### New School Plant To Open For Inspection

**Public Is Invited To See Buildings Tuesday Evening**

**Enrollment Reaches New High of 1846**

The new Lamesa School Buildings will be open to the public on Tuesday, July 18th from 2:30 p. m. to 9:00 p. m. and a host of interested parents, pupils and others are expected to inspect the structures and equipment.

No formal program is being arranged but it is the desire of the officials of the Lamesa Public School system that the citizenship look over these properties at the time which best suits the visitors. The primary grade building, the heating plant, the physical education building and the grandstand at the football field are the new buildings and all are located on the campus along Bryan Street west of the square.

The school board members and their ladies will be on hand most of the time for the visitation period. Teachers and former teachers are not in town in large numbers but some of them will be present. Former school board members for this district are given a special invitation to bring their families for the inspection. Several former school board members are deceased. Their families are invited to take part in the inspection. Those Lamesa and Dawson County citizens knowing the postoffice addresses of former members who now live elsewhere are requested to invite them.

### Stanolind Deep Test Spudded In Early In Week Drilled Two Hundred Feet and Set Casing

Information released this week revealed the Stanolind wildcat, just over the line in Gaines County, was spudded in Monday morning and drilled to a depth of two hundred feet, when heavy casing was set and cemented in the hole. This requires a shutdown of from 48 to 72 hours, and it is understood that drilling will be resumed today.

As has been shown before this location is about two miles over into Gaines County, and located just east of Cedar Lake.

It is understood that the well will be drilled to the greatest depth of any well in this section of Texas, possibly going between eight and nine thousand feet unless production is encountered beforehand.

Reports are to the effect that the contract calls for the drilling of a twelve inch hole for the first five thousand feet.

This will be the first deep test ever attempted in this county. All wells before going to around five thousand feet, and rarely over that. It will not only be watched by the people of this territory, but oil men in general will keep an eye on this well.

**Books Shipped Since War Over**

Long delayed by the Spanish Civil War, a shipment of 5,450 Spanish plays ordered by University of Texas library officials in 1937 from a Madrid book dealer is on its way here at last, Donald Coney, librarian, has disclosed. Until recently, the crisp notation, "cancelled until war is over" was the final word on the library order blank which topped four years' correspondence in Spanish between Mr. Coney and Julian Barbazan, the Spanish book merchant who found his wares bound by war-time postal restrictions. The collection was offered for sale in 1935.  
Following advice from Barbazan, May 4, 1939, that mail service for packages of printed matter was about to be resumed, Mr. Coney reaffirmed by cable the original order.

**Show Increased Postal Receipts**

Reports to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research from chambers of commerce in 49 Texas cities show postal receipts for May to total \$1,370,934, an increase of 4.5 per cent over April and 7.5 over May last year.

**Texas Building Slightly Off In May Is Reported**

Dropping slightly from the April total, Texas building permits during May still stood far above those of May, 1939. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research announced today.  
Aggregate permits in some forty Texas cities were \$7,684,224, a decline of 4.3 per cent from April but a gain of 29.5 per cent over May of last year.

**S.C.S. NOTES**

It pays to be "on the level" with your farming as well as in relations with your fellow men, declares Firestone, an engineer with the Soil Conservation Service at Lamesa. Contour farming, planting crops on the level across the slopes, is one of the best methods of conserving soil and water and of insuring good crop production.

When tillage operations are on the contour or level, every row becomes a miniature terrace and every foot mark a contour furrow. In periods of rainfall, the soil has a chance to soak up all the water it can hold before any runs off. If contour tillage and strip cropping will not hold the water that falls, broad base level terraces should be and to conserve water that would otherwise be lost.  
Crops planted on the contour do not drown out as readily in periods of excessive rainfall and can withstand drought much longer than those in straight rows where the available moisture has been allowed to run off.

On cultivated areas contour farming is one of the most important single conservation practices Firestone says. Areas with little slope and subject to only slight erosion may be protected by planting sown strips of vegetation in alternate strips with cultivated crops. Gently sloping land should be terraced and farmed with the terraces. Some land is too steep to be cultivated and should be retired to grass or planted continuously to a soil conserving crop.

