RELIEVES HEAT

SWELTERING LUBBOCK RECEIVES SHOWERS AND COOL BREEZES

Heavy rains fell over the plains yesterday, ranging from a quarter of an inch to as much as one and a half inches, according to line car drivers arriving here late yesterday at the Union Bus Terminal.

At Plainview the heaviest fall was received, and might have done a little damage to ripened wheat fields, in which first evidences of the harvest season were seen as early as Wednesday. Little of the crop had been cut, and that which was had been stacked, keeping the damage to the minimum.

Lubbock county was visited only by local showers that fell throughout the late afternoon and early evening, however, were valuable to farmers as crops in the most part have been cultivated and the maximum good will be derived from the moisture received.

The showers yesterday afternoon and evening followed the warmest weather of the season, and sweltering Lubbock received the accompanying cool breezes with good cheer.

Donnell, Tahoka, Lamesa and other points south received light showers, according to information received last night at the Avalanche office.

TUESDAY AUTO CARAVAN WILL SWELL LUBBOCK'S DELEGATION AT WEST TEXAS C. OF C. CONVENTION

Everyone going to Amarillo to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention in cars are urged to attend on Tuesday which is designated as delegation day, according to Spencer Wells, chairman of the local delegation parade and decoration committee.

The auto caravan is expected to report to Lubbock headquarters at Amarillo Tuesday morning, to register and be prepared to line up in the big delegation parade which will form at one o'clock.

"Lubbock is going to try for several prizes which are offered delegation day, Tuesday, June 22," Mr. Wells said last night. "Lubbock will be competing with other West Texas cities in these contests and we are counting on every one who attends the convention to be on hand Tuesday to obey orders and help Lubbock make a big showing."

The parade will be one of the most colorful and the most gigantic ever staged in West Texas. Every town in attendance at the convention will line up, dressed in spectacular regalia with floats and other attractions.

ROYALISTS TAKE OVER PORTUGAL

DE COSTA IMPOSES MARTIAL LAW IN LISBON; ALL EM. BASSIES GUARDED

LISBON, June 17.—Portugal is faced with the possibility of early restoration of monarchy following the establishment of a virtual dictatorship by General Gomes De Costa, the royalist army leader.

De Costa's troops marched from Sacavem Thursday and installed themselves in Lisbon without opposition. By evening they had placed guards outside all the ministries.

Premier Mendez Cabecadas retreated to the republican headquarters in Carmo barracks, declaring that he wanted to avoid bloodshed.

De Costa issued an ultimatum to the premier in which he demanded the latter's immediate resignation. The fall of the Cabecadas cabinet followed.

De Costa has imposed martial law in Lisbon and has suspended all ordinary laws. The situation in the city Thursday night was tense but calm.

De Costa's sudden move was the culmination of a quarrel with Cabecadas over the restoration of monarchy, or at least a plebiscite to settle the question, and Cabecadas demanding that the country remain republican.

OFFICIAL MUSIC MAKERS OF WEST TEXAS C-C TO STOP OVER

WILL PLAY HERE

PARADE AND CONCERT ARRANGED FOR VISITORS

Rev. J. E. Chase, pastor of the First Christian Church at Colorado, and S. H. Winn, representing the Colorado Chamber of Commerce, arrived here yesterday to make arrangements for the concert that will be played here this afternoon by the Colorado Band. Mr. Winn went on to Amarillo to make arrangements for the 100 Colorado delegates and the 32-piece band at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention that will open Monday.

The boosters will arrive here at four o'clock.

The Colorado delegation led by their band, will parade the streets of Lubbock immediately after their arrival here, and will play a concert at the Chautauqua grounds east of the Lubbock sanitarium this evening under auspices of the Texas Technological College, arrangements for which are being made by A. B. Davis of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and R. M. Chitwood, business manager of the college.

W. S. Cooper, secretary of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce, is manager of the automobile caravan hauling the Colorado boosters to the Amarillo convention. They will pitch camp at the county park here for tonight, leaving early Saturday for Amarillo and will spend the entire day visiting the towns en route. Band concerts will be played at each town visited.

Dr. P. C. Coleman, veteran West Texas booster and because of his work in connection with the creation of a school of higher education in West Texas has been recognized as the "daddy" of the Texas Technological College, will deliver an address following the band concert here this evening.

Dr. Coleman is well known to the people of Lubbock and throughout West Texas who will have much interest in his talk.

The Colorado band, which was last year designated the official band of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, is being directed this year by A. C. Hewitt, head of the well known "Musical Hewitt's" five members of which family are musicians and will be presented here as a feature of the evening program today.

New uniforms have just been provided for the band by the Colorado Chamber of Commerce, and this year has been the case since the organization of the band. Roy L. Farmer, Colorado's littlest man but biggest booster, will be uniformed and will accompany the band on all parades and attend all concerts given on the trip. Farmer is less than four feet tall, weighs one hundred pounds, but nevertheless keeps step with the band members on their parades and will aid them in entertaining the crowds.

Colorado, according to Rev. Chase, is making much progress at this time, with \$800,000 involved in the erection of buildings actually under construction at this time.

Dallas interests are building a five-story brick hotel building that will be completed at a cost of \$400,000, the only demand that was made on Colorado being for the site of the building, which was paid for by the businessmen and donated to the hotel company.

A refinery there which has been doing a large volume of business is being equipped to double its capacity, and a number of brick business-houses are being erected at this time.

The congregation of the First Christian Church there is to have a modern new church building soon, brick work on the structure to be finished in a few days. The new church will cost \$40,000 when completed, Rev. Chase said.

A high school building is being erected at a cost of \$150,000 to meet the demands of the fast growing scholastic population.

Crop prospects in that section were never more flattering than at this time, Rev. Chase said.

WHEELER TELLS OF PAID DRY TALKS

ANTI-SALOON LEADER NAMES CONGRESSMEN WHO TOOK MONEY

WASHINGTON, June 17.—United States senators and congressmen are employed through the anti-saloon league to go about the country making prohibition speeches for money, Warrick B. Wheeler, superintendent of the league, told the senate primary investigating committee Thursday night.

Wheeler named Senator Jones, Washington, republican, Senator Willis and Senator Fess, Ohio republicans, Robinson, Indiana, republican and Congressman Upshaw, George, democrat, Cooper, Ohio republican, Barkley, Kentucky, democrat and Lowery, Mississippi, democrat, as members of the national legislative body who had been employed through the league.

