O. Anderson Is Renamed Chief Cisco Volunteer Fire Department

O. (Andy) Anderson, West Texas Utilities service manager, was re-named Fire Chief of Cisco Volunteer Fire Department for the second year in an election Tuesday night at Fireman's hall.

According to a department spokesman, four of the original officers were re-elected. Officers include Pete Clemens, assistant fire chief; Bill Hall, secretary, and E. S. Sledge, captain.

Anderson was elected department lieutenant, the fifth year, he succeeds C. L. Tume. Prior to the election, routine duties were held with Clemens acting in the absence of Anderson, who is in Chicago this week, in charge of inspections. Pumper and hose lessons were discussed and firemen conducted a general inspection of equipment.

Once every four weeks, the department is required to flush and repair equipment and hose, as disclosed.

Clemens praised Ciscoans' property owners, in general, for the tireless cooperation in the department. "From the Cisco Fire Department has been recognized as one of the leading volunteer organizations in the state," he said. "All of which is tributed to our team work."

Due to the decline of major insurance in Cisco for the past year, longer, insurance rates for property owners were reduced in the lowest brackets. Approximately 19 members are present for the election, Olin Odum, newly appointed fire and police commissioner, presided the group.

In addition to the election, Don C. R. Padgett, Jay Garde, and Bill Kendall were re-named fire police for the coming year, it was learned.

Appointed by the city commission, C. R. Hightower will remain as Cisco Fire Marshal an indefinite term.

Proposals to send a delegation to the annual Texas State Firemen's convention, to be held at Galveston June 14-16, were acted on by the department. A delegation from Cisco will be selected at a coming meeting.

National Guardsmen To Be Entertained At Barbecue

National Guardsmen and officers of Battery A, 961st Field Artillery Unit will be guests of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and Battery headquarters at a barbecue Wednesday evening at the Lake Park.

J. W. McKinney Visits Old Home In Georgia

J. W. McKinney of the Shady Grove community returned Sunday from a visit to the place of his birth near Macon, Georgia. It was the first time Mr. McKinney had been back to his old home since he left 48 years ago to come to Texas.

Accompanying Mr. McKinney were his son, Travis, and a nephew, Wilburn McKinney. The entire trip was made by automobile on U. S. Highway 80. The party left Cisco on the morning of April 19.

McKinney found that the house on the old home place had been burned and pine trees 30 to 40 feet tall were growing on the site. He also visited the birthplace of his father and found that the land was still producing after 100 years of civilization.

What impressed him most was the fact that land which had produced cotton and corn for generations was now being used for growing clovers and other pasture crops. McKinney reported that he was instituting the practice on his farm next year.

Rotary International's goal and past days of the Cisco Rotary Club were recalled by P. W. Campbell of Abilene, former resident and founder of the local organization, at the club's regular noon luncheon Thursday at the Victor Hotel.

Prior to Campbell's introduction, President J. E. Proctor announced the club's annual Ladies' Night Banquet for May 19. Plans, he said, would be discussed later. Membership Chairman O. J. Russell reported the club had passed its thirtieth consecutive 100 per cent attendance meeting Thursday.

The guest speaker, introduced by Dr. E. L. Graham, told of rotary's coming to Cisco, the difficult times the movement had in establishing membership, and the eventual success.

According to Campbell's talk, the Cisco Rotary Club was organized in January, 1921, with nineteen members signing the charter enrollment. Campbell, organizer, was elected president and Dr. Graham, vice-president.

"Since the club was founded it now has a total enrollment of 35 members, sponsored countless civic projects for the betterment of the city, and developed into one of the most outstanding luncheon clubs now active," he declared.

"When we first organized Rotary here," said Campbell, "you might have said we were a selfish lot, thinking only of our own interests. But we quickly forgot that outlook and started living up to the motto: 'Service Before Self.'"

In a more serious state of mind, Campbell told 35 Rotarians and visitors that "where there is peace, there is Rotary; where there is brutality and war mongers, there is no Rotary."

Until Campbell left Cisco in 1928 to Abilene, he was manager of the West Texas Utilities Ice plant, an active church worker and civic leader. He is presently traffic manager of the West Texas Ice Division at the Abilene office.

Visiting Rotarians and guests included Bill Ledbetter, H. E. Strickland and Raymond Byrum of Abilene; J. C. Poe Frank Sayre, Bill Brown and Frank Jones of Eastland; Wilkin Bacon of Dallas and R. N. Cluck of Cisco.

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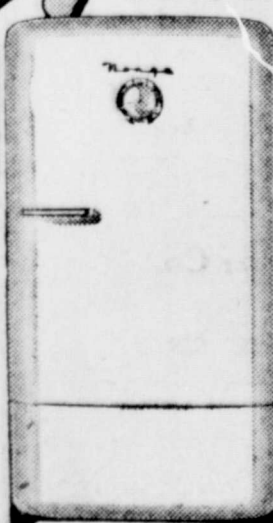
