Fairy Cops District One-Act Play

Fairy High School won first place in District 25-B one-act play competition for the fourth straight year.

Hico placed second, Sidney third and Carlton fourth.

Fairy presented "Leader of the People," directed by Mrs. W. B. Hill. The cast included Keith Streeter, Johnny Jones, Don Barnett, Anelle Gleason, Patsy Whitaker and Jerry Jones. They will compete for regional honors in Stephenville April 22.

The district all-star cast was named as follows: Keith Streeter, best actor; Kathy Higginbotham of Hico, best actress; and Jane Vineyard of Sidney, Johnny Jones of Fairy, and Barbara Randalls and Bobby Boone of Hico.

Fairy, Hico and Sidney competed against each other in last year's contest, but this is Carlton's first year to enter one-act play competition.

Mr. and Mrs. Al Scott of Hamilton acted as critic-judges of the plays, and chose the all-star cast.

Fast-Thinking Grandmother Credited With Saving Life

Mrs. Steve Parks, a grandmother who "had never given artificial respiration before," gave it for the first time Monday, and may have saved her granddaughter's life.

The granddaughter, Teresa Parks, 4, was critically injured Monday afternoon when she became entangled in heavy binding twine while playing on a trailer at the Parks home eight miles northeast of Hico.

Wednesday of this week the young girl's condition was improved.

Playing on Trailer.

"We'd been outside all afternoon," Mrs. Park said. "Teresa had been playing around a fish pond and on the trailer. I had been working in a flower bed. There wasn't anyone else at home. My husband was in the field and my son and daughter-in-law were working in town."

"Teresa had been climbing up on the trailer and jumping off of it," she continued. "I told her to be careful because she was close to the pond and I didn't want her to get wet."

I didn't hear her for a few minutes and I went to check about her. I thought something might be wrong.

"She was hanging from the trailer when I found her. Some string

Saturday, April 2, and Tuesday, April 5, are election dates which local residents should mark on their calendar.

IT'S THE LAW—

Everyone Should Have Experience of Jury Duty

Jury duty is an experience everybody ought to have.

In a criminal case twelve jurors have a duty to do justice as each one sees it, and yet be unanimous. In most trials both sides have much to say, and the evidence is conflicting. The twelve jurors vary in their ability, temperament, character, education, and their ex-

perience in the world, and in the question at stake.

Yet a jury made up of both sexes, with wide age and educational differences, jobs and origins must all come up with the same verdict. Upon their verdict much depends—the life or liberty of others, and the public good. So it may take them days of talking among themselves, all to agree.

Jury duty calls for insight, common sense, courage, tact, fairness, patience, (especially toward the jurors who disagree with you), good humor, tolerance, balance, willingness to hear others out and change one's mind, readiness to go over and over the facts to find something to bring agreement. In short, jury duty demands a "decent respect to the opinions" of others.

More and more women share civic duties, especially as jurors.

Time was in Texas when women could not serve on juries. They still cannot in four states.

A jury finds facts. It hears and weighs evidence and then comes to a verdict. It does not make the law—the legislature does; and the judge "charges" or instructs the jury concerning the law applicable to the particular case it is considering.

The judge will tell you not to find the accused guilty until he is proved so under strict rules of evidence. If you have any "reasonable doubt,"—not imaginary or far-fetched—acquit the accused.

Civil cases do not demand a moral certainty, merely the "preponderance" of what you regard as reliable and believable evidence.

Our spinal nerve analysis disclosed compression of spinal nerve roots and spinal x-rays were recommended and we began immediate corrective adjustments.

Sheep and Goat Field Day Slated April 5 Near Morgan

The Sheep and Goat Committee of the Bosque County Program Building Committee is sponsoring a Sheep and Goat Field Day Tuesday, April 5, at the Jack Rowland Ranch 4 miles Southeast of Morgan on Farm Road 927. The field day will feature a demonstration on Sheep and Goat Selection, Wool for Market Practices, and a discussion on the internal and external parasites and their control.

A free barbecue dinner will be provided by the Jack Kirby Warehouse, Meridian, to the group attending.

