Big Spring and Mitchell County Show Steady Progress in Development—Other News

Big Spring County Oil News

Big Spring, Texas, June 22.—The California Company reports drilling progressing at six tests, building rig and rigging up at two new locations, setting tubing at two recently completed wells and cleaning out at another following nitro shot. Completed wells on the California Company and Sloan leases are registering normal daily production on the pump.

Morrison No. 1-A, deep test of the California Company, is drilling at 4,960 feet in black lime. The company is most optimistic over prospects for deep pay in this well.

Morrison 2-9 is drilling at 475 feet; Morrison No. 2-8 at 1,284 feet; Morrison No. 2-11 at 285 feet; Morrison No. 2-10, new location, is rigging up to spud.

On the Miller lease of the California Company the crew is drilling at 1,215 at Miller No. 1-3, and at 2,330 at Miller No. 1-4. Butler 1-1, recently completed, will be placed on pump and pipe line connection within the next few days. Tubing is being set in this well.

The company has recently completed two wells on the Abrams lease. Abrams No. 1 is being cleaned out and swabbing considerable oil at 3,050 feet. At Abrams No. 2 the crew is setting tubing at 3,030 feet. Abrams No. 6, new location, rig under construction.

Brown No. 1, on the S. E. Brown lease near Lorraine, is down about sixty feet and drilling and has been temporarily suspended while the contractor rigs with heavier equipment.

This is the first test to be spudded in that section of Mitchell County and the well will be watched with much interest by the oil fraternity.—Colorado Record.

Sterling County Oil News

The pump in the Durham well No. 1 has been going continuously since Wednesday at 11 o'clock. The attempt last week to "muddy off" the water was only a partial success. However, the output of oil increases as the pumping operation progresses.

A considerable amount of oil has been pumped into the tank. Experienced oil men predict that the well will flow if it is kept on the pump for a week. They explain that when the oil bearing stratum is relieved of the water pressure, it will clean itself out and the oil will be forced out at the top.

The crew at Durham No. 2, 330 feet southwest of No. 1, has completed the derrick, and is now engaged in installing the machinery. This work is expected to be completed in the next five or six days, when the new well will be spudded in. Mr. Bigelow estimates that No. 2 can be completed to this oil sand within 40 or 60 days. The oil material was struck at 1412 in No. 1 and passed at 1427 feet, making the stratum 15 feet.

B. H. Kammeyer, of Hinsdale, Ill., who is interested in the Chicago-Texas Oil & Gas Syndicate, which owns this Durham well, has been here for the past several days, and expresses himself as being well pleased with the prospects.

Representatives of several of the big oil companies have been on the ground this week. A party of geologists, said to be of the Roxanna Oil Co., was taking elevation and measurements of the hill south of the well Wednesday.—Sterling City News-Record.

Pecos Oil News

With occasional swabbing and bailing the past week, the gas pressure has been much increased, and a considerable amount of oil has been put in the tanks. An effort is being made to keep the well in the best condition possible while finances are being raised to give the well a second shot, and then clean it out clear down to the bottom of the formations that were shot.

Ira J. Bell & Co. spudded a new well at Wednesday, June 18th. It is on the land of Henry Lepp and will be known as Lepp Well No. 1. The well is located on Section 15, in Block 2, W. & N. W. Railroad survey in Loving County, Texas, and is five miles northeast of the Bell well and a little over four miles from the Toyah-Bell well, and three miles northwest of the Wheat well. The well was started a 17-inch hole, and will be drilled to the Delaware sand, which, it is expected, will be reached at about 4,200 feet, as the well was begun below the conglomerate outcrop showing the structure, easy drilling has been encountered.—Pecos Enterprise.

TO CELEBRATE FOURTH OF JULY

American Legion Members to Stage Big Rodeo and Dance in Big Spring July 3rd and 4th.

The American Legion boys are on the job night and day working to make July 3rd and 4th the two most memorable days in the history of Big Spring, as far as good times are concerned. To get everyone in the right spirit for the occasion, a big dance will be given Wednesday night, July 2nd at the ball park. This will be the initial number of the program. The dance will begin promptly at 8:30 p. m., music to be furnished by the Bobbie Miller Orchestra. An enormous platform 70x70 feet will be built in sections 10 feet square and will be made out of the very best flooring material, costing \$600. The platform will be taken up after each dance. The ball park will be brilliantly illuminated with electric lights and seats in the grandstand will be reserved for spectators, or those who do not want to dance. An admission charge of 25c will be collected for admission into the grandstand and \$1.50 charged to those dancing.

