

Children Sought For Lions' Camp

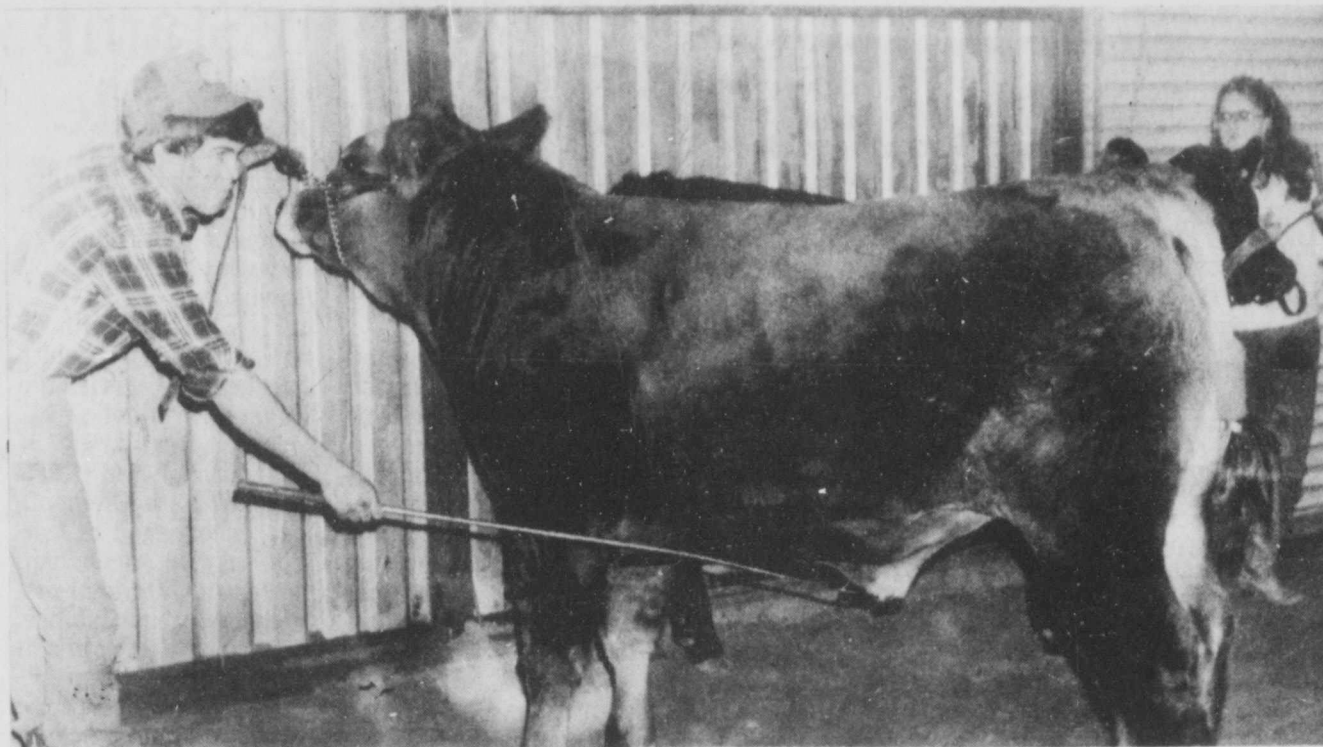
Colorado City Noon Lions Club is looking for children to attend Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children in Kerrville according to Van Mills, president of the club. Applications are also being taken for diabetic children.

Four different two-week sessions will be held throughout the summer, beginning June 20. Campers range in age from 7 thru 16.

Eligible campers include blind or visually impaired children; deaf or hearing impaired; or physical handicaps affecting one or more limbs. Two hundred fifty campers are assigned to each two-week session.

A child's IQ must be 70 or above to qualify. Normal bowel and kidney control and some degree of self-help skills in eating and dressing are also assignment guidelines.

Campers are well-supervised by college-age counselors. Activities include swimming, crafts, nature study, and modified athletics. A variety of night programs also entertain children. The child's health care and safety, while at camp, is also a primary See HANDICAPPED Page 2

Several unsuccessful attempts were made by the Mitchell County Ambulance Service from Root

Memorial Hospital Thursday night to revive or stabilize Barry Otis Joyce, after he was struck by an

unknown vehicle on the Lone Wolf Creek Bridge on Interstate 20, according to Texas Highway Patrolman Tom Johnson.

