Reagan may seek more spending cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's 1983 budget includes a series of spending cuts, tax increases, user fees and administrative savings — not all of which Congress will like — sources said Friday night.

Without approval, however, the sources said it will hard for Reagan to increase the military budget as dramatically as he wants and still keep the federal deficit below \$100 billion a year.

Congressional sources, who asked not to be identified by name, said that when Reagan unveils his 1983 budget next Monday, he also will propose \$2.4 billion in cuts for 1982.

Otherwise, sources said Reagan's 1982 deficit forecast of \$98.6 billion would balloon to \$101 billion. They said the near-future looks like this in the Reagan budget, due for release next Monday.

For 1983, Congress will be asked to enact a five-part budget savings plan saving \$56 billion. Even so, the deficit

would reach an estimated \$91.5 billion. For 1984, Congress will need to cut \$84 billion to achieve a deficit of \$83 billion. For 1985, Reagan needs \$99 billion from Congress to hold the deficit to \$72 billion.

But many of the upcoming Reagan proposals will be difficult to win from Congress. Many members have expressed reluctance to cut once again into domestic programs, especially with Reagan resisting reduction for defense.

SOME OF THE president's recommendations for charging user fees for federal services already have been turned down by Congress once, for example. Another recommendation, for tax withholding on dividend and interest income, already has been disowned by senior Republicans in Congress.

For the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1, sources provided these details of Reagan's plan to stem the tide of red ink:

— Cuts in domestic programs of \$14.2 billion. Many of the programs affected include those that were chopped a year ago at Reagan's request. The Legal Services would be wiped out. Social Services block grants would be cut by 18 percent, and low income energy assistance would be reduced by \$600 million.

Training and employment programs would be cut by \$2.2 billion. Funding for non-interstate highways would be cut by 21 percent, and mass transit operating subsidies would be reduced by 38 percent. Amtrak would be cut by \$185 million. Education programs would be cut by \$1.2 billion. Energy and natural resources programs would be cut by \$1.6 billion.

— BENEFIT PROGRAMS would be cut by \$12.8 billion. Included are Medicaid, \$2 billion; Medicare, \$2.5 billion; the government's main welfare program, \$1.2 billion; food stamps, \$2.4 billion; Supplemental Security Income,

\$300 million; civilian and military pensions, \$2.7 billion; student loans \$800 million; \$300 million from nutrition programs.

— Tax changes which will raise \$7.2 billion. These include a revised minimum tax on corporations, which would raise \$2.3 billion. Changes in accounting methods, repeal of business energy tax credits changes in tax-exempt revenue bonds and other, smaller alterations in the tax code would raise another \$4.9 billion.

— A "management savings" of \$20.3 billion, including \$8.4 billion from accelerated offshoring of oil and gas reserves; \$5.5 billion from enhanced Internal Revenue collection and enforcement, including the withholding proposal for dividends and interest; \$4 billion from debt collection and elimination of waste, fraud and abuse and \$1 billion from surplus property disposal. Federal pay restraint was said to save \$1.4 billion.

Top Reagan aides plot strategy at Camp David

WASHINGTON (AP) — Leaving President Reagan behind, top White House advisers met at Camp David on Friday to plot 1982 political and legislative strategy, aides said.

While virtually all of the key White House staff members gathered at the presidential hideaway, Reagan met briefly with members of the House and Senate and an agricultural task force sending aid to Peru, accepted diplomatic credentials from three ambassadors, and then returned to his living quarters for the afternoon.

The meeting occurred in the wake of several personnel changes at the top of the administration, and a public opinion poll that found 62 percent of those questioned saying they were not better off now than they were a year ago when Reagan took office.

One aide said that the president's popularity and the 1982 congressional elections were on the agenda, with James A. Baker, the president's chief of staff, presiding.

Deputy White House press secretary Pete Rousell said Reagan would be given a report "at the appropriate time" after the day-long meeting on

"where we go from here" in the effort to win enactment of the president's domestic programs.

"A synopsis of what they discuss up there will be presented to him. I'm sure someone will report to him at some point," the spokesman said. But he said no time had been set aside for such a briefing before Reagan sets out on a two-day trip to the Midwest on Monday afternoon.

Asked why Reagan was not taking part, Rousell said: "They've had similar meetings in the past and he hasn't participated in those, so that would be consistent with the past format."

An aide to White House spokesman David R. Gergen, one of the participants, said there had been a similar planning meeting "a couple of weeks ago."

The participants Friday included presidential counselor Edwin Meese III, deputy staff chief Michael K. Deaver, and Larry Speakes, the chief deputy White House press secretary. Vice President George Bush was on a speaking trip to North Carolina and Florida, and none of his staff attended, Rousell said.

Also absent were William P. Clark, the national security adviser; Elizabeth Dole, assistant for public liaison and the only woman on Reagan's senior staff, and Reagan's liaisons with minority groups.

A New York Times-CBS News poll marking Reagan's first anniversary in office found that 37 percent of those surveyed thought they were better off than a year ago and 62 percent thought they were not.

Welfare fraud 'staggering,' FBI says

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — The first government computer crackdown on welfare fraud in Texas has uncovered a "staggering" amount of cheating by employees of the City of San Antonio and Bexar County, the FBI reports.

"We've turned up staggering amounts of fraud," local FBI Agent-in-Charge John C. Lawn said. "More than a few public employees are cheating the government."

"The computer check, known as 'Project Match' continues in seven other counties surrounding San Antonio.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Daniel Maeso said the first 40 to 50 cases are expected to be presented to a federal grand jury for indictment in March. All involve City of San Antonio or Bexar

County employees, Maeso said. "I expect the dollar amount of fraud to run into the hundreds of thousands when the investigation is complete and all the cases are made," Maeso said.

MAESO SAID FBI agents not only were turning up cases of welfare fraud, but they also are learning about other possible violations, such as Social Security cheating. That information will be forwarded to appropriate agencies for action, he said.

"It will be an impact case in Texas," Lawn predicted, because success in rooting out welfare fraud here may prompt similar investigations elsewhere.

Project Match began here in March and was the first investigation of its kind in Texas.

The computer check involves comparisons of public payroll records and those of the Texas Department of Human Resources, which makes welfare payments in Texas.

Computers were programmed to match identical or similar names on public payrolls and on lists of those receiving food stamps and Aid to Families with Dependent Children, investigators said.

EVENTUALLY EVERY public employee living and working in Bexar, Atascosa, Bandera, Comal, Guadalupe, Kendall, Medina and Wilson counties will be scrutinized. This will include all military personnel, federal and state civil service workers and municipal and county employees in the eight counties, federal officials said.

There were 113,193 such employees in those counties as of last April, including about 7,000 on San Antonio's city payroll and 1,900 on Bexar County's payroll.

Some 190,000 people in the eight counties are paid approximately \$92 million in food stamps and AFDC payments annually, the Department of Human Resources reported.

The federal grand jury subpoenaed computer tapes of the welfare rolls and public payroll records for the eight counties last April.

"So far, they've only gone over the municipal and county employees in San Antonio and Bexar County," Maeso said.

The federal attorney said no elected officials had been implicated so far.

St. Jude saga ends in death

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — A man who "never recovered" from the leukemia death of his young son was shot and killed by police Friday night after holding three hostages for more than 24 hours at the hospital where the boy was treated, officials said.

The hostages, two women and one man, were released unharmed at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital, police said.

Jean Claude Goulet, 40, of Laplace, La., was killed by police gunfire, police director E. Winslow Chapman said.

Authorities had negotiated around the clock by telephone with Goulet, 40, a welder from Laplace, La., who, armed with a .357 Magnum pistol, burst into St. Jude on Thursday and took four people captive in a first-floor windowless examining room, Chapman said.

A fourth hostage, a 64-year-old doctor, was released in exchange for food a few hours later. The three others were identified as Dr. Paul Bowman, chief of the hospital's leukemia service and the favorite doctor of Goulet's son; Jean Marie Cox, the boy's favorite nurse; and Jo Cummings, a psychologist.

CHAPMAN SAID Goulet had prepared a tape about his views on leukemia which he asked to have played on Memphis radio stations.

However, after the 8-minute tape recorded by police was broadcast, Goulet said he was dissatisfied with its quality, police said.

The statement was read by Bowman, who said, "Jean feels that research laboratories are being built solely to find a cure and not the cause of leukemia... one must find the cause before you can find a cure." The doctor also said Goulet was unhappy because his son was given experimental drugs at Bowman's direction.

Goulet forced the hostages into the small room shortly before 1:30 p.m. Thursday. He smoked marijuana, and also played poker with the hostages, with whom he apparently had developed a "real comradeship," said Chief Police Inspector A.L. Williams.

Earlier Friday, Williams said the ordeal did not appear to be wearing on Goulet, whom he described as calm, although occasionally irrational. Chipman said the hostages' moods were "super."

AT LEAST TWO of the hostages were handcuffed, and the room had no bathroom or running water, officials

said. Police did not know how long Goulet had been in Memphis.

Hospital spokesman Jerry Chipman said Goulet's 6-year-old son, Robert Michael, died Dec. 27, 1980, after treatment at St. Jude. The hospital was founded 20 years ago by entertainer Danny Thomas, who was in telephone contact with officials during the incident.

Goulet's former wife, Phyllis, 33, who lives in Cridersville, Ohio, with two other children, called her ex-husband "a very sad, very lonely man" who was unable to cope with Michael's death.

She said Goulet had threatened the hospital and its personnel in the past, but she had not taken the statements seriously.

"I guess I should have," she said. Wilma Leis, Mrs. Goulet's sister, said she was taking the death "very hard. She went all to pieces."

Goulet, a native of Montreal, had called her Monday night and "said he was going to do something — but he's made threats like that before," said Mrs. Goulet. Her former husband, she said, "didn't like St. Jude. He doesn't like anything anymore."

"I tried to tell him he should snap out of this because Michael wouldn't want him to be depressed all the time," she said. "This whole thing has been growing inside of him ever since Michael was diagnosed."

SHE SAID HER former husband believed DES, which she took in 1973 before she knew she was pregnant, may have been the source of the child's disease.

DES — its full name is diethylstilbestrol — was prescribed to help prevent miscarriages until it was banned for that use in 1971. The drug continued in limited use as a "morning-after" birth control pill. It has been linked to cervical cancer in the daughters of women who took it, but has not been linked to leukemia.

Chipman said the incident forced only minor changes in routine at St. Jude, primarily an out-patient facility. About half of the 80 outpatients scheduled for treatment Friday had their appointments rescheduled. Others were taken in through a rear entrance.

St. Jude, founded in 1962, tries to keep seriously ill children alive while research continues into possible cures. Treatment is free, and the hospital is supported with grants, donations and proceeds from the annual Danny Thomas Memphis Classic golf tournament.

