LEAKE AYRES ATTENDS M. E. CHURCH CONFERENCE

Leake Ayres, member of the Board of Steward of the First Methodist Church of this city left this morning by automobile for Birmingham, Ala., where he will attend as a delegate of the central Texas conference to the quadrennial sessions of the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Mr. Ayres is one of the few laymen from Texas who will attend this conference, and it is in honor and recognition of his continued work in behalf of his church which causes his selection as a delegate.

At this meeting of especial interest, will be the question of merging the northern and southern branches of the church will be determined. A two-thirds vote of the conference is required to make the unification effective. The five Texas conferences have gone on record unanimously in favor of the merger.

When the general conference meets there will be five vacant bishoprics. Although the bishops who have no vote in the election have recommended that four be elected, it is expected that the conference will fill the five vacancies. Mrs. Ayres will accompany Mr. Ayres to Birmingham, Alabama.

"HILL CREST" PEARL H. NEWSPAPER WINS 2ND IN DISTRICT

Twenty four Texas school news papers have been named district winners in the Texas Interscholastic league Press Conference sponsored by Sigma Delta Chi, men's journalistic fraternity of the University of Texas, and Pearl High School's "Hill Crest" won second in the class C division of the Northeast District.

"The Trail" of Hamilton H. S. won 2nd in the B class. Each winning school is entitled to place two delegates in the five journalism contests—reporting, feature writing, editorial writing, headline writing and copy reading—at the State Meet of the Interscholastic League May 6-7 at Austin.

Class A schools have enrolled 500 or more, Class B, 200 to 500 and Class C schools of less than 200.

"DAIRY DAY" PROVES SUCCESS; 1,000 ATTENDING

Approximately 1,000 "came and went" at different times during the day of the Dairy Day held in Gatesville Saturday with some 35 animals being shown, which were for the most part Jersey cattle.

As outstanding points of the show, was the facts that this was the fourth show of its kind in the state, and there were two blue ribbon bulls here, whereas in the other shows only one had that many blue ribbon bulls, there are yet 16 more shows to be held in Texas.

Judges for the show included Jack Shelton, Director American Jersey Cattle Club, and vice-director of the Texas Extension Service; Chas. N. Sheppardson, head dairy dept., A. & M.; J. W. Ridgeway, Director, American Jersey Cattle Club and Production Manager, The Borden Co., San Antonio.

Other notables who took important parts in the show were: G. G. Gibson, Extension Service Dairyman, E. R. Eudaley, Extension Dairyman, D. T. Simmons, Fort Worth Fieldman, American Jersey Cattle Club; Edd Griffing, Waco, The Borden Co. H. H. Weatherby, Assistant County agent, Waco.

The program of course consisted of judging of the animals by the judges, and a special judging contest for the specta-

tors, 4-H boys FFA, who placed certain animals, 1, 2, 3 and 4 after which the judges told them how they should be judged and why. Merchandise prizes were offered for the winners in this contest.

AUDITOR GIVES CITY CLEAN BILL OF HEALTH

Looking over the audit just completed for the city by Frank L. Wilcox & Co. Certified Public Accountants of Waco, the City Administration has been given a "clean bill of health" We quote a part, as follows:

"Bonded Debt \$62,500.00. During the two years under audit this indebtedness has been reduced by \$11,500.00 as compared with the reduction of \$0,500.00 during the previous two year period."

"General. The figures shown in this report reflect the excellent financial progress made by the city during the past two years. The balance in the General Fund and Water Fund are ample. The interest and sinking fund balances are in excess of requirements, and the steady reduction in bonded debt has continued. The increase in Note and Warrant Debt is most conservative when compared with the benefits accruing from the Junior High School building, the new fire equipment and the improved streets."

WM. (BILL) McCRAW OPENED AT ARLINGTON SAT.

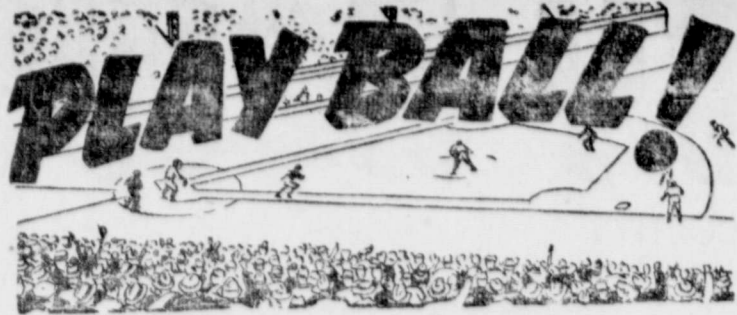

Attorney General now, and candidate for Governor in the 1938 struggle to name the ranking executive of the enormous State of Texas, Wm. (Bill) McCraw, fired his first gun in Arlington, his home town in the presence of some 20,000 spectators and supporters, besides a probable vast radio audience over the TQN radio stations.