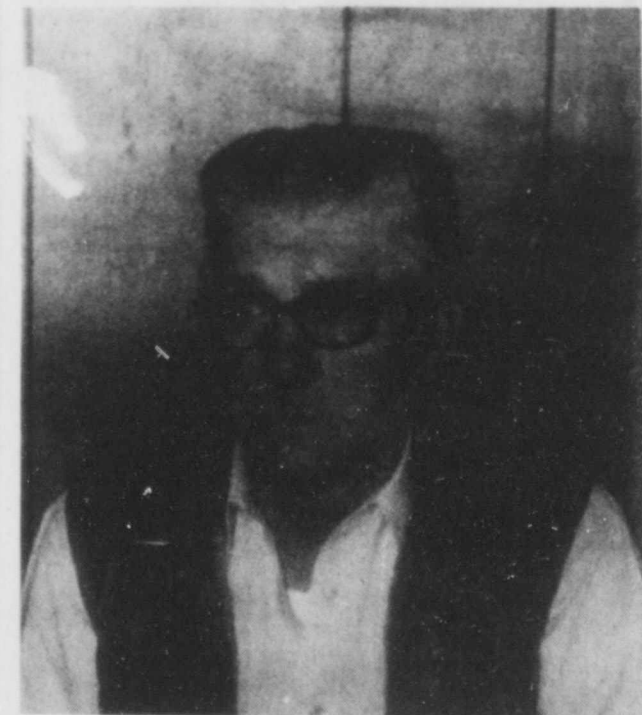

Alcoholism Stamp Now Being Made

A Houston congressman has moved to extend the lifespan of the Postal Service's 18-cent commemorative Alcoholism Stamp.

Rep. Mickey Leland (D-Texas) has written the Postmaster General requesting consideration of continuation of the stamp or its reissuance as a 20-cent stamp, Ross Newby, executive director of the Texas Commission on Alcoholism, announced.

Leland chairs the Subcommittee on Postal Personnel and Modernization of the House Committee on Post Office and Civil Service.

"Use of this stamp

enhances the possibility of alcohol-addicted individuals learning to deal with their disease," Newby said.

The stamp, with a blue design on a white background, carries the slogan: "Alcoholism: You Can Beat It!"

Newby noted that Gov. William Clements had encouraged utilization of the Alcoholism Stamp in an official memorandum in October. Leland wrote Postmaster General William F. Bolder in regard to the stamp's continuance after being conducted by Becky Davis, TCA deputy director, Newby said.

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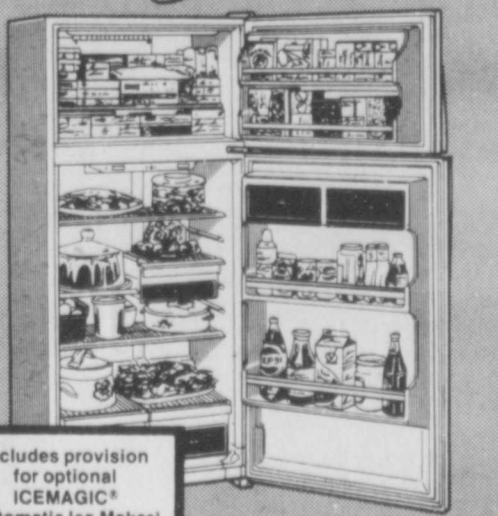
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Moore United In Marriage To Kupatt

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Number Of Wells Increased

The Petroleum Information Corporation of Denver reports that the number of wells drilled, rotary rigs working well completions, wildcats drilled, total footage, and deep wells all reached new plateaus in the year just finished.

The number of wells drilled for oil and gas was up almost twenty-nine percent from the 1980 record setting year. 78,884 holes were punched in the ground last year compared to 62,704 in 1980, according to Petroleum Information.

Rotary rigs working in 1981 finished at 4,530 versus 3,337 at the end of 1980, reports Hughes Tool Company. More rotary rigs were added to the national fleet last year than were working in 1971. Completions totaled 39,101 and broke the old 1955 record of 31,567.

Wildcat wells drilled jumped 27 percent to 9,331. This compares to 7,317 the previous year. The wildcat success rate in 1981 was 18.4 percent.

The total footage drilled last year amounted to 364.4 million feet...up 76 million from a year ago.

And, wells drilled below 15,000 feet were just under 1,000 at 988. That was 285 more than 1980.

In the Permian Basin, our rig count for last week was 499. One year ago it was 374.

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Conservation Winners Announced

Jimmy Harrison, chairman of the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District Board of directors, recently announced the district's 1981 conservation award winners.

Gerry Ritchey was selected as the outstanding conservation farmer. He was selected because of his interest in conservation and conservation work he has done on land he owns and operates. On the land he owns he constructed 33,000 feet of parallel terraces and 32,000 feet of standard terraces. He also constructed three acres of grassed waterways and completely rebuilt 37,000 feet of standard terraces. He uses cotton burrs as a part of his cropping system to improve the soil. Contour farming is carried out on all of the cropland.

Ritchey is carrying out the first Long-Term Agreement (LTA) approved in Mitchell County. The LTA is a conservation program cost-shared through the ASCS.

Herman Hundschnurher of Hermleigh was selected as the district's Absentee Conservation Farmer-Rancher. He was selected because of the outstanding conservation work he has done on his 326 acre stock-farm located south of Lorraine.

Hundschnurher established grass on 184 acres of severely eroded cropland. He has carried out deferred grazing, proper grazing use and wildlife upland habitat management on 307 acres of rangeland. Conservation cropping system and crop residue management was completed on 14 acres of cropland. A farm pond was constructed to provide water for livestock and wildlife, and for recreational purposes.