O. H. Morris who owns and operates a 320 acre farm three miles east of Lamesa saw the need of soil and moisture conservation but a surveying party was not available so he ran his rows across the prevailing slope in 1938 to reduce run off. He states, "Portions of my field where the rows were level I harvested 1-2 bale of cotton per acre but on other parts of the field where the rows were on a slight grade I gathered only 1-5 of a bale to the acre." Mr. Morris became a cooper with the Soil Conservation Service in January 1939 and terraced this farm and another farm he owns in the camp area. Since terracing he has had no run off and the prospects for a good crop are ideal.

Farm ponds can serve a three-fold purpose in the semi-arid plains according to Engineers of the Soil Conservation Service in Lamesa. Ponds impound surplus run-off water which otherwise would be wasted and provide water for livestock during dry periods, they aid in the development of wildlife, and provide recreation for the farm family.

If ponds are not to become mere silted basins, it is important that erosion control practices be carried out on the drainage areas, it is pointed out. Where possible the drainage should include only grass or woodland. If cultivated land is included, such land should be properly protected by good soil conservation practices.

Since the evaporation rate in this area is around 72 inches annually, depth is an important factor to be considered in the selection of a farm pond site. It is best for ponds to have a minimum depth of ten feet, and the value is materially increased by each additional foot.

It is not always to select a site where the drainage area is sufficiently large and adequately covered by grass, but the usefulness and life of the pond will depend to such a large extent upon the type of cover and upon the size of the watershed that their importance should not be overlooked.

It is seldom that a pond can be located where every factor is ideal. Mr. Orson, a cooper with the Lamesa Soil Conservation Service, who owns and operates a ranch 16 miles east of Lamesa, has constructed several new ponds in the

last few years. The locations were made where water was most needed for grazing distribution and where the most water could be impounded at the least cost. These sites did not have sufficient watershed to furnish water but through the use of diversion structures water was brought from adjacent watersheds, and during recent rains the ponds were filled which will insure Mr. Orson with stock water for another year.

Water alone should be delivered to the pond from the drainage area. If the water is loaded with silt, the depth of the pond will be lessened gradually through silt, and, within a few years, instead of being a pond, the site will be a large deposit of soil with no space left for water storage.

### Excess Penalty On Cotton Will Be Cent Higher

#### Farmers Are Warned To Report 1938 Carryover

The regulations governing marketing cotton for 1939 are practically the same as 1938 with one exception. The penalty of marketing cotton in excess of marketing quota for 1938 was 2c per pound while for 1939 it is 3c per pound. Carry-over cotton from the 1938 crop may be marketed any time at the option of the producer at the rate of 2c per pound penalty. All producers having carryover cotton should notify the county office as soon as possible of the amount of the carryover of the 1938 cotton so that a blue card may be issued from that office to any producer desiring to sell 1938 cotton.

All producers whose acres are in compliance with the cotton acreage allotment will be issued a white card again for 1939 which permits them to sell all the cotton produced on the farm penalty free. All producers who overplant their cotton acreage allotment for 1939 will be issued a red marketing card the same as in 1938. Producers overplanting their cotton acreage for 1939 WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE FOR SUBSIDY PAYMENT, SOIL CONSERVATION PAYMENT, OR TO EXECUTE A COTTON LOAN AGREEMENT.

In order to prevent confusion at the time of ginning, all producers are urged to properly identify the farm from which the cotton was produced by the marketing card from that farm. These marketing cards carry numbers and producers should be careful to call the ginners attention to the fact that the cotton was produced on the farm represented by the number on that

particular card. Since the regulations for deciding yields for individual farms permit a producer to have the actual production on that farm for his five year average it is very important that the ginners and producer make a correct report to the county office for all the cotton produced on the farm for 1939.

Washington, D. C., July 12—Senator Tom Connally of Texas has introduced in the Senate and expects to urge before that body the adoption of a proposal to secure

two-thirds Federal participation in Old Age assistance payments up to a maximum of \$15.00, the State and Federal governments to continue to share equally above that amount, as at present. If enacted into the Social Security Act, this would

have the effect of providing \$10.00 from the Federal government to match the first \$5.00 from the State government for federally eligible old age pensioners; in Texas instead of the equal basis of contribution now in operation.

