## Sat. Night Hail Does Damage In Burkburnett

Hail, driven by hard wind did considerable damage to property in Burkburnett last Saturday night just after dark.

This area was in a tornado alert from 3:00 P. M. to 9:00 P. M. Clouds had been bunching up late in the afternoon, traveling in a north easterly direction. After nightfall the wind changed to the north and at times to the northwest. Rain accompanied the hail.

The worst damage occurred in the eastern part of town. Houses and car glass- es were damaged in the Roselawn area. Hail fell the size of hen eggs. The ground was completely covered at one time and many people gathered up the big ones to put in the deep freeze.

Mathis new car yard on the east side had extensive damage. A four inch steel pipe post set in concrete and guyed down, was blown over and draped across the top of a new car.

It will probably be Tuesday before the full extent of the damage is realized.

and Social Security

Old age survivors and disability insurance benefits are becoming increasingly important as a community resource according to Erton F. Tate, District Manager of the Wichita Falls office of the Social Security Administration.

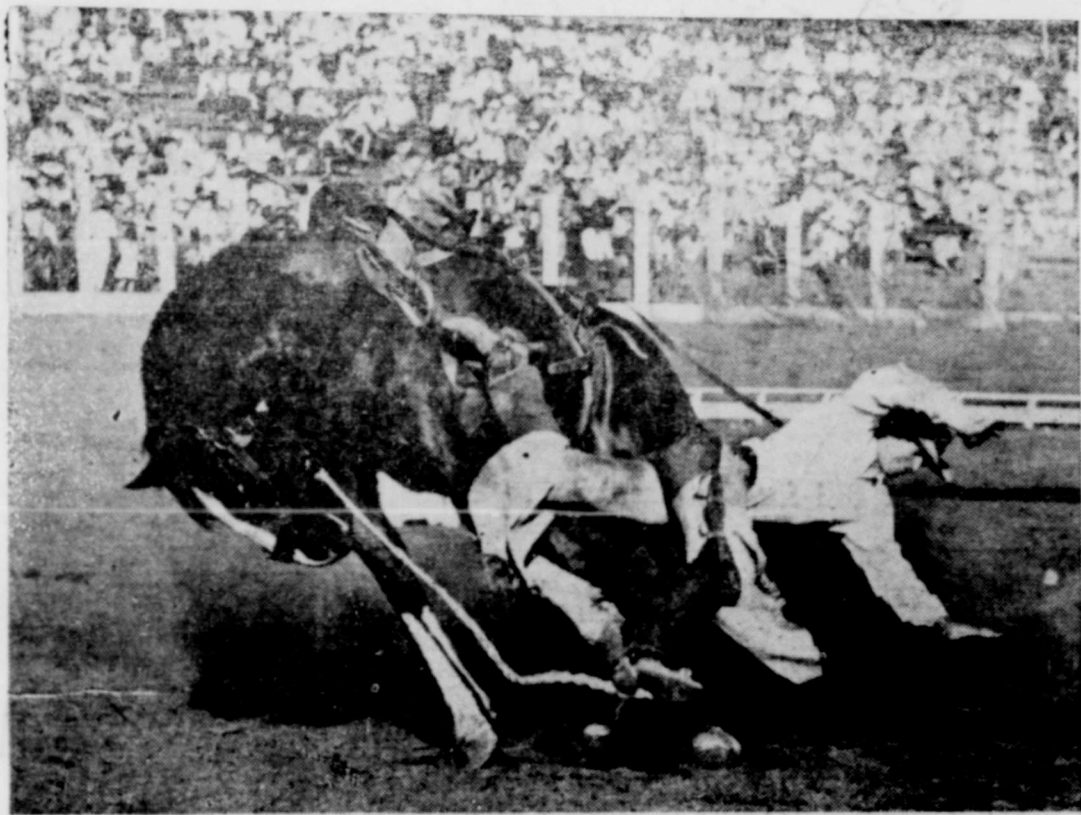
\$558,054 is paid monthly in social security benefits in Wichita County. This is an increase of about 19 percent over last year's figures. While the benefits are intended primarily for the beneficiaries' economic security, they help business in the community generally. Most of the money is spent immediately for food, clothing and other necessities.

At the present time, social security benefits are being paid at a rate of over one billion dollars a month. There are several reasons for the increase Tate said. There are more aged people; benefits are now payable at age 62; and less social security credit is needed to meet the eligibility requirements for benefits.

