Recently the Clovis Chamber of Commerce announced the location of an apparel manufacturing plant in that city. The site of the plant will be in the Southwestern Public Service Industrial Park on the east edge of Clovis. This is an ideal location from the standpoint of the Twin Cities.

Our future is closely tied in with the economic expansion of Clovis and we will be particularly benefited by growth along the four-lane highway that joins our two communities. This area seems to be the spot of greatest business growth and other activities. We think one reason for this is the economic prosperity prevailing in Parmer and adjoining Texas counties. We want to keep it that way.

Our communities are well-situated to benefit from greater employment opportunities on Clovis' east side. We can profit greatly by having more people live here and work there. What we need is people. People to own homes, pay taxes and buy their necessities of life here.

As we acquire more people, we can support a broader retail business base which in turn will employ more people who will live here and pay taxes, which will again begin the cycle. Growth is like the hen and the egg. It is difficult to tell just where in the cycle it all starts but once it gets going it will expand a lot just on its own momentum. This opening for 600 jobs will go a long way to start the cycle of economic growth for our Twin Cities.

As a community we must do several things. One is to fill in the work application blank being circulated. This is the final thing in the long chain of events that will bring this plant to our area. We strongly urge everybody's cooperation.

We must also maintain our towns in such a condition that people will want to live here. By keeping a bright, clean face to the public, we can certainly influence families to select us as their future home community.

We get a warm glow just thinking of what 20 or 30 more families might mean to the Twin Cities.

"Politics make strange bed fellows" is a remark not new to this column. Another startling example is now coming before the public. The Republican administration is plugging for a bill sponsored by our old friend Wright Patman, Chairman of the House Banking and Currency Committee. This bill calls for a substantial raise in the income tax exemption, up to \$2,000 instead of the present \$600. This had wide appeal as nobody likes to pay taxes and we all know the cost of supporting a dependent is astronomically higher than it was when the \$600 figure was set back in 1948.

This is a smart political move but one we feel in the long run can prove very costly to the few taxpayers remaining. When you exempt a person from paying taxes, yet allow him to vote to levy higher taxes on his fellowman, you will eventually have nothing but economic chaos. We strongly fault the Nixon administration for engaging in this political chicanery.

We believe the only moral policy is to require a person to pay some taxes before he be allowed to vote. This was a provision in our original constitution, but is now considered outmoded by some of our advanced-thinking doubledomes.

Some day, after the debacle, our great-grandchildren may re-discover this principle and wonder why we ever abandoned it.

Hail Destroys Crops Across Parmer County

Rain and hail in varying amounts accompanied by high winds cut a path across Parmer County last Friday afternoon damaging and destroying both young and matured crops.

In Friona, which had been hit by hail some two weeks ago, little or no hail was reported and only two inches of rain fell; however, in the Hub area many crops were totally destroyed by the hails which accompanied the driving rain. Rain in the Hub area was in varying amounts from two inches to three inches.

In Bovina, two inches of rain was reported while in the area south of Bovina, which was hard hit by hail two weeks ago, a heavier rain is reported accompanied by hail which finished all hope of any wheat harvest in that area. Harry Johnson at the Sherley Grain Co. in Bovina states that this is the most damaging hail in the county since 1963, when an entire area north of Bovina had major hail damage. He said, "Most area farmers agree that this year is worse than 1963."

In the area southeast of Farwell only good rains have fallen with no hail damage reported. However, in the area east of Farwell, at Oklahoma Lane, crops were completely wiped out by the hail which lasted from 30-40 minutes. Some hail as large as golf balls was reported in the Oklahoma Lane-Farwell-Bovina area.

North of Texico-Farwell little hail was reported with no damaging hail indicated.

However, good rains in varying amounts from one and one half inches to two and one half inches have been reported.

At Parmer, a two and one-half inch rain was reported with no hail.