Under the system as outlined by Wheeler the speakers get their expenses and any amount of money the local speakers committee desires to give them.

PARLIAMENT RESENTS INTERFERENCE BY SOVIET

LONDON, June 17.—Both houses of parliament united Thursday in condemning Russian shipment of funds to English strikers.

The Earl of Balfour joined Lord Newton in the house of lords in characterizing Russian contributions to the strikers as "flagrant interference with the domestic affairs of Great Britain." Others pointed to the "certainty" that the government of Soviet Russia was involved.

HERRIOTT BLOCKS BRIAND'S PLANS

RADICAL STARTS FORMING FRENCH CABINET WITH-OUT INVITATION

PARIS, June 17.—Edouard Herriot, former premier and leader of the socialist-radical group, believes he has successfully torpedoed Aristide Briand's chances of forming a national union government, and without an invitation from the president, has set about calmly to pick out his own cabinet.

While Herriot's refusal to join a Briand government is believed to have shattered the hopes of France's veteran cabinet builder for a strong national union group, Briand himself has thus far refused to admit defeat and has announced that he will continue to attempt formation of a body composed of strong national figures.

Raymond Poincare has accepted Briand's proffer of a ministerial post, but with the condition that he be consulted as to his cabinet colleagues. But even with Poincare in line Briand is thought by press and public to have little chance of success.

Train Wreck at Spokane Fatal

SPOKANE, Wash., June 17.—Arthur J. True, engineer, was killed and a fireman named Hawkins was seriously injured Thursday night when the Great Northern "Fruit Special", east bound, left the rails near Bonners Ferry, Idaho, and plunged into the Kootenai river below.

Half of the twelve cars containing cherries and strawberries were lost with an estimated loss of \$20,000.

200 GAL. STILL EXPLODES REVEALS FIVE OTHERS

KANSAS CITY, Kans., June 17.—When a 200 gallon still exploded in the cellar of Harry Brown, 54, police came running and discovered hidden about the premises, five more whiskey producers, all in operation. The explosion of still number one caused \$700 damage to the Brown house.

WILBUR WANTS PREPAREDNESS

SECRETARY OF NAVY SAYS ONLY ROAD TO PEACE IS PROTECTION

MARBLEHEAD, Mass., June 17.—Adequate preparedness is the only road to peace in the present state of the world, Secretary of the Navy Wilbur declared in an address here Thursday commemorating the 150th birthday of the United States navy.

"War can not be avoided either by ignoring their possibility or their instrumentalities," he said.

"If peace could be secured by reason, by firm determination, or by reverent prayer, there would have been no need for the revolutionary war because the declaration of independence contained all these elements.

"If peace could be achieved by purchase or disarmament, or by determination to turn our backs upon an army and navy with their burdens, we would have had no difficulties in 1797, in 1800, in 1812, and again in 1815.

"If a determination to maintain neutrality and avoid the entanglements in the wars of others could have prevented war, the American nation would never have become involved in the world war," Wilbur said.

Hold One In Bomb Blast, Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Calif., June 17.—Three suspected bombers seen fleeing from the ruins of the Brooklyn theatre after five terrific dynamite blasts reduced it to twisted steel and kindling Thursday, were sought by police following an investigation.

William Graffam, 45, owner of the Brooklyn Candy shop, next door to the theatre, was also demolished, was arrested on suspicion of arson, when it was found his store was insured for \$8,000. Police however, believe the dynamiting the work of a gang of bombers.

Paris Makes the Smartest Blouses



New Model for the Summer Wardrobe

Since the plaited separate shirt has been declared one of the most important of summer fashions, it is fairly expected that the blouse will occupy an equally important place, for this attractive garment also figures prominently into most of the three-piece costumes sent over by Paris.

Blouses for summer wear are simple in design but showy in pattern, the handsome printed silks being featured for their development. The model pictured is of rare chic for it is made of silk crepe in bordered effect, the border being used for the band about the neck and the collar.

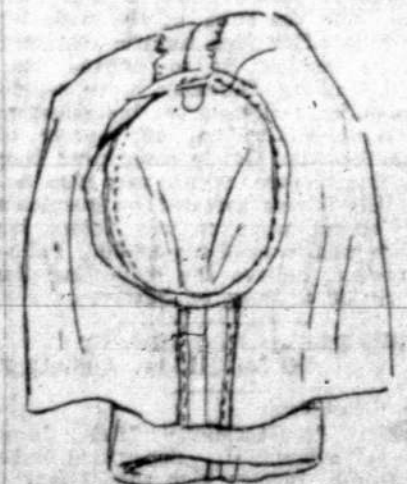
It is slashed front to back with a line fold of self-material, but the collar and sleeves are finished with bindings of ribbon to correspond with the figure in the silk. On either side of the front the blouse is also slashed from the armpits, the lower edges of the slashes being gathered and attached to the upper.

The sleeves are of the set-in type and are easy to make, since they are

very much abbreviated. There is no question that the short sleeve has returned to its oldtime favor, for the duration of the summer season, at least.

A clear idea is given as to how the sleeve should be set in and finished in the diagram. The underarm seam of the blouse is pressed open and bound, but the shoulder seam may be overlaid, if preferred. The sleeve is then set into the armhole, the seam of the sleeve being evenly matched with the shoulder seam of the blouse, and the top of the sleeve being matched with the shoulder seam. The sleeve is first basted into the armhole, then stitched. The binding may be attached on at the same time that the permanent stitching is done.

When the opposite edge of the binding is turned under and the stitching is folded over the seam and hemmed down with fine hemming stitches. The final turning of the binding is necessary only when bias folds of self-material are used to

over the upper seam. Otherwise the regulation seam binding has a narrow edge and does not require turning on either side.

One need not be limited to the pointed crepe for the regulation of this blouse, as there are many other fabrics in which it will look exceedingly well.

Cream of Tomato Soup—1-2 can tomatoes, 2 teaspoons sugar, 1-4 teaspoon soda, 1 quart milk, 1-3 cup butter, 1 slice onion, 4 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoonful salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper. Scald milk with onion, remove onion, and thicken milk with flour paste (thin enough to pour). Cook 20 minutes, stirring constantly at first. Cook tomatoes with sugar 15 minutes, add soda, and rub through sieve; combine mixtures, and strain into tureen over butter, salt and pepper.

