PRESIDENT WILL VETO PEACE MOVE

WASHINGTON, May 4.—In the opinion of administration officials, who are close to President Wilson, the Knox peace resolution is certain to be vetoed if adopted by congress.

It is intimated generally by those close to Mr. Wilson, that he would adhere strictly to the position he announced last summer against any other form of separate peace.

CALIFORNIA G. O. P. BALLOTING TODAY

SAN FRANCISCO, May 4.—Choice between two groups of 26 delegates to the Republican national convention, one pledged to United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson, and the other to Herbert Hoover, former United States food controller, was offered to voters at the California presidential primary election today.

Democrats and Prohibitionists today were also electing 26 delegates each to their respective national conventions. These were unopposed except that on the Democratic ticket, Henry H. Childers of Los Angeles, announced that he favored a liberal interpretation of the national prohibition amendment, qualified as a candidate for national delegates in addition to the 26 named by the state central committee. The Democratic delegates are unpledged. The Prohibition group is pledged to the candidacy of Henry Clay Needham of Los Angeles.

Registration for today's election exceeds that for any previous primary election in California. Of the men and women eligible to vote, 693,767 are registered as Republicans; 247,737 as Democrats; 16,528 as Socialists; and 6,321 as Progressives; 3,317 are scattering and 125,308 declined to state their party affiliations.

FIGHTING FOR UKRAINIAN CAPITAL

WARSAW, May 4.—The Bolshevik army is entrenched in the hills on the West bank of the Dnieper river, and are formed in a huge semi-circle, with their backs against Kiev, the Ukrainian capital, according to information received here from the front this morning.

The fight for the possession of Kiev is raging day and night along the entire line through the valleys and rivers.

LONDON, May 4.—A number of Russian bourgeois who fled from South Russia to Asia Minor, recently, perished during a storm at sea, according to wireless messages received this afternoon from Moscow.

Fourteen ships laden with refugees were lost in the storm.

Rebels Now Control Over Half Mexico; Juarez Taken

JUAREZ, Mex., May 4.—The bloodless revolt at Juarez yesterday and the capitulation of General Francisco Urbelajo and his Yaqui Indians at Casas Grandes, virtually gave the Sonora revolutionists control of the entire state of Chihuahua. This coup also paves the way for an unobstructed advance on the city of Torreon.

After taking Torreon, the revolutionists will launch a campaign against Mexico City and the final overthrow of Carranza it is indicated.

AGUA PRIETA, Sonora, Mex., May 4.—A general strike of Mexican laborers is the potential weapon possessed by the revolutionists for use against Carranza.

General Elias Calles, military commander in charge of the Northwest rebel army, announced "Labor organizations are active everywhere in Mexico for a liberal constitutional movement." Gen. Calles said.

WASHINGTON, May 4.—It is believed here in government circles and by agents representing the Mexican revolutionists, that the rebels captured Juarez without fighting.

It is also the belief of the government officials and Mexican representatives that up to the present time the rebel, have succeeded in taking from Carranza almost half of his territory without a battle.

Mexican military men here state, however, that a few stubborn contests are inevitable, unless averted by further defections in the federal army.

El Paso, May 3.—Juarez tonight is in the hands of the Sonora revolutionists. The revolution was peaceable and its announcement by Gen. J. Gonzales Escobar was accompanied by a popular celebration. The Obregon junta from El Paso crossed to Juarez tonight.

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UNION HEAD GIVES REASON FOR UNREST

WASHINGTON, May 4.—"Too many people are eating cake while too many find it impossible to get enough bread, is the underlying cause of unrest in the country today," said E. F. Grable, president of the united brotherhood of maintenance way employees and railway shop laborers, before the railway labor board this afternoon.

Mr. Grable was arguing for an increase of seven cents per hour over the present maximum wage of fifty three cents. Grable declared that a majority of the men are working for less than "starvation wages."



HOW LONG WILL THE PEOPLE STAND FOR IT?

There is no business in Ballinger which feels the effect of the poor light and power service the New York corporation is giving the city more keenly than The Ledger.

Without going into detail and enumerating our loss, due to the "shut downs" almost daily, on account of the current being cut off, suffice to say that we are thoroughly disgusted.

The Ledger was a strong advocate of a municipal light and power plant when the present corporation now giving the poor service, was taking steps to string wires into this city from San Angelo for the purpose of furnishing current from that place.

The proposition was submitted to the people for their approval at the same time the fire truck proposition was submitted. Both propositions were favored by an almost unanimous vote.

The city council purchased the fire truck, but left it with an easy ear to these false promises made by the representatives of the New York corporation.

