## Farmers To Pledge Increased Production In Food-For-Freedom

Signing Food-For-Freedom pledges got underway in Hale county last week, according to J. L. Mann, chairman of the Hale County USDA Defense Board, who has returned from a district defense meeting at Lubbock.

Similar meetings, explained the 1942 AAA and Food-For-Freedom programs, were held throughout the state at the same time to get food production in full swing, he said.

The production pledge is included in the 1942 farm plan sheet which will be used in mapping out the AAA notice of 1942 Cotton, wheat and Irish potato allotments, yields and marketing quotas.

"Farmers should remember that the signing of the production pledge is not the important phase of the Food-For-Freedom campaign. It's the follow through, delivering the goods that will make the difference," Mann said in explaining the responsibility of Hale county farmers in meeting goals.

County quotas in the Food-For-Freedom campaign include: Milk production, 46,970,000 pounds; Egg production, 1,073,000 dozen; and pork production, a 10% increase. Farmers will indicate on the plan sheet the amount of production to be expected of them for 1942.

Outline of the 1941 AAA farm program to assist farmers in planting crops for maximum benefit payments will be made at the same time production pledges are signed.

Necessary soil-conservation acreage and soil-building practices will be indicated in other sections of the farm plan sheet. For 1942, an acreage of soil conserving crops or land uses equal to 20% of the cropland is required for full payment with respect to allotment crops. Payments are made in proportion to performance under this phase of the program.

Soil building practices, which are carried out to earn soil-building payments, are similar to those outlined under previous AAA programs, Mann said.

"For years, we've been fighting soil-erosion. Farmers should remember that more than ever next year. We have the practices and the money under the 1942 program to carry out more soil-building work. Besides the food campaign, next year should be our banner soil-building year," the chairman declared.

General plan of campaign calls for completion of all Food-For-Freedom pledges during November. Following the sign-up county tabulations will be sent to the state office. Expected production for 1942 will then be forwarded to Secretary of Agriculture Wickard.

As an initial step in the nationwide farm machinery repair program, all farmers signing their Food-For-Freedom pledges are being urged to check their machinery, order necessary parts now and, if parts are not available to notify their county defense boards.

Checking and repairing now will facilitate difficulties in starting farming operations next spring, Vance declared.

SONGS BY COLE PORTER

Qualified voters of Abernathy will determine Friday whether or not their town shall have an up-to-date sanitary sewer system, when they vote "for" or "against" the issuance of bonds to finance the project.

The election will be held in the Chapman Motor Company building, with R. M. Hardesty acting as presiding judge, W. H. Crow assistant judge, and Mrs. Kate Ragland and Mrs. Ed Hardesty, clerks. The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Qualified voters in the election are those holding 1941 state poll tax receipts, or exemption certificates in lieu thereof, and who own property in the City of Abernathy, and have rendered said property for taxation.

The ballots will be simple in form, with the question to be settled plainly stated. Those in favor of the bonds will simply scratch out the two paragraphs starting off "Against the issuance" etc.; while those opposing issuance of the bonds will scratch out the two paragraphs starting off "For the issuance." It will be noted on the ballots that there are two "for" and two "against" questions to be answered. This is due to the fact that of the total \$45,000 bond issue to be voted on, \$25,000 worth are to be in revenue bonds, secured only by revenue from the proposed sewer system; while the remaining \$20,000 worth shall be regular tax bonds of the City of Abernathy. It is unnecessary, perhaps, to point out that a ballot will be worthless if only one of the questions on the ballot is voted on. The entire amount of bonds will mature over a period not exceeding 30 years, and shall bear an interest rate not to exceed 4%. Object in dividing the entire issue into two different classifications is to secure for the entire amount the lowest possible interest rate when and if the bonds are placed on the market.

Detailed plans for the proposed sewer system, have, of course not been made yet, pending the outcome of the bond election. City Engineer Harry Roberts of Lubbock, has however, submitted estimates showing that the amount asked to be voted will be more than adequate to finance a strictly up-to-date, fully approved system, capable of handling all present and any normal future needs. The proposed system calls for the disposal plant to be located well outside the city limits, and such a distance from any present dwellings as not to cause any objections from adjacent property owners.

Other estimates made, indicate that it will not be necessary for any service charge to be made for connection with the system if such connections are made at the time the system is being built. While no estimates of rates to be charged for sewer system service can be made at this time (this being determined almost entirely by the number of customers secured), it can be taken for granted that the lowest possible rates will be set by the City Council, as has been the case with the water rates.

The need for a sanitary sewer system and modern disposal plant, is, we are sure, fully appreciated by every resident of Abernathy, as well as it has been appreciated by the City Council in calling the election. The voters of Abernathy have the privilege Friday of deciding for themselves, and indicating to the Council, whether or not they want or do not want such a system.

Go to the polls Friday and vote!

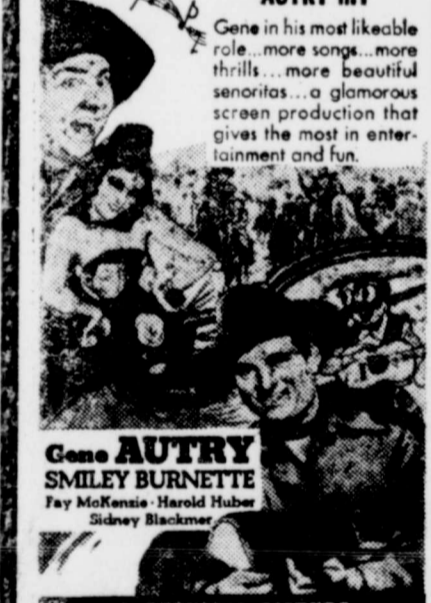
