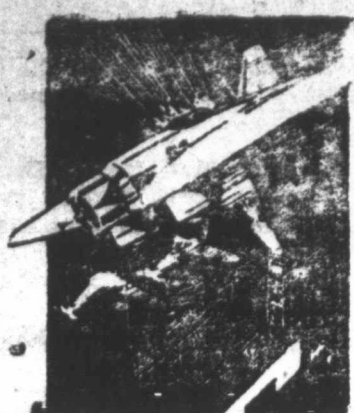




On The BEAM

This editor has for a good many years advocated a balanced farming program for this community. We have advocated raising of cows, sows and hens on farms to help the income of farmers. We have warned of the danger of a one crop system to the economy of the community.

For a few years many farmers did keep "the cow, the sow and the hen" on their farms—and they helped make them a good living too. But the high price of cotton, the high price of beef and the tendency of each farmer to farm more and more land has knocked the program into a cocked hat. Nowadays we buy milk produced a long way from home, pork produced in the corn belt and eggs that are produced in Arkansas—We include most farmers in this area.

This year our cotton crop is going to be short—where the money come from to buy milk, butter, eggs and pork? There are some farmers in this community who will not be able to go to the bank and borrow money with which to make a crop next year. Their crop of cotton this year is not going to pay them out of debt, they have used up their collateral. What can they do unless this county is placed in the disaster area and the government steps in to loan such farmers money to make a crop next year?

If those farmers we refer to had been following the "cow, sow and hen" theory they would have collateral for a bank loan. And in all probability would have enough money to pay out of debt even though the cotton crop is short.

Loraine's First Bale Season of 1917



In 1917 the cotton crop was short in this country, not many bales were ginned here in that year, and still less in 1918. Above is R. L. May astride his horse and behind him is the first bale of cotton brought to Loraine by him in 1917. He made five other bales that year.

He says the merchants of Loraine were all too poor at that time to raise a premium. One merchant gave him a pocket knife and that is all the premium he received. Mr. May is 78 years old and still rides his horse.

The first bale of 1952 cotton was brought in Thursday, Sept. 6, by Lewis Lemones who farms the W. H. Narrell farm south of town.

The bale was ginned by the Co-operative Gin Association and weighed 520 pounds. It was ginned from 1850 pounds of seed cotton.

Premium for the first bale was \$85.50 plus the ginning of four bales of cotton, one at each of the four gins.

Two more bales were ginned the same day the first one was brought in. The second bale, brought in by J. J. Land, was about thirty minutes behind the first bale. The third bale was brought in by O. C. Gabler.

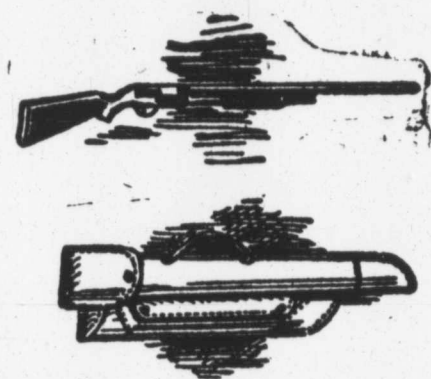

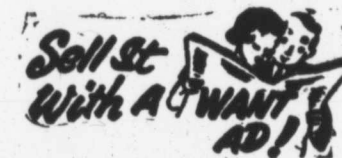

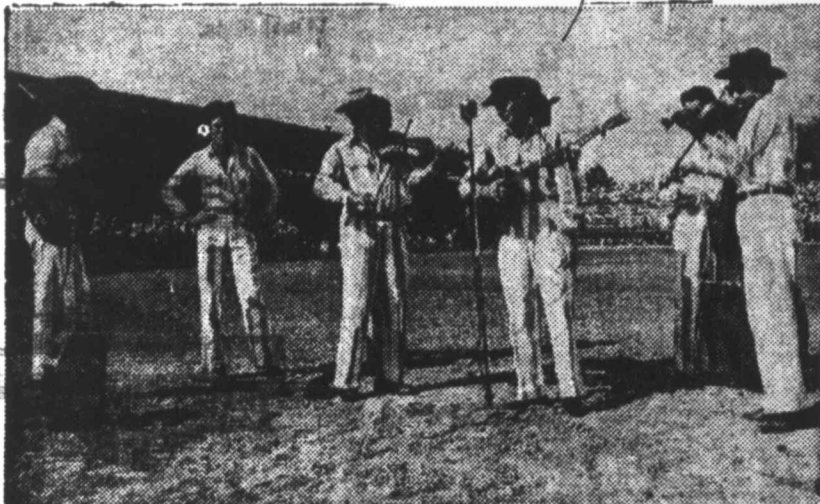

Dry Ranges Cause Vitamin Deficiency

COLLEGE STATION.—Present range and pasture conditions are conducive to the development of Vitamin A deficiency among farm animals. The lack of green feeds, over a long period of time, may result in a condition that is characterized in the early stages by night blindness and later by a loss of energy and appetite, swelling at the joints, rapid breathing, staggering gait, convulsions, nasal discharge, watering at the eyes and complete blindness. This condition, says U. D. Thompson, assistant extension animal husbandman of Texas A&M College is caused by a lack of Vitamin A in the animals' rations.

