

ITALIAN EARTHQUAKES KILL 251

LAMESA MILK PLANT MECCA FOR DAIRY FARMERS; THREE TONS OF MILK BROUGHT IN

DAWSON CITY'S \$200,000 PROJECT BEGINS OPERATION TUESDAY; PLANT TO DEMAND MILK FROM 5,000 COWS IN AREA

LAMESA, July 23.—Dawson county stepped into the agricultural limelight of the southwest today, when the Lamesa milk plant received, upon its opening day Tuesday, the largest volume of milk yet delivered to any milk plant in Texas upon initial day's operation. The total from 91 dairy farmers was 6,061 pounds, or considerably more than three tons of whole milk.

Delivery of this milk began at 7:30 in the morning and lasted until 11:30. The two first deliveries were from local dairymen who have been delivering milk to customers in the city of Lamesa.

Whittkamp Pleased
W. M. Whittkamp, manager of the milk plant, expressed high pleasure at the volume of milk received and declared the plant and building to be an efficient one of their kind anywhere in the nation.

The plant and building were constructed and installed at a cost of \$200,000, of which \$100,000 were raised by Lamesa and Dawson county business men and farmers. O. B. Norman, of Lamesa, is president of the company, and J. E. Barton, Lamesa, secretary.

To Need 5,000 Cows
It will require milk from at least 5,000 cows delivered to the plant to put it running to full capacity of 110,000 pounds daily, according to Mr. Whittkamp. There are 7,532 dairy cows listed in Dawson county. Nine routes are planned to be run by trucks from Lamesa for distances of 25 to 30 mile radius, picking up milk cans at the farm and carrying them to the plant.

As evidence of full meaning of bettering market conditions by establishment of this plant, L. Hancock, formerly of Stephenville, who had been operating a dairy farm near that city and shipping whole milk to Dallas, has moved his 100 dairy cows to Dawson county in order to be nearer a market that will pay him larger net returns.

Mr. Hancock has leased land from S. L. Forrest, near Lamesa, and is delivering all of the milk from his large dairy herd to the plant. In explaining why his move to Dawson county was made, Mr. Hancock stated he read in a national farm publication an advertisement of The South Plains, Inc., telling of developments in this area, climate, feed crops and the erection of the Lamesa milk plant.

GLIDER CLUB IS TO STAGE FLIGHT HERE

BEN BRANSON SLATED TO MAKE INITIAL HOP SUNDAY

Lubbock county will be given its first glider demonstration next Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock when the new machine of the recently organized Lubbock Glider club will take the air for its trial flight at the municipal airport, according to announcement this morning.

Ben Branson, pilot for the South Plains Air Transport, Inc., and instructor of the glider club, will have charge of the afternoon's event and will make the first test. Large crowds are expected at the port to view the trial flight and reports have been received from surrounding counties stating that interested parties in other sections probably will be on hand.

A meeting of the Lubbock group was held last night at offices of the chamber of commerce at which time permanent officers were named and a constitution and by-laws adopted.

C. C. Wright was elected president of the club; H. L. Allen was named vice-president and Eugene Adair secretary and treasurer.

U. S. CENSUS IS ESTIMATED

REPORTS ARE IN FROM 40 STATES; SAID TO BE 122,957,000

WASHINGTON, July 23.—When the census bureau today up the population of the nation for 1930, a figure somewhat less than 123,000,000 is expected to be the result.

On the basis of preliminary returns from 40 states and the District of Columbia, the Associated Press has calculated the population at 122,957,000 people.

The enumerators reported for those states a total of 100,807,723 as compared with 86,857,856 ten years ago, an increase of 14,949,845 or 18.31 per cent.

Applying this rate of increase to the country as a whole, the estimated total was reached. Should the final returns bear it out, the figure would represent an increase of 17,246,000 for the last decade.

Reports have still to be received from Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Oklahoma, Oregon, Louisiana, Mississippi and Idaho.

SHADES OF GRANDDAD'S DAY! WEST THREATENED BY "PHANTOM RIDER"

WHEATLAND, Wyo., July 23.—(P)—Death threats signed "The Phantom Rider" received by several Fletcher Park ranchers has added to uneasiness spread by the recent appearance of a masked horseman who rides the rugged Laramie peaks on a snow white horse.

Five men and a woman are reported to have received the letters which were placed in the hands of officers seeking the "phantom rider" who recently rode into the yard of Charles Adams, 20, and shot the rancher through the shoulder.