On July 3rd the big rodeo will start promptly at 1 o'clock. The Big Spring band will assemble at the courthouse at 1:20 o'clock and will lead a line of parade to the ball park. There, one of the biggest and best rodeos ever featured in all West Texas, will be staged with contestants from Roswell, N. M., Carlsbad, N. M., Toyah, Balmorhea, Pecos, Odessa, Midland, Sterling, Lamesa, Seminole, Gail, Brownfield, Fort Worth and Enid, Okla., participating in the various contests such as steer-riding, calf roping, bronc busting, wild cow milking and bulldogging. Prizes amounting to over \$1,000.00 will be given to the winners of the various contests.

There will be no dragging out and looting, or killing of time in this rodeo, that is so often the case in these events. Something will be going on all the time. "Action" will be the adopted slogan of the day and the two hours will seem like a short recess.

After the rodeo the ball game will be played—Coahoma and Big Spring will fight to a finish for the championship of Howard County. Both teams have strengthened their forces since they last met so you can be assured of a red hot ball game, admission charges to the entire afternoon's entertainment will be 75c.

Another big dance will be given the night of July 3rd, beginning at 8:30 p. m.—at the same place and for the same admission prices as the previous night.

The biggest day of this celebration, July 4th, will start its program off with a big band concert given by the Lamesa or Colorado band at ten o'clock a. m. The place for the concerts to be given has not been definitely decided upon but they will probably be given on the courthouse lawn. From 12:00 to 1:00 p. m. there will be a free barbecue at the ball park. Ranchmen living in Howard County have contributed enough meat, and the merchants of Big Spring have donated all of the trimmings, making it possible for the American Legion to serve this feast free of charges. Everyone buying a ticket to the Rodeo will be entitled to a free dinner in the ball park. The price of admission to the Rodeo and ball game will be 75c, and your dinner free. Everyone is urged to come early as all must be thru before one o'clock.

The rodeo will start promptly at 1 p. m. just as on July 3rd. Several new attractions will be added for the afternoon.

The Coahoma and Big Spring ball teams will again cross bats, following the rodeo. The Big Spring band, Colorado band and Lamesa band will furnish music during the afternoon.

At 6:30 p. m. a concert will be given on the courthouse lawn by the Colorado band. It is planned to have a massed concert of the three bands at 8 o'clock.

The third big dance will begin at 8:30, same place and admission charge for dancing as previously stated. Grandstand seats will be 50c and will be good for the big fireworks display to be given at eleven o'clock. This is a new feature to the usual celebration program and is put on at a very heavy expense. Such numbers as "Niagara Falls," "The Star of the East," and "The Battle of the Clouds," will be included in the display.

This added feature will be equal to a fireworks display given at any of the big fairs. If you miss everything else, don't fail to see this. Bring the children to the masterful climax of our entertainment.

Plenty of fresh ice water will be provided all three days and placed at convenient corners of all the business sections of the city, and also at the ball park. Cold drink stands and hamburger stands will be located on the ground—so that no one will have to go hungry or thirsty.

As everyone knows, the American Legion is doing its best to raise funds sufficient to build an auditorium and club room on their lot on Main street, and they most cordially invite everyone to attend their big celebration and help make it a grand success. Everyone come.

Big Swimming Pool

A concrete swimming pool, 60x110 feet is being constructed just northwest of Moss Springs, the work being done by Robt. Helms. This pool will have a graduated depth ranging from 2 to 8 feet.

The water supply needed to fill the pool will be pumped from the spring by an artificial pump, and fresh water will be put in the pool every day. The pump will run at night, too, if the demand becomes great enough.

The pool is running north and south; on the west side a building 20x60 feet will be erected, and will be partitioned off into dressing rooms, 12x20. At each end of this building there will be cold drink stands and hamburger stands. This structure will have a porch eight feet wide, on which there will be two rows of comfortable seats. The entire buildings, grounds and pool will be illumined with electric lights.

This will be one of the finest swimming pools in West Texas, and will be run on a high plane. There will be no dancing connected with it, and will be managed so that every member of the family can go swimming with the full assurance that they will be under the protection and watchful care of people that will see that the best of order and conduct is maintained at all times.

The road leading from Moss Springs is in fairly good condition and will be greatly improved before the swimming pool is opened. Gate guards will be placed at all of the fences so that there will be no gates to open and close.

The pool will be completed in about two weeks, and Mr. Helms proposes to give a big opening, the date of which will be announced later.

