Bale Count At 10,170 About 2,000 Bales More Is Estimate

Over 10,000 bales of cotton have been ginned by the seven gins in the county so far this season.

Although not all of the cotton is from county fields, the cotton harvest is about over in the county, with ginner estimates not over 2,000 more bales still to process.

The bale count this week shows the following amounts:

--Buford Co-op, 1,841 bales ginned.

--China Grove Co-op, 2,158 bales ginned, about 6 on the yard.

--Colorado Gin Co., 378 bales ginned.

--Farmers Gin, 648 bales ginned, about 5 on the yard.

--Lorraine Co-op, 2,553 bales ginned, about 6 on the yard.

--Planters Gin, 754 bales ginned, about 20 waiting.

--Producers Co-op, 1,801 bales ginned.

--Total ginned 10,133 bales and 37 on the yards, amounting to 10,170 bales to be processed.

F. B. Manly, of the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office in Abilene, reported that 12,300 cotton samples were classed at that office during the week ending January 16.

This brought the seasonal total to 153,600 samples classed, as compared to 521,300 samples

that had been classed by the same date the previous year.

Grade 42 was the predominant grade at 40 percent. Twenty-six percent graded 52, and 11 percent graded 43. Fifteen percent of the samples were reduced in grade due to bark or grass content.

Micronaire readings were 64 percent within the 3.5 to 4.9 range. Thirty-two percent was low mike and two percent was high mike.

Staple lengths were 53 percent staple 31; 31 percent staple 30, and 12 percent staple 32.

The cotton market continues to show very little enthusiasm from the producer or buyer.

Enough cotton is selling to meet consumer demands.

Better qualities, grades 31, 32, and 42 sell for 500 to 600 points above loan; or a 4131

premium mike will bring from 27.80 to 28.80; grade 4231 premium mike brings 26.75 to 27.90.

Lower qualities bring 200 to 300 points above loan; or a 5321 premium mike brings 22.

35 to 23.85. Low micronaire cotton brings from 100 to 300 points above loan. A 4231, with 2.6 mike, would bring from 13.90 to 15.90. A 4231, with 3.0 mike, would bring around 23.00 cents per pound.

Commutes From Buford Farm

George Muinch of Rt. 1 Colorado City has been appointed Director of NASA's Low Cost Systems Office.

The new Director has had an extensive career in research, development, engineering and production in the commercial and aerospace industries.

Muinch, along with his wife and daughter, has moved to the Colorado City area, and he commutes to his Washington D. C. office from their farm near Buford.

He says he enjoys the solitude of farm life, but also likes to get back to Washington and into the activities there.

The Low Cost Systems Office was established last year and has conducted studies of factors affecting costs of space programs. Based on these studies, standard equipment programs have been implemented to reduce the cost of space missions.

Under Muinch's direction, the office also identifies and evaluates specific business and program practices to achieve changes designed to reduce the costs of NASA programs.

Muinch is a native of Indiana, holds a Bachelor of Science degree in physics from the University of Notre Dame and a Master of Science degree in physics from the University of California.

He has worked successively with the Hughes Aircraft Co., Lockheed Missile Division, Aeronutronic Systems, Inc., Northrop Corp., Dynasience Corp. and as a partner in the Computer Measurements Corp.

He sold his interest during 1973 in the Computer Measurements Corp. then began work in Washington with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, also making the move to Colorado City.

He also lists as part of his experience operations, ordnance, electronics and carrier aircraft flight officer in the Navy from 1942 to 1946.

Following release from the Navy, he was initially in charge of development of the Attack Guidance and Control System for the E-4 Fire Control System, leading to installation of the equipment in a test F86D aircraft. He conducted flight test operations at Culver City and Edwards Air Force Base.

From there he participated in the early phases of the Polaris program at Lockheed, then

getting into space systems at Aeronutronic.

For five years he participated in space programs at Northrop Space Laboratories, managing development of the OV2 Satellite for the Air Force and for engineering of the Ranger Block V Lunar Probe for JPL/NASA.

For Dynasience he was concerned with designing and producing hydraulic fuel and pneumatic control products on a fixed price basis for military, commercial, industrial and NASA users.

Clayton To Speak Here

Bill Clayton, Springlake farmer-businessman and the newly elected Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Texas Legislature, will be the guest speaker for the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet.

The banquet is scheduled for 7 p.m. Friday in the new Civic Center.

Ticket reservations may be made at any time, says executive vice president of the Chamber, Sefton Pickens. Cost of the tickets is \$6 each.

Clayton collected enough pledges in his race for the speakership to make the election a mere formality when the legislature convened last Tuesday in Austin.

Clayton was one of the Texas legislators featured in the current issue of Parade, in that article he stated the goal of his administration "is simply to bring back some dignity and respect and raise the level of the legislature in the eyes of the public," he says.

