**Sells Pencil Sharpeners**

**Oklahoma Man Without Legs Sells Pencil Sharpeners to Support Large Family**

Here is J. A. Thompson of Cherokee, Oklahoma the man who is a victim of Ramsay's disease, a living death, while engaged in making a living for his little family of four, a wife and three small boys. Thompson was first stricken with the disease several years ago.

This dread malady attacks and paralyzes the blood vessels; the only known constant is removal of the

attached member of the body. In succession Thompson has been compelled to have all except one of his limbs removed, his left arm is all that remains, and from his left hand one finger has been removed. The remaining hand is sore constantly and is unusable. It is only a question of time until the left arm will be removed, then the disease will attack the body and death will follow.

To make a living for his little family Thompson has hit upon the idea of selling pencil sharpeners, although Mrs. Thompson tried to make the little family a living by washing, sewing and what other work she could do, this was insufficient to feed and cloth them all. The pencil sharpener was taken up to assist the meager income made by Mrs. Thompson.

The sharpeners sell for 50c each and are a bargain when the fact is taken into consideration that the money goes for an entire worthy cause. **Heart to Heart Talk**  
By John Joseph Haines M.D.

There are sermons all around us, just waiting to be seen; and, they are so impressive—far more so to me than those framed artfully for itching ears.

I have seen the young mother putting her first babe to the breast for the very first time. No word to mar the sacred stillness. Maybe just the faintest whisper of angelic wings that I am sure fluttered near. Here was the cherub at the fountain—the dawn of creation—a picture worth the brush of a Murillo—of a Millet. And the sermon—a volume of eloquence—the sacred—the sublime!

I watched the woodmen, hacking at the base of a mighty oak. Cheerily they sang, as chips leaped from their pygmy blows. Silently the forest giant stood, unconscious of the deepening sound, now perilously near his heart. . . . At last the crack of immediate doom—a swaying body—a thunderous crash to earth. The proud crest, form its heavenly altitude, now bent with soulless dust. A tower of liberty and freedom now supine—helpless—at the feet of its despoilers! Never to rise again, as truth crushed to earth may.

Man, militant proponent of liberty and freedom, chief executioner of both! Left to his own devices, man becomes a destroyer of all about him, transforming the natural into the artificial, the sublime to the ridiculous. Left to his own devices, mind you; last of all, he frames his own shackles, binds himself to eternal servitude. What a sermon for the seeking eye!

Not all sermons are pleasing, especially those we see; but they are sermons, nevertheless, and, bristling

with true testimony. To heed each faithful sermon is wise, whether seen or heard, it is our duty to see and hear.

Pasture for the farm horse saves feed and labor, and the green grass acts as a general tonic and laxative. For horses at work, however, a light supplementary grain ration high in protein and non-laxative in nature is advisable. When horses that are accustomed to a heavy grain ration are turned on pasture for a long idle period, they should be given a small amount of grain for a few days; otherwise they may gorge themselves on the green roughage.

If horses on pasture are laid off from field work for a few days at a time, the grain ration should be reduced to about half the usual amount. Irregularity in feeding with sudden changes to green feed, is apt to result in digestive troubles, and turning horses on pasture regularly at night keeps their digestive systems accustomed to the succulent green feed. Horses put on pasture at night should receive only a small quantity of hay with the evening grain ration before being turned out.

