YOUTHS ESCAPE WITH MINOR WRECK INJURIES

Two 16-year-old Abernathy youths escaped with what appears to be minor injuries in a one-car accident Sunday night. Johnny Lutrick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Lutrick, and Mac Rogers, son of Mr. and Mrs. N.M. Rogers, were treated in Lubbock hospitals and released.

AHS Antelope Band Members In Annual Subscription Drive

Renewing once again a bitter rivalry that had its beginning in 1910, the Abernathy Antelopes will wage war with the Hale Center Owls here this Friday night at 7:30 p.m. as the host Antelopes observe Homecoming '67.

Abernathy will enter the contest sporting a 4-0 won-loss record for the season while the Owls stand at 2-2. Point wise Abernathy has bettered their four previous opponents by a total of 90 points with the 'Lopes scoring 131 points in their first four games while their opponents only managed 41 points. Hale Center has scored a total of 78 points in their four outings with their opponents gaining 59 points.

However, looking at past Antelope-Owl clashes we see that most have been very close with the victory seldom being decided by more than one touchdown.

This year's tilt should prove quite true to tradition with the Owls having a two-fold reason for wanting to upset the 'Lopes. Number one is that the Antelopes ruined a Hale Center homecoming last year defeating the Owls 7 to 0, and second is that one preseason poll picked the Owls to finish in the cellar of district 3-AA. The Owls would like nothing better than to pull out of that position with a victory over the Antelopes.

The Abernathy Antelopes, maintaining a perfect won-loss record, plunged into district 3-AA warfare with a 26-14 romp over the Floydada Whirlwinds last Friday night, September 29, at Floydada.

Floydada, scoring on their first drive of the game, proved a stout contender until the latter moments of the third quarter when Abernathy forged ahead to stay. The Whirlwind's touchdown, the only first period score, came on a two-yard dive by fullback Joe Christian. A conversion kick failed.

Early in the second quarter, the 'Lopes retaliated with Darrell Selke commanding a Burl Fuller fumble across the double stripe from 20 yards out for the first Antelope TD. Fuller, making good on the extra point kick, pushed the Abernathy crew into the lead by one point.

Sammy Stephens intercepted a Floydada pass on the Floydada 25 yard line with 42 seconds left in the first half to set up the second Abernathy score. With only three seconds showing on the clock, Clark Riley downed a 13-yard pass in end zone for another six points. Fuller's kick failed sending the Antelopes to the dressing room with a 13-to-6 lead.

Floydada tacked another six points on the scoreboard early in the third quarter as Steve Craig rolled to pay-dirt from six yards out. A pass from quarterback Larry Barbee to Connie Bearden pushed the 'Winds out in front 14 to 13.

However, the Floydada lead was short lived with Fuller hauling the ensuing kick 70 yards to the Whirlwind 30 yard line and then moments later throwing to Travis Leach for another TD. Fuller again booted the extra point.

Climaxing a 95-yard drive, Fuller swept his right end for nine yards and the final score of the night. A 30-yard scamper by James Byers a few plays prior to Fuller's jaunt proved a key play in keeping the Abernathy thrust alive. The try-for-extras failed.

Also on the ballot will be the proposal to set a tax rate of not more than 75¢ on each \$100 of valuation on property subject to taxation in the proposed hospital district, and issuance of \$4 million in hospital bonds. If the hospital district is formed, Lubbock County

taxpayers will have the hospital tax added to their present tax bill.

Polls in Abernathy will be at Joe Thompson Implement Co., with Frank Lovelace as election judge.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Voting at New Deal will be in the clubhouse and at the school. Residents of the Becton area will vote at the Becton Gin. Ray Furgeson, election judge.

