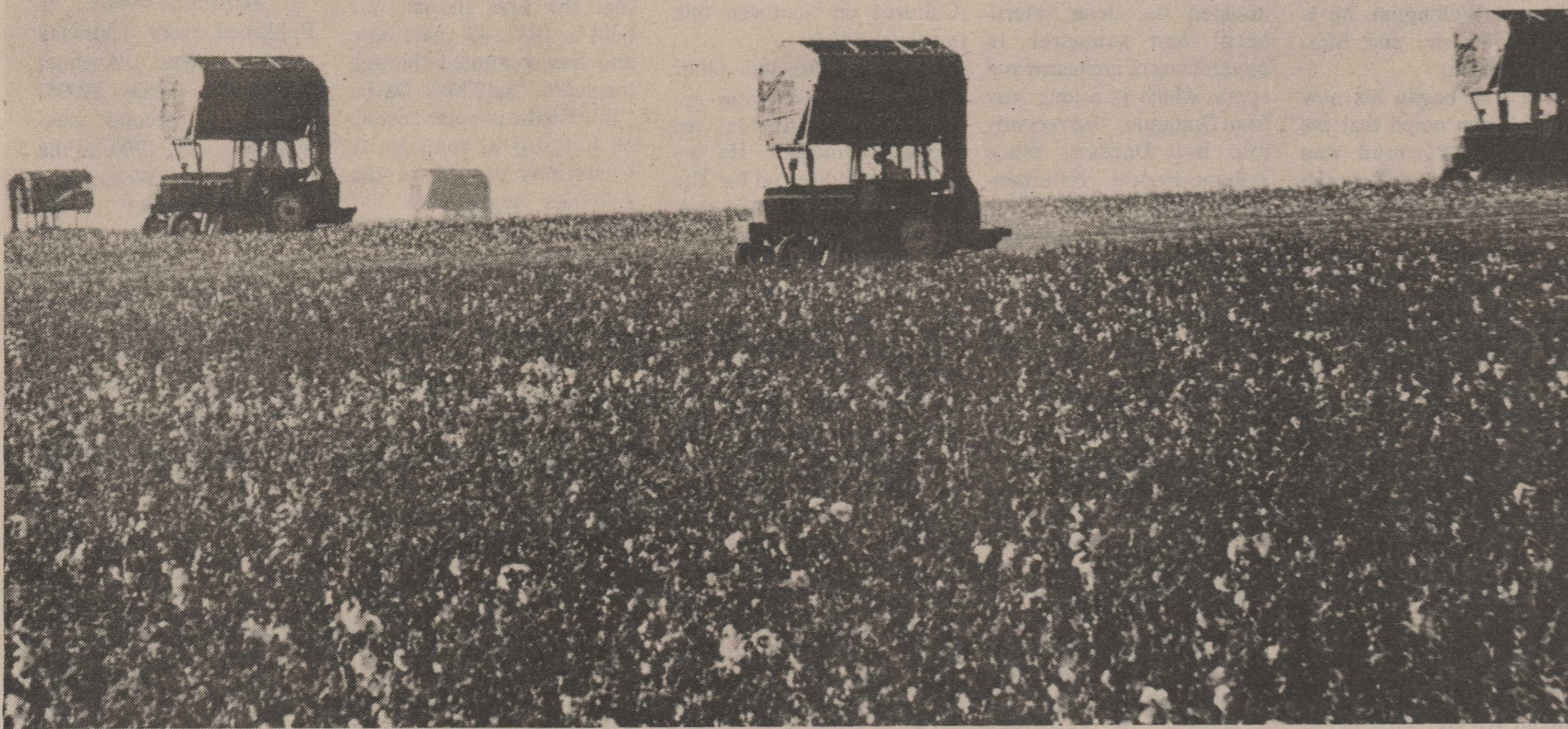

Wellington Leader Holds Open House for Community Friday

The Wellington Leader will hold an open house in its newly remodeled building from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday, December 5.

