Storm wreaks havoc on county

A severe thunderstorm blew through the eastern half of Mitchell County last Thursday wreaking havoc on houses, electrical infrastructure, telephone poles, and more. Citizens in Colorado City were without water for about two and a half days and some outside of town went without electricity longer than that.

City water outages were caused by a lack of electricity at the city's well fields in the eastern part of the county. The wells were not damaged, but no water could be pumped to the surface without electricity to run the pumps.

Widespread wind damage and flash flooding occurred from the storm as it moved southeast through the eastern part of Scurry and Mitchell Counties. Onco confirmed there were just over 200 assorted wooden transmission poles and 86 steel lattice transmission towers damaged and over 22 miles of trans-

mission line downed during the storm.

High winds caused a properly anchored mobile home to be overturned at the China Grove tank facility, with a man trapped inside. He had to be extracted from the mangled ruins and was flown out with serious injuries. A representative of the Snyder Fire Department said downed power lines and flash flooding made it difficult to get the man out.

The National Weather Service (NWS) measured a 76-mph gust in Scurry County at 11:45 pm. The strong wind blew over an 18-wheeler on North Hwy. 208 between Snyder and Colorado City. A weather station three miles east of Snyder measured 2.24" of rain falling in just 25 minutes, causing flash flooding that killed at least 17-head of cattle.

The storm advanced south

MCNRC evacuated due to fire

A fire at Mitchell County Nursing and Rehabilitation Center (MCNRC) caused the complete evacuation of the facility Monday. The call came in about 10:30 a.m., and Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department personnel responded, along with many first responders from various agencies. No one was injured in the emergency.

At the time of the fire, there were over 50 residents living at MCNRC. The staff managed a quick evacuation of all. Transport vans from the facility were loaded, as were a handicap bus and regular school bus from Colorado ISD, to take residents to Mitchell County Hospital for temporary housing and to be checked out by medical professionals.

While the final report has not been released, a news release provided by Jessica Whitesides, MCNRC Administrator, said preliminary findings suggest the fire started in an exhaust fan in

a resident room. CCVFD Chief Tom Carlock said it took about 45 minutes to get to the fire to extinguish it. Firefighters had to locate where it was coming from and peel back part of the roof to put the fire out.

In only a few minutes, all residents had been taken outside the facility and were sitting under a shade tree. Volunteers and staff were handing out bottled water and making sure all residents were not injured and everyone was safe.

Mitchell County Hospital District CEO Robbie Dewberry said the residents were being transported to the hospital for temporary housing and to be checked out by medical professionals.

Fortunately, the fire was small and was contained to one area of the nursing facility.

"It was a great community response," Leann Moore Kuhel said. Her mom is a resident of

City to hire code enforcement

The city council voted to amend the budget to hire a code enforcement office sometime in the near future. City Manager David Hoover will be looking for someone to provide the unique and sometimes difficult service.

During Tuesday's regular meeting, the council voted to amend the budget \$48,730 to be spent on the salary and benefits of a code enforcement officer. Hoover said the city definitely needs one,

and he thinks it will increase revenues in the future.

Larry Chaney said he thinks code enforcement is vital for economic development, and Travis Lynch said Colorado City's image needs to be better to draw more businesses to town.

The funds for the amendment will come from contingency funds and from cuts in certain areas, according to

CISD hires CCA director

The Colorado ISD Board of Trustees welcomed Tina Melendez as the newest district employee during the regular meeting Monday evening. Melendez will serve as the Colorado Career Academy Director and head of the Spanish Department.

Superintendent Reggy Spencer said Melendez comes here from Sweetwater ISD, and she's a past Region 14 Teacher of the Year.

In other business, Spencer said the preliminary STAAR scores have been

sent to the district, and the news is good for CISD. Students in 5th and 8th grades must pass the STAAR reading and math tests to advance to the next grade, so those scores are even more important to students.

Spencer said 82% of 5th graders passed the reading part of the exam and 97% of 5th graders passed the math portion. Similarly, 81% of 8th graders passed reading and 93% passed the math portion of the test.

