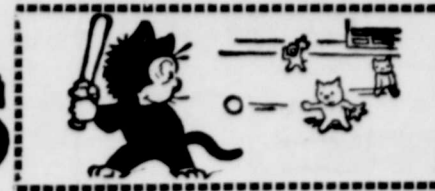

Careful storage and disposal are equally important, especially to ensure the safety of children and animals around chemicals, the two groups report.

Southwestern Bell's War On Nuisance Calls Brings Results

Southwestern Bell's all-out war on nuisance and obscene telephone callers has brought conclusive results and relief to customers since it was begun a year ago this month.

During this period, some 200 offenders have been apprehended. Of this, 59 were arrested—resulting in 36 convictions—and over 125 were warned that any future recurrence would result in the termination of their telephone service.

Compared to a similar period the previous year, the last 12 months saw arrests and direct identification of nuisance callers rise over 100 per cent, not only in Texas and Southwestern Bell, but the entire Bell System.

"Protecting the public against such calls is an important assignment for us," says Southwestern Bell Telephone Manager, C. A. Dueschle, "and we have tried to devote as much time as necessary to handling each individual annoyance call case."

Utilizing new devices, it is a much simpler matter to determine the source of harassment calls than it once was. One method involves the use of a register which is placed on the subject's line, automatically identifying every number dialed and the time.

Other, more complicated trapping devices are used when indicated in cases referred to Southwestern Bell's security department.

"No longer are annoyance telephone callers safe from detection," Dueschle added. As an example, he cited a case that was closed in Midland only a few weeks ago.

Calling from a pay telephone, an annoyance caller was caught in the act by Midland police only moments after he had completed his call to a frightened woman. With its tracking devices, Southwestern Bell was able to detect the location of the call and notify police, who quickly dispatched a nearby on-duty officer to the pay telephone.

Six hours later the man had been convicted, and had begun serving a 30-day jail sentence.

"Arrests and convictions of annoyance callers can be expected to continue," Dueschle said, "as long as customers are angered enough to prosecute. Offenders will come to know more and more that they can and will be exposed."

Our customers may be assured that we will do all in our power to stop the source of irritation," Mr. Dueschle said.

Tom P. Nicklas Attending SMU Banking School

Tom P. Nicklas will enroll in the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking for a two week session on July 16, 1967. The school, located on the campus of Southern Methodist University, is co-sponsored by the Arkansas, New Mexico, and Texas Bankers Associations, the Dallas, Ft. Worth, and Houston Clearing Houses, and Southern Methodist University. The director of the school is Dr. Richard B. Johnson, Chairman of the Department of Economics at S.M.U. Dean for Bankers is Dr. Robert W. Kneebone, Consulting Vice President, Texas National Bank of Commerce, Houston, Texas. The faculty is composed of distinguished bankers, lawyers, economists, and educators from all over the United States.

Swigbie, as the school is known, offers courses to executive personnel from both large and small banks. The curriculum includes study in bank management, credit administration, and trusts. Study emphasizes basic policy and management problems and the development of a deeper understanding of the economy within which the banking system operates.

This year the 530 banks enrolled constitute the largest attendance in the school's history. The bankers will be housed in three air-conditioned dormitories by classes. Activities will begin at 8:00 in the morning and continue until 9:00 in the evening. All campus facilities, including extensive libraries, recreational and cultural centers, are available to the students during the school.

Swigbie is a pioneer in the use of the "case method" in banking education. Its purpose is to create a practical decision-making situation in which the entire group participates. They examine the case, evaluate it by discussion, and reach conclusions based on their findings. This process is aided and guided by trainer counsel.

To qualify for graduation a banker must attend three summer sessions. In addition to classroom work between the first and second sessions eight extension problems are completed. These problems are developed by committees of bank officers and deal with problems of credit, trust administration, personnel, investment planning, bank organization, and asset management. After completion of the second summer session, the seniors are required to prepare a thesis over which they are examined during their last session.

Highlights of the two weeks on campus include evening lectures, workshops, and special discussion sessions concerning development in banking and finance. Other events of the session are an Evening at The Fine Arts Center and a musical evening presented by the bankers. The school closes Friday evening, July 28th, with a senior banquet, graduation ceremonies, and awards.

