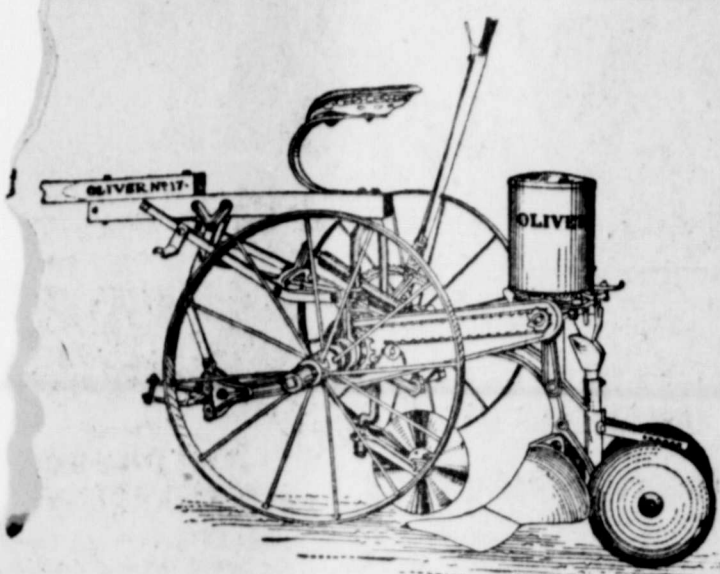

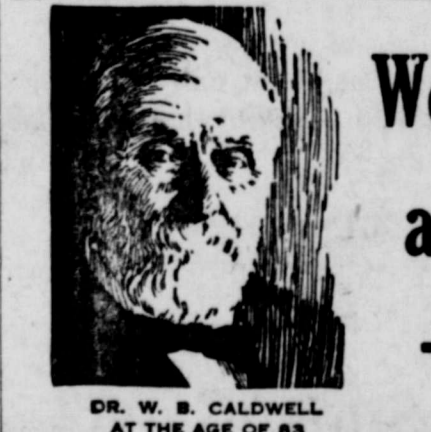

Mother's Cook Book

O, my life have we not had seasons That only said, live and rejoice! That asked not for causes or reasons But made us all feeling and voice.

APPETIZING GOOD THINGS

WE ARE all looking for variety which will appeal to the appetites of those for whom we cook. The following salad may be enjoyed because it is different:

Kidney Bean Salad.

Take one can of kidney beans, two cupsful each of diced celery and apple, one cupful of diced dill pickles, two tablespoonfuls of chopped pimientos; mix and add mayonnaise.

Mayonnaise.

Into a bowl place two eggs; beat, add a teaspoonful of salt, one and one-half teaspoonfuls of mustard, four tablespoonfuls of lemon juice and one cupful of oil. In another dish mix two tablespoonfuls of flour, three of cornstarch, one cupful of water, two tablespoonfuls of oil. Cook until the starch is well cooked, then turn into the first bowl of ingredients while hot, mix and beat with a Dover egg beater, adding one more cupful of oil. This dressing will keep indefinitely when kept in a cool place. Thin with cream when using.

Chicken Warmen.

Cook in plenty of broth, one good-sized fat chicken, if small add two sweetbreads or veal to help out in bulk. Cut up the cooked meat as for salad, place in a double boiler to keep hot. Cook three bunches of celery cut into dice, in the chicken broth, with one small onion, diced. Remove the celery to another dish and keep hot. Add noodles to the seasoned stock and cook; drain and place a nest of noodles on a serving plate, over them the celery, over that the chicken. Garnish with very small croutons and serve very hot.

WHEN I WAS TWENTY-ONE

BY JOSEPH KAYE

At Twenty-one: Ernest Thompson Seton Wrote a Story No One Has Yet Taken.

AT THE age of twenty-one I wrote a wild-animal story which still lies in my desk (for which I am now thankful as I look over it).

"I made other attempts after that, but it was not until six years later that I wrote a story which received respectable payment. This was 'The Drummer on Snowshoes,' which appeared in a magazine. For this story, with five illustrations, they paid me the incredible sum of \$50—cash (not promises)—enough to keep me on the prairies for a year.

"I showed this story to Joe Collins, the Canadian writer. He had editorial instinct, and said briefly: 'You can sell as many of this kind as you choose to write them'; and he proved right, for this was later rewritten and republished as 'Redruff,' in my most successful book of animal stories.—Ernest Thompson Seton."

