Carlos Ramsey On Vietnam Duty

VIETNAM (FHTNC) — Marine Second Lieutenant Carlos D. Ramsey, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carlos W. Ramsey of 519 Magnolia St., Burkburnett, Tex., and husband of the former Miss Gerri E. McMillian of 3319 Telephone Road, Houston, is serving with the First Marine Division in South Vietnam.

As a member of the division he helps capture or destroy enemy forces. During large and small scale operations he is supported by Marine air units, tanks, artillery, amphibian tractors and engineers.

His unit is also engaged in a project to assist the Vietnamese people in completing self-help projects, such as the building of wells, culverts, small bridges and schools. Equipment and materials are made available through the Marine Corps Reserve Civic Action Fund.

WALLACE CAPTURES 80% OF STRAW VOTE BALLOT

George Wallace, American Independent Party nominee for the Presidency of the United States, is confident of victory.

Perhaps he has been reading the Burkburnett Star and News. For in the straw vote conducted by the Star-News, Wallace took a resounding victory, capturing almost 80 per cent of the votes cast.

Of the 1066 votes tabulated, Wallace received 840.

Richard Nixon, former vice-president and the standard-bearer of the Republican Party, came in second with 143.

While Hubert Humphrey, no-

minee of the Democratic Party, could do no better than 83 votes.

Wallace has shown surprising strength in other straw votes conducted around the area, and the second and third place showings also reflect the sentiments of the various unofficial votes held previously.

One Humphrey booster in Burkburnett refused to be dismayed by the results.

"It only goes to show that the Wallace people make the most noise," he said. "We'll see what happens in November, he added.

WINTER ACTIVITIES AT LOCAL YOUTH CENTER ARE PLANNED

WICHITA FALLS — Registration for the 1968-69 fall term at Midwestern University was held Sept. 19 and 20, and classes began at 8 a.m. Monday, September 23.

Between 3,600 and 3,650 students were expected to register. Miss Betty Bulluck, registrar, estimated today.

Last fall 3,584 enrolled at Midwestern, and five years ago the all registration figure was 2,513. In 1961, when the university became fully state supported, 1,924 registered.

About 800 beginning freshmen students were expected to enroll compared to 780 last fall. Total number of freshmen registered this fall, including transfer students and part-time students, is 1,500.

The political campaigns are in full swing and we are
about to enter a maze of electioneering which will surpass
anything in the past. Each year the number of voters
increases as more and more of our youth mature to legal
voting age.

This being an election involving the highest office in
the land, more voter interest and a proportionately higher
investment of campaign funds for the various items dis-
tributed by the candidates will be required.

Over the past several years one of the most widely
circulated pieces of propaganda has been the bumper strip.
The reason for the popularity of the strip is its versatility.
It can be applied to a wide range of fixtures and will ad-
here to almost any space from its traditional spot on
automobile bumpers to straw hats. We have seen them on
briefcases, kids' lunch boxes, houses, store windows and
the inevitable bikini in press photos released by the pro-
fessional ad men.

It matters little to us where the partisans of any par-
ticular candidate may choose to display their support by
plastering one of these stickers—provided only that they
use their own property. But we do get more than a little
angry with the antics of the partisans who use the prop-
erty of others to forward the ambitions of their boy.

Sometimes, we wonder if the placing of bumper stick-
ers on street signs, public buildings, telephone poles, bill-
boards and the like isn't ultimately more damaging to
candidates than useful. Certainly the folks charged with
their eventual removal do not enjoy having to undo the
damage caused by them. Very quickly they become an eye-
sore, especially when they start to show the signs of peel-
ing and fading. And how many unsuccessful aspirants
enjoy being reminded of their defeat by seeing those
wretched, weatherbeaten banners staring back at them
from places they should not have been in the first place?

We hope that the campaign managers this year will
encourage more discretion on the part of their faithful
workers to eliminate this practice. After all if their man
is elected he should want to serve in a beautiful com-
munity.

AIN'T NECESSARILY SO
A dab of paint or the addi-
tion of a little padding may be
all that's needed to salvage a
lure that is not producing fish.
Color and size are extremely
important in influencing the
decision of a fish to smash a
certain plug, say the fishing
authorities at Mercury out-
boards. But, the lure in your
hand may appear entirely dif-
ferent when scanned by the
critical eye of a roving large-
mouth. He may not be im-
pressed by either its size or
color.

Instead of disposing of an
ineffective plug, try changing
its apparent size by painting it
a different shade.

