TOM HARKEY TAKES PROPOSAL TO AUSTIN

Mr. Tom Harkey, local superintendent of schools, took a proposal for a School-Home-Community communication to Austin October 27. The proposal is for a pilot program for the 72-73 school year.

Only 20 schools in the state will be chosen for this program. If Loraine is chosen to pilot this program, it would mean one additional teacher on the staff. Responsibility of the teacher would be to visit in the home of each student in this school several times during the year and report back to teachers and administration, as to any special needs of any student in the school. This per will also keep the community informed as to changes, reason for changes, new programs and other particular details of the total school program. Pilot projects is 100% financed through the federal government.

Most of this money appropriated for this type of project go to the larger schools, but Mr. Harkey is making an all-out effort to get this program for the Loraine school.

READING WORKSHOP
Ten teachers from the Loraine School attended a workshop, Friday October 28 at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene.

Dr. Nick Silvaroli from Arizona State University, conducted this workshop. Dr. Silvaroli has been on the Presidential Advisory Council for Education, a director of the International Reading Association, and a foremost authority in the field of reading and language development.

He is presently working closely with the Education Service in Abilene setting up inservice training for teachers in the area of language development reading and math.

These areas of inservice will be covered in detail by consultants who will be brought into our school at the expense of the service center.

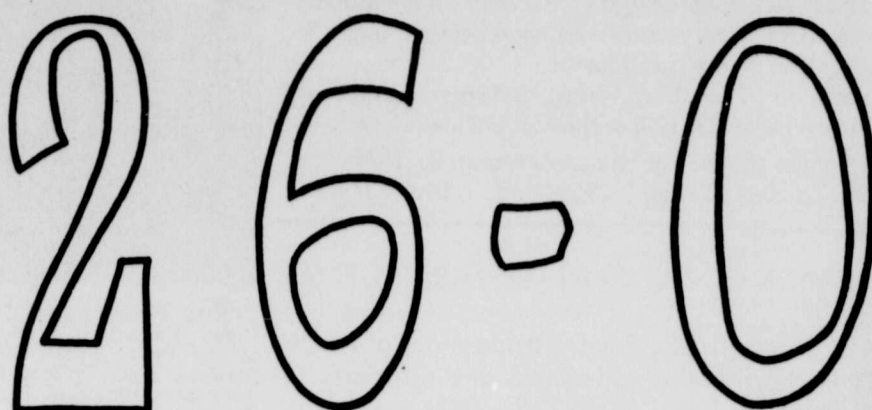

LORAIN RECEIVES ATTENTION FROM BIG SPRING HERALD

Last Friday was the day Sands was to play Loraine. Big Spring Herald Sports Editor John Hart selected that day to run an editorial concerning an incident that supposedly happened on the night the Sands Jr. High team played in Loraine on Thursday night of Homecoming Week.

According to Editor Hart, Coach Bob Davis of Sands High School told him that "several Mexicans and Negroes threw rocks and hit one of their pep squad members on the leg. It could just as well hit her in the eye." Coach Davis reportedly added that abusive language was used and during the half time break, several Loraine young people had sticks and hit the Sand players on the hands.

According to Coach Davis, he is basing his information on what some assistants told him. He told me today that a rock was thrown through the pep squad bus window and hit a girl on the leg. He says that Editor Hart was wrong about the boys with the sticks. He says the Loraine boys stood near the Sands players and beat their own hands with sticks while making gestures. He didn't say what kind of gestures they were, but did say they were "menacing".

According to Rene Roman of Ackerly, the girl Coach Davis said got hit in the leg, it was not she who was hit on the leg but her sister Liz. When I talked to Liz she told me that it wasn't her that was hit, but it was her sister, Rene, who was hit. Upon speaking to Rene Roman again, she suddenly remembered, after being prompted by Liz, that it was herself after all who was hit by the stone. "But it didn't hurt a bit," she told me. "I was standing in the door of the bus and the rock hit my leg. But it didn't hurt a bit."

Three people, three stories. Undoubtedly, some Loraine boys could have done some wrong things (and they should be helped to learn better). But, Mr. Hart took some third hand information and evidently (from what he told me) didn't make any attempt to substantiate the facts.

Mr. Hart, Loraine is sorry if we made Coach Davis unhappy over what you have built into an incident. We are glad the girl was not wounded and we are glad she sounded surprised that anything came out of the "incident". We tend to be oriented over here toward Christian Forgiveness. So, we will drop the thought that we could discuss your editorial policies before the public without checking your reasons for doing whatever it is you do. Let's hope that the next time a coach finds any of our students doing something of this nature, that they will tell us about the incident first so we might have an opportunity to help the students.