The average old-age benefit nationally for December, 1961, was \$75.65 for a retired worker. In the State of Texas, the average benefit was \$68.23.

Burkburnett's 17th Annual "Boomtown" Rodeo is just around the corner - in fact, there are only 20 days until Wednesday, June 13, opening day of the rodeo.

Members of Burkburnett's Rodeo Committee, all volunteers contributing spare time away from their daily jobs, have been busy as beavers. The rodeo is taking shape. Most loose ends of Burkburnett's annual main event have been found and bound by the Rodeo Committee.

There are still a couple of dangling lines that seem to have grown too large for the Rodeo Committee. One of these is the aorta or life-line of the Rodeo - ticket sales. Last year, the "Boomtown" Rodeo sold less than a \$1,000 in advance ticket sales. The rains came, all three nights, and the economic structure of the rodeo crumbled to rubble. So badly, that there is still a \$3,000 deficit.

### Solution Up To Burkburnett

This year the Rodeo Committee, and all of Burkburnett, want to avoid this pitfall. One way to do so is by hedging, or supplying yourself a "cushion" to fall back on in case of inclement weather. Advance ticket sales is the only reasonable solution. Of course, the easiest solution is by not having the "Boomtown" Rodeo, but that is the course of a quitter, of a dying community - not Burkburnett's solution. Burkburnett prides itself in being a prosperous community - and justly so. And it will continue to flourish so long as the community accepts challenges such as the "Boomtown" Rodeo, with all of Burkburnett's citizens accepting their share of the responsibility.

It is true the primary responsibility lies with the Rodeo Committee to insure the success of the rodeo. This responsibility has been accepted by them. But, let's face it, the basic responsibility lies with every citizen of Burkburnett. The rodeo is a tradition of Burkburnett. For sixteen years the citizens of Burkburnett have talked with pride about their annual successful rodeo. Last year was a disappointment, sure, but we cannot afford to become complacent and discouraged because of one bad year out of seventeen.

Now then, what is this article all about? It is about a group of men and women who have been working hard for the past several months in preparation for this year's rodeo. Their outlook has been, and still is, highly optimistic, but they have reached a point where they need assistance.

That assistance is to boost advance ticket sales - to provide this year's "Boomtown" Rodeo with a cushion. Who can be of assistance to this Rodeo Committee? Everyone, especially the town's merchants who come in daily contact with the people of Burkburnett. They can sell these tickets, not only to their customers, but also to businesses they themselves patronize.

The Rodeo Committee asks that each merchant render his assistance by selling Rodeo tickets this year. You will be contacted soon by Rodeo Committee members. Open your door to them. Accept a few tickets, sell them, and give Burkburnett a cushion this year. Help make this year's rodeo one of the most successful ever and at the same time prove that Burkburnett is a growing and progressive town with responsible citizens.

**IDEAS ARE CONTAGIOUS**

It was just 20 years ago that General Motors instituted a company-wide practice—that of encouraging the employee to use his initiative and rewarding him suitably—that has since become almost universal in American industry.

Since 1942, said President John F. Gordon in announcing the Suggestion Plan anniversary, GM workers have received more than \$40 million for ideas that have made jobs safer, work more efficient, and production better. Moreover, he noted, participation has expanded rapidly in recent years as workers experienced the satisfaction of seeing their suggestions put to work.

In 1961, he said, five times as many suggestions were submitted and adopted as in 1950. The year's awards, totaling \$5,159,543, were well over five times those of 1950 and more than the total paid out during the first eight years of the program. As an indication of the general enthusiasm, Mr. Gordon noted that five divisions and six plants racked up an employee participation rate of 100 per cent.

Considering that 116,871, or just about 25 per cent, of the total 1961 suggestions were adopted, that 56 workers won maximum awards of \$5,000 and that there were 508 awards of \$1,000 or more, this should not be difficult to understand.

To be more personal, consider George M. Herzig, a Fisher Body worker at Hamilton, Ohio. He lives in a fine new home that he financed largely out of the more than \$37,000 his suggestions have thus made for him.

