Ochiltree County Farmers Turn to Trench Silos for Sorghum Storage

Farmers are turning their attention to trench silos as means for storage of the large crops of sorghums which are now approaching maturity according to County Agent E. W. Thomas. The silo offers a cheap storage for feed which may be put down and left for years if desirable and the feed will come out as good as the day it was put in. It is safe from rain, wind, dust, fire and vermin.

Some forty silos have been dug the past five years and it is expected that many more will be constructed this year. R. V. Pluitt of the Huttoon community is one of the most enthusiastic boosters for the trench silo in the county. He put down about two hundred tons of light feed in his silo last fall and used up about 25 tons of it. He squared off the end of the silage when he stopped feeding and the balance left in the silo will keep indefinitely. Crops cut for silage this month have a good chance to

make a bundle crop from the stubble. A convenient size for a trench is ten feet wide at the top, six feet at the bottom, six feet deep and as long as necessary to furnish the required storage. A trench of these dimensions will hold a ton of silage for each running foot. Thus a trench 100 feet long will have a capacity of 100 tons.

District Farm Bureau Meet

W. M. Deck, prominent farmer-rancher of Ochiltree county and District No. 1 director of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, has called a meeting of the members of this district comprising the entire Texas Panhandle for August 11, 10 a. m. at the Herring Hotel in Amarillo.

Mr. Deck who is also president of the Ochiltree County Farm Bureau Federation and Audie Conley, vice president, urge that a large delegation from this county attend the fall district meeting.

District meetings are being held over the entire state at which plans for the 1942 farm program will be discussed. Well informed farm leaders will be present to conduct the program.

The Texas Farm Bureau Federation means service to Texas farmers. The organization has made great gains for agriculture but farmers must unite and remain united in order to hold what they now have and build for a permanent farm parity.

Silos and Silage

Quite frequently you see a person who doesn't care for kraut, but did you ever see a cow that didn't like silage? The principle of preservation is very much the same. Kraut is made of cabbage. Silage is made of corn, cane, grass, or any good forage. Silage is put up in a bigger jar.

For years it was thought that leguminous crops would not do for silage largely because the product had a bad odor which was imparted to the milk of the cows that ate it. But again research came to the rescue and sprinkled enough common molasses on the silage as it went into the silo to give it the proper acid reaction as fermentation got under way and that problem was solved. It was also discovered that the addition of phosphoric acid in solution would likewise make things just right.

So now, if a rainy spell sets in just when the alfalfa should be cut, you don't have to worry about saving the hay. You can cut it, let it wilt just a little, chop it up, sprinkle molasses or phosphoric acid solution on it, and blow in into the silo. Heavy cowpoe hay is notably hard to cure. Blast that into the silo too (be sure to use molasses or phosphoric acid), and forget it until the cattle start belching for feed.

The discovery of the use of molasses and phosphoric acid let the bars down. You can make good silage out of any good forage crop. If along about April the cattle and sheep and hogs can't keep down the crimson clover and ryegrass, start the mowing, the rake, the wagons, and the silage cutter. You'll get the cheapest good feed you ever fed in your life and it will come in handy when the drouth hits or a bad winter bears down on you. The bluegrass of Kentucky and Virginia the orchard grass of anywhere, the red clover, timothy, lespedeza, or what have you—all can be preserved in the silo.—The Progressive Farmer.

Poultry Quality Maintained by Culling Hens

STILLWATER, Okla. — If you would have culled that hen last year, cull her this year too, in spite of rising egg prices.

Acknowledging that he anticipates a marked rise in the numbers of poultry on Oklahoma farms this fall, R. B. Thompson, head of the poultry department at the Oklahoma A. and M. College, warns against any lowering of quality to obtain quantity.

"The hen won't lay any more just because there's a war going on and egg prices are high," he said. "So unless she's good, don't keep her just because you have her. It's still a good policy to cull the non-layer."