We were told by the New York corporation representatives that we would be given a better service at a lower rate. We are paying a higher rate for a service which is causing a loss to every enterprise which depends on the long distance power plant for power.

The representatives of the corporation appeared before the city council and pledged to maintain a power plant here for the purpose of supplying current for Ballinger, Winters, and Rowena. They have violated their contract.

The light and power consumers of this city should not tolerate such treatment when the city commission has full authority and can get ample financial backing to install a municipal plant.

The city commission will have the support of the citizens in any steps they see fit to take to give relief. We have suffered long and the longer we suffer, the more we suffer.

During the last two years and

seven months that an independent light and power plant was operated in Ballinger there was not a time when the current was off, and the citizens were given good service by the local corporation.

TESTING OWNERSHIP OF MINERAL RIGHTS

AUSTIN, May 4.—Non-resident land owners in Reeves and other West Texas counties are the principal ones who are objecting to persons holding state mineral permit, for oil and gas, drilling in that region, according to Assistant Attorney General E. F. Smith, who has just completed a personal investigation of the situation.

This investigation is preliminary to the institution of a suit in the district court of Travis county to determine the question of ownership of the minerals. The land was bought at a very low price with forty years time in which to make payment and the sale was conditioned that the state retain ownership of the minerals, Judge Smith declares.

"It is quite probable that the purchaser by denying the rights of the state then its recognized agencies to go on the land has thereby forfeited all his right to the surface," Judge Smith said.

ELECTRIC "JAG" LATEST FOR DRUNKS

SAN FRANCISCO, May 4.—Possibility of producing all the symptoms of alcoholic intoxication on electric "juice" attracted a good deal of interest here recently when Dr. Albert Abrams of San Francisco demonstrated to medical men the use of an electrical device he has invented.

The "electronic jag" discovery was purely incidental, Dr. Abrams said today.

"The discovery," he said, "is based on the theory that the unit of energy is the electron, and that every material thing is simply a manifestation of different rates of vibration. I have used the vibrations of chloroform to produce the effects of chloroform itself."

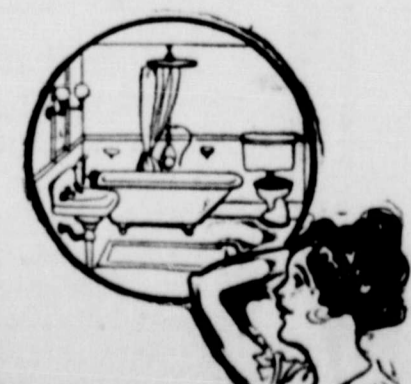

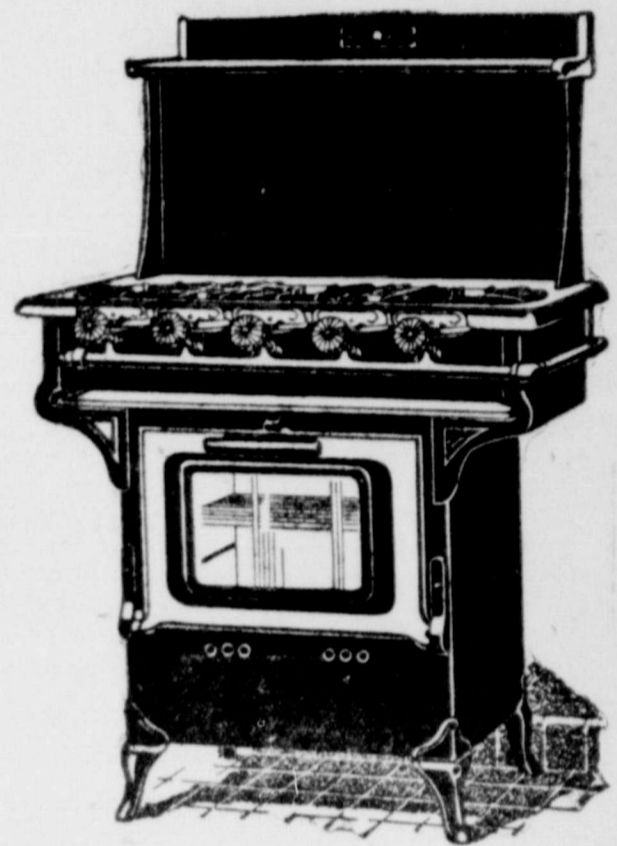

WICHITA FALLS, Tex., May 4.—County officials, who have been called upon to solve many mysterious robberies since oil was discovered in this section, are

AUSTIN, May 4.—An example of the causes of fire in Texas is cited by State Insurance Commissioner T. M. Scott, in seven consecutive reports of fires which came into the state fire insurance commissioner's office today. The following causes were given for the fires:

The extension cord of an electric iron which had hung on a nail until the insulation had become worn, caused a blaze; matches in clothing hung in a closet caught fire; an explosion of a coal oil stove started a conflagration; small boys started a blaze; hot ashes started a blaze in a frame building; filling a gasoline stove while it was burning caused fire, and the last of the seventh reported fire was caused by careless cigarette smokers.