Twin Mountain Muffins—1-4 cup butter, 1-4 cup sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 1 cup milk, 2 cups bread flour, 5 teaspoons baking powder. Cream the butter; all sugar and egg well beaten; sift baking powder with flour and add to first mixture, alternating with milk. Bake in buttered gem pans 20 minutes.

PRINTS MORE AUSTIN PAPERS

THIRD VOLUME OF SERIES ON
FAMOUS TEXAN ON
PRESS

AUSTIN, Texas, June 17.—The third volume of the Austin Papers, assembled by Dr. E. C. Parker, professor of history in the University of Texas, is now being printed by the university press. The first volume of the papers in two parts, aggregating 1,800 pages, has been published by the American Historical association, and the second volume, of 1,200 pages, is now being printed by the government printing office at Washington, D. C. Concerning the series on the Austin Papers, Dr. Parker says:

"The Austin Papers differ widely from any collection previously published by the American Historical association. In large part, they consist of letters and documents written by unknown men, but taken as a whole, they illuminate the social and economic history of much of the American frontier from 1789 to 1827, when the first volume ends. The thread of unity which runs through the material, giving it coherence and welding it into an interesting human document, is the history of the Austin family.

"Moses Austin grew to manhood in Connecticut; he was a merchant in Philadelphia and Richmond; a lead miner and manufacturer in southwestern Virginia, and a lead miner and manufacturer and merchant in southeastern Missouri. The papers illustrate these occupations and the life of the communities in which they were carried on. With the opening of Arkansas the Austins moved to the new frontier, and in 1821 they crossed the frontier and entered the Mexican province of Texas—but they drew the frontier after them.

"Stephen F. Austin becomes the central figure from this point, and the papers take on international interest. There are still many letters from American emigrants and prospective emigrants which reveal much of the social, economic and intellectual life of the United States. There continues to be an abundance of such material until 1835. But naturally the greatest historical value of the collection after the story reaches Texas lies in the abundance of the material which it furnishes for constructing an almost daily chronicle of the development of an Anglo-American state on the Mexican frontier. We see here the motives which carried emigrants to Texas, their relations with each other and with the Mexican authorities; the growing anxiety of the Mexican government over the efforts of the United States to buy Texas; the futile efforts of the government to stop immigration from the United States; the widening breach between the colonists and the government, and finally the revolution.

The first volume, already published by the American Historical association (report for 1919, volume 11) has the most direct value for the social and economic history of the American frontier. The second volume, now in the hands of the printer, to be issued as volume II of the American Historical association's report for 1925, reveals the widening breach between the colonists and the Mexican government (1827-1834). The final volume, to be published by the University of Texas press during the fall of 1926, is in the main a documentary history of the causes and progress of the Texas revolution and the relations of the United States thereto.

"The Austin Papers were collected by Moses and Stephen F. Austin. They were carefully preserved for more than fifty years by Colonel Guy M. Bryan, a grandson of Moses Austin, and in 1901 they were given to the University of Texas by Colonel Bryan's children, Guy M. Bryan and Mrs. Emmett L. Perry of Houston, Texas, and Mrs. Edward W. Parker of Germantown, Pennsylvania.

"A reviewer said of the first volume of the Austin Papers: 'Beyond all doubt the Austin Papers comprise the most significant contribution that has ever been made to the social history of the men and women who, to use Stephen Austin's oft recurring phrase, "redeemed Texas from the wilderness." In addition to this they furnish a detailed picture of life in Virginia, Missouri, Louisiana—under Spanish, French and American regime—Arkansas, early Texas and Mexico."

THE STATUS OF PROHIBITION BILLS IN CONGRESS

The reorganization bill for the appointment of a Commissioner of Prohibition, and for other purposes, has passed the House and has been reported out by the Finance Committee of the Senate. This bill has developed from the experience of prohibition enforcement under General Andrews. The Coast Guard Personnel bill and the Coast Guard Ships bill, which are both in the Commerce Committee of the Senate, have passed the House in an impressive way. The narcotic bill to strengthen the control of the drug evil is in the Finance Committee of the Senate and the Committee on Ways and Means of the House. The bill for the appointment of additional Federal judges has been favorably reported and is on the calendar of the House and will receive early discussion. The Goff bill, comprising various needed readjustments in prohibition law and administration has been reported out by the Senate Committee on the Judiciary and had a hearing by the Judiciary Committee of the House on the 27th of May. The bill to allow the appointment of retired Army officers to Prohibition work has been reported out by the Judiciary Committee of the Senate and is before a subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee. The Stalker bill for increased penalties for Prohibition Law violations is still tied up in Committee. The bill to put prohibition agents under civil service has passed the House and has been reported out of the Senate Committee on Civil Service. The provision is in the Goff bill also. A measure to provide for deportation of alien bootleggers has been reported favorably by the House Immigration Committee. Most of these bills are a part of the Administration's prohibition enforcement program, and they are heartily endorsed by all of the dry organizations. Opposition to them is not only opposition to measures desired for better prohibition enforcement, but when on the part of Republicans it is disloyalty to the Administration program. At the same time, the measures are receiving the hearty approval of dry democrats. It must be said that the wet organization and program is in better shape than it has been before, despite the severe shock of the complete breakdown of the wet case at the recent hearing. They are pushing the psychology of even insignificant situations, misinterpreted, and ignoring those which cannot, pushing for referendums in wet states. The prohibitionists have been exceedingly patient while all of the lessons learned during prohibition years have been ignored. Despite the fact that they have had an overwhelming majority in both houses of Congress, they have permitted obstructive wets by unfair methods to block needed legislation. Even now, they face the prospective adjournment of Congress while legislation which is demanded by the situation and which would pass overwhelmingly is kept lingering. The size of the whole thing is, that the dries and the wets are going to have to have a real fight in the United States Congress, and it might as well be now. Congress ought not to adjourn until the reorganization bill and the Goff bill, as well as some minor legislation, has been enacted. If the wets want to filibuster, let them filibuster until the filibuster busts.

