(Q) I do not understand how the water billing is done here. I moved out of a house soon after the first of the month and was charged more than I thought I should be.

How does it work?  
(A) Gloria Erwin, billing clerk at Colorado City Hall, said that billing is not done from the first of one month to the first of the next month, but from the reading date which is stamped on your bill.

She explained that the meters are read sometime around the 7th of the month to the 15th of the month and then she gets the bills out as soon after the first as possible.

If you move out within 15 days of the reading of the meter and have used the minimum amount of water or less, you are charged for that amount of water plus half of the normal month's sewer and garbage. If, however, you move out 16 or more days after the reading of your meter, you will be charged the full amount, she said.

## PIK response termed good

The response to the PIK (Payment in Kind) sign-up has been good, according to Don Stewart, executive director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Mitchell County, with approximately 40 percent of the farmers here having

signed up so far.

Stewart is urging farmers who have not yet made up their minds to make a decision soon, since the March 11 deadline is not very far away. He adds that farmers who do not wish to participate in the PIK should be sure to sign up

for the regular program in order to make their cotton eligible for Commodity Credit Loan and for the 20 cents per pound projected deficiency payments.

Since the announcement of the PIK program on January 24, producers have tried to

assimilate all the information they have been receiving on the program from many different sources and make a decision as to whether or not it would be beneficial to them.

## Feathers convicted

Former Colorado City resident and Payne Chapel C.M.E. pastor David Feathers, 58, was found guilty of first degree murder Thursday in the San Bernardino, California court system according to San Bernardino Sun reporter Raymond Coronado.

The eight man, four woman jury deliberated for eight hours before finding Feathers guilty of murdering his 24-year-old son David Feathers, Jr. in 1979 in San Bernardino County. The trial lasted three weeks, and Superior Court Judge William Pitt Hyde

will issue a formal sentence March 17, said Coronado. Feathers faces a possible 25 year to life sentence.

Colorado City residents Charlie Uselton, Rev. Ron Hamby, Rev. Monte Jones and Rev. Glenn Roenfeldt all went to California this week to testify in Feather's behalf.

According to Coronado, Deputy District Attorney Raymond Haight claimed that Feathers See FEATHERS, Page 2

# Retirement change protested

Postal workers in Colorado City have received word from the National Association of Letter Carriers (AFL-CIO) that the President's Commission on Social Security has plans to include "new federal and postal workers in the Social Security System."

Three of the letter carriers here feel that such an action would do

great damage to their retirement system.

Tommy Reeves, a letter carrier for 27 years, stated, "This is our money they're trying to put into Social Security," adding that their payments were higher than Social Security payments. He explained that the action would extend their retirement by ten years or cut down on payments.

According to Reeves, they would still be able to retire early, but 5 percent of the payments would be deducted for every year.

Robert Sayger said that although he had been a letter carrier only since 1977, he felt that putting the postal employees' retirement into Social Security was unfair: "It's a bad deal for everybody, especial-

ly oldtimers. They're taking advantage of them, taking away their privileges."

Seventeen-year employee Ed Walls thought that the action takes away much of the incentive for working for the post office, noting, "That's one of the reasons I went to the job." "I hate to see it go," he said. "I don't think it should and I hope our Congressmen and lawmakers see that it doesn't."

Reeves said that so much controversy had been stirred by the proposition that the President has put in a Comment Line to deal with the input.