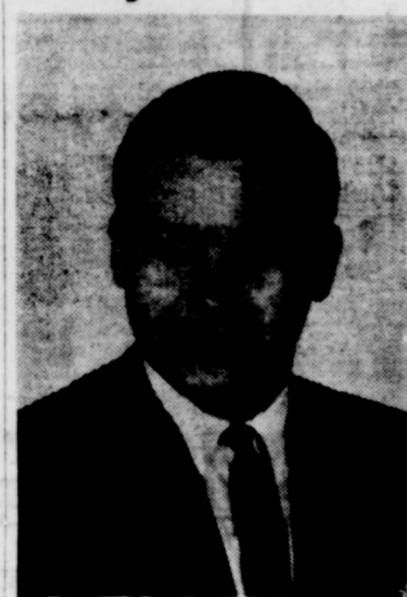
The girls decided to help at the Center by being with the children of Day Care when they read books and play; to help in any way they can.

Farmers Are Urged To Add Roll-Over Bars To Tractors

AUSTIN, Tex.—The Texas Safety Association and the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council join in urging farmers to add protective frames or crush-resistant cabs to guard tractor operators in roll-over accidents.

JULY 23-29 NAMED 'FARM SAFETY WEEK' IN COUNTY

County Judge Calvin Ashley has officially proclaimed July 23-29, 1967 as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Wichita County, according to J. W. Tole, president of the county Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

The county farm leader said that the accidental death rate for farm residents has increased since 1961. "If this trend is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must have a renewed effort," Tole continues. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today. He also said that farm and ranch families can reduce these costly farm accidents by using some of the tools of safety, such as seat belts, fire extinguishers, and SMV emblems.

In his official proclamation, County Judge Ashley said: "All the citizens of Wichita County are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities."

"Farm and ranch accidents reap a grim harvest of approximately 150 fatalities and thousands more suffer painful disabling injuries each year in Texas, plus the great economic loss, causes profound physical and psychological damage suffered by members of farm families that are involved."

"During this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, 4-H Clubs, the Texas Safety Association, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Wichita County Farm Bureau, with the theme "Think and Act Safely."

County Farm Bureau President Tole said that a different phase of safety would be emphasized each day during the week: Sunday - reverence for life; Monday - safety begins at home; Tuesday - agricultural chemicals; Wednesday - prevent falls; Thursday - rural highway safety; Friday - farm machinery; Saturday - recreation safety.

Cadet Bynum is a member of the AFOTC unit at Texas Technological College. He is a 1964 graduate of Burk Burnett High School.

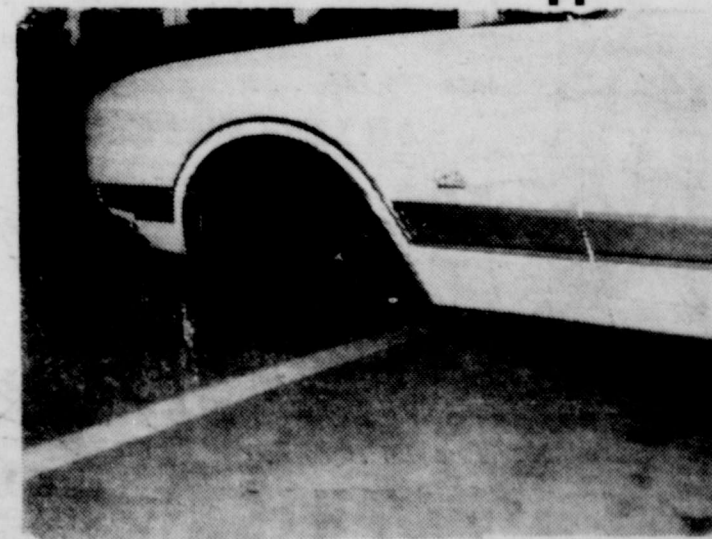
Post Safety Tips Around Farm Ponds

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TO MUCH CHALLENGE MAYBE

A group of annual reports of leading U. S. oil companies is as interesting in worldwide areas covered and photography as a National Geographic magazine.

It has been widely publicized that many college graduates see no challenge in working in private industry—that they prefer some branch of government. This is a strange outlook if they learned anything at all of history, economics or U. S. industry and its worldwide ramifications. A young man would be dull indeed, for example, if he saw no challenge in the activities of the oil industry with wide ranging interests stretching from his hometown to the bottom of the sea, the burning desert, the jungles of South America and wilds of Alaska. Maybe the challenges are too great for some current college graduates.

Oilmen have been pioneers from the day of the first oil well one hundred years ago. From that day on, they have had to take chances. They have accepted constant challenges from nature, industry and government. They have built towns and schools in desolate lands, railroads, harbors, roads, pipelines, docks, the largest ships afloat and a thousand other things to make available the myriad number of petroleum products that we have come to take for granted. The gasoline and oil for the sports car of a college boy who may think industry offers no challenge may literally have come from the ends of the earth. He should think twice before telling an oilman that his industry offers no challenge, or he might have more challenges tossed at him than he ever heard of.