O'Donnell Girl Dies in Auto Wreck

O'Donnell, Lynn Co., Texas, June 23.—While Miss Hognett of Big Spring and Adelle Shumake of O'Donnell were riding in an automobile three and one-half miles southeast of town Sunday evening at 3:30 o'clock the car struck a deep rut and turned over. Miss Adelle Shumake was thrown out and received injuries from which she died at 5:15 o'clock the same evening. Miss Hognett was not injured.

The funeral services were held at the Christian Church Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock. Burial was in O'Donnell cemetery, Dallas News.

Miss Shumake is a daughter of Jerry Shumake and has lived most of her life in and around Big Spring. The many friends of the family extend heartfelt sympathy in this sad hour.

J. LEE TARPLEY SPOKE MONDAY

A Large Crowd Was Present to Hear President Farm Labor Conference and Things Political

One of the largest crowds that has greeted any speaker this year in the city was the one present Monday evening in the district court room to hear J. Lee Tarpley, President of the Texas Farm Labor Conference.

Mr. Tarpley came to speak in the interest of the candidates endorsed by this organization and judging from the crowd present and the applause given the speaker, the organization will support them.

Mr. Tarpley was introduced by J. O. Tamitt. He began by stating that he would talk more of the Farm Labor movement and what it had accomplished in the short time it had been organized, than he would of the men. "This organization," Mr. Tarpley went on to say, "sprang into existence because the farmers were not, in fact, never had, received a fair price for their products; and because they were unable to organize their interests like other businesses could do they could not secure the needed legislation in state or nation, and therefore they were compelled to sell their products below cost of production."

The speaker said because other farm organizations had failed in the past was no reason why this one should fail. The organization stands for stable sales of what it produces, generally, and are getting to the point much faster than was hoped by the most sanguine at the time of its organization.

He believes that the farmer is just as much of a business man as the merchant, baker, or others and should have a fair profit on what he produces, the same as the others receive on what they sell. "The farmer has always been at the mercy of the speculator, who makes a living off of what the farmer produces, therefore the speaker proposes to put him out of business or put him to earning his livelihood by the 'sweat of his brow.'"

The Farm Labor Union of Texas favors the nine month school for the country boys and girls the same that the city and town pupils receive, Mr. Tarpley stated. If the farmer can make a profit on what he produces he will be able to run the country school nine months. Tenant farmers are too numerous over the Southland and until they make greater profits on what their land yields, they will continue to be a tenant but if in a few years it were possible for him to own his own farm, he will be much more contented and a much better farmer.

If the proper marketing plan is adopted and put in operation, the city man will not pay any more for the produce fresh from the farm, but the money will go into the pockets of the producer, where it rightly should go. Farmers should get the price of their products; then they are assured of proper market prices with no fluctuation in prices, because of flooded markets. The time is not far distant when the selling of all farm products will be turned over to one man, who will be in touch with the best markets and who will be in touch with the best markets and who will instruct the farmer where to ship his products.

Too, the time is near when the farmer will see a great advantage in keeping books, just as the banker and merchant do, and he will figure a profit the same. In this way he will have the figures as to the cost of producing a certain commodity and can say how much it should be sold for, for him to make a profit.

Regarding the marketing of cotton under the direction of a competent and experienced grader and salesman, Mr. Tarpley says, was in doubt satisfactory the past year. In some counties where they were well organized, the farmers received as much as \$53.00 a ton for cotton seed while in unorganized counties they were selling for \$35.00 per ton. He believes that in the next year the farm organizations will be selling their cotton direct to the mills because the mills say that they prefer buying from an organization rather than a broker. When the farmer can do this, he will get exactly what his cotton is worth, and will not pay as much for the finished product as he now does. The farmer is the only business man who can go broke in December and go back in business in January.

The object of the Farm Labor Union is not to make a fight on the bankers, merchants or other business men running legitimate business; all they want is to make a fair profit on what they sell and the business of the organization is to set the prices of the products on commodities sold at a profit.

Mr. Tarpley stated that the laboring men and farmers represented 80 per cent of the voters in this country but on account of not being organized the remaining 20 per cent had always controlled and elected the men they wanted for office. He said the farmers could get better results and elect the preferred man by endorsing him instead of organizing a new party. This organization met in Dallas in March, sent out questionnaires to the different candidates for governor, and finally decided to endorse T. W. Davidson for their candidate—not because of his answers on the questionnaire but because of his past record.