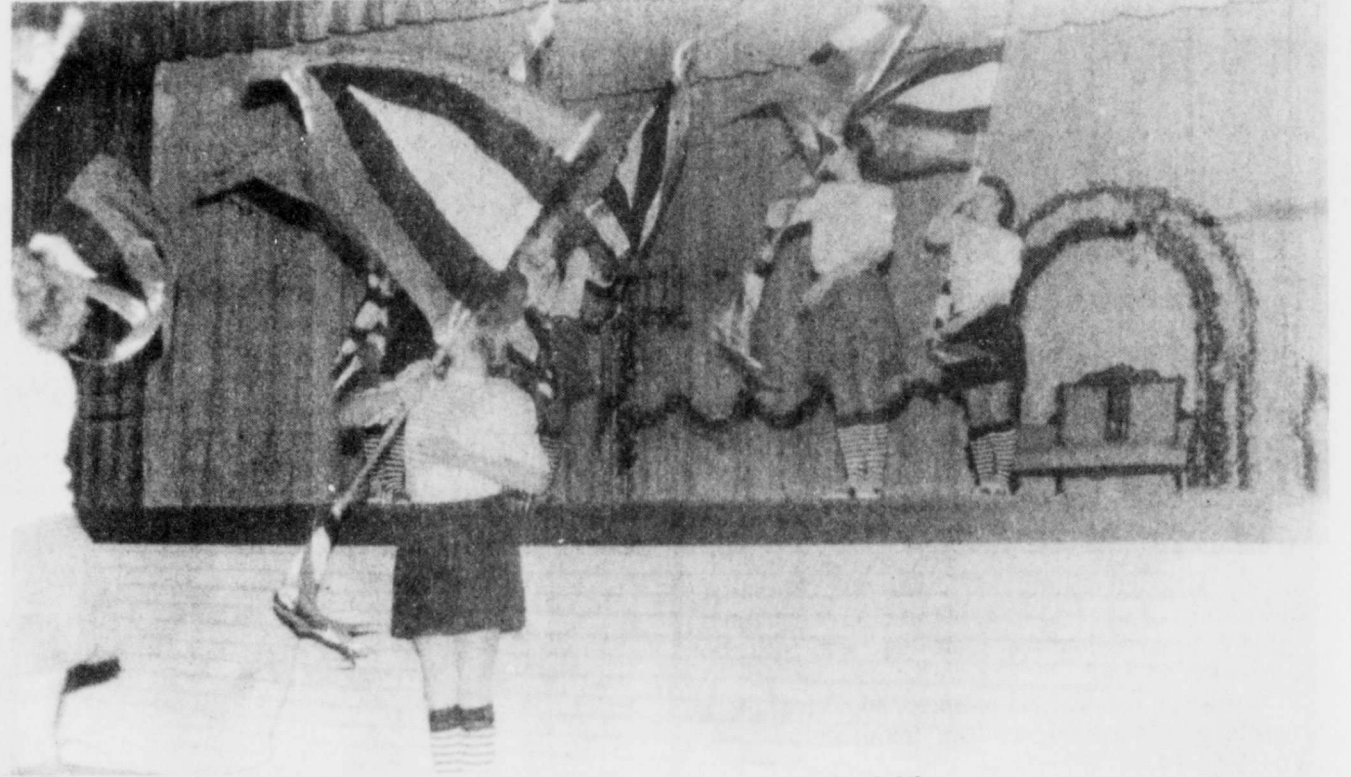

thers brutally shot his son in the back of the head and took him to Vickville, located 35 miles east of San Bernardino where his decomposed body was found. Haight told jurors that Feathers killed his son to collect a \$70,000 life insurance policy on David, Jr.

Public defender Don Pepe told the jury that anyone could have murdered the younger Feathers. "He was collecting government disability checks, and carried a lot of money around with him. Plus he was

say that no blanket statement can be made about whether the program is good or bad for an individual farmer—each producer will have to "put the pencil to all the different parts of the program as they apply to his farm," Benson says, and decide for himself if PIK would be beneficial in his case.

The Extension Service has developed education information and a special worksheet which is available at the Mitchell County Extension office, Benson noted.

Benson added that the program would probably be good for marginal but not for those who have 500 pound yield or better; however, it is imperative that each producer weigh the pros and cons himself.

Though the aim of PIK is to reduce the surplus of cotton, Benson has doubts about whether desired effect will be produced: "Cotton production has gotten to the point where it is not based on what Texas makes or the United States makes, but on world production and I don't think PIK will have worldwide impact."

One of the drawbacks of PIK is its probable adverse effect on the cattle market. Since farmers who participate in the program will be allowed to graze cattle between November 1 to May 1, more cattle are likely to be on feed, thereby bringing down the price.

Stewart and Benson urge each producers to sit down with the figures on his acreage and decide which program he wants to sign up for—PIK or regular—and do it soon because it is less than two weeks until the deadline for both programs.