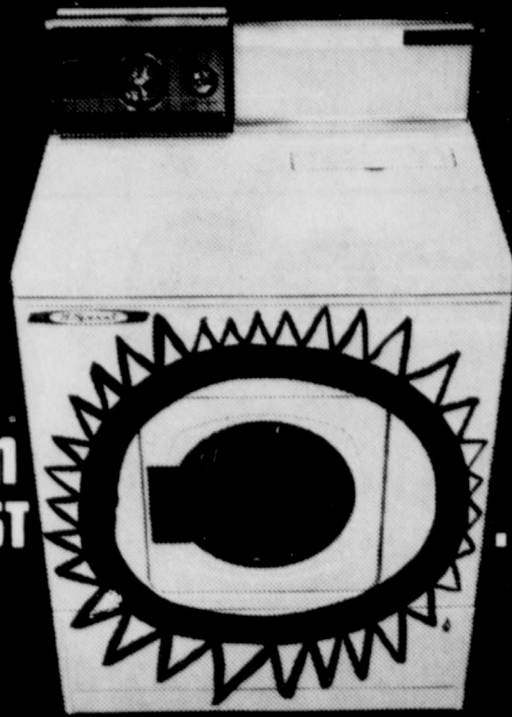

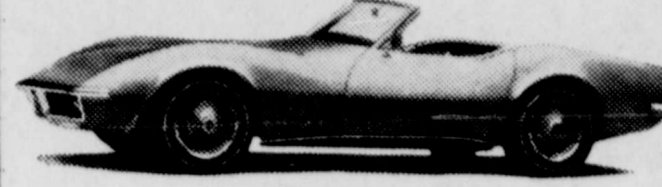

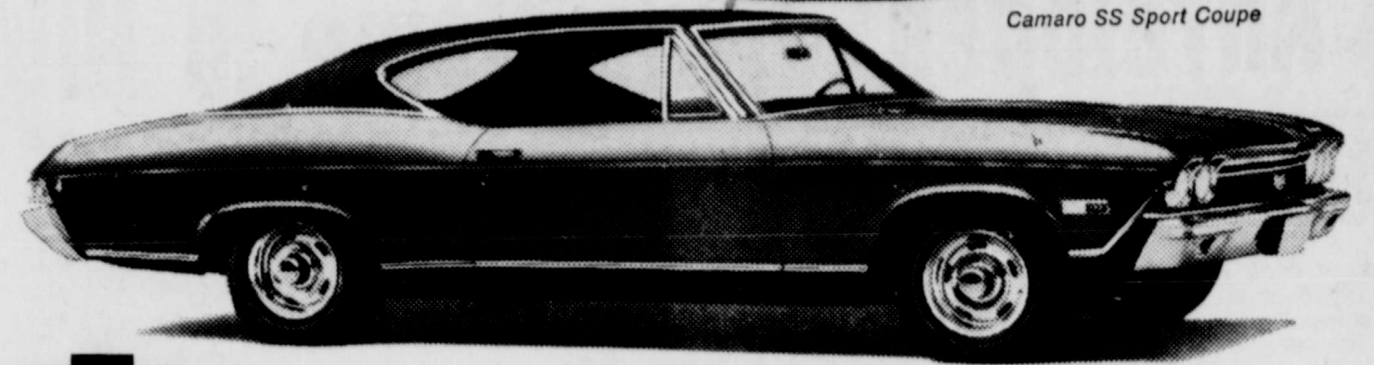

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Southwestern Public Service Company Asks First Rate Increase in 16 Years

The first general increase in electrical rates in 16 years is part of the rate simplification and adjustment program submitted to municipal governments for approval in the Texas communities served by Southwestern Public Service Company.

An average increase of 7.62% for residential and commercial customers in the Texas portion of the company's service area will take effect upon approval of the proposal.

The new rates have already been approved for communities the company serves in New Mexico by the rate-making authority in that state, the New Mexico Public Service Commission, following thorough study of company's books and records by the Commission and the Commission Staff.

The 1951 rate increase, which added 10% across the board to electric rates, is the only general rate increase the company has ever requested. There have been some 25 reductions in rates by Southwestern Public Service Company, or predecessor electric companies in the area, 14 of them having gone into effect since the company took its present form in 1942.

The company proposes, under the rate simplification phase of the program, to reduce the number of rates applicable to residential service from 4 to 2. At the same time it will switch to single meter billing for all residential customers. Presently, those customers who heat their

homes electrically or heat water with electricity are billed on two meters.

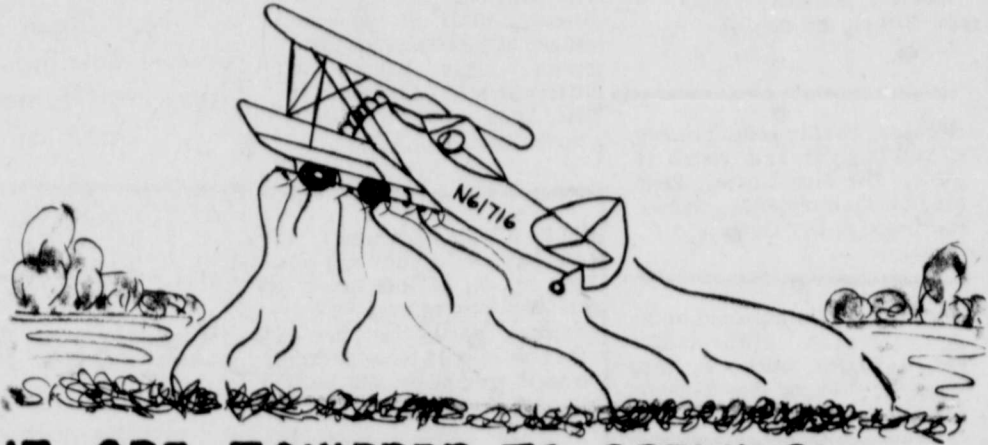
Single meter billing offers a number of advantages to the residential customer. There is a single minimum bill charge in the event of a long vacation or extended absence from the home. The customer has a smaller investment in the wiring needed to bring the service into his home. During the winter season, in electrically heated homes, all usage after 500 kwh per month will be billed at a rate of less than one cent per kilowatt-hour.