In explanation of his plan, Senator Connally said:

"Under the present law, the Federal Government pays to each State an amount equal to the average paid by the State to old age pensioners who are eligible and are on the roll under the State Administration of old age assistance or pensions. The maximum limit is \$15.00 per month on the part of the Federal government, but there is no minimum fixed by the law. The result has been that in some states the Federal contribution has been out of proportion to the same contribution in other states. For instance in Arkansas, the state contribution amounts to something over \$3.00 per month and, therefore the Federal government pays to eligible old age pensioners in Arkansas something over \$3.00 per month. However, in other states, such as Colorado and California, and some of the richer states, the Federal government in some instances pays the full \$15.00 maximum limit and in some states pays an amount something less than the maximum limit. This situation has created a state of inequality in

the amount of Federal contributions because of inability or unwillingness of some states to make substantial payments or contributions to eligible pensioners on the old age pension rolls. An anomaly is presented of the Federal government paying to eligible pensioners on the old age pension rolls a little over \$3.00 in Arkansas and to a person similarly situated who may reside in Colorado \$15.00 out of the Federal treasury.

"To somewhat rectify this inequality, the amendment which I have offered provides that the Federal government shall contribute two-thirds of the payment to be made to eligible old age pensioners on the state rolls to an amount not exceeding \$15.00 (in other words the Federal government would pay \$2.00 for each dollar provided by the State, or \$10.00 in Federal contribution to \$5.00 state contribution to a maximum of \$15.00 under such proportion). It further provides that from \$15.00 up the state and match payments equally as under the Federal government shall existing law."

"My amendment will be urged when the bill is considered by the Senate. I feel its adoption and enactment into law will afford a very substantial contribution toward meeting the obligations with respect to old age pensions." Senator Connally concluded.

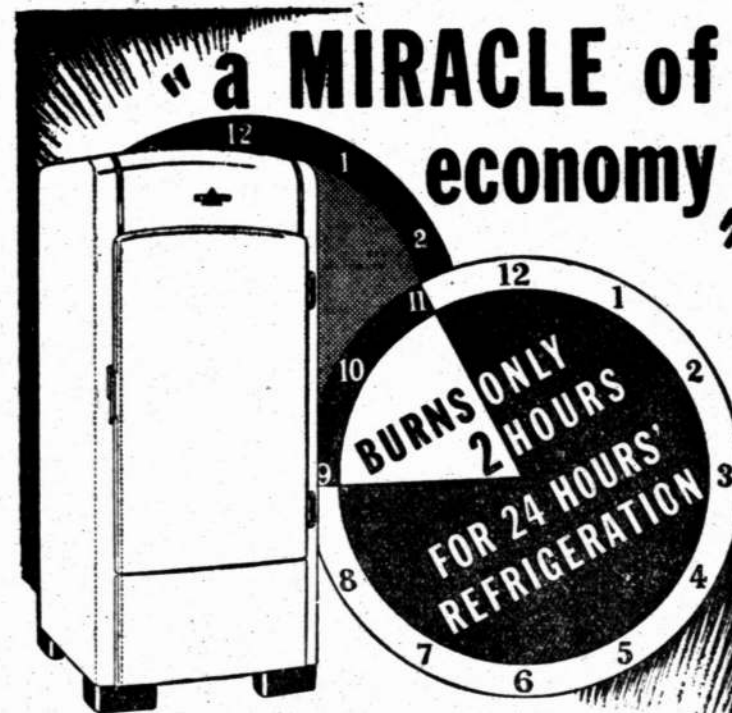

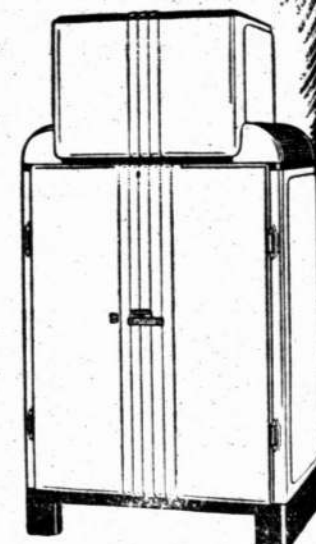

partment of Health. A simple precaution to help prevent heat cramps and prostration is to add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient with resulting heat cramps are heat fatigue. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body loses large quantities of salt during hot days.

In industry a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be used. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramps are characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then various muscles begin to cramp.

