CISCO TO SEEK ACTION ON HIGHWAY

Italy Confident of Great Triumph

ARMY MAY BE CUT; SELASSIE NOT TO QUIT

ROME, Feb. 22 — (U.P.) — Confidence of a decisive triumph over Ethiopia prevailed in Rome tonight and reliable sources said the size of Italy's army would be reduced to lessen the heavy drain on the treasury.

Many rumors circulated in the capital. One, that Emperor Haile Selassie was ready to sue for peace, was thoroughly discredited by responsible officials who pointed out it would be equivalent to signing his death warrant by the hand of one of his tribesmen.

A report from Brussels that Haile Selassie was willing to abdicate for 12 years in favor of a League of Nations mandate was made in a newspaper interview with Col. Ruel, Belgian military advisor to the emperor, just returned from Ethiopia.

Col. Ruel said the emperor is willing to let the league run his country as a protectorate against Italian aggression for a definite period but was not considering direct negotiations with Italy.

"Negotiations with Italy would be impossible because my chiefs would kill me," Col. Ruel quoted the emperor as saying.

Another report was that Ras Kassa, one of the main Ethiopian commanders on the northern front, had started negotiations with the Italians for his surrender.

The report the Italian army at home would be reduced by 500,000 men who would be returned to farms and industry generally was accepted as true by the best informed quarters despite an official denial. Foreign military observers pointed out the rainy season would make military operations in Ethiopia impossible anyway.

From the East Ward workmen will go to the grammar school and thence to the high school for other repairs, Cluck said yesterday.

Woods will base his campaign upon fulfillment of his original platform promises, he said, which will include the following:
Promise not to reduce per capita apportionment, equalize educational opportunities in Texas, close gap between urban and rural schools, emphasize vocational training, provide more supervision and less inspection, administer school affairs with economy and efficiency, provide more school for the money, and provide a more practical course of study.

Woods is now serving his second term in the state office.

Freedom of Mind Is Education Need FDR Tells Temple

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 22 — (U.P.) — President Roosevelt spoke feelingly today upon necessity of "freedom of the mind" in education.

"The education depends upon freedom in the pursuit of truth," he told 3,000 persons celebrating founders day at Temple university, which awarded him an honorary's doctor's degree.

"No group and no government can properly prescribe precisely what should constitute the body of knowledge with which true education is concerned. The truth is found when men are free to pursue it. It is this belief in the freedom of the mind, written into our fundamental law and observed in our everyday dealings with the problems of life that distinguishes us as a nation," he said.

CHECK STORY WITNESS TOLD ABOUT BRUNO

TRENTON, Feb. 22 — (U.P.) — Governor Harold Hoffman, still convinced the Lindbergh kidnapping case is unsolved, today questioned Millard White, the Sourland Mountain logger, whose testimony helped convict Bruno Richard Hauptmann of the murder of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr.

White appeared "voluntarily" at the executive office in the state capital, although he was accompanied by the detective who located him in Lambertville. No charge was placed against him and under New Jersey law he was under no compulsion to answer questions.

Governor Hoffman ordered Prosecutor Anthony Hawk, Jr. of Hunterdon county to "invite" White to submit to examination. The executive is known to be dissatisfied with White's story that he saw Hauptmann sinking through the woods near the Lindbergh estate shortly before the abduction of the Lindbergh baby on the night of March 1, 1932.

Shortly after White was taken into Hoffman's office, C. Lloyd Fischer, chief of counsel for Hauptmann, appeared.

Fisher Charges Pension 'Politics'

DALLAS, Feb. 22 — (U.P.) — F. W. Fischer, Tyler attorney, who is seeking the democratic nomination for governor, held Governor James Allred responsible today for the way the old age pension bill was written and accused Allred of playing politics with it.

