WOMAN KILLS FOUR CHILDREN AND SUICIDES

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz.—Mrs. Marie Walkup, 35, strangled and stabbed her four children to death as they lay in their beds, then drove four miles from town and shot herself, the sheriff's office reported today.

Mrs. Walkup's body was found on the edge of the Flagstaff Country club course. She had shot herself through the chest with a rifle.

When investigators went to her home they found the bodies of her four children. In the downstairs bedroom were Denny, 10 and Phoebe, 2. The bodies of Jackie, 5, and Rose Marie, 8, were found in their beds upstairs.

Denny's nostrils had been taped with adhesive. Nostrils of the others had been plugged with cotton. Each had been stabbed twice over the heart, apparently with an ice pick.

A doctor had been treating Mrs. Walkup for an intestinal ailment.

One note addressed her husband, James Walkup, 35, read, "Jim, I'm a failure at disciplining the children, and this is the best way out."

Body of Williams Is Sent to Illinois

The body of Roger T. Williams, 63, who died Thursday morning in a fall from the roof of the Connally hotel at Eastland was shipped by train Friday to Decatur, Ill., for burial.

Arrangements for the services were being made by a brother, H. Williams, who lives at Decatur.

Williams fell from the seventh floor roof of the hotel to the top of the kitchen. Criminal District Attorney Earl Conner, Jr., who investigated with Justice of Peace E. E. Wood, notified Illinois relatives. A sister in Champaign, Ill., Mrs. J. T. Livingston, also survives.

Isbell is the son of Dr. and Mrs. F. T. Isbell of Eastland.

Brother of Ranger Man First to See Traxler and Captor

Morris Jefferies of Ranger has received a letter from his brother, Emory Jefferies of Boswell, Oklahoma, telling of his experiences while delivering his rural mail route, when he met up with Pete Traxler, and his captors, just after Traxler had been shot and his companion Fred Tindol had been slain by J. F. Denton.

The letter states that Jefferies passed a car parked alongside the road, in which four men were sitting. Later when he returned there were two men in the car and they flourished pistols and halted him.

The two stated that they had shot Traxler, who was in the automobile, and had killed Tindol. Traxler got in Jefferies' car and asked Jefferies to take him to a doctor. Jefferies replied that he could not do that, but would send a doctor back.

Squad cars, awaiting news of the desperadoes, were contacted and officers rushed to the scene of the slaying and capture.

Jefferies states in his letter that although several days have elapsed since his experience, he is still "telling about it" as everyone he meets stops him to ask about the capture of the notorious outlaw.

Coastguards Seek Missing Heiress

STATE BOARD TO RECONSIDER SCHOOL FUND

AUSTIN, July 23.—The State Board of Education will meet tomorrow to discuss the scholastic apportionment that this week threw Ghent Sanderford, president of the board, into a bitter feud with the state automatic tax board.

Sanderford, seeking a higher allotment, was requested by several members of the board to call the meeting tomorrow. When he refused three members called the meeting by petition.

"They are going to try to reduce the per capita apportionment," said Sanderford.

The school board, two weeks ago, set an apportionment of \$22. When the tax board met Wednesday it refused to set a tax rate that would allow the increase and cut the total ad valorem tax rate to 49 cents per \$100 valuation.

Failures To Pass Farm Bill Seen As Devastating

Failure to pass the 1938 agricultural adjustment act bill now before Congress could easily create a condition where surpluses of farm crops would reduce prices to the ruinous levels of a few years ago, according to W. B. Starr of Dan Horn, chairman of the Eastland county Agricultural association.

Starr called the attention of farmers and Eastland county business men to the bill and asked that they urge favorable action. A meeting for the discussion of the proposed bill will be conducted at Waco next Thursday Starr said in a letter.

He continued: "Such prices coupled with the great advances in prices of goods farmers have to buy would undoubtedly create a new depression. Officers of the Eastland County Agricultural association urge as many farmers as possible to attend this meeting at Waco. Those wishing to go should get in touch with the writer at Cisco or leave word at the office of the county agent at Eastland."

"All farmers are urged to write their congressmen or the Secretary of Agriculture regarding this bill. One congressman recently said that members of congress rarely received a letter from farm-voters, and they were often at a loss to know just what they wanted done. At the same time they daily received letters from lobbyists in the employ of those interests, urging them to vote for bills favorable to these interests."

"Let us write our congressmen more frequently so that they may have the benefit of our advice on matters before Congress affecting farmers' interests. Let us perform our personal duty, which so greatly affects our children's interests."

Kicking of Carol Won't Be 'Japanese Incident'



Even though pert, personable Carol Lathrop, above, of Washington, D. C., strolled too close to Japanese defense lines in Peiping and, with another woman visitor, was kicked and handled rather roughly by Japanese sentries, the United States will not become embroiled in a "foreign incident," the State Department indicated. American embassy officials in Peiping will make representations to the Japanese embassy about the treatment of the Washington girl and Mrs. Helen R. Jones of Detroit, and end the matter it was said.