State unemployment fund said to be going broke

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Unless Texas' unemployment compensation fund gets some help, it could go broke — at a cost of up to a 400 percent rise in employers' taxes, members of a legislative committee were told Friday.

Congress is considering restoring some of the budget cuts that have resulted so far in the closing of 65 Texas Employment Commission offices and layoffs of about 800 TEC employees. Five other offices may be closed and 500 more employees were scheduled to be laid off this month.

The additional money may allow the agency to reopen up to 50 offices and save the 500 employees currently under the shadow of layoffs, but TEC still would not be at the same funding level as last year, TEC Administrator Ernie Tullis told members of the Texas House Employment Practices Subcommittee on Budget and Oversight.

Without some budget relief, Tullis said, the state's trust fund, which is used to pay unemployment benefits, could go broke within a few months. For each \$5 million the fund drops below a federally-set "floor," Texas employers' taxes rise one percent, he said.

Tullis said currently the fund is at \$224 million. The floor is \$225 million. If the fund went bust, Tullis said, an employer could face paying \$276 a year per employee — instead of \$6.

He said one long-term solution to TEC's funding problem would be a tax on non-profit organizations and local governments, which currently only reimburse the state's unemployment fund when their employees receive benefits. They pay no administrative costs of operating employment programs, and the federal government is powerless to tax them. But the state could, he said.

"Our state leaders need to decide what is the minimal level of employment services we need in Texas," Tullis said, but he would not endorse a suggestion that the state take total responsibility for funding and providing the programs.

"The cutbacks that are closing the offices and laying off employees aren't saving the taxpayers any money, are they?" asked subcommittee Chairman Ed Watson, D-Deer Park.

"No," Tullis told him, pointing out that Texas employers are required to pay a minimum tax.

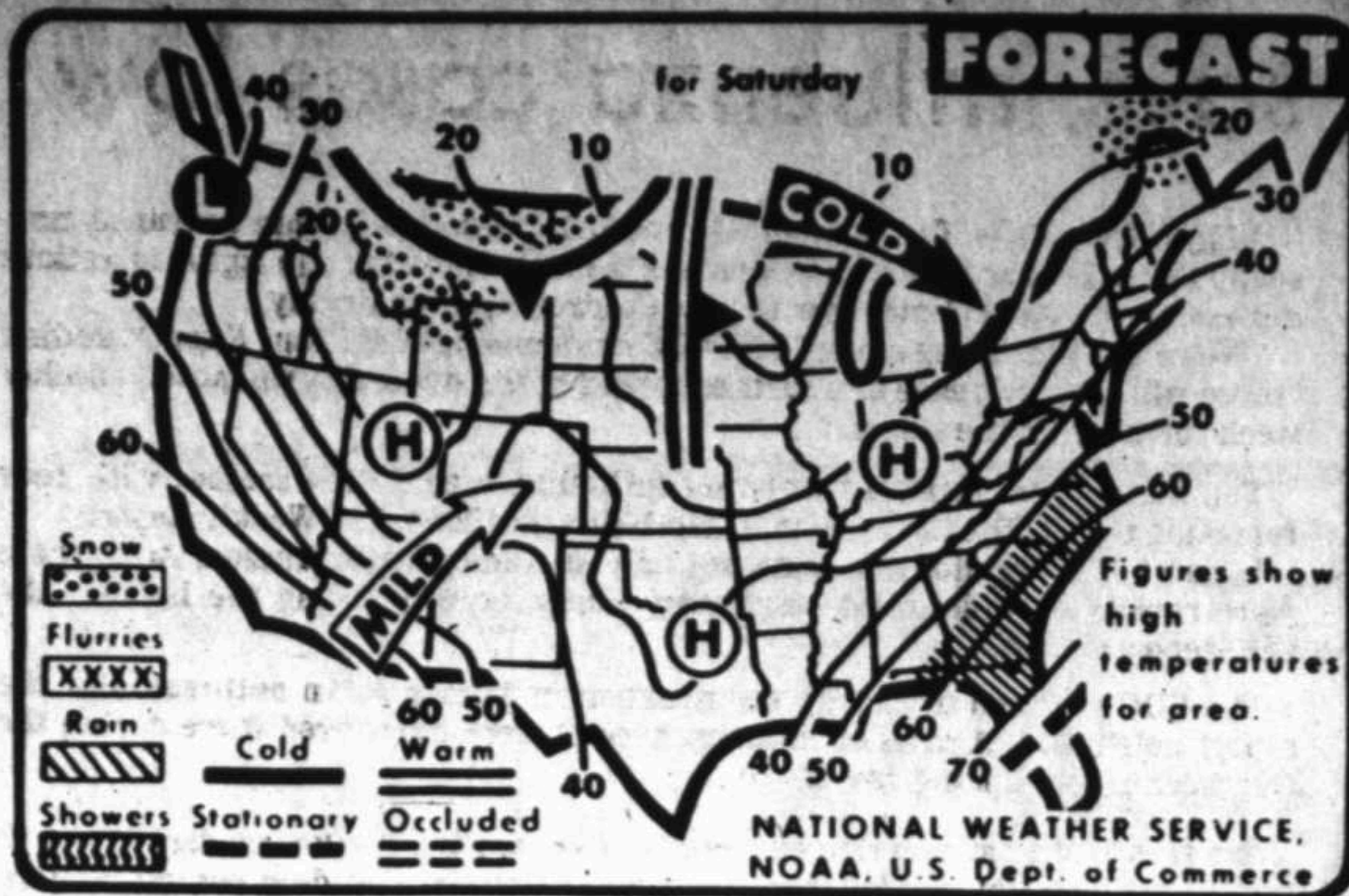

U.S. planes arrive in El Salvador

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — U.S. transport planes arrived Friday with the first replacements for aircraft damaged in last week's guerrilla raid on El Salvador's military air base, well-informed sources said.

Guerrillas trying to topple the civilian-military junta meanwhile claimed they had taken control of the southeastern section of this small Central American nation. The claim has not been confirmed and the military reportedly rejected the broadcast as "psychological warfare."

A military source, who requested anonymity, said that in the first four hours of the airlift three Hercules cargo planes arrived with three Huey-1 transport helicopters for the Salva-

doran military.

A source at the U.S. Embassy here said the report was true.

More than a dozen aircraft were damaged or destroyed in the Jan. 27 attack on Ilopango Airport, seven miles outside this capital, by guerrillas using dynamite charges, mortars and bazooka-type rocket launchers.

Guerrilla broadcasts on the clandestine station Radio Venceremos claimed that 70 percent of the military's air strength was destroyed in the attack.

The Reagan administration had supplied 14 Huey helicopters for the military's use in its fight against the leftist insurgency. There were reports that six of the Hueys were among the aircraft destroyed last week.

Freezing rain, snow covers North Texas

Freezing rain and snow fell Friday in much of North Texas, coating roads with ice, snarling traffic and forcing some workers and students to stay home.

Freezing drizzle was reported as far south as the Hill Country of San Antonio and Austin, and a winter storm watch was issued Friday for South Central and East Texas because of the possibility of freezing precipitation.

Temperatures were bitterly cold. The wind chill factor in the Panhandle was 30-40 below zero, with temperatures hovering just above zero and winds reaching 10 to 15 mph.

Readings in South Texas and along the Coastal Plain were mostly in the 40s, but the National Weather Service said the colder air was moving south.

At 10 a.m. Friday, temperatures were at or below freezing north of a line from Longview to San Antonio to Del Rio, and travelers advisories were in effect because of icy or snow-covered roads.

Traffic accidents and delays were numerous, and some roads and bridges were closed awhile in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. Fort Worth police said they "stopped counting" accidents at one point and were responding only to major crashes.

The driver of a tractor-trailer truck

was killed Friday morning when the east-bound rig jackknifed while crossing a bridge on Interstate 30 west of Dallas.

In San Antonio, four members of a family were overcome by carbon monoxide fumes early Friday as they burned charcoal in a wash tub to keep warm inside their home.

A relative said electricity and natural gas had been disconnected because the family could not pay its utility bills. The four were found by the unidentified relative inside their house about 1 a.m. and were rushed by ambulance to Medical Center Hospital. They were released after four hours of treatment.

Dallas Independent School District

schools were open Friday, but classes were canceled at some suburban schools and in Fort Worth and at some area colleges.

Texas Instruments canceled its second and third shifts at North Texas plants because of the hazardous driving conditions. Those plants include ones in Dallas, Plano, Lewisville and Sherman.

The National Weather Service said the entire state was under overcast skies Friday.

Record low temperatures were set in Amarillo and Lubbock. A reading of 3 at Lubbock at 2 a.m. broke the date's previous record of 9 set in 1923. Amarillo's 5 below zero broke a record of 2 set in 1905.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements, despite raising the ire of groups he thought were on his side, said Friday he stands by his Washington testimony in favor of extension of the Voting Rights Act with no changes.

Clements told a U.S. Senate Judiciary subcommittee on Thursday that he favored a 10-year extension of the currently existing act, which requires Texas and other states to get federal permission to make changes in the electoral process.

The governor had gone to Washington with the support of four minority organizations and the League of Women Voters. The League of Women Voters and the NAACP jumped ship after they heard what Clements said.

Diana Clark, president of the Texas League of Women Voters, said she thought Clements planned to speak in favor of a Voting Rights Act approved by the U.S. House, and pending in the Senate.

Mrs. Clark and NAACP officials said they support the House version of the act. She said there might have been a misunderstanding on Clements' position.

"There isn't any misunderstanding," Clements said Friday. "If you don't mind me saying so, I think that the misunderstanding, if any, was on the part of perhaps two of the participants who assumed something that was never said."

CLEMENTS, AT A news conference, said the House version of the bill "was never discussed in our meeting, in any way, shape or form."

"I am for the bill as it is now constituted. I am against the House bill. My position is very clear," he said.

The major difference between the existing law and the House-proposed version has to do with intent. The U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that the present law requires litigants to prove that officials who changed voting laws or boundaries intended to discriminate against minorities.

The House-passed version would merely require litigants to show that discrimination resulted. They would not have to prove intent to discriminate.

The House proposal also includes "bailout provisions" which would enable some areas to be exempt from the act's requirements. But Clements, who generally favors such provisions, testified the House-proposed bailout provisions "are so stringent and cumbersome it is doubtful that any covered

jurisdiction could become exempt."

Clements released statements from the three organizations that still back his position.

Jose Garcia of Texas IMAGE, a Mexican-American group, said the organization "fully stands by the statement" it made in conjunction with Clements.

TAX TIPS

Auto expense reimbursement may be excluded as income

This is the sixth in a series of tax tip articles sponsored as a public service by the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.

Q. How much, if any, of my auto expense reimbursement should be included in my total income?

A. Reimbursement of auto expenses that are incurred for business purposes can be accomplished by several different methods. The employer may pay employees a fixed rate per mile of business travel; a monthly allowance; the actual cost of the incurred expenses; or a combination of these methods.