"This statute provides that only those men and women over 65 years of age who are most needy shall be paid pensions. Allred said that no one would receive pensions until after July 1, 1936 and by this wise and salutary provision he would be re-elected before any of them found out they would not get anything," Fischer said in a campaign speech here.

GROUP DUE TO ASK CONTRACT BE LET SOON

Seeking early action on the Eighth street rerouting of Highway One through the city, a Cisco delegation will make an effort to contact the state highway commission at its regular meeting in Austin Tuesday, it was learned Saturday.

The Ciscoans will ask that the highway commission let the contracts for the new route through the city as soon as possible in order that the project may be finished in the allotted time, at the same time pointing out the importance of the relocation in view of the approaching Texas Centennial.

Those who will go to Austin in the Cisco delegation are Mayor J. T. Berry, City Attorney R. E. Grantham, Secretary J. E. Spencer of the Chamber of Commerce, E. P. Crawford, and perhaps some of the city commissioners.

To Leave Monday
The delegation will leave Cisco Monday afternoon. Those going plan to seek a hearing at the meeting Tuesday and to return to Cisco Tuesday night.

The meeting of the highway commission Tuesday is for the purpose of letting contracts. It has been announced and is not a regular scheduled session for hearing delegations from various parts of the state, but officials here Saturday felt confident that they would be able to contact the members of the commission when they arrive Tuesday.

A number of state highway contracts have been let in the last few weeks, but the Cisco rerouting of Highway One has not been among them. It was understood that plans were complete for the project, which will include paving of Eighth street, construction of a concrete overpass at the Katy crossing, and connection of the paving in the city with highway on each side of Cisco.

Project Approved
Members of the state highway commission agreed some time ago to go ahead with the project after it had been dropped temporarily.

To be carried on through the use of federal funds, the project was originally scheduled to be completed by July. Delays and the necessary changing of plans to fit the situations encountered have caused a late start on the new route.

In a telephone conversation with the Austin highway department, Ciscoans were informed that, since the meeting Tuesday is not on a regular hearing date no definite appointment could be made for them, but that if they came to Austin they probably would be allowed a hearing as though such an appointment had been made.

STORY CAPONE WOUNDED SAID PURE 'FICTION'

ALCATRAZ ISLAND, Feb. 22 — (U.P.) — Warden James Johnston of Alcatraz federal penitentiary today angrily branded as "100 per cent fiction" reports that Al Capone had been wounded this week in an assassination attempt by fellow convicts.

"There isn't a word of truth in all these rumors that have been circulated," the warden said.

He flatly denied the latest rumors that convicts, angered at Capone's refusal to join Alcatraz's recent mutiny, had hurled a window weight at him in the prison laundry and the former gangster had been saved from possible death only because a friendly convict pushed him out of the way.

Illness Here Is Lessening, Health Officer Reports

A mild wave of influenza, mumps, pneumonia, and common colds which swept over Cisco during the week appeared to be subsiding somewhat Saturday, Dr. W. P. Lee, city health officer, told the Daily News yesterday.

Although the illness never really reached the epidemic stage, approximately 15 per cent of the pupils in the schools here were reported absent during the middle of the week, according to Superintendent R. N. Cluck, but the number of absences had lessened somewhat by Friday.

Cisco's Health Record

Cisco has been fortunate in escaping serious epidemics this winter while other cities, some of them nearby, have had to close schools and take other measures to avoid a more general spread of communicable diseases. But it has not been entirely luck that has prevented epidemics here.

First of all, Cisco is favored with a climate more healthful than that of many places where suffering has been acute. The winter has been more harsh than usual but has been far less severe than that of many points in the north and east. At the same time, the city is located at an altitude that gives it a healthful advantage, although this would not necessarily make a great deal of difference in the winter.

Second, Cisco is a clean city. It is a city where one need have no fear of bringing his family, in Centennial year or any other year, for a vacation or a permanent home. The streets are clean. There are adequate sewage facilities. The great water supply in Lake Cisco is not contaminated and is as pure and fresh as any in the state of Texas.