LOWER COURT REFORM STILL IS IN MAKING

WASHINGTON, July 23.—President Roosevelt was represented in authoritative quarters today as believing that despite the death of his original court plan he has made progress in his campaign to liberalize the judiciary.

This statement came as leaders of the fight against the original court plan prepared to draft a bill to alter lower court procedure without supreme court changes.

One of these leaders, Sen. Edward Burke of Nebraska, conferred at the white house today with the president. The appointment was made at the instance of Vice President Garner, who has assumed the task of conciliating conflicting views on the court bill.

The lower court procedural bill will be drafted by a subcommittee of eight senate judiciary committee members, headed by Sen. Pat McCarran of Nevada.

Other gains the president was said to see in the court fight were that the country has become "court minded" and has learned to feel that the constitution was not intended to block social and economic reforms.

The president's attitude, it was said, could be summed up "we are getting somewhere, but we have along way to go."

The president was said to feel that he has recommended a legislative program which he believes essential to the country's future and that the question of action rests directly upon congress.

The corner stones of this program are minimum wages, maximum hour laws, federal farm aid legislation, low cost housing and government reorganization.

DOCTOR KILLS INVALID SON AND HIMSELF

SEATTLE, Wash., July 23.—One of Seattle's most prominent physicians shot his invalid son to death, then committed suicide because his son's illness was incurable, authorities said today.

The actors in the mercy slaying drama were Dr. Guy Peterkin, 66, internationally famous, and his 22-year-old invalid son, Sherman, a brilliant and popular student at the University of Washington last year.

After completing his studies at the university last year, Sherman went abroad. In Paris he suffered a nervous breakdown and his health failed. Dr. Peterkin hurried to Europe and brought the youth home early this year.

Late yesterday he took his son to his downtown office and fired a revolver through his head.

Then Dr. Peterkin wrote a note and telephoned a doctor friend in the same building. He shot himself through the head after telling the doctor he had killed his son.

MANY EXPECTED TO BE IN CITY FOR BIG EVENT

Contestants and Spectators Will Have Plenty of Room at Improved Arena.

Rodeo contestants, rodeo fans, the regular trades day crowd and those who customarily do their shopping in Ranger on Saturday, are expected to flock into town in large numbers Saturday afternoon and night for one of the biggest entertainment features ever offered in this part of the country.

Two big rodeo performances, with the most outstanding contestants in this part of the country and a large number from as far away as 100 miles in every direction, will be one of the main attractions of the day, with arrangements made for thousands of visitors.

The first performance will begin promptly at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, preceded by a big parade, led by Mayor Hall Walker and the Ranger High School Band.

The program for both the afternoon and evening performances has been worked out by a committee composed of G. C. (Lum) Love, chairman; Sig Faircloth, A. J. Ratliff and Dr. Ross Hodges. Faircloth has taken a big part of making the final arrangements and will furnish part of the stock for the show. He will be in charge of the arena at both performances, assisted by Charles McNabb of Stephens county, who is also a proficient rodeo manager.

The most outstanding amateur ropers, riders, wild cow milkers and other rodeo entertainers will compete for the prizes that are being offered, while trick roping by Duke Purdum and a six-calf roping contest between Vester Parrish of Wingate and Zelma Herrington of Stephens county, for a purse of \$100 will be another feature.

The two have roped before for a side purse, with Herrington winning, but Parrish is determined to prove that he is the best calf roper of the two, and much interest is being worked up on this feature of the show.

Contestants must register at the office of the Chamber of Commerce on Main street, while spectators can obtain tickets there in advance and will not have to stand in line at the ticket booths.

It was pointed out today that there was a lot of parking space behind the temporary fence that will be erected tonight through the middle of the field. This parking space, from which the chutes, as been readily, as it faces the chutes, is reached through the big gate in the fence on the Walnut street side of the arena.

Seats, too, will be installed along this fence so that an additional 500 spectators can have choice places opposite the chutes and the grandstands.

Announcement was made today by the committee that everything was in readiness for the big show and preparations had been made to handle many more than attended the first night rodeo here last May.

Scabies Control Is Being Continued by Livestock Group

AUSTIN.—The Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas, in conjunction with the Bureau of Animal Industry, conducted activities for the prevention and eradication of the scabies infection and exposure thereto in 73 counties in Texas for the month of June.

Seven hundred one herds and a total of 543,321 cattle, sheep and goats were dipped or inspected or both.

Two hundred ten goats were classed as infected. Of the number inspected 535,686 cattle,

sheep and goats were found to be free of scabies infection and exposure thereto.

Nine thousand nine hundred fourteen cattle, sheep and goats were dipped and certified to.