Poses searched the hills following the attack but were unable to apprehend the mysterious horseman who previously visited several Fletcher Park ranches and ordered their owners to leave the country at once.

Authorities believe the horseman is connected with recent cases of cattle rustling.

VETERANS OF QUAKES SAY TREMORS WORST IN HISTORY

NAPLES, July 23.—The Stefani News agency estimated that 250 persons were killed and several hundred injured in the regions of southern Italy shaken by three sharp earth shocks after 1 o'clock this morning.

The terror of earthquakes, so sharp and frightful that the number of deaths from fright in Naples alone was estimated at fifty, struck in three shocks that caused the most widespread devastation since the great Messina quake of 1908.

Hamlet Mett Hit Hard
The hamlet of Mett in Apulia was the hardest hit, unconfirmed reports stating that there were 100 deaths there alone.

Everywhere in the stricken region firemen, soldiers, militiamen and civilian volunteers dug into the ruins hour after hour in frenzied efforts to discover whether there were victims buried under the debris. Damaged walls and roofs were bolstered up.

The exact number was difficult to determine because of disrupted communications.

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RADIO MAN IS GANG VICTIM

JERRY BUCKLEY KILLED BY THREE MEN AFTER DETROIT ELECTION

DETROIT, July 23.—Two and a half hours after he had announced the recall of Mayor Charles Bowles by the voters of Detroit, Gerald E. (Jerry) Buckley, political commentator and radio station WJLB, was assassinated by three gunmen as he sat in the lobby of a downtown hotel at 1:50 a. m. today.

The slaying was the climax of three weeks of gangster killings which have paralleled the intensive and bitter campaign over the proposal to recall the mayor on charges which included inefficiency and toleration of lawlessness.

Governor John
Four hours after the slaying the entire law enforcement machinery of the state was in motion.

Governor Fred W. Green took a hand, ordering Col. John S. Bersey, adjutant of the national guard, to Detroit. By 9 a. m. the governor, Col. Bersey and ranking officers of the state police were on the ground assisting police in an investigation of the slaying.

Mayor Bowles for whose recall 120,863 Detroiters voted yesterday had been assailed in political summaries given over the radio station by Buckley. The announcer also had disparagingly attacked the city's gangster elements who have carried out ten spectacular slayings in the past three weeks.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 23.—James Eads How, 56, the "millionaire hobo," is dead as a result of 15 years of self denial.

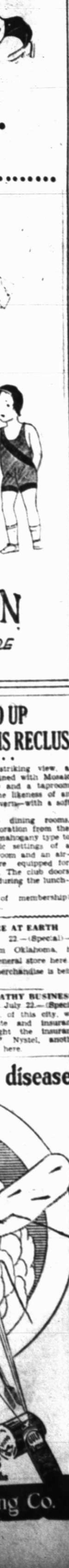
Physicians attending him when he succumbed in a hospital here yesterday said death was due to pneumonia, evidently superinduced by starvation.

REPUBLICANS TO VOTE ON FULL BALLOT

SECOND PRIMARY OF PARTY TO BE HELD IN TEXAS

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, July 22.—The Democratic primary will not afford the only harbor for Texans with poll tax receipts and other franchise credentials next Saturday, since the Republican party will be open for business at virtually every polling place in the Lone Star state.

The Republicans will hold the second primary they have been obliged to tolerate since they set up business in Texas many years ago. The first, in 1926, did not attract many participants, there being only about 16,000 votes cast. However, the Republican nominees in the general election that year received twice that many votes.

Started in 1924 the Republican party in Texas ran afoul the state primary law in 1924, when Dr. George C. Butte of Austin, opposing Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, the Democratic nominee for governor, received nearly 300,000 votes. This year's primary was made obligatory when W. H. Holmes, Republican, polled more than 120,000 votes against Gov. Dan Moody, Democrat, two years ago.

The Republicans have a field of four candidates for governor in Saturday's primary, although they have apparently been content to let the 11 Democrats aspiring to the nomination at the hands of their party do the balloting.

Possible Break Hinted

Dr. Butte has been put forward again as a candidate and there has been talk this far in advance of a probable break in November from the Democratic ranks to his candidacy, or some other Republican's, should things not go just so-so next Saturday, and in the succeeding runoff to be held August 23 between the two high men in the first primary.