THE PRESIDENT ON INCOME TAX REDUCTION

The announcement is made from Washington, apparently on official authority, that President Coolidge is opposed to any further reduction of income taxation for several years to come, taking the ground that any excess of income over expenditures should be applied to the more rapid reduction of our bonded indebtedness. In this we think President Coolidge is absolutely in the wrong. We believe it would be far better for the payment of the bonded indebtedness of the country to be stretched over a much longer period than has been intended, in order to lessen the burden upon the taxpayers of the present generation. No well-managed business corporation would undertake to amortize a big bonded indebtedness as rapidly as the Government is amortizing or paying off our national indebtedness. Far better would it be for the good of the country if all surplus national income should be used to reduce the income taxation, which hampers business and restricts the amount of money available by business interests for expansion. The rapid growth of this country in population and business brings about such a vast increase in our wealth that the bonded indebtedness of today would seem almost small 20 or 30 years hence measured by the wealth of

the country at that time. This bonded indebtedness was incurred not merely for the safety of the country of the present generation, but for all generations to come. There is absolutely no sound reason why future generations should not bear some of the cost of saving this country from ruin by German domination and damnation. Far better would it be for the progress and prosperity of the whole country to make no more rapid reduction of the debt than we have been during the last few years, and then apply to the lessening of income taxation every available dollar of surplus income. Income taxation is a heavy burden upon business interests. It hampers enterprise. It lessens business activities, and in that way the cost to the Government itself is far greater than any advantage which might be gained by President Coolidge's proposed method of using surplus income for lessening our bonded indebtedness. We believe that the voice of the business people of the country should be long and loud in opposition to Mr. Coolidge's views on this point, and that business organizations of all kinds should press upon the President and Congress the necessity of reducing income taxation just as rapidly as possible, even if in bringing this about we do not reduce our bonded indebtedness as rapidly as Mr. Coolidge desires.

THE GRAVEL ROAD

"I would rather eat dust than mud," says the governor of a state with a big road problem, addressing an audience in one of the less populous districts. Meaning that he is satisfied with gravel roads when he can't get better ones. Many states and many communities seem to think that in improving roads they must take one jump from dirt to paving—as if there were nothing between. Gravel or macadam roads are by no means to be scorned, especially when they are given a binder of oil or tar to keep out the water and keep tire-suction from tearing them up. Canada is a revelation in this regard to American tourists. Its roads are mostly gravel, and while by no means so satisfactory as paved roads, they are vastly better than our dirt roads. Better, too, by the way, than most of our gravel roads because, though often not built so well in the first place, they are better kept up. There may well be many proper grades of transition from wagon trails to wide, solid-paved highways, depending on the amount of traffic, the ability of the community to stand the expense and the local nature of the soil and local building materials. More practical appreciation of this fact would give the country thousands of miles of passably good roads where now there are none deserving the name.

CONGRESS SCARY ABOUT LIQUOR

First there was an ambitious program of liquor legislation framed up at Washington in behalf of the wets. Then there was an equally ambitious and distinctly hostile legislative program framed up in behalf of the dries. The former recently went by the board. Senate leaders deciding that nothing should be done about it at this session. Now word from Washington is that the same fate is destined to befall the dry measures. The Goff bill, intended to "put teeth into prohibition enforcement," has been sidetracked by the Senate steering committee. Anything may happen in these turbulent days, but evidently Congress as a whole is disposed to avoid any drawn fight on the liquor question at this session. Senators and representatives are scared, not knowing for sure how their constituents and the country generally feel about prohibition now, and preferring to wait and find out instead of committing themselves on the eve of an election. Perhaps this is just as well for the country itself. Liquor sentiment at present is very confused, and needs clarifying. Everybody may know more about it next winter.

UNIFORM LAWS

Uniformity of laws in the various states in the union is desirable, especially in matters of vital importance. The ludicrous, but tragic, situation arising out of diverse and conflicting marriage and divorce laws are sufficient to point the moral. But, in the attempt to standardize, so to speak, these laws, let us not commit a more fatal error and accept a general Federal law covering the situation, for that, it is easy to see, would be but another step in the gradual dissolution of state rights which is constantly going on in this country. There is too much centralization of power in the Federal government now. We are becoming thoroughly bureaucratized. It is dangerous. The individual states should keep the major control over their affairs, trusting the Federal government to care for those features or activities, such as foreign relations, customs, defense, and so forth, which are clearly the province of a national form laws, let us emphasize the fact that we need government. Thus, in the movement toward uniform coordinated state laws, and not a Federal law covering the situation, it is entirely up to the individual states to confer, decide what the law should be and then individually adopt it. The result would be true coordination, as far as all practical purposes, are concerned, but without the drawback of the further surrender of state rights.

THE "PROFESSION" OF "SLUGGING"

San Francisco is undergoing a carpenters' strike. The calling of the strike was immediately followed by the importation of a bunch of professional sluggers, who began the regulation assault on men who insisted upon working. It is time this common system of slugging men who insist on working must stop in this country. Men have the legal and moral right to quit work if they want to, but they have no legal or moral right to prevent other men from working. Strikers must depend on public opinion to win, and that opinion is quicker won by fair means than foul. The slugging system, which is not approved by the great majority of union men, has done much to condemn unionism with the public.

BURNING SMOKE

There is an old adage from Carlyle, which says, "Burn Your Smoke." In these days that advice is being put into practice. Smoke burners are nightly conserving fuel and adding to human comfort. The ashes of the great manufacturing concerns are being turned into sources of great revenue. "By-products" is a word to be conjured with. The wealth of many a concern today is the saving of what erstwhile was thrown away. The great meat packing concerns of the country were organized for the purpose of preparing meat for the market, but they have long since passed beyond that original idea, and have become the producers of a great variety of foodstuffs by taking care of what had been overlooked through the early years of their operation. Their wastes are now making beef tea, lard, canned goods, mince meat, glue and a great variety of products that answer human need and produce wealth. The Standard Oil Company produces gasoline, paraffine, and an almost limitless supply of kindred articles which are the products of what formerly were disposed of by throwing them into the river. The Welch Grape Juice Company for years threw away vast quantities of pulp which today is conserved in the manufacture of a variety of fruit products that are exceedingly tasty and profitable. Henry Ford "burns his smoke" and produces gas for power. Germany has invented a method of burning smoke that produces 100 per cent pure denatured alcohol that can be sold at half the price of our wood alcohol.