If the employee makes a full accounting to the employer and receives reimbursement that is less than or equals the expenses of auto business use, the reimbursement is not includable as income. However, the employee may not use the expenses as a deduction. Any excess expenses would be used as a deduction.

If an employee does not make a full accounting of auto expenses to the employer and receives reimbursement such as a monthly allowance, the total monthly allowances are includable as income. The employee, of course, may then use the incurred expenses as deductions to apply against the reimbursed amount.

Employees who receive a fixed rate per mile of business travel which does not exceed the IRS allowed rate of 20 cents per mile, are considered to have made a full and adequate accounting to the employer. The time, place and business purpose must be established.

Should the employee's allowance exceed the 20 cents per mile allowed by the IRS and the employee elects the mileage method for determining the

amount of business auto expenses, the excess allowance would be includable as income.

The employee should determine whether the mileage method or the actual expenses method of business expense is greater and more beneficial. An employee may use either method for determining the amount of expenses (provided other criteria are met) regardless of which method is used for the reimbursements.

'Moonflower' dog gains attention

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Riddle: What is black and bald, has erect ears and wags its tail? Answer: the Inca orchid moonflower dog.

It's a new name proposed for an old breed of Peruvian hairless dogs of uncertain origin.

They can be seen in many Peruvian villages, the lighter-colored ones with bad sunburns. One theory is that the hairless dogs were in Peru 2,000 years ago and are depicted on Inca and pre-Inca pottery.

Another theory is that the dogs immigrated over the Bering Sea, through Mexico, where hairless dogs also exist, to South America.

A third idea traces the dogs to China-crested dogs, brought to Peru with Chinese laborers in the 1800s.

In any case, hairless dogs have been around for years, but just recently have attracted the attention of breeders and dog lovers.

Their official name in Peru is Inca Hairless Dog and the standards for show and breeding have been set by the Peruvian Kennel Club.

Some owners and breeders prefer the name Inca Orchid Moonflower Dog, which comes from Andean mountain lore that the Incas kept the dogs in huts full of orchids to protect them from the sunlight and took them out for exercise only by

moonlight.

Dr. Jose Torre, the official veterinarian of the Peruvian Kennel Club, is the head of a genetic commission which is studying the breed.

"We need more dogs to study, but there aren't many good dogs in Peru," Torre said. "Most of them are bred outside the country, especially in Germany and the United States. In the villages here, the dogs are mixed with other breeds."

The Inca hairless comes in three sizes: miniature (10-16 inches), medium (16-20 inches) and large (20-28 inches).

The main characteristic is the absence of hair on the head, feet and tail. Torre said the best color was black for protection from the sun.

Torre said there were about six scientific breeders in Peru.

Fred Drew, an American breeder living in Lima, describes the dogs as docile, intelligent and affectionate and says they make good watchdogs.

"My trainer thinks these hairless dogs are smarter than the traditional smart breeds, such as German shepherds and collies," Drew said.

Hairless dogs are kept as pets or good-luck charms in Peru. Some people say the dogs cure rheumatism and arthritis, and people who suffer from asthma love them.

Atlanta center report says influenza cases low

ATLANTA (AP) — The number of reported cases of influenza remained unusually low in January, with no evidence of a major spread of the highly infectious disease, the national Centers for Disease Control reported Friday.

"We're still sputtering along," said CDC epidemiologist Dr. Kari Kappus, adding "there still is no evidence of a further spread of the disease as we moved another week further into the season."

Ten states have reported isolating influenza type B this season, with four reporting type A, the CDC said in its Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report.

In most communities, the cases are only sporadic, but in Tucson, Ariz., there were reports of widespread respiratory illness accompanying the isolates, the CDC reported.

The CDC declined to classify the situation in Tucson as an outbreak. But the report noted that 21 cases of influenza type B were discovered there during the five-week period ending Jan. 29.

The ages of the patients ranged from 1 to 69 years, but the low median age of 17 months "reflects the predominantly young age group attending clinical centers that submitted specimens for diagnoses to the laboratory," the CDC said.

Accompanying the appearance of the disease in Tucson has been an absenteeism rate averaging 15 percent in elementary and junior high schools, the CDC noted.

Kappus cautioned that despite the low occurrence of flu so far this winter, major outbreaks still could occur in the next two months and those 65 or older or patients suffering chronic respiratory diseases should receive immunizations.

Laker grounds airline

LONDON (AP) — Laker Airways, whose no-frills fares revolutionized trans-Atlantic travel, closed down Friday, leaving thousands of passengers stranded and U.S. planemaker McDonnell Douglas as much as \$50 million in the hole.

Sir Freddie Laker, 59, the high-flying entrepreneur knighted in 1978 for his pioneering bargain-basement Skytrain, announced he was calling in a bankruptcy receiver after the collapse of a plan to reschedule his debts of \$350 million.

Laker became the nemesis of the major airlines because he offered travelers cross-ocean travel at half-price, but in the end was outmaneuvered when the bigger carriers, some of them government-subsidized, matched his low fares and deprived him of a competitive edge.

THE MORNING announcement left many of Laker's 2,500 employees in tears and thousands of passengers stranded — at least temporarily.

Laker, responding to expressions of sympathy, said Friday night in a television interview "I am overwhelmed by the public reaction and the public support."

At Gatwick, Laker's headquarters, some passengers were angry when their flights were suspended.

One Laker flight from Manchester to Tenerife in the Canary Islands, with 309 passengers on board, turned around in mid-journey and returned to England.

"About an hour after leaving, the captain said he had some bad news for us and we were having to turn back," said one passenger, Pamela Ingleson of Blackpool. "The cabin crew were in tears. I don't think anybody could believe it."

Even Laker's rivals were sympathetic.

"WE DON'T GET ANY pleasure out of the situation in which Sir Freddie finds himself," said Roy Watts, chief executive of state-owned British Airways, a major competitor.

One of Laker's 10 McDonnell Douglas-produced DC-10s was impounded by the British Airports Authority at Gatwick Airport, south of London, as security against landing fees and charges owed by the failed airline.

McDonnell Douglas Finance Corp. of St. Louis, Mo., and the Clydesdale Bank of Scotland had raised \$111 million to repay loans on behalf of Laker to a consortium of 13 British banks and the American Export-Import banks, but

The deal fell through. The aeronautics company will lose out on a special tax arrangement.

"When we announced our fourth-quarter earnings last month we said our earnings had been hurt by a \$50 million pre-tax provision for probable restructuring or default of some commercial aircraft financial transactions," said a spokesman for McDonnell Douglas. "That was for Laker. The company (McDonnell Douglas) stands to lose a maximum of \$50 million."

Laker's bankers appointed impartial accountant William Mackey as official receiver. Mackey estimated that between 4,000 and 5,000 passengers on scheduled Laker flights were overseas at present. Several thousand more were believed to be on packaged holidays.

Those on packaged vacations were guaranteed a flight home under a government-backed bond, the British Trade Department said.

Travelers on scheduled Laker services were not automatically protected, and many had to scramble. But British Airways and Pan Am said they were letting stranded Laker passengers — on either side of the Atlantic — fly the homeward leg of their journey free of extra cost, provided there were seats available.

This included Americans who flew to

London on Skytrain. "So far we've had 22 applications in London to fly back to the United States — we want to do what we can for them," said Peter Joel, Pan Am press officer.

BRITISH CALEDONIAN and Britannia Airways said they would allow stranded Britons overseas to fly home free on Laker tickets.

Those who have paid in advance for Laker flights will have to apply to the

receiver for refunds, a lengthy process. Last year, Laker flew just under 2 million passengers.

Mackey said Laker staff will be paid until the airline's future is decided and it was possible some operations will be salvaged and a few flights resumed by Sunday or Monday. He was meeting Laker Saturday.

Whatever the outcome, Mackey said, Sir Freddie could not carry on with the business "in its present form."

Boston runway not cleared for 2 hours

BOSTON (AP) — A runway at Logan International Airport had not been handed or plowed for almost two hours before a DC-10 slid from it into Boston Harbor two weeks ago, according to operation records.

Two of the 210 people on the World Airways airliner that landed in icy rain on Jan. 23 are missing and believed drowned, and 39 suffered minor injuries.

The Boston Herald American reported in Friday's editions that the snow and operations log of the Massachusetts Port Authority, which operates the airport, shows the runway used by the jetliner was closed for plowing between 4:30 and 5:36 p.m.,

leaving 1/4-inch hard-packed snow, 1-inch drifts and "obscured" runway markings.

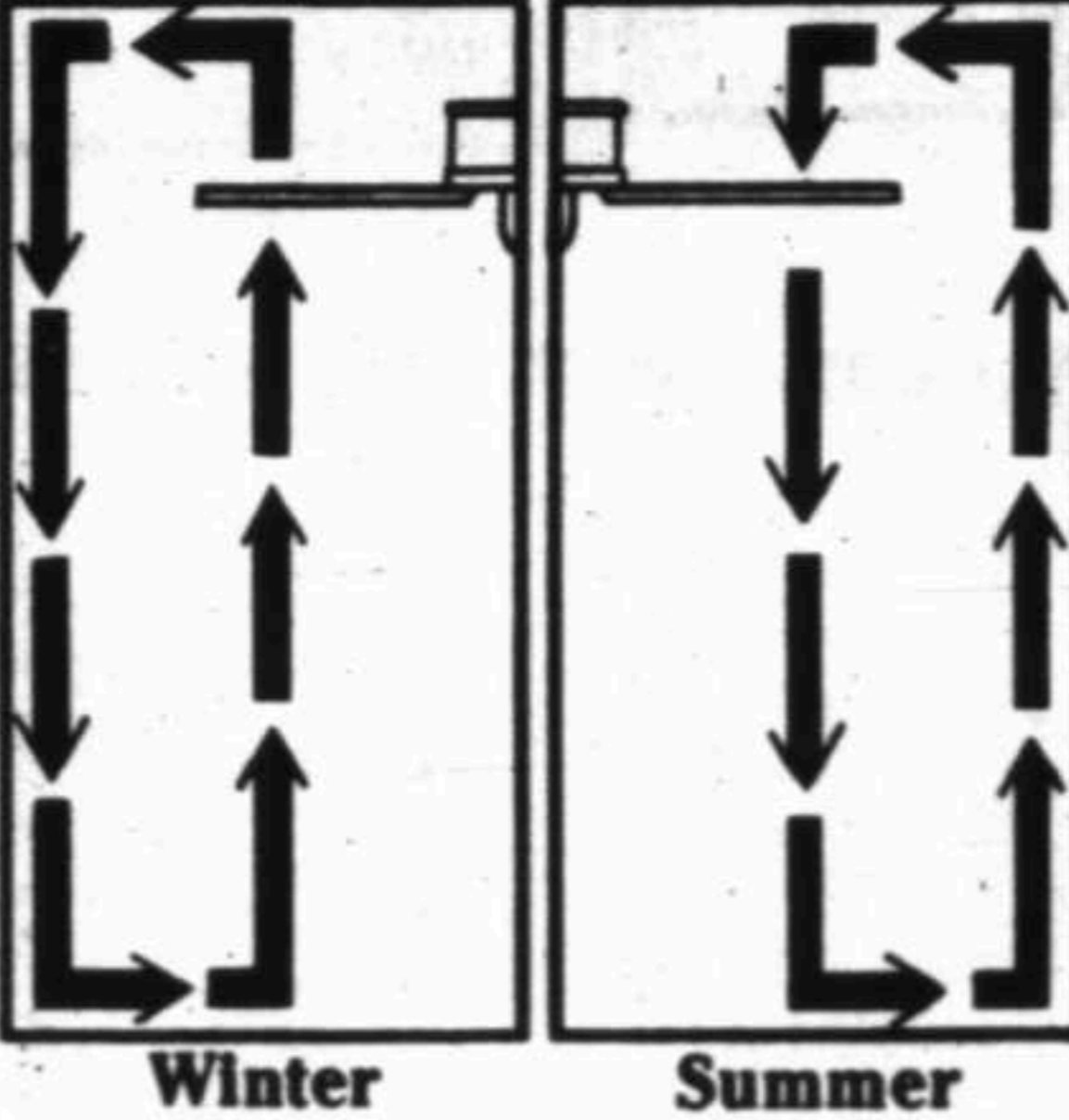
Nine minutes after the runway was reopened, the log said, "Caution advised, thin layer of ice on all plowed surfaces." One hour later, the log said, an adjacent taxiway was covered with "skim coat of ice."