While Mr. Herzig is the top money winner, others have doubtless enjoyed equal satisfaction. There's Byron K. Donahue, a millwright in the Los Angeles Fisher Body plant, whose suggestion money, together with contributions from others in his church, equipped a little Mexican church in Lower California with a new bell, an organ and 100 bibles. A Pontiac, Michigan, worker used his winnings to bring a young Italian to this country and finance most of his education in an electronics trade school. Others, hundreds of them, applied their awards to college funds for their children, retirement funds, home improvement, appliances and new cars.

It is also interesting to speculate, on this 20th anniversary, on what some of those 869,100 ideas adopted since 1942 may have done for U.S.

Another Bill for the Customer to Pay

President Wagner of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States is critical of employers who pay lip service to hiring qualified handicapped persons and don't follow through. In his words, "Mere acceptance of the idea that handicapped persons can make good employees is a long way removed from actually hiring them. And the boss who says that they should be hired but does nothing to make sure that employment opportunities are available to them, falls short of doing a good job."

Representative Van Zandt of Pennsylvania asks a ban on St. Lawrence Seaway promotion using tax dollars or toll revenues. In his view, if the Seaway is benefiting Great Lakes port cities, "it is clearly detrimental to ports such as New York, Philadelphia, Hampton Roads, New Orleans and Galveston, as well as to the railroads with which the Seaway is in competition."

U. S. News and World Report recalls that in 1958 Khrushchev announced a plan to increase farm output 70 per cent by 1965. Production in 1961 would have had to show a rise of 20 per cent if the schedule was met. Actually, production declined by 6 per cent in the 1958-61 period.

Modest reduction in the cost of dairy products are anticipated. Reason is a cut in federal price supports to the minimum legal level.

## Farm Facts

According to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, an hour of farm labor produces four times as much food and fiber as it did 40 years ago.

Productivity of farm workers increased by 6 1/2% a year during the 1950's—about three times the increased output in non-agricultural industry, which went up 2% per year.

The average productivity per farm worker has more than doubled in the last 20 years. In fact, it has gone up more in the last two decades than in all recorded time prior to 1940.

Crop production is 65% greater per acre than it was 40 years ago, and output per breeding animal is 88% higher.

In 1910, it took a farmer 135 hours to produce 100 bushels of corn, 106 hours for 100 bushels of wheat, and 276

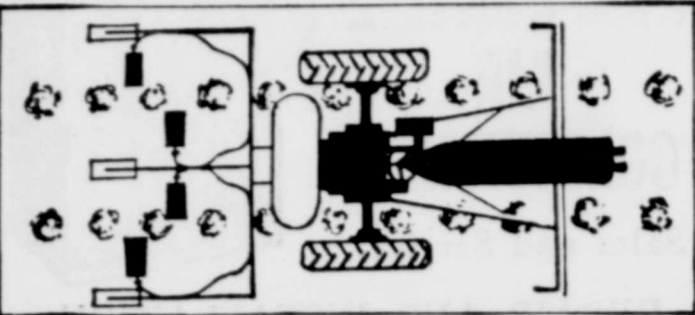


Hourly farm output is four times that of 40 years ago.

hours for a bale of cotton.

In 1960, it took about 15 man-hours to produce 100 bushels of corn, 13 for 100 bushels of wheat, and 57 for a bale of cotton.

## Peacetime Flame Throwers

Skeptics laughed when Alabama farmer Price C. McLe-more pulled a "flame thrower" down his rows of cotton to kill the weeds back in the 1930's. They figured he'd lose more cotton than weeds with that kind of cultivation.

Today, with greatly improved equipment and techniques, LP-gas "flame cultivation" of weeds in row crops has now become an established agricultural practice. The flames make steam of the water in the cells of many weeds, and kill them by millions of tiny internal explosions.

At first only cotton stalks were believed tough enough to take the punishment of flame. Today, with pinpoint control, LP-gas flame cultivators control weeds in scores of grain, vegetable and fruit crops. The cultivators are pulled by tractors powered with the high octane LP-gas.

Flame cultivation has brought

the \$100 an acre cost of hand weeding onions down to \$5. One man with a flame cultivator can replace 40 with hoes. About five gallons of LP-gas per acre is all that's usually required for most crops.

Surprisingly helpful side effects turned up in LP-gas flame cultivation experiments. Some 30 years ago the first tests on cotton showed that the bolts of fiber set higher on the plant, making it easier for mechanical cotton pickers. Now it's known that some diseased crops can be burned back to ground surface level and re-emerge as healthy plants.