"We'd like to take this opportunity to invite everyone in the community to come down and see the new plant and see how we put the newspaper together," said Henry Wells, editor and publisher.

"We've appreciated the community support over the past 50 years and we'd like to say 'Thanks' in a small way by having people take their coffee break with us on Friday."

The 50-foot building features a wooden shake shingle awning. Rough

cedar forms the exterior and the interior paneling. It is designed to accommodate new newspaper technology and to give more display space to the Leader's office supply department.

The building was built in the middle 1920s, with Frank Goforth, now of Amarillo, as the contractor. Steve Davis Construction was contractor for the remodeling this year.

The Wellington Leader has been at this site since 1937. Prior to that, it was located on a site now covered by Wellington State Bank. To the north of that old location was Ellis Funeral Home and to the south, Ross Wilkerson

Grocery.

The Wellington Leader was established in July 31, 1909, by the late Thomas Durham. L.L. Ladd followed him as publisher.

J. Claude Wells was the owner and publisher through the years of World War I, and to 1925, when he was joined by his cousin, Deskins Wells, who had received his degree in journalism from the University of Texas in 1925. The next year Mr. and Mrs. Claude Wells moved to the Memphis Democrat.

Deskins Wells published the newspaper 51 years, until his death in 1976, when he was succeeded as editor and publisher by his son,

Henry Wells.

His daughter, Diane (Mrs. Ansel McDowell, Jr.), of Lake Jackson, will be here for the open house.

Other staff members of The Wellington Leader are Virginia Robey, news editor; Dela Bee Ford, office supply manager, classified advertising manager and bookkeeper; Nell Wilbur, circulation and job printing manager; Lynda McGill and Ramona Hightower, editorial and advertising assistants.

The oldest living former employee of The Wellington Leader is Mrs. V.P. Robertson, the sister-in-law of Thomas Durham. She

Cong. Hightower Receives The Knapp-Porter Award

VERNON--U.S. Rep. Jack Hightower of Vernon, a longtime booster of agriculture in the state, was presented with the prestigious Knapp-Porter Award by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service here November 6.

Hightower, who represents the 13th Congressional District of Texas, has been a member of the U.S. House of Representatives since January of 1975. He has served on the Agriculture Committee, the Small Business Committee and is a member of the House Appropriations Committee.

Subcommittees on which he has served include Agriculture, Rural Development and Related Agencies; State, Justice, Commerce and Judiciary; Activities of Regulatory Agencies; Government Procurement and International Trade; Cotton; Livestock and Grain, and Conservation and Credit.

Hightower was named chairman of the Texas Democratic delegation for the 96th Congress in 1978.

The award, highest given by the Extension Service to citizens for their many contributions to agriculture and family living, was presented at the annual meeting of the Rolling Plains Economic Program (RPEP).

Dr. Daniel C. Pfannstiel, Extension Service director, read the award citation as he made the presentation to Hightower.

The plaque, which bears the likeness of Dr. Seaman A Knapp and Walter C. Porter cast in bronze, bears this inscription: "For distinguished service to Texas agriculture in projecting the visionary aims of Dr. Knapp, Extension founder, and Mr. Porter, pioneer farm demonstrator."

"Mr. Hightower has

made many important contributions to agriculture in Texas the nation," Pfannstiel said in presenting the award which was initiated by the Extension Service in 1964 to recognize outstanding individuals.

Before going to Washington, Hightower served in both the Texas House and Senate and established outstanding records. He was elected to the Senate in 1964, and in the regular session 1971, was elected President Pro Tempore. He served as acting Governor in 1971, while both the Governor and Lieutenant Governor were out-of-state.

A native of Memphis, Texas, Hightower received a B.A. Degree from Baylor University and also a Bachelor of Law Degree. He established a law practice at Vernon after graduation, and still considers Vernon to be his home.

Hightower was elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1952, and did not seek reelection. He was appointed district attorney in January of 1955, serving through December of 1961.