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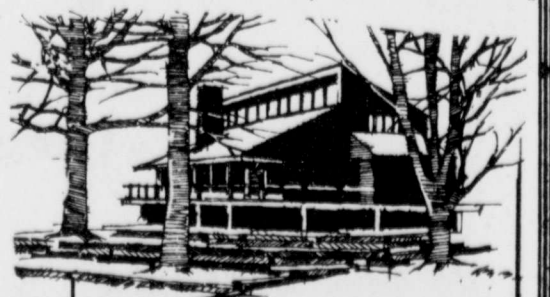
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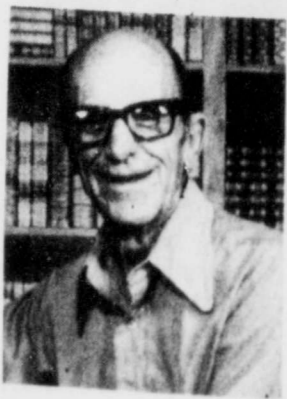

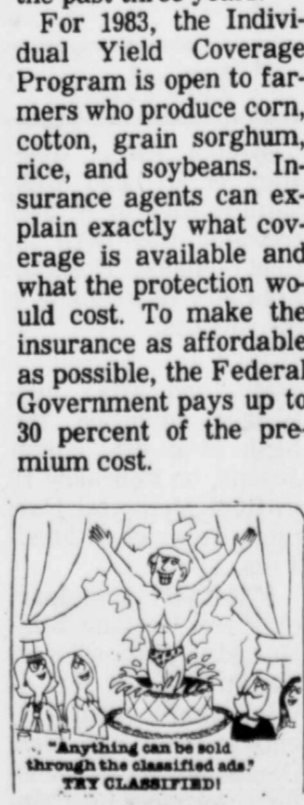

Thus, if a farmer can prove that his yields during the past three or more years have been above the average for his area, we'll also give him credit for above-average yields in any years for which he doesn't have the necessary records."

"We'll assume his yields in those years were above average by the same percentage as his recent yields," explains Crouch.

The insurance official states that the improved Individual Yield Coverage Program, as it is called, will make Federal Crop Insurance policies significantly more attractive than in the past to those farmers who have a history of high yields. "The fact that there's no increase in cost for the increased protection should also provide an incentive to carry insurance," he adds.

The county ASCS office can provide information about the procedure for verifying above average yields. The farmer must provide ASCS with records of planted acreage and all production of a crop for at least the past three years.

For 1983, the Individual Yield Coverage Program is open to farmers who produce corn, cotton, grain sorghum, rice, and soybeans. Insurance agents can explain exactly what coverage is available and what the protection would cost. To make the insurance as affordable as possible, the Federal Government pays up to 30 percent of the premium cost.

## Baptists increase membership in '82

Texas Baptists recorded gains in 1982 in all major church organizations and increased baptisms by 11 percent over the previous year.

The total of 67,692 baptisms was the second greatest for one year in the denomination's history and is the highest mark since 1955. In the Mitchell-Scurry Association, the total number of baptisms in 1982 was 153.

Total membership of the 4,800 churches and missions rose more than 33,000 to a total of 2,288, 218, with 8,807 of those members being listed in the Mitchell-Scurry area.

The 4,598 members enrolled in Sunday School in this area adds to the 1,210,418 enrolled state-wide.

"This is an excellent report and reflects the growing concern Texas Baptists have for missions and evangelism," said William M. Pinson, Jr., executive director of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Texas Baptists continued to set new records in giving with more than 4,800 churches and missions reporting \$593,811, 095 in church offerings, with the Mitchell-Scurry Association contributing \$2,058,980 of that figure.

Missions gifts set an all-time record too, as the churches contributed \$95.4 million. More than \$45.4 million of the total was through the Cooperative Program, Southern Baptists regular lifeline of support for state mission causes and for the more than 6,200 missionaries in the

United States and almost 100 nations.

Membership of all major church organizations increased. Church training had a 6 percent gain, raising their enrollment by 14,188 over the 1981 total of 234,114.

Church music enrollment increased by 7,315 to a 1982 total of 220,631; in the Mitchell-Scurry area, 498 persons were registered in the various choirs.

Woman's Missionary Union increased state-wide to 131,611 members, 498 of them in this area, and Texas Baptist Men raised its total membership to 64,968. In this area 219 men are registered with this group.