Mr. Tarpley then took up the names of the different candidates and eliminated the entire bunch with the exception of three—T. W. Davidson, who he claims to be the strongest man in the race; Felix Roßinson, who he entirely ignored, never referring to him once in his speech. Then he took up the 20 per cent candidate, Lynch W. Davidson, and proceeded to tell what he was and what he stood for.

Mr. Tarpley is for T. W. Davidson because he favors a \$15 per capita for the public schools and is against the repealing of the free text book law, in favor of repealing the 35 cent ad valorem tax, in favor of the state insurance plan, in favor of the state furnishing money to the poor of the cities to buy homes and the farmers to buy their own farms.

The speaker closed his address with the story of the great big cow with her head down in the south and her other extremity up in Wall street. The farmers in the south feed her, while the crooks in New York milk her. Mr. Tarpley suggests that we turn "Old Boss" around for awhile and let the crooks feed her for awhile and let the farmers do the milking.

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John Quinn Wins More Honors

John Quinn, son of Mrs. Mabel Quinn, has been appointed to represent the 16th Congressional District of Texas at the United States Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md.

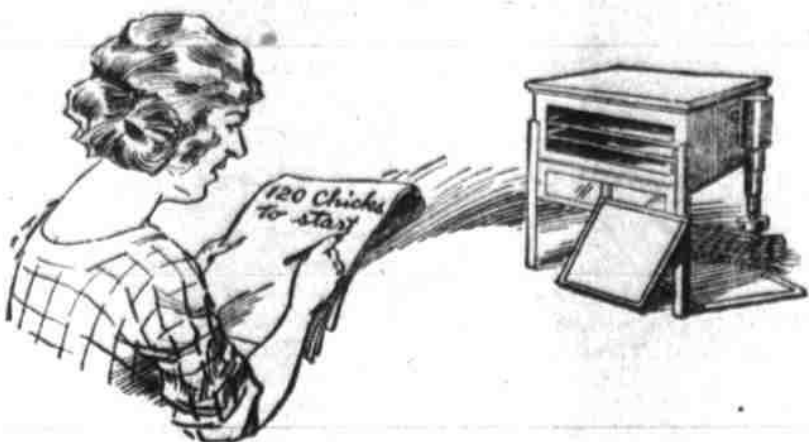
He was called last year to fill the same place but preferred to remain in Leland Stanford University where he was seeking a degree in Chemical Engineering but this year when the second summons came, he felt it was his duty to go. So he bid farewell to Stanford University, came by home to pay a visit to his mother and friends here, then on to Washington, D. C. There he took the required examination, making A in each of twenty mental tests while physically he was pronounced a perfect man. He is now a student in the U. S. Naval Academy, where he will receive absolutely free of charge a four year University education together with naval training. In addition to this, he will be paid a monthly salary by the government to stay there and equip himself to fill the place that is waiting for him in the U. S. Navy. At the expiration of this time he will become a commissioned officer to sail the high seas under the U. S. flag; and it wouldn't be John Quinn if he didn't climb to the top round of the naval profession.

John was born and reared in Howard County. He never had the pleasure of attending school until he was eleven years old and now at the age of twenty, he has made a most wonderful record. To date he has won 17 gold medals.

He graduated from Big Spring High School as valedictorian of his class; then on to Wentworth Military Academy, Lexington, Missouri, where he again finished at the head of his class. From there, he went to Leland Stanford University, California, where he was doing excellent work when called by the government to represent his district. This is indeed an honor, as but few are called and still fewer of that number are able to stand the intricate entrance examinations.

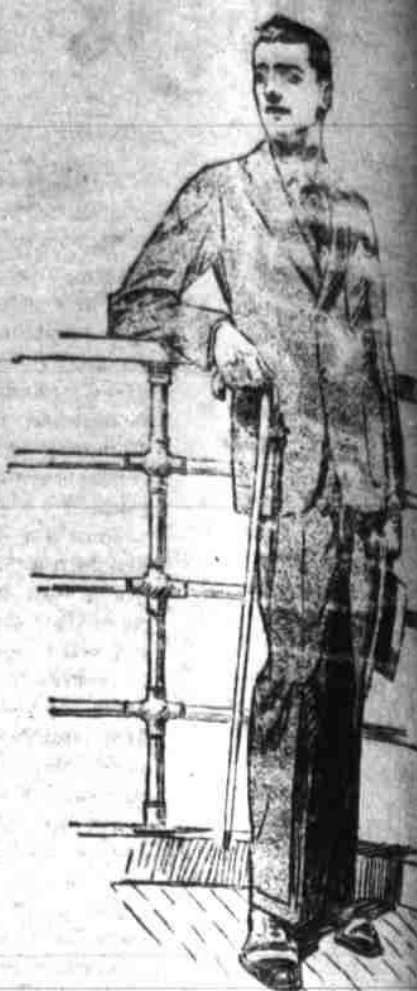

THE PASSING DAY

Will H. Mayes, Department of Journalism, University of Texas.