If egg prices continue to hold and feed continues abundant, state farmers will probably increase poultry flock numbers. Many Oklahoma hatcheries are planning to have a good hatch of chicks beginning in October, and Thompson expects a sizeable crop of fall broilers in the state this fall.

There are not as many hens in the state this year as usual because during 1940 people were not buying chicks. During the past spring however, hatcherymen were able to sell everything they hatched.

Maintaining of quality, however, will be important this year as formerly. Culling practices were developed during World War I, and will prove successful under the present emergency as well as then, when poultrymen found them essential to profit.

High Producing Dairy Cows are Most Profitable

COLLEGE STATION — Records for 1940 of the Texas Dairy Herd Improvement Association show that high producing cows are the most profitable, says G. G. Gibson, assistant dairyman of the A. and M. College Extension Service.

The total feed cost of a 400 pound butterfat cow was \$44 more than for the 100 pound butterfat cow. At the same time, the income above feed cost for the 400 pound producer was \$61 more than for the 100 pound butterfat animal. The low producing cow had a total feed cost of 25 cents a pound butterfat while the feed cost for the high producer was 17 cents, or eight cents a pound less.

Costs for roughage and grain increase with production, Gibson says. But dairymen expect to feed more grain or concentrates to the high producing cows in order to get more production. For example, the records show that grain costs increased from \$10 for the low cost to \$47 for the high, but the income above feed cost was \$10 and \$24, respectively.

"Now and then we find dairymen who question the advisability of feeding for capacity production," Gibson observes. "It is unwise to push dairy cows to the point where there is a likelihood of doing physical injury. On the other hand it is poor business to allow a cow to loaf along at half capacity. Dairy animals should carry a capacity load like any farm equipment. When we have a dairy cow capable of 350 pounds of butterfat a year under ordinary herd conditions we should give her a 350 opportunity to produce."

"This does not mean that we should try to make a 400 butterfat producer out of a 300 pounds butterfat inheritance. By using our dairy herd improvement association records to feed each cow according to production we can steer clear of that difficulty."

New Food Guide

A new food guide worked out by the Food and Nutrition Committee of the National Research Council gives kinds and quantities of food Americans of all ages should eat for good health. Here is the daily diet which would measure up to these proposals:

"One pint of milk for an adult and more for a child.

"A serving of meat (cheaper cuts are just as nutritious).

"One egg, or suitable substitute such as navy beans.

"Two vegetables, one of which should be green or yellow.

"Two fruits, one of which should be rich in vitamin C (found abundantly in citrus fruits and tomatoes).

"Breads, flour, and cereal, most or preferably all whole grain or enriched.

"Some butter or oleomargarine with vitamin A added.

"Other foods to satisfy the appetite."

Dr. Thomas Parran warns that this is no narrow guide from which to draw. If your diet does not reach these standards the situation is dangerous. Paul V. McNutt, chairman of the Nutrition Conference, sounded a timely warning about apparently lazy people who in reality suffer from hollow hunger. "We know that a lot of people regarded as poor prospects for jobs need food. They are set down in personnel records as lazy or dumb. In the learned language of personnel analysis, we find them marked as 'slow to adjust to job situations.' What is really wrong with them is they are hungry."—The Progressive Farmer.

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Texas Farm Troubles

Lack of breeding stock is limiting the increase in production of dairy products in Texas, according to E. R. Eudaly and G. C. Gibson, dairy husbandmen. They are attacking the production problem by advocating better feeding of cattle, and explaining that at the present time 1 pound of butterfat will buy 30 pounds of feed. Improved quality of dairy cattle was evident at the 20 Dairy Day programs held in the state in recent weeks.

Although cattlemen are rejoicing that prices are good, grass is abundant and livestock is in good shape, they have a hard fight ahead of them in controlling parasites, says Cameron Siddall, extension entomologist.

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Schedule of Charges for Privileges at Lake Fryer are Announced

Observe Safety Rules at Lake

There are going to be large crowds at Lake Fryer August 9-10 at the second annual opening celebration and again it is fitting that safety be urged to every one who visits the resort.