Just before 7 p.m. a Delta DC-10 reported "poor to nil" braking. At 7:25, the log said, "All plowed surfaces wet mostly covered with 1/4-inch layer packed snow and ice with widely scattered thin slush patches."

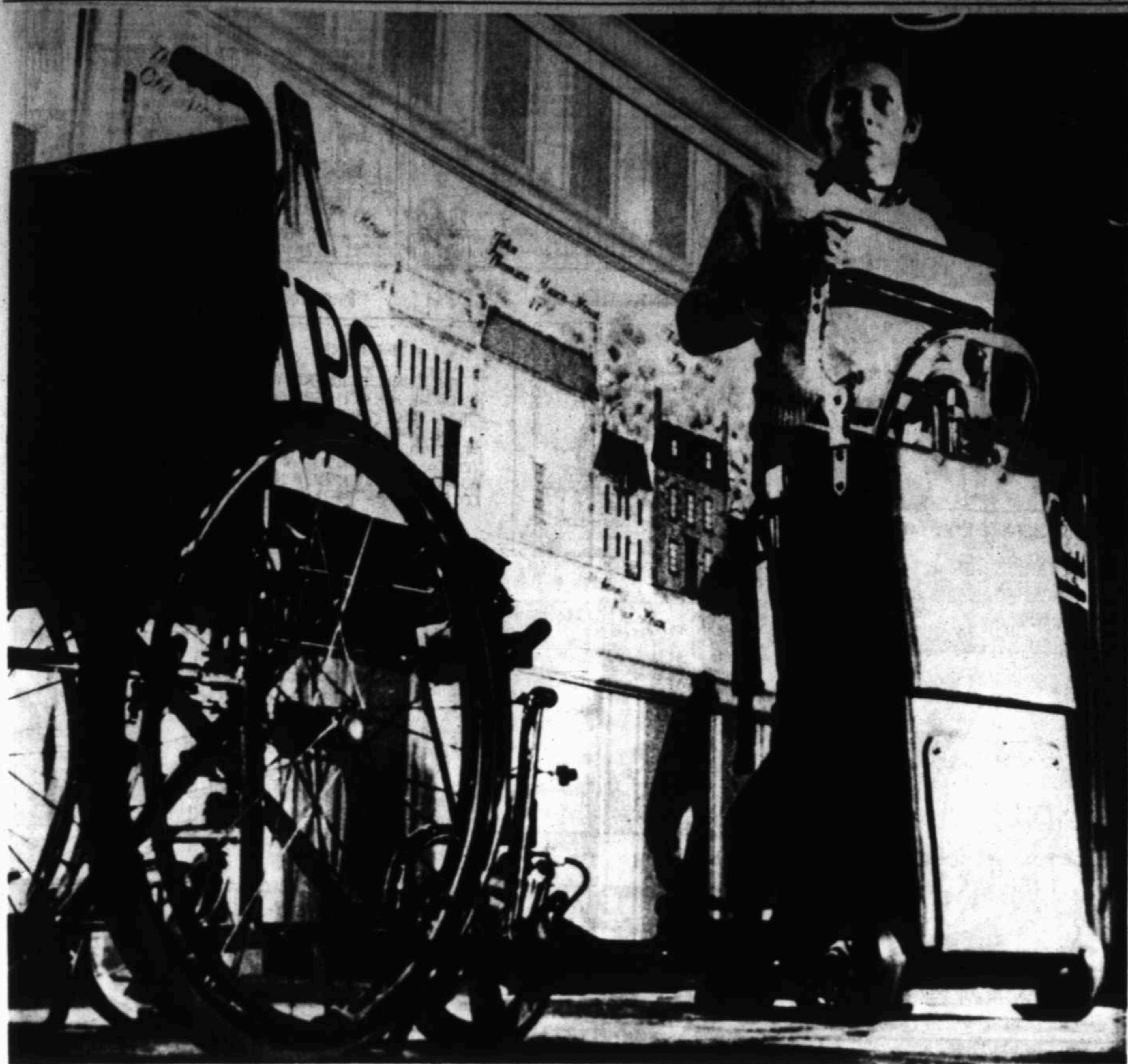

Crippled inventor stands tall for award

WASHINGTON (AP) — When Donald Ausmus left a hospital in 1975, paralyzed from the chest down, he did little but sit and look out his living-room window. But on Friday, with help from the device of his own making, he stood tall as Inventor of the Year.

Ausmus, 40, of Independence, Mo., has developed a three-wheeled, motorized cart dubbed a "moto-stand" that is not unlike an upholstered hand truck. He can pull up from his wheelchair, strap himself into the vehicle in a standing position "and do nearly all the things I could before — just maybe not as fast."

Ausmus was paralyzed

when he crashed during a cross-country motorcycle race — or "motocross." Ausmus said doctors led him to believe he would eventually be able to walk again. But he soon learned otherwise, and a big gap in his life was not being able to use the tools in his basement shop.

THEN HE recalled how he and co-workers at a truck repair garage used to horse around during lunch hours, scooting across the garage floor on a two-wheeled hand truck. That inspiration was the end of his idleness.

In three years he built five different versions of the moto-stand, each

improved over the last. "The first thing I noticed was washing my hands. In a wheelchair I would always have water running all over my lap. I realized what a thrill it was to wash my hands without getting all wet," he said.

"It just makes life a whole lot better for you to stand up and do things yourself. There's the psychological aspect — I just can't explain how good it feels to stand up."

AUSMUS demonstrated the device Friday as he arrived for ceremonies at the U.S. Patent Office on Sunday in which he will be awarded the title of Inventor of the

Year for 1981. The award, sponsored by Intellectual Property Owners, a non-profit organization representing patent holders, carries a \$1,000 stipend.

Ausmus said his unit is now being manufactured commercially in Kansas City and sells for about \$3,100. Its motor is powered by a single automobile-type battery which can be recharged overnight and lasts about a

year. Although his invention won't replace the motorized wheelchair for outdoor use, Ausmus said, he is now working on a new version that will have wheeled stabilizing arms that unfold and allow a paralyzed person to venture out into a yard and even climb grades.

"I've always — if I couldn't get something, I just made it," he said.

Poteet man pleads guilty to brother's mercy killing

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — Woodrow Collums, 69, a rancher at nearby Poteet, pleaded guilty to murder charges Friday in the mercy killing of his older brother at a local nursing home last year.

Collums asked District Judge Tom Rickhoff to sentence him, and Rickhoff said he would do so at the end of February or early March after a presentencing investigation. Defense attorney Roy Barrera Sr. called several witnesses, including the widow of Collums' dead brother, Helen, in asking that Rickhoff grant probation. The state did not oppose probation in the case.

Britain first U.S. ally to impose sanctions on Poland, Soviet Union

LONDON (AP) — Britain on Friday became the first of America's allies to join in imposing its own sanctions against Poland and the Soviet Union because of the Polish military crackdown Dec. 13. The Polish and Soviet ambassadors were summoned to the Foreign Office where an official announced the sanctions. There was no immediate public comment from the envoys, or in the U.S., Soviet and Polish capitals.

The sanctions include travel restrictions on diplomats, businessmen and journalists; a halt in any new credits to Poland; tighter control on Soviet processor ship purchases of British-caught fish and a cutback in technical cooperation with the Russians.

The sanctions are: — Polish diplomats, representatives of the Polish airline LOT and the shipping firm GAL, and Polish journalists will need Foreign Office permission two working days in advance of any travel beyond 25 miles from the center of London and Glasgow, Scotland, where there is a Polish consulate.

— A 35-MILE restriction on Soviet diplomats and officials in London will be tightened to 25 miles. — No new credits of any kind will be granted Poland "for the present."

— Soviet factory ships processing fish purchased from trawlers in British waters will now need licenses and may be subject to cutbacks. Britain does not allow Soviet trawlers within 200 miles of its coast.

THE SANCTIONS

while not of major impact, will put a further chill on British relations with Warsaw and Moscow.

They demonstrate clearly our disapproval of what has happened in Poland," said a British official who declined to be identified.

President Reagan ordered sanctions against Poland and the Soviet Union December 24. The U.S. sanctions included credit restrictions on Poland, suspension of Polish and Soviet civil aviation privileges and Polish fishing rights, and a ban on high-technology sales to the Soviet Union.

— Renegotiation of a 1968 marine navigation treaty with the Soviets. — Reduction in "level of activity" of British-Soviet exchanges in medicine, public health, environmental protection, farm research and atomic energy.

— Cutbacks in political, trade and cultural relations with Poland to "ensure (Britain's) relations with the military

Parachutist survives after falling 12,500 feet into sewage pond

PERRIS, Calif. (AP) — A skydiving waitress fell 12,500 feet into a shallow sewage pond and survived after her main parachute failed to open and her reserve chute only partly unfurled.

Lisa Boyer, 20, Costa Mesa, was in satisfactory condition following surgery for a torn kidney and broken pelvis, said Lu Land, office manager at the Perris Valley Parachute Center.

