3 CENT CUT IN COUNTY TAX RATE

Sitting as a board of equalization this week the Commissioners Court raised the valuation of about forty-six property owners, and lowered the renditions of about thirty-two. The court sent out notices to forty-six taxpayers, notifying them to appear before the court and show cause why their renditions should not be increased. Out of this number only three responded. On its own motion the court cut the renditions of thirty-two property owners.

After adjusting renditions and figuring the budget of expenses for the ensuing fiscal year, the court found that it was possible to cut the county tax rate. The 1923 rate, including the thirty-cent road tax, was 59 cents. The 1924 rate has been fixed at 56 cents, a cut of three cents on the hundred dollars valuation. This will result in a small saving to the property owners.

The reduction in the county tax rate was made possible by the retirements of warrants from the sinking fund, warrants which were not due being taken up by agreement with the holders of the securities. Another cause for the reduction is attributed to the good financial condition of the county treasury at this time, there being about \$25,000 in the general county fund.

The Commissioners Court was in session for its regular monthly meeting, and also as a board of equalization. The court completed its work and adjourned Wednesday.

WORLD ADV. MEET COMING TO TEX.

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, July 16.—A series of discussions of specific problems of present day advertising occupied the International Advertising Convention which is in session here, today.

Leaders in the convention expressed the opinion that departmental conferences would form a basis for the immediate opening for advertising on a universal scale, and allow the United States delegates to bring to bear upon the delegates of nations not yet highly developed along advertising lines and the modern advanced conceptions of the industry now prevailing in the United States.

Texas won the 1925 convention which goes to Houston.

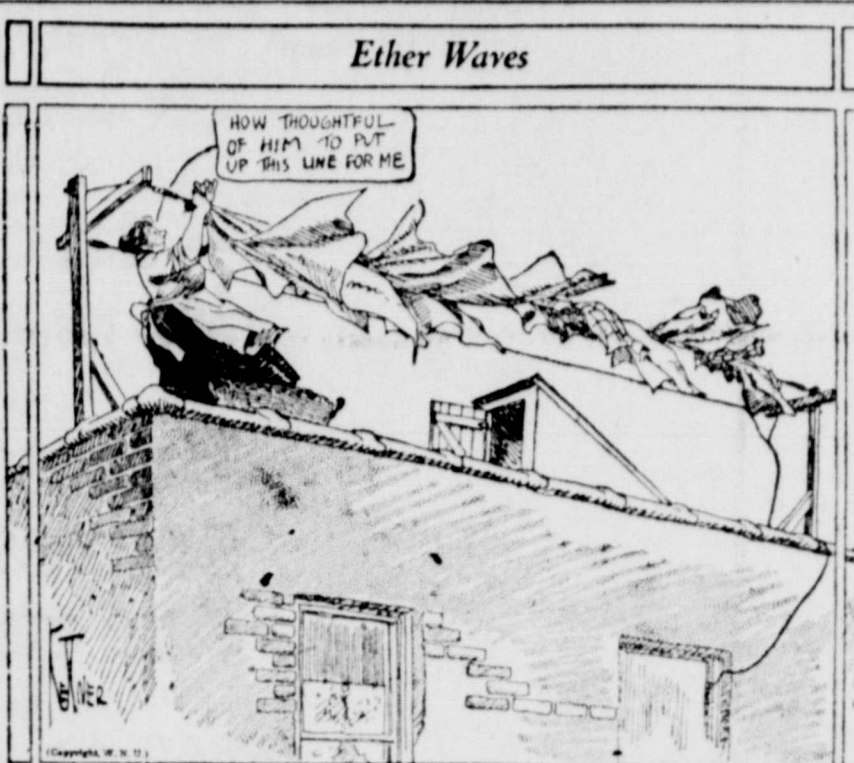
LONDON, July 16.—The system of merchandising co-operation instituted by American newspapers was described to the convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World in session here today by W. E. Donahue, local display advertising manager of the Chicago Tribune. The merchandising service department of the typical American newspaper which, he said, "had taken the blue sky out of advertising in the United States," was the product of years of labor and many hundreds of thousands of dollars.

"The old theory of advertising, that is, advertising without distribution," he said, "was that it forced people to demand a certain product of the retailer until he (the retailer) was forced to demand it of his jobber in such numbers that the jobber eventually secured it from the manufacturer."

"There were two weak links in this chain. In the first place, the advertiser was frequently broke before the circle was complete and money began flowing back to him to compensate for his great advertising outlay. In the second place, by the time the product reached the retailer the consumer had forgotten his original request or had been well satisfied with a substitute."

"The American newspaper merchandising service departments have replaced these weak links with strong ones, making advertising in American newspapers an investment and not a speculation. The newspapers of America do not sell goods for any manufacturer, but they do furnish the manufacturer with advice and knowledge and with definite systematic plans for covering the market that the newspapers circulate in, and show how manufacturers may reduce the cost of distribution by the proper use of newspaper advertising and to show the extraordinary efficiency of newspapers as advertising mediums."