## Family FINANCIAL PROTECTION

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. What is "limited payment life insurance?"

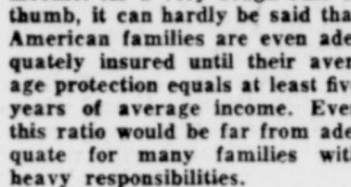
A. It is a type of policy which provides permanent protection, but on which the premium payments stop at the end of a specified number of years or when the policyholder reaches a certain age.

For example, premiums on a 20-pay life policy are payable for a maximum of 20 years (unless the policyholder dies prior to 20 years), but the policy remains in full force for life.

Q. Don't a lot of families have too much life insurance?

A. On the whole, American families are far from over-insured.

At the end of 1960, the average amount of life insurance owned per family was about \$10,200, which was equivalent to only about 20 months of average family income. As a very rough rule of thumb, it can hardly be said that American families are even adequately insured until their average protection equals at least five years of average income. Even this ratio would be far from adequate for many families with heavy responsibilities.



No rule of thumb or national average can determine the specific life insurance needs of an individual family. Besides their current income, some factors to be considered are: the parents' ages, the number and ages of the children, plans for sending the children to college, the father's prospects for job advancement and increased income, whether they own or rent their home, the size of their mortgage and other debts, the mother's employability if the father should die, their savings and other resources, and their retirement program.

As a practical matter, it is hard to conceive of a family having more life insurance than they need for a secure financial future. However, it is possible for a family to have an insurance program that is unbalanced and unsuited to their special needs. For example, a family might be carrying sufficient insurance to protect them in case the father should die at an early age, but not arranged to help them build an educational or retirement fund.

A good life insurance agent can help a family set up a balanced life insurance program.

## Lobbyists Jubilant Over Tax Vote; Some Solons Cheer, Others Sulk

Austin—(UPI)—Sales tax lobbyist Tom Sealy stood jubilantly in the Capitol rotunda and cried "Peace" to passers-by.

It was indeed "peace" for Sealy and his Citizens for a Sales Tax organization. The tax package would raise \$319 million with a 2 per cent sales tax on most items costing more than 24 cents.

The Capitol had the atmosphere of both a Roman carnival and a wake as lawmakers salvaged the 30-day special session with last-minute action on taxation and spending.

Lobbyists were jubilant.

Victors cavorted in the

House chamber, where the tax measure passed 83-62.

Lobbyists charged they were denied their constitutional rights. They harangued Speaker James Turman in personal privilege speeches, and charged the Legislature with selling out the people.

Some argued, others sulked and many slumped dejectedly in their chairs. Senators handled their chores quietly. They limited debate and avoided theatrics.

Both chambers played to standing-room only crowds.

Lawmakers gave a historic performance. They approved the largest budget and largest tax bill

ever passed by the Legislature.

Lobbyists were gleeful over escaping a heavy load of business and industrial taxes.

One lawmaker commented, "The T.M.A. (Texas Manufacturers' Assn.) flag is flying over the Capitol tonight."

Temper flared after the tax bill passed. Some lawmakers were ready for violence.

Rep. Neil Caldwell of Alvin, one of the losers, calmed things with a remark to the House that "fist fights don't accomplish anything in alleys and they don't accomplish anything on the floor."

The present sales tax with its inequities was passed only with the pressure of the large lobbies in Austin. We need a man in Place 2 who will work for the people, not the lobbies.

Let's have more effective, more imaginative, and more active representation in Place 2.