If we could "burn the smoke" of a few billions of the cigarettes consumed in this country it might add many millions to the nation's wealth as well as years to the lives of our boys and girls.

FRENCH OIL MONOPOLY

The government of France has definitely decided to establish a state monopoly of the sale of oil, gasoline and petroleum products. By the terms of the act all importations of crude oil and its derivatives must be made by the State or its authorized representatives.

France imports nearly all its oil, estimated at 2,000,000 tons last year and valued at about \$1 billion of francs. The business at present is in the hands of about fifteen large companies of which the Standard Oil, the Royal Dutch and the Anglo-Persian companies control more than half.

According to records compiled by T. B. Kittredge, assistant director of

the League of Red Cross societies, an epidemic took a toll of 52,000,000 lives between 1914 and the present day. Of this number 2,000,000 lost their lives in war, 6,000,000 in civil strife, 40,000,000 in epidemics, 5,000,000 in famine and 2,000,000 in earthquakes and other natural disasters. At least 14,000,000 persons are injured seriously. The total of dead and injured includes more than 16 per cent of the world's population.

One of the most sensible plans yet to be advanced for the consolidation of faculty and student thought has just been instituted at the College of the City of New York. It consists of weekly meetings of picked members of the student body and the faculty. The meetings are informal and so planned as to give rein to the freest possible discussion on subjects concerning college discipline and curricula. Certainly the plan is logical and has much merit, in a purely advisory capacity.

T. J. Little, president of the Society of Automotive Engineers, asserts that large cars represent a waste, altogether out of proportion to their utility, and predicts that within the next few years even the best cars will be reduced to about the size of the present day lightest American models. The average auto only develops about 3 per cent of its possible power.

Judging from Henry Ford's experience it is not capital, nor the government, nor the state that employ labor. The greatest employer is Mr. Idea. Mr. Ford's idea gives employment to nearly 600,000 men at good wages.

Secretary of Agriculture Jardine says that boys and girls contemplating lives as farmers should not only have a liking for the business but should have a practical education in that line. From all accounts farmers are receiving a decidedly practical education—and that is the cause of most of the dissatisfaction and unrest.

The sales of pompies for relief of war veterans while Congress was voting \$165,000,000 for public buildings and a much larger sum for rivers and harbors, involved a note of irony—especially in view of the fact that a bill for veteran relief was cut more than two-thirds.

Excitement is contagious, but self-control is more so.

Bobby Jones Rises To Heroic Golf

LONDON, June 17.—Bobby Jones of Atlanta, rose to a new pinnacle of the golfing world Thursday by completing the 36 holes of the qualifying round for the British open championship in a miraculous 134.

His feat, dwarfing into insignificance the efforts of British and American stars, was hailed as an all-time record for tournament play. Following his record breaking 66 Wednesday on the difficult Sunningdale links, the American amateur champion shot a beautiful 68 Thursday to lead his nearest opponent, George Gadd of Roehampton, winner of the Northern professional championship at Formby, recently, by the wide margin of seven strokes.

Fourteen of the 17 invaders qualified. Joe Stein and Silas Newton failed to get under the 154 limit at Sunningdale and John Reuter scratched. As Jones, unperturbed by the large, fashionable gallery which followed him over the links, sank his last putt on the 18th green for a three foot hole, a great cheer went up. Beautifully gowned London society women and men in silk hats and outwings joined the throng which acclaimed the youth.

The golfing experts of the British newspaper joined in the generous praise for the Atlantan, adopting the superlatives of American movie subtitles.

Rowland Jones who was paired with Bobby, called him the "wonder golfer." In thirty years of play he has never seen a player like the Britisher said, "I have never seen anything which equalled those two rounds."

H. H. Hilton, former amateur champion, observed, "There never has been a golfer with such extraordinary command of all strokes."

The veteran J. H. Taylor said Great Britain had never seen such golf before.

From Scotland's glens to Trafalgar square and Fleet street, players too numerous to mention recalled that Bobby Jones' 36 holes were the lowest aggregate ever recorded in two first class rounds. The late Douglas Edgar did 69 and 66 in the Canadian championships in 1919; Emmett French, the American who competed in the qualifying rounds, negotiated the first two rounds in the Ohio championships in 1922 in 47.

The lowest single round in any British championship heretofore had been 68 by Taylor at Sandwich in 1914, Ernest Gray at Previc in 1908 and Tom Ball at Muri field four years ago.

A glance at Jones' cards for the two days clearly indicates the remarkable consistency of his play. For the 36 holes he was ten under four, shooting a five on the first hole coming in third. He retrieved the loss by taking only two shots on the fourth hole coming in.

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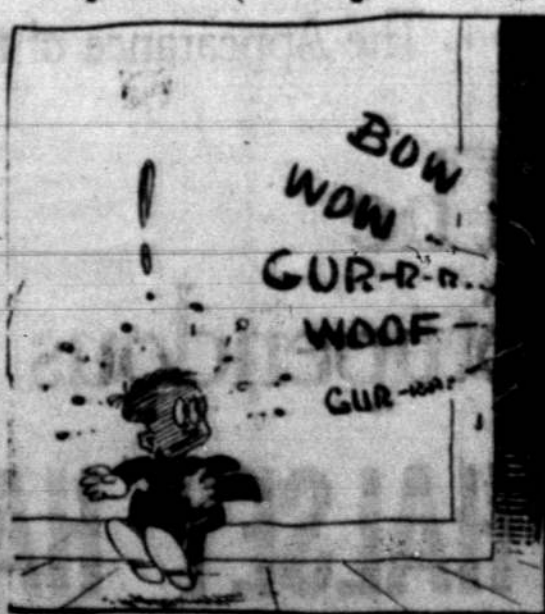

WHITE STAR SALE NOW ASSURED

BRITISH SYNDICATE WILL
BUY AMERICAN
SHIP LINE

HOBOKEN, N. J., June 17.—Sale to a British syndicate of the White Star line, one of the most powerful of American shipping organizations, was assured Thursday when stockholders of the International Mercantile Marine company empowered the directors to resume and conclude negotiations for the sale, which was interrupted by the British general strike.

When the stockholders, representing 644,366 of the 1,015,968 shares of outstanding common and preferred stock authorized the directors to sell the White Star line, it meant that the last strong element in American shipping was passing into the hands of the British.