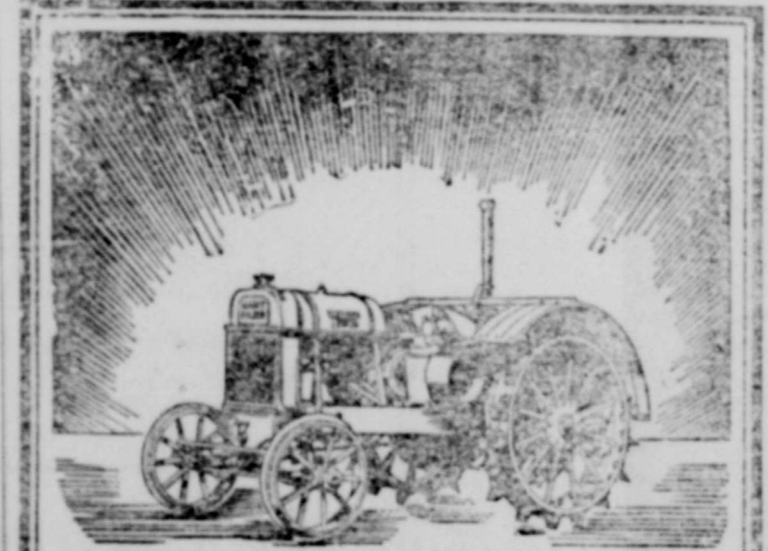

**Beware of Tipster Sheets**

In a recent issue of Harper's Magazine, Paul Tomkinson warns prospective investors against tipster sheets. These sheets are circulated as an advisory service under a camouflage of unbiased opinion. They suggest purchase of "sure-shot" stocks. They are not to be confused with investment information sent out by responsible bankers and brokers.

The National Better Business Bureau estimates that tipster sheet circulation is nearly fifteen million. They do not deal with the type of stocks listed on the big exchanges but promote issues which are not known in high class investment circles.

The cure for this evil is knowledge on the part of the investing public. Get-rich-quick schemes defraud thousands of people of millions of dollars a year.

Legitimate brokers and bankers will give anyone scientific market advice. The large exchanges, by investigating stock issues before listing them, and auditing their member brokerage houses, do everything in their power to protect the investor. And the public should turn a cold shoulder to tipster sheets and all the other blandishments of the "sure thing" promoter.

The spotted garden slug makes trouble for the gardener by feeding on plants at night and then hides in the daytime, making it very difficult to destroy the pest. Garden slugs whose work can be detected by the trail of slime they leave behind, thrive in dark, damp places, such as under old decaying lumber and refuse, and places such as those in the garden or field should be cleaned up and sprinkled with lime.

Where practicable, lime should be applied directly to the soil and plants on which the slugs are feeding. Many people think the garden slug is an insect, but it is really a mollusk and related to the snail.