In the 30 minute speech McCraw outlined his platform and campaign, and said briefly, "My ambition to serve Texas as its governor is prompted by recognition of the opportunity that is presented for substantial accomplishment . . .". In addition, he pledged humanized aid, need of reorganization of the state government, better pay, better hours, more leisure, more purchasing power and more security against the hazards and vicissitudes of life and more efficiency in government.

It was a home coming for McCraw in his birth city, and a rousing welcome was given him, bands from Ft. Worth and Dallas special trains being run from many Texas points, besides motorcades and other visitors.



BASEBALL CHATTER By Post

Play in the Coryell County Sunday baseball league will start Sunday May 1st, regardless of the number of teams entered in the race. In the meeting Thursday night a definite set of rules was adopted, and if any team wishes to enter the league he should send in his list of eligible players to the league secretary. It is necessary that these players be in the secretary's office by 6 o'clock, Wednesday, April 28. After that it will be too late.

Each team is allowed fifteen men, and they must be sent in on the original roster in order to be eligible to play at any time during the season. If a manager knows of a player whose name is within a 10 mile radius of his team's community, but the player is off attending school, he should list his name on his original roster. He must do this in order to have this player eligible for participation when he returns home from school. Each team is allowed fifteen players and no more. If the manager plays with the team, he could be on the active list. A complete set of rules adopted by the league appears elsewhere in this issue. All managers are requested to read it carefully.

The secretary will attempt to keep complete batting, fielding, etc. records, and in order to do this each team must point an official scorer and

have him send in a complete box score after each game is played.

In the high school league Flat won its second victory by eking out Turnersville 4-3. In the only other game they have played this season they won another one point victory over the same Turnersville team.

Gatesville pounded three Ireland slabbists for 20 hits and 22 runs in defeating the hapless Ireland Cardinals, 22-5. Ireland garnered two runs in the first inning, when Rutherford was wild and had to ease up trying to get them over the plate. The fireworks in the gubernatorial race open in earnest this week with Attorney General William McCraw opening his campaign with a gigantic rally at Arlington and with Ernest Thompson making his "East Texas opening" at Sulphur Springs.

Saturday, April 23 has been designated as McCraw homecoming day at Arlington and some 25,000 North Texas people are expected to attend. In order to insure a record-breaking turnout of Dallasites at the celebration, friends of McCraw have chartered a special train to convey supporters of the candidate to and from the rally free of charge.

Thompson Saturday afternoon will make the second speech of his campaign after his opening last week at Waco. Delegation of Thompson supporters from many East Texas cities will gather at Sulphur Springs.

Sulphur Springs will be the site of the opening campaign blast of Gerald C. Mann, candidate for attorney general, who on April 30 will speak before one of the greatest state-wide rallies of the year.

District Judge Ralph Yarbrough of Austin opened his campaign for attorney general Tuesday night at Tyler.

The other three candidates, Lieutenant Governor Walter Woodul of Houston, Speaker of the House, Robert G. Calvert of Hillsboro and District Attorney Lewis Goodrich of Shamrock, have not announced when they will open their campaigns.

Discussion of the moment about the governor's race is whether the nominee will be decided in the first primary. Politics are inclined to believe that either Thompson or McCraw will win in July provided no other candidates enter. It is generally agreed that should Harry Hines and or Tom F. Hunter enter a second race would be necessary.

In informed quarters little importance is attached to the candidacy of Karl Crowley who resigned a \$6,500 job as solicitor general to the Post Office Department in Washington to enter the race.

Crowley is without political background in Texas and must campaign without friends and political organization which are supporting both Bill McCraw and Ernest Thompson. McCraw has been in state politics since 1931 and has been an unofficial candidate for governor since that date. Thompson, it is believed has had an eye on the governorship since he became a member of the railroad commission in 1932.

Crowley perhaps counts upon the support of the national administration to master strength among devout Texas new dealers. No one knows just what assurances of support he may have from President Roosevelt and National Chairman Jim Farley. At any rate, Crowley is given little chance of nosing out either McCraw or Thompson for a place on the second primary ballot.