## Compensation To Unemployed Being Confused

In spite of several "blind spots," Dawson County workers are generally well-informed on unemployment compensation, Orville S. Carpenter, Texas director of the jobless benefits program, said this week. Employment service interviewers report that individuals do not confuse jobless benefits with relief. There is no connection, Carpenter affirmed. These Dawson County workers thoroughly understand that jobless benefits are the right of the eligible unemployed. A man is probably eligible for benefits if he has earned at least \$80 during a prior 12-month period, and has earned it from a tax-paying employer. As a rule, a tax-paying employer is one who customarily employs at least eight workers.

A key point in the jobless benefits program is that the individual must be physically able to work. Claimants in Dawson County do not understand this, Carpenter asserted. The individual, formerly employed by a tax-paying employer to receive benefits must be able to accept any suitable job offered.

Another phase of the program is not understood by Dawson County workers. The tax for jobless benefits is paid solely by employers; workers pay no part of it.

Carpenter emphasized that approved claimants should report their part-time earnings when filing claim. Failure to report accurately and completely shortens the benefits they may be drawn and makes the claimant liable for prosecution under state laws.

The Director said that unemployed workers could always obtain an explanatory pamphlet from their last employer. Every tax-paying employer in Texas has a supply of these bulletins which tell workers when laid off how to make claim for benefits. They also define the rules of eligibility.

## AAA BLANKS SIMPLIFIED

Administrative affairs of the AAA this week took a turn toward simplicity.

E. F. Vance, assistant state administrator, announced distribution of an application blank for 1939 cotton price adjustment payments which is hailed here as the simplest form ever used for this purpose.

It will cause a substantial reduction of errors and corrections in applications, Vance said.

"Undoubtedly the form will save time and money," he predicted, "as most any sixth-grader could fill it out without much trouble. Fewer errors will mean fewer suspensions of applications for payment and smoother distribution of cotton

price adjustment checks." Sometimes referred to as a "parity" payment, this reward for planting within cotton acreage allotments, which is 1.6 cents a pound on the normal yield of the allotment, is expected to add approximately \$22,500,000 to buying power of Texas cotton producers.

It is in addition to the conservation payment of 2 cents a pound on cotton, and is scheduled to begin flowing around September 1, or soon after compliance with cotton acreage allotments has been checked.

## Tips Given On Kitchen Comfort

Hot weather is the most logical time for increasing kitchen comfort, according to Mrs. Bernice Clayton, specialist in home improvement for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

While reducing the number of hot foods and eliminating as near as possible the use of the oven are two factors in making the average kitchen more habitable, reducing the number of necessary steps in the kitchen cannot be overlooked by the efficient housewife, Mrs. Clayton suggests.

"A good housekeeper moves in orderly sequence from the refrigerator to the work table and sink, to the range, and to the dining table without the crisscrossing of paths," Mrs. Clayton has pointed out.

In an effort to aid each housewife in analyzing her own kitchen efficiency, the Extension specialist has these pertinent questions: Does the homemaker have to cross the room continually to secure her food materials, or are they close at hand? Is the refrigerator as near as possible to the food preparation table? Once prepared, is the food near the stove? Are the implements for the cleaning of pots and pans convenient to the sink? Are the dishes for setting the table near the dining room?

Since the kitchen is frequently the hottest room in the home, Mrs. Clayton also suggested that the housewife form the habit of serving meals in the dining room. "But be sure," she cautioned, "that the set-up is so arranged that the housewife will make no unnecessary steps."

With the four kitchen work centers efficiently arranged, the next step in summer work saving is to eliminate articles infrequently used in hot weather. Mrs. Clayton concluded, "Decide what utensils might well be stored until fall and use your less accessible shelves for the supplies needed in winter baking and seasoning," she advised.

## TC Anniversary To Be Observed

Commemorating fifty years of progress in education, North Texas

State Teachers College, began in 1890 as a six-teacher normal college will observe its "Golden Jubilee" celebration throughout the 1939-40 long term.

A continuous series of programs are scheduled to be held during the year, to be participated in by students, ex-students, and faculty members at the Teachers College. Five major dates have already been announced by the committee in charge for the fiftieth anniversary observance, with more to be scheduled later.

