of Directors shall give notice of said election and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Directors is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this hospital district, and said posting shall be made at least 15 days before the date of said election.
