FERRETING OUT THE "FLU"

One day not so very long ago, a doctor walked into his laboratory in the Rockefeller Foundation. He peered through the glass door of a ferret cage, expecting to see the tiny animal listless and ill from influenza germs with which it had been inoculated. The doctor got the surprise of a life which he had devoted to medical research the ferret stared back at him with bright, vicious eyes dangerously healthy.

That marked a milestone in a work which began in 1920, after the deadly World War I flu epidemic. The medical profession knew two things influenza would strike again in twenty years and no preventative had been found.

For 19 years the doctors worked. But vaccines taken from influenza infected ferrets proved ineffective the vaccinated ferrets died as easily as the others. Then fate stepped in. In November, 1939, four ferrets contracted distemper and died. Fear was left in the Rockefeller laboratories if the distemper spread, all the costly ferrets might die. Distemper shots were administered. Then following the two decades old routine, the ferrets were inoculated with the flu virus. And they didn't get sick.

Had the long sought solution to flu been found? For months the doctors worked with their new vaccine, consisting of distemper and influenza solutions mixed. Human volunteers were called for tests. And it was found that the new vaccine put into their blood 70 times the normal amount of influenza fighting antibodies.

The tests still go on the medical profession never claims success until it is certain beyond question. In the meantime, hundreds of thousands of doses of the new vaccine have been sent to England, where an influenza plague is a dread possibility as a result of war conditions. Soon the world will know definitely whether a certain immunizing agent has at last been found.

Here is the way private medicine works. Its war against disease never ends. One by one the plagues which have killed so many millions are shorn of their menace.

JUST WHERE ARE WE?

The arguments that support the theory that we cannot long keep out of war are obvious enough. We have dropped all pretense of neutrality—we are simply non belligerents, committed to the hilt on England's side. We have damned the dictators in unequivocal terms. The leaders of both political parties, the President and Mr. Willkie, are aggressively pro British and anti-Nazi. And we have embarked on a new policy which will give England and her allies our utmost moral and material support—a policy which Hitler, if he is seeking a fight with this country, could logically construe as a declaration of war as in effect.

On the other side of the fence, the arguments have not been so well publicized. In a recent issue, the United States News summed up five principal reasons for believing that this country is not going to war.

First, says the News, the United States can aid Britain more by not fighting than by fighting. Britain, in other words, needs supplies, not men. If we entered the war it would be impossible to send much abroad, as our own undersupplied military establishments would need all our factories would produce.

Second, the U. S. can help her own defense more by staying out of the war. The arms we send England may be lost, but we won't lose men so long as we remain a non belligerent. And we will find out if our arms and planes are adequate for modern war. England, in other words, will be the proving grounds for the products of our factories.

Third, through the lend lease policy, the U. S. can exert its major effect in the war. Actually taking up arms against the Axis would not permit us to do more.

Fourth, the fact that all aid for England policy apparently has the support of a nation which is also committed to maintaining peace, is construed in administration circles as proof of the fact, that its plans and actions are sound.

Fifth, according to his intimates, the President really hates war, meant what he said during the campaign, and will do everything possible to prevent war. He believes that his policy offers the surest road to peace, and in that he is backed by large numbers of his political opponents.

All this does not take into consideration that the Axis might make war on us, thus plunging us into the conflict whether we want to fight or not. Military and political experts, for the most part, don't think that likely at this time. They point out that Hitler doesn't make a particular point of "saving face." As he has said himself, he will not be badgered into taking steps he believes dangerous. The experts argue that Hitler will not wage war against us until and unless it suits his time table. And it is obvious that he has enough troubles on his hands now without asking for more.

Time, which heals all wounds and solves all arguments, will prove the soundness or weakness of these various contentions. In the meantime, there are many thoughtful observers who feel that we will be in war before the year ends—perhaps within six months. Joe Martin the Republican leader in the House, is said to feel that. All the people can do now is wait and see.