John Hadley, who lives seven miles southwest of Texico-Farwell reports hail at his farm which at one time stood three inches deep on the ground. His cotton and wheat are total losses, but he has hopes that the grain sorghum will be alright when the sun comes out. Hadley says, "This is the worst year since 1949 when it rained constantly making it impossible for farmers to harvest wheat crops until late in the summer or not at all."

Closer to town where Mark Liethen farms, approximately

three miles southwest, good rains have fallen with no hail. Fred Chandler at Sherley-Anderson-Pitman Elevator in Farwell reports a total of 2.2

inches of rain through Tuesday morning since Friday, with only light hail. In Texico, B.A. Rogers reported one and one-half inches of rain Friday evening with light showers on Sunday and Monday nights.

As this is being written the skies are overcast bringing the promise of even more rain.

At a meeting of Theta Rho Chapter of ESA Sorority last Wednesday at Clara's Cafe, plans were made for the chapter to again sponsor the "rodeo queen" contest which is held in conjunction with Border Town Days. Date for the annual celebration is July 31 and August 1, 2.

According to Mrs. JoAnn Liethen, president of the sorority, during the next two weeks (prior to July 1) all business firms in Texico and Farwell will be contacted to see if they would like to sponsor a girl in the contest. Entry fee is \$5.00 for each contestant. During the same period, all girls between the ages of 14-18, inclusive, will be contacted in regard to their entry in the contest.

Plans are underway for the entrants in the contest to make

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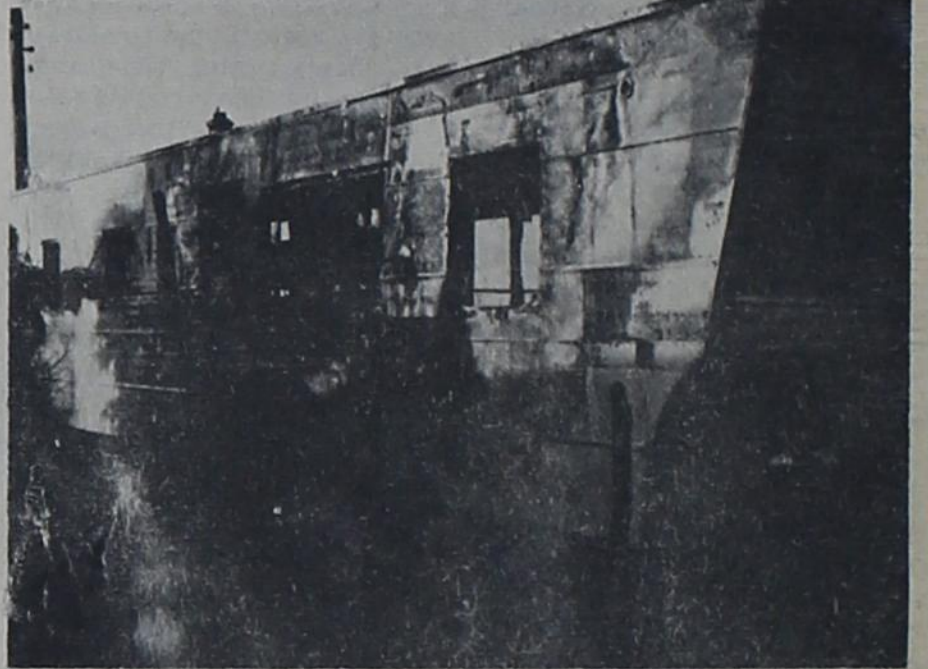

Carolyn Langford was named "rodeo queen" last year. She was presented at the final performance of the AJRA rodeo which is held in conjunction with the annual celebration.