Skin divers have noted that
lures painted yellow appear
much larger when viewed from
beneath the surface. This aber-
ration is apparently caused by
reflection, plus the magnifying
effect of water. The same
model in a different light-ab-
sorbing color might appear
nearly normal.

Yellow and white-and-red
combinations have long been
favorite topwater choices; their
effectiveness probably derives
from the reflective qualities of
these colors, not the colors
themselves.

But color is not the only way
to achieve a false dimension.
There are other ways to pad
out the girth of a lure without
actually adding bulk.

Ordinary flyrod bugs with
stiff hackles attached so that
they stick out at right angles
can create the effect of a larger
apparition. The same feathers
placed on the tail give the ap-
pearance of a longer lure.
Neither alteration affects the
casting or fishing abilities to
any degree, but both create an
entirely different impression on
fish.

So heed the hues and pad
the plugs—a phoney line has
been the downfall of many a
lunker.

Leaving A Delicate Problem Behind!

What really causes painful diaper rash? How can a mother pre-
vent it? And how can she cure it where it already exists?
Helpful answers to these questions were given recently by
William O. Elson, director of research of the Curly division of
the Kendall Company, one of
the world's largest manufac-
turers of regular and dispos-
able diapers.

The real cause of most diaper
rash is ammonia, according to
Elson. Not the ammonia which
might be used in washing di-
apers, but that which is formed
by bacteria in wet diapers. If
diapers are not properly lau-
ndered, this bacteria tends to
build up in them, further ag-
gravating the baby's rash, and
the pain and discomfort which
it brings. Soap or detergent left
in diapers, because of inade-
quate rinsing, also will cause
a rash.

There are several ways to
prevent diaper rash, Elson said:

"First of all, mothers can
generally avoid both bacteria
and soap build-up by using
either disposable diapers or
diaper liners. The diaper liners
are made either of paper or of
fabric, such as the new, soft,
non-woven cloth in Curly's
Super-Dri liners.

"For mothers who use regu-
lar cloth diapers, there are two
alternatives. These women
should either use a diaper ser-
vice, or they must exercise
great care in washing and rins-

ing the diapers themselves. If
diapers are laundered at home,
a mild soap, soap powder, or
detergent is recommended, in
plenty of very hot water. If
the water is hard, at least four
rinsings are necessary to re-
move all traces of soap or de-
tergent which may irritate a
baby's delicate skin.

"If you can manage to change
your baby's diaper promptly,"
Elson continued, "you will
avoid most chances of rash.
Leaving a wet diaper on a baby
too long will cancel out all
other precautions.

"Your doctor or pediatrician
is the person to consult if a
rash is particularly painful or
if it persists in spite of all
these preventive measures,"
Elson said.

The research director pointed
out that mothers might begin
to treat less serious cases of
diaper rash by following the
directions given by the U.S.
Department of Health, Educa-
tion, and Welfare, through its
Children's Bureau. A booklet
issued by the bureau points out
that exposing the baby's rash
to light and air, by leaving off
the diaper, will usually cure
mild cases.