In my youth, through the grace of my Creator, I have been permitted to peacefully gather the flowers that grew along my pathway. In manhood, I have been spared the worry and perhaps a sore conscience in the feverish efforts to gather wealth that I did not need.

Now that old age and decrepitude is upon me, I rejoice every day that it was permitted me to gather pleasures in my youth, joy in my manhood and a glorious realization of old age that I am honored, loved and respected by my own, my neighbors and my neighbor's children who cater to my every wish and whim.

I know that one of these days I will be called. I know that perhaps I will cry out in a brief moment of agony, a last sigh and a gasp, and then the world will float from under me into God's hands. He will take care of me. I am His creature. God has always taken care of His creatures and he will do so even unto the end. While I have had a glorious existence on this earth, then why should I fear? It is God's way and in His program is it not? It is good to be old.—Uncle Bill

RACE PREJUDICE

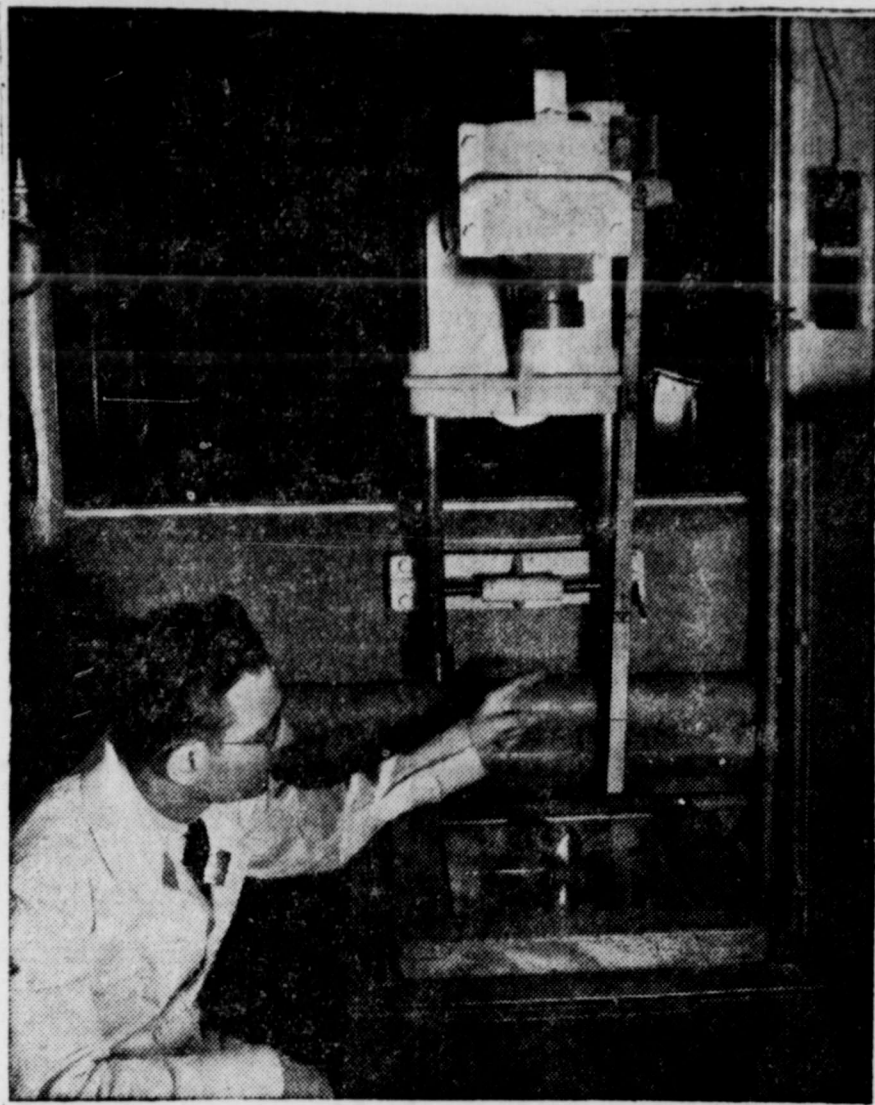

Tuberculosis

"Tuberculosis, like cancer, may be called an undercover disease. Its ability to harm and kill is based on the amount of time it has at its disposal to undermine the system before it is discovered. This factor which only in part can be influenced by public health measures, is one of the biggest stumbling blocks in a further drastic reduction of tuberculosis deaths, states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Formerly, tuberculosis occupied the unenviable position of number one in the causes of death. Through the years it has gradually relinquished its preeminence, and in Texas now is in the sixth place. However, between the ages of 14 to 45 it still holds first place. Even at that, this means that during 1939, the last year on which complete Texas mortality figures are available, 3,011 persons in the State were its victims, despite the fact that never before has science been so well equipped to fight tuberculosis successfully as it is today.

The majority of persons suffering with undetected tuberculosis usually have themselves to blame for their ignorance of their illness because, despite consistent loss of weight, faulty digestion, poor appetite and loss of strength or the existence of a tired feeling in the afternoon, they fail to bring their



HIS JOB IS TO BREAK GLASS

DEARBORN, MICH.—This man's job is to break glass. He's been at it for years. Yet he keeps on breaking it, trying to find a kind of glass that will bend instead of break.

After the first success with a glass that would break in a way that would not leave jagged edges, continued experiments have produced a glass which will crack and bend but not smash into dangerous cutting edges. In the 1920s, when the jagged glass in broken windshields was a major menace in even minor accidents, the Ford Motor Company pioneered safety glass in automobiles.

This picture, taken at that