TODAY.—Mr. Seton is the most famous writer of animal stories in the world and vastly popular. He was brought up on the Canadian prairies and in the woods and obtained his material then, as he does now, first hand. At about the same time that he wrote the story mentioned above he became naturalist to the province of Manitoba, Canada, and published a volume on the mammals of Manitoba. He was only twenty-six then.

BOOTH TARKINGTON

MANY claim that Booth Tarkington is the greatest living American writer. He was born in Indianapolis, July 29, 1869, went to Exeter academy and finally to Princeton university.

Though he may have intended to become an author from the very beginning, he decided to go in for business, at first, and took a position with an oil company. He began in his twenties to write "The Gentleman From Indiana," which was published when he was thirty years old. The same year his university conferred an A. M. degree on him.

He took up authorship seriously from that time on—so great was his first success. Critics said that he had established a new school of fiction. The first book was followed by "Monsieur Beaucaire," also a great success. From then on his reputation has steadily grown.

More recently, in collaboration, he wrote a play, "The Man From Home," which had a record run in New York and, later, played practically all over the country. William Hodge made his reputation as the homely, wise, unspoiled man from Kokomo.

Then he wrote the Penrod stories, beloved by everyone who has any sympathy for boyhood—stories of the merely average boy and his average adventures, so true to life that grown men find their own boyhood in them and gain a greater sympathy with boyhood while they chuckle over them. He has also written equally wonderful stories of the boy and girl in the half-grown stage of seventeen.

WHO SAID

"No sword bites so fiercely as an evil tongue."

THE man who uttered these words of wisdom was Sir Ralph Sidney, one of the conspicuous figures at the court of Queen Elizabeth and one of the queen's favorite courtiers. Sir Phillip had an intimate knowledge of the workings of the life at the court of England's monarch, and his remark, "No sword bites so fiercely as an evil tongue," may well be considered a mature reflection on the meteoric rise and fall of so many favorites of the queen.

Sir Phillip had seen many rise to power, prominence and favor in court circles, only to be dashed to oblivion by the wagging of some evil tongue. And when this man compared the biting of an evil tongue to a sword, he knew whereof he spoke—for Sir Phillip Sidney was a warrior as well as a man of letters, and it was on the battlefield that he gave his life for his nation and his queen.

Sir Phillip was born in Kent, England, in 1554. Upon completing his education, he was introduced at court and Queen Elizabeth at once took a fancy to him. As a mark of her favor, she sent him as ambassador to Germany. Upon his return he married Frances, daughter of Sir Francis Walsingham, and the same year (1583) the queen admitted him to the peerage. In the year 1585 he went to the Netherlands.