"Within the last five or six years," he continued, "through the merchandising co-operation of American newspapers, more national advertising now runs in newspapers than in magazines and American manufacturers are

nize that they are to reduce the cost of distribution through advertising that their national campaigns must run in newspapers rather than magazines, because the local jobbers and local retailers stand between them and the residents of each locality."

INTEREST RATE CUT ON LOANS TO FARMERS

WASHINGTON, July 16.—The Federal Farm Loan Board today announced a reduction from five and a half per cent to five per cent in the rate of interest charged on direct loans to all co-operative marketing associations. The board members declared that the reduction should aid materially in financing this year's crop movement.

25 CENT CUT IN CRUDE OIL

WICHITA FALLS, July 16.—The Texas Company announced a cut of twenty-five cents per barrel in crude oil today on grades of 36 degrees and above. The new price is \$2.00 per barrel on North and Central Texas crude, guaging thirty-six and above.

ROUND WORLD FLYER MISSING

CROYDON, England, July 16.—American army airmen who are flying around the world, landed here at eight minutes after two o'clock this afternoon, flying from Lembourget, France, a distance of 250 miles, in three hours and three minutes.

TOKIO, July 17.—A. Stuart MacLaren, British aviator, flying around the world, is six hours overdue at Paramashiru Island, where he was to have landed today. A Japanese destroyer has set out in search of the airplane, according to a report from Paramashiru.

IMPOSSIBLE TO SAVE STATE TEN MILLION DOL.

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, July 16.—Campaign promises of candidates for governor to save from five to ten million dollars for this state were described today as being an impossibility, by Dr. H. H. Harrington, member of the State Board of Control, and who is in charge of the \$42,000,000 appropriated by the legislature and represented by the departmental expenditures.

Dr. Harrington said that if all departments created by the legislature were destroyed it would save less than two million dollars, and declared that campaign promises of saving the state \$10,000,000 were impossible of fulfillment.

AMERICA REPRESENTED AT ALLIED CONFERENCE

NEW TAX BOARD NOW OPERATING

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 16.—

The machinery created by the new tax law for the adjustment of tax claims was formally set in motion today with the organization of the Board of Tax Appeals.

Twelve members already named elected Charles D. Hamel, of North Dakota, as chairman, and proceeded to work out rules for procedure in governing the disposition of claims which in the past aggregated as high as \$500,000 a year.

Present plans contemplate a division of the board into committees of three. Each committee today was assigned headquarters in some city in central communities from which the claims come. The taxpayers will thus be spared the necessity of going to Washington to handle their claims.

CAMPERS GO TO BUFFALO GAP

GETTING READY FOR BUSY SEASON

The Runnels County Gin Company, which owns gins in a number of communities in the county, including Ballinger, Winters, Hatchel, Rowena and Miles, is getting ready for the ginning season, and in order to be in good shape several thousand dollars worth of new machinery will be installed.

Included in the new equipment, which will arrive in a few days, will be four new stands and other machinery for the Ballinger gin. The old stands are being removed and will be replaced with new and more modern stands, the cost for this change alone and improvements in the Ballinger gin amounting to about \$3,000.

The company will overhaul its gins and add new equipment where needed, replacing the weak parts with new parts, and making ready for what promises to be a big run this fall. Reasonable rain within a few days will practically insure a big ginning season here.

The independent gingers of the county are also overhauling their plants and making plans for installing new machinery, but The Ledger man has not gotten a line-up on the extent of the improvements yet, but will make an effort to get a report from all gins in the county within the near future.

LONDON, July 16.—American co-operation for putting the Dawes plan into effect and to set Germany on her feet and to stabilize the European economic situation, was emphasized at the opening here today of the inter-allied reparations conference.

British Prime Minister MacDonald and French Premier Herriot are the leading figures in the conference. Two American representatives, Frank B. Kellogg, ambassador to Great Britain, and Colonel James A. Logan Jr., observer with the reparations commission, sat at the conference table.

MacDonald, in his opening remarks, made special reference to the presence of the two Americans, who although not full delegates in the conference, indicated by their presence the good will of the United States, and its co-operation in an effort to give effectiveness to the Dawes plan.

Mr. Kellogg replied for the United States delegates that the American government and the people believed that in making the Dawes plan effective it would be the first notable step toward European stabilization.

After MacDonald had been chosen chairman of the conference, committees were appointed to work out agenda, and the conference adjourned until tomorrow.

SIMMONS NEW DOMITORY READY

Special to The Ledger:

ABILENE, July 16.—The new dormitory for men at Simmons College, being erected at a cost of \$150,000, will be ready for occupancy by the opening of the winter or spring term of the next session, President J. D. Sandefer stated today. The framework of the building has now reached the third floor and the contractor is rushing construction work as hurriedly as possible in an effort to have it completed for part of the next session.

The new building will replace Cowden Hall, destroyed by fire two years ago. Construction work has been under way for the past ten months, though it was halted during the past winter for several weeks.

The dormitory will be of the latest architectural design. It will be three stories high. No main hallways will be placed in the building, the various groups of suites of rooms on each floor being served by individual stairways with exterior exits.

A sum of \$50,000 was donated to the fund for the building last month by a friend of the college whose name is withheld from the public at his own request.