Third, Cisco has taken precautions to avoid an epidemic. True there have been cases of pneumonia, of influenza, of mumps and other diseases but when they were found in the schools the pupils were immediately sent home to avoid contact with other pupils and spread the disease.

Common colds have hampered the work in the public schools somewhat, but cases of severe colds have been given the same care as other diseases and a severe cold epidemic has been avoided.

As the Centennial approaches, what better recommendation can Cisco offer for itself than its health record during a year when the entire nation has been plagued by disease?

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON—Into the hurly-burly, the constant strain, and the partisan bitterness of the capital, there sometimes comes a touch of comic relief which greatly relieves the tension of life here. Much of the comedy is unconscious. Frequently it is Congressman Maury Maverick of Texas who introduces such wit and humor as is obtained by design. Maverick has an idea that laughter and ridicule are important weapons.

SCOTT of California had introduced an amendment to forbid teaching or advocating the legislative program of the American Liberty League in Indian schools.

"I rise as the champion of the freedom of speech in defense of the American Liberty League," said Maverick. "Does the gentleman mean to tell me he intends to deny the pure doctrines of James M. Beck and his pal, Newton Baker, who received \$50,000 to decide the TVA before it came into court, and the doctrines of other impeccable and self-righteous citizens for the du Ponts and the holding companies, from being taught to our Indian children?"

"Does the gentleman mean he would prevent the teaching to the Indian children of the doctrine of Mr. 'Sixty Grand' Shouse, who gets salary and allowable expense of \$60,000 a year? Indians know a lot about horses—they probably know about Twenty Grand—but they should know the du Pont horse known as Sixty Grand."

"No, Mr. Scott, I would let even the Liberty League talk. Would you deny these gentlemen who claim to be sole guardians of the Constitution the right also to be guardians of our Indian children?"

PROBABLY destined to become famous as a departure from the

routine, dual committee reports as Maverick's one-man minority report against the bill permitting certain American officials to accept medals bestowed on them by some Latin American governments.

"Had I earned a foreign medal in the late war against the German Imperial Government," said he in the printed report, "when we entered the war to end wars—there now being no wars and with democracy thriving everywhere throughout the world—I suppose I should have worn it. But this bill ought to be defeated."

"Congress can legislate and debate on medals and titles of nobility. This should give us pride. It appears we cannot legislate on the welfare of those who live from the soil—and all humanity does—for that is a mere local matter—hence, the welfare of 125,000,000 people is not within our scope."

"Nor can we provide naturally even for minimum decent labor standards to protect states as against each other, or for millions of workers on whose lives and purchasing power the welfare of the nation, and business, depends."

"But we can dress our officers in foreign medals from foreign governments; and that proud power we must jealously guard, and if we permit all our powers to be usurped, as appears likely, we can devote much of our time to decorations. Thus we can pass our time."

AFTER that much sarcasm, Maverick proposed a foreign decoration for every farmer, every unemployed person, every starving person, that they may "die in glory." And, "For Every Unfortunate Citizen—a Medal," since "it's probably unconstitutional to give them anything to eat, whereas Congress clearly has the home-doling power."

Big signs have been placed on the streets near schools in Cisco but still much recklessness is seen as drivers continue to flaunt them. Such drivers, as well as all others, will do well to think over the warnings contained in the slides the club is sponsoring.

Cost of Living High in Ranger Boom As Strawberries \$1.10 Quart, Writer Recalls

Author of Were You in Ranger?

Although the prices of commodities in Ranger during the great boom never soared to the heights reached in the Klondike and in California in the days of '49, the cost of living was high in the oil field city, particularly during 1929, the second big year of the rush.

Strawberries were \$1.10 a quart. However this quotation was on March 29 and perhaps it was a little early for strawberries.

Gasoline was 32 cents a gallon—and that was before the time when the government began charging five cents per gallon in taxes.