Five thousand five hundred seventy-one cattle and 1,854 sheep were classed as exposed on account of being imported into Texas and dipped to comply with Texas' scabies law.

TORONTO, Ont.—Despite the fact that the legal speed limit on Ontario highways was raised from 35 miles an hour to 50 last month, the department of highways has not changed roadway signs. Officials explain it by saying they are not eager to encourage motorists to drive at 50.

Voters Pay and Pay Under Machine Rule

From out Chicago way come rumblings indicating that that high-spirited city is, once more, about to demonstrate the price that can be paid for government of, by and for the politicians.

Chicago's new tax rate, announced recently, touched an all-time high with a figure of \$9.52 for each \$100 of assessed valuation. But a high tax rate, in itself, is nothing particularly new for any American city. What makes the Chicago case interesting is its background.

Eight or nine years ago Chicago landed itself in the headlines with a taxpayers' strike. Taxes went uncollected, city services languished, city employees went on skimpy rations—and, all the while, the city was blithely going ahead on borrowed money, supporting one of the most malodorous political rings in America.

That got itself settled, finally. The politicians were chased out, the city began to pay its way once more, and it looked as if everything was to be lovely. But one of the unnoticed little axioms of American politics is that if you resign the worries of government to politicians you are going to pay for the privilege; and before long this old saw began to prove its truth anew.

The old gang was chased out, but a new gang came gaily in. The Kelly-Nash machine took Chicago over as its private fief, and the tax rate began to soar. In 1933 it stood at \$6.49. It has gone up every year since then. In addition, new gas, vehicle and liquor taxes have been created in recent years, each collecting its mite from the taxpayer in addition to his real property levies.

With all of this money being collected, you would suppose that Chicago was at least getting some excellent government for its money, and that all of the city employees were being paid regularly. But it isn't quite working out that way. Most of the city employees have been getting along under a 10 1/2 per cent pay cut for two years.

Past as the city's income mounts, it does not seem to mount fast enough to enable the city to pay its workers their full wages and salaries.

As a result, loud murmurs of discontent are being heard. The head of an electrician's union talks ominously about turning all the street lights off and leaving the river bridges open. School teachers talk of forming a "united front." And on top of everything else, a taxpayer's strike is freely predicted.

A picture like this is eminently worth the study of the inhabitants of other cities. For it is perfectly obvious that what is happening in Chicago is nothing more than the inevitable result of giving a political machine its head. If you permit a machine to fasten itself upon you, you are going to pay for it. The plight of the Chicago taxpayer is an object lesson for all taxpayers.

ICE CREAM can be all things to all men. Some like it hot, some want it cold. Then give them Baked Alaska Shortcake.

Baked Alaska Shortcake
(4 to 6 servings)

One-quarter cup butter, 1-3 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1-2 cups flour, 1-2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cup milk, 1 quart fresh strawberries or raspberries, 1-4 cup sugar, 1 quart ice cream, for meringue, 4 egg whites, 6 tablespoons sugar.

To make cake, cream butter and sugar together. Beat in whole egg. Sift dry ingredients together and alternately add with milk to egg mixture. Beat thoroughly. Pour the batter into a well buttered 2 quart heat-resistant glass utility dish. Bake until nicely browned in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 25 minutes, or when an inserted toothpick comes out clean. While cake is baking, clean and cut berries and stir in the sugar.

When cake is cool, cover with berries, forming 6 depressions for the ice cream. Place the ice cream in each depression. Cover thickly with the meringue, made by beating together the 6 egg whites and sugar. Be sure the eggs are beaten absolutely stiff. Brown quickly in the oven and serve immediately. That's a big time Sunday dessert!

For a less spectacular dessert with plenty of surprise flavor, try butter pecan ice cream.

BREAKFAST: Persian melon, fried ham with cream gravy, cornmeal muffins, grape jelly, coffee, milk.

DINNER: Grapefruit cup, roast leg of lamb, scalloped potatoes with cheese, fried tomatoes, buttered snap beans, lettuce and cucumber salad, baked Alaska shortcake, coffee, milk.

Butter Pecan Ice Cream

(Makes 1 quart)

Two cups milk, 1 package vanilla arrowroot pudding, 1-2 cup granulated sugar, 2-3 cup pecan nuts, 1 tablespoon melted butter, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup cream, whipped.

Mix vanilla arrowroot pudding with milk, bring to boil, stirring constantly. Remove from fire. Add sugar. Cool slightly and pour into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator to chill. Let freeze about 1 hour, until thick but not hard.