In addition to his fame as a courtier and a soldier, Sir Phillip Sidney is known—best, perhaps—as a man of letters. His best known works are "The Arcadia," a medley in prose and verse after the prevalent Italian style of the period; "Astrophel and Stella," the first important body of sonnets in English; and "The Defence of Poesy," published in 1595.—Wayne D. 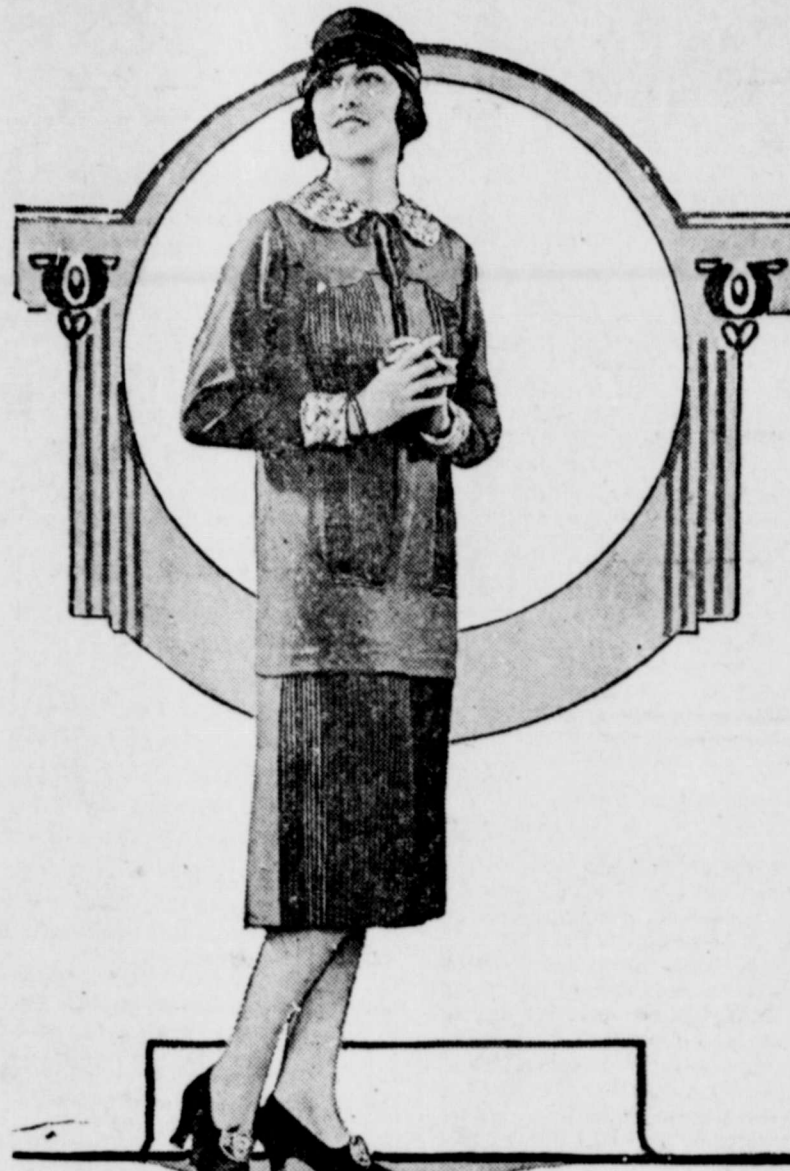

Building

Small Towns' Growth

Shown by Statistics

For many years we have witnessed in this country the phenomena of pronounced population shifts from the rural districts to the cities. While this movement still may be in progress, the development of semi-rural environment has been carried to the place where the big cities of the first magnitude are now growing seemingly no more rapidly than are the small cities and large towns, and we even may be on the threshold of a reaction from the traditional pro-urban migration.

From the most complete and reliable source of building information available in this country, it is found that during the first nine months of 1925 the 25 leading cities of the country, in point of housing construction, enjoyed a building gain of about 17 per cent over the same period of 1924. From the same authority it is learned that 344 cities and towns, exclusive of the 25 metropolises, showed a combined increase of substantially the same percentage. Included in this list of 344 centers were some places with only a few thousand population.

While these figures are not conclusive, they are enough to the point to arouse the interest of the student of current economic conditions, and to justify the hope that the small town is beginning to come into its own.—Thrifty Magazine.

Community Joins in Shade-Tree Planting

Residents of Polytex, a suburban district of Fort Worth, Texas, are conducting a tree planting campaign. Carried to a successful conclusion, it will result in the parkways alongside every street and avenue in the suburb being lined with shade trees of uniform size and variety.

The movement is a result of the effort of a resident of Avenue M to improve the appearance of his immediate neighborhood. News of the Avenue M beautification project spread rapidly to other streets in the suburb, and its sheer merit awakened the public conscience, with the result that now there is hardly a street in the district on which some self-appointed committee is not trying to put over a similar program.

Indications are that each street will select a different variety of tree. Thus a motorist in a few years may be able to drive through the suburb in the shade of trembling sycamores, return by another route shielded from the summer's sun by stately American elms—a pride of Texas as well as New England cities—thence to Greater Fort Worth on a boulevard lined with pecans, the official state tree of Texas.—Christian Science Monitor.

Home Judged by Outside

While it is desirable to keep both the interior and the exterior of your home in good repair, do not expend all your efforts on the inside, as the greater wear and tear results on the part of your home that is exposed to the elements.

In addition to protecting your investment in the home by proper care, your efforts will tend to stimulate interest in the upkeep of their homes by all your neighbors, who will usually wish to be outdone. This is another way of adding indirectly to the value of your own home, as it is to a certain extent judged by the quality of its neighbors.

And in the event that you are at any time forced to dispose of your home you will find that a well-kept home will sell easier and at a much better price than if allowed to run down to such an extent that it would require costly repairs.