"Lisa was conscious throughout her ordeal and wouldn't allow anyone to touch her until paramedics arrived," Ms. Land said Thursday.

The fall occurred around 5 p.m. Wednesday when Ms. Boyer and three companions jumped at the 12,500 foot

level. They had intended to make a four-way hookup during their free-fall to earth, Ms. Land said.

Ms. Boyer pulled her main chute ripcord at 3,000 feet, but it didn't open. She then activated her reserve chute, but was nearing the ground when it began to unfurl, Ms. Land said.

She landed in a pond at the Perris Sewage Disposal Plant about 1,000 feet away from the end of the airport runway.

"The canopy of Lisa's (reserve) parachute was beginning to trail, but wasn't completely unfurled out when she hit the water," Ms. Land said.

Dow says bacteria share blame

MIDLAND, Mich. (AP) — A rare Southeast Asian bacteria may be partly responsible for a variety of ailments afflicting Vietnam veterans who have blamed health problems on the defoliant Agent Orange, according to Dow Chemical Co.

Dow, the government's largest supplier of Agent Orange, said as many as 500,000 Vietnam veterans may be carrying melioidosis, a bacteria which can lead to a chronic disease and, in some cases, death.

Company officials based their contention on existing medical literature on melioidosis, Dow spokesman Phillip L. Schneider said Thursday.

The information was distributed this week to officials of the Veterans Administration, Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion and House and Senate Veterans Affairs Committees, he said.

"We are not saying that this is the absolute cause of all the veterans' health problems, but we think it should be examined to see if it is," Schneider said.

A VA physician Friday said the agency would get more information on the disease.

"We don't think it's a major threat," said Dr. Barclay Shepard, special assistant to the chief medical director in the VA's office of environmental medicine in Washington. "Obviously, we want to get more data on it, and we will do that. It's quite a rare disease."

Agent Orange is a potent defoliant which was used extensively in Vietnam to kill crops and reveal enemy positions. The defoliant contained the highly toxic dioxin contaminant 2,3,7,8-TCDD, a known animal carcinogen.

Some Vietnam veterans who have suffered ailments ranging from skin rashes to cancer have blamed their illnesses on exposure to Agent Orange. The number of people seeking damages from Dow and other manufacturers of Agent Orange named in a class action suit has reached 6,000.

Museum honors working class

BALTIMORE (AP) — Hardhatted steelworkers carry lunch pails past the Baltimore Museum of Industry, on their way to work at a shipyard down

the street. The muffled rumble of a box factory which shares the museum building echoes softly inside.

"We're a working

museum for a working city," said Dennis Zembala, director of the fledgling museum.

It derives that slogan, too, from the fact that many exhibits whir and click and show how several turn-of-the-century industries actually operated.

"People come through," on tours of the museum's cannery and other displays, Zembala said, "and say, 'My mother used to work in the canneries.' Everybody has a direct connection."

In a working machine shop, where several floor-to-ceiling belts turn flywheels on lathes and planing machines, retired machinists explain what their work was like, Zembala said.

The antique machines are used to make bolts and other parts for some of the museum's displays — like the old sewing machines in the garment shop which, in turn, make souvenir aprons.

Zembala, a member of the Society for Industrial Archaeology, is working on a Ph.D. dissertation, but the Detroit native's interest in the machine age is not all academic.

"We've never given all those people who came here at the turn-of-the-century credit for all that they've done. We're just beginning to realize how important industry is to us. The more we import, the less healthy our economy is," Zembala said.

Organ donation unknown until too late

NEW YORK (AP) — Contrary to popular opinion, there isn't a great deal of difficulty getting people to donate their eyes to others. The trouble comes at the time of the donor's death. For more often than not, no one knows the person who died had wanted to make the donation, until it's too late.

New York is one state trying to do something about that — not only in the case of eyes, but also other parts of the body. With their license-renewal applications, motorists in New York get what's called a "universal donor card" on which they can declare their intent to donate.

But even so, according to the executive director of the Eye-Bank for Sight Restoration, Mary Jane O'Neill, there's been "no great surge in organ retrieval."

And the reason is that no one might think to question whether the person who died had wanted to be a donor, she explains.

If, for instance, a person dies in a hospital, it's not likely there would be a wallet on the body. And even in the case of an auto accident, no one would be apt to look to see if the form on the back of the license had been filled out and signed.

Through a public-relations campaign, the eye bank in New York City — one of about 80 around the country — is trying to get paramedics and others in the medical field to become more active participants in the search for donors. And it's asking donors to tell their next of kin of their intentions.

So, what happens if you want to give your eyes or other organs and your request is met?

Taking the eyes for example: If you die at a hospital, it's likely that a resident — perhaps one with training in eye surgery — will remove them, Ms. O'Neill notes. Or, an eye bank might be called. In that case, a specially trained technician called an "enucleator" would do it. The eyes are taken to the eye bank and examined to see if they're suitable for transplant. And, usually, they'll go to a patient listed for surgery that day.

It is best if the enucleation can be done within a few hours — perhaps three, and preferably no longer than six hours — after the person has died.

If they do not happen to be needed right away, the eyes can be put in what's called a McCarey-Kaufman solution and kept viable for 72 hours.

But that's generally about as close to "banking" — or "long-term storing" — as an eye bank comes.

Research is being done to improve on other means of preservation, among them use of a tissue-culture medium and freezing.

The whole eye is not used, as such. The portion used in a transplant is the cornea. That's the clear surface that covers the eye like a crystal goes over a watch. The corneal button is removed.

The rest of the eye — including the shell — can be used for research.

Listeners disagree whether song is funny, offensive

LOS ANGELES — The hottest New Wave song here has a catchy tune, a fast beat and ear-catching lyrics. But listeners can't seem to agree if the lyrics are humorous or offensive.

"Johnny, Are You Queer?" is not an average record, even for the usually outrageous New Wave sound. It tells the story of a young girl who wonders about the sexual preference of her boyfriend. Her repeated question, "Johnny, are you queer?" is never answered.

"It's a modern day love story," said Bobby Paine, who co-wrote the song in 1980 with his brother, Larson. A newcomer to the music scene, Josie Cotton, recorded "Johnny" last summer.

The record cover is almost as outlandish as the title. "Josie Cotton feared the shocking truth...but she had to know," the psychedelic cover reads. It features a woman with a spiked haircut sobbing as a young blond-haired man with an earring gazes at another man in blue shorts.

The song became a huge hit at the few rock stations across the country that dared to play it. Listeners of KROQ, the only Los Angeles radio station which programs the song, rated it number three in the top 10 songs of 1981.

'Killer Frogs' are suddenly respected in SWC

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — With all due respect to the Chinese calendar, 1982 may turn out to be the Year of the Horned Frog.

From 1972 through 1981, Texas Christian basketball teams did not post a winning season. In that nine-year span, the Frogs were never better than five games below .500 and 11 wins in a year was the best they could do.

Suddenly the Frogs are respectable. They are 11-8 for the year, 6-3 in Southwest Conference play after snatching four SWC wins in a row. They are tied for second place with Texas A&M and Texas and living up to their media nickname, "The Killer Frogs."

And a win over Texas Tech in today's televised contest from Lubbock (12:10 p.m., KMD-TV) would guarantee TCU its best season since 1972.

"I hate basketball. It's so boring," said TCU student Jamie Sneider, who prefers soccer. "But I've started going to the games now that they're winning. It's getting exciting."

The man responsible for the excitement are coach Jim Killingsworth and player Darrell Browder.

Killingsworth, nicknamed "Killer" long before his 1979 appearance on the TCU campus, has stamped his blue-

print on the basketball program and brought it back from death's doorstep. When his club knocked off Baylor and Texas A&M in the SWC post-season tournament last year, sports reporters immediately pinned them with the "Killer Frogs" tag.

Browder, who wrote fruitless letters to Texas A&M and Baylor begging for a scholarship after his senior year in high school, has become the glue that holds the current Frog team together.

He led the team in scoring last year but now has the less-glamorous task of running Killer's offense, handing out the assists and making sure current scoring leader, junior transfer Doug Arnold, gets plenty of shots — shots Browder was taking last season.

It was an adjustment that took considerable maturity and he has made it without rancor.

"No question about it," says Killingsworth, "Browder is really sacrificing himself."

Browder says his new role makes plenty of sense.

"I look forward to him (Arnold) getting 25 or 30 points a game," Browder said. "If he doesn't score, I don't feel I've done my job. He's big, he's quick, he's fast and he can

score."

Arnold, a 6-foot-9, reed-thin forward, averages 20 points and nine rebounds a game, areas Browder dominated last year.

"He can do things I can't do," Browder said. "He's 6-9. I'm 6-1 1/2. He's a forward, I'm a point guard. It was not a hard adjustment. I handle the ball 90 percent of the time, I decide who takes the shots. I'm a better player than I was last year, even though I'm scoring less."

Arnold, a transfer from Duquesne, is not surprised his new teammates have accepted him without resentment.

"I'm here for a purpose," he said. "I want to make a reputation for myself and I want for us to win. I'm not satisfied yet because we haven't finished yet — we're still on the way up and the season's not over. But if I can get my points and the team can keep winning, things will be good."

"If you'll remember last year," said Killingsworth, "if Browder wasn't taking 20 shots a game we probably didn't have much chance to win. There are times this year when he'll take no shots at all. For the good of the team."

Browder was not offered a single scholarship after he finished high school, despite his efforts, and he was headed

for a junior college when Killer spotted him in an all-star game.

"I didn't know anything about him until then but as soon as I saw him practice I knew I wanted him," Killingsworth said.

"We were lucky to get him and some other kids who are great competitors. They're good players and they do what they have to do to win. It's the attitude of the people playing for you that determines whether you win."

In Killingsworth's opinion, that kind of attitude has to include an understanding that a large part of success is just plain, hard work.

"Basketball played at this level is not, 'fun, ha ha.' You know what I'm saying? It's the satisfaction of knowing you beat somebody who did their best to beat you, you get all the attention, you worked like hell — that's really what this is."

"If a kid expects to go out there in college basketball, and laugh, have a big time, he better get his fraternity team and get a keg, like those guys you see on TV. It's Miller Time, you know? But it's not Miller Time here."

NFL calls Herschel Walker

But Georgia star may want shot at Olympics first

Barring catastrophic injury in the next year or two, Herschel Walker's financial future is as bright as almost any collegiate athlete in the country.

The 6-foot-2, 220-pound sophomore running back from Georgia is so good, speculation is strong he will challenge the NFL rule prohibiting its teams from drafting and signing underclassmen.

There probably isn't a team in the NFL that wouldn't offer Walker a multi-year contract worth millions of dollars if a court said the NFL rule was

unconstitutional.

AND YET, Walker is serious when he says track is his No. 1 sport, that he doesn't care that much about money or the Heisman and that an Olympic gold medal would mean much more.

