Get out of the Gulf

As I'm sure you realize by now, I'm pretty gung-ho when it comes to foreign affairs.

For example, I wouldn't mind seeing troops sent to Nicaragua to clear the Communists out of that Latin American nation.

But right now we are involved in a foreign expedition that upsets me: using American naval forces in the Persian gulf.

When dealing with fanatical Iran, we have to understand who we are dealing with: irrational people. It's not a matter of sitting down at a negotiating table and coming to a sensible agreement. I can't see the present Iranian leadership doing that with "the Great Satan," their euphemism for the U.S.

When it was first announced that Kuwait was re-registering its ships under the U.S. flag, my eyebrows furrowed. That in itself was a dangerous escalation of the war and the first practical involvement of the U.S. If a ship flying the U.S. flag is attacked, is that not an attack on the U.S.?

Then it's announced that American Naval forces are being sent there. Yet another important escalation.

What really set me off was the "Time" magazine article of two weeks ago which blasted the U.S. decision-makers in this situation. To sum up, "Time" said they didn't know what they were doing. Rarely have I seen a publication that I respect so angrily criticize our leaders.

For many, many years, the U.S. has considered the Persian Gulf to be of strategic interest to the West. Even though we don't get that much oil from that area, our allies do, especially Japan.

As a result of World War II, Japanese naval forces are at a minimum and that nation is in no position to guard its oil supply through the Gulf. I think it's time for the U.S. to urge Japan to begin building up its military forces to equal those of our other major allies.

Thus, I have always assumed (ah, that famous word) that our military leaders had thoroughly planned for any disruptions of the oil caravan through the Gulf. Well, bluntly, it sure didn't look that way the past few weeks. It looked more like the generals and admirals meeting each day and saying to each other, "What do we do now?"

So let's take a look at the possible upcoming scenarios.

One: Iran does nothing more than laying out mines, which are swept easily. Score one for the U.S.

Two: Some fanatics from Iran jump in a boat laden with explosives and ram a U.S. warship (remember: in the Muslim religion, an attack on heathens in this manner is a sure way of getting to heaven. And don't ever under-estimate the power of religion).

How does the U.S. respond to that scenario? All I can visualize is an attack on the Iranian mainland. If we do nothing, we lose a tremendous amount of "face" and will be the laughing stock of the world.

(Frankly, I don't care that much about "face," but it seems leaders always do. I've always said that all the favorable publicity in the world and 5 cents still won't buy you a cup of coffee.)

Thus, we retaliate. We send in airplanes and bomb some strategic military target, killing a minimal amount of civilians in the process. Now, it's Iran's move. And that wealthy nation has a lot more going for it than Libya or Grenada. The Ayatollah has the wherewithal to strike back. And I'm sure he would.

No problem there. We strike again. And the first

Kellie has been in a coma since July 26. She is in a very light stage of coma, but she is still not fully awake.

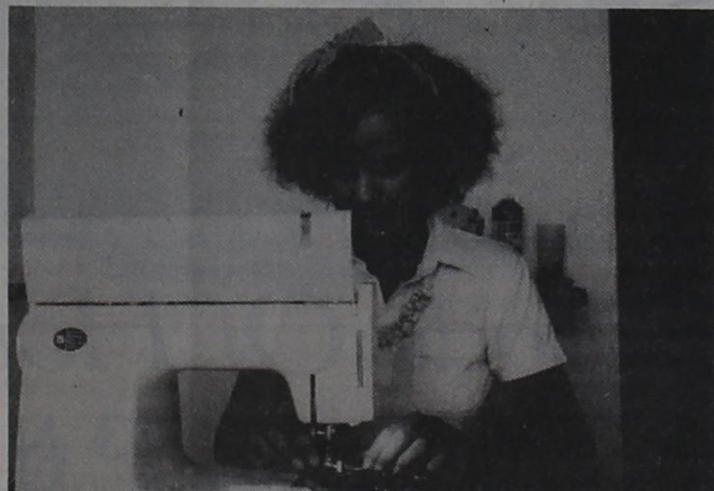
"The doctors are adjusting Kellie's medicine; we hope it will make a difference," Mrs. Anderson added.

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Dental clinic to be expanded

The Farwell Hospital Board voted to accept the proposed addition by the Farwell Development Corp. to the Farwell Clinic.

"This is something we have wanted for years. We've been saving for it for a long time," said Dr. J. R. Ivins. Part of Dr. Ivins' salary has been set aside for the development.

The remainder of the funds for the projected addition would come from the Farwell Development Corp. instead of tax funds. Farwell Development Corp. is a private, non-profit organization.

