V-H TOURIST CAMP CHANGES OWNERSHIP

A deal was consummated last week whereby the V-H Tourist Camp was sold by Mr. Victor Hardeman to Mr. Henry Bossman. Mr. Bossman was recently connected with the Oklahoma Construction Co., who had the contract for the construction of the Humble Pipe Line through this section. After disposing of his interests in the Construction Company, Mr. Bossman looked longingly at the tourist camps of this county, and finally got a price on Hardeman Tourist Camp, which resulted in the transfer of that property, the final papers being signed this week, and Mr. Bossman is now in possession of this beautiful camp.

The Eagle extends to Mr. Bossman a hearty welcome and wishes for him every success in his new field.

While Mr. Hardeman disposes of this particular part of the V-H Ranch, he is retaining a sufficient number of acres to justify him in continuing the ranch business, and he states that as soon as he can regain his health he will again stock the ranch which has been leased to other parties for the past year.

Mr. Hardeman has made a wonderful success of the tourist camp, having been among the pioneers in this field, establishing the camp some three or four years ago.

O. S. T. PIONEER VISITS JUNCTION

Mr. B. W. Vanderen, of Baltimore, Texas, passed through Junction enroute to San Antonio Sunday. Mr. Vanderen was on a business trip and did not have long to tarry in Junction, but he expressed himself as being highly pleased with the progress of this town. In a conversation with the Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce this old pioneer expressed his opinion that the O. S. T. towns were being out-generated by the Bank Head Highway organization, and that many tourists were being routed over the Bank Head Highway that should travel the O. S. T. One of the chief talking points of the Bank Head Highway enthusiasts is that we have about ten or twelve miles of incomplete road across the Sutton and Kimble County line.

Mr. Vanderen suggested that every O. S. T. town select a delegation to meet some time in the near future at either Kerrville or Junction for the purpose of formulating a plan of action to combat any propaganda that might be detrimental to the O. S. T. interests. We think that this is a good suggestion, and that the meeting place should be Junction, as it is nearer the center between San Antonio and Baltimore.

NEW BUS SCHEDULE- JUNCTION TO KERRVILLE

A new schedule of busses to and from Kerrville, making connection with cars to and from San Antonio, has been announced by Mr. Hal Peterson, of the line from Kerrville to Junction. The schedule is such now that one may leave Junction at 6:30 a. m. and spend the day in San Antonio, leaving there at 4:30 and arriving in Junction at 9:05 at night.

The official schedule follows:

First car leaving Junction at 6:30 a. m., arriving at Kerrville at 8:30, making connection with the 8:30 car leaving Kerrville for San Antonio, arriving at 11:05 in San Antonio. First car to leave Kerrville going to Junction at 9:45, arriving at Junction at 11:45. This car will enable people to leave San Antonio in the morning at 7:00 o'clock and make connection with the 9:45, arriving in Junction at 11:45. Have the afternoon car leave Junction at 2:00 o'clock, arriving in Kerrville at 4:00, making connection with the 4:30, arriving in San Antonio at 7:05. This will enable people to go from Junction to San Antonio in the afternoon, arriving there in time to see the shows and spend an enjoyable evening. The last car out of Kerrville for Junction to leave Junction at 9:05, making connection with the San Antonio car leaving San Antonio at 4:30.

SAN DIEGO C. OF C. PAYS JUNCTION VISIT

A delegation representing the San Diego, California, Chamber of Commerce, composed of Mr. D. W. Campbell, who is manager of the convention and events department; Mr. Russell H. Miles, director of publicity; Mr. George P. Stone, manager of the California Club Department, were guests in the city for a short time Sunday.

These gentlemen are on the home stretch from an extensive tour of the country including points as far east as Atlanta, Georgia, and as far south as St. Augustine, Florida. This tour is being made preparatory to sending out an advertising car some time in the near future from San Diego which will be routed over the Old Spanish Trail. They are also inspecting various aviation centers in order to secure the most modern ideas in regard to putting the finishing touch on air ports, as they are now finishing the construction of a \$625,000 air field in the city of San Diego, which they regard as one of the most attractive and beneficial projects of their city.

