Memorial Closings Set

Several Littlefield businesses will be closed Saturday in observance of Memorial Day, and all federal offices, with the exception of the post office, will be closed Saturday and Sunday. The post office will be open all day Saturday. City Hall will take an early day off, and citizens wishing to transact business there are asked to have done by 5 p.m. Thursday. The courthouse will remain open for business as usual Friday. All barber shops and beauty shops will be closed Saturday.

Man Is Jailed For Not Sending Kids To School

Rodriguez of Littlefield will be cooling his heels in the Lamb County jail for at least half of the summer for failing to send his children to school. Rodriguez, who has 10 dependent children, and another local man were brought before Justice of the Peace J. N. Bowen and charged with getting their children in school. Judge Bowen said one child, but with less than a month left in this school term, Rodriguez failed to follow the law. Rodriguez was fined \$200, and paying the fine out at \$5 a day for 40 days. Lamb County sheriff's office charged one person with burglary and charged another with felony forgery this week.

County Residents Eligible For Loans

Lamb County has been included in the major disaster area Declaration by the President.

This Declaration makes Lamb County farmers and ranchers who received tornado damage on April 17, or May 11, eligible for special low interest loans through Farmers Home Administration.

The loans can be used to repair, restore or replace damaged or destroyed property such as farm dwelling and buildings, household furniture, livestock and farm equipment.

Loans can also be made for qualifying crop losses caused by the tornado which are not compensated for by insurance.

Farmers and ranchers who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere are eligible for three percent interest loans up to \$1,800 principal and interest cancellation.

Loans are also available to farmers and ranchers who can

obtain other credit; however, the interest rate on this type loan is five and seven-eighths percent and no principal and interest cancellation is available.

All loans are limited to qualified property losses as a result of tornadoes which occurred on April 17, and May 11.

For information concerning these loans, contact The Farmers Home Administration office located in the Post Office building, 110 E. 6th Street in Littlefield.

Council Reviews Civil Defense Plan

A detailed Civil Defense Plan, including the early storm warning system for Littlefield, was discussed at the regular City Council meeting Thursday night.

City Manager Pat Bradley explained the program step-by-step and told how the city's plans are being coordinated with defense plans of the Red Cross, Salvation Army, Southwestern Public Service Company, Pioneer Gas Co., General Telephone and Lamb County Electric Co-op Inc.

At present, plans are being made to utilize emergency vehicles in areas where the downtown siren cannot be heard when blown during storm warnings.

The plan, which is still being discussed and improved upon, will begin when notice of impending bad weather is given, and in the event a tornado comes within a 10 mile radius of the city, six short blasts on the warning system will be sounded.

Civil Defense authorities feel citizens need a little time to get to shelters, instead of driving in a panic down streets with only a few seconds at stake.

In a few days the city manager plans to inform the public in greater detail as to how the plan works, when all the steps have been worked out.

Mayor J. E. Chisholm suggested that the plan needs to be reviewed each January, so that protection for the city is readily available at all times.

Councilmen feel that a civil defense plan needs to be workable all year.

Another item on the agenda called for a decision on whether the city would continue the Migrant Health Project through 1971. Councilmen instructed the city manager to check into finding someone else to sponsor the project if the Health, Education and Welfare Department would not approve the project with the sanitarian's position and salary included.

Police Chief F. A. Fitzgerald

and patrolmen James Cox and Dusty Bogard appeared before the council to answer questions concerning a curfew. All three officers agreed that there was no need of having a curfew.

Councilmen discussed the data processing method of preparation of 1970 tax information, and decided to have the city manager prepare a complete list of specifications and set them up for bids.

City Manager Pat Bradley explained a letter he had received from South Plains College concerning the proposed police training school.

The letter informed the manager that recent action taken by the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) had caused their plans to vary, in that the Criminal Justice Advisory Committee of SPAG has

recommended that their organization conduct the training.

And the letter continued to say that the college would not proceed with any plans for a police academy until SPAG made their final decision.

Councilmen discussed the possibilities of a community antenna television franchise and learned that General Telephone's application for certification of construction and operation of proposed cable facilities has been dismissed until March 16, 1974.

City Manager Bradley stated he had received a letter from Tejas Enterprises, Inc. in Dal-

las, inquiring about the status of a community antenna television system franchise in Littlefield.

Councilmen authorized the city manager to contact General Telephone for further information on the standing of the situation.