For residential service in homes which are not electrically heated or do not heat water electrically, the new rate schedule is as follows:

6.50c per kwh for the first 50 kwh used each month
4.30c per kwh for the next 50 kwh used each month
2.15c per kwh for the next 900 kwh used each month
1.70c per kwh for all additional kwh used each month.

The 1.70c bottom step on the rate schedule for regular residential service is the lowest rate for this type of service the company has ever offered. This additional block recognizes the trend toward increased use of electric service in modern day living and offers to the customer the benefits accruing to the company when it is able to utilize larger, more efficient equipment.

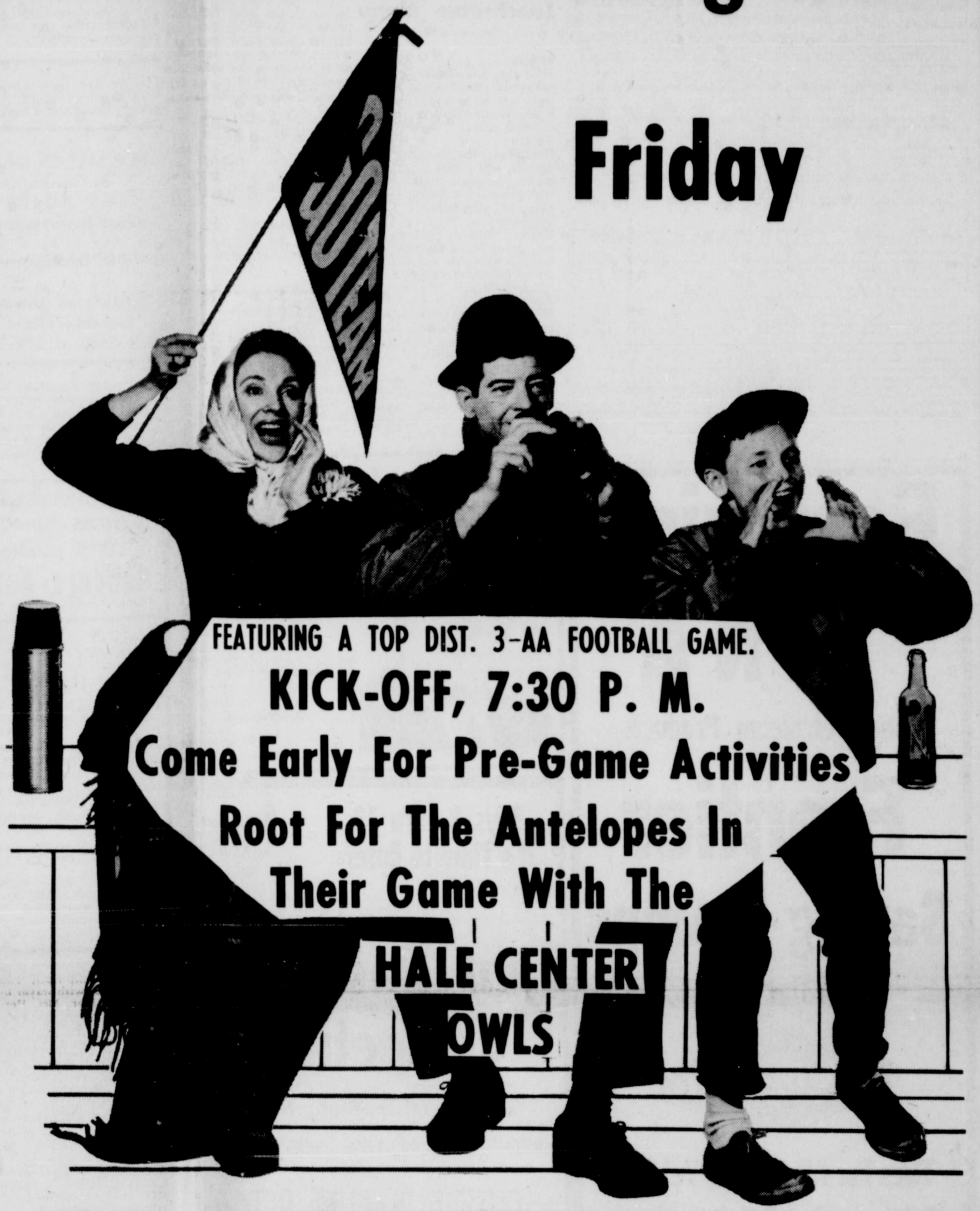