# Tennis team fares well

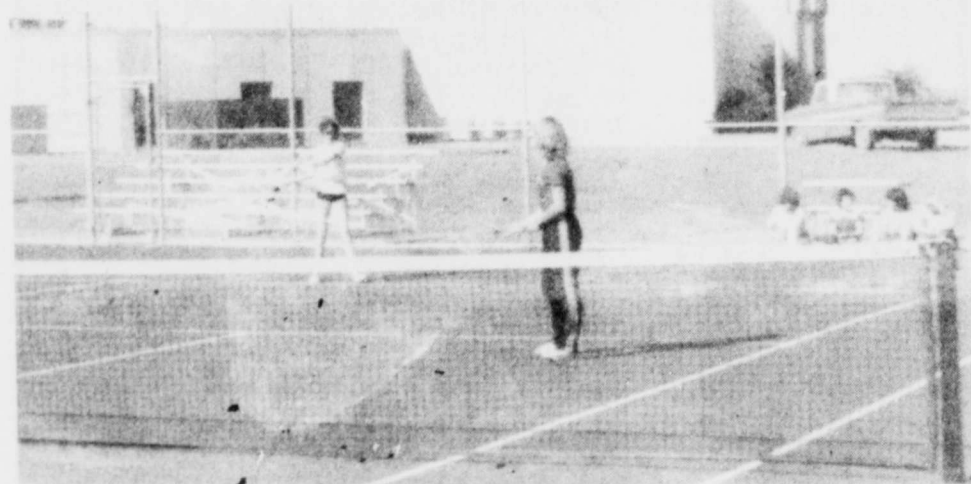

## Cook's Corner

### Friends' recipes are this cook's favorite

Janice Weaver loves collecting cookbooks, but her favorite recipes are "given to me by family and friends. Those are the ones I prize most," she says.

Although her cooking time is limited by the fact that she works as music teacher at Kelley Elementary, as well as being a wife and mother. She and her husband, Dennis, have two children, Jennifer, 4½, and Jeremy, 3½.

The way she solves her time problem is to cook large quantities when she does have time to cook, then freeze what is left over for future use. She notes, "It's so much easier to cook that way; it fits my hectic schedule better."

The three recipes Mrs. Weaver is sharing are some that were given to her and that she thinks are especially good.

**BLUEBERRY SALAD**  
1 large can blueberries  
1 large can crushed pineapple  
1 large pkg. raspberry Jell-O

**½ c. chopped pecans**  
Drain pineapple and blueberries, reserving juices. Add enough water to juices to equal three cups. Bring to a boil. Dissolve Jell-O in juices. Add fruit and pecans. Chill until set.

**Cream together:** ½ c. sugar, 8 oz. cream cheese, one cup sour cream. Spread over chilled Jell-O.

**Note**—This salad looks best in a clear glass bowl.

**CHICKEN-BROCCOLI CASSEROLE**

**Layer:** 3 c. cooked, chopped chicken  
2 pkg. chopped broccoli (or fresh equivalent)

**Mix:** 2 cans cream of chicken soup  
1 can cream of celery soup

¼ c. white wine or cooking sherry  
½ c. real mayonnaise  
1 beaten egg

Pour over chicken and broccoli. Top with ½ lb. shredded cheddar cheese.

Mix 2 pkgs. Stove Top Stuffing and 2 sticks melted margarine until moist.

Spoon over casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-40 minutes.

**HOT CHICKEN SALAD**  
3 c. chopped chicken  
1 c. real mayonnaise  
1 small onion, finely chopped

½ c. sliced almonds  
1 c. chopped celery  
½ c. grated cheddar cheese.

Combine all ingredients. Salt and pepper to taste. Put in 9 x 13 baking dish. Cover with crushed potato chips.

## Oil, gas discoveries are down

Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace has announced that Texas operators reported 93 gas and 60 oil discoveries in January 1983.

One year ago, 121 gas and 43 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in January included 38 in deep South Texas, 15 in Southeast Texas, 12 in West Central Texas, six in East Texas, five each in North Texas and the Midland and Refugio areas, three in East Central Texas, and two in the San Antonio and San Angelo areas.

Oil discoveries included 17 in West Central Texas, 10 in North Texas, eight in Southeast Texas, six in the San Angelo area, five each in deep South Texas and the Midland area, four in East Texas, two in East Central Texas, and one each in the Panhandle and the Lubbock and Refugio areas.