Clearly, this young man is unusual in more ways than just his overwhelming physical talent.

"Track has always been my No. 1 sport," said Walker.

"I was never the kind of kid who sat around watching all the sports on TV. I love track the most because it got me into other sports like football and basketball."

Although he knows he's not one of

America's best sprinters at this time, he thinks he'll improve dramatically this season. He ran 10.19 in the 100 meters last year in Europe.

Continued improvement would move him into the nation's upper echelon, and make his dream of an Olympic medal a possibility.

It seems impossible that a man so large could run so fast, but Walker is truly unusual.

"I've never had an athlete like this before," said Georgia track Coach Lewis Galney. "Herschel is extremely flexible, even though he appears muscle-bound. After what we learned about him last year, he should run faster this season."

"In Georgia, football is king. They don't have a very long track season for high school athletes. Last year was the first year Herschel had a chance to train for track for more than six weeks."

WALKER WILL run often indoors this season and then point toward the nationals and running in Europe this summer. By the end of the 1982 season, he should know if the Olympics are a realistic goal.

"If I qualified for the Olympics, I would have to wait until after the Games to turn pro," said Walker, smiling at the thought.

But that's 1984. Walker admits anything could happen long before what would be his senior year at Georgia.

"Sure, the Olympics is a goal, but anybody on the street can say they want to win a gold medal," Walker said, implying he won't wait that long if he decides challenging pro football's rule is what he really wants to do.

"Right now, I haven't ruled anything out. At this point, I don't know if I'm going to continue at Georgia or see what happens in the courts."

One thing's for sure: He might stay at Georgia to remain in track and help his teammates win a national title in football, but he wouldn't hang around just for a better chance at a Heisman Trophy. He's finished third and second the past two years.

"Right now, I don't think I need to win a Heisman," he said. "I've proven what kind of football player I am. It's not going to do anything for me."

Walker, one of the most widely publicized frosh-sops in the history of college football, gained 1,975 yards last season despite playing behind a young offensive line.

He did it despite the kind of media pressure few ever have to face in even their junior or senior seasons and he continued to improve as an athlete.

BLESSED WITH sprinter's speed and an awesome physique despite never having lifted a weight in his life, Walker was offered a lucrative pro contract by the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League after his freshman year.

"I wasn't really tempted," Walker says now. "I just went along for the ride to see what would happen. The dice were hot and I wanted to roll them."

He is more serious now that he's proven his freshman year was no fluke, although his attitude toward becoming a millionaire remains blasé.

"When I was growing up, my dad always had plenty of money," Walker said. "But he never gave me any of it. And I was happy."

"Money has never meant that much to me. I try to live for happiness. I find real excitement in a lot of things I do, whether it's football, track, karate or studying."

Ironically, Walker's major could not be more appropriate to his situation. He's studying for a pre-law degree.

"There's no doubt the NFL rule is unconstitutional," he says. "It deprives a person of a right to make a living. I may get an opportunity to test it."

But he honestly appears not to have decided.

"Our family gets calls from attorneys and agents all the time," he said. "But I've got enough attorneys in my own family."

Where would he choose to play if he does turn pro?

"I guess Dallas," he said. "No special reason. It's like when I was choosing a college and I almost picked USC. They were the football team everyone knew. Dallas is the pro team everyone talks about."

Hess, Cooper hog spotlight

SCHLADMING, Austria (AP) — Switzerland's Erika Hess and Christin Cooper of the United States each won their third medal in the World Alpine Skiing championships here Friday.

Hess, 19, who already has won gold medals in the women's combined and giant slalom, skied an impeccable second run to emerge as the overall winner in the individual slalom and win her third gold medal.

Cooper, 22, of Sun Valley, Idaho, won a silver medal in the slalom. She previously had clinched a bronze in the combined and silver in the giant slalom.

"Today's was my hardest victory," Hess said, after winning her third gold Friday. "I wanted to break the rule that favorites cannot win Olympic or world championship races."

"I hope it will work out all right at Sarajevo as well," Hess said, referring

to the Yugoslavian city which will host the 1984 Winter Olympics.

The Swiss, buoyed by Hess's performance, also won another medal — a silver in the men's combined for Peter Luescher, who said he had planned to quit after a poor showing in the slalom phase of the combined event.

But he posted the fourth best time in the downhill, which earned him overall second place behind surprisingly strong Frenchman Michel Vion, 23. Vion won the first gold medal in the new combined event, consisting of a separate slalom and downhill.

Cooper was asked why the U.S. team, along with the Canadians, had witnessed such an upsurge at the event.

"It took a long time for North America to develop skiers, and very often they ended up quitting before they reached the peak," she said.

"But now we have such a really sup-

portive program, we have really good coaches and money behind us. That motivates our people," she added.

The Americans have confidence "and we enjoy ourselves skiing," Cooper told a news conference. "Also, we North Americans are getting tougher because we have to stay away from home for such long months."

Cooper said the team members could not go "home to mum," see their friends and eat well.

"We constantly have to battle these European conditions. We have a lot more to overcome by the time we are at the starting gate. That makes you stronger."

The Austrians again were disappointed.

Anton Steiner, who was first in the slalom phase, won the host country's first medal — a bronze in the combined.

SLC offers invitation to North Texas State

DALLAS (AP) — Southland Conference officials announced Friday that Northeast Louisiana University has been admitted to the league and North Texas State University has been offered an invitation to join.

Northeast Louisiana officials are expected to meet early next week with the university athletic committee to formally accept membership in the Southland Conference.

North Texas requested and was granted a March 1 deadline for deciding whether to request or reject the invitation to join the conference.

Southland Conference officials said the addition of Northeast Louisiana and compete in the NCAA Division I-AA enables the league to participate in that division's national football playoffs next season.

Northeast Louisiana University, playing basketball as a Trans America Athletic Conference school, is slated to play all SLC schools in football next season. The school will become eligible for all league championships starting Sept. 1, 1982.

"We are very excited about the opportunity and feel that it is a very positive step for our athletic program," said Northeast Louisiana athletic director Benny Hollis.

Northeast Louisiana finished last season with a 5-6 football record, and so far have this season have posted an 11-6 record in basketball.

The addition of Northeast Louisiana will be the first membership change in the last ten years for the Southland Conference, officials said, adding that further expansion will be explored in the near future.

Other SLC schools include, McNeese State, Louisiana Tech, Southwestern Louisiana, Arkansas State, Texas-Arlington and Lamar University.

Los Angeles pulls out of big TV pact

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Los Angeles pulled out of a \$19.8 million agreement Friday with the European Broadcasting Union (EBU) for televising the 1984 Olympic Games.

The Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee (LAOOC) made the decision after the EBU failed to make a payment of \$12 million by last Monday, as stipulated in an agreement signed between the two parties three months ago.

Mike O'Hara, vice president of the LAOOC, said in an interview the EBU gave no explanation of failing to make the payment, but said the agreement had not been finalized.

"Whatever final touches were needed in the agreement certainly had nothing to do with money," O'Hara said. "The financial terms were firmly settled when the agreement was signed