The addition will be added to the south of the existing building. It will add a reception room so that healthy dental patients will not have

to come in contact with ill patients waiting to see a physician.

It will feature a ramp to make the clinic accessible to patients in wheel chairs, and also a restroom equipped for use by handicapped patients.

There will also be a place for a business and bookkeeping office.

"We are really excited about this new addition," said Dr. Ivins.

Ivins first came to Farwell in June 1979 under a contract with the National Health Services Coop. This federal program helps small communities find medical and dental personnel.

Ivins requested to stay here as long as he could. Each year his contract was

renewed. Earlier this year, Ivins was scheduled to be transferred by the National Health Services Coop. Ivins decided to leave the National Health Services Coop rather than leave Farwell.

"We are very glad that J. R. Ivins has decided to stay. Now that we know that we have a dentist who plans to stay, it makes sense to upgrade the clinic facilities," said Jimmy Mace, president of Farwell Development Corp.

"We appreciate Farwell Development for making this addition to the hospital district possible," said Hospital Board president, Tom Nichols.

"We are also glad to be out from under a federal government program," Nichols added.

Cattleman accused

Amarillo - A hearing will be held Friday in state district court here to consider action against prominent Lubbock cattleman Jim Kassahn, who is accused of defrauding First National Bank of Amarillo by gaining a \$13 million loan with cattle that court documents allege he did not own.

Kassahn, who was a member of the board of directors of American State Bank in Lubbock, resigned that post last week. He sits on the board of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association in Amarillo.

Judge Jairl P. Dowell of the 108th State District Court granted First National a temporary restraining order last week and set a hearing on an injunction request at 1:30 p.m. Friday in 47th State District Court in Amarillo.

Reportedly with a cattle empire worth more than \$36 million, Kassahn is being accused of misrepresenting his ownership of 37,000 head of cattle, some of which are now in a feedlot in Deaf Smith County, according to court documents filed Wednesday.

First National, contending Kassahn did not abide by his loan requirements, declared the loan in default and now is calling in the

\$12.75 million that remains due, court records show.

Amarillo attorney John Huffaker, who is representing the bank in the suit, said the hearing Friday would be an effort to convert the temporary restraining order into a long-term temporary injunction, which in turn could block disposition of the cattle on which the bank has a lien. Huffaker said the court action could prevent any unauthorized sale of the cattle that the bank claims is collateral for Kassahn's multi-million-dollar loan.

According to court documents, First National claims to have made the loan to Kassahn upon representation that the 37,000 head of cattle were owned "free and clear" by J. P.'s Family Inc., a firm owned by Kassahn and his wife, Paula.

American State Bank President W. R. Collier said Tuesday that Kassahn "does not owe our bank any money, nor does J.P.'s Family, Inc."

"I understand this matter is in litigation, and we have

no further comment," Collier concluded.

Efforts by the Avalanche-

Journal to contact Kassahn for comment on the suit were unsuccessful Tuesday.

Processing plant questions answered

Wayne Smith, manager of the planned Blake's Lotaburger processing plant west of Texico, held a meeting Aug. 13 to answer questions.

About 30 persons attended. The plant, which may cost about \$1 million, would open by the end of this year unless it runs into red tape. From 8 - 12 persons would be employed. It's on 8 acres 1/4 mile east of Stuckey's on the highway.

Among the points Smith made were:

- It's a unique plant in that cattle will be brought to it, slaughtered, made into hamburger patties and shipped to Lotaburger stores. It will not handle wholesale sales but is an in-house operation.

- Ninety percent of the building will be refrigerated. It will handle 50-60 head of cattle a week (two days a week). Processing will be done four days a week; it will be in operation 4 days a week. It can handle up to 100 head but Smith said he doubted that would be

needed as far as he could see.

- The state's Environmental Control Agency and Livestock Commission will inspect the facility. A commission inspector was present at the meeting and praised the Blake's processing plant in Albuquerque for its cleanliness.

- The reason this location was found was because of the transportation network and the fact it's in the heart of the cattle industry.

- Nothing will be stored outside. Cattle will not be fed. When they arrive, they will be inspected, then moved inside for slaughter. Waste water will be taken care of by a commercial pumping outfit. All by-products will be refrigerated daily; blood will be used for pet food.

The main concern brought up by residents was about odors. They noted the problem with the alcohol plant. Smith said odor from the processing plant should not be a problem.

Smith, operator of the Oklahoma Lane Gin, said the gin would be open this year.

School budget OK'd

The Farwell School Board Tuesday approved a 1987-88 school budget of \$2,137,936.

This is a 1.88 percent increase over the final estimate for 1986-87 of \$2,098,474.