Good Roads and the Town

Beyond question the extensive building of good roads has brought about a new status for the town, big and little, as it has for the country generally. What this status finally shall be is not in the nature of a problem so much as a process that is bound to take its own course to a large extent. Good roads extend the commercial reach of every town. Whether that reach may be made profitable depends much on the town itself, for the reach of other places has been extended similarly. Better roads bring into or near the towns greatly increased travel. Whether that travel shall be made profitable or negligible from a business point of view depends again very much on the invitation the town affords.

Boost Home Town

There may be a great many features about your home town of which you cannot be justly proud, lots of things going just the other way, the way you didn't want them to go. Just the same when you go on the outside to speak of the affairs and the progressiveness of your home town—smile. You never see families with any degree of intelligence displaying dislikes and hatreds once the members have transferred the seat of operations to the outside.—Albany-Deatur Daily.

Keep House in Order

Everybody is—or ought to be—in terested in keeping the house in order. There is so much more pleasure possible when environs are inviting and surroundings orderly and clean.

VACATION FOR COW

FOUND PROFITABLE

Experiments have shown beyond a reasonable doubt that it does not pay to milk a cow continuously right up to the day of her freshening. Almost any good cow can give milk right up to the day her calf is born but it is a better and more profitable practice to dry her up several weeks before this. This rest that the cow gets before her calf comes enables her to produce much more milk after freshening and puts her in a good strong condition to withstand the strain of a heavy milking period without so much danger of sickness and weakening of her constitutional vigor. Continuous milking up to freshening time undoubtedly tends to reduce a cow's productive life. Generally it pays to dry up a cow from six to ten weeks before her calf is expected to be born.

Some heavy producing cows are not easy to dry up. But it is always possible to dry a cow up within a period of from two to three weeks by cutting down on the amount of grain or meal feed and green feed and by milking her less frequently and by failing to remove all the milk from her udder. Do this gradually and get the milkings farther and farther apart until she is giving only a quart or two of milk daily.

As soon as a cow is dry she should be given all the rough feeds she needs to get her in good sappy condition before calving. It is not necessary or advisable to feed a dry cow heavily on grain or meal feeds. A cow should be fat but not overly fat when her calf comes.

Do not let a cow go unbred too long after calving. It does not pay. It is recommended that a cow be bred between one and four months after calving. Failure to breed a cow promptly results in financial loss and in some cases long-delayed breeding is thought to result in the cow's becoming barren.—F. R. Edwards, Animal Husbandman, Georgia Experiment Station.

Plenty of Water Needed for Higher Production

An Iowa dairyman whose cows have been making one of the best milk and butterfat records in the state attributes no small share of his success to the use of individual drinking cups in his barn. The drinking cups were installed about a year ago and the dairyman says he noticed from the first the good effect the handy drinking system had on the milk yield.

He uses one cup for two cows, having it attached to the feeding rack just between each two stanchions. A large tank is up against the ceiling in one end of the barn. This is filled from the well by an electrically operated pump. The water flows on a plate in the cup, a valve opens. When the pressure is released, the valve closes and water stops flowing. The cows very quickly learn to use them, the dairyman says.

Since the cups let the cows water themselves, they are a great labor-saving device. But that is not all. "If you want to get high production from cows," the dairyman says, "you must see that they get plenty of water. With the drinking cups right at their heads all the time they are in the barn, cows drink much more than they would if they were regularly watered, or had to go to a tank to drink. You would be surprised to see how often they take a sip at the drinking cup. Taking just a little sip that way every now and then, they drink much more in the course of a day than they would otherwise. Another thing, with the tank up near the ceiling, the warmest part of the barn, the water stays at a comfortable temperature in the winter, which is another inducement for the cows to drink more."

Grinding Hay for Dairy Cows Is Not Profitable

Experiments conducted by the dairy husbandry section of the Iowa experiment station indicate that it doesn't pay to grind alfalfa hay when it is to be fed to dairy cows. At least it wasn't profitable in these preliminary tests. Eight cows were used in the experiment.

The use of ground alfalfa did not increase the yield of either milk or butterfat in these tests and, in addition, there was a greater amount of ground hay refused by the cows than of the unground hay.

It cost \$3.50 per ton to grind the alfalfa and there seems little likelihood that this figure could be reduced on the average farm, those in charge of the test say. The grinding cost, they state, represents from 20 to 25 per cent of the market value of the hay on the farm in the average year.

Dairy Facts

The water supply is of greater importance than most farmers realize. To produce 30 pounds of milk a cow requires 100 pounds of water.