An advertisement in the Ranger Times read: "For sale, one team of mules, wagon and harness cheap—\$800."

At one time, every grocery store in town was out of sugar.

A franchise was let for a street railway in Ranger and there was much talk of interurban lines to Eastland, to Mineral Wells and on to Fort Worth. (None of these projects ever materialized.)

A construction company capitalized at \$4,000 borrowed \$35,000 from a bank.

Incidentally, Eastland had probably the youngest bank president in the state—he was only 25.

One of the weirdest dreams of the weird period was that of a promoter who planned a skyscraper in Ranger. The building was to have an observation tower and he expected to charge passengers 25 cents to ride to the top and view the surrounding country. He estimated a revenue from this source alone of \$25,000 annually!

No less than 22 passenger trains a day arrived in Ranger. Ten were operated by the Texas & Pacific and brought in a total of 1,000 passengers, on an average. Eight trains picked over the Hamon-Kell between Breckinridge and Ranger, and four ran south over that line from Ranger to Dublin.

Danger of disease constituted one of the chief problems at Ranger.

An influenza epidemic swept through the city and 2,500 cases were reported.

The Times recorded that there were 2,000 inoculations against typhoid and 10,000 vaccinations against smallpox.

A campaign was conducted among the schools to rid the city of rats and mice. The second grade of Cooper school killed more than 2,000

rodents in two weeks and won first prize.

Ranger merchants lost three-quarters of a million dollars a year on tad checks.

Where the Western Union had received less than \$300 in business a month, the boom raised the payroll alone to \$4,000 each month.

The Chamber of Commerce, in an advertisement in October, 1919, claimed a population of 35,000 for Ranger (the town had 800 inhabitants) or so prior to the discovery of oil; and stated that Ranger had eight refineries, 10 trunk pipe lines, six casinghead plants and 100 companies operating in the field.

Building permits for the preceding July had been \$477,750.

In 1920, the Chamber of Commerce had a membership of 2,000 and had pledged of \$60,000 annually for the next three years.

Former County Judge Ed. S. Fritchard illustrates, with the following incident, the calm and unflinching fashion in which the opportunity to make sums that now would be considered fortunes was viewed during the boom.

Fritchard then was county treasurer and had not been admitted to the practice of law. A farmer, with a claim against an oil company, called on his friend Fritchard at the courthouse for advice. The official told him that a certain lawyer was very capable and the farmer remarked he would like to have the attorney's service. Fritchard called the barrister over the telephone and explained that a large amount was involved.

Although it was only a block's walk the lawyer was so long in arriving that the farmer actually had started out of Fritchard's office. The attorney decided to take the case on a contingent fee basis but, not wishing to be bothered with the matter himself, he formed a partnership just to have someone to turn the case over to; and his associate fought it through to a successful finish. The two lawyers divided a fee of \$40,000.

UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, Feb. 22.—(U.P.)—No contemporary likeness can be found for the six Texas heroes chosen for portrait sculpture in the Texas state building at the Dallas Centennial Exposition.

A photograph of General Sam Houston will be used as a guide for Pompey Coppini in modeling the figure of the hero of San Jacinto.

Authentic likeness of Austin, Lamar and Rusk have been obtained but none of Fannin or Travis. While there has been no difficulty in insuring fidelity to Houston's facial appearance, there is likely to be a storm over his attire.

The artist has submitted a design in which the rugged warrior appears in tails. The statesman appears in tails. The cost is not as long as that featured by dancer Fred Astaire when he's tying his white tie, putting on his tails, etc., but plainly it is an evening coat.

Members of the state board of control say the artist insists that formal attire is necessary to provide the requisite dignity.

Board members inspected this week the paintings of Houston that appear in the state capitol, before making a decision. The house of representatives portrait shows Houston wearing an Indian blanket but in the portrait Houston is shown as seated, thus making it impossible for the eight-foot standing figure proposed as a sculpture. The senate portrait is symbolic. Its "dignity" is conferred by a Roman toga wrapped about Houston as he stands bare-foot among the crumbling ruins of the Forum.