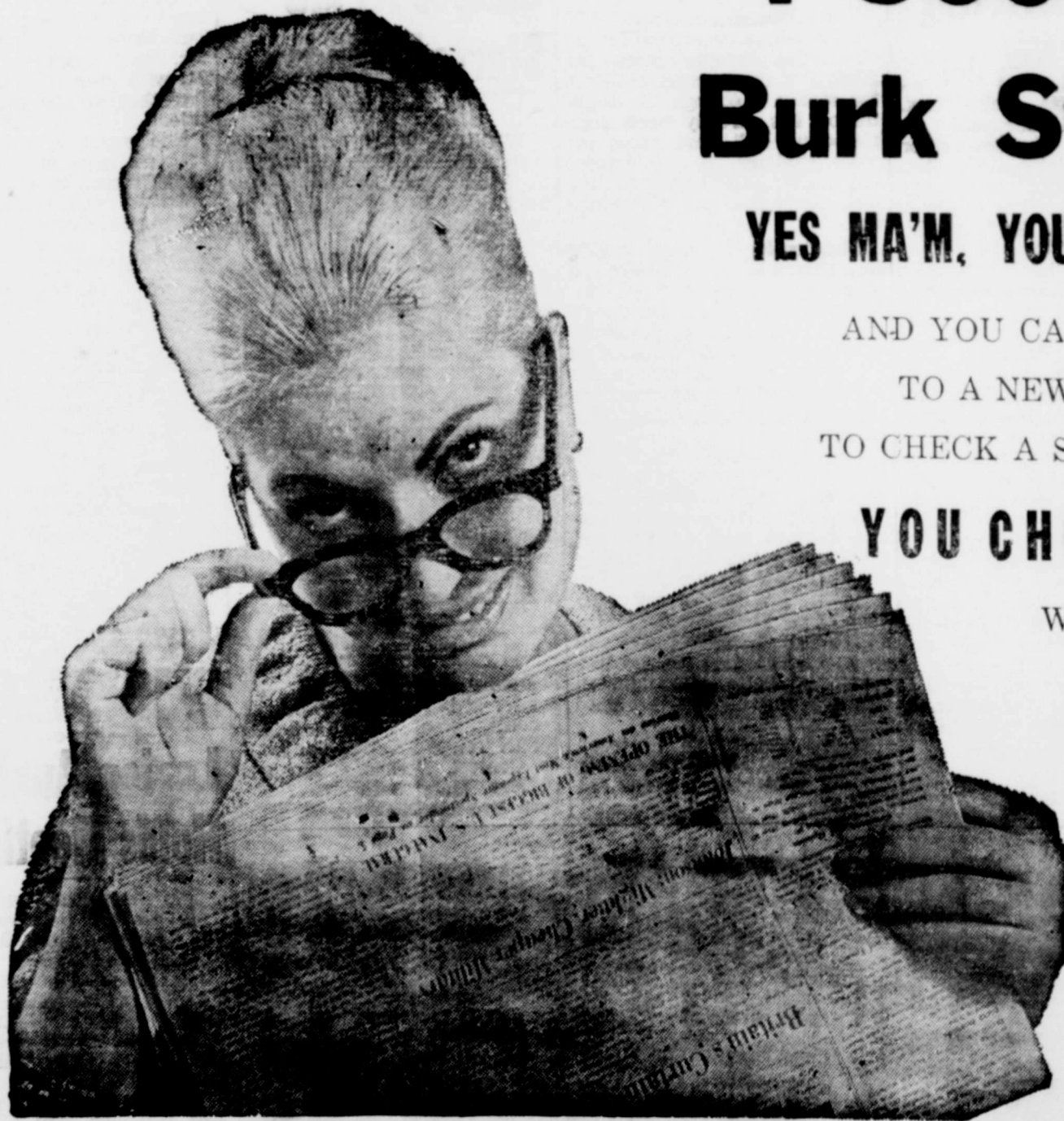

FOOD FOR DIFFERENT AGE GROUPS

One of the very real problems in nutrition education is the fact that nutritional needs vary with the individual. Whether you are a man or woman, boy or girl, and what your age is — all these and other factors determine what your food needs are.

As a result, nutritionists cannot say that so much food, or so much of a certain food, is what all of us need. Instead, they have to list differing needs for groups of people and this makes nutrition advice more difficult to understand and harder to remember. In other words, nutrition is not a simple subject.

Nutritional Needs Vary

With this in mind, here's some nutrition advice for various groups of people:

Teen-age boys need more protein, calcium, and greater amounts of most all nutrients than at any other time during their lives, because they are experiencing their most rapid growth rate. Energy needs, too, are high. Thus between meal snacks are usually needed and should be chosen frequently from the four food groups.

Teen-age girls seem to have the poorest eating habits. Dietary studies show they are figure con-

sious and apt to skip or skimp on nourishing foods. Breakfast, especially, crash diets should be avoided. Since teen-age bodies are in an important period of development, girls need essential nutrients. With increasing teen-age marriages, nutrition is doubly important since pregnancy will put extra stress on the teen-age mother-to-be.

Mothers Neglect Themselves

In general, adult men are likely to have better eating habits than women. Mothers are prone to neglect their own meals while tending the family, or because they, too, are figure conscious without understanding the basics of figure control.

Older adults who have become less active need the same foods as other people but fewer calories. Thus smaller portions are in order. In cutting down, however, it becomes doubly important that meals be made up largely of the so-called protective foods. Excessive starches and sugars should not replace needed nutrients. Studies show older people usually are low in some of the nutrients furnished by milk, citrus fruits, and other fruits and vegetables.



Policyholder Questions Answered by the Health Insurance Institute, 277 Park Ave., N. Y., N. Y., 10017

Q. I have a "major medical" health insurance policy where I work that also covers my wife. I want to be sure that it covers our needs fully — in other words, do I need any additional insurance?