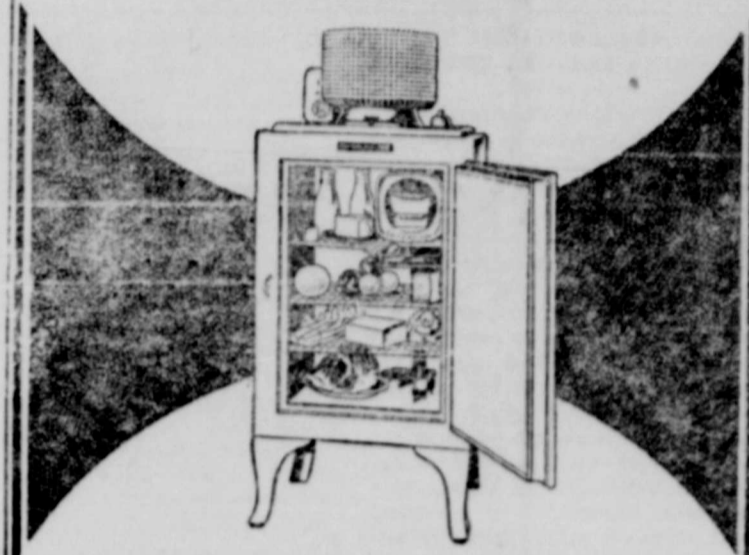

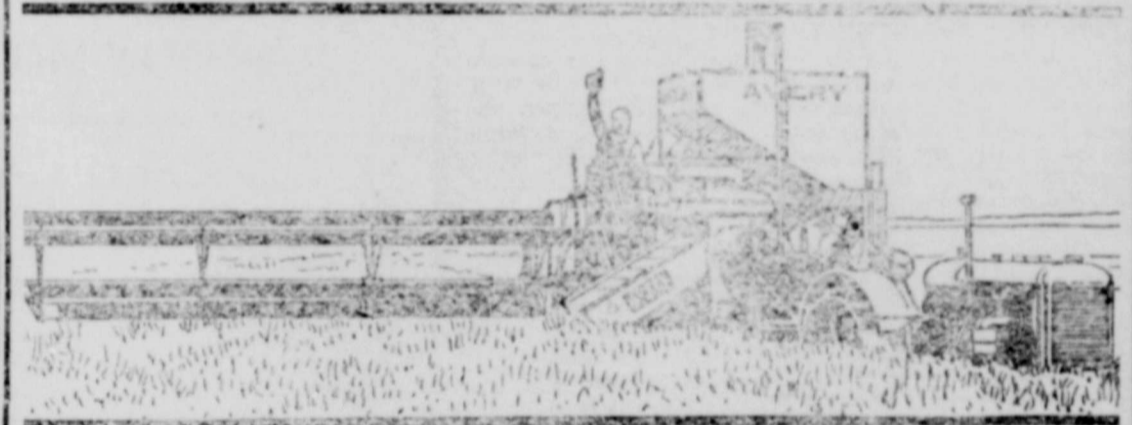

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**Feed Chicks Protein**

Poultry Specialists Say That Baby Chicks Should Have Daily Portion Protein

"Had your thimbleful of protein today," will become the popular interrogation in the poultry yard between baby chicks following the recent announcement by the poultry Department of Purina Mills that a thimbleful of feed, high in protein, should constitute the chick's daily menu.

This new contribution to poultry unexpectedly and more or less accidentally, specialists in the department declare. "For generations," they say, "corn and oats has been the accepted standard ration for baby chicks. Corn and oats of course are high in carbohydrates and low in protein."

These specialists began wondering about this corn and oats ration. They knew that the chicken before it was domesticated, fed while young on worms and bugs—protein. "What's wrong with nature's way of handling baby chicks? Possibly nature had some reason for this method that man has overlooked," they asked themselves.

A little study on the part of these scientific research men brought out the well known fact that calves receive colostrum, the cow's first milk, which is high in protein. The baby chick's first food, injected yolk, is 35% protein. The baby chick doubles its initial weight in about twelve days consuming only about two and one half times its initial weight of feed. Since the baby chick consumes so little feed during those twelve days—a thimbleful each day it is only reasonable to assume that much of this must be protein because the chick is at this time making heavy growth. All that it consumes is going to make bone, muscle, blood and feathers.

Deiving still farther into this realm of nutrition—highly interesting study that it proved to be—they found that protein in the ration is a growth factor. Leave out protein and growth at once is halted. Add protein and growth is accelerated. A study of different animals revealed the fact that the rate of growth in animals is more rapid where the mother's milk is high in protein. These specialists found that the rabbit's milk contains 15.5% protein. It requires only six days for the young rabbits to double its weight. The sow's milk is 6% protein. It requires the young pig fourteen days to double its initial weight. The same facts were brought out in the study of the dog, sheep, goat, horse and man. The same was found to apply to the baby chick—a need of a high percent of protein in the ration from the very first.

These findings on the part of these research men of course exploded the theory that baby chicks should not be fed a protein ration due to the possibility of what some term "protein poisoning." These laboratory studies showed that the baby chick is more apt to suffer from pro-

tein starvation rather than from protein poisoning.

These research studies refutedly established two facts. First that a very limited amount of feed daily—one-fourth of an ounce or about one thimbleful. Second, that the baby chick's feed should be high in animal protein on the very order of feed that nature furnished all young birds in the days before civilization entered an era of domesticating birds for his use. In milk products, meat scraps, wheat germ, alfalfa leaf meal and other ingredients these scientists discovered by experiment the feed exactly needed for the baby chicks.