A third painting of Houston in the capitol pictures him reclining, wounded, after the Battle of San Jacinto as the captured General Santa Anna is brought before him. A monument at Houston showing General Houston on horseback already has been a subject of dispute. So the Centennial Houston likely will be a hero in long tailed coat.

"Hall, Emperor. We who are about to die salute you," was the customary address of Roman Gladiators to Caesar. It was echoed in the death row at Huntsville state prison when four condemned men sent a letter to Warden O. J. S. Ellington thanking him for a radio.

There was something more sincere in the simple message from the Texas prisoners than in the grandiloquent phrase of the coliseum. "You have done considerable," the convicts wrote, "toward brightening our last days."

In the search for funds to pay old age pension demands, Texas legislators may take a hint from Wisconsin and ferret out unclaimed accounts in banks and other depositories. Wisconsin is reported to have gleaned \$700,000 in this way efforts to escheat similar funds in Texas have been made heretofore. George Puril, Dallas, tried to have such an act passed while he was a member of the house and later as senator. His bill proposed turning over to the state all deposits which remained without a demand for a specific number of years.

The "bit" that most state taxes give to the public schools funds also may receive some attention from legislators when they feel the pressure for pension funds grow strong. Under the state constitution a fourth of all occupation taxes goes for school purposes. Many of the taxes now levied as occupation taxes might be changed to excise taxes and thus escape the constitutional apportionment. School men apparently have seen the danger. Already they are holding meetings for the purpose of planning a defense of school finances.

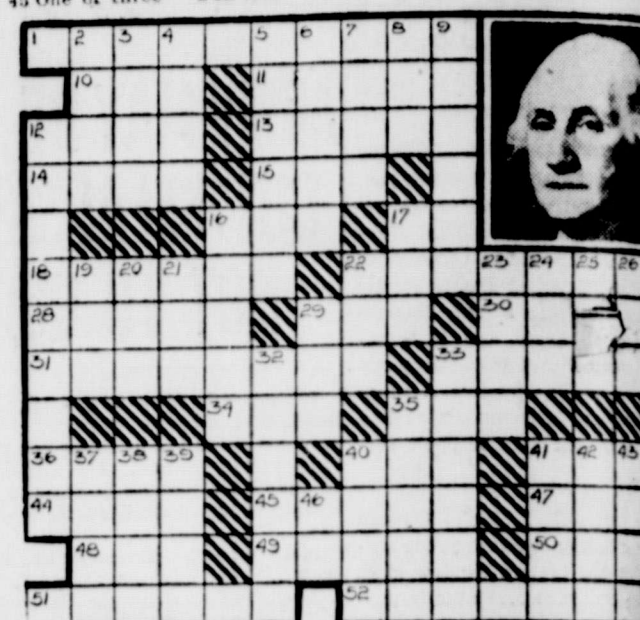

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Man Makes His Own Portable Call

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More Hogs and Fewer Horses, Mules, Cattle and Sheep Shown for Texas

Feb. 22—Decreases in numbers of horses, mules, cattle and sheep, and an increase in the number of hogs on farms in Texas, compared with the estimates for January 1, 1935, are shown by the annual inventory estimates of livestock on farms made by the crop reporting division of the department of agriculture.

The number of horses in Texas, compared with the estimates for January 1, 1935, was 11,637,000 head, a decrease of 224,000 head or about 2 percent. The number of horses on two years old decreased 4 percent there was a further substantial increase in colts under one year old. The value per head of all horses and colts on January 1, 1936, was \$96.79 compared with \$77.05 on January 1, 1935. This was the highest January 1 value since 1921. The total value of horses this year was \$1,126,400,000 compared with \$913,870,000 a year ago.