Jack Peel, a tenant on the city-owned well field farm, appeared before the councilmen to present facts about a proposed underground irrigation line on the farm. Costs were reviewed and councilmen decided that the timing for such a project was bad, and that

Crop Planting Tops 80 Per Cent

It's decision-making time for farmers again, and for many the question is whether to re-plant cotton.

Figures at the county agent's office Friday showed about 80 per cent of the county cotton crop planted and 85 per cent of the grain sorghum in the ground, with most of the land not planted being dryland.

High winds have caused seed furrows to dry out, and many farmers over the area were running rotary hoes this week trying to get seed up behind last Thursday's rain.

Several farmers, like Floyd Prentice at Olton, were trying to scratch a stand of cotton up, and said if the situation didn't look better by today or Monday, they planned to replant this week.

Farmers in the Hart Camp area have good stands of grain sorghum, and in the Springlake-Earth communities the corn is growing well. Several around Springlake are growing corn on contract for starch for the Dimmitt plant, and several, including producer Ed Dawson's corn, is double-row bed planted.

Corn around the Olton Feed-

lot is being grown for silage.

FORMER RODEO STAR

Policeman Still Rides, But Now On Softer Seat

Until Littlefield police sergeant Dusty Bogard joined the local law force a little over two years ago, he was, like the mythical movie star cowboy, kissing his horse instead of the girls and riding off into the sunset.

Bogard roped calves and bulldogged in professional rodeos all over the U.S. and in Canada for 10 years before coming

"home" to join the police department.

Bogard started rodeoing as a member of the junior rodeo while he was in high school at Bula, where he lived from the time he was two years old. He played all sports as the seasons rolled around and two colleges tried to recruit this 6'3" for their cage squads, but Bogard had his mind made up to join the rodeo circuit and "get rich."

He describes his getting rich

as "getting by" and for the next 10 years he followed the Rodeo Cowboys Association (RCA) rodeos that started in Odessa in January and wound up in San Francisco in November, averaging 40 rodeos a year.

The average RCA calf ropers' active employment is five years and the average bull rider lasts only two years, but Bogard stayed with the profession 10 years. He had to win to make money and had to win to stay with RCA, but he modestly calls himself "just a run-of-the-mill cowboy." Like a 200 baseball hitter, he explained, "some can hit 300."

Bulldogging jolts the knees and ankles of performers, and Bogard hurt an ankle before he quit. During his rodeoing he worked two years as a salaried pick-up man, getting riders off barebacks, and saddle broncs, running calves and steers out of the arena and running bulls or roping and dragging them out if necessary.

His pay averaged everywhere from losing his entrance fee and coming out broke to making \$1,500 during one rodeo. An

Texas Tech University's College of Agriculture was notified Friday that a 1956 graduate from Littlefield has received "one of the highest awards given by the Foreign Agricultural Service."

Jimmy D. Minyard, son of James F. Minyard, of Star Route 1, Littlefield, received a certificate of merit for his "Quality Step Increase" award for "high quality performance above that ordinarily found in his position as Chief, Analysis and Evaluation Branch in the Trade Projects Division."

Minyard holds the bachelor of science degree in agricultural economics from Texas Tech.

Minyard is one of five members on a task force selected also by the Secretary of Agriculture to receive the Superior Service Award, the second highest offered by the department. The group also holds the Foreign Agricultural Service recognition for special achievement.

The members received certificates "for unusual initiative and effectiveness in developing, organizing and planning a far reaching and imaginative five-year promotional program for expanding sales of agricultural products overseas."

The group is the Program Planning and Budgeting System Task Force for Market Development.

Festivities Days officials met twice this week to plan the two-day, activity-filled event set for August 28 and 29.

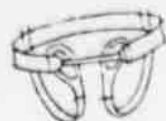

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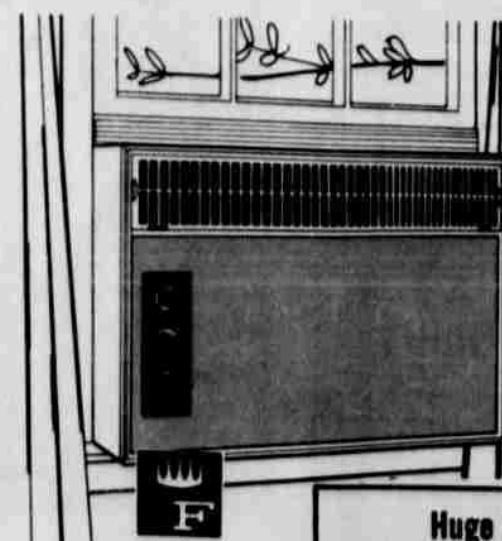

If we focus so much of our attention on them that they appear to be the whole of living, we are being very foolish.