Highly interesting is the fact that with this recent discovery of a better way to feed baby chicks that state experiment stations are verifying truths. At Nebraska seven rations were fed baby chicks. The one containing 20% protein gave the best results. The California station also in its experiments verifies the fact that a baby chick should be fed protein ration and one that is easily digestible. Even the most critical feel that this new discovery in baby chick feeding may be as far reaching and as important as the discovery some seven years ago of the keeping qualities of vitamin D in cod-liver oil when mixed with commercial feeds.

The old idea that a baby chick should be fed a ration of corn and oats is now a bit of theory fit for the ash can. What is true is simply this, that the baby chick with its small capacity for food and its need for protein feed can use only one-fourth of an ounce of feed, one thimbleful per day. It should be high in protein. The popular baby chick refrain now will be, "Had your thimbleful of Protein today?"

**RECIPES FOR FOODS THAT ARE DIFFERENT**

Every housewife has a number of recipes for dishes that are favorites with her family. Sometime these recipes are decidedly different. They are, nevertheless, delicious. Farm women of Oklahoma, Texas and Arkansas often exchange such recipes through the Oklahoma Farmer-Stockman. Here are three that are taken from the April 15 issue:

**Baked Chicken With Rice**—Cut up a young but full-grown chicken and put in a gallon crock or an enamel pan. Cover well with hot water and bake one hour. Then add 3-4 cupful of rice which has been soaking in cold water while the chicken is baking. Add salt and pepper to taste and cook another hour, covered. Be sure there is plenty of water so that rice does not get dry. Ten minutes before serving add 1 cupful of thin cream and leave uncovered to cook these 10 minutes.

**Peanut Butter Chops**—Cut as many slices of bread as you wish chops, remove the crusts and spread on both sides with peanut butter. Rye bread is best but any kind may be used. Beat 2 eggs, add 1-2 teaspoonful salt, 1-4 teaspoonful paprika and 3-4 cupful of milk. Have ready some cracker crumbs and a well-greased baking pan. Dip the bread into the milk and egg mixture, then in the cracker crumbs, lay in the pan and bake in a hot oven until a golden brown.

**Stuffed Bacon Slices**—Make a moist bread dressing, seasoning with pepper, but using very little salt. Either sage or onion may be used to season the dressing. Slice bacon and place a heaping teaspoonful of the dressing on each slice. Roll and fasten with a toothpick. Place the stuffed pieces in a baking pan in a very hot oven, or fry on top of the stove, turning often so the bacon will cook evenly on all sides.

**THE NEW PAPER MONEY**

The new paper money which the government will distribute about July 1, will look surprisingly small. Bills only six and 5-16 inches long, and two and 11-16 inches wide, will not seem as if they could do much work at the grocery store.

Before the war old Dollar Bill looked quite respectable, as you conferred him to the tradesman. But now, does he do a decent day's work when you send him after your food and clothing? He does not, and he can not complain if he is required to occupy less space in your limited purse.