Mules
The number of mules on January 1, 1936, was 4,685,000 head compared with 4,822,000 a year earlier; a decrease of about 3 percent. The number of mule colts under 1 year old increased but was more than offset by the decrease in mules over two years old. The value per head on January 1, 1936, was \$120.42 compared with \$99.34 a year earlier and the total value was \$564,186,000 compared with \$478,998,000.

Cattle
The estimated number of all cattle and calves on farms January 1, 1936, was 68,213,000 head, compared with the revised number of 68,529,000 head on January 1, 1935; 74,262,000 head on January 1, 1934; and 61,903,000 head on January 1, 1930. Compared with a year ago there was a decrease of only one half of 1 percent, but a decrease of 8 percent from the peak number of January 1, 1934. The value per head on January 1, 1936, was \$34.09 compared with \$20.22 a year earlier. This was the highest value per head since 1931. The total value was \$2,325,586,000 compared with \$1,385,948,000 a year ago.

Sheep
The estimated total number of sheep, including lambs on January 1, 1936, was 31,673,000 head, of which 46,380,000 head were stock sheep and the balance were sheep and lambs on feed. Compared with a year ago, the number of stock sheep decreased 300,000 head. In the past, published estimates by states have carried total sheep, but this year's report by states shows only stock sheep and this form will be followed in future reports. The number of stock sheep in the native sheep states January 1, 1936, increased about 2 percent over a year earlier, but in the Western Sheep States, there was a decrease of nearly 2 percent. In the Western Sheep States most of the decrease during 1935 was in the number of ewe lambs being kept for breeding ewes with but little change in the number of ewes 1 year old and over. The average value per head of stock sheep on January 1, 1936, was \$6.34 compared with \$4.33 a year earlier and the total value of \$294,249,000 was 46 percent higher than a year ago and the highest since 1930.

DIVINING RODS TERMED HOOEY BY GEOLOGIST

By ROY J. FORREST
United Press Staff Correspondent
HOUSTON, Feb. 22 — (U.P.) Dr. L. W. Blau, geologist for a major oil company claims to be one of the nation's leading authorities on the "divining rod" or "wiggly stick" method of petroleum prospecting.

Dr. Blau doesn't believe, however, that such methods for the discovery of oil pools are feasible or even possible, but he claims to be an expert through experience on the subject.

A "divining rod" is a metal rod, tree branch or some other object which a person carries about over the ground until it is directly above a mineral deposit. It is claimed that such rods will be drawn magnetically or will be "disturbed" by the deposit.

The approved methods of all accredited geologists in prospecting for oil are those advanced by Dr. Blau, but as chief of a large staff of geologists, he has inspected more than 1,000 "wiggly sticks" and other mineral-looking devices.

He calls such efforts and related efforts for discovering oil "black magic."

"The rapid growth of the oil industry, and the high profits derived by the more fortunate land and royalty owners from oil so often found on previously worthless land,"

Dr. Blau said, "have so preyed on the imaginations of some would-be inventors and miracle men that hardly a month passes without news of the invention of a purportedly reliable oil finder."

"One common characteristic of all inventors or claimants," the geologist said, "is that they have never studied an exact science."

"Another is that each has worked 'many years' on his invention, depending on the age of the inventor."

"Still another is that the invention has been at a previous time submitted to some great scientist who was unable to understand it."

One of the most fantastic of the hundreds of inventions Dr. Blau has examined was one which it was claimed, would not only locate oil fields, but would register gravity of the oil, thickness of the sand and size of the field.

Tested Rod
"We took the device to an oil tank farm," Dr. Blau explained, "It rotated just as rapidly near a tank with 50 feet depth of East Texas oil as it did near a tank with 10 feet of Conroe crude, which are different grades."

The inventor explained to Dr. Blau that the Conroe crude was "so much higher in gravity that it made up for lack of volume."