Jack Rowland, host for the meeting place and chairman of the Sheep and Goat Committee, and Jack Kirby extends a cordial invitation to the public and especially to the interested sheep and goat raisers in and around Bosque County to attend this education and interesting field day and barbecue dinner.

James Gray, Extension Sheep and Goat Specialist from San Angelo will conduct a selection demonstration on both sheep and goats. He will also discuss the shearing and "Wool Preparation for Market" practices during the day. Mr. Gray will also discuss the recommended practices to pre-

vent and control the many internal and external parasites which the local ranchers are faced with.

The sheep selection demonstration will be conducted on Rowland's flock of Rambouillet type ewes. These ewes were grouped last year during the selection demonstration. They have been separated since for breeding and lambing and will be individually selected again this year for their performance and wool production. This second year selection program should result in an overall picture of the Selection Program for more pounds of higher grading wool and better lambs for market and replacements.

The shearing demonstration will follow the final selection of the Rambouillet ewes. This will provide the fleeces so that the Wool Preparation for Market demonstration may be conducted. The ewes which will be sheared in this demonstration will be a representative number of ewes from each group according to the selection program. This will give a method of determining the average fleece weight in each group of ewes.

Group A—80 ewes — Average fleece weight, 10.2 lbs.

Group B—90 ewes — Average fleece weight 9.1 lbs.

Group C—57 ewes — Average fleece weight 9.0 lbs.

To follow up with the results this year should prove to be very interesting and will certainly show the merits of the sheep selection program. It should also prove to any sheep owner why he should be in a selection program.

The same type of selection program conducted with the sheep can and is being done with Angora goats all over the western part of Texas. To introduce the goat selection program to local producers, a group of Angora nannies will also be provided for a selection demonstration. Mr. Gray will point out the points to select for improving mohair production and quality of goats. These points are the ones used in the goat selection program which is available for any rancher to work on with help provided through the Extension Service which is your county agent or the help of the sheep and goat specialist.

On the Home Range

By Helen Ruth Flowers

Many of you have requested information on how to make fruit from lye soap so here is the recipe.

LYE SOAP FRUIT

6 lbs. of melted clean fat
5 cups water (boiling)
1 can lye

Dissolve the lye in water in a large crock or stoneware container. When cool add grease, beat until consistency of fudge.

Pour into box that has been lined with wax paper. Cover with a piece of plastic and let set until it can be cut into squares. It should be soft but firm enough to handle with hands protected with rubber gloves. Take squares from box and store in plastic bags for four days or longer.

Shape into fruit or flowers inserting a floral wire in each piece so that it may be dipped into melted paraffin that has been colored with wax crayons. Each piece should be hung on a line by the floral wire for a day or so. The pieces should be hung after dipping to dry evenly.

Poppy seed, cloves, etc., are used to finish ends and stems. A huck towel is used to make indentations on oranges and lemons while wax is still warm on fruit. Borax and talcum are used to get the fuzzy finish on peaches and grapes. Red lipstick may be added on fruit for darker color in spots.

Spring means special uses for automatic clothes dryers.

Though cold weather seems to linger this year, we'll soon be thinking of storing winter clothes, spring house cleaning chores, Easter outfits, and April showers. An automatic clothes dryer will be helpful in all these situations.

Used wisely, a clothes dryer will save hours of labor during your spring house cleaning. Use it to freshen these furnishings.

Slip covers. Place slip covers in dryer immediately after washing, and regulate time and temperature settings according to the particular fabric. While still damp, remove from dryer and press any pleats or ruffles. Then replace on furniture where slip cover will finish drying to snug smoothness. Draperies. Before laundering, remove all trimmings, detachable hooks and weights. Drying time and temperature will vary, depending on weight of fabric, size

and remaining moisture. Allow drapes plenty of room for tumbling. Remove when damp-dry, run drapes lengthwise through ironer and rehang.

Airing and dusting curtains and drapes. When curtains or drapes are not soiled, but require airing and dusting, use your automatic dryer to "revive" them. Allow several pairs at a time to tumble

freely. Remove from dryer and hang—curtains will be sunshine-fragrant again. Tumbling procedure removes wrinkles and removes dirt from drapes and slip covers taken from storage.