Industry offers plenty of challenges and unlimited opportunity to the young man with ambition who is looking for a chance to build security for himself through initiative and enterprise. It offers, too, the chance to contribute things of lasting value to the progress and advancement of people the world over.

NOTED AND PASSED

Replacement: When President Johnson and Premier Kossygin departed Glassboro, New Jersey, at dusk on Sunday, June 25, 380 high school girls moved in. Some were in the dormitories by 9 p.m. Glassboro was hosting a cheer-leading clinic.

Roger W. Babson Weekly ReportBabson's Point of View on:
COMING TAX BATTLE

Will Uncle Sam be taking a bigger tax bite out of your paycheck before the end of 1967? By January 1968? In his State of the Union Message last January, President Johnson recommended a tax surcharge of 6%. Since then, neither LBJ nor the Congress has shown any insistence on upping the federal tax take. But the truce is about over. The tax-hike battle will soon be joined amid sounds of rising fury.

YEAR OF GREAT DEFICIT

Our government's New Year has just begun. It will end June 30, 1968. Economists, legislators, accountants, financiers — and just plain citizens who have been watching the U.S. spending spree shift into high gear — are shocked by the prospect of a federal deficit that may hit the \$30-million mark for this fiscal year.

Despite this towering evidence of budget mismanagement, our Administration and our Congress continue to amble along a path of business-as-usual. Here and there you hear of the upcoming deficit as the "greatest in peacetime." Unfortunately, the nation is engaged in one of the biggest, though undeclared, wars in our history.

HIGHWAY TO INFLATION

Remember the days of President Franklin Roosevelt? He took office at the depth of our most severe depression. His "brain trust" (that was before the time of the Council of Economic Advisers) recommended that he spend a great deal more than would be taken in through taxes. This was called "priming the pump." The idea was that the additional dollars spent by Uncle Sam would find their way into consumers' pockets, and hence "prime" the business "pump." Hopefully, prosperity would be restored.

Both President Roosevelt and his advisers were sorely disappointed. Business and employment did pick up slowly for some years; but there followed the severe depression of 1937-1938. Unemployment climbed back to a staggering 9 million. It did not subside substantially until World War II vastly stimulated demands both abroad and at home. Despite controls, higher taxes, and price ceilings, wartime deficits created huge additions to U.S. money supplies. At the end of hostilities, our tremendous monetary expansion provided a broad highway to inflation. Wages and prices truly exploded.

REPEAT PERFORMANCE

Right now it looks as if we are going to have a repeat performance. The Federal Reserve is upping the money supplies of the nation at an 8% yearly clip. This at a moment when the government is heading toward a \$30-billion deficit. The combination of an easy-money policy and a huge "pump priming" makes a renewed surge in prices almost a certainty.

That is what all the "hollering" will be about in the weeks just ahead. The "kickoff" was done last week in June by Mr. Mart, head of the Federal Reserve Board, calling loudly for an income tax increase. Then Mr. Ackley, top man in the President's Economic Council got into the bigger-tax lineup.

HEAVY OPPOSITION TO BIGGER TAXES

Despite the formidable support and prestigious names plumping for increased income taxes, there is no guarantee yet that Congress will vote them at least not soon. Many legislators are not convinced that rising money supplies will produce an automatic pickup in total business. They do not agree with the Council of Economic Advisers that the coming fourth quarter will bring a sizable upswing in sales and profits.

More important, the opposition points to the Council's earlier belief that a business recovery would be under way by early July. Congressmen and Senators ask themselves: "What if business does not surge ahead in the fourth quarter? If

a new boom fails to "catch on," we may be blamed later for having killed the goose that lays the golden business eggs." That is why we predict that an early tax boost will be hard to come by. The bigger-tax advocates may win in the end; but the battle will be drawn out. And the actual levy may not be effective before the turn of the year.

