SHOWS BRAVE MIST AS FAIR IS OPENED

COLD WAVE FAILS TO INJURE SOUTH PLAINS CROPS

VOICE KING DUE TO RETIRE, IS FORECAST NOW
RETURN TO NORMAL IS EXPECTED ALL OVER MIDDLE WEST

After holding its grip on the Plains since Sunday night, when a light rain was the first real touch of winter, the elements today apparently were lightening their touch, and steadily rising temperatures were forecast for late today and tonight, although the mercury was driven down during Monday night, here to the lowest of the season to date.

A total of .59 of an inch of rain has fallen here since Sunday night, according to the government station report at noon today, and while lower clouds still hung heavily overhead, occasional riffs served to refresh the soil. A precipitation of .15 of an inch fell Monday night between 8 p. m. and 2 a. m. Tuesday, with 1.13 having fallen during daylight hours Monday.

Water towers were much in vogue and lines were welcomed in reports of the Union bus terminal here today said the rain was heavy in all directions, bringing down the clouds, and extended east as far as Crosbyton, where a lighter shower was recorded.

Temperatures reported in this part of the state, and rising readings were expected to be held by agriculturalists that the crops will be damaged.

They brought a blood-stained, tattered flag, captured from 4 Florida brigade at the battle of Franklin, Tenn., on November 30, 1864, which, after more than a score of years on display at Toledo Ohio, as a Union trophy of victory is to be returned to the survivors of those who fought under it.

## FRENCH GIVE DOTY PARDON

### YANK SENTENCED TO PEN IS GRANTED RELEASE

PARIS, Sept. 27.—Deputy J. Doty, who enlisted in the French foreign legion under the names of Gilbert Clare and was court-martialed in Syria in August 1926, being sentenced to eight years in prison, has been pardoned by the French government.

Deputy J. Doty, whose home was in Memphis, Tenn., was the center of a vivid episode in the French foreign legion which took place last year during the French fighting with the Druzes in Syria. Doty, who is 26, is a veteran of the World War, having served with Battery E, 115th (1st) Artillery, 20th division.

Doty, while serving with the French foreign legion, left the French lines in southern Syria where a campaign was under way and was arrested with several companions on the charge of "abandoning his post before armed rebels." He was imprisoned in Damascus, and for a time feared a re-entertainment that he might be sentenced to death.

Herrick Intercedes  
On June 7, Ambassador Herrick at Paris was instructed by Secretary Kellogg to intercede with the French government in behalf of Doty, who was stated to have made an excellent record in France as a soldier in the American army. His trial took place at Damascus before a court martial on July 16 and he was sentenced to eight years imprisonment at hard labor.

An officer representing the government as prosecutor, had demanded the death penalty, while another officer for the defense asked for a suspended sentence describing the brave conduct of Doty prior to his defection and

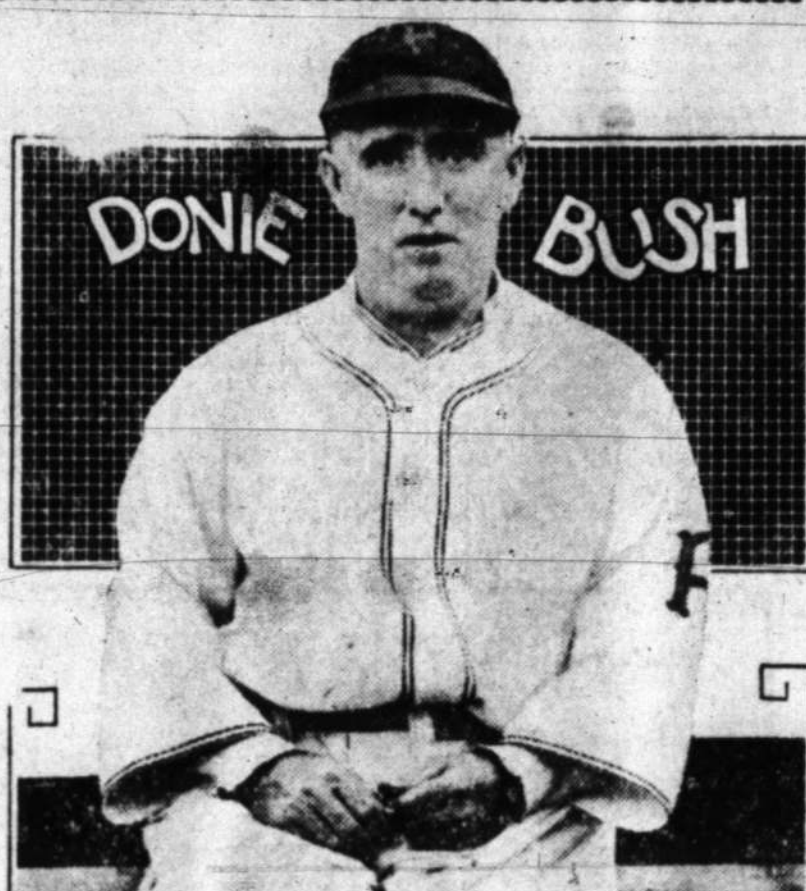
### GO 13 INNINGS BEAT REDS; SENS WIN TWIN BILL

