## County Approved For Emergency Funds

### LATE DRIVE WINS IT

## Wolves Thunder Past Sweetwater

It's whatever makes up the ingredients of a great football team.

It's what carried the Colorado City Wolves to a tremendous 14-32 come from behind victory over the AAA Sweetwater Mustangs Friday night in Wolf Stadium.

It's such things as talent, power, ruggedness, determination, guts and never-say-die winning spirit.

It's what the Colorado City Wolves have inside them.

All the ingredients were capped off by a 30-yard scoring pass from Glen Nix to Rusty Steakley with 1:15 left in the contest and Wolves trailing 12-6.

That tied it up and then Nix hit the tough fullback Donnie Higginbotham in the end zone for the two extra points and victory.

The superbly conducted game had rocked back and forth for the better part of four quarters and it seemed the score-board might read 66 for the night.

Then Mustang quarterback Gary Ruffin electrified fans on both sides of the stadium with a dazzling 76-yard punt return that almost provided the winning margin for the visitors.

The game was marked by inspired and relentless play on both sides.

Sojourners Dan Steakley snuggled the rushing lead for the Wolves as he carried the ball on 25 of C-City's 52 rushing plays.

The fleet and elusive Steakley picked his holes like a pro as he darted and danced to a 110 yard total for the night.

Higginbotham turned in another solid performance with 57 yards on 12 carries. In addition the Wolf fullback returned three kickoffs for 89 yards with one romp for 47 yards in the final quarter.

The Wolves rolled for 236 yards on the ground and 102 in the air as Nix hit six of 13 passes.

A determined drive by the Wolves got underway after Higginbotham returned the opening kickoff for 18 yards. Consistent gains by the full-

back and Steakley plus a 10-yard burst by Wayne Russell set the Wolves up on the Ponies' 17-yard line.

Nix circled left end in an effort to reach paydirt only to be met by a trio of Mustangs at the eight-yard line who shook him loose from the ball for a Sweetwater recovery.

The Mustangs then put on a concerted 92-yard drive to score with John Hefner going the final 17 yards with 1:04 left in the first period.

Wolves drove to the Mustang 26 on their next series only to lose the ball on downs. Four plays later a Pony bobble was recovered and the Wolves took over.

The 63-yard drive was capped by Higginbotham's yard plunge with 3:06 left in the second quarter. Nix kick was wide and the score knotted at 6-6.

But the Pony defense put on a terrific show of force and got the ball on downs at their own 10-yard line.

Mustangs got into high gear and moved to the Wolf 36-yard line before Larry Paul recovered a fumble for C-City.

The Wolves moved to no avail and punted.

Ruffin hit the punt and raced 76 yards to paydirt. The Mustangs drew a 15-yard penalty.

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## To Aid Victims Of Flooding

Mitchell County was approved Friday as eligible for emergency funds from the Agricultural Conservation Program for cost sharing to repair damage to some 200 farms damaged by heavy rains and flooding in July.

ASCS head, Eddie Braswell, notified The Colorado City Record of the news Friday afternoon.

The announcement was further confirmed by a telephone call from the Austin office of Senator Ralph Yarborough and by telegram from Congressman George Mahon.

Under the emergency program individual farmers in the county would be eligible for up to \$2,500 in funds to repair terraces, dams and waterways.

Braswell said it would be two weeks before repairing practices were okayed by the State Disaster Committee. Also the county will receive notice if 80 percent

of costs will be paid by the government as applied for by the emergency funds at the ASCS office.

Braswell noted that some farmers had already applied for help under a program allowing smaller payments than the measure approved Friday.

He said the first application would have to be cancelled and the new program applied for in order to receive additional funds.

Sen. Yarborough's Austin secretary, Mrs. Nora Lou Spiller, told The Record that \$348,990 had been approved for three Texas counties including Mitchell, Colburn and Hudspeth.

Braswell warned farmers not to repair their damage until application had been made for the emergency funds.

It is estimated that 200 farms were severely damaged by the flooding with others being hurt to lesser degrees.