He served as president of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association and named to the Board of Regents of Midwestern University, and later as a member of the Baylor University Board of Trustees. He has also served as a director of the Baptist Standard.

He was honored by Howard Payne University with an honorary Doctor of Laws Degree in 1971.

Hightower is married and has three daughters, Alison Hightower of Waco, Amy Hightower of Dallas and Mrs. Ann Thornburg of Arlington, Va.

Jon Johnson New Baylor University Choral Director

The new Baylor University choral director is a lower Panhandle man with Wellington ties, and he did not hesitate when he was asked to fill a pair of mighty big shoes: those of legendary Baylor choir director Euell Porter.

Jon Johnson has some impressive credentials of his own, and like his predecessor also is the choir director at Seventh and James Baptist Church in Waco.

Born at Matador, reared at Quitaque and a frequent visitor in Wellington, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. O.V. Johnson.

When he began his new job, Johnson noted that his musical background was necessarily limited to church music, since a high school

with a graduating class of 8 has few music facilities.

But that religious background sparked an interest that has continued. It also led him to Baylor.

Wellington will remember when Johnson and his younger brothers, Jamie, Barry, and then 12-year-old Dickie had a band of their own.

"So I came and found myself studying under such masters as Dr. Porter, Herbert Colvin and Dean Daniel Sternberg. I even assisted the dean (Sternberg) one semester in productions of orchestra and opera--which is a long way from Quitaque," he recently told Bob Darden, Waco Tribune-Herald Entertainment Editor.

From plans for a career in teaching, Johnson found himself working toward his master's with a graduate assistantship, directing a choir.

"And the first time I got in front of a good choir, I thought, 'Man, this is it,' and that sold me."

He did teach at Richfield High School 6 years and his 1971 choir was one of three selected to perform at the Texas Music Educators Association convention. He moved on to the University of Illinois to seek his doctorate. He calls the experience an eye-opener.

"I attended classes taught by Charles Hamm, a nationally known musicologist. I realized I was sort of a 'musical snob.' Even though I had grown up in Bob Wills Country, 'I put it behind me as something less than the classics."

"But Hamm opened up a whole new world for me. He said the music of the popular culture is something

a serious musician should analyze, rather than dismiss."

Johnson's term paper that semester was on "The Influence of the Blues on Jimmie Rogers."

He studied extensively ethnic music of Appalachia. Later, as director of choral activities at the University of Mississippi, he was asked to be on the advisory board of the Center for the Study of Southern Cultures. He contributes to the board's Encyclopedia of Southern Cultures on Southern folk music and jazz.

He also directed other kinds of music, from acapella to oratorios, to musical comedies. He arranged and directed for The Group, an ensemble that performs contemporary pop and jazz.

"But in time, I missed Baylor and Texas. I missed the musical situation in Texas Schools--which is probably the best in the nation," Johnson told the Tribune-Herald editor.

"One of the reasons I wanted to return was the stability here. Having taught in state schools, there's something to be said for the table, traditional values in private education. State schools are great for some people, especially on a graduate level. But even the best of students can get lost there. Not at Baylor."

In his work as choir director at the 7th and James Baptist, he is also developing a strong children's program, which his wife, Willa Dale, will direct.

In summing up his return to Baylor, Johnson said: "My philosophy is to continue to affirm the idea of giving students the opportunity to perform--and hear--fine music."

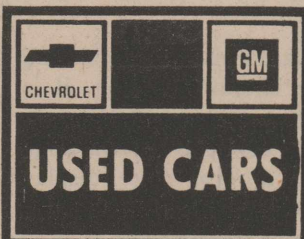

Bob Bullock Will Run for Reelection

AUSTIN -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Monday that he will run for reelection in 1982.

"My record for getting the job done is my platform," Bullock said.

Bullock was first elected the state's chief tax collector and financial officer in '74 with 70 percent of the vote. He was reelected in '78 without opposition in either the primary or the general election.