In January, operators reported 620 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,385 in January compared with 2,862 in January of 1982. Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in January amounted to 2,697 against 3,099 a year earlier.

Operators filed 782 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 791 amended requests.

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# New area code established for part of Texas

A new area code will be effective March 19 for telephone customers in parts of East and Southeast Texas.

The new area code, 409, will replace the current 713 area code for about 180 cities and towns, including Beaumont and Galveston, said Jim West, Community Relations Manager for Southwestern Bell.

Houston and about 30 nearby towns will re-

main in the 713 area code. All other cities in the existing 713 area will switch to the new 409 area code.

Record growth, especially in the Houston metropolitan area, created the need to split the existing 713 area code, said West.

He said forecasts indicated that without the new area code, all available 713 area code telephone numbers would

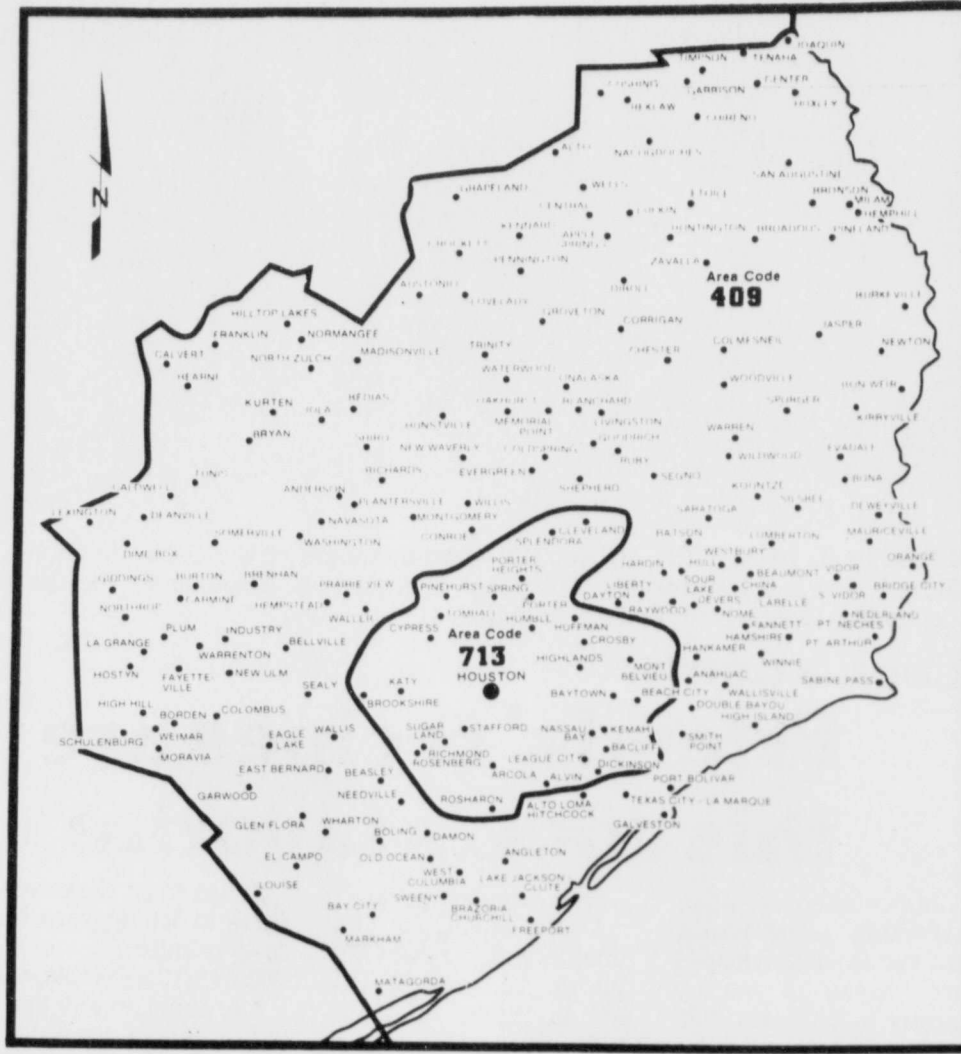
be exhausted by early 1984.