It is surprising how few people pay enough attention to affairs of government to be able to vote intelligently. Even the greater number of those who attend political conventions and howl themselves hoarse do not know what it is all about or just why they get so excited, and not one in twenty of them have any real part in the shaping of platforms or in the nomination of candidates, though they may think they do. A few shrewd politicians lead the masses around as though they owned them, and those who are led do not know enough about what is going on to be aware of the fact that they are merely the dupes of the leaders. It is deplorable that people know so little of government, for really there is no democracy where the voters are too uninformed to cast an intelligent ballot.

This ignorance of government is not confined to the masses. It permeates legislative bodies. The average law-maker knows little or nothing of law. He merely does the bidding of those better informed. Often he thinks he knows enough to act, but he does not know enough to realize that he is just a tool of wiser heads. Legislation is a science, to know which requires years of study and experience, but strange to say, many think they understand it, just as almost every person thinks he knows how to write. This country will be better governed when it has fewer legislators in both national and state governments and when men are elected for their ability as lawmakers rather than for their popularity.

After all, it may be a good thing for Texas that there are so many candidates for governor going up and down the state offering to relieve the people of most of their burdens for \$4,000 a year and the use of the governor's mansion at Austin. Along with all the charges of extravagance and graft and inefficiency in state government there is a modicum of truth that may not be brought to light except through exagerration. Texas is not as well managed as it should be, and perhaps this applies from the highest to the lowest in office. Neither will Texas ever be free from mismanagement, for you can not expect more of government than of business, and every business man knows that at times he woefully mismanages his own affairs. If the candidates do nothing more than get the people to thinking deeply enough to assist somewhat in matters of government, through their suggestions and through economy on their own part, much good will be done.

It is a pity that the public gets so excited about who is to be governor and gives so little study to all the other offices. A governor without the support of other efficient officers is utterly helpless. He has somewhat more influence than other officer in the state, but is powerless to do anything worth while without the help of others. He soon comes to realize this after he gets into office. Generally, during his first term he conscientiously endeavors to bring about the improvements he talks about during his campaign, but after that he sees the futility of his efforts and finds that the state can get along about as well when he is in foreign lands as when he is in his office. He may be just as eager as ever to serve the state, but he has learned that after all he is but a small part of the big thing we call government.

In a sermon recently I heard the statement that it is of no avail to be a good fellow unless one is good for something. There is a lot of truth in that little statement. Just to be good without a definite, active kind of goodness is about equivalent to being good-for-nothing. For goodness to amount to anything it must prove itself worth something to somebody; it must serve a useful purpose. It is doubtful if there is such a thing as negative, idle goodness. That suggests the question as to what use you are making of any

goodness that you assume. You must be good for something or else you are not good at all.

It follows from the foregoing statement that the best person is the one who is best for something, the one who uses his good traits to the best purpose and in a way to render the best service. You can idle away goodness until it is worth nothing to you or to any one else, or you can exercise it in a way to make yourself a blessing to every one about you.

He Would, and Did

Read this one to your boy, if the Lord has blessed you with one. It is a short, true story that's good for boys, and for fathers, and for all Americans.

At 15 years of age, Wallace Hastings was left an orphan, in Oakland, Cal. Too bad, everybody said. What chance had a boy alone in the world—no home, no folks, mighty little of anything? But, an orphan boy may have things that folks don't see. Wallace had pluck and determination to win his way.

This orphan boy worked at odd jobs and studied at odd hours, and graduated from high school in 1918. He enlisted in the army and went to Siberia with the American expeditionary forces. He also went right on working to bring out what there was in him.

In 1920, as a private, mind you, he asked for admission to West Point Military Academy, and passed with highest markings.

For four years Cadet Wallace has been working, studying, struggling to succeed. No congressman's political "pull" to push him along. No mother or father with a word of help or cheer. Just a strong-hearted boy making his life-battle with courage and a will that would not be put down. A high school diploma his only honor, while hundreds of his competitors had on the walls of their dens the prized "sheepskins" of the great colleges.