This delegation was accompanied by Mr. Harrell B. Ayres, who is managing director of the "Old Spanish Trail" Association. Mr. Ayres expressed himself as being pleased with the new highway construction work that is about to begin in this county. He also intimated that if the proposed air mail route to Mexico comes by way of San Antonio that we might in the near future get an air mail line designated from San Antonio to El Paso. He was highly pleased with our proposed air port project for the reason that it will have a distinctive bearing on this proposed air mail route.

LOCAL C. OF C. MEETING WAS WELL ATTENDED

The regular monthly meeting of the Kimble County Chamber of Commerce was held at the court house Saturday night, April 28, 1928. This was one of the most successful meetings ever held by the Chamber of Commerce in this city.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Judge Weaver H. Baker. Current business which includes the following was discussed from every angle: (1) Building of an electric railway; (2) The construction of a first class, up to date flying field; (3) Bus schedule from Junction to San Antonio. Committees were appointed on each of the given projects, and at the time they were appointed they were admonished by the president to put every ounce of energy of which they are possessed into their respective projects. Everyone of the above projects are worthy of, and should have the support of every individual in this community.

The construction of an air port for this town only yesterday seemed but a dream, but today, as seen by the enthusiastic committee, is a reality.

The proposed electric railway will to many seem too good to be true, and will be seen by others to be only another mirage or phantasm, but to the most wide awake observer, it appears to be the soundest proposition that we have had up to date. Judge Baker was unanimously chosen as our representative to deal with the Insular Interests and to assure that company that they have the Chamber of Commerce solidly behind them.

Another thing that seems small at first glance, but which has been worked out to what is as nearly perfect as can be, is the new bus schedule between Kerrville and Junction. This schedule, which will appear in another part of this issue of the Eagle, will give the people of Kimble County an opportunity to go to San Antonio and transact their business and return the same day.

The publicity committee presented at this meeting a new folder for advertising purposes which is unique, inexpensive, very attractive and artistically designed, which upon sight was very enthusiastically received by those present. The plates for this folder are now being made, and will be ready in a very short time for distribution.

In a speech made by Judge Randolph, he emphasized the need of new legislation in regard to the speed law as it now exists. A committee was appointed to investigate this proposition.

A letter was read by the secretary from Mr. Jack White, manager of the Plaza Hotel at San Antonio, Texas, in which it was proposed that the Chamber of Commerce could advertise one night by a musical program interspersed with short talks descriptive of our country over the radio station K. T. S. A. at San Antonio, free of charge. We are not sure whether or not we have the local talent available for such a program, but it would be a great boost for this country if it could be arranged.

A committee on streets was appointed to urge the City Council to issue warrants to raise money necessary to tar and grade the street intersections of Main street. The warrants, if issued, will be bought by the county. This money, together with private donations, will insure the tarriation of Main street.

Walter Buckner, associated with his father, T. A. Buckner, of the San Marcos Record, one of the best weekly papers in the State, was a Junction visitor last Friday and Saturday, and comments upon the phenomenal growth of the city. Mr. Buckner was a guest at the Beasley ranch, where Mrs. Buckner is on a visit to her mother, Mrs. L. Beasley.

RESOLING WORN SHOES

The village shoemaker in the old days was a substantial citizen of his community, and besides repairing the family shoes he frequently acted as justice of the peace, alderman—and sometimes he put in Sunday at preaching. When the "shoe-machinery trust" began turning out women's shoes with the soles sewed directly to the upper, without an intervening welt, the poor shoemaker around the corner was unable to resole this kind of shoe. But a new method of resoling this type of shoe has been developed and more than 140,000 pairs of women's shoes are being resoled weekly by the new process which has been developed by a well known industrial firm which specializes in the tanning of sole leather.

In repairing by this method, a flexible soling particularly adapted to the work is cemented to the shoe with a specially developed waterproof cement by means of a hydraulic press, which molds the sole to the contour of the shoe. This process eliminates nails and stitches and permits the repair shop to resole shoes that heretofore have been considered unrepairable. Shoes repaired by the new method, it is claimed, have none of the old "half-soled" appearance and, in addition, the solid comfort of a "well-broken-in" shoe is retained.