It had been pointed out that in the event Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas, 1928 presidential better, obtained the Democratic nomination, the faction who opposed his getting on the party primary ballot

on grounds he was ineligible because of his defection to President Hoover, could be expected to either get behind the Republican nominee or encourage an independent candidacy.

On the other hand, Senator Love has publicly advised all concerned that should the Democrats pick Mrs. Ferguson for governor he will not support her. He quoted from the supreme court decision that a voter was not bound in conscience to support the nominee of a primary, that decree having been handed down on his application for a mandamus to force the state Democratic executive committee to recognize him as a party candidate.

Others on the ballot as candidates for the Republican gubernatorial nomination were H. E. Exum of Amarillo, John Pollard Gaines of Wichita Falls and John F. Grant of Houston.

The Republicans had three primary candidates for the United States senate, the nominees to oppose either of the three Democrats seeking party favor. The Republicans were Doran John Haeley of Dallas, Harve H. Haines of Beaumont and C. O. Harris of San Angelo.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction: Mrs. R. L. Cooner of Eastland county, Mrs. Hallet Reynolds of El Paso county and Mrs. Alma Baker Rea of Hamilton county.

Commissioner of the General Land Office: P. C. Beard of Tom Green county, and Clarence C. Coeling of Anderson county.

Mr. Du Pont is also chairman of the board of General Motors Corporation.

David Sarnoff, president of the Radio Corporation of America, said on sailing for Europe that his company's production is now being speeded up. "The radio industry," he added, "has passed through a very trying stage and it is just about able now to sense the turn toward improved conditions." He said the earnings statement for the first half would not be very encouraging, but that it is now confidently hoped that the last half will be more satisfactory.

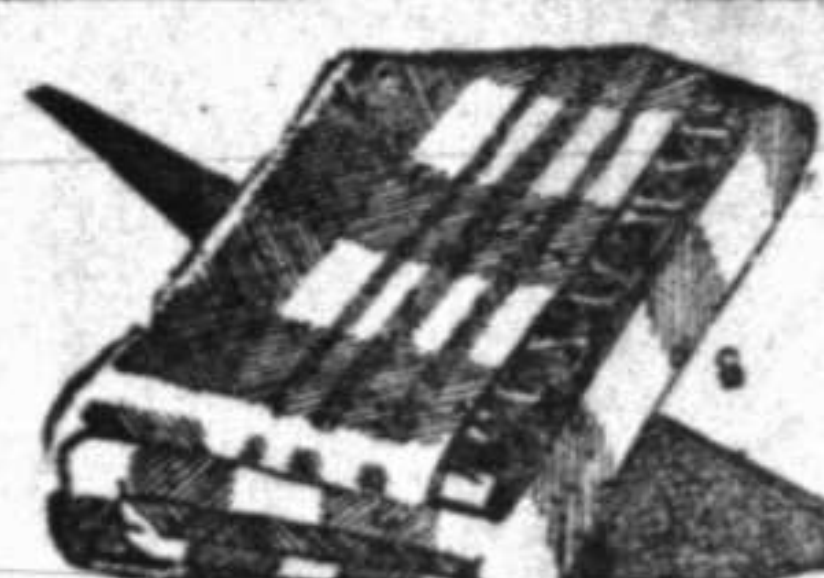

STATEMENT IS GIVEN IN RACE

JOHN THOMAS SAYS HE IS FOR SCHOOLS OF SECTION

(Special To The Journal)

LAMESA, July 23.—In an interview here recently, John N. Thomas, of Tahoka, candidate for state representative of the 19th district, related the most important planks in his platform. Included in his statement was one in which he said that he believed Lubbock is proud to be the home of this district's senator and that that city is willing to come from the lower house to come from its trade territory.

Born in Georgia, Thomas is 36 years old. The Lynn county man is a pioneer of this section, having moved to Tahoka in 1905 where he has since made his home. He recalls many changes in this section of the country during the past 24 years; among them the passing of the great ranches and the coming of the farmer.

"I have also seen the school system develop into one of the best of our Lone Star state from the few scattered one-room buildings to the many fine brick structures, which are our pride. In this respect we have seen the coming and many of us have participated in securing for this section, one of the outstanding institutions of learning in the southwest. If not of the nation, our Texas Technological college. This institution is our own and we are just proud of it. My pledge to the people of this district is that I will at all times be alert to its every need and will untiringly fight for appropriations that will not hamper it in its development and in the education of the youth of the southwest. I also of course, stand for the continued progress being made in our rural schools of this area.