And now the orphan graduates from West Point Military Academy as HONOR MAN of the class of 1924, and Uncle Sam gives him a lieutenancy to start with.

Read this story to your boy and observe his face as he listens. It may even show you what sort of a boy you have.—Fort Worth Press.

This was the slogan adopted by the men who controlled the Cleveland convention: "Keep cool and keep Coolidge." Dog days are coming. November is a long way off. Will it be possible for the voters of America, or a large part of them, to keep cool and keep Coolidge? There are millions of independent voters. These voters do not wear a party collar. "Under Eternal Bonds of Fidelity."

On Memorial Day of 1919 Woodrow Wilson spoke at the ceremonies which were held at the hillside cemetery of Suresnes, which overlooks Paris. The President said:

"I beg of you to realize the compulsion that I feel that I am under. I advised the Congress to declare that a state of war existed. I sent these lads over here to die. Shall I—can I—ever speak a word of counsel which is consistent with the assurances which I gave them when they came over? It is inconceivable. There is something better, if possible, that a man can give than his life, and that is his living spirit to a service that is not easy, to resist the counsels that are hard to resist, to stand against purposes that are difficult to stand against, and to say, 'Here I stand, consecrated in spirit to the men who were once my comrades and who are now gone, and who have left me under eternal bonds of fidelity.'"

Thus did Woodrow Wilson, on the first Memorial Day of peace after the World War, consecrate himself to the task of vindicating the ideal which Americans in that war died to uphold. The task, as he says, was not easy. Alas, no. He realized it even then. Yet he resisted with all of his power those forces which seemed to him to stand in the way. The less than four months ago his dying but ever valiant spirit passed on to join the spirits of those for whom Wilson fought, fell and died. On this Memorial Day we mourn and honor them all.

When the President had finished speaking that day at Suresnes five years ago a blue clad figure arose in front of the speaker's stand and saluted. It was Captain William H. French, seventy-four years old, aide of the 14th New York Volunteer Infantry. The President smiled and returned the salute. After the ceremonies Captain French said:

"When the President smiled and saluted I cannot tell you how deeply I was moved. I felt as though I represented the old soldiers of the Grand Army and was appearing for them before our President three thousand miles from home. His speech carried me back fifty-four years to the day I heard Abraham Lincoln address us on the field of Gettysburg."

There was a picture. Woodrow Wilson, a son of the South whose forbears upheld the cause of the Confederacy, the President of a united country whose armies had crossed the sea on the most idealistic mission which has ever taken men to battle. He greets a soldier who helped to make that nation possible. He stands beside the graves of those who died in the later contest and pays them tribute. Now he has joined those men, and our tribute swells to include him with them.

In the clustered graves on the hillside at Suresnes Woodrow Wilson saw concretely exemplified the lesson of sacrifice to an ideal. Less than a year before, the men who in 1919 lay below those ordered mounds had been crusaders in a righteous cause—a cause which they had paid "the last full measure of devotion" to defend. Their Commander-in-Chief acknowledged in their unseen presence that they had left him "under eternal bonds of fidelity" to their memory and their cause—his cause. Woodrow Wilson himself now belongs to the Legion of the Gold Starred. To his memory, no less than to theirs, are we who remain under eternal bonds of fidelity. — American Legion Weekly.

Democratic Convention

New York, June 25.—The fate of the Democratic party in the 1924 campaign was virtually at stake today when an inner circle of fourteen "master minds" met to draft an official platform for submission to the national convention.

The platform conferees faced one of the bitterest factional fights in the history of the party over the adoption of Ku Klux Klan and League of Nations planks. All hope of settling the issues peacefully in secret session were abandoned after the opposing factions formally served notice they would carry their fights to the convention floor if defeated in committee deliberations.

The conferees were Homer L. Cummings, Connecticut, chairman; William Jennings Bryan, Florida; William H. O'Brien, Indiana; W. A. Ayres, Kansas; Senator David I. Walsh, Massachusetts; Gilbert M. Hitchcock, Nebraska; Senator Key Pittman, Nevada; Joseph A. Kellogg, New York; Newton D. Baker, Ohio; Senator Robert L. Owen, Oklahoma; and F. J. Garrett, Tennessee, minority leader of the house. Never in the history of the party has there been engendered into a convention as much enmity as the present one. The Ku Klux Klan on one side and the anti-Ku Klux on the other. The wets and the anti-wets—and they are locked in a deadly combat—and it will be fought to a finish. Both sides say "on with the battle" and down the first one who says "enough."