MUCH DANGER "T. B." AMONG NEGROES

The negro comprises one-seventh of the population of Texas, and a tuberculosis survey made by the Texas Public Health Association shows health conditions among the negro population to be bad and dangerous to the white race.

In the towns and counties where the tuberculosis surveys have been made, it has been discovered that there are a large number of negroes suffering from consumption.

The facilities for caring for the negro t. b. victims are such that the disease spreads among the colored population, and is carried into the homes of the white people by servants. Sanitary conditions as a rule among the negroes are poor, and little precaution is used to control the disease.

Negroes are employed as maids, nurses, cooks, laundresses and other positions. This makes it important that the white people support the campaign carried on to stamp out the white plague. In employing negroes as servants it is very important that only negroes free from t. b. be employed in the home.

He is a lifelong Democrat. He was born in McLennan county, his grandfather being General Jerome P. Robertson, commander in Hood's Brigade of the Confederate army. His father is Gen. Felix H. Robertson, who was a Brigadier General in Joe Wheeler's corps in the Confederate army. During the world war Judge Robertson was a major in the 132nd field artillery of the Thirty-Sixth Division.

Judge Robertson has been a lifelong prohibitionist, having been active in his fight against the liquor interests for more than twenty years, and an advocate of woman suffrage.

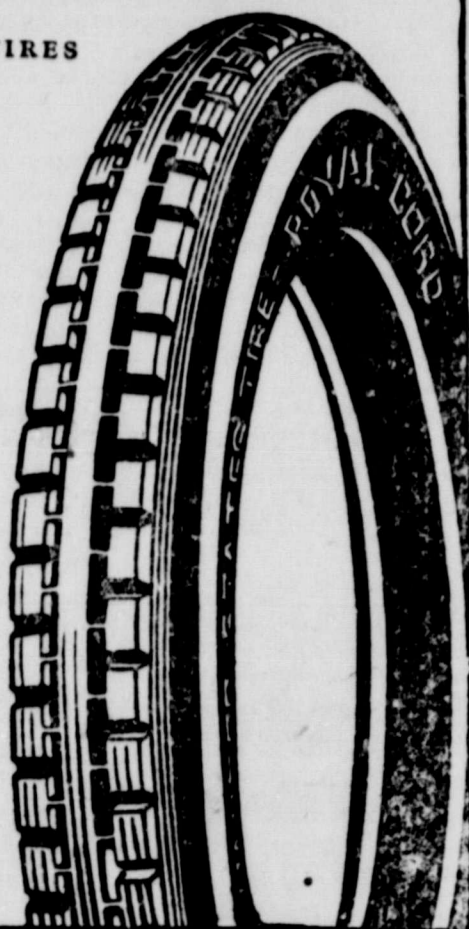

BAPTIST REVIVAL BEGINS SUNDAY

The revival meeting which has been announced to begin at the Baptist Church, will have the opening service next Sunday morning, July 20th.

The evangelists who have been engaged to lead the services are Rev. John G. Winsett, who will do the preaching, and Mr. T. D. Carroll, who will lead the music. Evangelist Winsett makes his headquarters at Abilene, and has had great success in meetings in Texas and the other Southern states. The nearby towns where successful revivals have been held and which speak in highest praise of the evangelist's work, are Abilene, Midland, Big Spring, Anson, Weatherford and others.

Mr. Carroll is said to be an accomplished leader of revival music, having been trained in the music department of the Baptist Seminary at Fort Worth as well as elsewhere.

The services will be held in the auditorium of the Baptist church. Several electric fans have been installed in the church which will add to the already comfortable features of this auditorium. There will be two services each day.

The visiting evangelists may not be on hand for the first service, being in the closing services of a revival at another place, but will arrive in Ballinger without delay. In that case the pastor will preach till their arrival.

An invitation is extended to all the Christian people to assist in the meeting in every possible way. Mr. Carroll will doubtless wish to organize a large singing force, and all the singing folks

are urged to help.

This will be the first revival meeting held in the new Baptist church, and the auditorium is so arranged as to accommodate great gatherings from both town and country.

FIRST OIL FROM PANHANDLE ON MARKET

(By Associated Press) AMARILLO, July 16.—Ten thousand barrels of Panhandle oil are now in storage at the Reese S. Allen refinery here, and will be refined as soon as minor repairs are completed. Thereafter it is planned to operate the plant at capacity of 2,500 barrels a day.

This is the first Panhandle oil to reach a market. There are about 140,000 barrels in storage in the field and this is being moved to Panhandle City by the Plains Pipe Line Company at the rate of 3,000 barrels daily. The Pan-Tex Pipe Line Company's six-inch line, connecting Amarillo directly with the field, will be in operation within two weeks.

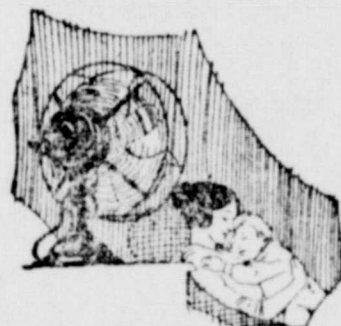