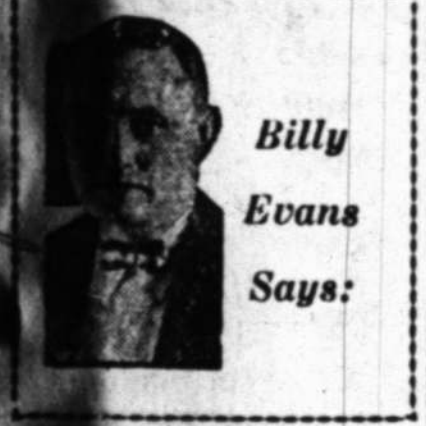

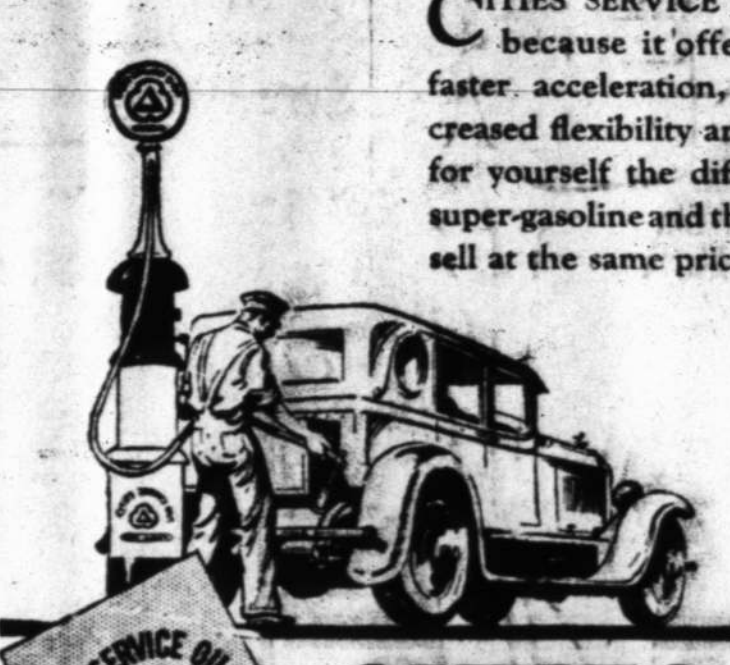

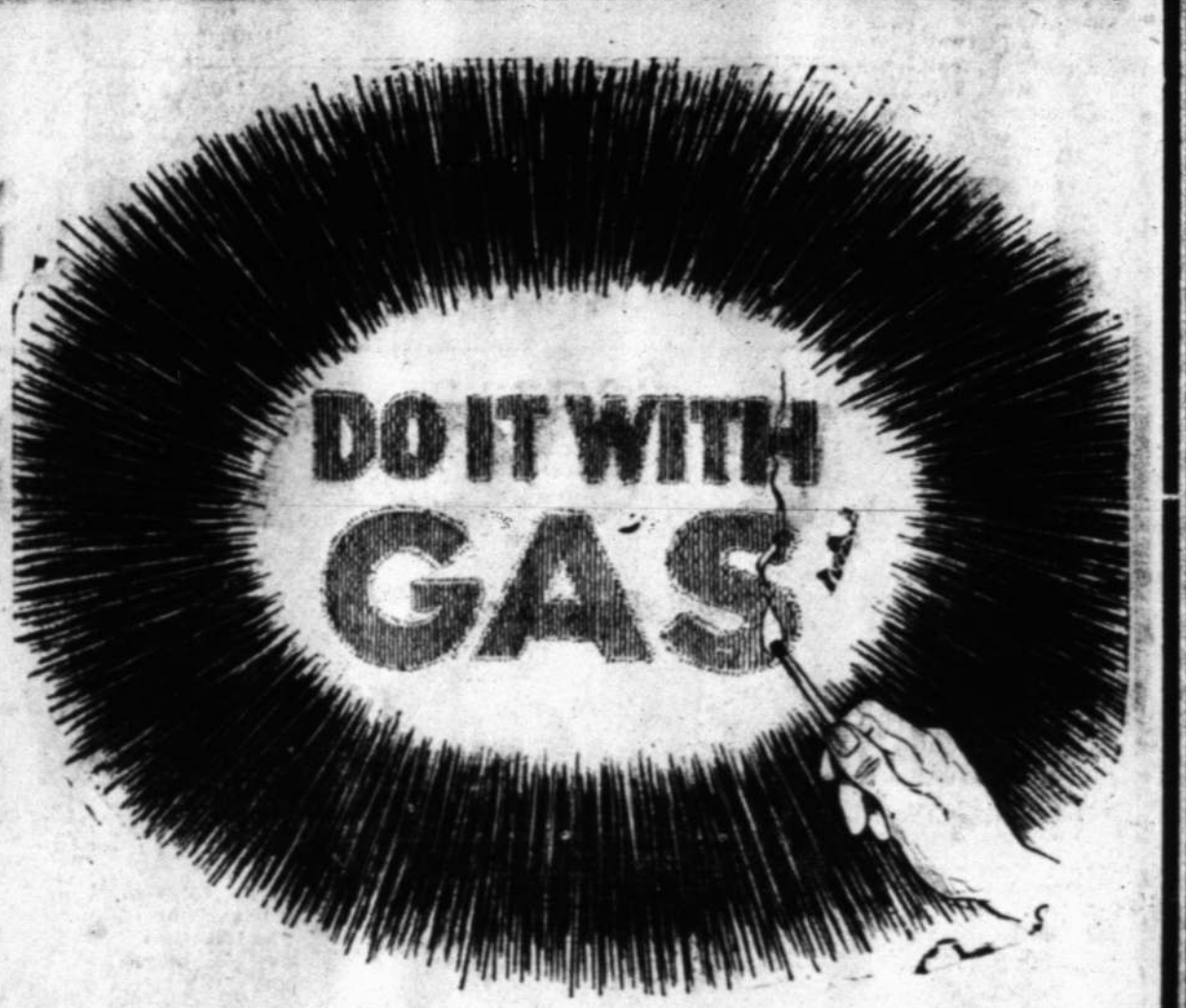

FIRST YEAR IS MOST VITAL TO STUDENT, HELD

NOTED EDUCATOR SAYS WORK AS FRESHMAN VERY CRITICAL

BY WALTER DILL SCOTT (President of Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill.)

For you, the Freshman student about to enter a college or university this, the first year, is the most-critical of your life. It marks a turning point. It is a measure of your progress and is the beginning of a new epoch.

Enter Adult Life

You have ceased to be a child and have entered into adult life. You will be less shielded and protected than in the past, and you will be affected by a richer and more complex environment. Your safety will not be provided by parental care, but must be sought in your own strengthened self-determination.

I want to call your attention to certain phases of your new environment that experience has shown is important in the career of students.

Many Work Way

Many students will find it necessary or desirable to earn a part of all of the money required to meet expenses. Avoid work that in its nature or its amount interferes with your health or interferes with your other duties. When additional money is required, borrow the amount, if necessary, rather than engage in too many hours of the student's year.

The second phase of your environment is athletic. We believe in the best possible development of the physical body. Excessive interest in athletics often leads to classroom neglect and finally exclusion from college for failure to attain the required standard of scholarship.

The third phase of your environment is the social. Begin to think and act in terms of the many rather than in the narrow and childish terms of individual selfishness. Join at once your class organizations, the local church of your faith, the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A., a dramatic, a literary, a musical, or social or such other organizations. My advice to every student is to join at least two different organizations. However, as in athletics, undue emphasis should not be placed on the social life to the detriment of the educational life.