A. Generally speaking, no additional insurance for your medical care costs may be needed if you have major medical coverage, since your policy is probably sufficiently comprehensive to protect the average family from the larger expenses of serious illness or accident. Group health insurance policies are designed for realistic protection against medical expenses in their local area, and will include coverage for hospital expense and probably convalescent nursing home expense, in addition to out-of-hospital diagnosis, surgery, and doctor bills and other related expenses, in or out of hospital. Benefit payments are provided for 75-80 percent of all treatment after a co-insurance factor — which you pay — has been met. Maximum benefits will range anywhere from \$5,000 to \$15,000 and sometimes higher. There is also a deductible amount to be paid by you, usually between \$50 and \$150 for a group policy.

Q. I have a moderate to serious heart condition which has prevented me from obtaining health insurance in the past. Is there any hope of being covered with some kind of health insurance policy?

A. Yes. Many people have health conditions that prevent them from receiving benefits under the usual type of health insurance policy. However, under "special class" health insurance, now offered by an increasing number of health insurance companies, a policy may be issued to a person unable to meet the normal health requirements of a standard policy. A period of recovery or adjustment is required and the policy is issued on individual merits of the case, the particular condition, the degree of damage, and in all instances, is up to the individual judgments of the company. For group health insurance coverage, health is generally not a criterion.

5. Have you replaced frayed wires, loose connections, cracked plugs as you've noticed their state of ill repair?

If you can honestly answer "yes" to the above questions then you can rate yourself "Careful and Conscientious." But in too many cases, the hazards fall into the "I'll-get-to-that-soon" category and sometimes are forgotten in the press of "larger" problems. DIMINUTIVE KARATE EXPERT IS STATIONED AT SHEPPARD

SHEPPARD AFB, Tex. — Have you ever heard of someone 5'5" tall, weighing 125 pounds who has backed away from fights because he was afraid of hurting someone?

That man exists and is presently a taxi dispatcher at Sheppard Air Force Base, Tex. Oh yes, he is also a third-degree black belt holder in karate.

Diminutive, but potentially lethal, Sgt. Billie Norman now counts eight years in the Air Force and almost that many as a karate practitioner.

"Most fellows in high school become interested in football. I was different and favored the martial arts," Norman confessed. His first real sports love was boxing, from which he received "some degree of success" as a high school Golden Glover.

But the Air Force unveiled the world of karate to Norman, and within 14 months after his

first contact with the sport, he had achieved a black-belt rating.

Sergeant Norman didn't come by his black belt rating easily. It was the result of attending karate classes for two hours a night, six nights a week at Seoul Air Base, Korea, in 1961.

For the next half-dozen years, the sergeant hopped around the world as the Air Force sent him to California, then to Vietnam, back to California, then to Korea again and finally to Amarillo AFB, Tex., in 1967 as a training instructor.

"No, I didn't dare use any karate as a TI," Norman observes. "Since it would have gotten me nowhere but jail." During all these hitches, none of which numbered more than 18 months, Sergeant Norman stuck with karate despite frequent lack of facilities and local interest.

Eighteen months ago, he achieved one karate milestone by passing his karate instructors test, a four-hour ordeal. Conducted at the Korean Tae Kwon Do (karate) Association near Seoul, the test has been passed by only 17 Americans before Norman.

When he has taken to the mats against top-flight opponents, Norman has excelled. In November, 1967, he captured the middleweight division title at the Midwestern Judo Championships at Denver, defeating eight opponents.

Earlier this year, at HemisFair '68, Norman emerged as the Grand Champion of a special karate tournament. He out-fought 14 adversaries during that competition.

Currently teaching karate two nights a week to 30 students at the local YMCA, Norman does not take his karate abilities lightly.

"I can break a brick with my fist or six or seven boards with my hand, but teaching it is my goal. Someday I hope to do this at the university or military academy level."

Pamela Fowler is Named Semi-Finalist in Merit Program

Principal James Pearson has announced that a student at Burkburnett High School has been named Semifinalist in the 1968-69 National Merit Scholarship Program.

The student is Pamela Fowler, daughter of M-Sgt. and Mrs. Curtis P. Fowler of 213 Wigham, Burkburnett.

The 15,000 Semifinalists appointed today are among the nation's most intellectually able high school seniors and will compete for some 3,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1969.

The Semifinalists were the highest scorers in their states on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, given last February in 17,500 schools nationwide. They constitute less than one per cent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States.

The Semifinalists show high promise for leadership in their adult careers, according to Jean M. Stalnaker, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. "They have already demonstrated both high intellectual capacity and a readiness to develop their abilities," he said.

"These students deserve credit and honor. They bring honor to their families, who deserve much credit as do their teachers and their communities. Their future success, however, will depend increasingly upon their ability to become productive at the high intellectual levels of which they are capable."