OUR MISFORTUNES are increased when we give to them more attention and consideration than is necessary. "The longer we dwell on our misfortunes, the greater their power to harm us," Voltaire.

They may require some attention, but we must keep it to the minimum. In many instances, as part of the overview of life, we should turn our attention to better things.

WE BECOME OVERWROUGHT if we do not maintain the overview. "Behold eighty-three years passed away! What cares! What agitation! What anxieties! What ill-will! What sad complications!

Laws That Don't Work

GUN CONTROL LAWS, of themselves, do little to retard the growth of crime.

Of the nation's largest cities, four were covered by total firearms registration during the first half of 1969.

Four more were under local or State laws requiring permits to buy or transfer handguns. One had an ordinance covering all firearms transfers.

Three of the nation's largest cities, by contrast, had no local or State laws rigidly restricting the sale of firearms.

AMONG THE CITIES with controls, New York City, Chicago, Washington, D.C. and San Francisco have, perhaps, the stiffest firearms laws.

In these cities, the homicide rate during the first half of 1969 ranged from a six percent increase in New York to a 102 percent increase in San Francisco.

Five of the nation's largest cities with gun controls of varying stringency showed alarming increases in

homicides, ranging from 53 percent in Cleveland to 18 percent in Philadelphia.

The other three of the nation's largest cities—Los Angeles, Houston and Milwaukee—having the least restrictive gun laws came up with these figures for the first half of 1969.

Los Angeles, murders up 14 percent; Houston, murders decreased five percent; Milwaukee, murders decreased 18 percent.

THE FOREGOING are facts from figures compiled from the FBI Uniform Crime Report.

They bear out the belief of Dr. Bruce Danto, director of the Detroit Suicide Prevention Center, that "gun control is not the answer" to the rising tide of violence in cities.

The sad truth is that many freedom destroying laws aimed at law-abiding citizens are passed in an emotional fury; and, after passage, no one ever takes the time to appraise their effectiveness.

It is much easier to pass another law than to remove a bad law from the statute books.

COMMENCEMENT TIME puts me on a campus somewhere else two or three times every week.

It's wonderfully refreshing to encounter segments of our student population still facing the future with confidence and pride and great expectations.

I FIND MORE than a few who are not sitting around asking themselves "Who am I?" "Are my parents real?" "Is God dead?" "Which dope is not dope?"

And I thought I'd sensed a renaissance of some old-fashioned philosophies and values among today's young sophisticates; now I've seen three surveys which say the same thing: There is "an old-fashioned youth movement."

THE FIGURES for 1969 are now in and added up. An audit of retail grocery store sales includes this at-first-unimpressive item: "Purchases of home-canning jars last year were the greatest in 11 years."

My goodness, with all the prepackaged, fresh-frozen, canned and even precooked foods presently available, who in the world would want to sweat through a session of home-canning any more?

THE KERR GLASS people, who make most of those home-canning jars, had reported increased sales in three of four previous years but nothing to compare to this sudden spectacular increase in 1969.

They set out to find out who's canning and—guess who? Youngsters.

WHILE THE CAMPUS noisemakers have been making news, the same generation has been home-canning and home-canning more than any time in 11 years.

It's not grandma in the kitchen "putting up" vegetables and jams and perfuming the house with piccalilli. Kerr's survey shows only 9.2% have been home-canning for 37 to 40 years. Where 29.1% started within the last four years.

WHY? Surveyors expected the answer would be "to save money" but 80% of the home-canners said they did it for "enjoyment."

That's not all. More young home-makers are taking to growing their own food. Union Fork and Hoe Co. reports sales of garden tools up-trending and the switch is from ornamental gardens to fruit and vegetable gardens.

Further, Ohio State University research reveals increasing interest in sewing. What are these young folks coming to!

HOME ECONOMIC STUDENT enrollment this year includes 5 million in secondary schools, 100,000 at college level, plus 65,000 home EC majors.

4-H membership is at an all-time high, 3.9 million members; a gain of 20% in one year! And only about a third of the 4-H members live on farms; 63.6% live in towns and cities.

THESE ARE NONFARM young people learning do-it-yourself crafts.

The lost generation has been found--of all places--in the kitchen!