Favors Good Roads. "One of the present issues being carried to the people is that of good roads and highways. I pledge to our citizenship to at all times fight for this section's equitable rights in the proportion of our state highways and the maintenance of same. I am and have always been, in favor of good roads and hard surfaced highways. However, I cannot support, at this time, a bond issue for the amount of something like three hundred and fifty millions of dollars. A sin of this size on the commonwealth of Texas is not in keeping with the present economic condition.

As this section of the country has turned from ranching to the growing of crops and a great portion of the area is now under the plow there is no other question so urgent to our farmer and farm owner. My aim is to assist in any way possible and support such legislation as will tend to stabilize a better price for farm products, including dairy, poultry and stock raising.

The penitentiary problem is another major issue before our state. I am for and will support legislation for the improvement of our penitentiary system and the handling of the state's unemployed prisoners. I believe a plan can be arranged whereby it will not be necessary to tax burden our state in bringing about a correction of the existing condition.

Thomas also mentioned prohibition as an issue that the voting public is interested in in their candidates. He states, "If I go to Austin I will conduct myself the same as among my home people, in a sober, moral way in keeping with the dignity of the position. The many existing organizations with the purpose to undermine our prohibition laws makes this an issue at all times."

One Man Guides Disposal Of Huge Wheat Surplus

CHICAGO, July 23.—Every time somebody eats a loaf of "white" bread it takes a weight off George S. Milnor's mind.

Milnor has the twin responsibilities of managing the business of the farmers' national grain corporation and the grain stabilization corporation, both organized under auspices of the federal farm board.

His duty is to direct the disposal of 200,000,000 bushels of wheat produced in American fields each year, but not consumed in America.

This surplus is enough wheat to cover a sizeable city. It glut the market when unexported, forcing prices down.

Milnor, however, comes to the job literally "through the wheat." He has been dealing with it for 30 years.

He recently resigned from the presidency of the Sparks Milling company of Alton, Ill. He is a director of the Merchants' Exchange of St. Louis and of the Miller's national federation.

The grain stabilization corporation already has underwritten approximately 50,000,000 bushels of wheat as a part of its campaign to hold back the recent price decline.

The Farmers' national grain corporation has as its object the organization of 4,000 cooperative elevators and dealers into a mobile centralized unit by the time the 1930 crop is ready to go to market.

GETTING HOT

Corn Pops In The Ear In Georgia

QUITMAN, Ga., July 23.—(P)—The crackling sound in Mrs. Claude Phillips' garden patch must have been another hot weather myth getting ready to explode.

Mrs. Phillips thought it was her pop corn popping in the shuck on the stalk, but available plant pathologists didn't agree.

The corn apparently was popped. That much is authentic.

United States department of agriculture plant specialists, however, pointed out that pop corn had to be thoroughly dried and seasoned before it will pop over a fire.

The plant is comparatively rare in this section and the department of agriculture men were not thoroughly acquainted with all its peculiarities, but said they had a vague recollection of a disease that causes the corn to appear to have popped in the ear.

Hoover Nominates Group Of Officials

WASHINGTON, July 22.—(P)—Three members of the newly created federal power commission of five have been nominated by President Hoover in the first batch of nominations he has sent to the senate since the special session convened.

They were Claude L. Draper, chairman of the Wyoming state board of equalization; Ralph B. Williamson, Yakima, Washington, attorney, who has specialized in the study of water power; and Marcel Garsaud, port engineer at New Orleans.

The chief executive has also nominated William M. Jardine of Kansas, former secretary of agriculture, as minister to Egypt; Brigadier General Frank T. Hines, head of the veterans bureau, as administrator of the combined veterans administration; and Nicholas conflict in June a year ago.