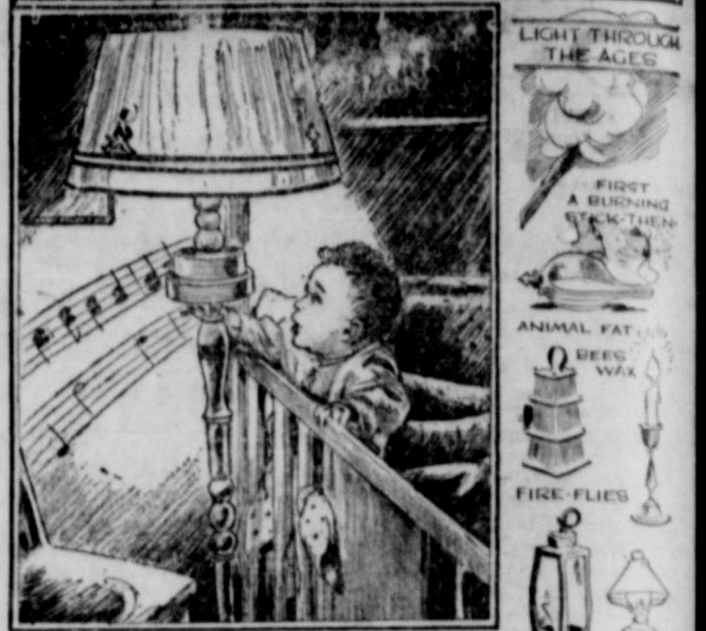

report of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Reports from the office of Secretary of State show a decline in number of charters of 40.6 per cent from May and 33.3 per cent from June last year, the bureau's statement said. Capitalization declined 43.1 per cent from the preceding month and 27.2 per cent from June last year.

During the first six months of the year 810 new corporations were chartered, a decline of 11.5 per cent from the 915 chartered during the corresponding period a year ago. Aggregate capitalization of these firms was \$12,825,000, an increase of 4 per cent over the first half of 1936.

Four-Month Toll Of Accidents Hit Near the 600-Mark

AUSTIN, Texas—Death in traffic accidents came to 594 persons in Texas during March, April, May and June.

Hit and run drivers killed 19 of the 100 they left by the roadside within the first three months of that period.

Through the May 31 tabulation by the Public Safety Department, covering the immediately preceding three months, there were 3,746 accidents, 9.82 percent of which were fatal. Injuries were suffered by 3,368 persons involved in 52.07 percent of the wrecks.

Motor - with - motor collisions

were the worst offenders, more than half of the accidents being thus classified, but the outmoded horse-drawn vehicle was involved .51 per cent of the time.

Not one of June's 168 fatalities resulted from accidents within metropolitan city limits. Why? "Just an accident," Public Safety employees said, adding that they hoped it was because of stricter traffic law enforcement by city police, but that could not be ascertained until the accident report records are submitted to the department.

Report Is Made On Tick Eradication

AUSTIN.—The Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas in conjunction with the Bureau of Animal Industry conducted activities for the prevention and eradication of the fever-carrying tick in 78 counties in Texas for the month of June.

Twenty-five whole and parts of three other counties are engaged in systematic tick eradication work.

Twenty-five whole and parts of one other county are released from both federal and state quarantines but still contain a small number of quarantine herds that are being systematically treated. The remaining 25 counties and part of one county are also released from quarantine but are counties in which inspections or dippings or both are done in accordance with state and federal requirements.

One hundred twenty-six thousand and nine hundred seventeen herds and 1,981,428 cattle, horses, mules, jacks and jennets were dipped or inspected. Three thousand five hundred four herds and 18,440 livestock were upon inspection found to be infested with the fever tick.

Thirty-six thousand two hundred fifty-nine herds and 464,795 livestock are being held for further systematic treatment.

Self-Fed Gas Is Used to Dull the Dental Office Fear

TORONTO, Ont.—The day of fear and trembling which descends on almost every man when he sits in a dentist's chair watching the dentist reach for his drill may be over.

A machine, demonstrated here by Dr. J. B. Greer, Toronto dentist, enables the patient to feed himself whiffs of nitrous oxide gas, commonly known as "laughing gas," as the dentist works over him. The gas gives a sensation of exhilaration and dulls pain.

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON—That party the Democrats had at Jefferson Island is well in the past, but some of the best stories of what happened on the island are just beginning to leak out.

One of them evidences the fact that although President Roosevelt will call a man by his first name as quickly as one thus addresses a barber or waitress—often ap-
plying the phenomenon to a lady or gent on first meeting—it takes a Jim Farley to remember the correct name every time.

A group of anti-court bill senators stuck close to each other on the island, and a half dozen of them approached the President in a group to pay their so-called re-
spects. Senators Bailey of North Carolina and Byrd of Virginia had passed by and had not been greeted by their first names, which would be a story by itself.

Then up stepped Senator Clark of Missouri. And the President either had become flustered by this time or else suffered one of those brainstorms or memory lapses which at one time or another afflict us all. The only other possibility is that he was trying to be funny, which is unlikely.
