Stamp Goes On Sale August 26 To Honor Soil Conservationists

Cooperators of the Mitchell County Soil Conservation District are among those honored by issuance of the world's first conservation stamp, Roy Carey said today.

Mr. Carey said the stamp, to be issued August 26 at Rapid City, South Dakota, is "a tribute to the nation's conservation farmers and ranchmen including district cooperators of the local district, which has been in operation since 1941."

"The 4-cent stamp is in recognition of the farmers and ranchers who are demonstrating good soil stewardship," Carey said. "It is a salute to their soil conservation districts, and to the professional workers of State and Federal government who help them."

The stamp will go on sale August 26 at Rapid City, South Dakota, at the annual meeting of the Soil Conservation Society of America, a professional organization, Carey said.

On the following day, the stamp will go on sale at other post offices throughout the country, including those at Loraine, Colorado City and Westbrook.

Mr. Carey said local observance of the issuance of the soil conservation stamp is being planned. Local stamp collectors are urged to make plans to secure first day coverage and to purchase their stamps August 27, 1959. Local business are urged to purchase and use the new stamp.

Quail And Dove Hunting Will Be Good In Mitchell County

fore hunting time and that the people of Mitchell County would do well to learn something about our wildlife.

Quail and Dove are more plentiful in Mitchell County than they have been in several years. This is due in part to good cover and feed produced as a result of our soil conservation district program. Dove season will be with us in September, so here is a little information about the Mourning Dove.

Mourning Doves are migratory birds. Hunting regulations are prescribed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. These birds are subject to rapid movements—northers, drought, lack of food or heavy hunting pressure will cause them to move out. The birds require drinking water every day. They are seed eaters. Principal foods are crotons, pigweed, sunflower and ream sorghums. Sorghums, wheat grain and sunflowers are good feed seed, but are subject to rapid deterioration by sprouting or spoiling. They feed on wheat grain, sorghum, and crotons mature. One-seeded croton is one of their favorite seeds. Some grasses are very good, particularly Texas panicum.

Doves feed in the morning, water and sit around in protective cover (trees) through the middle of the day. In the afternoon they feed, water and roost. Birds are often taken during the afternoon in grain fields, or around water holes late in the afternoon. Their daily flight pattern.

According to Mr. Carey if we are to maintain our wildlife for food and hunting pleasure, farmers should provide surface water and encourage the growth of native weeds, such as sunflower and croton. Good crop utilization on grain sorghum is a good practice. Five acres is about the minimum acreage for feed in management.

People who hunt foxes should be very careful not to let one of the animals bite them or their dog. Nearly a third of all foxes have rabies, according to animals tested during the first five months of this year by the State Health Department.

Dogs have the next highest percentage of rabies while skunks are only about a percentage point behind the dog.

The Health Department gave these figures on various animals: dogs, of 832 tested, 58 were positive for a percentage of 24.6; of 567 cats tested, 21 were positive for 8.9%; of 57 cattle tested, 21 were positive for 8.9%; of 96 foxes tested, 69 were positive for 29.2%; of 96 skunks tested, 55 were positive for 23.3%.

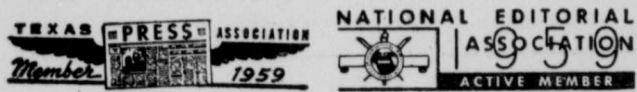

Questions and Answers

Q. I have a GI home loan I have been paying on for a year. I just heard that the maximum allowable GI interest rate has gone up. Does this mean I have to pay my lender more?

A. It definitely does not. Loans closed before July 2 are in no way affected by the new rate. Only loans made on or after that date can be charged the new 5 1/4 percent rate.

Q. I want to go to school under the Korean GI Bill in the fall. How soon after starting school can I expect my first GI allowance check?

A. In about two months. Under the law, VA allowance checks are payable only after completion of each month of training, and the law allows VA 20 extra days to process checks. So be prepared for a two-month wait before your first check comes.

Q. I am going to have to take a physical examination to reinstate my lapsed GI insurance policy. Who mails my medical application for reinstatement to the VA, me or my physician?

A. Your examining physician should mail it to the VA as soon as your examination is completed.

Q. If I decide to convert my term insurance to a permanent plan, must I convert it all at once, or can I convert a part at a time?

A. You may convert a part of your term insurance to permanent insurance, but the minimum amount that may be converted is \$1,000. After that, conversion must be in multiples of \$500.

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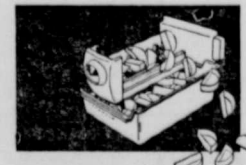

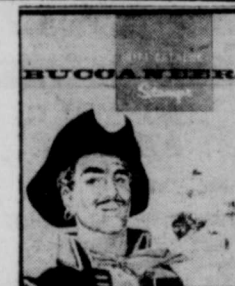