Scanty Garb Brings Their Arrest



Beauty unadorned has led Earl Carroll, Broadway theatrical producer, into trouble again. Arrest of nine of his "Vanities" show girls for giving an allegedly "indecent performance" recalls the faith-bus episode which led to a five-month federal sentence, at Atlanta, for Carroll in 1926. 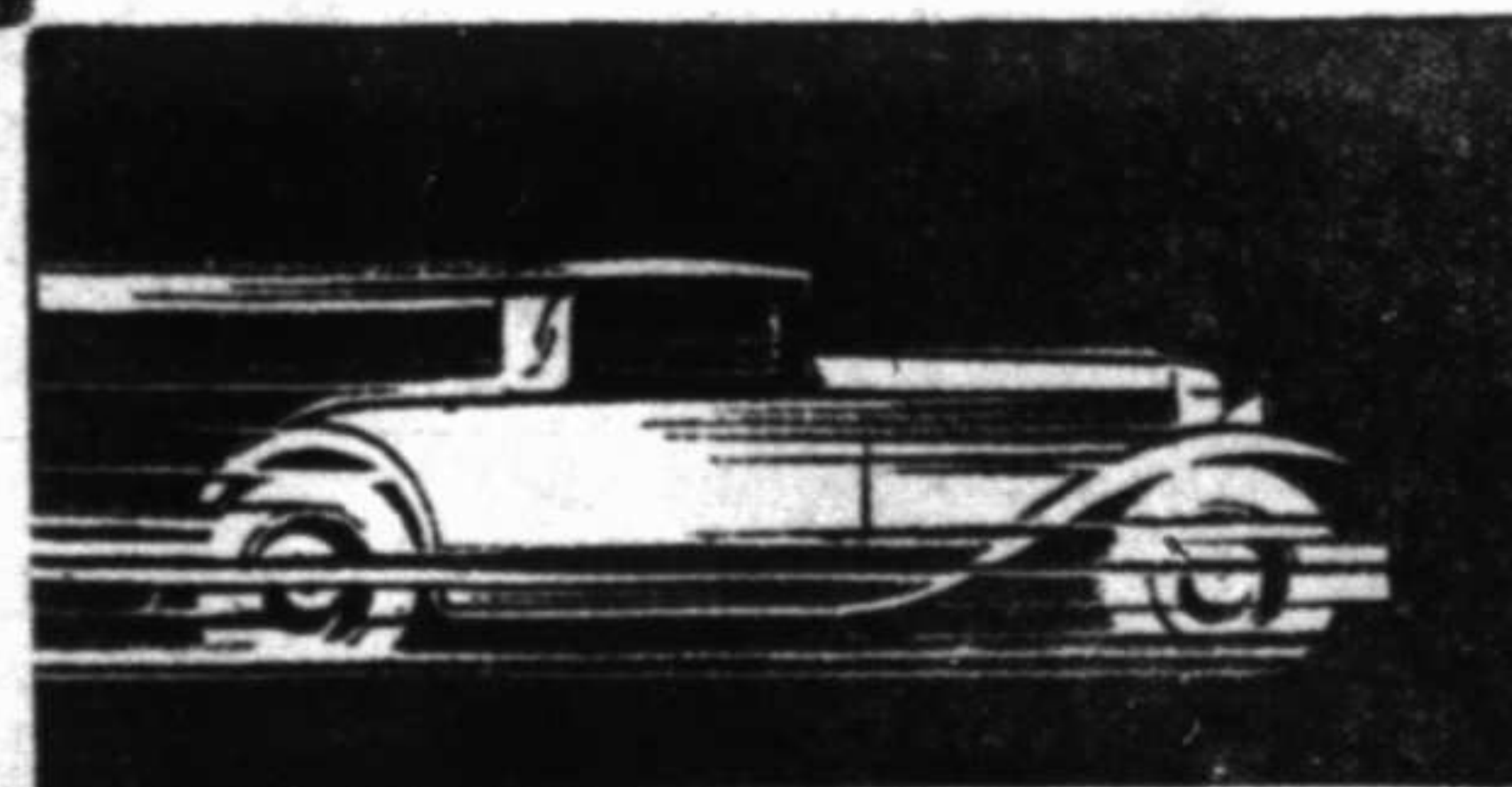

Another nest of Texas Owls hatched last night when Houston and Dallas formally opened the night baseball era in the Bayou City. One hundred and thirty huge reflectors lighted the Buffalo park as the after supper games were ushered in. Houston is the third of the Texas League teams to light its diamond artificially. Waco started the idea, and Shreveport followed suit shortly afterward. Now it is Houston, and if the fad continues to spread as fast in proportion to the first part of the season, all of the teams will have illuminated ball parks before the season is over.

The major leagues are opposed to bed time baseball. When canvassed relative to the subject most of the big time owners declared that if the thing came to a vote they would vote against such owl play. There is hardly a reason to believe that a vote will be necessary, since nearly all of them have expressed an opinion. One of the most noted of the major league clubs said early this week that "night baseball is all out of harmony with the game, which is essentially a daytime sport." The Houston team is the only one in the league that has undertaken in earnest it would be no time before the contests would be turned into noisy brawls on the ground that this or that play had not been properly seen. It is bad enough now in the daylight.