Some of the inventions are so "miraculous," Dr. Blau said, that the inventors claim to be able to locate oil fields while in an office by just working their machines on a map.

Despite Dr. Blau's skepticism regarding such ridiculous claims, he checks each invention brought to him in the hope that some inventor—crackpot or genius—might stumble upon a feasible formula as a short-cut to new and undreamed of oil pools.

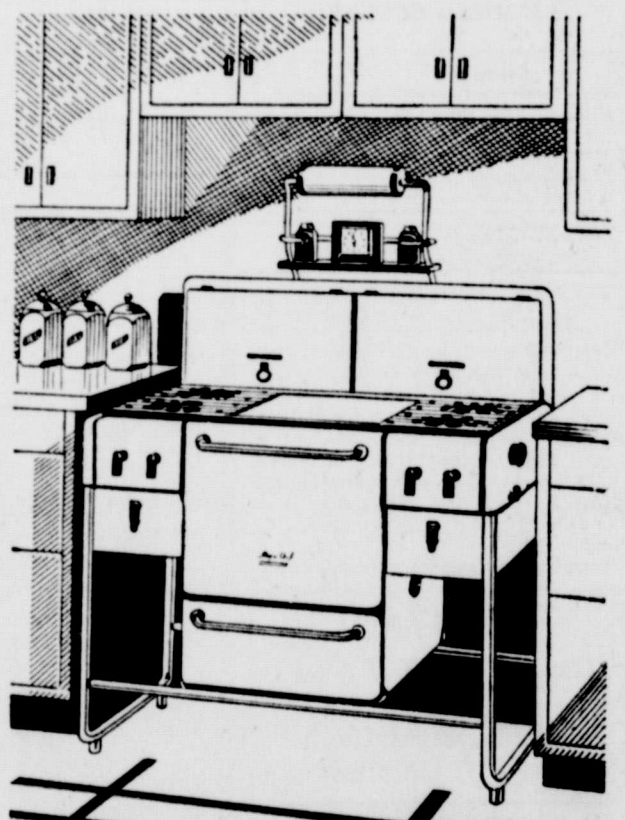

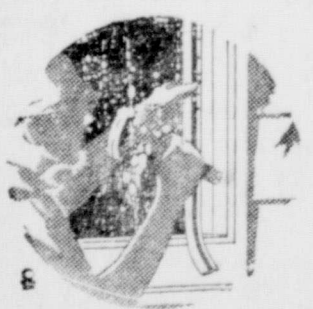

Hotel on Wheels Aids Winter Sport

ZAKOPANE, Poland, February 22.—(U.P.)—An innovation in winter sports on the Continent this year is the "Touring Ski-Train," a hotel-on-wheels which makes a circle of the Polish winter sports resorts in the Carpathian Mountains.

The special train, composed of comfortable sleeping cars, a bath car, a dining car, a restaurant car and similar facilities, was organized by the Polish Society for Encouraging Skiing. It travels about the skiing region of south Poland, making one day stops at all the important centers and continuing during the night.

Most famous of the Polish winter sports resorts, Zakopane, nestled at the foot of the Tatras, is considered the leading resort in southern Europe—second only to St. Moritz in all Europe. Electric elevators have been installed on a special bobsled and toboggan run two and a half miles long. Throughout the Carpathians, there are skiing grounds covering an area of 13,000 square miles. One of the longest tracks is the color-marked Carpathian Track, which runs uninterrupted along the chain of the Carpathians.

The International Ski Competitions, in which most of the celebrated skiers of Europe take part, climaxes the winter sport year early in March.