Rugs. For braided or place two small rug in the dryer when hint of moisture. Lay on flat surface to dry. For chenille shag rugs vacuum before drying to remove lint. Careful not to over-dry. Remove rugs when dry and replace in place on floor.

Importance of Rangeland Management Stressed by SCS

By A. L. MILES

Proper management of all farm and ranch lands is of paramount importance. Right now it is time to give serious consideration to a program of proper use of range land. Conditions are favorable for a luxuriant growth of all range plants, especially desirable range grasses.

With firm prices for all livestock and livestock products the temptation for overstocking is great. This calls for exercise of restraint and sound judgment on the part of the rancher if he is to insure himself of a continued supply of range forage which is essential to economical production of livestock and livestock products.

One of the most effective means of preserving the carrying capacity of range land is a deferred grazing program. Deferred grazing has been defined as periodically postponing or deferring grazing on rangeland for a prescribed period during the growing season of the year. The purpose is to give the existing desirable grasses a chance to produce seed for new plants, to provide a feed reserve for fall and winter grazing or emergency use. A deferred grazing program is applicable to all range lands normally grazed throughout the growing season.

Carrying out a desirable and profitable deferred grazing program may require the construction of cross fences and the establishment of additional watering facilities. If it is determined that either one or both of these are needed, financial assistance is available through the Agricultural Conservation Program. Financial assistance is also available for approved grazing practices.

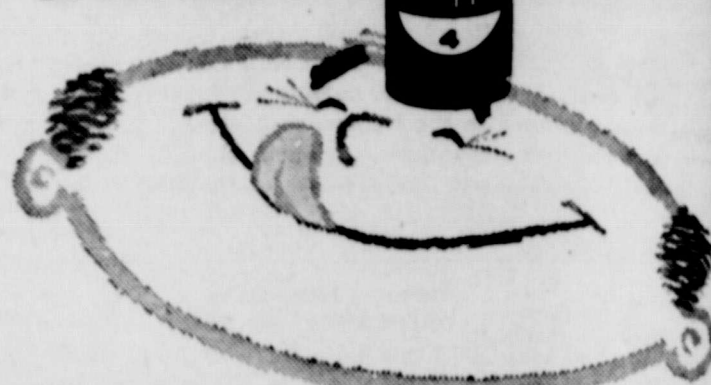
Specifications for carrying out a deferred grazing program vary with existing conditions. Some range conditions are poor, some are good, and some excellent. Condition will require a grazing deferment program. Personnel at both Hamilton and Gatesville offices of the Conservation Service have through experiment and observation determined that will best fit conditions in Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District. Contact them with you out on your range. They will assist you in making an over-all conservation plan including a grazing program. Act now for the year is growing short.

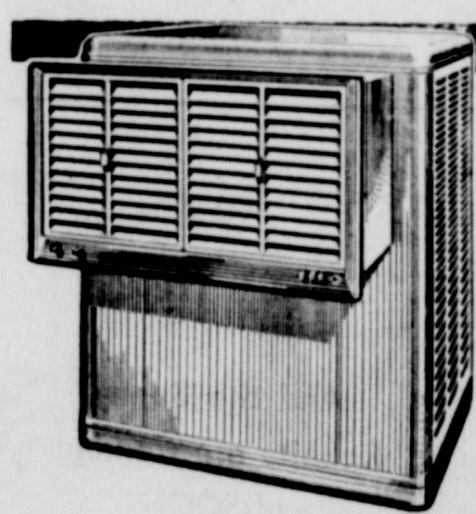

Eye appeal has become quite an
important factor in the merchan-
dising of many articles. This is
one of the reasons many food pro-
ducts are put up like they are—
that is, packaged like they are—
so the housewife can see what
she is buying. Chances are she
will buy the package that looks
most pleasing to her.

This same thing—merchandising
—is an important factor to the
wool grower. When the wool buy-
er rips a bag of wool down the
seam, and if he likes the looks of
the wool he sees and it makes a
good impression on him, he is
more apt to offer a better price
than he is if he does not especial-
ly like what he sees.