Tom Hunter is now touring the state sounding out sentiment in the governor's race. A three-time gubernatorial candidate, Hunter is said to be anxious to

If Hunter and Hines run, Wichita Falls will have residents in the Governor's race for the fourth consecutive time. Hunter carried the banner of the Northwest Texas city in 1932, when he ran third in the first primary Allred Hunter and C. C. McDonald were Wichita Falls' citizens who ran in 1934. In 1936, Hunter and Allred were again on the ballot, Allred winning in the first primary with a majority over the field of five.

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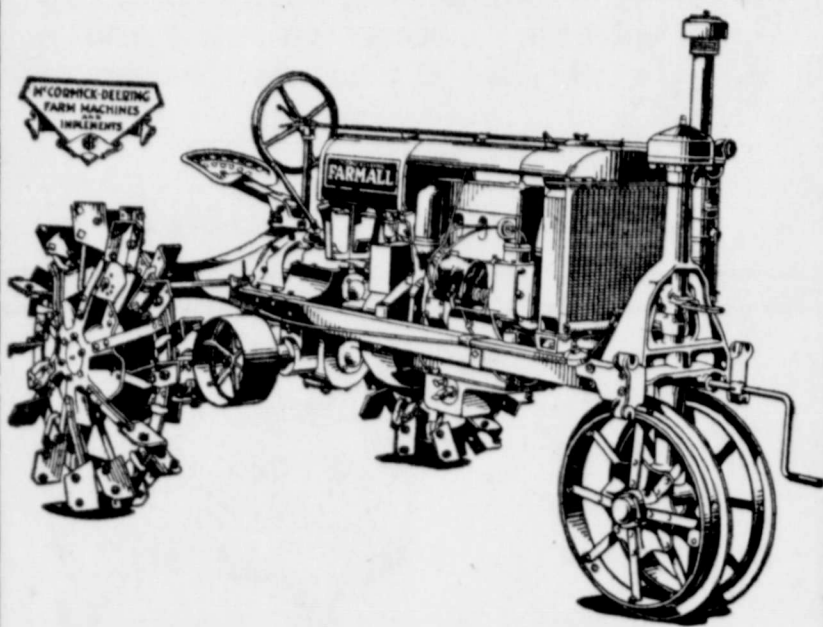

MENU'S



For ME 'N YOU

There need not be no lack of variety in the salads you serve these days, what with the market full of tempting new vegetables fairly begging to be combined with some delectable piquant dressing and included on your menus.

MACEDONIE OF VEGETABLE SALAD

1 can lima beans, 1 cup cooked, diced carrots, 1 cup celery cut fine, French dressing. Lettuce Beets, 4 hard-cooked eggs.

Drain beets and carrots. Clean and cut celery. Toss together with French dressing. Chill. Arrange on crisp lettuce leaves just before serving and garnish with sliced beets and quartered hard-cooked eggs. Pass a bowl of mayonnaise with the salad.

CALIFLOWER AND TOMATO SALAD

This salad consists of cauliflower separated into flowerets and sliced very, very thin. Tomatoes are cut in thin edges and the two tossed together with a sharply flavored French dressing.

FRENCH DRESSING

1 garlic clove ½ cup salad or olive oil, ½ tsp. salt, 3 tbsp. vinegar or lemon juice, few

grains pepper, one-fourth tsp. paprika.

Add all ingredients and stir vigorously with a fork. Remove garlic and beat dressing before serving.

PECAN BUDWOOD

Uses of Budwood

Budwood that has been seasoned need not be wasted if the budding operation is interrupted for any reason, Rosborough said. Such wood can be held for 18 to 25 days by placing it back in a temperature of 36 to 40 degrees.

Thoroughly dormant budwood should be used for grafting, according to the horticulturist. Such wood is taken directly from storage and should be used within 24 to 48 hours.

Pecan Budding and Grafting Notes

Farmers who desire to bud pecan trees but have no bud wood stored may still work their trees over by cutting fresh budwood from trees, according to J. F. Rosborough.

At the base of the previous year's growth are some 4 to 8 buds that have not been forced out, he pointed out. Bud sticks

may be cut from this growth and packed in damp shavings at a temperature of 36 to 40 degrees. So treated the wood may be held for a week or two before use.

After July 15 the current growth of pecan trees may be used as budwood. The leaves should be trimmed off to within a quarter of an inch of the stake. Such wood, like the bud sticks of the previous year's growth, may be used at once or held for as long as 14 days by packing it in damp shavings and lowering the temperature.

Cold Storage budwood cut in February must be seasoned before it is used. This is done by placing the sticks in damp sawdust and hold them at a temperature of from 80 to 85 degrees. During April it usually takes from 6 to 8 days before the buds ship well; in May, as it becomes warmer only 4 to 6 days are needed. In June 3 to 4 days is generally enough.

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