The directors of the I. M. M. were given permission to sell the White Star line, also known as the Oceanic Navigation company, which is a subsidiary of the I. M. M. for not less than 7,000,000 pound sterling, (nearly \$35,000,000).

At the meeting no reference was made to the identity of the prospective purchasers, but for the past several months Wall street has reported that a British syndicate headed by Furness Withy company, Ltd., was negotiating for the American line, whose ships have always flown the British flag.

BUT THERE IS A FIELD IN TEXAS FOR THE BUS

The failure of the bus lines in interurban transportation service in Texas and other states impresses the fact that even with the advantage that such transportation agencies enjoy of having a roadway supplied at public expense there are some such agencies that are economically unsound, says the Texas Public Service Information Bureau.

In cases where such bus lines have gone into direct competition with electric interurban lines that serve heavy traffic territory, the cost of the bus service has been so much greater than the cost of the electric service that some such lines have suspended operations.

HOW TO POISON BUGS AND WORMS

CLEANLY HABITS OF ROACHES
ENCOMPASS THEIR
DOWNFALL

Cockroaches, grasshoppers, and worms.

Against these three pests, County Agent David Eaton has declared war, issuing instructions to the cohorts of farmers and bug-haters as to just how to poison them.

First, as to the cockroaches and to those somewhat similar black bugs which are swarming on the sidewalks and invading the business houses these days. Their habits of cleanliness, which most people will be surprised to know that they possess, will encompass their own downfall. Mr. Eaton says to scatter some sodium fluorid around their feeding places, or anywhere else they pass or congregate. The roaches crawling through the powder, will get it on their feet. They will then lick their feet to clean them, and will thus swallow the poison and die. Simple enough.

Next, as to worms, which Mr. Eaton says are now playing havoc with elms, maples and cottonwood trees. "Spray your trees with water, getting them thoroughly wet," Mr. Eaton says. "Then dust the trees with calcium arsenate. This is a better method than spraying the trees with a solution of calcium arsenate and water, although that method is also effective."

Finally, the grasshoppers, which in Biblical terms, have become a burden. Farmers are instructed to sow the following solution in a str along the edge of their fields: 25 pounds of coarse bran, one pound of arsenic or paris green, mixed dry, two dozen lemons ground up, and all, two quarts of low grade cane syrup—not corn syrup—in two gallons of water. The lemons, syrup and water should be mixed apart from the dry mixture of bran and poison, and then the two mixed together. The amount mentioned above should be sown over about two acres.

Mr. Eaton warns against expecting too quick results. He says the grasshoppers will not die for twenty-four hours. Then they start eating each other dead bodies, and the poison is thus spread.

Asked whether chickens would not eat the poisoned grasshopper and thus die, Mr. Eaton said there was no necessity for worrying the folks on near where chickens were kept, as the chickens would chase the grasshoppers from that vicinity.

Mr. Eaton said that the grasshoppers were dying by thousands on the farm of Ernest Shelby, who has been using the poison.

The Rockefeller party of eight had lunch at the Cascade hotel, Owego lake, near Moravia, and then called on Mrs. John P. O'Hara, Rockefeller's cousin.

The oil magnate showed his friends the spot where the little cottage in which he once lived had stood. The cottage was destroyed by fire two years ago while occupied by a gang of convicts who were building the Rockefeller highway along the east shore of Owego lake.

Every person who came in contact with the oil chief Thursday was given a new shiny dime.

The Rockefeller party will leave by motor Thursday night for Richford, Tioga county, where he was born. They will spend the night in that village.

WRECK, BLAMED ON DEAD MAN

ENGINEER RAN PAST FOUR
STOP SIGNALS, 15 ARE
DEAD

PITTSBURGH, Pa., June 17.—Three investigations were started Thursday night into the railroad wreck at Gray station, near Blairsville, Wednesday night which took a death toll of 15 and caused injuries to more than fifty.

Railroad officials, the interstate commerce commission and H. D. Hirsch, counsel for the public service commission, began separate inquiries.

Meanwhile Engineer D. Gordon, of the Pittsburgh-Cincinnati-Chicago Limited which crashed into the standing Pittsburgh-Washington express after running past four red flares, was blamed for the disaster.

It was revealed late Thursday that the engineer was probably adjusting the engineer's mechanism when the locomotive flew past the danger signals.

Gordon still clutched a monkey wrench when his body was removed from the tangled wreckage. For 20 years he had been an engineer with never an accident.

Superintendent G. M. Sixsmith of the passenger transportation division of the Pennsylvania railroad, said he was convinced "Gordon ran his engine past four easily distinguished safety signals. Why he did this, of course, will never be known as the entire crew was killed," the superintendent said.

Then it was ascertained that Gordon's lifeless hand held a wrench. He may have been working on the machinery, thereby obscuring his view of the signals, or he may have been working earnestly to prevent a crash which seemed imminent.

## AMERICANS ABROAD SEEK INFORMATION

LONDON, June 17.—With most of the very best American amateur and professional golfers, and tennis players in Europe for one of the most elaborate invasions the United States ever has made on foreign greens and courts, it might be expected that the large American colonies in London and Paris are interested chiefly in golf and tennis. But such is not the case.

The first questions pumped at an American arriving in Paris or London are these:

"What kind of a football player is Red Grange really?"

"Is Dempsey going to fight this summer and will his opponent be Harry Wills?"

"What kind of magic did they use on the New York Yankees?"

Red Grange, in proportion to the space available in the American language papers in Europe, received almost as much attention on this side as he did in the states and the football fans were eager to know if he were as good as Eddie Mahan, Jim Thorpe and George Gipp.

They also asked: "How much dough did Grange actually make?" and they followed with the expression of a typical American colonist in Europe: "Wouldn't he have been a sucker if he hadn't turned pro?"

The criticism of Dempsey that has been so freely and frequently expressed and printed in the States, was not heard here. There are so few good heavyweights in Europe that the Americans here are proud to boast: "Spalla? Posilino? Francis? Scott?—Why those bums couldn't go one round with our Dempsey!"

## GREAT SALES FIELD FOR ELECTRIC SERVICE

Despite the growth of the electric light and power industry, the homes and industries of the United States as a whole are only ten per cent electrified, the National Electric Light Association convention was told by S. D. Heed, Chicago, Chairman of the Sales Organization and Management Committee.