"We are the trustees of a \$5 billion corporation and we need to conduct ourselves that way. I think the clowning around down here will just have to be eliminated. You don't go to the board room of a large corporation and see the clowning around we do," he added.

The Clayton family includes son Tommy, son-in-law Allen Hatfield, daughter Brenda Clayton Hatfield and their daughter, Lisa Hatfield, and Mrs. Clayton (Delma).

Their home is in Springlake, where Clayton and son Tommy farm. They raise corn, cotton and sorghum on a 2,000-acre operation.

Water is one of his principal legislative concerns. "We are going to have to find some water somewhere--the Mississippi or somewhere," he says.

Until Jan. 1, 1973, he was executive director of Water, Inc., a leader in efforts to increase the South Plains water supply, by pumping water from out of state if necessary.

Clayton lists a string of awards and honors from both within and outside Texas. He is chairman of the Southern Environmental Resources Conference; vice president of the Southern Legislative Conference; immediate past president of the Interstate Conference on Water Problems; immediate past chairman of the Intergovernmental Relations Committee of the National Legislative Conference; a member of the governing board of the Council of State Governments and of the executive committee of the National Conference of State Legislators.

Clayton, 46, grew up in Springlake in Lamb County and graduated from the local high school. He received a bachelor's degree in agricultural economics from Texas A&M--he thinks he's the first Aggie speaker--and returned to Springlake to run the family farm.

He was first elected to the House in 1962 and he quickly became known as a hard worker, a good man on complex bills, especially water legislation.

Clayton wears a copper link bracelet on his right wrist, "for bursitis," he says.

He classes himself a "progressive conservative."

"I think that I am conservative as far as fiscal matters are concerned. When it comes down to how you do business, I think I am a progressive. I am for change whenever it can make an improvement," he stated.

Residents from Colorado City and the surrounding area have the opportunity of coming to the

Chamber banquet to hear Clayton speak.