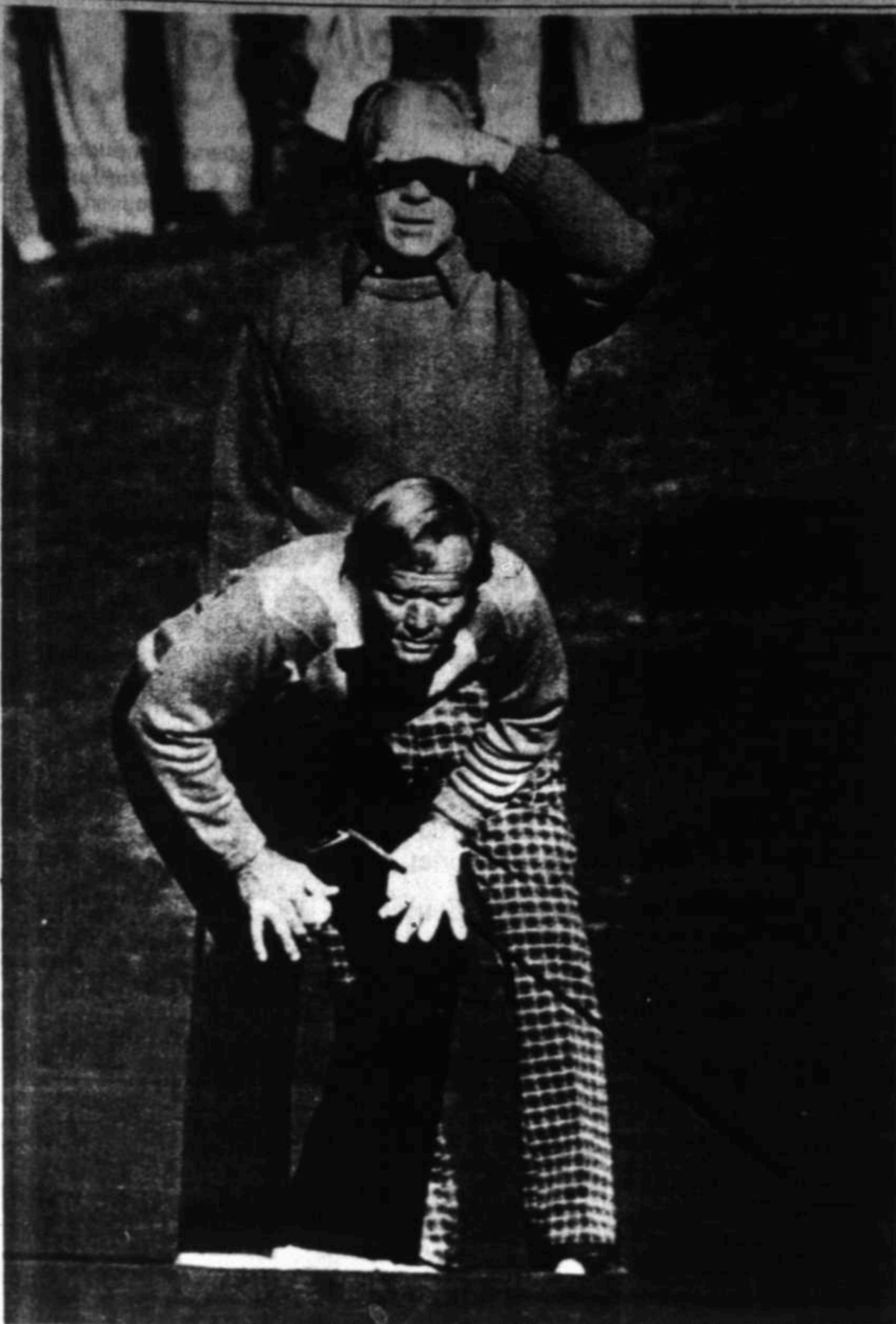

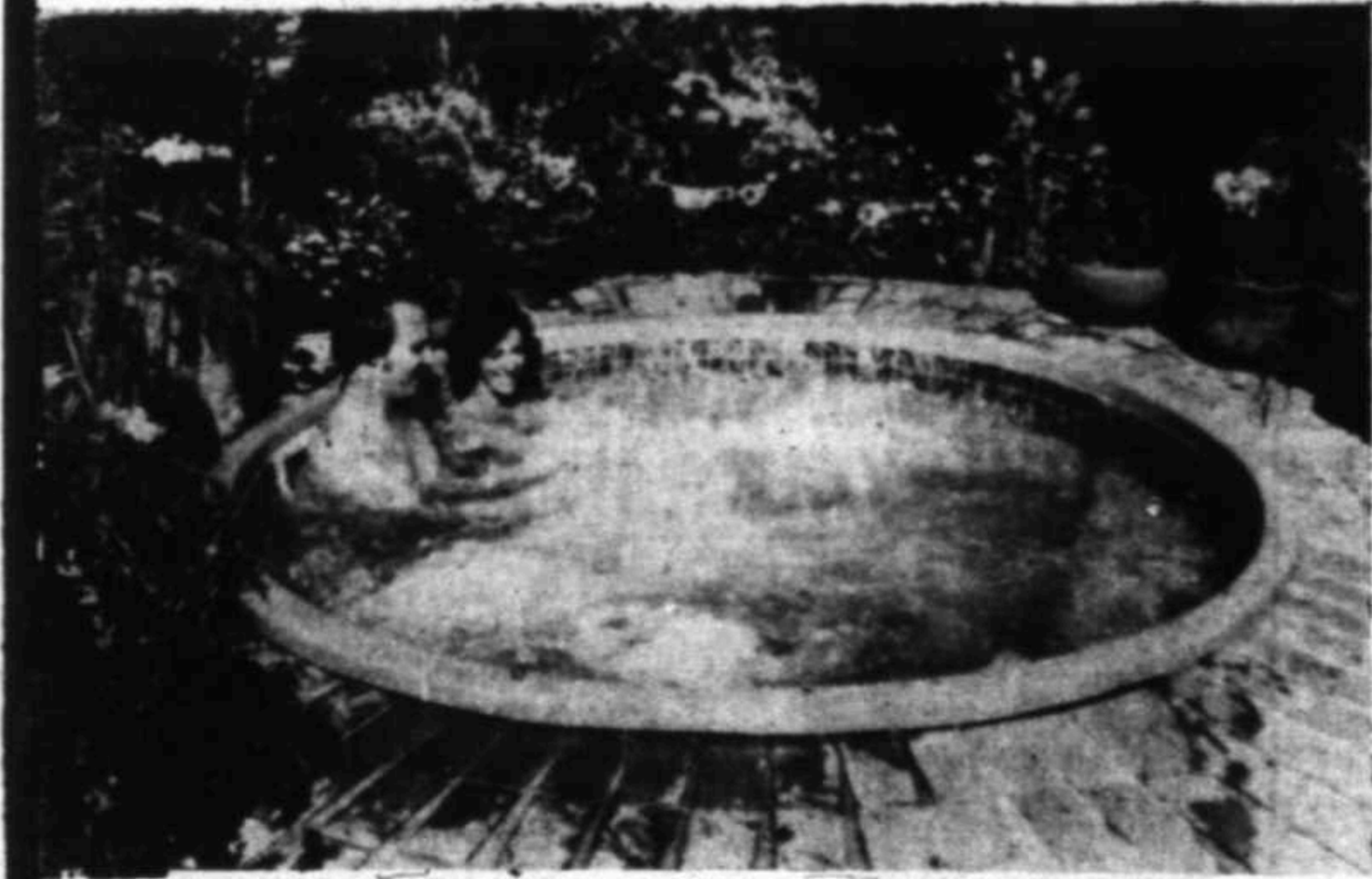

Point shaver gets 10 years in jail David Clyde hangs up baseball cleats

NEW YORK (AP) — Former Boston College basketball player Rick Kuhn was given 10 years in prison Friday by a judge who said he hoped the stiff sentence would keep other athletes from bribe and point-shaving schemes.

It was believed to be the stiffest term ever given a college player convicted of fixing basketball games.

U.S. District Judge Henry Bramwell rejected a plea for leniency from Kuhn's lawyer, Gary Zimmerman, and a request that he consider imposing a sentence such as public service work, rather than a jail term for the 26-year-old former player from Swissvale, Pa.

"Unfortunately, I don't give alternative sentences. I don't believe in them," the Brooklyn federal court judge said.

"On final analysis, deterrence emerges as the most important sentencing objective," Bramwell said.

"A strong argument can be offered that a substantial term of incarceration imposed on this defendant will be recalled in the future by another college athlete who may be tempted to compromise his performance," he said.

ANOTHER NEW York judge expressed similar sentiments 30 years ago when he gave prison sentences to five basketball players that ranged six months to an indeterminate sentence of up to three years.

Nine other players were given suspended sentences in that point-shaving scandal, which involved players from seven teams.

Kuhn's 10-year sentence was for his Nov. 23 conviction of conspiracy to commit racketeering, to be served concurrently with the maximum five years each for conspiracy to commit sports bribery and for using interstate facilities to further a crime.

He could have received 20 years on the racketeering-conspiracy charge.

Prosecutor Edward McDonald declined comment on the sentence, as did Kuhn, who remained free on bail pending outcome of an appeal of his conviction.

But Zimmerman said, "The length of it is outrageous." He had asked the judge to be lenient and consider Kuhn's age

and a past free of criminal activity.

Kuhn was convicted with four others of conspiring to fix the point spread of at least six games during the Boston College Eagles' 1978-79 season so that their betting syndicate could beat bookies' odds on the games.

The former reserve forward and at least one other undicted player were paid \$2,500 for each game in which they shaved points.

Another defendant, Paul Mazzei, of Pittsburgh, will be sentenced Feb. 12.

As he did on Jan. 22 when he sentenced the other three, James Burke of New York and brothers Anthony and Rocco Perla of Braddock Hills, Pa., to terms ranging from four years to the maximum 20, the judge emphasized the scheme's negative impact on college athletics.

"THEIR CRIME has reminded millions of sports fans that athletes can be compromised," he said. "Every college athlete may now come under suspicion from coaches and fans."

Bramwell noted Kuhn's central role in the scheme and said "it is interesting to note" that during the four-week trial, nobody testified that Kuhn was reluctant to enter the scheme or ever wanted out.

"Rather, he emerges as somewhat of a greedy individual," more concerned with making money than winning games, Bramwell said.

Before imposing sentence, Bramwell also read part of a letter he had received from Kevin P. Duffy, vice president of student affairs at Boston College, saying the college "neither opposes nor supports any particular type of sentence" for their former student.

Duffy said the college supported a sentence that "best fits society and the rehabilitation of the defendant."

HOUSTON (AP) — Pitcher David Clyde is retiring and veteran relief pitcher Randy Moffitt is joining the Houston Astros, the club announced Friday.

Moffitt, 33, has been assigned to the Astros' Triple-A Tucson farm club of the Pacific Coast League and invited to attend the team's major league tryout camp, said Bill Wood, Astros director of minor league operations.

Clyde started well in 1981, going 6-0 and compiling a 0.76 ERA for the Astros' Double-A Columbus farm club. But when he moved up to Tucson, he dropped off to a 4-10 record with a 6.85 ERA in 19 starts. Moffitt has had severe stomach ailments for the past two years.

Colleges gear up for signing date

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — College football recruiters, operating under a new set of rules, are gearing up for the final to the Feb. 10 national signing date in what's being called "the year of the running back."

The consensus among most coaches is that this year's high school crop is brimming with good running backs. Quality linemen and defensive backs are in good supply, too, but the word is that standout quarterbacks are hard to find.

California, Texas and Florida, historically among the most fertile player-producing states, are again at the top of the list.

But the overall depth of talent may take a back seat this year to some significant changes in recruiting rules and schools' classification.

Members of the Mid-American Conference, the Missouri Valley Conference and Pacific Coast Athletic Association are hopping mad at the last Tuesday's announcement that they are among about 45 NCAA schools dropped from Division I-A, the top football division, to Division I-AA.

This could murder their recruiting efforts, they say, because rival schools are telling prospects, "Don't go there and spend your career in the minor leagues... come with us and play big-time football."

The restructuring of Division I-A was legislated at a special NCAA convention in December, basing membership primarily on stadium capacity, and

attendance. The ultimate makeup of the divisions is still somewhat in doubt pending a review of attendance figures.

"This won't have much effect on the kids being recruited by schools like Oklahoma and Southern Cal," said one conference official, who asked not to be identified. "But it could have a big effect on the middle and lower-end of the Division I spectrum. They're now in a good position to scoop up the near-marginal kids who would otherwise be leaning toward, say, Drake University (a Missouri Valley member)."

There is nothing marginal about Kevin Wilhite, Marcus Dupree or Anthony Byerly. They are generally considered the best of an abundant crop of running backs, based on evaluations made by the NCAA enforcement staff.

The NCAA, after studying this year's high school class and talking with college and high school coaches, compiled a list of the top 100 or so prospects in order to monitor their recruitment.

"They're calling this the year of the running back," said David Berst, director of enforcement. Wilhite, a 6-foot-1, 190-pounder from Cordova, Calif., is also considered a 1984 Olympic sprint prospect. Dupree, of Philadelphia, Miss., is a 6-3, 215-pounder and has already committed to Texas. Byerly, 6-1, 195, is from Newton, Texas.

"They are generally considered the best running backs, but there are a number of good ones," said Berst.

Dietzel loses LSU AD job

ALEXANDRIA, La. (AP) — Paul Dietzel, under fire because of a losing football record and developing financial problems in the athletic department, was removed Friday as athletic director at Louisiana State University.

The LSU Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to reassign Dietzel to a position as assistant to the LSU president "for the development of projects and programs."

There was no immediate word on who would replace him as athletic director.

Dietzel will keep his present salary of \$66,000 a year. The reassignment is good through the end of his current contract, which runs out July 31, 1983.

The move came after about four hours of meetings by the board, following a report by Chancellor James Wharton, who blamed mismanagement for problems in the athletic department.

"Yes, in my opinion there are many management problems and there have been," Wharton said in answer to a question.

He had been called to the meeting to report on sagging finances in the department, which ran up a \$300,000 deficit last year — its first in modern times — with prospects of a \$122 million deficit over the next seven years.

Wharton, who indicated there was friction between him and Dietzel, was asked to give some specific instances of mismanagement, and board member John Cade of Alexandria stepped in to offer a motion for the secret session. It passed 13-4.

Dietzel, who was in the room, did not object. He has

been under fire for months because of LSU's losing football record, but criticism intensified last month when it was learned that the department was losing money.