The big mogul goes on to say that "some of the minor clubs that have been experimenting with night baseball have found it is of no help to them the moment its novelty has worn off. The minors moped with the thing without consultation with the majors, and, as usual, with little thought as to what effect night baseball might have on their communities in general if only they could attract a few more at the gate."

We are inclined to disagree just a little with the major official. Perhaps the thing is still a novelty, but night baseball seems to have been tried and proven in the Texas League, and in all other leagues that have experimented with it. It is more than just a fad, we believe, and has come to stay. Aside from resulting in greater financial gain, which has played a great part in saving at least one team in the Texas League this season, the time of day is more suited to the modern business man and his family. Entertainment these days is sought after Old Sol has begun his daily beaming in China. Instead of listening to bed time stories by the pater, the youngsters haul off the breadwinner and the cook to the baseball diamond, and who can say that the time thus spent is not wisely enjoyed?

The major leaguer goes on to suggest that attendance at baseball is not built upon the kind of crowds that go to night shows, but on the sentiment of the young for baseball after they have played it themselves. "Night baseball won't go in the United States any more than the night cricket would go in England," he says. That is hardly a reason, or a plausible excuse, unless the mogul is part owner of a string of theaters. What's the matter with the kind of people who go to night shows? The same people go to baseball games. The thing is the entertainment field is to attempt afternoon matinees and night ball games. With modern show-bus ventilation equipment and naturally lower temperature after dark it would at least be cooler. No, night baseball is not going to draw the slum district any more than the equator would draw equinox.

There are those who believe that Lubbock high school will wear some sort of football crown this fall. The time is a little early for a prediction, but it is a well known fact that Lubbock high school will have a team this fall of which it need not be ashamed. The material is on hand. The coach is ready. The spirit seems high. Those are the three essentials, and without any of them there will not be a prize winning team in this locality. The word is going around that Lubbock will be exceptionally strong, which means that the Westerners will have plenty to live up to. But other teams will be strong too, even in this section, and Lubbock must indeed take a long look to see a state championship. Fort Arthur and Brockbridge, dual champions last year, will be in the fight this fall, practically as strong as last year. Waco high will not be a determining factor in this year's championship. It is doubtful if Waco wins the district. Amarillo in this section will be hard to hold down, but the word is going around that Lubbock will be strong, but that strength will get every kind of test.

And, incidentally, whoever suggested that Little Boy Blue come down his own oughta be bawled out. Done tonight.

Two teams which sometimes look as if they might get somewhere in the major league pennant races but which aren't doing it are the St. Louis Browns and the Philadelphia Nationals. But the individual feats of Phil Collins could not be kept in the shade. Collins not only continued his effective pitching, but he hit two successive home runs and added a single to bring in four Phillies runs.

Brooklyn with its pitching staff, tried Hollis Thurston as a starting moundman in its struggle to get back to the top. The American League cannot find the St. Louis Cardinals to give hits to win a 1 to 0 decision. The Robins made only five hits off Hahnman and Lindsey but two of them and Frischa's error produced the victory.

Giants Best Cubs

The double victory left the Indians six games behind the Yanks.

The Philadelphia Athletics lost an opportunity to gain on Washington, second place team when they dropped a 6 to 5 decision to the Detroit Tigers. Although he did not pitch, George Uhle won the game when he cracked out a pinch single in the eighth to drive in two runs.

I. C. C. NOT TO ALTER RULING

LEGGE BRANDS OPPOSITION TO FARM BOARD'S EFFORTS FOR WHEAT POLICY AS "POLITICAL BUNK"; TO GO AHEAD

BY FRANK I. WELLER
Associated Press Farm Editor

WASHINGTON, July 23.—(AP)—Declaring he was fighting in the open and "not behind President Hoover's skirts," Chairman Legge of the farm board has characterized opposition to the board's wheat policy as "political bunk."

"Present and future orations written by the Democratic national committee," he said, "and fathered by various orators to broadcast the alleged failure of the Farm Board are only more or the same kind of political bunk by virtue of which the farmer arrived at his present position."

Reed Opposition Political
The opposition of Governor Reed of Kansas, to the wheat acreage reduction campaign, he said, was "wholly political." Likewise political he said was criticism of the board for not using government funds to buy and store large amounts of the 1936 wheat crop.

