Lamesa High School Home-Coming Day, Friday, Nov. 10

The Lamesa High School is to have its first homecoming day, on Friday November 10, commemorating the tenth anniversary of the Golden Tornadoes.

A particularly interesting program has been arranged for that day, according to F. T. McCollum, high school principal. At 10:15 o'clock, Friday morning, all ex-students are invited to attend a real pep rally in the high school auditorium. In the afternoon the usual Armistice Day football game between the local school's chief rival, Slaton Tigers, and the Golden Tornadoes will take place. The game will be a conference game, and will determine no doubt, the chief bidder for District 2, Class B title.

Not only graduates, but all ex-students of the high school, are invited to attend the ex-students banquet at 8 p. m. Friday evening. Students that are married are asked to bring their husband or wife.

Letters from a number of ex-students have been received that they would be present. This is the first get-together Lamesa high has ever had, and it is hoped that an Alumni Association can be organized. Between 200 and 300 students are expected.

Tornadoes Defeat Brownfield 25-0 In Conference Game

Taking advantage of all the breaks of the game and playing heads-up football the Lamesa Golden Tornadoes defeated the Brownfield Cubs in a conference game here last Friday by a score of 25 to 0.

For three quarters the game was hard fought and uncertain as to the final out come but the Tornadoes broke loose to score two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to sew up the game. Some good passing and receiving by the local team, with some excellent end running and line plunges gave the locals the advantage and kept the Cubs on the defensive for most of the game.

The Cubs threatened to score only once when a blocked punt rolled out of bounds on the Tornadoes ten-yard line. Four attempts to score failed however and the goal line was saved. Lamesa scored its first touchdown after a series of end runs and two completed passes had placed the ball on Brownfield's one-yard line. Boswell then plunged the line for the score. The second touchdown was scored on 2 long end runs by Wilkes, a completed pass and another end run. The Cubs held for three downs on the one yard line then Wilkes carried the ball over on an end play. Try for points after both touch downs were unsuccessful.

The third Tornado touchdown was in the middle of the fourth quarter after Lamesa had lost the ball on downs on the Brownfield five-yard line. Brownfield elected to try a pass from behind their goal line but the ball was hit by some one who knocked the ball straight up. Morgan of Lamesa caught the ball as it came down across the goal line. Try for point failed. The fourth Lamesa touchdown came as the final gun sounded. A pass from Wilkes to Gable who ran 50 yards for the touchdown. Just as Gable crossed the goal line the game ended, but as the ball was still in motion the score counted. Boswell dropped kicked for the extra point.

Penalties were many and slowed up the game considerably.

TAHOKA GAME TO BE PLAYED IN LAMESA

The Tahoka football management requested the Lamesa coaches to change the location of the Lamesa-Tahoka game from Tahoka to Lamesa because of the number of home games at Tahoka and the lack of attendance on the part of the public. Tahoka was having much trouble meeting the guaranties to visiting teams. Lamesa paid Tahoka a good guarantee last year and was expecting to receive it back this season. The Tahoka authorities agreed to play here on a reduced guarantee and to protect Lamesa on the home and home game arrangement for next year.

The game will be played in Lamesa on Friday afternoon, at 3:30 p. m. Those fans who would have gone to Tahoka with the Tornadoes are to be saved the trouble and expense of traveling over 70 miles.

That the game will be a good one is indicated by the fight put up by Tahoka at Slaton last Friday. Tahoka was defeated by the same score that Lamesa defeated Brownfield. Tahoka made eight first downs on the Tigers. Jolly made a 55 yard run and otherwise showed up the Slaton team on defense. The Tahoka team has experienced players, having more three year men on the team than any other school in this district. There never has been a time since the two schools have been engaging in interschool contests when Tahoka was an easy mark for Lamesa.

The game promises to be a good one and many local fans will welcome the opportunity to witness a game at home without the inconvenience of making a long drive.

Approved Code Compliance System Is Established

Complaints of violation of approved Codes in this district are to be referred to Ernest L. Tutt, District Manager of the United States Department of Commerce at Houston, according to V. Z. Rogers, chairman of the Lamesa Compliance Board in a statement issued today. Mr. Tutt was appointed by General Hugh S. Johnson as director of Compliance and is to serve until such time as the permanent Code Compliance System is established.

Mr. Rogers stated further that this does not alter the functions of the local compliance board in obtaining 100 per cent compliance with the President's plan. "Our local Compliance Board will continue to handle all complaints alleging violations of the blanket code, but complaints of violations of permanent codes should be made to Mr. Tutt."

The approval by the President of an increasing number of permanent codes of fair competition necessitated the creation of a regional Code Compliance system in addition to the administrative agencies within the industries, which brought about Mr. Tutt's appointment as District Compliance Director. He is to serve in this capacity until such time as the permanent code compliance system is established. His duties consist of education, explanation and adjustment to assist employers and keep them informed of the provisions of the permanent codes.

