

New Period Of Danger Looms In Cuban Crisis

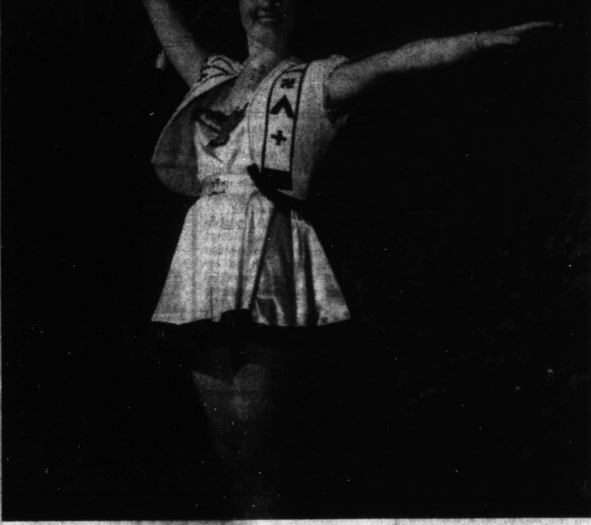
By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy met with his top military and diplomatic advisers today amid evidence that the Cuban crisis may be moving into a new and more dangerous period.

In a White House conference with the executive committee of the National Security Council, Kennedy was believed to have discussed Premier Fidel Castro's threat to fire on U.S. reconnaissance planes over Cuba.

Officials here say they have no real idea what Mikoyan could mean by New York so he could meet U.S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson and other U.S. negotiators.

Castro's belligerent assertion could have either of two purposes, as officials here understood them.

He could be striking a strong public pose to cover up concessions to Mikoyan on the international inspection issue. Or he could be intent on forcing a fight with the United States.

18 Crewmen Missing

By BERNARD BROWN HAMILTON, Bermuda (AP)—Rescue planes and ships searched the stormy Atlantic northeast of Bermuda today for 18 missing crewmen who abandoned the Greek freighter Captain George as flames and their way toward a cargo of explosives.

The U.S. submarine Torsk took over the search from two Liberian-flag ships which picked up the seven survivors, the tanker Virginia and the freighter Trinity Navigator.

Later the Coast Guard reported that the Compass Island, an experimental navigational ship, left the scene on an undisclosed "military mission" and would land the survivors—five Americans and a Briton—in New York on Nov. 21.

Guam Damage \$210 Million

AGANA, Guam (AP)—The acting governor of Guam has put a price tag of \$210 million on restoring the island's typhoon-battered economy and pledged a long-range recovery program to prevent the growth of shantytown communities.

The six men aboard the two-master schooner were rescued by the U.S. Navy ship Compass Island which had escorted it from a point 90 miles north of Bermuda.

Saturn Superrocket Poised For Third Test Launching

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—The Saturn superrocket, its booster stage fully fueled for the first test launching today.

The 162-foot, million-pound rocket, forerunner of a vehicle which will take American astronauts to the moon, was set to blast into the sky in midday under the tremendous power of eight engines pouring out 13 million pounds of thrust, equal to 30 million horsepower.

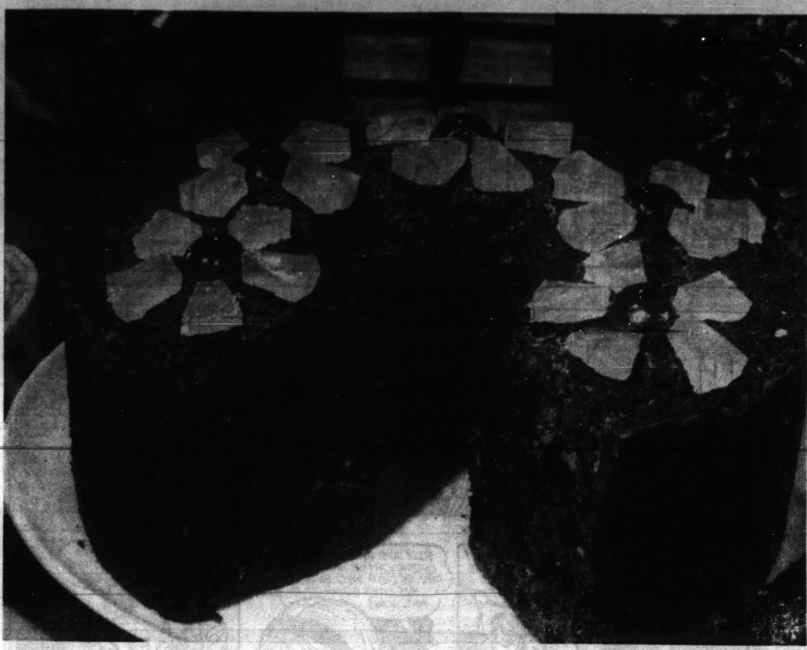

Fruitcake Supreme Is Old-Fashion Favorite

Made with candied fruit and light molasses, Fruitcake Supreme is a new, unusual variation of the old-fashioned favorite fruitcake served during Christmas time. The spicy hard sauce adds a tangy sweet gourmet touch which will make you the hit of the season. Here's the recipe for Fruitcake Supreme with three hard sauce variations.