Wool and mohair are two pro-
ducts sold that bring far higher
prices per pound than any other
product produced on the farm or
ranch. Yet, many crops of wool
are damaged at harvest time—and
harvest time is here now.

Here are a few points that should
help in preparing the wool crop
for market that should have eye-

appeal to the buyer:

1. Separate sheep before shear-
ing according to length of wool
staple.
2. Shear and bag the wool from
the groups accordingly.
3. Shear on shearing boards and
keep these boards clean.
4. Clean off the ground area
around the shearing boards and
keep it damp to prevent dust.
5. Supply new oil for oiling the
shearing heads.
6. Roll the fleeces as they are
being picked up from the floor.
7. Remove tags.
8. Tie with paper twine and on-
ly one twine to a fleece.
9. Place good fleeces along the
bag seam line as the bag is filled.
10. Keep bagged wool clean and
off ground until sold.

HERE OR NEAR

The telephone rang. I answered. A voice, excited, agitated, began to tell me something. I broke into his incoherent talk and asked who was speaking. I never did identify the caller. He began all over again and told me they were digging up the two big trees on the highway toward Stephenville. His talk sounded if it were a case of tragic importance, and there seemed to be an appeal to me to do something about the awful travesty. I undertook to gather what two big trees he referred to. I was no wiser when he concluded. It then sounded as if the caller wanted me to pour hot scorching words on the offenders whom he referred to as "they." I got loose as soon as I could, told wife about the conversation and sought a clue to the whereabouts of the "two big trees" and the "they" of the offenders. At long last it occurred to me that it could be the two big trees at the Y where highways number 6 and 281 separated, number 6 going to Dublin and 281 to Stephenville.

Next day wife and I drove out that way, and sure enough there were the fallen trunks of the two landmark trees. They must have been the trees the voice meant, and the "they" must have been Contractor Buckner who is doing the road building. The caller must have been recalling the times he had rested under the shade of the landmark trees. Or maybe he had sparked his sweetie some moonlight night there. Or it could have been a neat deal he closed with some soul in which a comfortable profit came to him. Or he could have been thinking of how many times he had given directions to some traveler by naming the trees. Maybe he was thinking of the pioneer days when Indian chieftains or warriors stopped there for a pow-wow. At any rate it seemed to be a spot of fond memories and tender sentiments.

Now I did nothing to stop the work of felling the trees nor am I pouring fire on the heads of folks responsible for the demolition of the landmarks. It is a case of sentiment versus progress. And I have observed that efforts to halt progress have usually been

futile. The world is moving on and it is inevitable that many a landmark of landscape or of mental prospect has to be demolished in order for progress to be made. It is a thing we have to get used to in spite of our devotion to the status quo.

A lot of factors are involved in this clash between sentiment and fact. In the matter of highway building safety for the traveler is high on the agenda. It would be nice to have the big trees to look at and dream of. But if a man and his family were on their way to Waco for a funeral of a loved one and driving fast to be there on time, and the pavement should be wet and they should skid into the tree with fatal results to the car and its occupants, it would be useless then to regret that the trees were not removed when the road was modernized.

The incident reminds me of a story I read years ago when one of the transcontinental railroads was being laid out across a mid-western state. When the surveyors got to the property of a certain widow she went out to ask what they were doing on her land. The chief of the survey crew told her they were laying out a railroad across her acreage. Whereupon she went into her house and got a shotgun and drove the crew off.

Every effort to carry on the survey failed, for the crew was aware that the stern-faced elderly widow was not joking when she threatened to shoot any trespasser. The surveying chief got in touch with the promoter and that worthy ordered the crew to keep off her land and change their route. They did as ordered and with the result that several miles were added to the track and a hill had to be ascended and to this day the railroad is paying for the woman's determination to keep her acreage free from the invasion of a railroad, at that time a new thing in the history of the world.

Sorry to disappoint the soul who called me, but I don't have a shotgun and if I had one would be mighty leery of threatening that road crew to use it unless they spared the old trees. And I have no hot water to pour on the heads of the men who felled the trees