Mitchell County's application was filed late in July by the disaster committee consisting of Curtis Lattimer, ASCS county chairman; A. V. Sheppard, Soil Conservation Service; John Russell, Farmers Home Administration; and Bobby Lemons, county agent. Braswell is secretary for the group.

## Mr. Franklin Rites Today

Last rites for Charles E. Franklin, 97, are scheduled today at 2:30 p.m. in First Baptist Church with Rev. M. A. Smith Jr., pastor officiating, assisted by Rev. Caddo Matthews, pastor of Plainview Baptist Church.

Mr. Franklin died at 11:40 p.m. Friday in Root Memorial Hospital after being in failing health for several years.

Born Jan. 7, 1869 in Louisiana, he married Claudia Lenora Clark on Dec. 31, 1895 in Hamilton. The couple moved to Mitchell County in 1898 and to Colorado City in 1903. He was a member of First Baptist Church.

Mr. Franklin was a former Mitchell County tax collector and deputy sheriff and also worked as a bookkeeper.

Grandsons will be pallbearers with burial in Colorado City Cemetery under direction of Kizer and Son Funeral Home.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. John Womack of Colorado City, Mrs. Ruby Watford of Midland and Mrs. Grace Everett of Big Spring; two sons, J. C. Franklin of Midland and Dr. V. E. Franklin of Socorro, N. M.; two sisters Mrs. Ocel Shurtlett and Mrs. J. J. Loveless, both of Colorado City; 11 grandchildren; 23 great-grandchildren; and 12 great-great grandchildren.

## CONVERSATION CORNER

**FOOTBALL FEVER** is hardly ever fatal, even though some boys and most men have recurrent attacks year after year every fall.

It appears in several forms — kind like measles do. Football fever can be acute, causing palpitations at kick-off time for the first home game. Along with noticeable nervous heebie-jeebies in some cases.

It can sometimes reach epidemic stage and in winning seasons is probably both contagious and infectious.

It can be chronic with symptoms of football fever persisting from early youth until advanced old age.

**WOMEN** and girls, for the most part, are less susceptible than men and boys of the same age except for mothers of the team, sweethearts of the captains, wives of all coaches, and members of the pep squad, most often exposed.

There are occasional women who have been known to take symptoms of football fever. Such women, deeply involved with football fever families, sometimes get excited and yell, scream, squeal, jump up and down at games... and let the roast burn while applauding the Dallas Cowboys on TV.

Women on the whole, however, are often more immune than men to acute attacks and, by nature, build resistance because they'd rather watch the band march and see what other women are wearing this season.

**FOOTBALL FEVER** is marked by stages of delirium wherein the male being afflicted thrash their arms and shout "Touchdown... kick that goal... kill him... run, run, run!"

Even at more normal times, chronic football fever makes men talk in a strange tongue... of offside, pass interference, sneak, lateral, safety, fourth down and punting situation... clipping, penalty, field goal, illegal use of the hands... defense, offense, quick kick and huddle.

They understand sports pages and when two or more of them get together they sound off like sportscasters, in their special language.

Football fever is a very strange thing. It really seems to make people who have it feel better, not worse... feel happier, more alert, bright-eyed and energetic.

**RED REST** is never indicated for football fever. While there is no known cure for it, people with it do better sitting in a grandstand or even running up and down along the sidelines.

If you have one or more attacks of football fever at your house do not try to isolate a case. A few, simple steps will make your victim more comfortable.

First step is to feed him well the minute he gets home.

Second step is to be ready yourself when he gets there and give him no interference while he's warming up for the game. Never try to block him... do not kick.

Third step simply requires that you grab your coat and hat and grin so you can join the fun. Practice sessions will teach you how to grab his arms to keep him from beating your back black and blue when the ball goes over.

Hand me down my stadium seat. Football fever season is here.

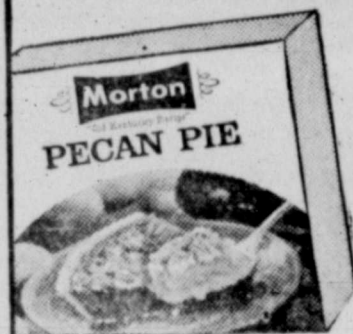