He points out that research work conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station shows that cattle placed in the feedlot and limited to such ra-

tions as cottonseed meal, cottonseed hulls, white corn and other white grains are often affected by the condition. Following long dry periods, cattle placed in dry lots and on Vitamin deficient rations may show symptoms of Vitamin A deficiency in a relatively short time. Younger animals become effected sooner than the older ones.

Thompson says that calves born to cows which have been subjected to a shortage of Vitamin A usually are in very poor condition at birth and unless placed on cows receiving adequate Vitamin A, may die within two or three weeks.

Farm animals, he says, get most of their Vitamin A requirements from Carotene which is found in green range or pasture grasses and green hays. The carotene is changed into Vitamin A by a process that takes place in the liver of the animal which is also the chief storehouse of both carotene and Vitamin A in the

body.

Both carotene and Vitamin A are destroyed when exposed to air and light. The process is hastened by high temperatures, however, heat in the absence of oxygen has only a minor effect says Thompson. Large losses of carotene occur during the curing of roughages, especially when they are cured in direct sunlight. The lack of green color in hay, or fodder means that a large percentage of the vitamin A potency is lost. This fact emphasizes the need for preserving the color in forages at harvest time.

Thompson says that research has shown that the addition of a pound of good green alfalfa hay to the daily ration will protect the animals from a deficiency of the vitamin when they are receiving a deficient ration. The giving of cod liver oil to effected animals will also correct the situation.

To guard against any occurrence of the deficiency condition he advises watching for night

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q I want to name my two children as beneficiaries of my National Service Life Insurance policy, but I'd like to arrange things so that one of them will receive 60 per cent of the insurance and the other 40 per cent.

A Yes. You may specify exactly how you want your insurance money paid out, in addition to specifying who is to get the money. Any VA office will help you with the details.

Q I'm a soldier, badly hurt in the line of duty, and expect to be discharged from the service soon. While I'm in the service, I'm covered by the free \$10,000 indemnity insurance, but that coverage will stop 120 days after my discharge. What type of GI insurance may I get afterwards? I realize I'll have to pay the coverage.

A After your discharge, you will have two choices: (1) the five-year level premium term policy, issued without a physical examination, but for which you must apply to VA within 120 days of your separation from service, or (2) any plan of the special NSLI that is issued only to disabled veterans. You may apply to VA for this within one year from the date VA finds you are suffering from disabilities for which compensation would be payable. In either case, any VA contact representative can supply you with further details.

Still Time To Plant Winter Legumes

COLLEGE STATION.—The continuing dry hot weather over much of Texas is not conducive to getting a big acreage of fall and winter legumes planted but as the old timers say "It has always rained." So despite the drought, farmers should be making plans now for getting the seed and fertilizers they will need for their legume planting.

According to E. A. Miller, Extension agronomist of Texas A. & M. College there is still lots of time for planting legumes. In most areas of the state the best time for fall planting is from the middle of September to November 1st and not later than November 15th.

Recommended legumes for the Rolling Plains area are alfalfa, hairy vetch, sweetclover and Austrian winter peas. Alfalfa does especially well on the sub-irrigated soils of the area.

Miller suggests that you check with your local county agent for information on the best legumes for your particular area as well as on fertilizing, inoculating and seeding operations.

They studied the new laws on the use of wetbacks.

Mexican workers are recruited in Mexico and transported to Reception centers located in Harlingen, Eagle Pass, and El Paso by the U. S. Employment Service. The cost of recruitment and transportation is borne by the farmers using the workers. At present, this amounts to \$15 per worker, which must be paid before the worker may be contracted.

An employer may be an individual, an association, or a group of individuals engaged in Agriculture. As agriculture is defined it does not include ranching. Briefly, in areas the Texas

Employment Commission decides are short of agricultural workers, farmers may apply for these migrant workers. He will be notified as to when and where to pick them up. The employer must furnish the Mexican worker hygienic lodgings adequate to the climatic conditions of the area of employment and not inferior to those of the average type generally furnished to domestic agricultural workers in this area. The employer is also required to furnish liability insurance and to pay the prevailing wage rate, to furnish water and fuel, to guarantee a certain number of work days during the period of the work contract, and to guarantee that the worker may purchase the things he wishes at the place of his choice. Many other requirements are also included in the new law and agreements with the Mexican government.

Delegates from the Mitchell County Home Demonstration Council have returned from the Silver Anniversary celebration of the Home Demonstration Association at A&M College.