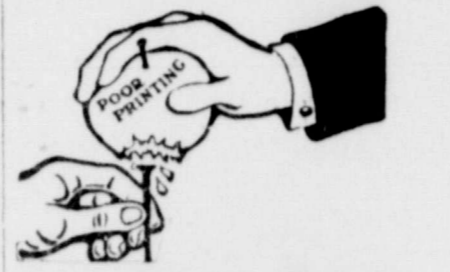

No Need for Steam Roller In County Convention

The best attended Democratic county convention held in this county in many years, was in session this afternoon. The convention was scheduled for two-thirty and delegates from the rural precincts began arriving here early in the day, and were talking politics.

A pre-convention canvas of the delegates showed that the Wilson administration forces were in a position to operate a steam roller if they so wished.

It developed that the Bailey forces were on the firing line at practically every box in the county, and in some of the boxes came near mustering sufficient strength to control the precinct convention.

On first balloting in the Miles convention, the vote was evenly divided, the convention standing twenty to twenty. The arrival of a Democrat who was loyal to the administration threw the strength to the anti-Bailey forces by one vote.

Other boxes sent mixed delegations, while others sent solid anti-Bailey delegations. Some of the precincts sent unopposed delegates.

A steam roller was a useless ornament in the Democratic county convention which convened in Ballinger Tuesday afternoon.

The delegates composing the convention were all of practically one political mind, and unanimous in every motion put before the convention.

In fact the convention voted as a unit on all questions, and no motion made was lost.

The convention was organized by the election of Edjes M. Lynn

as chairman, and A. W. Sledge as secretary.

On motion R. W. Bruce, H. O. Jones and J. A. Hancock were appointed a committee on credentials.

The credentials committee's report was adopted, showing that there were thirty-one votes in the convention, all precincts except Tokoen, Cochran, Mavetiek, Marie and Brookshire, being represented.

C. R. Crews, W. A. Halameick, A. D. Tally, C. S. Coleman, and F. D. Bedford, were appointed to nominate delegates to the State Convention. The following report was adopted:

We, your committee on delegates, respectfully recommend the following names as Delegates to the State Democratic Convention, held at Dallas on the 25th day of May, 1920: A. K. Doss, Paul Trimmier, R. W. Bruce, R. T. Williams, C. R. Stephens, H. O. Jones, J. L. Speer, W. D. Jennings, W. A. Halameick, Estes M. Lynn and J. A. Hancock.

Signed: C. R. Crews, C. S. Coleman and F. D. Bedford. Judge O. L. Parish, W. D. Jennings and Paul Trimmier were appointed a committee on resolutions. The following resolutions were adopted without dissenting vote:

Be it Resolved by the Democrats of Runnels County, Texas, in convention, assembled:

First: That we heartily approve the great achievements of our Democratic National Administration under the leadership of Woodrow Wilson, both in peace and in war, and we favor the unqualified endorsement of its achievements, by the Democratic National Convention to be held at San Francisco.

Second: That we instruct our delegates to the State Convention to vote for no person for delegate from Texas to the Democratic National Convention who does not favor and support the principles and purposes expressed in this resolution.

Third: That we direct our delegates to the State Convention to vote as a unit on all questions submitted to the State Convention for consideration.

We, your committee on resolutions recommend that the above resolutions be adopted.

Signed: O. L. Parish, W. D. Jennings, and Paul Trimmier. Resolutions presented by Judge Jno. L. Guion, dealing with state and local politics, were referred to the committee and the committee recommended that in view of the convention being assembled for the consideration of National affairs, be not adopted.

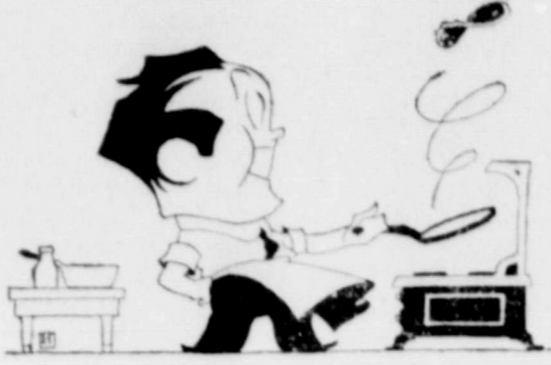