Religion is the fourth phase of your environment. You may have been cooperating with the religious environment in your home community and by leaving your home and going to a university you need that relationship. I most heartily recommend that you hasten to establish the most helpful cooperation possible with those religious organizations in your new environment that in your judgment are most effective in promoting the Kingdom of God on earth.

Educational Environment The last, but not least important phase of your environment is the educational. If you have the strength to keep the educational aim from being eclipsed by the other phases of your environment your student days will fulfill all your expectations. You will continue to report present at the roll call of those who have the will power and the enlightened self-determination to profit by a university training.

MANY DROWNED IN ALP FLOOD

HEAVY RAINS RESULT IN DAMAGE THROUGH MOUNTAIN AREA

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Sept. 27—Scores of lives are believed to have been lost in Alpine floods which inundated the principality of Liechtenstein, the eastern section of Switzerland and the upper Trentino, Italy, after tremendous rains over the weekend.

Especially affected are those valleys whose waters join the Rhine above Lake Constance, while the upper Rhine itself is amazingly swollen and the lake is fifteen feet above normal.

The actual total fatalities are unknown and can not be reliably computed until the communications broken by the flood are restored.

Situation is Improving

Latest reports say the situation is improving somewhat, the downpours beginning to subside. A sudden drop in temperature in the mountain regions has checked the melting of snow which largely contributed to the floods.

Liechtenstein, which with an area of 68 square miles is one of the smallest principalities in the world, was almost overwhelmed by the inundation. The worst feature of the flood in that region was the

EFFICIENCY IN MAILS LAUDED

DIFFERENCE IN POST-OFFICES SHOW A DIFFERENCE

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 27—It takes 36 employees to handle mail in the Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, postoffice, while 26 handle sixty times as much in the Laredo, Texas, office across the river in shorter time, Carl W. Besserer, postal inspector reports to his superiors at the Austin federal postal division headquarters here after three weeks inspection at Laredo.

He said the Texas postoffice is in first class shape and shows an increase of 50 per cent in business.

A redeeming feature of the Mexican postal service, he said, is that it has several admirable systems of bookkeeping, requiring the continual services of a host of bookkeepers, one reason for the large force.

NEGROES LIKE SCHOOL WORK

GROWTH OF FACILITIES TO EDUCATE BLACKS IS STARTLING

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Sept. 27—Remarkable growth of negro educational facilities in Texas is brought to light in a complete published report for the first time by William Elders, rural supervisor of the state department of education, for the Farm and Ranch magazine.

During the last seven years 207 school buildings and shops for negro teachers, and eleven thousand homes have been built at a cost of \$1,142,236, of which \$221,242 contributed from funds provided by Julius Rosenwald, Chicago philanthropist, the article says.

"The Rosenwald foundation," Elders commented, "places a premium on local initiative, and has been the means of awakening interest in education progress of Texas negroes, among whites, as well as the negroes." The state department of education took advantage of provisions of the Rosenwald foundation in 1920 although it has been available since 1912. Eleven training schools erected with aid of the fund as "feeders" for the Prairie View normal college, negro state school, are located in the following counties: Cherokee, Fort Bend, Guadalupe, Houston, Lee, Navarro, Hunt, Henderson, Harrison, Milam and Limestone.

One of the best high school buildings erected with aid of the Rosenwald fund is located at Woodland in Limestone county. It is a eight room brick structure costing \$25,000.

### Madison Farmers Abandon Cotton For Dairy Cattle

(By Associated Press)  
MADISONVILLE, Tex., Sept. 27. — Mostly to the influence of W. H. Dupuy, Madison county farm agent, farmers hereabouts are abandoning cotton to diversify their farming with considerable of the basis, however, built on a triple livestock program, including dairy cattle, hogs and poultry.

The striking example of the change has been in a cream station which began with only a few milk cows, but has grown within a year to a point where many farmers are becoming converted to the belief that dairy is an inviting and profitable business.

The expansion of the program last year gave Mr. Dupuy an opening to preach diversification and so well has he succeeded that plans are being made to place a pure bred Jersey bull in each of the 18 communities of the county. One bull in each of four communities by October 1 is the first step in that direction.