The report states that, during the forty-odd years of the industry's history, problems of engineering and finance have been solved, and that the task of market development is now "one of the most gigantic selling jobs the world has ever known."

According to a recent survey, says the report, it is estimated that if the America of today were completely electrified with present day equipment, the total annual requirement of energy would probably be in excess of five hundred billion kilowatt hours as against approximately sixty-five billion kilowatt-hours in 1925. "American selling genius," says the report, "has changed our daily lives by moulding new lines of thought. It has developed new personal tastes and has actually changed the customs and habits of our people. Now there is a tremendous national demand for new foods, new clothes, new means of transportation and new household and industrial conveniences. The report urged that the industry adopt sales management and sales promotion methods used so successfully in other industries.

## PERSIA OK'S OIL LEASE

BAGDAD, June 17.—The Persian government Wednesday ratified the oil concessions granted to the Anglo-Persian Oil company and transferred to the company the territories involved. The company will pay \$1 a ton in royalties.

"Irish girls wear their skirts just about as short as those of the United States," he said, "and they bob their hair just as closely. I don't think they drink or smoke, however. They use little paint and powder, because nature provides a natural bloom in the cheeks of Irish girls."

The Dublin rector headed a delegation of 18 Irish priests and 65 laymen who will attend the Eucharistic congress in Chicago. Three German priests, also bound for the congress, were aboard the ship.

## WALKER OFFERS CURFEW LAW

"JIMMY" WOULD PUT TEETH IN  
"BLUE" ORDERS ON  
BROADWAY

NEW YORK, June 17.—Mayor James J. Walker, himself one of most picturesque Beau Brummels of New York's night life, has now undertaken to close up the city promptly at 3 a. m. instead of allowing its cabaret to operate until long past daylight, as at present.

Violations of a law to this effect, offered by the mayor to the board of estimate, would be punishable by a maximum sentence of a year in jail plus a \$500 fine.

Night club owners who had been protesting loudly a less formal police order that they close at 2 a. m. realized with the submission of Walker's proposed law that they had gained another hour to mulct their patrons before consigning them to the all night speak easies, but that the new regulations would be enforced with sharp teeth.

The cabaret proprietors had fought the police order on the ground that it was a "hypocritical attempt to blue law Broadway" and that incorporated clubs chartered by the state were immune from the order.

But the mayor's new law defines cabarets affected by it as "a membership corporation, club, association, or society, which permits musical entertainment, singing, dancing, or other forms of amusement where food or drink is directly or indirectly sold to its members or to their guests or to the public."

### New York Finance

NEW YORK, June 17.—In one of the broadest trading days since the run upward movement, stocks swept forward in an irresistible drive Thursday and shorts were badly punished.

Steel common which has been the outstanding leader of the record recovery in the past fortnight signalled the second stage of the advance with a sharp move into new high ground for all time.

Although the steel business undoubtedly is improved, the demand for steel common obviously is based on expectations of a higher dividend rate, or at least an extra payment in addition to the regular \$7 annual rate. Many traders are confident that the plans of the steel corporation for the immediate future include a stock dividend which would raise the income on the outstanding common considerably. General Motors, running mate of steel in this market, rose into new high grounds for the year while sharp advances were in order throughout the list.

Traders operating for the advance found continued encouragement in the money market where the call rate held at 3-1/2 per cent, off 1-4 from Wednesday's closing rate. This low figure bears out predictions that the market has nothing to fear from the money markets until along toward fall when the crop movement will make the usual demands upon the country's funds.

Rails, rather sluggish of late, resumed activity and while the demand for trading in this division was not so aggressive as was the case in the industrial, the carriers managed to more than hold their own and the closing levels were generally higher for the day. Cast Iron Pipe which rose some ten points Wednesday added 8 1/2 points Thursday. This issue is considered to reflect Durant operations.

## TELLS ROTARY OF EUROPEAN TRADE

THOMSEN OF DENMARK IS SPEAKER AT DENVER CONVENTION

DENVER, Colo., June 17.—"When we deal honestly internationally, we help to establish a good reputation not only for ourselves but also for our country—and we create good will," said T. C. Thomsen of Copenhagen, Denmark, at the morning session of the Rotary convention. Mr. Thomsen is a notable leader in European industry, at the head of a great cream separator machinery company which has trade throughout the world.

Mr. Thomsen also stated, "Excessive trade barriers mean stagnation and throttling of progress." He said in part:

In modern life nearly all business, at any rate, all big business, rests on confidence, and the great bulk of all payments is based on credit.

Thousands upon thousands of people are engaged in keeping this tremendous international trade going, and it is the moral standard of each and every one of these men and their colleagues in their respective trades, which determine the ethics of international trade, as we find them today, and it is these men who shape the ethics of tomorrow.

Infidelity to contracts always follows violent fluctuations in price. It is undee such circumstances that men show what they are made of. A grain broker in Vancouver told me that in 1924 when wheat prices suddenly dropped 25 per cent and he had sold millions of dollars worth of wheat to many countries, purchasers everywhere with the exception of one country tried to cancel their contracts or to wriggle out by finding fault with shipments.

I mention this to remind you that when we deal honestly internationally, we help to establish a good reputation not only for ourselves but also for our country—and we create good will.

Since the war, overseas countries tend more and more to develop their own industries. Overseas markets have consequently in a great measure been lost to Europe, and in order to alleviate the abnormal unemployment following the loss of markets, many countries are introducing prohibitive customs tariffs, often pointing to the United States as the great example of the blessings of high tariffs. In addition, strong appeals are made to national sentiments, all for the purpose of replacing imported goods with goods produced inside the country itself.

But all these measures instead of reducing national unemployment, simply cut the great arteries between the countries. The barriers set up against the free interchange of population, of goods and of skilled experience inflict still more hardship on everybody.

And just as no nation can get rid by crippling its neighbor through war, so it is daily growing more and more clear, that no nation can get rich by ruining other countries economically or by surrounding itself by a "Chinese wall."

The world is an economic whole, and the more each country acts on the basis of selfishness and ill-will to other nations, the more will each suffer in the long run. Industries will stagnate, much human energy will be wasted, and the entire standard of living will be lowered for a long time ahead.