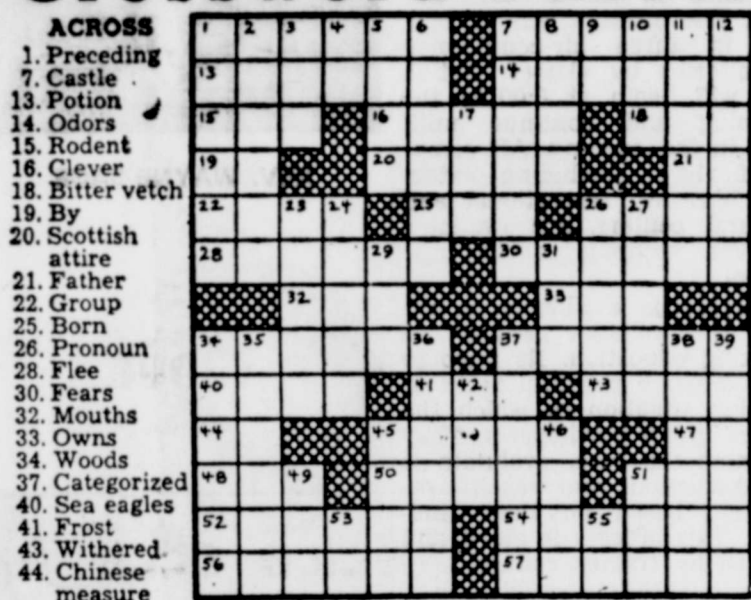
Fire Damage Greater On Rural Property

AUSTIN, Tex.—When fire occurs on rural property, damage is three to six times greater than in the average city fire, the Texas Safety Association and the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council report. Two-fifths of all damage is to dwellings and their contents, another third to barns and their contents. The remainder of losses is to outbuildings, machinery and equipment, livestock and produce. The economic loss of the nation's rural residents from fire is approximately \$195 million a year.

Tractor Upsets On Level Ground Occur Frequently

AUSTIN, Tex.—The Texas Safety Association and the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council report that tractor upsets on level ground occur much more frequently than many farmers realize. Speed "too fast for conditions" is the chief factor in most cases. Tractors have been known to tip on level ground at only eight miles per hour — just half the top speed of most tractors in use today. High hitching and hidden obstacles also rank high on the list of tractor upset causes.

Policyholder Questions Answered by
the Institute of Life Insurance 277
Park Ave., N.Y., N.Y., 10017

Q. I dropped a life insurance policy some time ago when I was under severe financial pressure. My solvency has returned and I'd like to put the old policy back in force. Can I do this or do I have to buy a new policy?

A. If you are in good health and can qualify the same as for a new policy, you can reinstate your old policy by paying any unpaid premiums, plus interest, provided that you did not turn in the policy for its cash value and also that you have not exceeded your life insurance company's time limit on reviving policies. This time limit is commonly three to five years. Incidentally, all policies have a "grace period" beyond the due date of premiums, usually 31 days, during which the policy continues in force. After that, the unpaid premiums must be paid up to revive the policy. It is usually better to pay up these back premiums and continue an old policy, if possible, than to replace it with a new one because the annual premiums would be smaller due to the earlier date of purchase. In addition, an older policy would be well on its way toward the accumulation of cash values, while a new policy would have to start from scratch in building these values.



Q. I'm self-employed, so I do not come under any group life insurance program. Is there group life insurance available to me even though I belong to no union or firm?

A. Possibly. Many professional societies, employee associations and fraternal orders, among other organizations, offer life insurance to their members on a group basis. Look into the organizations you belong to — maybe there's a program you've overlooked.

News From The County Agent

Use your hay conditioner on large stemmed hay plants at the same time of cutting or as soon afterwards as possible, advises county agent B. T. Haws. When the plant is cut, its stem is full of water, and the slightest pressure will cause the stem to crack. If the plant lies in the swath for more than 30 minutes after cutting, it will wilt and become limp.

After a small amount of water has evaporated from the stem, it becomes limber and pliable and will flatten out under roll pressure rather than crack open. Thus the stem walls will not be cracked open for better drying and most of the water will stay in the stem, says the county agent.

The conditioner will do the most good on the best drying days. So don't make the mistake of thinking the conditioner isn't needed when drying conditions are good, advises Haws.

Hay meadows should receive a topdressing of fertilizer immediately after each cutting. The addition of plant food makes for better quality in the regrowth — higher protein and more palatability. Production for more hay or grazing is produced. Tests will show that well fertilized hay crops are more drought tolerant and will produce 30 per cent or more on the same rainfall than unfertilized crops.

And finally, reminds Haws, hay should be harvested when the plants begin to mature.

Farmers in the county are urged to make weekly cotton insect counts in the cotton fields. We have cotton in all stages in the county. It was

necessary this year for farmers, due to weather conditions, to have to replant two or three times. The insects found in cotton fields are thrip, bollweevil, fleahoppers and aphids. The infestation in most fields is light.

There is one sure way to determine the quality of hay. Have it tested. Results from the A&M Forage Testing Service show a wide range of differences in quality and feed values of forages tested. A relatively new figure is being included in the analyses — net energy. It is a more accurate indication of the growth of a forage than crude protein or total digestible nutrients.