Semifinalists must advance to Finalist standing to be considered for Merit Scholarship, since all winners will be selected from the Finalist group. Semifinalists become Finalists by receiving the endorsement of their schools, submitting scores from a second examination, and providing information about their achievements and interests.

Every Semifinalist who becomes a Finalist will be considered for one of the 1,000 National Merit \$1,000 Scholarships, allocated by state. Many will also be considered for the four-year Merit Scholarships provided by some 400 corporations, foundations, colleges, unions, trusts, professional associations, other organizations, and individuals.

Winners of four-year Merit Scholarships may receive up to \$1,500 a year for four college years, depending on their individual need. Winners of the National Merit \$1,000 Scholarship will receive one-time stipends of \$1,000 upon enrollment in college.

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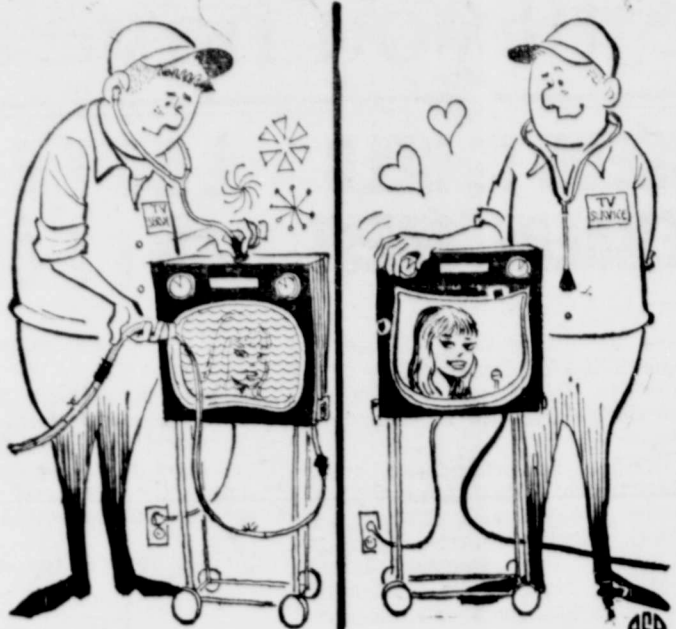

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Rx For "Sick" Color TV's



Does your color TV picture look like this? Image blurred and distorted? Well, it may be suffering from "signal malnutrition." Fuzziness and distortion are common symptoms of an electronic malady caused by inadequate or worn-out antenna lead-in cable. The prescription recommended by a manufacturer of all five types of lead-in now available to set owners is this: a stronger signal is needed for good color or UHF black-and-white TV reception.

Belden Corporation, Chicago, advises that common flat-ribbon or tubular twin-lead cable, which works well for most VHF black-and-white reception, just isn't good enough for color or UHF.

Independent laboratory tests show that for color or UHF sets a shielded twin-lead cable performs best under most reception conditions—especially in crowded areas where the chances for transmission-line pickup of stray electrical interference and noise are greater. With its metal sheath beneath a waterproof foam polyethylene jacket, shielded lead-in protects the cable signal from the effects of auto ignition, electric motors, and other sources of electrical interference.

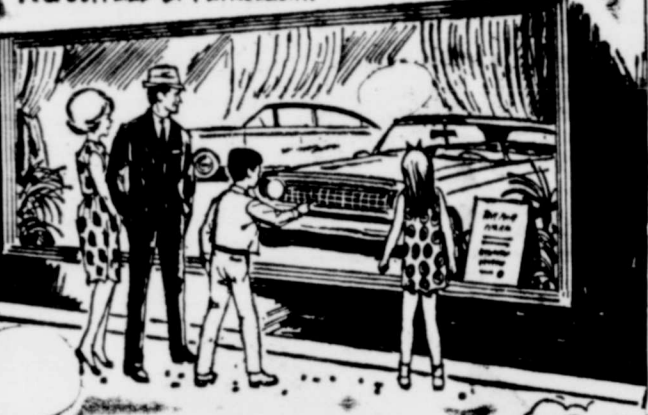
Another type of TV lead-in cable particularly suitable for color or UHF sets in fringe areas is the encapsulated type. It has two conductors separated by a basic insulating material and covered by a special foam polyethylene jacket.

If interference is ruining your color or UHF TV image, or if neighbors are getting better color than you, examine your antenna lead-in cable. If it's the older tubular or flat-ribbon type, or is cracked or corroded, consider replacement with an encapsulated or shielded twin-lead.

A change of diet may do wonders for your sick TV!