Never before in the history of the party, as The Herald man sees it, were the chances as good for the Democrats, as this year. If they had shown good sense and put out a progressive candidate, who would have reiterated the time-honored principles of the Democratic party, and then adjourned—they would have swept the country this fall like the republicans did four years ago.

With the bitterness now being created in the convention it seems doubtful, no matter who is nominated, whether he can be elected or not. Judging from what we get from the daily papers, none of the present candidates will be nominated, and the convention will last many more days before a nomination will be made.

The report was current on the streets Thursday morning that McAdoo had been nominated on the fifth ballot, but The Herald called the Abilene Reporter at 1:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon and they reported the following from the seat of war:

"No balloting yet. They are still nominating. Al Smith and Salisbury were put up this morning."

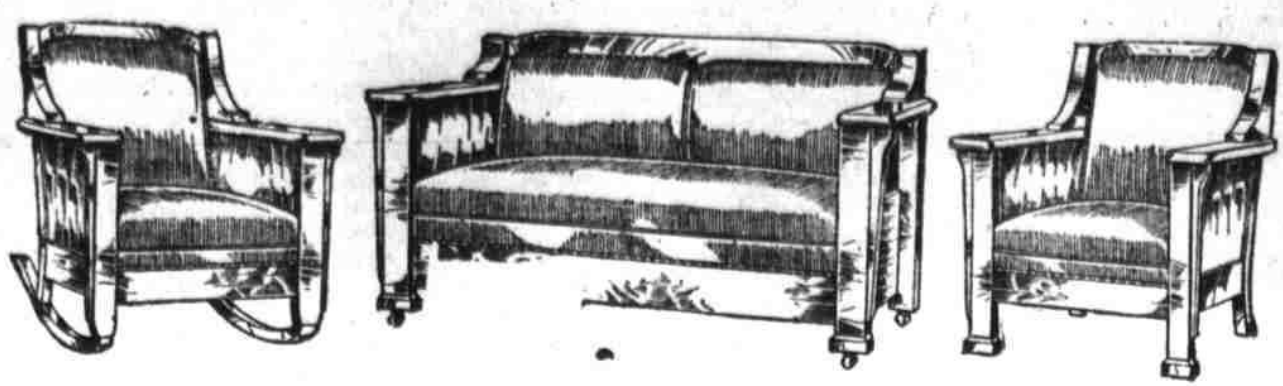
At the close of the exhibit, the babies were arranged on the steps of the east entrance, while the Misses Bradshaw made a picture.

The first effect of the new American immigration bill is being felt by the transatlantic passenger liner companies operating to South American ports, who already have booked their third class lists for the next two months and have announced their intention to place more ships in the passenger service.

Most of the bookings come from steamship agents in the Latin countries, where emigration to the United States is so restricted that American consuls are refusing to grant visas until Washington authorities issue the new quotas and regulations. This is all as it should be. Our melting pot has filled to the overflow point, and until we can ladle off some of the scum, or transmute it from the base metal of the Red, the Bolshevik and the ignorant, into the tested steel of true Americanism, we don't want to put any more Europeans into it to melt up!

The Monroe Doctrine has held the Americas for Americans. The immigration laws, which reduce to a minimum the influx of unassimilated and unassimilable human material, will keep this America American. What less restricted immigration may do for South American countries is, of course, their affair, but it must be noted that many South American nations have large undeveloped resources, huge areas to cultivate, wildernesses yet to be won; such conditions may, probably will, operate upon their immigrants as similar conditions did upon immigrants to this nation in its earlier days.

At any rate, we haven't so much metal to melt for a while!

Latest News From Texas Presbyterian Educational Movement

One hundred and fifty thousand dollars is all that stands between the Presbyterian educational institutions of Texas and the receiving of \$1,350,000 for Christian Education in Texas. This was the announcement made by Dr. S. W. McGill, at Presbyterian educational headquarters in Dallas this week.

The Texas Presbyterian Educational movement was launched just a year ago for the purpose of securing \$1,350,000 for the ten Southern Presbyterian educational institutions in the synod of Texas. After twelve months of aggressive work the committee in charge reports that \$1,205,000 has been subscribed leaving the sum of \$150,000 yet to be secured. The amount that has been subscribed is payable on the condition that the remaining \$150,000 be subscribed as no subscriptions are binding until the full amount is subscribed payable within four years.