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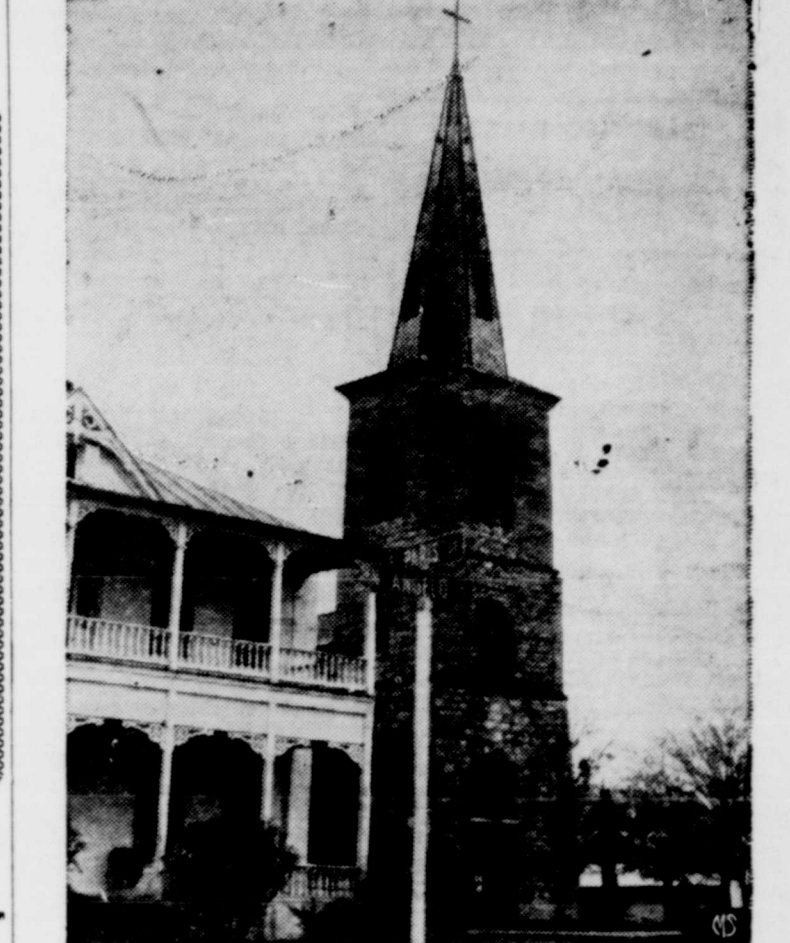

### PIONEER TEXANS AND FRENCHMEN



In Castroville, 25 miles west of San Antonio, the spire of Saint Louis Church is a symbol of Frenchmen in Texas during the pioneer days of the Texas Republic. Appropriately located, the French colonial edifice stands at Paris and Angelo streets.  
Saint Louis Church was begun in 1847 by Abbe Domenach, and completed in 1850. Mesquite and local oak timber were used to frame stained glass windows brought from Galveston.  
In early Spring, links between Texas and France will be renewed once more in a very special way when Air France 707 jetliners open direct service between Houston and Paris. On board "The Parisian" service, travelers will be whisked over the 5,037-mile route in 9 hours and 20 minutes. Today, as before, the ties between Texas and France are founded on hospitality, mutual interests, and friendship.  
In many places, Frenchmen marked their role in the Texas Republic's history. General Sam Houston was received in Austin at the French Embassy, then presided over by Count Dubois de Saligny. In the 1850's, 2,134 French pioneers established farms on the Rio Grande River and founded such towns as D'Hanis, and Quilhi which still dot the map of Texas. French settlers also founded in 1859 the colony of "La Reunion" on the Trinity River across from what is today the City of Dallas.  
Now, Air France jets will bridge the distance between Texas and France three times weekly, a further impetus to traditional understanding through travel of Europeans and Americans.

## HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS

With the drone of power-driven lawn mowers about to start, cases of chopped finger tips and serious injuries by mower-propelled missiles will climb sharply.

Neither power nor hand-driven mowers are completely safe in use because they can cut most things they touch besides grass.

Rotary power mowers have blades which spin at tremendous speeds cutting everything in their sweep—grass, weeds, fingers and toes.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that 75,000 power mower accidents occur each year. More than half the injuries are to the feet and hands. About one-third involve different parts of the body when stones or pieces of metal are thrown by the mower blades.

These missiles can have the impact of a 22-calibre bullet. Since most injuries are due to carelessness or error on the part of persons using mowers, the Texas State Department of Health advises the following precautions:

First, remove stones, sticks and other objects from the lawn. Then check all bolts, nuts and screws to see that they are properly tightened.

Add fuel before starting the engine, never while the engine is running and keep hands and feet away from mowers when starting and mowing.

Learn how to stop the mower's engine quickly. Children and pets should be at a safe distance from the mower, preferably inside the house.

Always stop the engine before pushing the mower across gravel driveways, walks or roads and be sure of your footing when mowing slopes or when grass is wet.

Never plug in an electric mower when it's raining or when the grass is still wet and always check the cord to be sure it is in perfect condition.

The mower should always be moving away from the operator and remember that sit-down mowers have a habit of turning over on sloping ground. Disconnect the spark wire be-