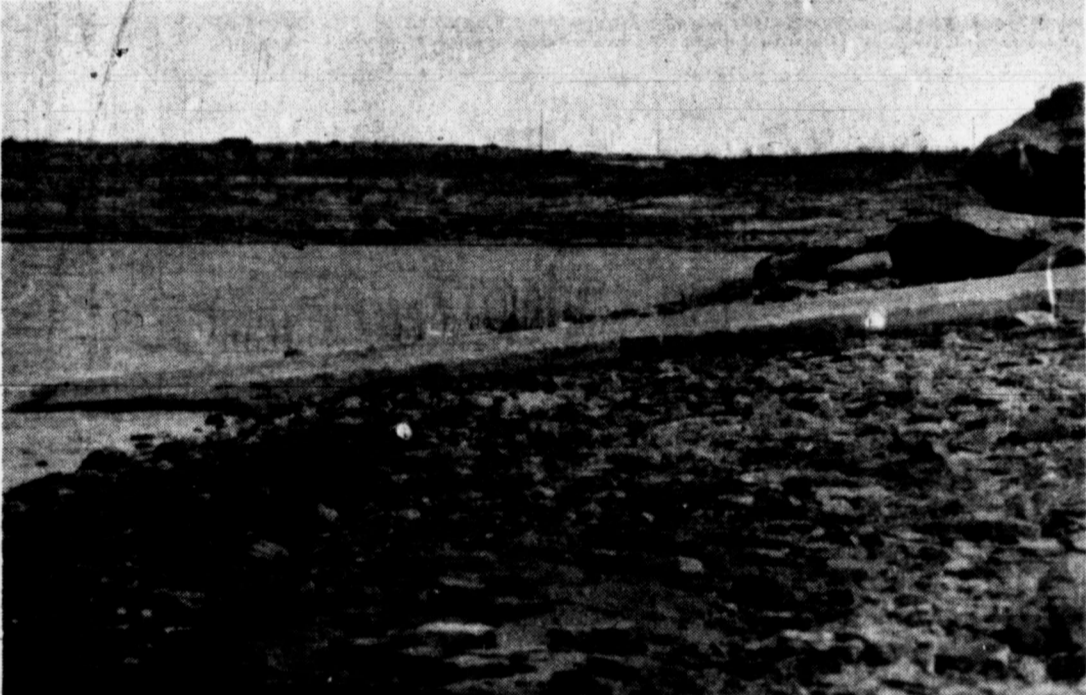
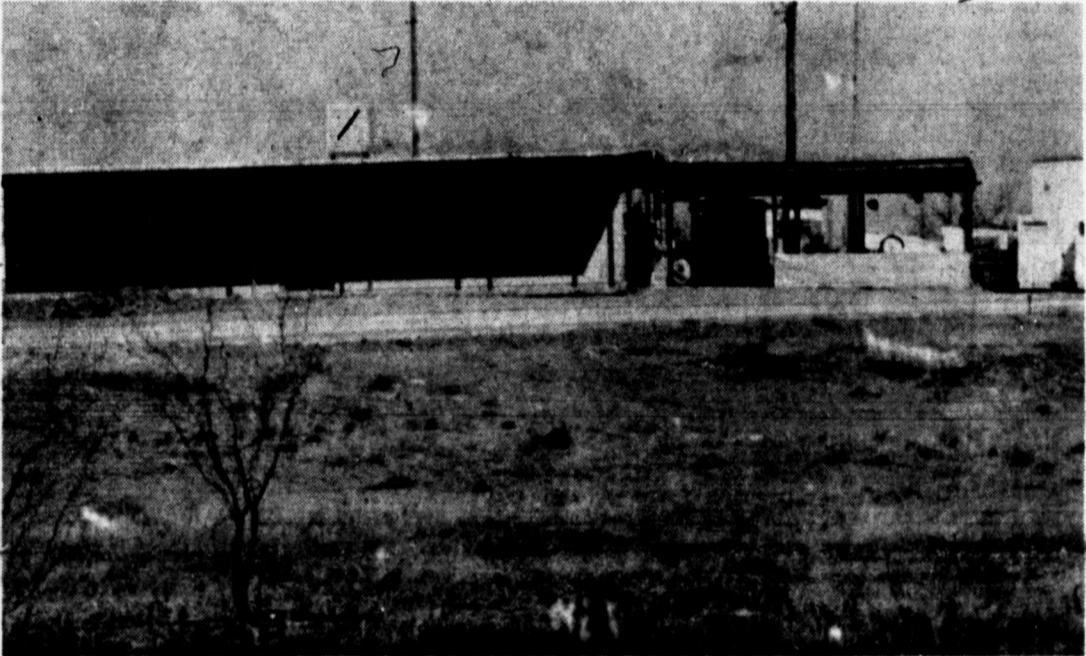
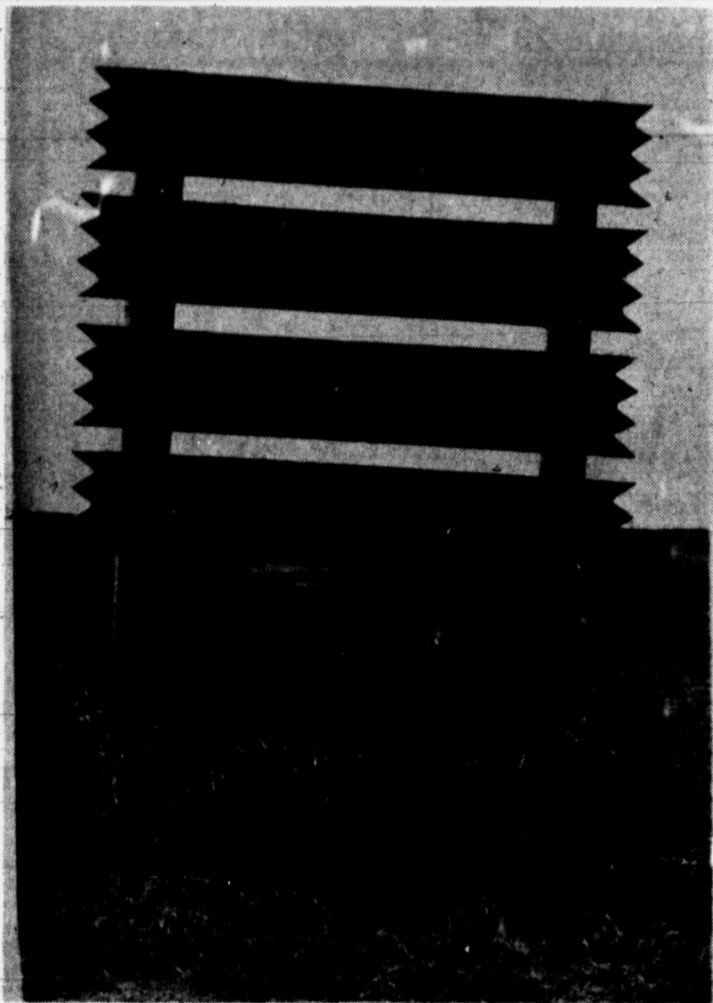

Purpose of the organization, according to president Frank Marsh, will be to relay messages and assist stranded motorists in the Colorado City area.

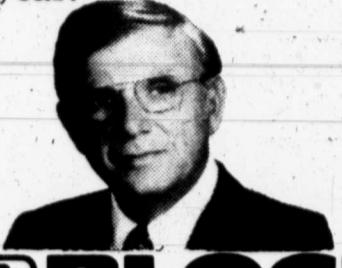