School Supt. John Grigsby said it would add a half-cent to the tax levy and the board was very happy at keeping that low a tax increase.

Grigsby said last year's budget included \$45,000 for construction. Plus, salary raises increased the new budget by \$100,000. He said he was able to keep the new budget low by trimming costs for travel and maintenance.

In other business, the board approved the student handbook.

It was noted that inservice for teachers starts at 9 a.m. Monday.

No pre-kindergarten class will be held. Fifteen students were needed and only 12 signed up.

Damon George and DeeAnne Ray told the board

about their experiences at Boys State and Girls State, respectively.

School bells!

School will begin in Farwell for the 1987-88 school term on Sept. 1 at 8:25 a.m.

Registration for students new to Farwell Junior High will be held on Aug. 20 and 21.

New students will need to bring birth certificates, immunization records, and transcripts from their last school to registration.

"Pre-registering new students before school starts really helps us on opening day. We can spend a little time with each new student, and answer each question they have individually. The first day of school is less stressful for all of us that way," said Tanya Chadwick, secretary of Farwell Junior High School.

terrorist bombs go off in Washington.

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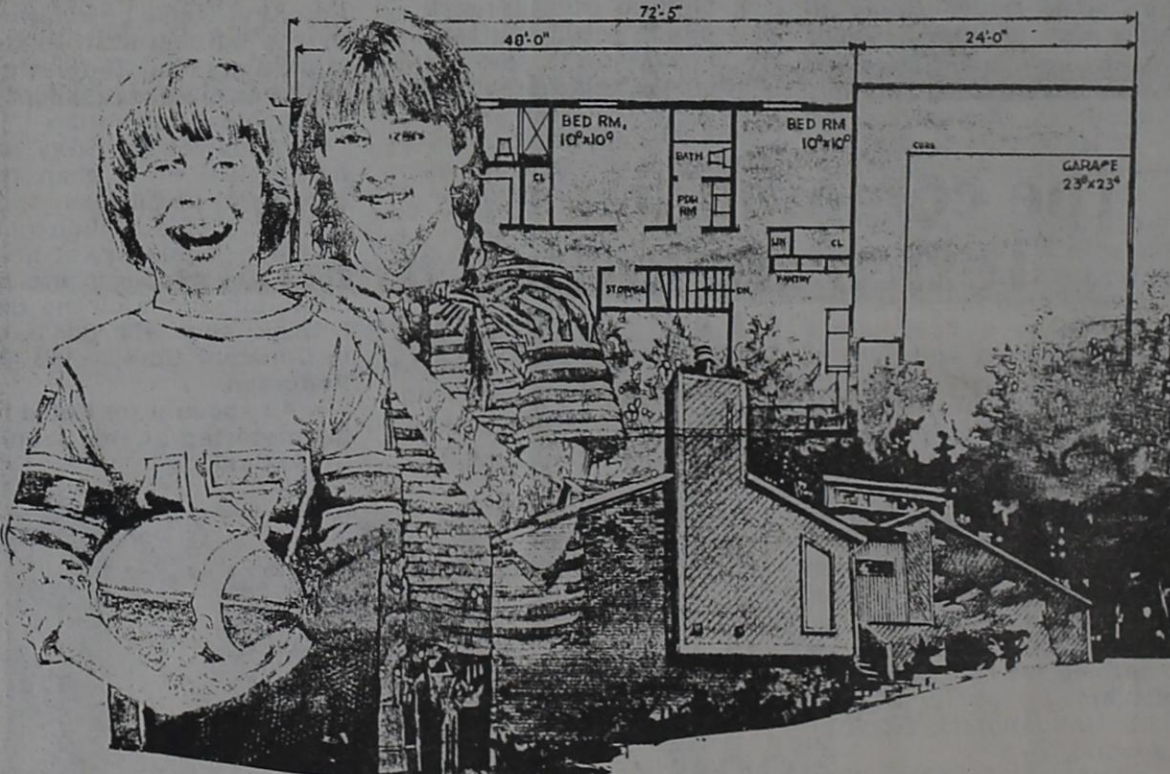

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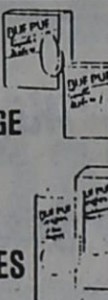

Sept. 1 is the effective date for the new Texas minimum wage requirement for farm workers, the latest of federal and state laws covering, and in some instances double covering, virtually every aspect of agricultural employment, reports Plains Cotton Growers.
The new Texas mandate sets the minimum wage at \$3.35 per hour beginning Sept. 1. This is the same as the federal rate that went into effect in 1981. But the federal rate applies only to farms using 500 man-days of labor in a calendar quarter, while the state law applies to all farms, larger and small.