Dietzel, 56, has been AD since 1978 when he accepted a five-year contract that runs out in 1983. He currently makes \$66,000 a year. He coached LSU to its only national collegiate football championship in 1958 but left Louisiana before coming back as AD.

In his report, Wharton said this year and next year's budgets can be brought in line if ticket prices are raised, but he predicted a 1984-85 deficit of \$839,111, when spending will reach \$9.8 million with revenues of only \$9.02 million.

The current budgets can be held, he said, without cutting out any minor sports or shrinking the size of stadium seats to create more tickets — proposals suggested by Dietzel.

Under his proposal, ticket prices for basketball would go from \$6 to \$8 next year, and for football from \$11 to \$13 next year and \$14 the year after that. In addition he suggested that the policy on free tickets be revised.

Wharton also suggested that the \$1-million Varsity Club — a Dietzel creation — be united with the LSU Foundation. He said the merchandising program — also a Dietzel project — must become self supporting.

It was reported earlier in the day that the merchandising department was stuck with 188 fur jackets dyed purple and gold — \$359 items which they are now trying to sell at half price.

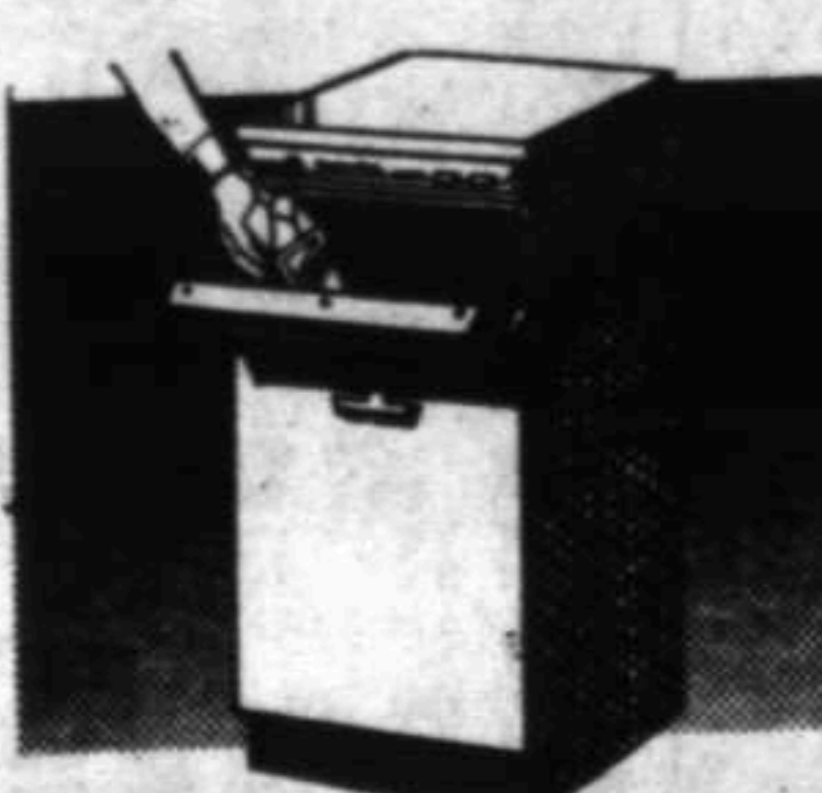

OPEC may call special session

LONDON (AP) — OPEC oil ministers may be summoned to a special session to review crude oil pricing and production levels because of the continuing world surplus, the cartel's president said Friday.

President Mana Said Oteiba, from the United Arab Emirates, did not say when a meeting might be called, but he said production cutbacks and price reductions might be proposed when a meeting is held.

"We have to try to balance the market," Oteiba said. He said that if he called a special meeting, "We will discuss the whole thing — prices, production, the whole market situation."

But he stressed that the benchmark price of \$34 per barrel for Saudi Arabian produced light crude oil would not be reconsidered.

The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries' output has fallen to less than 20 million barrels a day, from a peak daily production of 31 million barrels in 1979, the president said.

OPEC is not scheduled to meet in regular session until May.

In December, some OPEC producers cut their prices in hopes of arresting the decline in prices on spot, or non-contract, markets. The price weakness is largely due to sluggish demand.

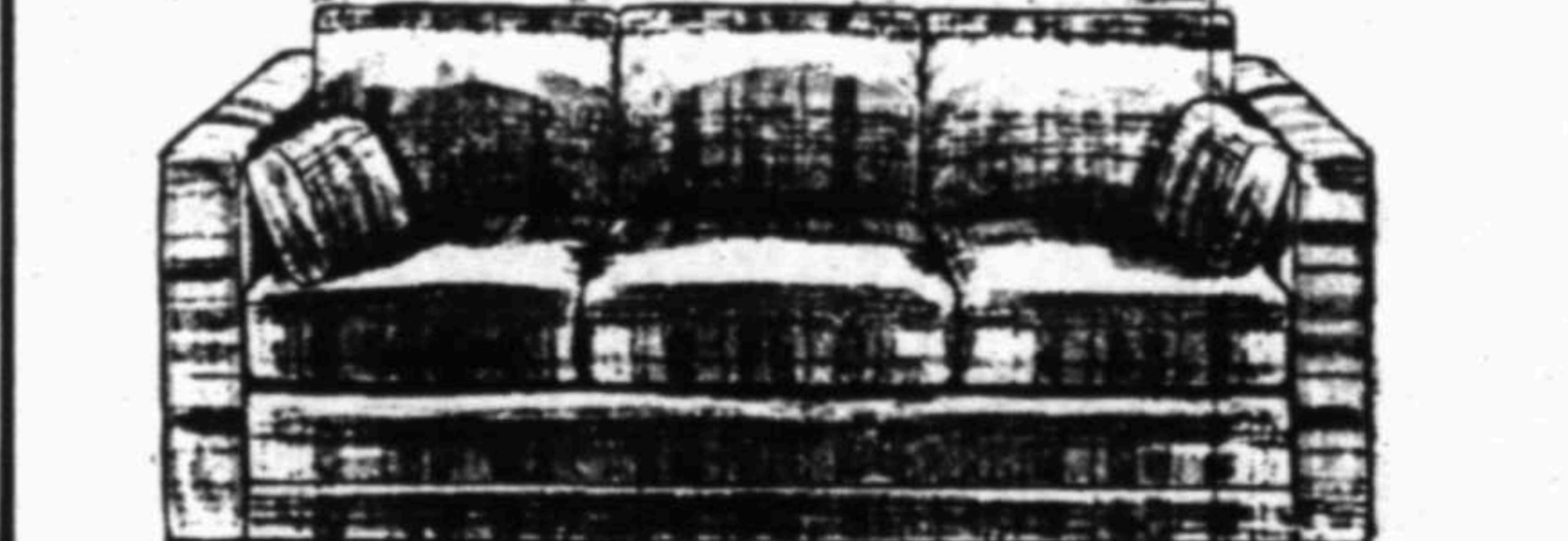

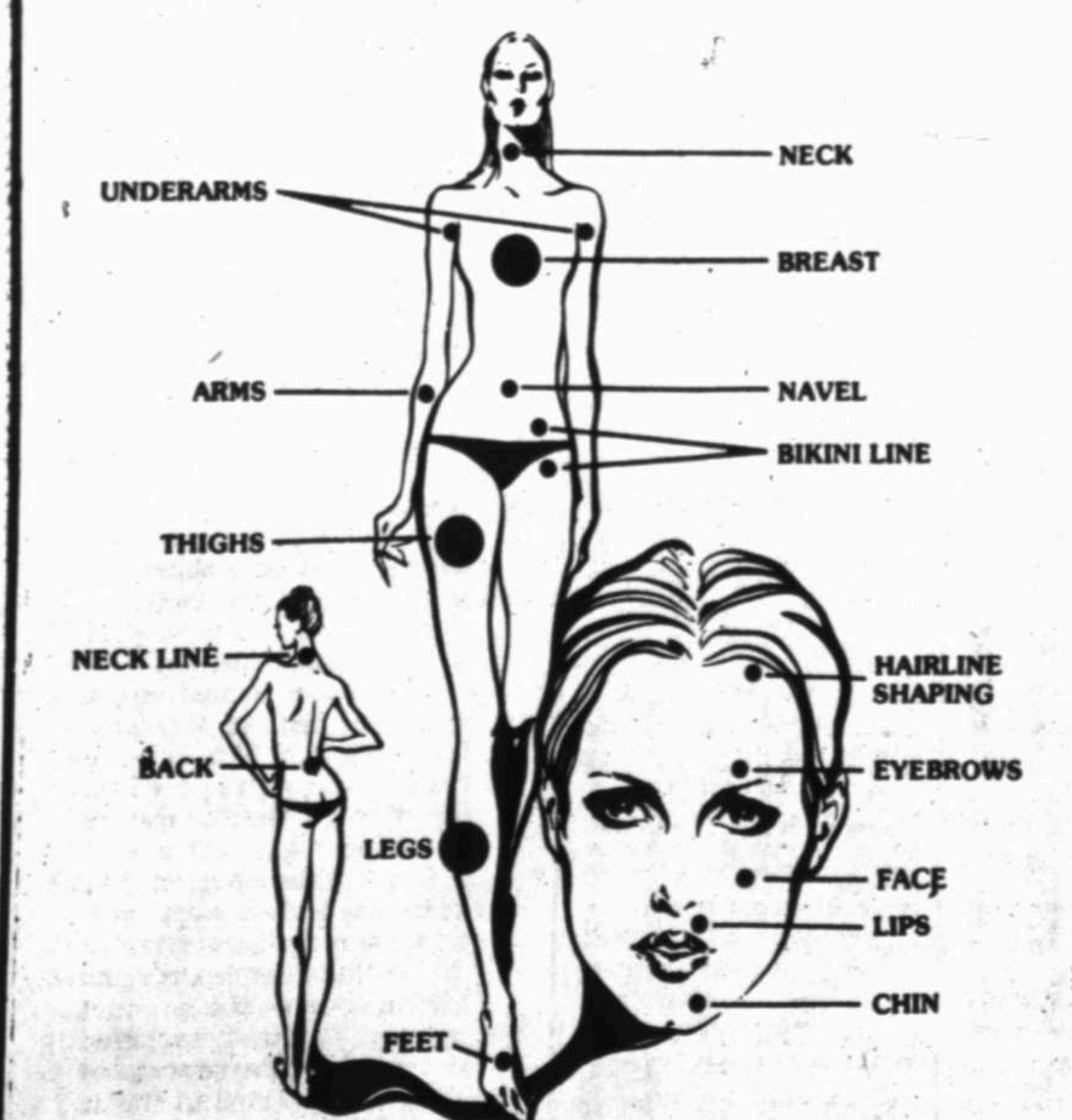