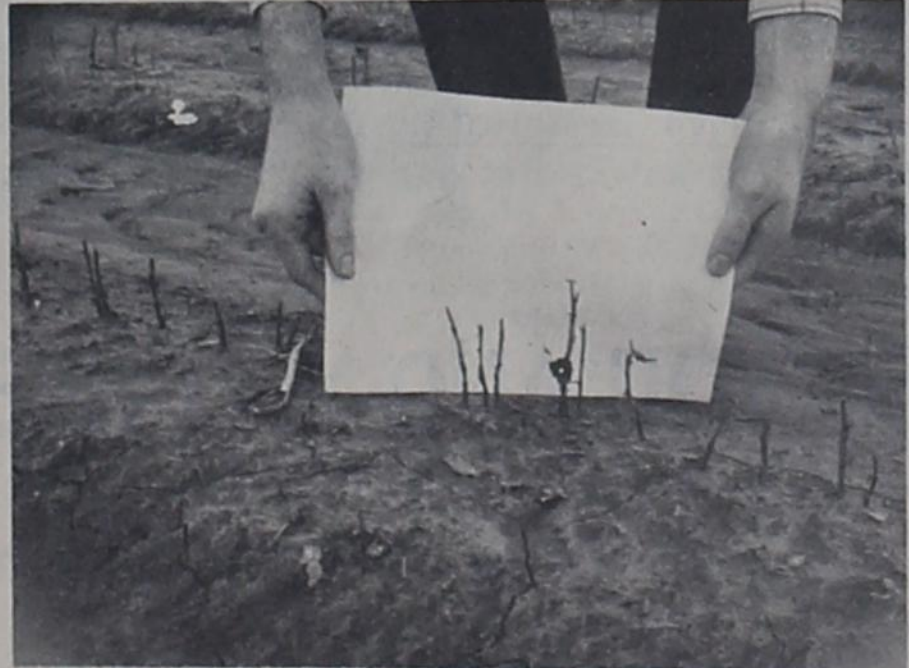

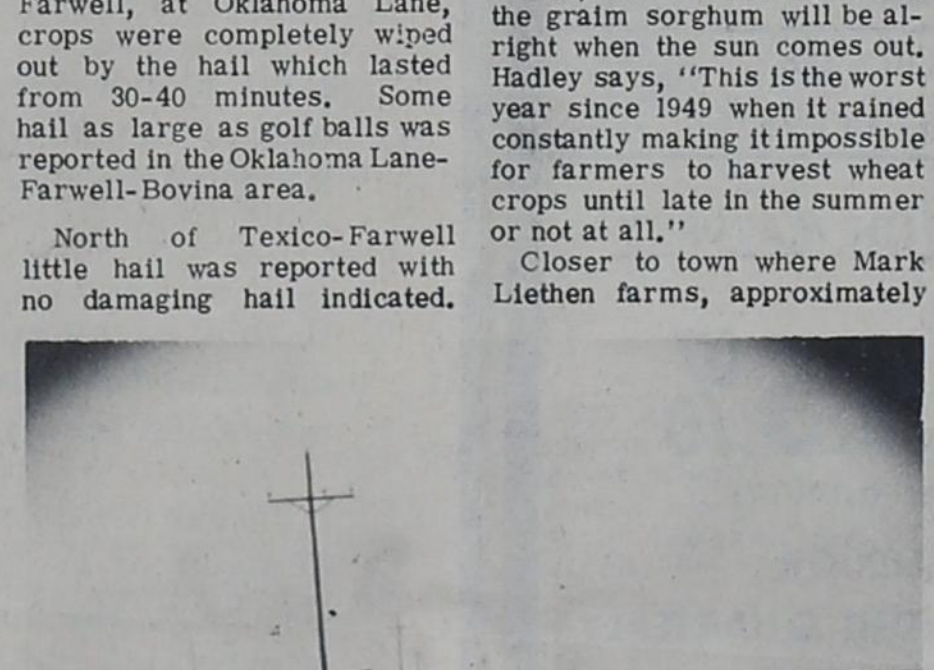
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MAIZE CROPS on the Barthell Ford farm were also a total loss following the hail and rain on Friday. No crop in the area survived the devastating storm.