Extra precautions will be in force throughout the two days with added officers on duty to help prevent accidents or drownings. On the other hand people, themselves, can do more to prevent accidents around lakes by knowing rules and adhering to them at all times.

Swimming rules have not changed one iota since the beginning of time. Everyone knows not to go bathing too soon after eating and to take a cold shower before entering the pool when weather is hot. Senior life guards will be on duty at all times at Lake Fryer and people are cautioned not to swim in any part of the lake other than the swimming area. People caught diving from boats will be expelled from the lake, government officials have announced.

Boating is lots of fun and one of the major sports of the Panhandle today but like all thrilling sports is dangerous unless you know the rules. Just as in automobile driving there are laws governing boats on inland waters. One of the first rules to learn is right-of-way rules. Row boats have the right of way at all times and over all craft. Sail boats have the right of way over powered boats and the small motor boats over the inboard boats with only one exception and that is all passenger or commercial boats have the right of way at landing docks or piers. When passing a boat always do so on the left side. Never throw back wash toward another boat as this is liable to flip their boat before they can have an opportunity to set a course.

All boats on lakes must be equipped with running lights at least thirty minutes before sundown and thirty minutes after sunrise. These lights should show red on the port side (left side) and green on the starboard (right side) with a white pilot light on the boat's stern and visible above the driver's head.

Boats for hire or passenger rides must be cleared by the concessionaire as to safety. They must be equipped with safety cushions or life jackets, one for each passenger. They must have fire extinguishers aboard. They must have a tow line or ring buoy for rescue work and absolutely no one under the influence of intoxicants will be allowed to drive a boat or ride with passengers.

When you have docked your boat common decency requires that you move it away from the landing area for other boats to use.

All boaters are required to know regulations on all lakes both private and general and should acquaint themselves with flag and light signals. A red flag indicates an approaching storm and means for all boats to get off the lake immediately. A red flag with a black center indicates a hurricane the world over and in the Panhandle means a wind storm is approaching. Boaters should never "turn tail" and run with the waves as water will come in the stern and swamp your boat. The best method is to head into the waves and ride it out or at such a degree into the waves that the bow of the boat takes all the pounding of the white caps.

Sail boats and motor boats must carry either a flash light or lantern aboard and lighted after dusk. To be sure at all times remember to ask the boat house man the capacity of the boat you are using and remember "Water plays for keeps".

Last Will and Testament

And all meadows, with the clover blossoms and butterflies thereof; the squirrels and the birds and the echoes and strange noises, and all distant places, which may be visited together with adventures there found. And I give to said boys each his own place at the fireside at night, with all pictures that may be seen in the burning wood, to enjoy without let or hindrance any encumbrance or care.

Item: To lovers, I devise their imaginary world, with whatever they may need, as the stars in the sky, the red roses by the wall, the bloom of the hawthorn, the sweet strains of music, and aught else they may desire to figure to each other the lastness and beauty of their love.

Item: To young men jointly I bequeath all the boisterous, inspiring sports of rivalry, and give to them the disdain of weakness and undaunted confidence in their own strength. I leave to them the power to make lasting friendships and of possessing companions, and to them, exclusively, I give all merry songs and choruses to sing with lusty voices.

Item: And to those who are no longer children or youths, or lovers, I leave memory; and bequeath to them the volumes of poems of Burns and Shakespeare and other poets, if there be others, to the end that they may live the old days over again, freely and without tithe or diminution.

Item: To the loved ones with snowy crowns, I bequeath the happiness of old age, the love and gratitude of their children until they fall asleep.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Combine Faith and Good Works

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Aug. 10.

Text: James 1:17-22; 2:14-17; 4:13-17; 5:12.

IN the last lesson, we were dealing with Paul's emphasis upon salvation by faith. Here, drawn from different passages in the epistle of James, we have an opportunity to see the other side of salvation and the Christian reference from the standpoint of character and conduct.