company's glass plant, shows a 2-pound ball falling five feet upon a piece of safety glass. The glass merely cracks slightly. There is a newer glass now which will withstand the ball dropping 16 feet. This glass has a rubber-like quality and bends slightly when hit.

Ordinary plate glass of quarter-inch thickness shatters into jagged pieces when the balls drop only 18 inches.

Safety glass is made on the sandwich principle. This principle is to place between two layers of glass a sheet of plastic known as vinyl. Glass and plastic are formed into one unit under heat and pressure.

condition to the attention of a physician. Not only is early detection the best guarantee of arresting the disease, but it also serves to protect others in the family by removing the dangers surrounding the unrecognized contact case.

Modern tuberculosis treatment in homes and sanatoria has been a boon to thousands and a protection against the disease to thousands more. However, personal cooperation, in the form of taking one's earliest suspicious symptoms to the family doctor for a check up needs to be more generally applied if the fight against this devastator of life to show marked progress.

The medical profession, public health officials, and lay agencies are doing their best to prove the value of this point upon every one. It is hoped that in the not too distant future it will be more widely accepted.

HAS FORD THE ANSWER?

NEW YORK. — After a six months' investigation of airplane manufacture throughout most of the United States, Edward P. Flynn, of the New York Post, found no likelihood of mass production by airplane manufacturers.

So he went to Detroit to see if there was any possibility of mass production of airplane engines by the automobile companies.

"To achieve mass production," Flynn writes, "Ford has quietly undertaken a job which may well prove to be the most important single contribution to defense production—development of a liquid-cooled aircraft motor so designed that it could be made in mass production in his gigantic River Rouge plant."

"It won't mean anything for 1941 of course, but conceivably it might mean world air supremacy in 1942."

"If the hopes of the Ford engineers are realized, it will be possible within a year to turn out great quantities of airplane motors, not by the slow, man-hour consuming processes, which must be followed in constructing the aircraft motors now being built in this country, but in something very much like the assembly-line style that Ford created."

After commenting that some airplane engineers with whom he talked elsewhere doubt that Ford or anyone else can manufacture plane engines in mass production, Flynn, still impressed by what he has seen at Ford's, declares:

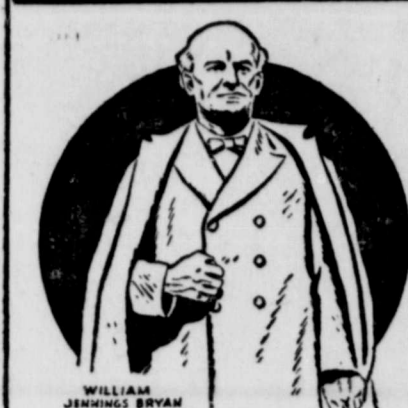
"The Ford engineers have always busied themselves with heresies—the things that violated all the rules and simply couldn't be done. They are doing that now with the aircraft motor. Henry Ford may yet prove his boast that he could make a thousand planes a day."