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Weekly Sunday School Lesson: People Before Property

Text: Luke 8:26-37
The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Feb. 23
BY WM. E. GILROY, D. D., Editor of Advance

THE story of the Gerasenes in the King James Version called Gadarenes and the swine, which this lesson is based, has puzzled many people. To some of freely critical mind, it has seemed so different from anything else in the New Testament that they have wondered whether it had an authentic place in the record at all, yet it has some very clear and definite teachings, the application of which is decidedly marked in relation to life today. The story itself is simple. As Jesus went through this country of the Gerasenes, adjoining Galilee, He met a man possessed of demons, or who was as we would say insane. The man's insanity took the form of sending him forth from his fellows to live in the tombs, unkempt and unclothed. When the poor fellow saw Jesus, there was fulfilled the saying, "He," for in his madness and tremble he cried, "Master. When Jesus asked him his name, he replied that it was Legion, for many demons had entered into him.

why the gentle Jesus in healing the man should have destroyed the hogs or sent them to such an end. The obvious reply would be that the hogs were intended to be slaughtered anyway, and that no question of mercy or humanity is involved in the form of their destruction.

THE story manifestly is strange and puzzling, but the teachings that come from it are very clear and practical. These Gerasenes, by their law and religion, were forbidden the use of pork. So far as their religion was concerned, they were engaged in an illicit and prohibited business for the sake of gain. They would not eat the hogs themselves, but they would sell them to other people. Waving aside any question of the propriety of eating pork, a question that the non-Jewish world has solved in its own way, the teaching is obvious. There always have been in the world, and there are today the sort of people who are far more concerned about their self-interest and profit than they are about the welfare of their fellow men. Here were these Gerasenes utterly unmindful of the fact that the poor man had been healed and put in his right mind, but deeply concerned about the loss of their profit in pork.

THE story has a strange aspect, as the demons are represented as asking that if they were cast out of the man, they should not be hurled into the abyss, but should be allowed to enter a herd of swine feeding on the mountains. The record is that when the demons had gone into the swine the latter rushed down a steep place into the lake and were drowned. Interpreted upon any literal basis, inquiry might well be made

HOW many modern parallels "one could cite." Such an attitude too always has its larger consequences.

The Gerasenes asked Jesus to depart out of their coast. When a man has given his life over to selfishness and meanness there is no place there for Jesus. He immediately becomes an unwelcome guest.

How large are the areas in our modern world that we do not wish Jesus to enter!

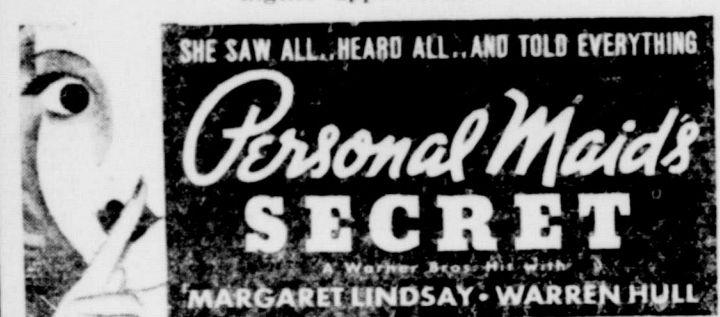

"Walters and Bowman are ready to go. Joe's arm trouble is cured and Bucy's wildness is under control. Frank Frisch thinks Jorgens is one of the best youngsters in the league. I know he is. So with the three fellows like that to choose from, you get an idea what I really think of Kelleher."

As to the old stand-by Syl Johnson, Wilson said:

"I never think of him as a regular. To me he's the first string relief man. And a corker, too. "While we're at it we might as well mention Johnny Pezullo. Appendix trouble worried him all year, but he never let me down. He will be back again and get a thorough trial. I think he will make good."

Wilson asserted that all his pitchers possess courage under fire and that given a bit of assistance offensively they would give no cause for worry.

In fact," said the catcher, "we won't have to worry anyway. If Kelleher lives up to expectations."

Praised by Umpire
In the opinion of Johnny Quinn, American League umpire the youngster will not only come through, but will surpass Curt Davis. "He's great," said Quinn. "In a month or two Kelleher won't be the No. 2 pitcher on that staff. He'll be No. 1."