Harrison stated that Dr. Kenneth Cowan was selected as the Wildlife Conservationist because of the excellent wildlife habitat developed through good management practices.

Dr. Cowan seeded 100 acres of cropland to grass, constructed 12,000 feet of terraces and 1,600 feet of diversion terrace. He also constructed two ponds to provide water for livestock and wildlife. Deferred grazing, proper grazing use, rotation grazing and wildlife upland habitat management were carried out on 176 acres of rangeland. Contour farming and a conservation

cropping system were carried out on 74 acres of cropland. An excellent job of residue management was carried out on the cropland to promote wildlife.

All three recipients will receive awards from the Mitchell SWCD at the awards program to be held in May. All three winners will also be entered in the Texas Conservation Awards Program.

small amount of weevils are produced this year then next year there will be fewer weevils, however, if an increasing number of weevils are put into the system each year they will soon reach yield - destroying numbers.

So, to help prevent weevils on a yearly basis and for the future Mitchell County Producers are urged to plant their cotton on May 24th.

Pest Management Met January 18th

The Mitchell County Pest Management Steering Committee met on January 18 and set the Uniform Delayed Planting Date for cotton producers on May 24.

This date was chosen because boll weevils had very good conditions when they were preparing to overwinter and until just recently have had relatively mild winter weather. As a result of these conditions the potential exists for a higher number of weevils this year than we had last year.

The Delayed Planting Date is one of the best defenses against the boll weevil. When the weevil emerges in the spring and early summer it needs to feed on cotton squares in order to mate and lay eggs. The purpose of the delayed planting date is so the cotton will not be squaring when the weevils are emerging and searching for squares. Therefore, the weevil will die from starvation and leave no offspring.

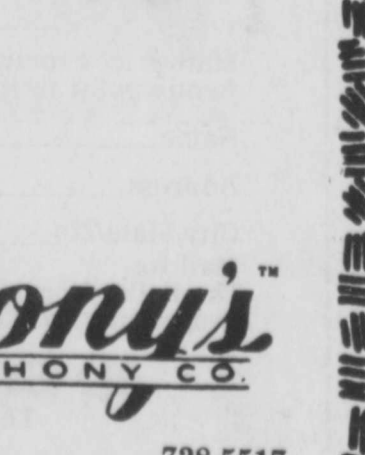

Q. Is there any easy method to check out proper rear axle alignment?
A. Actually, it's simpler to check rear axle alignment than it is the front end. And, the check usually is as simple as running the car over a wet patch of pavement, then a dry patch, then checking your tracks. The tracks of the rear wheels should, in proper alignment, be either directly on top of or equidistant inside those of the front wheels. If a properly aligned front end must be turned slightly to go straight, or if the rear track is off to one side or the other, one end of the rear axle is misaligned. With the spring supported, loosen the u-bolts on either end and bump the axle back into place. Measuring to check displacement is easily done by measuring the distance from the spring to a clearly definable point on the axle housing on each side.

THE JACKASS THAT DISCOVERED THE WORLD'S GREAT MINE

Unbelievable but true, the story of a stray jackass led a prospector to the strike that turned out to be one of the greatest silver-lead finds in history.

Back in 1885, N. S. Kellogg, a carpenter in his sixties, turned prospector when the gold boom in Murray, Idaho subsided. The building boom was over also, a ghost town was in the offing, and Kellogg found himself unemployed and almost destitute. If gold had been discovered in Murray, he reasoned, why wouldn't there be more gold in the mountains?

He sought help from many until two persons, O. D. Peck, a contractor, and Dr. J. T. Cooper, a former surgeon in the British navy, consented to grubstake him. But not handsomely, he found out, for they gave him less than twenty dollars for food. To this they added a jackass—which they bought for three dollars—to carry his pack. The jackass was a vagrant about town, having been running loose on the streets for months, baying day and night. Miners and their families had indicated a desire to shoot him.

For two days Kellogg moved into the mountains. The second night in Milo Gulch, he unrolled his pack and tethered the jackass. The next morning the jackass was gone, his tether broken.

Without that blankety animal he was lost, so Kellogg, his age working against him, labored up the mountain. As he approached the summit, all hope of finding the jackass gone, a harsh bray floated out from somewhere above him. He found the beast grazing contentedly on the mountain. Exhausted from the climb, Kellogg sat down to smoke and rest. It was then that his hand dislodged a rock, and the ore beneath was almost pure galena. With a pick, he worked down the mountain, across the gulch and up the opposite side, finding a continuous vein of the silver-lead mineral running through it.

The discovery on that August day in 1885 by Kellogg became known as the famous Bunker Hill and Sullivan mine. And the braying announcement of a jackass started it all.

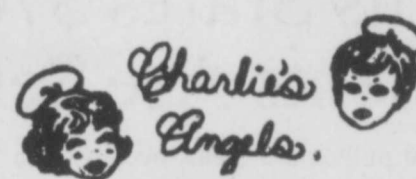