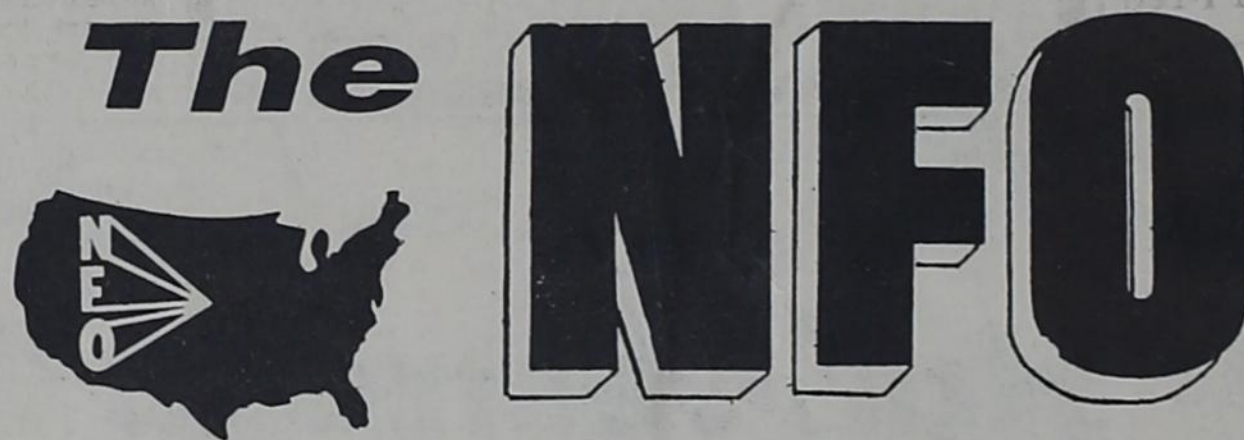

The trend is established. Farm prices continue to drift downward, with only an occasional short lived price rise. NFO is designed only to help farmers reverse the trend. Farmers can not do this as individuals -- but they can do this as an organized group.

NFO is not asking farmers to desert their present farm organizations, but only to join the NFO for the purpose of bargaining collectively for a fair price. NFO has the system to gain better farm prices and to protect the farmer in the market place.

If this areas economy is to remain stable, all segments of the economy must continue to receive a fair return for goods and services. The businessman needs the farmer and the farmer needs the businessman.

NFO has the communication system to give the best information on supply and demand of farm products. Because farmers have failed to set their price in the past, the buyer has been forced to set it for them. Through NFO farmers are setting their own price -- NFO members in the grain sorghum producing areas of Texas and bordering states are asking a minimum net price to the farmer of \$2.00 cwt for milo--a price not unrealistic considering that full parity for milo is \$3.08 cwt. NFO has also been responsible for an upward pressure on livestock prices bringing cattle and hog prices closer to parity.

NFO is now the largest active participating farm organization both locally and nationally. Let's keep it that way. Be at our next meeting and participate in the business.