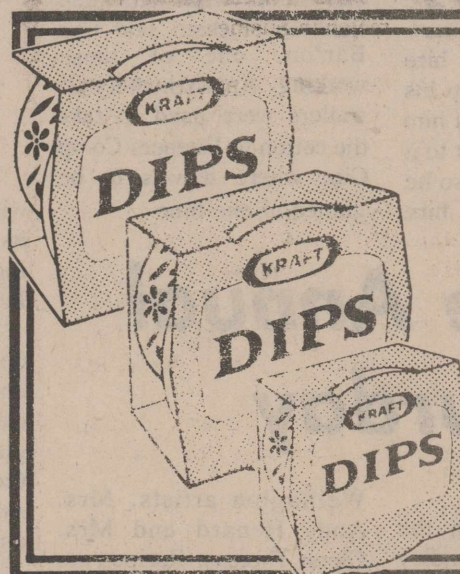
Bullock said he is proud of what the Comptroller's office has accomplished in the past five years but that "we don't intend to rest on our accomplishments now."

"There are a few tax deadbeats and delinquents who don't like it, but the vast majority of honest taxpayers and business people support our energetic and equal enforcement of the tax laws," Bullock said. "The people realize that every delinquent dollar collected -- both in Texas and from out-of-state -- is a dollar they don't have to make up in new taxes."

Democratic primary, of course.

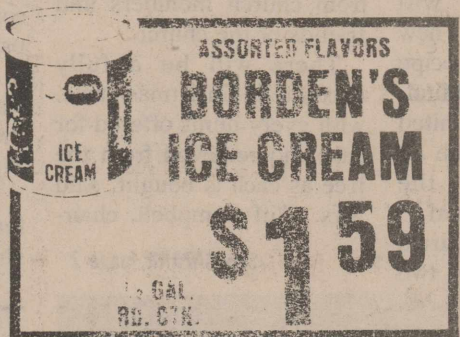
In '74 and '78, Bullock noted, he was "first to announce and first at the finish line -- just where I intend to be in '82."

Bullock said his early announcement "will end all speculation and give a lot of county-level politicians who may have toyed with the idea of running a chance to make up their minds."

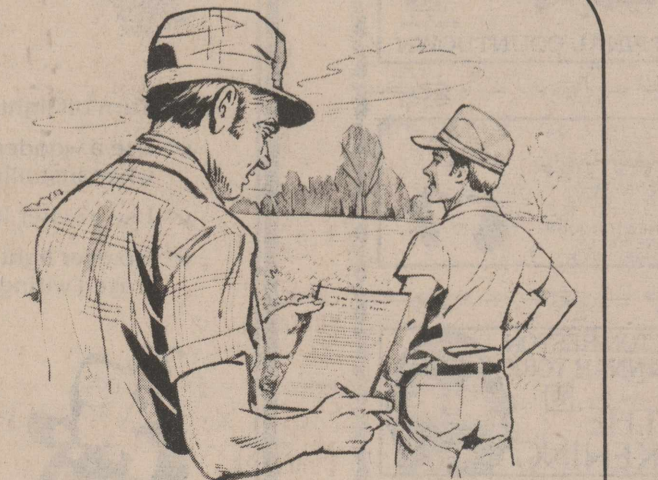

Rites Held Tuesday for Pearl Shaw

Mrs. Pearl Loving Moore Shaw, who had known Wellington for almost 75 years and who lived here during much of that time, died Monday, November 29, two days after her 93rd birthday.

Although Wellington was 20 years old when she came here to live, she found it still a "semi-frontier" town. Yet this was where she chose to put down her roots.

She was the daughter of the late Dr. J.H. Loving and Annie Porter Loving. She came here first in 1906, with her husband, the late Will Moore and their small son, from Blair, Oklahoma, where Dr. Loving had practiced medicine since 1899.

She and Mr. Moore were married April 30, 1905, and at Blair, and were farming there. The trip to Wellington took two days, traveling approximately 65 miles in wagons and buggies.