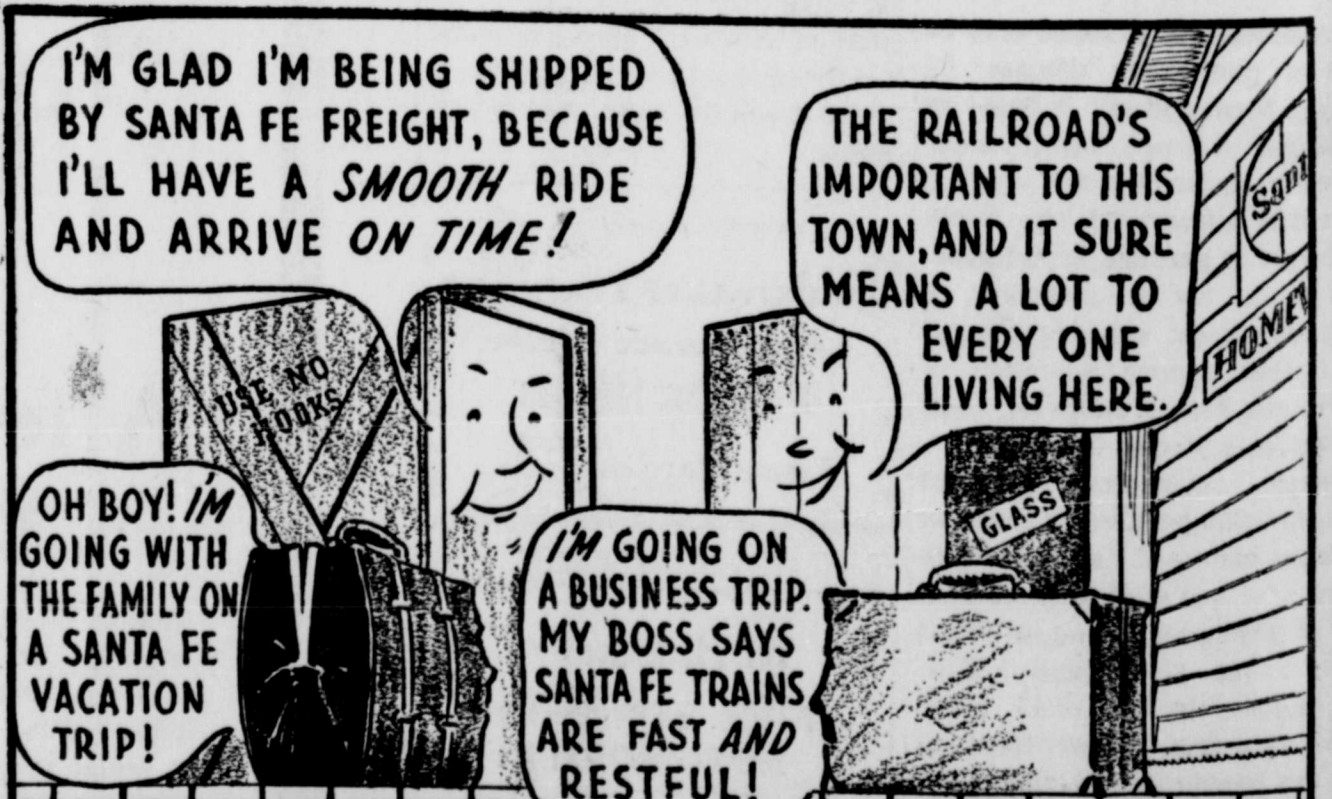