Imagine, for example, if in the United States there were customs barriers between individual states; imagine that whenever you crossed a borderline you found a different people, a different language, a different coinage, a different religion, etc., just imagine how life would be complicated.

But this is just the position in Europe today, and there are a growing number of thinking men, who feel that the only way to save Europe from destruction is the formation of a European trade league of nations, surrounding Europe with a common custom barrier, and enclosing a sufficiently vast territory to enable the nations inside the barrier fully to utilize their powers and resources in a united effort for cheaper production and elimination of waste.

But today hard times and national jealousies have placed each country inside a watertight compartment resulting in the manufacture of goods at high costs, which could be produced cheaper by other countries.

Excessive trade barriers mean stagnation and throttling of progress; it means that countries do not get the benefit of that stimulating and fertilizing influence which can be brought about in no other way than by a lively interchange of population of goods, of service and of experience.

I now wish to focus your minds on one of the greatest cancers affecting every trade; I refer to bribery. We all know the existence of a huge dark building over the portal of which is this inscription: "Bribery and unfair trading," and in that house are many compartments; let me name a few of them for you:

Bogus independent; espionage on competitors; bribery of competitors; employees; price cutting and dumping; fighting brands; misrepresenting competitor's goods; cornering markets; intimidation by threats of litigation; the use of trading stamps or coupons; excessive credits; enticement of employees; secret commissions; premiums to shop assistants; misleading prospectuses; misleading advertising; and propaganda; copying other firm's designs or trade names; suppression of patents by purchase of rights.

Bribery, corruption and unfair business dealings are daily going in to the discard, and in wider and wider circles do people realize, that in the exchange of goods, personal service or ideas upon which is based the economic life of a today, all persons or parties to the exchange must benefit.

In some countries legislation is much behind the times, or if the laws are exemplary, the juries may favor their own countrymen, or again,

litigation may be so expensive, that the game is not worth the candle, and when justice becomes expensive—it is no longer justice.

There is evidence of a growing conviction, that certain principles of justice and fair dealing are applicable in all countries the world over, and that national legislation should more clearly reflect commercial customs based on this principle.

May I here be allowed to call attention to the excellent work done by Rotary International Association for Great Britain and Ireland in taking the initiative in bringing about a joint conference between Rotary club representatives and the League of Nations Union, which took place in London in January of this year.

A resolution was adopted in favor of bringing before the forthcoming economic conference of the League of Nations a proposal for league action in regard to international standards of business practice.

The proposal is "That the league shall initiate machinery whereby the standards of business practice obtaining in the various nations of the world shall be studied and compared, so that everything possible may be done towards removing such practices as may be conducive to international misunderstanding and ill will."

There is no question about the fact, that economic conflicts are the principal causes of war. Improvement in business ethics will therefore tend to prevent that explosive accumulation of ill feeling and national jealousy, which, if allowed to go on long enough, unquestionably leads to war and destruction. It may here be worth mentioning, that the four small Northern nations, Denmark, Norway, Sweden and Finland have just concluded treaties under which all matters of dispute without exception are to be settled by arbitration, and it is hoped that settlement by war between these countries will be ruled out forever.

And just as in business life the development is steadily towards arbitration instead of litigation, so, many believe, that in international life arbitration will sooner or later replace settlement by war.

And if one nation has a better reputation for fair dealings than another nation, is it not because the morals and business standards, of that nation are on a higher general level?

If this is true, that to gain friends, a man must behave as a friend, it is especially true that if a Nation wishes to have friends it must behave as a friend to other nations, and it is no shame to be the first to extend the offer of friendship.

## Hamburger Stand Is Enjoined

On petition of Charles Garrett, judge Clark Mulliken of the 72nd district court yesterday issued a temporary injunction restraining W. R. Kelley, Leonard Curry and R. A. Hicks from operating a hamburger stand on property next to the Broadway hotel during 1926. Garrett, who operates a hamburger stand on these premises and has been operating one there for more than a year, on a sub-lease, alleges that he had an understanding with Kelley, lessor of the property, that no similar stand should be allowed there. But, he alleges, on June 8 Kelley allowed Curry and Hicks to open up a hamburger stand in competition with him 85 or 90 feet from him, on the same property. No date has been set for a hearing on whether or not the injunction shall be permanent.

## GOOD ROADS IMPROVE EDUCATION STANDARDS

 RICHMOND, Va., June 17.—Improvements in America's educational standards can be traced directly to good roads, according to H. G. Shirley, president of the American Road Builders Association.

"The children of today have an opportunity to attend good schools regardless of weather conditions, even in the most remote regions of the country," Shirley said. "This regular and increased attendance has made it possible for better teachers to be employed, larger and more modern schools constructed, and conditions of study generally improved."

The consolidated school system in many states has resulted from the good roads movement, according to Shirley. He said in Mississippi more than 72,000 children are taken to school daily over improved highways. North Carolina transports approximately 65,000 to school each day, and Indiana about 47,000.

Approximately 1,800,000 miles of wire is used by the telephone companies in Texas in supplying service.

## Briand Is Again Frenchman of Hour

PARIS, June 17.—Aristide Briand Although determined Tuesday, when he resigned, that he was finished with cabinet building, the man who has nine times been premier of France yielded to repeated requests from President Doumergue and Wednesday night accepted the task of forming his tenth ministry.

As he left the Elysee palace following his promise to the president, Briand said "The president did the honor to ask me to form a new cabinet. Under the present circumstances the task will not be an easy one, and it was because of these difficulties that I felt it my duty now to refuse. I shall try to form a cabinet composed of leaders from all political groups, and shall ask them to forget their quarrels and place themselves at the service of the nation. I shall ask them to do me in the necessary effort to solve

our financial crisis."

Briand began at once a series of conferences with political leaders who must be consulted in forming a cabinet which is to include every shade of political thought. He hopes to give President Doumergue a statement of his progress Thursday. Edouard Herriot, former premier, is pointed to as the first man to whom Briand will offer a post in the new cabinet. Politicians maintain that Herriot will listen to the advice of his radical friends and refuse. His friends hope Briand will fail and that then Herriot himself will receive an invitation to form the cabinet.

Raymond Poincare, war time president of France, is regarded as the sure choice of Briand for the important position of minister of finance. If Poincare does follow Peret in the position around which the present financial storm centers it will be his first return to power since the fall of 1924.