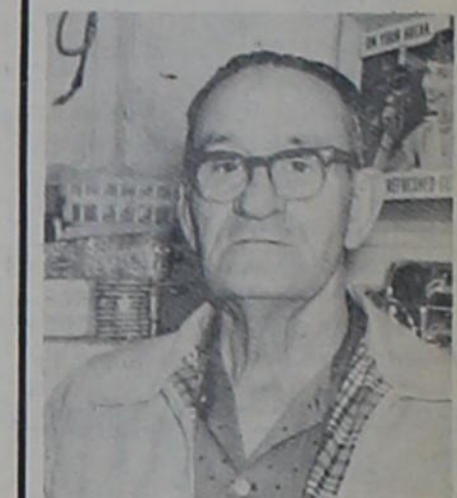

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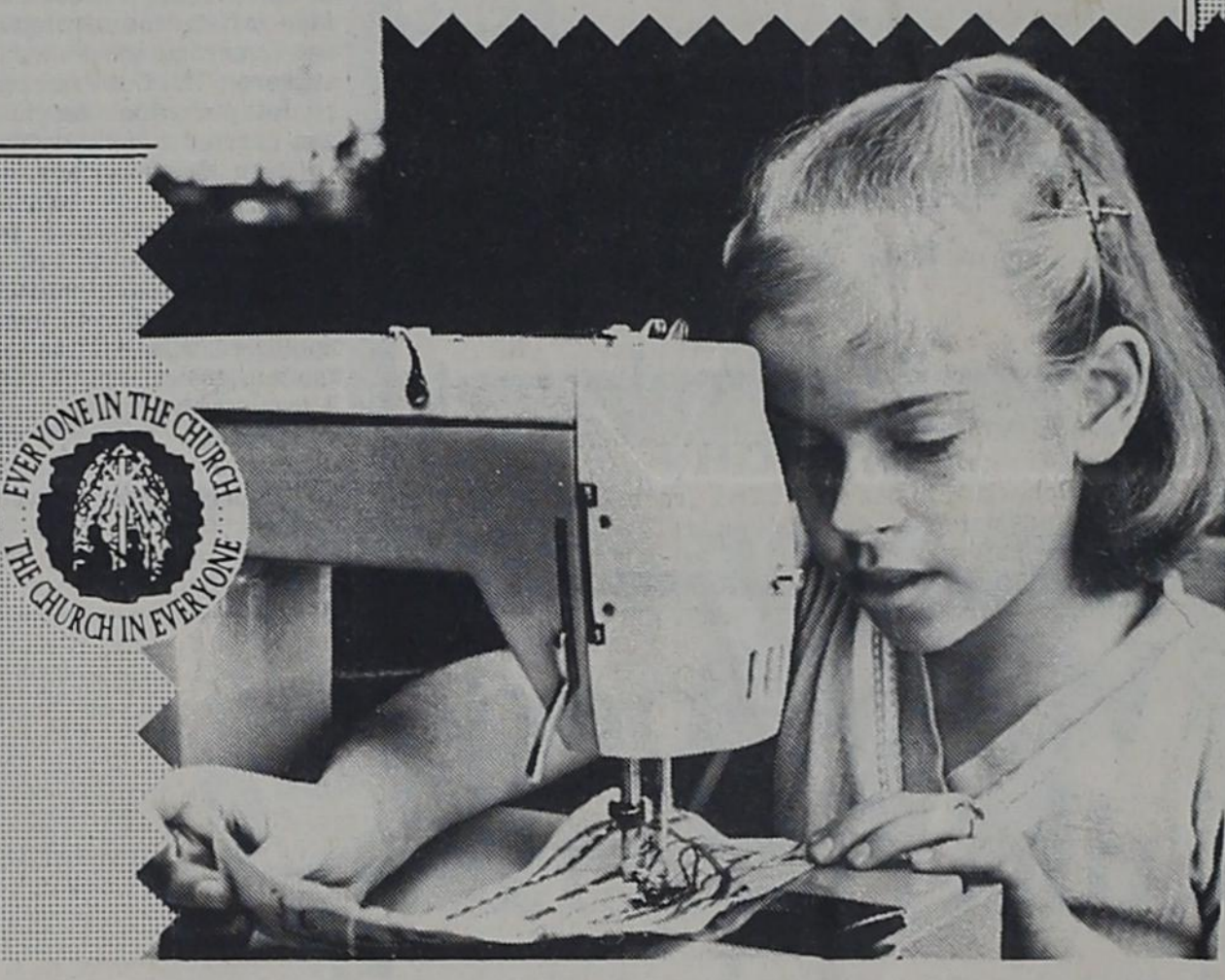