Meanwhile the poultry business has grown by leaps and bounds in the county. Five years ago a processor dealer's office space was 12 by 12. Today it has been replaced

which was taxed to capacity almost from the start.

The livestock program is based on dairy cattle. As the milk supply increases the surplus of skimmed milk is fed to both pigs and poultry. Fifty sow pigs which have been put out in the county are expected to produce enough pigs to consume a large part of it. As dairying increases it is intended that the number of hogs shall also be increased. Within a year it is planned to ship pigs by the carload.

When it is considered that Madison county was once regarded as a cotton country, the change to other farm lines is regarded as of particular significance in the trend of Texas agriculture.

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# FORMER WOMEN SOVEREIGNS IN EUROPE POOR

FIVE QUEENS HOMELESS AND DEPENDENT ON PUBLIC CHARITY

(By Associated Press)  
VIENNA, Austria, Sept. 27.—Dispersed over Europe like the shattered jewels of their shattered crowns, five throneless queens are living on the slender charity of relatives and friends.

Once the proud mistresses of millions of acres of land, the rulers of tens of millions of people, and the possessors of untold millions of wealth, Dowager Empress Marie of Russia, Empress Zita of Austria, Queen Sophie of Greece, Queen Amelie of Portugal, and young Queen Elizabeth of Greece are today without a roof of a bed they can call their own. Their return to their own homes would be sufficient to start an immediate revolution.

Saddest and loneliest of all five fugitive queens is Empress Dowager Marie of Russia, mother of the murdered Czar Nicholas, who, broken in body and mind over the successive tragedies she has borne, beginning with the assassination of her father-in-law, Emperor Alexander II, and culminating in the brutal murder of her son and his entire family, is spending the remainder of her tragic life in Copenhagen. She was recently reported to be dying.

While the rest of the world has given up her son and family as irrefutably dead, the venerable empress insists they are still alive. At her window in Copenhagen she still burns a small lamp so that, as she says, "Nicky will know I'm still awaiting his return."

Another ex-queen whose share of sorrow has overflowed is former Queen Sophie of Greece, who in her time has witnessed the assassination of her father-in-law, King George I of Greece; the death by a monkey bite of her eldest son, former King Alexander of Greece; the overthrow, humiliation and exile of her brother, Kaiser Wilhelm

On other occasions she slips down to Biarritz to break bread with her throneless son, George, and his consort, ex-Queen Elizabeth. Most of these trips are financed by relatives or by American dollars acquired by Sophie's brother-in-law, Prince Christopher, upon the death of his wife, Mrs. William Leeds of Cleveland, Ohio.

## LEAGUE ENDS ITS MEETING

GUANI SOUNDS HIGHLY OPTIMISTIC NOTE AT CONCLUSION

(By Associated Press)  
GENEVA, Sept. 27.—The eighth assembly of the League of Nations, which has been considering disarmament and security problems for the past few weeks, came to a close shortly after noon today on an optimistic note sounded by its retiring president, Alberto Guani, Uruguayan ambassador to France. The work done by the assembly, President Guani told the delegates

adherents in Hungary, Empress Zita of Austria is living in exile with her eight children in the village of Lequeto, Spain, in a house donated by the king of Spain, who is related to the Hapsburgs. Undaunted by reports that there is little chance of Hungary returning to a monarchy, Zita, personally is tutoring and training her oldest son Otto for the duties and responsibilities of a king.

Zita, too, has tasted tragedy. After two dramatic and unsuccessful attempts to regain the Hungarian throne, her husband, Emperor Karl, was deported to Madira, where he died of physical exhaustion and a broken heart. Widowed and penniless, Zita lived a beggarly existence until the king of Spain came to her rescue.

Another crownless, countryless queen living the life of a refugee is Queen Amelie of Portugal, who witnessed the assassination of her husband, King Carlos in 1908, and who two years later was forced to flee for her own life with her son, King Manuel, on the eventful day Portugal was proclaimed a republic. Queen Amelie is now living quietly at Versailles, supported largely by family relatives and friends.

Youngest and least experienced of all former occupants of queenly thrones is the once Queen Elizabeth of Greece, daughter of Queen Marie of Rumania, who, with her consort, George, forfeited the crown of Greece when that troubled country became a republic three years ago.
