Half Inch Rain Falls Here Early Today

Cisco received another .5 inch of rain to add to the steadily mounting figure for May and for the first five months of 1949 when a blowing rain, accompanied by an electrical storm, hit at 1 a. m. Thursday. The lightning and wind did some damage to power lines and telephone service.

Only .10 inches of moisture was registered at Lake Cisco and no increase in the water supply was noted. Heavy rains were recorded in the Moran area and between Cisco and grain fields to some extent. High winds damaged, but it was believed that the damage was slight.

More than 100 telephones were out of order today as a result of the blowing rain and the Utility Company reported that some feeder lines were blown down. Repair crews were working to repair the damage.

"It has been necessary to eliminate BA itinerant contact service because of budget limitations," Mr. Harrington said. "We regret the necessity for this action."

Intinerant contact service by VA will be discontinued in 27 North Texas towns served by the Dallas Regional Office due to the reduced budget, the VA manager said.

NETTING PAYS OFF

Fishermen Are Removing Hundreds Of Undesirable Fish From City Lakes

Thousands of pounds of undesirable fish have been removed from Lake Cisco since the city commission voted to allow netting in the waters of the city owned lakes, Ray Judia, lake custodian, reported.

The fish being taken from the waters are all large Carp, Buffalo and Catfish that eat the small fish and the eggs. The fish that are being removed from the nets are old and are considered parasites since they take from the lakes without returning anything to them. The older types do not lay eggs and contribute nothing toward the building of the lake into a good fishing spot.

The Buffalo and Carp eat millions of eggs annually and the large Catfish eat the small fish. It is the hope of lake officials to improve the fishing by removing the cannibalistic element.

Approximately 12 fishermen are taking advantage of the city ordinance permitting netting and are getting fine results. One group reports catches of carp weighing as high as 200 pounds and another removed three catfish averaging 35 pounds, four averaging 25 pounds and a 38 pounder. In addition they caught several carp, the smallest of which weighed 14 pounds. Only nets with a three inch or larger mesh may be used in the lakes, it was announced. The prohibiting of the use of smaller nets protects the smaller fish, including bass and channel cat.

Permits for netting can be obtained from Ray Judia at the Lake Cisco Tourist Lodge by posting a \$10.00 bond and receiving a tag. The bond will be returned when the tag is returned, if the netter has not been caught violating rules.

West Ward P. T. A. Appeals For Aid In Ward School Lunch Room Program

Donations for the proposed lunch room at the West Ward School continued to come in as P. T. A. members were attempting to raise the \$1,000 needed to complete the project, it was announced.

The P. T. A. is attempting to raise the money without a concentrated drive and is depending upon programs and bake sales to raise the major part of the required amount. The project was designed in order to relieve the overcrowded condition at the grammar school lunch room and to keep West Ward students from having to walk to the Grammar School in bad weather.

ARMY QUARTERMASTER BUYS \$31,000,000 PER MONTH FROM FARMERS' MARKET

When Uncle Sam goes to market to supply the Armed Forces with fresh foods he is the American farmer's best customer. During the past year his purchases averaged \$31,000,000 a month.

Known as the Market Center System and operated by the Army Quartermaster Corps, this organization purchases, ships, stores, and supplies virtually all the perishable subsistence required by the Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. In addition to the regular Armed Forces, the Market Center System supplies perishable foods for National Guard organizations while they are in camp, as well as for certain civilians who are entitled to buy from Army commissaries, and for use in the Greek aid program.

The Army defines perishable foods as those requiring refrigeration in shipment and storage. They include fresh meats, vegetables, fruits, fish and other water foods, dairy products, and frozen fruits and vegetables. Nearly 100 different kinds of food items aggregating about 150,000,000 pounds a month are regularly supplied.

The purchases from all over the United States are made on the spot for specified amounts and at quoted prices. Payments are made promptly. And although savings to the taxpayers run high into the millions of dollars per year through this unification of purchases as compared with the local buying by all of the military services in competition with each other and without uniform standards, such as prevailed before the recent war, supplies are benefited by knowing the quantities and qualities desired, by greatly reduced rejections, and by the opportunity offered all who are interested to offer their products.

There are now ten Market Centers. They are situated at Columbia, South Carolina; Denver, Colorado; Fort Worth, Texas; San Francisco and Los Angeles, California; New Orleans, Louisiana; New York, New York; Richmond and Williamsburg, Virginia; and Seattle, Washington. Williamsburg is also the port for European shipments.

Direct contact with companies and individuals who have products for sale is maintained by a crew of field buyers who operate all over the country working out of their field offices. These are the experts who know fresh foods, who have specialized in certain lines, and who work face to face with the producers and those who have them for sale. The field offices are in Boston, Massachusetts; Washington, D. C.; Jacksonville and Miami, Florida; Kansas City, Kansas; Idaho Falls, Idaho; San Diego and El Centro, California and Mobile, Alabama.

Perennial Flowers from Seed, Easy as Vegetables

To grow perennial flowers from seed, it is far better to sow them in the early spring than to wait for summer. There is no way in which an amateur can save money faster than by growing his own plants of those perennials which "come true" from seed.

Peonies, Iris, and some others take several years to reach flowering size, and then cannot be depended to resemble the varieties from which seed were saved. But columbines, delphinium, coreopsis, hardy pinks, shasta daisies, hollyhocks, pyrethrum, poppies, and many other lovely kinds of the highest quality can be grown to full maturity in one year.

Many of them, sown early this spring, will give their first blossoms before the season ends; and for years to come will be beautiful performers in your garden pageant. Amateurs who have found difficulty growing summer-sown perennials are usually surprised at the difference, when seed is sown in the spring. The usual practice is to sow the seed in boxes, or in a seed bed; then to transplant to garden rows as soon as the seedlings are large enough to handle. Give them space in the row to grow until fall when they will usually be ready to take their place in the decorative border.

If you have vegetable plot, perennials can be grown there and given the same feeding and cultivation. Most of them are as easy to grow as the vegetables.

Plants are difficult to grow in large scale operations because of the limited area over which they can be distributed satisfactorily and the high cost of packing such fragile subjects for shipment. The gardener who grows his own pays only for the seed. The task of caring for the plants and observing their growth is a fascinating recreation, if he is a true garden fan.

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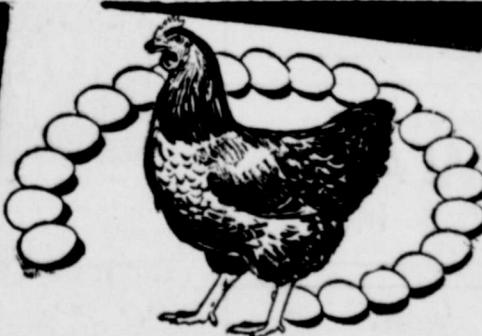