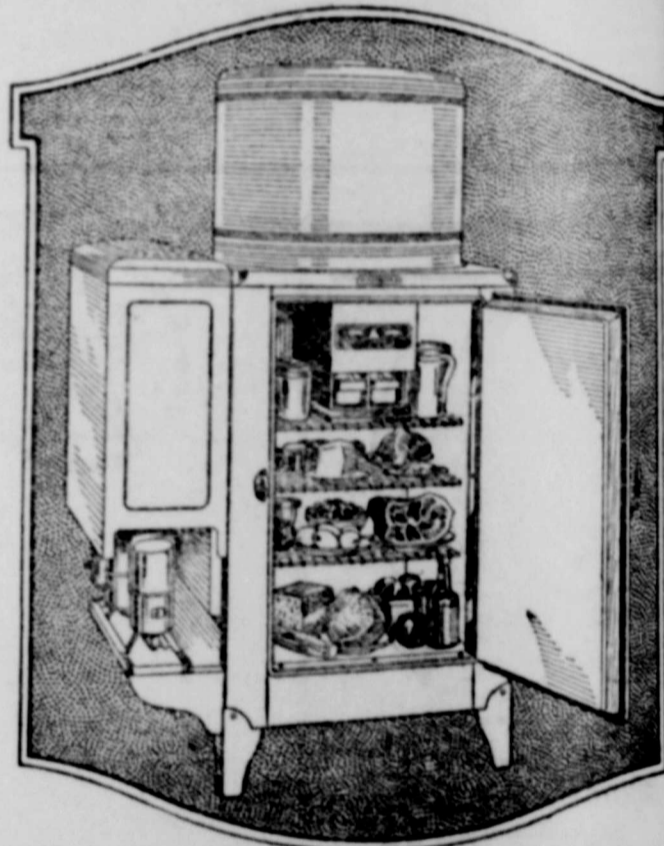

## Sunday School Lesson

God. There was all too much expression of general opinion and no one thought the matter through as it might apply to him personally.

They treated Jeremiah as a renegade because he said Jerusalem would be overthrown if sinners persisted in doing evil. He is a patriot indeed who is bold enough to speak against his nation when they are riding to a fall because of wrong doing. Later monuments are erected bearing the names of just such patriots.

When a formal trial came at the gate, the usual place of justice, Jeremiah saw that it was a fine opportunity to again tell them of their sin. He did not trim his message to please the jury but said "Amend your ways and your doings, and obey the voice of Jehovah." He dismissed his own life as by a wave of the hand. They could do to him "as is good and right in your own eyes." Then their better judgement helped their guilty consciences to pronounce against themselves and to declare the prophet "Not guilty." It still remained for the remnant of the great Jewish nation to reform their conduct and bring it in accord with their recent vote. It is the same today. Deeds count, rather than good sounding words.

### POTATO BEETLES EASILY CONTROLLED

Potato damage by the striped Colorado potato beetle or by the orange colored slug-like larvae is very common at this time of year in Texas. Herever potatoes have pushed above the ground and started any considerable growth. Control may be had, Extension Service authorities say by dusting or spraying with lead arsenate. The dry dust may be shaken on the foliage in the morning when dew is on the plants, using a can with small holes punched through the lid after the manner of a pepper shaker. Two pounds of this dust mixed with fifty gallons of water will make a good spray which should be kept agitated while application is being made.

Vary the acid in your French dressing occasionally, and also the seasonings. Orange, lemon or grape fruit juice may be used in place of plain vinegar, or tarragon or spiced vinegar from pickles. Crumbled Roquefort cheese, minced green pepper or pimento, chopped stuffed olives, chopped mixed pickle, celery seed, horseradish, or onion juice are other flavors which may be added according to taste, either separately or in any preferred combinations.

Asparagus should be cooked the shortest possible time to preserve its fine flavor and valuable food constituents. It may be cooked whole or cut up in inch pieces. Young tender asparagus, cut up, will cook in from ten to fifteen minutes.

Sour milk and soda may be substituted for sweet milk and baking powder in making biscuits, cake, or cookies and vice versa. When proportions are given in terms of sweet milk and baking powder, an equal quantity of sour milk be substituted and enough soda used approximately to neutralize the acid, or a scant half teaspoonful for each cup of sour milk. In the case of thin batters the soda and sour milk usually furnish enough leavening, but for thick batters or dough, baking powder is usually needed in addition. For example, if biscuits call for one cup of sweet milk and two teaspoons of baking powder, one cup of sour milk may be used, a scant half teaspoon of soda and two teaspoons of baking powder. When sweet milk is used in place of sour, baking powder is substituted for all of the soda in the proportion of four teaspoons of baking powder for one teaspoon of soda if no other acid ingredient such as molasses is used. If such an ingredient is used, some soda is required.