Many years later she wrote of the last one mile stretch toward her parents new farm in Collingsworth: "Dana (her sister) and I climbed off the wagons and walked barefooted until my feet were almost blistered. We were fascinated by the clean look of the reddish soil and wanted to get the feel of it."

About a year later she and her family moved to New Mexico and Moore filed on a quarter section about 25 miles from Tucumcari.

Later they moved to Tahoka, a time, she recalled, when Lubbock had only one train a day.

About 1910, they returned here to live in the Houselog community.

Afterward, Mrs. Shaw lived for many years in Oklahoma City before her final move back to Wellington.

She was born at Old Fate, Texas, and was living at Rockwall before the family moved to the Indian Territory in 1899.

Funeral services for Mrs. Shaw were conducted Tuesday at 2:30 p.m. in the Kelso Chapel with Bob Odle, minister of First Christian Church officiating. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under the direction of Kelso Funeral Home.

City Sales Tax Up Over 1979 Figure

Rebates to Wellington of the optional one-percent city sales tax to November 6, 1980, is running about 8 percent above the rebates for the November period one year ago, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

For the one-month's pay period ending November 6, Wellington received \$12,763.79 with 1980 payments to date totaling \$66,131.05.

Payments for the November period 1979 totaled \$11,103.06. For the 1979 payments through November 29 were \$60,813.91.

Bullock said November 1980 payments were \$80.1 million to all Texas cities with the yearly total being \$526.9 million-nearly \$60 million more than cities received during 1979.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office to the cities where it is levied.

Mixed Drink Tax \$215

Collingsworth County has received \$215.82 in mixed drink tax remittances from the offices of State Comptroller Bob Bergland.

This represents the county's 15 percent of the total county drink tax revenue of \$1,438.78.

Texas cities and counties receive a 15 percent rebate of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized mixed drink sales.

Slaton in Lubbock County received the smallest rebate check, \$5.53 on the sale of \$368.90 in mixed drinks during the third quarter.

Houston's check was for \$931,050 on sales of more than \$62 million during the quarter.

The tax is collected by the

County Gross Vehicle Sales Tax \$124,485

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has announced that for the 12-month period that ended September 1, 1980, the four percent motor vehicle tax, levied on the sale of cars, trucks, motorcycles, and mobile homes amounted to \$124,485.14 for Collingsworth County.

This reflects the lower sales in the automobile industry for this period.

State-wide, the collections amounted to \$439.4 million, which Bullock said was \$3.7 million less than was collected in the previous one-year period.

Motor vehicle sales taxes are collected by county tax assessor-collectors and the counties retain five percent of the amount and send the rest to the state.

The county's part of the \$124,485.14 sales tax gross collections for this county gave Collingsworth approximately \$6,224 for its part.

Oil & Gas

A mineral deed with life estate reserved has been filed in the county clerk's office in which Mofyt Russell conveys to his wife, Gladys Russell and thereafter to Connie Jo Russell Howell, and undivided 1/5 of 1/32 of 1/8 overriding royalty interest in oil, gas and other minerals produced on 15,105.60 acres of land in the north part of Block 12, southern part of Block 13 and in the Oklahoma Strip block. One tract is for gas only and another includes casinghead gas, while a third designates production only to a depth of 2,500 feet.

Alcoholic Beverage Commission and the city-county rebates are sent out quarterly by the Comptroller's office.

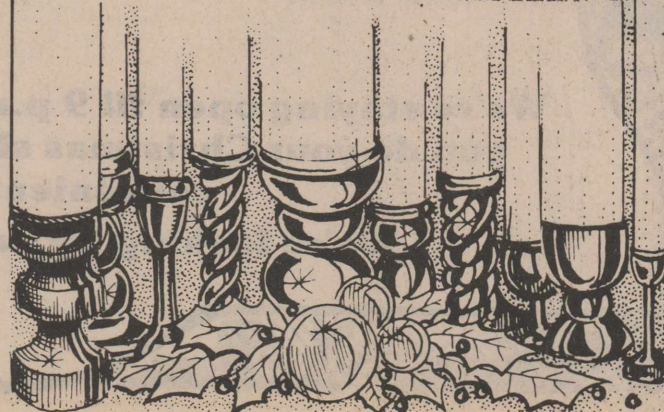

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — Every ten years the Texas Legislature knocks down the "fences" which mark the boundaries of legislative and congressional districts, and redraws the political map.