Included in the year-long celebration will be the official acceptance of the College's new buildings on October 7 in the school auditorium. This date will also mark the opening of the Golden Jubilee series of North Texas broadcasts through Station WPA, beginning with the acceptance program. The annual football battle between the Denton school and East Texas State Teachers College on November 18, when hundreds of former students visit the campus, will be the second jubilee date. Since April 21 is the official Teachers College Day, April 18-21 has been selected for a three-day program to be designated as "Culmination Week," which will climax the year's observance. The anniversary celebration will close with the annual spring commencement June 1-3.

The Teachers College first opened its doors in a Denton business building while a school building was being prepared. It remained a private college until 1899, when it became a state school. Since that time, three administrations have been completed, the present administration under Dr. W. J. McConnell having begun in 1934.

## More Charters Granted In May

Business expansion in Texas climbed during May with 145 new charters granted to corporation seeking to operate in the State, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported today.

This number was a gain of 14.2 per cent over April and 18.9 per cent ahead of May last year. Total capitalization of the new concern was up 5 per cent over April and 67 per cent above May 1938.

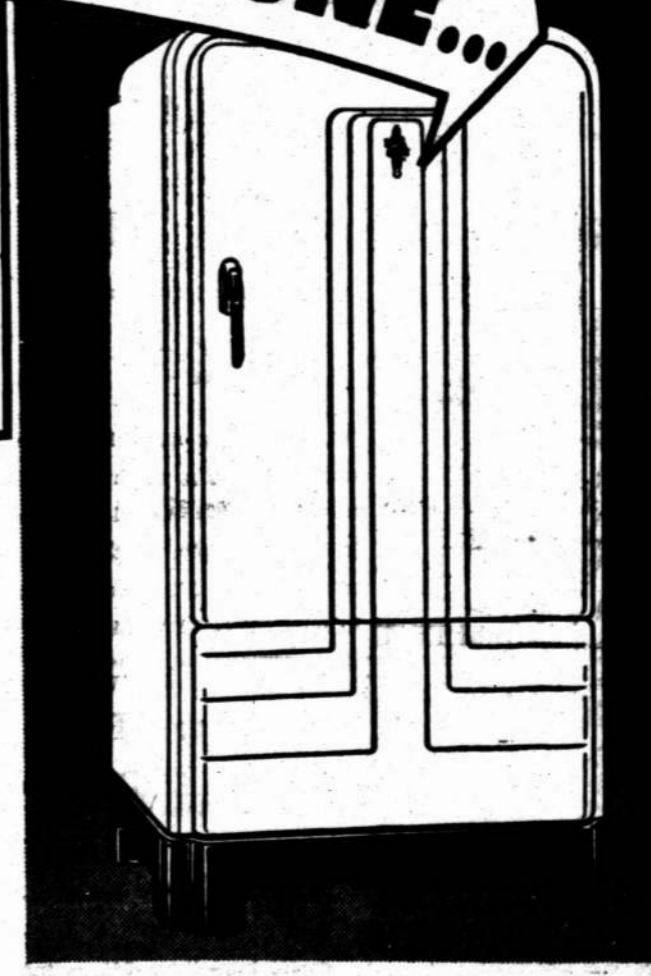

**Plan to Organize A Circulating Library In Fall**

Plans are nearing completion for a county school circulating library to be ready for use during the 1939-40 school term. Similar libraries are in use in most of the counties of Texas at the present time and in every case have proven the most satisfactory way of meeting the library needs of rural children.

Jones County has one of the best circulating libraries in this section of the state. It contains approximately 6,000 volumes and has been built up at about one half the cost of libraries in individual schools.

The state law requires that each school expend \$10.00 per teacher on library books per year. With a circulating library the schools can expend \$5.00 per teacher and still meet this requirement, and also have at the use of the child a far larger variety of books than would be possible otherwise. Each child will be given a variety of books which will be large enough for him to meet the requirements for a state reading certificate.

The Dawson County Circulating Library will be located in the office of the County Superintendent and will be under the supervision of W. P. A. Librarian. This librarian will repair worn books and keep close check on the condition of each book when returned. Only teachers will be allowed to take out books and they will be taken in proportion to the size of the school. The teacher will also be responsible for the collection of all fines and for all lost books from the responsible party.