One of the best temporary pasture crops for sheep where the soil is thin is the soy bean. This crop has the desirable ability to make new growth after being grazed and can be pastured from July until the first frost.

Medical remedies have thus far proved of no value in curing infectious abortion of cattle, and cattle raisers must rely on excluding the disease from healthy herds and suppressing it in herds already infected, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The disease can be detected in animals by two different blood tests. Farmers' Bulletin 1336-F, procurable from the Department of Agriculture, contains practical information on this problem.

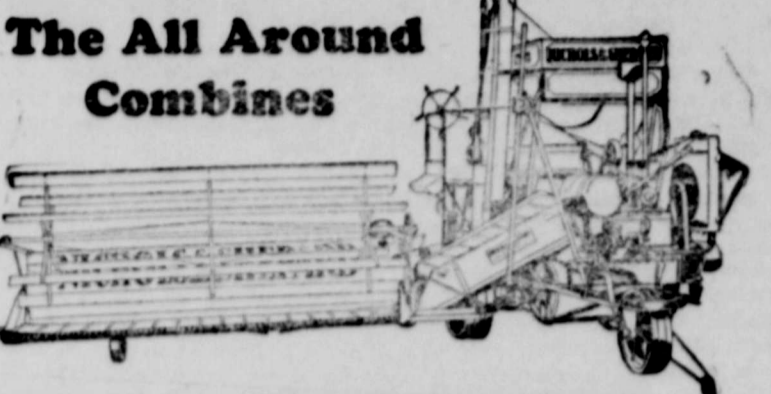

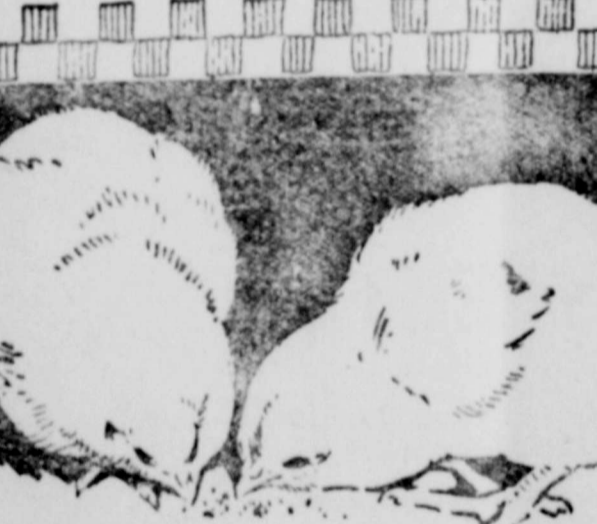

### New Marriage Law

Goes Into Effect June 13; Notice Must Be Given Of Intention To Marry

The new marriage license law passed by the last legislature and approved by Gov. Dan Moody on February 23, goes into effect on June 13. It was to become a law ninety days after the close of the legislature which adjourned on March 14. A copy of the new law regarding the issuing of marriage licenses passed by the Texas legislature reads as follows:

Article 4603-A. For the purpose of ascertaining all facts required under the statutes, the county clerk at the time of license is applied for, shall examine in the applicant or applicants for the license under oath as to age and residence, which shall be reduced to writing by the county clerk, and subscribed to by the applicant or applicants. In case either party is absent when the application is made an affidavit shall be made by a person other than the contracting party as to the age and residence of the absent party. Said affidavit to be filed in the county clerk's office.

Article 4604-B. Application for license shall be made at least three days and not more than thirty days before the license shall be issued. Immediately upon receipt of an application for license the county clerk shall record in a book kept for that purpose and marked "Notice of Intention to Marry," and after expiration of the three and not more than thirty days after the signing of the notice of intention to marry, the county clerk may issue said license.

Article 4604-C. Before the county clerk shall issue a marriage license the man shall produce a certificate from a reputable physician to show that he is free from venereal disease.