Gov. Connally Proclaims Farm Safety Week

AUSTIN, Tex. — Governor John Connally has proclaimed July 23-29 Farm Safety week in Texas and called on rural residents to give attention to safety "as part of every occupational and recreational activity."

The Governor noted that accidents on Texas farms and ranches "continue to exact a painful human and economic toll each year" and called attention to the observance of National Farm Safety Week which has been proclaimed by President Lyndon B. Johnson, and coincides with Farm Safety Week in Texas.

Theme for the state and national observance is "Think and Act Safely." The Texas observance is being sponsored by the Texas Safety Association and the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council. Other groups interested in farm safety, such as the Texas Farm Bureau and the Texas Electric Cooperatives, Inc., are participating with these two groups in coordinated safety programs for the July 23-29 observance. County judges throughout the state will be making local proclamations in observance of Farm Safety Week, and most county agricultural agents and home demonstration agents will take part in local programs.

Spearheading the Texas activities is Joe L. Smetana of Waco, who directs the statewide activities of TSA in farm accident prevention as Vice President for Farm and Ranch Safety. He is also President of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council and Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau, Waco.

Smetana reported that accidents kill some 8,000 farm residents each year, and an additional 750,000 are victims of disabling injuries. The economic loss to the nation is some \$2 billion.

"This is a tragic waste of human and economic resources," he said. "We must apply full energy to the urgent task of reducing rural accidents."

these things near your range or are they some distance away?

There are exceptions to this guide, however. For example, utensils such as pressure cookers or canning equipment may be used first at the sink. Since they are not frequently used, though, they can be stored in a more out-of-the-way location.

Arrange frequently used items so that they are easy to reach and put back. Store items at a convenient height, one row deep and unstacked, if possible. Packaged goods should be arranged so that labels are clearly visible. Heavy items may be lifted more easily if they are stored at or slightly below, elbow level.

Mrs. Phillips Weiss has served as a storage demonstrator this year. Before moving into a new house Mrs. Weiss made a list of all items to be stored, took it to the new house and planned a place for everything. This took care of many questions on moving day.

Do you take special pride in the beauty of copper, pewter and silver accessories? If you keep them looking their shining best, they are a lovely addition to your home, says Thelma Wirges.

Copper utensils should be washed in hot soap or detergent suds, rinsed with hot water, then polished dry with a soft cloth. A little ammonia added to the suds will help to remove stains or corroded spots. Or, after washing and drying, rub spots with lemon and salt, then suds again. If the bottom surface becomes stained from heat, apply a commercial copper-cleaner and wash again. Lacquered copper should be washed quickly without soaking, using warm suds. Then rinse and wipe dry.

Pewter should be washed in warm suds, rinsed, and polished with a soft cloth. If a pewter piece is heavily tarnished, first wash it in hot suds, rinse and dry it. Then cover it with silver polish, and while this is still wet, apply a thick soap or detergent lather. Rinse in hot water, buff it dry with a soft towel. When polishing is neces-

silver either sterling or plated, should be washed with hot suds and rinsed after each use to delay tarnishing. While still warm, buff it dry with a soft towel. When polishing is neces-

sary, first wash and dry each piece, then apply polish, applying lengthwise on flatware and following the contours of hollow-ware. Let the polish dry, then rub the silver to a high gloss with a soft cloth or chamois. Finally, wash it again in hot suds, rinse with hot water, and buff dry.

Questions - Answers

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.)

Q.—What is the difference between going to school under the new educational act and the vocational training act?

A.—Any eligible veteran can attend school under the new educational act while only certain service-connected disabled veterans can qualify under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act.

Q.—What is the final expiration date for World War II Veterans to apply for a G.I. loan?

A.—July 25, 1967.

Q.—Is there a final date for conversion of a National Service Life Insurance Policy?

A.—No, the policy can be converted at any time the policy is current.

Q.—Where do I send my income questionnaire after it is completed?

A.—There are several locations now processing these cards, and the address to which yours should be sent is printed on the card.

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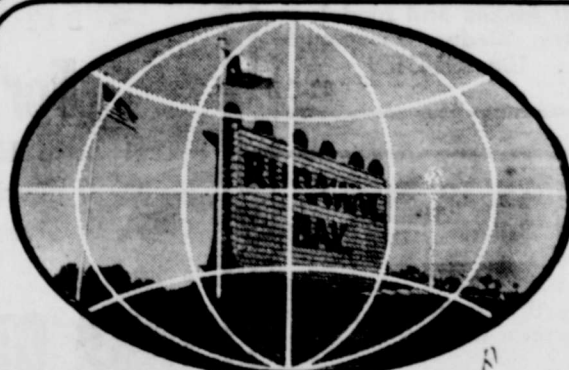