The unusually satisfactory appearance of the job is made possible by the fact that, in using cement instead of stitching, the thickness of the sole can be graduated rather than having to meet a certain width to permit stitching. The cement used in this process is a waterproof, belting cement adaptation, developed for this specific purpose by a nationally-known chemical industry.

While the utility of this process is chiefly in the soling of the types of women's shoes manufactured today, which defy resoling in any other way, it has been found to be also the most satisfactory method of repairing men's shoes.

THINGS WORTH KNOWING

Modern Decoration
Modern art and its sources and its influence in all phases of modern life from portraits to bathroom fixtures is found in the progress of the present age of industry, according to R. E. T. Hafl, who finds in this movement "the expression of life as it is lived today." Mr. Hafl relates that Lord and Taylor have completed five rooms in their great New York store, which has been designed by their own decorating staff in the modern spirit. These are a bedroom, a diningroom, a smoking room and two living rooms. Some of the furniture was imported but in three of the rooms, the furniture was designed by the firm, and made in New York. Rayon stands out in this practical display. In the diningroom, for instance, a beautiful room with lemon colored walls and black, and silver furniture, the chairs are covered with orange fabric of which the gleaming threads leave no doubt of its origin.

In several of the rooms, the glass curtains are of what is known as rayon and cotton Rodier Fabrics. They are hung like this in conjunction with a complete ensemble, walls, rugs, furniture and accessories, and they serve to emphasize sharply a distinct place in the new school of the art of home decoration.

And now comes the question "What's to be done about it?" Here, merchant princes of the world, have made a most successful effort to show America a comprehensive outline of this really serious movement, and they have brought together a magnificent collection of beautiful objects. France is by no means the only nation producing this new art, but France to quote Miss Dorothy Shaver, who selected the exhibits, has put "a unity of effort behind this movement. To emphasize the work of French artists is sufficiently logical when one realizes the vigor and power behind the work that is being executed in France."

The New York merchants believe this exhibit will serve to show the American manufacturers that American people are genuinely interested in beauty and that there is a market for fine work only made possible by co-operation between artist and maker.

CHILDREN SHOULD KNOW—

The noble sport of archery is often thought to have passed from this ever more and more commonplace earth long ago. It is mentioned in the Book of Genesis. There are mighty hunters, however, even this mundane day and age, who hunt big game with bow and arrow, and cameras, rather than with adapted rifles, and during the last few years there has been a renewed interest in the ancient sport of archery.

Down in North Carolina, there is an old, old building, at the entrance to which stands the figure of a yeoman with a drawn bow. This is a bow and arrow factory. Here master craftsmen fashion strong, flexible bows from Cuban lemon wood. Yew, as well as the wye-elm so much prized by English yeomen, is used for the making of bows, too, but the painstaking workmanship which they require and the rarity of the woods make them a little too expensive for all but the most fastidious bowmen.

The bows are strung with flax or hempen cord, which is considered far more serviceable

than the catgut which sang to the snap of Little John's strong fingers.

Norwegian pine that has seasoned in the sun for many a long month is made into the slender feathered shafts. The first three feathers of the turkey's wing are used to adorn the arrow of today instead of the gray goose feathers used by the bowmen of the Middle Ages. When bows and arrows are sawed and shaved and sanded to the utmost degree of precise perfection, they are dipped in a duco bath to obtain the final, firm, lustrous finish.

Such are the bows and arrows of today—not so very much unlike the implement with which the beloved thief of Sherwood Forest won many a shooting match in Nottingham town, or yet that other bow with which the little Hiawatha "could shoot ten arrows upward ere the first had touched the ground."

If you are a little boy and tired of fire engines and cowboy suits and complicated electric toys, get Daddy to give you a bow and arrow for your birthday so that you can pretend you are Will Injun Sitting Bull at the battle of Little Big Horn. It's all kinds of fun.