FRUITCAKE SUPREME
2 pkg. Date Bar Mix
1-1/3 cups hot water
6 eggs
1/2 cup of flour
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/4 cup light molasses
2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. nutmeg
1/2 tsp. allspice
2 cups chopped walnuts
2 cups mixed candied fruit
2 cups raisins
Heat oven to 325° (slow mod.) Grease and flour a 10" tube pan. Combine date fillings (from both date bar mix pkg.) with hot water in large bowl. Add crumbly mixtures, eggs, flour, baking powder, molasses and spices; blend well. Fold in nuts and fruit thoroughly. Pour into prepared pan. Bake 2 hr., or until toothpick stuck in center comes out clean. Cool. Wrap and store in refrigerator. Serve with Hard Sauces (below).

HARD SAUCES
1/4 cup soft butter
2 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
1 tsp. cream
1/4 tsp. mace
1 tsp. lemon juice
1/4 tsp. brandy extract
1 tsp. chopped nuts
1/4 tsp. pineapple extract
Cream butter, sugar and cream together until smooth. Divide into 3 portions. For Spicy Hard Sauce: add mace and lemon juice to one portion; mix thoroughly. For Brandy Hard Sauce: add brandy extract and nuts to one portion; mix thoroughly. For Pineapple Hard Sauce: add pineapple extract to one portion; mix thoroughly. Soft sides? Place biscuits close together on baking sheet or in pan.

McMurry, Louisiana Duel Here Saturday

College football comes barreling into the scene here in Snyder Saturday night when McMurry of Abilene squares off with Louisiana College of Pineville in Tiger Stadium at 7:30.

The unique game is being brought here by the local Optimist Club, and will bring together a pair of teams who are both desirous of capping off their respective campaigns above the 500 watermark. The Indians of McMurry are 4-4 on the eve of the contest, while the opposing Wildcats stand 4-3-1.

Grant Teaff, a "transplanted Snyderite," is head coach at the Abilene school. Two of his tackles also hail from here—Jackies Ronnie Gilles and Doug James.

Several Tribe starters are products of the immediate area, also. Among them are guard Wilbert Shipp of Rotan, tackle Delbert Wiley of Ballinger, quarterback Lee King of Ranger, fullback Don Davis of Stamford, guard Ray Crumpler of Abilene, and tackle Ernest Park of Wylie.

McMurry will field a forward wall that is pro-type in size, averaging out at 217 pounds to the man.

Close games, for the most part, have keyed the season for both competing eleven. McMurry wins have been over Howard Payne (7-0), Hardin-Simmons (8-0), Southwest Texas State (14-0), University of Corpus Christi (60-0), and Tarleton State (43-12). Their losses have been dealt them by Youngstown (Ohio) University (9-19), Trinity University (14-24), Arlington State (13-25), and Abilene Christian (12-14).

The Wildcats list among their victims Sam Houston State (9-0), Troy (Ala.) State (28-0), University of Southwest Louisiana (12-4), and Jacksonville (Ala.) State (8-7). They have been felled by Howard College (12-14), McNeese State (14-28), and East Central Oklahoma (13-14). Their deadlocked game was a 7-7 affair against Northwestern Louisiana State.

Coaching the Wildcats is Frank Young Jr. Tickets for the game—priced at

two dollars for adults and a dollar for students—remain on sale at the Ben Franklin Store on the west side of the square, and will also be available at the gate prior to game time.

Tigers, Wolves Meet In District Conflict

A pair of old, old rivals take to the gridiron tonight in Colorado City when the Wolves of that community engage Snyder's Tigers in a District 3-AAA on next beginning at 7:30.

Both teams will be seeking their initial conference victories when they take the field, with their records being identical at 0-3. Tiger losses have been sustained at the hands of Lamesa (23-36), Brownfield (12-21) and Sweetwater (0-3), while the Wolves have been dropped by Brownfield (0-27), Sweetwater (6-52), and Lake View (24-56).

For the entire season Snyder is 3-6 and Colorado City 1-7. Looking back on a rivalry which began in 1924, the C-Citians sport a wide edge in the won-lost column. They have won 16 compared to Snyder's nine, while three other games ended in ties.

Snyder holds the edge in recent years, however, beginning in 1956. Since that time the Tigers have won four while losing two and tying one. Their last outing is one the Bengals would just as soon forget, though, for it was on that occasion that the underdog Wolves rose up to knock the pins out from under the local eleven, 25-14.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—In Cassius Clay ready for the heavyweight boxing champion, Sonny Liston?

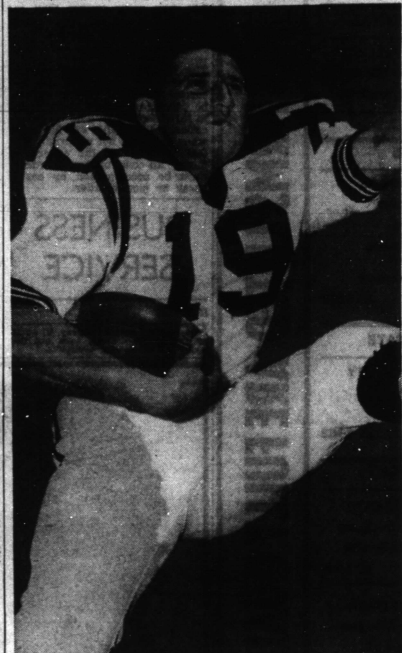
"I think you better ask his manager about it," said Liston after watching Cassius knock out Archie Moore in four rounds Thursday night.