A Change In Seasons



A change in seasons always seems to herald a change in activities. If the pace of everyday living is quickened, food must be relied upon to supply the extra energy needed.

While a basic breakfast of fruit or juice, ready-to-eat cereal with milk, bread and spread and a beverage provides a good start on the body's nutrient needs for the day, sometimes a heartier meal is desirable.

For heartier morning fare Kay Kellogg suggests a breakfast built around Baked French Toast as the main event. This recipe features another ingredient use for versatile packaged corn flake crumbs. Suitable accompaniments may include crisp bacon, warm maple syrup or honey and the customary fruit plus a beverage to complete the menu.

BAKED FRENCH TOAST

| 4 cups corn flakes or | 1/2 teaspoon vanilla flavoring |
| 1 cup packaged corn flake crumbs | 6 slices day-old bread, cut in halves |
| 2 eggs, well-beaten | 1/4 cup regular margarine or butter, melted |
| 1/2 cup milk | |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | |

1. If using corn flakes, crush into fine crumbs. Set aside.
2. Combine eggs, milk, salt and vanilla in shallow dish or pan. Dip bread in egg mixture turning once and allowing time for both sides to absorb liquid. Coat evenly with corn flakes crumbs and place in single layer on well-greased baking sheet. Drizzle with margarine.
3. Bake in hot oven (450°F.) about 10 minutes or until golden brown.

Tito & Brezhnev

In a visit which sometimes became tense, Communist Party boss Leonid Brezhnev and President Tito of Yugoslavia did verbal battle for several days recently in Belgrade. The result was a communique which could be of profound importance to the future of all Europe—and perhaps the world.

Tito was determined to have Brezhnev renounce any claim to intervene in the sovereign affairs of Yugoslavia, as Russia did in the case of Czechoslovakia. He had extracted such an agreement from Nikita Khrushchev in 1965. Of late, however, Brezhnev has made speeches hinting possible intervention in the affairs of other East European socialist states, claiming that right.

Tito forced a showdown on this question and received a reaffirmation of the Khrushchev doctrine—especially important to Romania as well as Yugoslavia. But he also agreed to closer cooperation with the Communist Party of Russia, and joined in a verbal blast at the United States, in strongly doctrinaire Communist language.

Tito's concessions could mean much or very little. In the past he has agreed to closer cooperation with the Russian Communist Party and little has come of it. It would therefore initially appear that Tito, Yugoslavia, and other small nations of eastern Europe did not come off badly in the Belgrade confrontation.

Support Law Officers

One thing certain to encourage those with martyr complexes or militant or extremist tendencies is criticism of law enforcement officers combined with rationalizations and excuses for criminal behavior, no matter how well meaning.

Now occurring regularly in the United States are senseless killings of law officers. One of the more senseless occurred recently in Jacksonville, Florida, when a 24-year-old award-winning officer stopped a suspect for questioning and was shot through the head and heart. Similar killings now take place every week, by those who hate law officers. Revolutionaries and militants (including Communists) have stirred up hostile emotions in some cases; some militant minority leaders gain power and position by sensational and divisive hate speeches.

In some cases, of course, especially in the past, police departments have been less restrained in dealing with some citizens than others. This cannot be justified and has been largely eliminated. There have been other faults in operation of police departments, prisons, and in many other areas, admittedly, and probably always will be.

Reformers who succumb to the temptation to champion criminals and excuse their behavior because law enforcement and police protection aren't perfect encourage extremists and the simple-minded to commit awful deeds.

Poll Shows Americans Prefer Newspapers

A recent poll showed that Americans rely more on newspapers for special information and advertising than any other media, the Bureau of Advertising has reported.

The bureau, a non-profit organization formed to promote newspaper advertising, cited results of a national survey by Opinion Research Corp.

It said 51 per cent of the respondents named newspapers as the medium that would most likely have full coverage of news "in which they are very much interested," while 45 per cent chose television.

A total of 33 per cent selected newspapers when asked, "Where are you most likely to find the kind of advertising that gives you the facts you want to know?"

Nine per cent preferred television, and no breakdown was given for the remainder.



Often the squirrel has been called "the little teacher."

That's about as apt a nickname as any.

Fortunately, most Texas youngsters get their first taste of hunting in the squirrel woods.

Show me someone who is proficient at hunting squirrels and I'll show you a hunter who can hold his own with any kind of game. A person who can sit statue-still on a stand or slip silently on light feet through the woods to beguile a squirrel can certainly do the same with deer. The squirrel is no pushover. No sir, not by a long shot.