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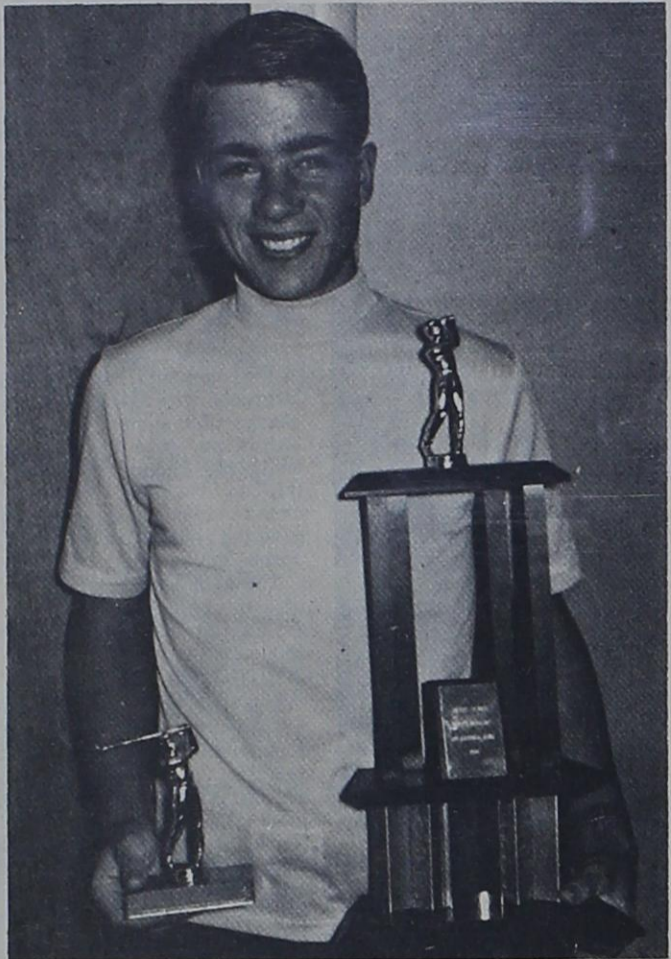
Serves As Chairman Of Citizenship Short Course

Garden Provides Relaxation And Fun

"The desert shall blossom as a rose." These words of the prophet Isaiah have been literally fulfilled around the Lutheran Church and parsonage in Lariat since Reverend and Mrs. Herbert F. Pelman took residence there in the spring of 1964.

"That first spring, with practically no grass and only a few shrubs on the south side of the house, the sand blew from the south one day and from the north the next, then reversed itself making it difficult for our little radishes to survive," reminisce the Pelmans.

Soon the men of the church took pity on the pastor and his wife, and planted bermuda grass roots all around the parsonage and on the large plot of ground between the parsonage and church. Slowly the pastor and his wife, Madge, developed flower beds around the parsonage, on two sides of the church, and in other bare spots, until flowers for the church have been provided for most of the Sundays for the past three

years, beginning with jonquils and tulips in the early spring until the last mums are gone with the first killing frost in the fall. During the past month more than a dozen varieties of iris in various colors and several bouquets of roses have graced the church. Other flowers blooming at the present time include creeping phlox, blue flax, and a shrub known as the flowering sweet pea tree which looks much like a tree Wisteria.

Later there will be petunias, marigolds, balsam or lady slippers, larkspur, phlox, gladioli, dahlias and a dozen different varieties of lilies along with several everblooming iris. Then just before frost comes the mums and golden glows will bloom.

East of the parsonage is the garden which for the past month has provided radishes, lettuce, rhubarb and asparagus for the parsonage table. Later there will be English peas, green beans, lima beans, corn, okra, cantaloupes, squash and cucumbers.

The south side of the garden is fringed with a berry patch containing blackberries, dewberries, and raspberries.

Replying to a question about how he finds time for his miniature farm, the 75-year old clergyman said, "Preachers need exercise too, and I, for one, receive more enjoyment and recreation out of digging in the dirt and watching things grow than I could ever get out of chasing a little ball around a golf course!"