"It remains to be seen," said Dr. McGill "whether Presbyterians and friends of Christian education in Texas will see more than one million dollars lost to Texas for the lack of the comparatively small sum of \$150,000." It is understood that the field has been practically covered and the campaign is now about to be closed. The beneficiaries of the campaign are Austin College, Sherman; Daniel Baker College, Brownwood; Texas Presbyterian College for Women, Milford; Presbyterian Orphans Home, Itasca; Austin Theological Seminary, Austin; The University Church at the State University; Tex-Mex Schools for boys and girls.

This is said to be the biggest thing ever undertaken by the Presbyterian Church in any Synod and the outcome is awaited with great interest.

Park Commissioners Coming

This is to notify you that on account of the time necessary for proper inspection of the Parks from San Antonio over the Glacier to Gulf to Big Spring, Davis Mountains, Palo Duro Canyon and returning via Abilene, Wichita Falls, Cisco, Mineral Wells, Fort Worth, Dallas, etc., at the request of Governor Neff we have divided this territory into two separate trips and changed the date of starting the inspection to Monday July the 14th.

The exact itinerary has not been completed, but Tuesday night July 15th will be spent at San Angelo. On Friday the 18th our party consisting of Governor Neff, State Highway Commission and the Park Board will meet the Governor and Highway Commissioners of New Mexico at the Gaudalope Mountain Park site on the north line of Culberson County adjoining the 100,000 acres in New Mexico on the State line, recently set aside as a National Monument by the Federal Government. A Mass meeting will be held there that night and the inspection completed by noon Saturday the 19th, after which we will drive to Van Horn for a mass meeting Saturday evening, and after the mass meeting or early Sunday morning we will drive over to Ft. Davis where we will rest and Governor Neff will deliver one of his Sunday lectures Sunday afternoon.

The details of the inspection of the Davis Mountains are being left to the central committee composed of all of the interested towns in that section of which Mr. W. B. Bloys of Ft. Davis is chairman, but we should be able to finish this inspection on Wednesday noon and spend Wednesday night at Ft. Stockton and from that point we will return to San Antonio either via Del Rio, Eagle Pass, Alto Frio Canyon, Junction, Kerrville, Alto Frio Canyon, Bandera to San Antonio. The exact itinerary will be decided on as soon as we can ascertain definitely what Del Rio and Eagle Pass have to offer in the way of a park site.

We would be glad to have each town arrange for a mass meeting that the Governor and other members of the party might have an opportunity of explaining in detail the mission of the State Park Board.

The personnel of our party will be approximately as follows: Governor Neff and daughter, Miss Halie Maude; Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Hubbard, Mr. and Mrs. D. K. Martin, Mr. Geo. D. Armistead and Br. Gibb Gilchrist of the Highway Commission, Mr. A. R. Losh, Federal District Engineer and a representative from the San Antonio Express and San Antonio Light, Houston Post and Chronicle, Dallas News and Fort Worth Star-Telegram. There will be five members of the Park Board, possibly two or three members of the board will have some member of their family with them. If our United States Senators accept the invitation extended them and Mr. Stephen T. Mather, Director National Park Service, we will have altogether about 24 or 25 people in our party.

Those desiring dates with either the Governor, Highway Commission or State Park Board will have to notify us before the itinerary is completed, and it will be necessary for you to give us complete information as to the length of time necessary to spend in your vicinity. The itinerary must be completed not later than next week.

Vindication by Election

The wife of former Governor Ferguson of Texas has an entirely wrong slant. She is appealing to the voters of the Lone Star State to elect her to the governorship as a vindication of her husband whom the legislature a few years ago impeached. It is immaterial that this people of Texas sometime later declined to reinstate the governor. Then was the time to vindicate him if the people believed that he deserved vindication.

But elections for governors are not held for the vindication of those who have been charged with wrongful acts. That a man has been so charged, though later his innocence may be established, gives him no claim upon the voters, even though they themselves may have participated in the punishment of him.

If they should later be convinced of his innocence, and at the same time believed to be fitted for the office sought by him by the way of vindication, there would be no impropriety in taking into account at the election the wrong that had been inadvertently done. However, they would be under no obligation, moral or other, to take that into account. Debts cannot be settled at popular elections.

The theory is that the voter owes the candidate nothing. His duty is solely to the state. There is an implied obligation upon him to vote for the candidate who he thinks can best serve the state.

Beside, we do not see how the election of Mrs. Ferguson could be a vindication of her husband. If she is superior to any other candidate or the equal of any other candidate, we hope that Mrs. Ferguson will be elected. But the election should not be made the means of redressing any wrongs that have been suffered by the Ferguson family.—Arizona Republican.