Those attending from Mitchell County were Mrs. Virgil Moser, President of the Fairview Club; Mrs. A. J. Hooks, County HDA Chairman; Mrs. Roy Wells, President of the North Loraine Home Demonstration Club and Mrs. Emabeth Towery, Home Demonstration Agent.

Mrs. Nathan King, a new member of the faculty at Junior High will organize a string ensemble among the students of Junior High school students who join will furnish their own instruments and the ensemble is limited to 12 in number.

Mrs. King came to Colorado City from Handley, Texas and taught for four years in Fort Worth Public Schools.

Good news in the oil picture was the setting of pipe in the Winn number 1, 18 miles south Colorado City. This indicated an attempt to make a producer out of the well, which has shown oil but little gas pressure and will not flow.

The fact that three major companies owned a piece of the well, complicated the outlook, since all had a voice in the decision as to whether to set more than a mile of pipe in the well and hope to get out enough oil to get their money back.

A hundred sacks of cement were used to case off the water which was getting into the well and it is possible that five off-sets may be drilled, if the well makes a producer.

A. W. Bryant, 73, of Route 1, Colorado City was struck by a switch engine and painfully injured about 9 o'clock Friday morning.

Bryant was walking down the tracks and failed to note the approach of the switch engine, piloted by J. J. Smith, local engineer. According to B. McQuerry, T&P agent, the engineer whistled several times at the elderly man and thought he was going to get off the tracks. By the time it was evident that he was not, the engine was too close to stop completely.

Hospital attendants at the Root Hospital said that he may have a few cracked ribs, but apparently is not seriously injured.

Monday night Colorado City's council met for their regular monthly meeting and promoted 46 year old Bill Oyer from Acting Director of Public Utilities to Superintendent of Water Works. Oyer has been employed by the city since 1943.

The council also voted to employ John Worrell as City Attorney at a flat rate of \$150 per month. Colorado City has been without a city attorney since the resignation of George Leonard several months ago.

The Chamber of Commerce Aviation Committee, including members—Eldon Mahon and Tom Jay Goss II, appeared before the council, accompanied by L. A. Chapman, manager of the C. of C. and Jack Robson, CAA Airport Engineer. The council voted to employ an engineering firm to make topography surveys on an airport site.

In other council action: the council heard schoolboard members J. C. Bradley and Frank Kelley, who discussed the possibility of building a new negro school, voted to extend water and lights into negro and Latin American sections and voted to accept bids for a new police car.

The annual Mitchell County Singing Convention is to be held Sunday at Junior Hi. The program will begin at 10 A. M. Business men and farmers will furnish a barbecue to be held at Ruddick Park. Mitchell County women who attend are asked to carry salads and pies to go with the barbecue.

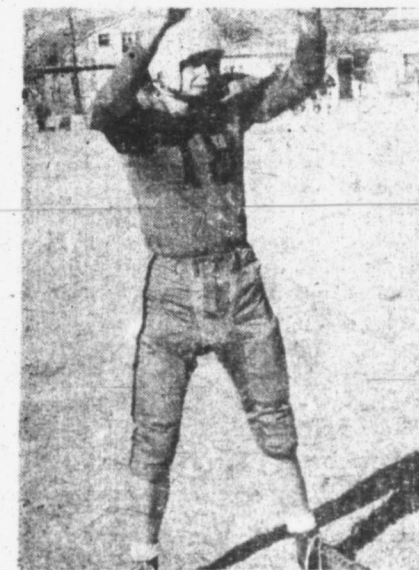

Humble To Broadcast Football Games

Humble Oil & Refining Co. will kick off its eighteenth consecutive season of the Southwest conference football broadcasts on Friday, September 21, at 9:20 C. S. T. The game will feature the Texas Aggies versus U. C. L. Social Security Rep. At Colorado City

Mr. Glen McNatt, Field Representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Colorado City at 10:00 a. m. on Wednesday, September 19. Persons wishing assistance with retirement claims or death claims under the Social Security Act, or needing information about their social security accounts, should call at that time for necessary help and information.

Many self-employed persons do not know that the 1950 amendments to the Social Security Act extend coverage to them, according to Glen McNatt. This change became effective on January 1, 1951. Self-employed persons now have the same rights to benefits on behalf of themselves and their families as employees.

Self-employment includes individual store owners, partners, pulpwood operators, owners of shoe shine stands and numerous other business activities. There are 14 specific exceptions for professional people, among them doctors and lawyers.

Self-employment coverage is not voluntary. The individual is either covered or not covered. The self-employed person's is not reported until the end of the year and will be reported with his annual income tax return. The first report is due before March 15, 1952. The tax is 2 1/2% of the first \$3,600 of net business profit.

The self-employed persons who want further information can get a leaflet from the Social Security Administration, 308 Post Office Building, Abilene, Texas, explaining self-employment income.