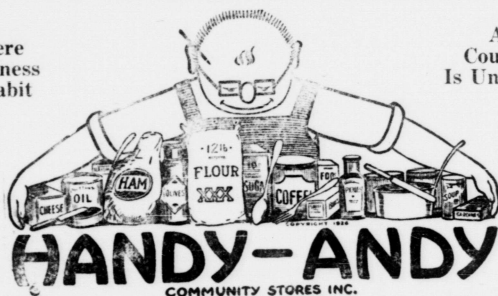

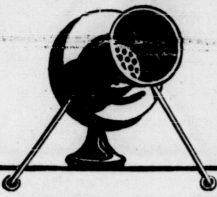

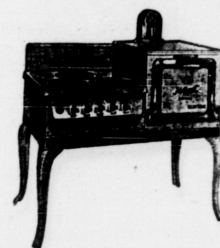

YOUR FLOWER GARDEN

(by Romaine B. Ware)

Gardening in Limited Space If your gardening time is limited you will have to plan to get the most out of it. The success of your garden is measured by the amount of bloom you get for the time you spend upon it. And the size of the garden is also controlled by the time you can give it. It would be foolish for you to have too large a garden.

To get the greatest amount of bloom with the least time and effort takes careful planning and the selection of the right flowers. I am today, suggesting a group of annuals that will give you the maximum bloom at the least outlay in both cash and care. These ten annuals are of the easiest culture, and every one of them may be depended upon to give you their full quota of bloom. They may all be started from seed and will require the minimum of care. There are many more that might be added, but these will give you a good selection for both garden display and cutting.

Here are the ten: Cosmos, Bachelor Buttons, Zinnias, Gypsophylla (annual), Larkspur, Gaillardia, Nasturtiums, Poppies, Stocks and Petunias. In this list you have flowers of all heights, and can arrange your borders to look well with the taller ones in the rear and the shorter to the front.

In a border that is open upon both sides, plant the taller things in the center and the shorter toward the edges. Do not follow this rule too closely, as your borders do not want to have a set appearance. If you will study the effects of flowers as grown in their wild state, you will learn a great deal that will help you to make your garden a thing of beauty. The wild things have a way of their own in growing, and you can get many ideas from them that will be well worth while. Mother Nature is a wonderful teacher if you will only listen to her.

In some future article I will list ten perennials that will be permanent, and also fill the above requirements. Perennials are the backbone of the garden, and you will eventually want a goodly showing of them.

"Making Their Own"

Now and then let the children make their own candy—like we used to do. Show them how to measure and prepare this simple recipe which makes two pans of pure, delicious candy, and keeps them interested, too:

2 cups granulated sugar (beet or cane), a pinch of salt, 2 tablespoons corn syrup, water to moisten. Let come to a boil; add 1/4 teaspoon soda, 2 tablespoons sharp vinegar and a big lump butter. Cook until a firm ball forms in cold water; flavor—and PULL.

HOME DECORATION HINTS

Attractive Living Room
Attractive living rooms can be created almost overnight by a little judicious use of color. Seldom is it necessary to go to any great expense or to inaugurate any radical changes in existing decorations or furniture.

In securing a color harmony in your living room, you should be careful to match the shades in your curtains and upholstery as nearly as possible with the colors you plan to use on your furniture and woodwork. You should also watch carefully that fundamental rule of interior decoration, that the values of the ceiling, the walls and the floor must follow that order in tone value. That is a light ceiling, slightly darker walls and darker floors.

I suggest that in starting to redecorate your living room you begin with a single color, or possibly two colors, and work out your harmonizing shades after the original or predominating shade has been fixed. A table, a chair, a rug—you can start almost anywhere to fix that original color. Once it is fixed build around it.

The rest is largely a matter of your own preference, your own personality. A pleasing color combination which can be achieved with duco colors consists of a bright living room corner built around painted furniture. It is both gay and comfortable. Yellow, the predominating shade, is fixed by a desk chair and a small table. A buff desk harmonizes with this color. A magenta curtain, carefully selected as to tone and shade, complements the predominating yellow. A vivid ducoed mandarin red chair and book table provide a pleasing contrast.

TO CONQUER TRICKY RUGS

There are usually certain rugs in the home that we learn by experience to avoid or walk over cautiously. They slip and skid, creep and crawl all over your floor. They form a real danger.