Mr. Rogers entered a plea for citizens to put a stop to false rumors and to report to his board complaints of violation of the President's Agreement so his board may take the proper action. "We stand ready to investigate such complaints if people will but report them to us." "It is harmful to an honest and sincere employer who may be misinformed of his duties to have such rumors being spread."

PIONEER CITIZEN PASSES TO REWARD

E. J. Bartlett, aged 86 years, passed away at his home on Tuesday, October 31. Mr. Bartlett had been in failing health for the past few years, and was also suffering from a wound received many years ago.

Mr. Bartlett was born on February 24, 1847 in Tennessee. He was a soldier in the Civil War and was wounded while in service. The bullet lodged in his leg and was never removed and until his death the wound bothered him a great deal.

He was married to Miss Lucette Hampton in White county, Tenn., on March 10, 1868, and from Tennessee came to Texas and settled in Hill county.

Mr. Bartlett with his wife and family moved to Dawson county in December 1906 making their home north west of town, in a community which was later named for him.

His wife died in 1917 after which Mr. Bartlett moved from his farm into town.

Mr. Bartlett leaves 103 living descendants and 15 who have passed away. Sixty-five of his close relatives attended the funeral.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday afternoon at 4 p. m. at the Lamesa cemetery, with Rev. J. W. Simpson officiating.

Mr. Bartlett is survived by twelve children, one daughter, Mrs. Carrie Putnam of near Abilene, and eleven sons, L. R. of Levelland; G. M. of Bronco; W. D. of Humes, Calif.; D. H. Comes; J. A. of Tahoka; and W. E., W. H., H. T., and N. E., of Lamesa.

In addition survivors include 45 grandchildren, 46 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

Farmers Are Profiting By Government Plan

Farmers of this county are eagerly seizing the opportunity of selling cotton to the government at ten cents per pound, and loans or sales, to this effect have already been made in many instances.

O. B. Petty, received the first loan on ten bales of cotton, through the Cotton Coop office according to J. J. Wallace.

More than 150 farmers in this county have already procured these loans. Both the Cooperative office and Ewing and White, purchasers for J. Coon and Anderson Clayton Co., report loans on around 700 bales.

CHURCH APPRECIATION WEEK TO BE OBSERVED BY THE CHURCH OF THE NAZARENE

Church Appreciation Day will be observed in the 2,000 churches of the Nazarene Sunday, Nov. 5, the Rev. A. L. Dennis, pastor of the Lamesa Church of the Nazarene, announced. Certain features of the history of the church will be emphasized on this first Silver Jubilee Anniversary celebration.

The official beginning of the church was 25 years ago at Pilot Point, Texas, where the Pentecostal Churches of America and the Holiness Church of Christ became a part of the present organization. Since that time, the church rolls have grown to contain more than 100,000 names with about 3,500 ministers, and foreign missionary work extending around the world.

Progress attained in the quarter century covers a wide field, now operating 2,000 churches scattered throughout the United States and Canada. These churches, parsonages, as well as the other property of the church, now have a value of 13 1/2 million dollars. Schools and colleges owned by the church account for 1 1/2 million dollars. The revenue of the church totals 3 1/2 million dollars annually.

The church has, since its organization, been particularly interested in young people's activities. In 1908, there were 523 members in various young men's and young women's societies. Then the 1923, the Nazarene Young People's Society was organized with 12,748 members and it became recognized as a department of the general church. Since then the membership has grown to about 45,000. Spiritual objectives are outlined and all forms of worldliness are taboo.

INTERSCHOLASTIC LEAGUE MEMBERSHIP COMPLETED

The Lamesa High and Elementary schools have completed their memberships in the University Interscholastic League for the 1933-34 school term. The new Constitution and Rules bulletin which is sent to member schools only after receipt of the annual membership fees contains many changes for this year. A new scheme of eliminations before going directly to the State meet have been made effective for this year. There are to be Regional contests following the district meets from which winners will go to the State meet. The regional location for the meet and officers will be announced in December.

The League is an organization of Texas Public Schools fostered by the Extension Service of the University of Texas, which provides a plan for interschool activities, both athletic and literary. Some forty different events are provided for. Approximately six thousand schools of Texas are members of the League. Pupils who compete well enough to enter the State meet are chosen from the member schools from more than 200 counties.

All of the Dawson county schools are eligible for membership and it is seldom that the rolls do not include these institutions. For several years Dawson county schools have been represented in the State meet held annually in Austin. It will be recalled that Lamesa won third place in the State basketball tournament last year and Stanley Wilkes a place in the half mile race last year.