"The Farm Board," he said, "was created to assist the farmer and not for politics. The farmer's problem in an economic one that will never be solved by any political remedies. Hoover Stays Out."

"The president has not interfered with our program and we have gone ahead saving wheat. I expect to report to him soon on the acreage reduction campaign but I am not hiding behind his skirts."

The chairman said he was prepared to tell the president that cooperation in acreage reduction could be expected from the farmers of every state in the winter wheat belt. The report, he said, would be based on the individual expression of farmers he had met on his tour of the southwest. He declared the cooperatives had no authority to force acreage reduction upon their members; the farm board had no power to authorize such contracts and would not do it if it did have.

The whole purpose of the campaign, he said, was to show farmers they would either have to reduce production or be prepared to take a lower price for their wheat.

The chairman said his opposition to removal of an arbitrary tonnage of the 1936 wheat crop was based on the economic fallacy of trying to stabilize a crop in which there is a constantly pyramided surplus.

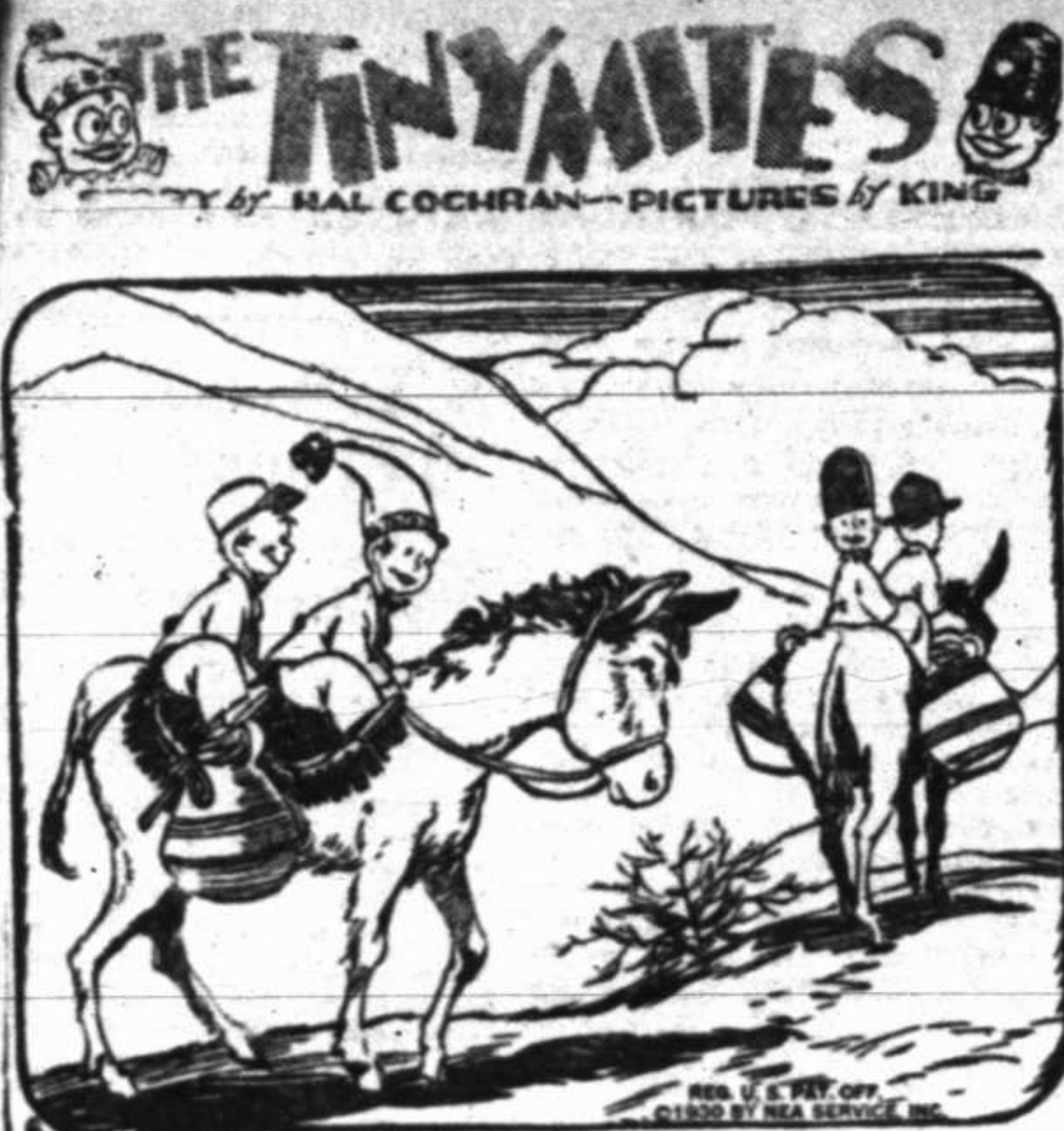

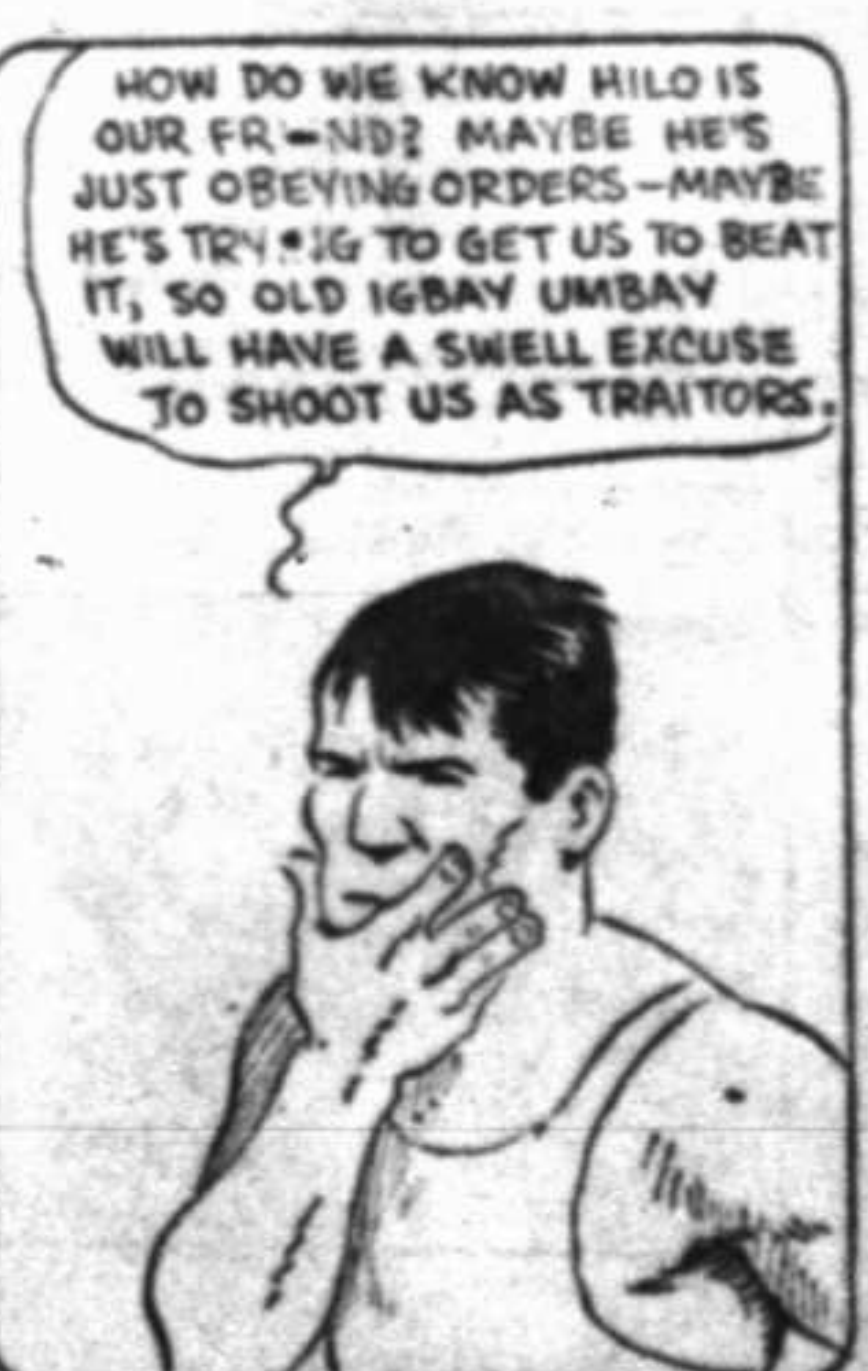