Roden Drug scored in every inning. Their big innings were the first with three runs, third with five runs, and the sixth

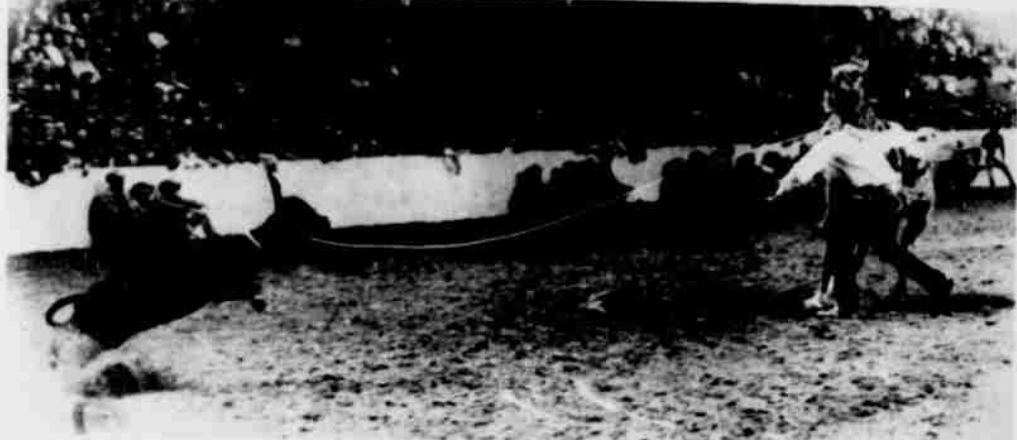
with three more scores.

Bogard has suffered through some embarrassing to him, funny to others, performances. In Sidney, Iowa, Bogard was on a horse that was hard to keep in the box. His brother, Jake, was in the box holding the horse's head waiting for Bogard to give the nod to open the gate. Bogard nodded his head and the calf came out just as the horse reared up.

"The horse hit Jake in the head with his front hoof and cooled him, (knocked him out)," Bogard said, "then fell backward on me. All three of us were sprawled out in the box with the calf going down the arena with the band playing."

Bogard was pick-up man at a Nebraska rodeo and roped an 1,800-pound bull when it was suddenly brought to his attention that he hadn't pulled his saddle tight. The saddle turned with the horse bucking, throwing Bogard for a backward flip, with the bull hooking at him until he managed to climb the fence.

Although Bogard is out of the rodeo professionally now, he still likes roping and riding and goes to his parents' farm at Bula about twice a week. He turns

out about three "green" horses a year, selling them after getting them started in roping.

Bogard's parents are Tom and Dorothy Bogard, and they have lived at Bula almost 30 years. Bogard's brother is deputy sheriff at O'Donnel, and there are three girls in the family. Opal, who played basketball with the Wayland Flying Queens and was an All-American guard, and Tommie and Barbara.

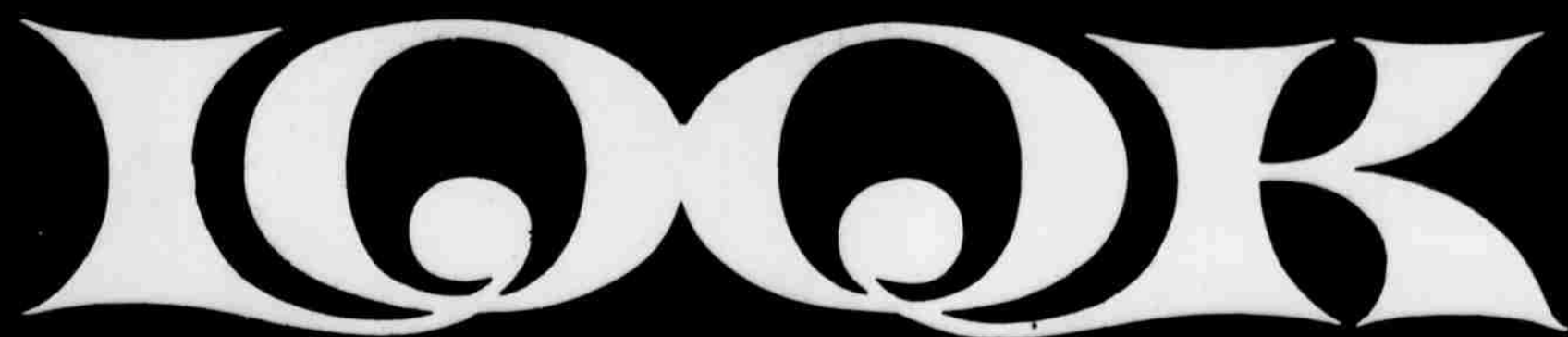