The process is called redistricting, and though it only occurs once a decade, it is one of the most important duties of the Legislature.

What is the function of redistricting?

The law requires that legislative and congressional districts must be as equal in population as practicable. At the end of each decade, population shifts in Texas counties have thrown the districts out of balance, population-wise. Simply stated, some districts grow to have more people than other districts. Redistricting is a tune-up, an attempt to start over by making every district equal again for another ten years.

Two New Seats

The Texas Constitution requires that the state redistrict after each decennial U.S. census. Because of the state's rapid population growth, Texas is likely to receive two new seats in the U.S. House of Representatives in 1981, bringing the Texas delegation's voting strength to 26.

The number of seats in the Texas Legislature will by law remain unchanged: 150

in the House of Representatives and 31 in the Senate.

While the courts keep a close watch on the redistricting process to keep minority parties and ethnic groups from being deprived of fair representation, the "Redistricting Legislature" is a political free-for-all in many respects. In general, the most powerful group in the Legislature (whatever its characteristics may be) will try to influence redistricting in order to dilute its opposition.

For example, if the majority group wants to get rid of an urban legislator who has given them stout resistance, they may draw him into a district in which he will face mostly rural voters, hoping he cannot adjust and will be defeated. There are many variations on that theme.

The redistricting plan is drawn up and passed like any other bill. The bulk of the work is done in committee and then sent to the floor for a vote. Traditionally, the House and Senate draw plans for themselves. Once one chamber has approved a redistricting plan for itself, the other chamber usually approves it without amendment.

If the Legislature fails to adopt a plan, or if a plan is vetoed by the Governor, then the responsibility for drawing a plan is given to the Legislative Redistricting Board.

False Social Security Salesmen Operate

Out of town insurance salesmen, who appear to represent themselves to older residents in a way that makes them appear to be from Social Security Administration, have been reported in Wellington in recent weeks and in the Panhandle for at least two months," according to Tessie Burba, Community Action director.

Complaints have been made to Mrs. Burba.

"The thing we want to emphasize to older people is: Do not let anyone in your house that you do not know," she declared.

These salespeople are operating within the law, it was pointed out, but their statements, can cause older people on whom they call to believe they represent the Social Security Administration, and need to see them about the person's Medicare and Medicaid. An appointment is set up.

On the second visit, the "representative" discovers the individual "needs more insurance coverage", and attempts to sell a policy, that in fact, is not needed at all.

"Our advice is: If you think you do need additional insurance, there are a number of local agencies who will be happy to work

with you. We recommend that you do all your business with someone you know. Again we say, do not let anyone in your house without proper identification," Mrs. Burba emphasized.

Keep Records To Support Tax Claims

Taxpayers, especially those who itemize, should begin compiling receipts and other records to support claims on their Federal tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service advises. These records can be used to back up claims in case the return is examined and also assist taxpayers by reminding them of potentially overlooked deductions.

For easy reference, the records should be sorted into the categories which appear on Schedule A of Form 1040, the IRS says. When itemizing, taxpayers should bear in mind interest paid on loans and mortgages, as well as payments for medical insurance which are documented on various financial statements. These amounts are often deductible, and frequently overlooked.

Medical expenses, union dues and charitable contributions are a few other commonly claimed deductions for which IRS examiners often request supporting evidence. Keeping cancelled checks, pay stubs, and bills can be helpful in supporting these claims. However, the IRS notes that taxpayers should not attach receipts or cancelled checks to their tax returns.