Calves placed in the feedlot at weaning time and continued therein until finished for market make from 50 to 75 per cent more gain from the same feed than do mature steers.

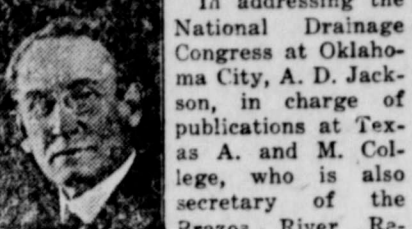

What Tex's Could Be.



In addressing the National Drainage Congress at Oklahoma City, A. D. Jackson, in charge of publications at Texas A. and M. College, who is also secretary of the Brazos River Reclamation Association, said that there are 20,000,000 acres of rich lands, in districts of heavy population in Texas, that could be reclaimed by flood protection, drainage, and inexpensive irrigation. These are the rich alluvial soils of the Texas river bottoms. Mr. Jackson is not given to guessing or to rash statements. Usually he knows what he is talking about. Think of the population these acres would support, and then think of what Texas may become in time. There is plenty of money and credit in Texas to do all that Mr. Jackson visions in his dreams of conservation and irrigation. To the discredit of the people, little or nothing is as yet being done to use those 20,000,000 acres of rich lands.

A Funny Old World Is This.

Greece has announced that its debt commission has no authority to pay this country a debt of \$15,000,000, or to fund that debt, unless the United States lets it have a further loan of \$20,000,000. Suppose that individuals should adopt that policy in their private business. Private financing might then become easy for the borrower. A man could borrow \$10.00 from his neighbor due in 30 days, and at the expiration of that time could announce that he would not pay it unless he was extended another credit of \$20.00. Then when the \$30.00 matured with interest, he could demand another \$60.00 and so on forever. The public is anxiously waiting to see what the United States is going to do about it, and then to know if private debts may be settled that way. Well, hardly

Buying South Texas Lands.

When the Florida boom ends, as it surely will in time, since there is a point beyond which inflation cannot possibly go, the boomers are almost certain to turn to South Texas and to exploit that section to their advantage as long as possible. Along with the exploitation there is sure to be much that is of questionable practice. Texas should get ready for it in a way to see that people are not robbed and the state given a black eye of the kind that Florida will surely have in course of time. Texas desires development, and even more rapid development than it has had in the past, but the good of the state demands that there should not be misrepresentation. The Texas Division of Associated Advertising Clubs has undertaken a big problem in its efforts to keep down graft in South Texas and other parts of the state.

There is Too Much Doing.

There is so much going on everywhere to divert attention from one's work that a fellow has a hard time getting down to the job in hand from which he makes his bread and butter. Really the side shows are bewildering. One must see something of the things about him or he will soon be in the class with the old fogies and get years and years behind. Not a great while ago living was comparatively easy, especially for country people, but now most people in remote districts are so closely hooked up with the outside with good roads, automobiles, daily mails, telephones and radios that they hardly know what to do. The woman in the country who once was on a party line and couldn't get the dishes washed for listening in on the telephone is now in a much worse fix trying to keep up with all that is going on at hundreds of radio stations throughout the country, and thousands of farmers on the pretext of getting the market reports, are leaving their teams idle in the fields.

The Town Folks Busy, Too.

The town people are even worse bewildered than those in the country, for they have to keep up with many more things that little time is left for sleep. Things are done with a slap, dash, and bang. The Charleston, with all its waste of energy, is typical of the day. No wonder that Henry Ford and others are trying to interest people in a return to the old-time music and customs, even if his pesky old car has been largely responsible for the hurry into which we have all been thrown.

Three Bales to the Acre.

G. M. Adams, a Smith County business man, who went to farming about two years ago, has made 15 bales of cotton on five acres of land, or three bales to the acre. A few years ago such a thing was thought impossible, but it shows what can be done on a farm with plenty of work of the right kind. What has been done in Smith County can be done in other places in Texas with the right kind of effort.

Are All Athletes Cripples?

Those who are in charge of athletic publicity in all the schools seem to think that it is necessary to report a greater part of their teams as crippled or off their feed in advance of every game. It was bad enough to try to fool the people into thinking that all the football men were to the bad physically, and now that the football season is over the same kind of press-agenting is being done for the basketball teams. Well, we don't have to believe all we see in some papers.