James, just as much as Paul, believes faith is the very foundation of Christian living and of salvation. So he asks very pointedly, "What doth it profit, my brethren, if a man say he hath faith, but have not works? can that faith save him?"

What he is saying is that such a man has no faith at all, for he brings it down to a matter of definite human and Christian obligation. Here, he says, is a brother or sister who is without clothing and without food. If one says to such a person, "Be warm and filled," and does nothing to meet their need, he is certainly lacking in Christian works and also in any real faith.

JAMES makes a profound plea for plain, honest, practical Christian living. Faith is primary and basic, but faith and

works go together, and until we relate faith to character and conduct we do not come to understand what Christian faith is.

James, like Paul, emphasizes the fact that God is the source of all goodness. From Him comes every good and perfect gift, and with Him there is no variability or shadow of turning. His love and His grace are abiding, and every man who in faith accepts the obligations of the Christian life will find the power of God with him to help him.

Our Golden Text has given us a concise definition of religion which we cannot stress too strongly. "Pure religion and undefiled before our God and Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep oneself unstained from the world."

IT is this sort of religion which distinguished the early disciples. Paul believed in it just as much as James, but the world is still run largely on the basis of self-interest and not always "enlightened" self-interest.

True Christianity represents something deeper and brighter. It has produced humanitarian organizations and movements which lift mankind to motives of mutual aid. This, not self-interest, is the hope of the world's future.

Ordinance No. 155

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING SOLICITORS, PEDDLERS, ITINERANT MERCHANTS AND TRANSIENT VENDORS OF MERCHANDISE FROM GOING UPON THE PREMISES OF PRIVATE RESIDENCES WITHOUT AN INVITATION OF THE OWNER OR OCCUPANT THEREOF; PROVIDING A PERMIT; FIXING A PENALTY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, itinerant merchants, transient vendors of merchandise, and solicitors of every nature, have made a practice of forcing themselves in the homes of and attention to their wares on the citizens of Perryton, Texas; and, whereas, these merchants, vendors, and solicitors have perpetrated innumerable frauds upon the citizens of Perryton, Texas, and have caused substantial property damage by their actions;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCILMEN OF THE TOWN OF PERRYTON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any solicitors of orders for merchandise, peddlers, itinerant merchants, transient vendors of merchandise to go in and upon the premises of a private residence in the City of Perryton unless requested or invited so to do by the owner or occupant of said private residence for the purpose of soliciting orders for the sale of goods, wares and merchandise, or for the purpose of disposing of or peddling the same.

SECTION 2: Every solicitor of orders for the sale of merchandise, peddlers, itinerant merchants or transient vendors of merchandise shall obtain a permit from the City Clerk of the City of Perryton before soliciting any orders, offering for sale or selling any goods, wares or merchandise in the City of Perryton, and it shall be the duty of the City Clerk to make investigation of all persons offering so to do to determine their authority for making such sales and taking such orders, and before issuing a permit shall determine that they actually represent the parties they so claim to represent and that they are an actual bona fide representative of a reliable concern. Unless he so finds he shall refuse to issue a permit for the taking of orders and the selling of merchandise in the City of Perryton.

SECTION 3: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

SECTION 4: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

The fact that the United States District Court for the Northern District of Texas, Amarillo Division, has declared Ordinance No. 151, which deals with the subject of solicitors, peddlers, itinerant merchants and transient vendors of merchandise, void and that by reason thereof there is now no ordinance in effect in the City of Perryton dealing with the same, which fact creates an immediate need for this ordinance and creates an emergency and urgent public necessity, requiring that the rules and provisions providing for ordinances being read more than one time at more than one meeting be suspended and that this ordinance be passed and take effect as an emergency measure and such rules are accordingly suspended and this ordinance is passed and shall be in full force and effect immediately after its passage.

Finally passed and approved on this 5th day of August, 1941.