The squirrel has one weakness, however. Its eyes are adapted to movement and it can be fooled by something which does not move. The hunter who steals into the sullen woods just at daybreak, finds himself a comfortable spot to sit down and stays put is going to see squirrels if there are any around.

It isn't difficult to pinpoint these arboreal critters. Squirrels just can't seem to keep their big mouths shut. They rush around in the treetops making all sorts of commotion. But when there is a hint of danger, one can spraddle flat on a limb and be all but invisible to probing eyes.

Squirrel hunting teaches the fledgling hunter many important things about outwitting game. It teaches him to be still and quiet, to have roving, sharp eyes to detect any unnatural movement, to be able to accurately judge range and to set the squirrel up for a fatal shot.

A good weapon for the beginning squirrel hunter is a Marlin Model 24, the standard model with a .22 rimfire in one barrel, .410 shotgun in the other. It holds only one of each kind of ammo. This way there is less chance of an accident. With the shotgun, the youngster is ready for the short or moving shots; the .22 rim-

fire takes care of medium-range shooting.

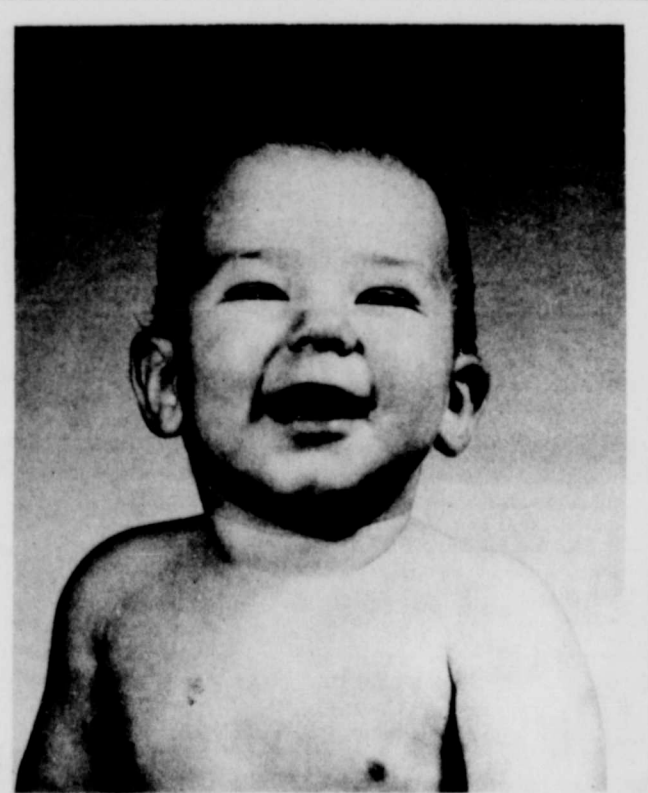
Although the opening of the squirrel season is heralded with much fanfare in parts of the state, particularly East Texas, in many other counties it is open the year around. One of the best times to seek the diminutive bushytails is during early fall, in a grove of oak or pecan trees, when the nuts are ripening and the critters are out and feeding.

Texas has a sizable population of both species of squirrels, the reddish-colored fox squirrel and the grayish gray squirrel. The gray squirrel is most abundant in East Texas. The larger fox squirrel is found predominantly through the Hill Country in the heart of the state.

Hunting squirrels is the same no matter what locale or the particular species of bushytail you might be after. It is a quiet and slow game of wits . . . with the hunter trying to see the squirrel before revealing his presence. Once a squirrel is spooked it is doubly hard to get it in the skillet.

One of the squirrel's most annoying habits is its tactical withdrawal to the opposite side of the tree the hunter is circling. A bit of its tail—constantly just out of range—slowly and enticingly lures the maddened hunter in a merry-go-round chase as the squirrel in question retreats one step ahead of his pursuer.

According to the lore of old Texas squirrel hunters, there is only one sure way for a single hunter (without dog) to outfox such a maneuver. Make sure the squirrel isn't peeking, then hang your hunting jacket on a branch where you are standing. Retreat carefully to the background then slowly circle the tree from a considerable distance. Supposedly the squirrel will continue to regard your jacket as his prime enemy and focus his attention accordingly. Meanwhile you sneak up on its blind side.



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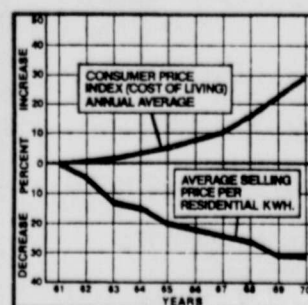

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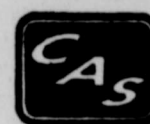
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