Rules Governing Boating on SCS Lakes in the Panhandle Area

The following regulations have been issued by the Soil Conservation Service governing boating on all government owned lakes in the Panhandle area.

Boats will be permitted in the lake only between the hours of 6 a. m. and 12 p. m. All boats must be checked in at the boathouse before 12 p. m.

All boats on the Lake must have a Boating Permit, which must be presented to government officers for inspection upon demand.

All boats must check in and out at the boathouse every day.

No boat shall be allowed on the lake which the government officers judge unsafe, unseaworthy, insufficiently equipped, or overloaded. Requisite equipment shall include sufficient life preservers to insure the safety of all occupants in all boats, and fire extinguishers in all motor propelled boats. All children must wear life jackets when in boats.

No boat should pass docks, other boats, or bathing areas at a speed or at such a close distance as to cause danger or annoyance by its wake.

All types of reckless use and operation of boats are definitely prohibited.

Row boats and canoes shall have right-of-way over all other boats; sailboats shall have right-of-way over motor boats; and sailboats and motor boats shall keep well to the right in passing other craft.

Bathing from boats is expressly prohibited in all parts of the lake.

No boat shall enter the area restricted for wildlife, or the area reserved for swimming, both of which are clearly marked.

No person shall be allowed in any boat while under the influence of intoxicants, nor may intoxicants be taken on any boat.

After dark, all boats must carry lights. Every motor-propelled boat and every sailboat must show a red light to port, a green light to starboard, and a white light at the stern; and every row boat and every canoe must show either a lantern or a flashlight. No spotlights or searchlights may be used while in boats.

The United States will not be liable in case of any accident, injury, or damage to any person or property which might occur in connection with any form of activity in the project area.

camp he jumped when he declared against extending the one year service of selectees a single day.

We are yet awaiting an answer to Col. Ernest Thompson's question to O'Daniel during the 1940 primary, "What did this 'Great Patriot' do for his country during the days of 1917-18?" That's a question O'Daniel never answered.

With a motto of "cowboy boots for cattle owners only" the Madisonville Sidewalk Cattlemen's Association attracted national attention when they ruled to wear boots one must be the owner of two head of cattle. The owner of three head could tuck one trousers leg in, the owner of four head could tuck both trousers legs in, and the owner of six or more head could wear spurs.

Some people remind us of buzzards and jackals, always in the offing to rush in and clean up on the kill. We know people that thrive on other peoples' misfortunes, ever on the alert and often wishing some neighbor hard luck so that they can buy his business, his farm, his home or his property at less than its real worth.

Here's one that'll take a lot of explaining! Recently we shipped a carload of news print into Liberal from Ontario, Canada, on which the freight rate was 69 cents per hundred pounds. In this car was 10,000 lbs. of news print for the Herald. The railroads and truck lines wanted 54 cents additional per hundred pounds to bring the 10,000 lbs. on down to Perryton, a distance of less than 50 miles by truck and a little over 100 miles by rail. And mind you, this 54 cent rate was based on the 10,000 quantity, it's 63 cents for less than 10,000 lbs.

Well, we refused to be held up for any such outrageous charge. The trucking company says that they wanted to establish a rate of 21 cents between Liberal and Perryton which is about right, but that they were forced by the ICC to base their rate on the number of railroad miles between Perryton and Liberal.

Now if this is the case we say it's wrong, in fact it's nothing but highway robbery. It seems to us that plain common old horse sense justifies shipping between two points by the shortest possible route and that the rate should be on the basis of miles hauled and not on the number of miles it takes to go by railroad. If you're asking us, we say it smells like something pretty rotten and it's the shippers of this area who are getting soaked in the neck and not the haulers, be they truckers or railroads.

Cowgirls calf roping contest offering a \$30 purse for the two days with no day money offered but winners based on best average time for the two days. No entry fee is required.

Cowboys wild steer riding contest offering a purse of \$100 per day with a \$4 entry fee covering both daily contests.