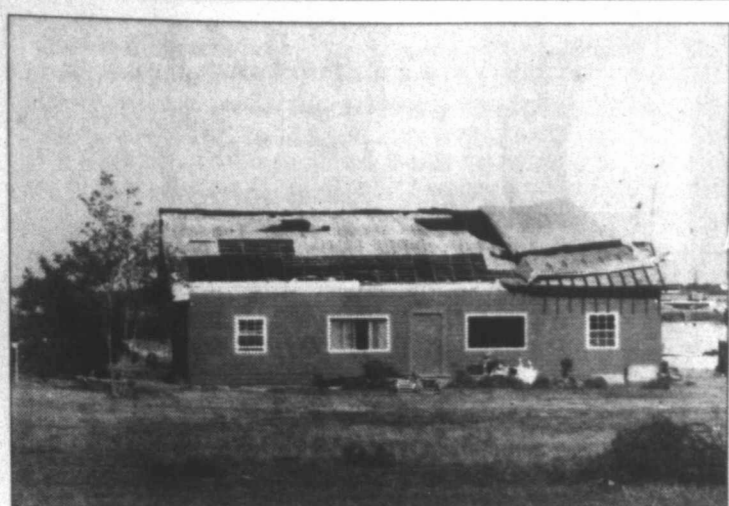

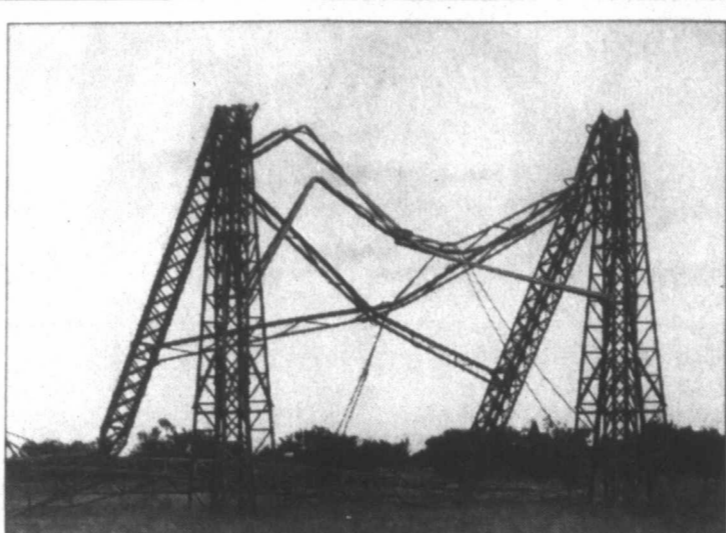

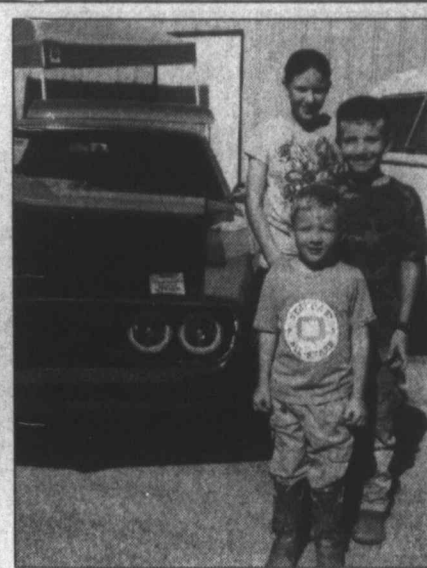

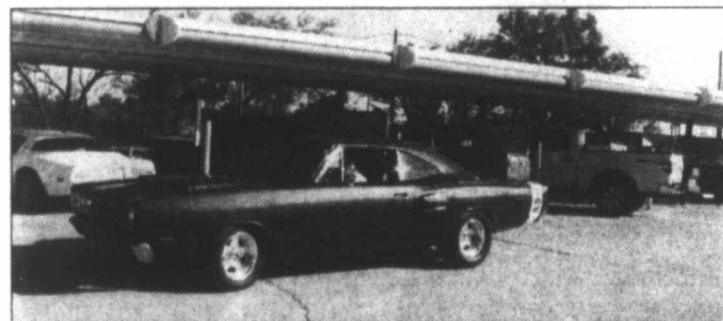

TUMBLEWEED SMITH Cowboys in Cowtown

The cowboy era, which brings up images of trail drives and things having to do with cattle and life on the range, lasted less than 20 years, but the legacy of that time carries through to today. When I was growing up in Fort Worth I used to drive to the stockyards to pick up sides of beef for my father's grocery store. Being there made me feel like a cowboy.

After the Civil War, Americans acquired a taste for beef. There was plenty of it on hoof in Texas, where cattle sold for four dollars a head. In Kansas, the same cow brought 40 dollars. So great cattle drives started from the Rio Grande northward. The Chisholm Trail passed through Fort Worth. When the railroad arrived in 1876, Fort Worth became a major shipping point for livestock. So the city built the stockyards two and half miles north of the Tarrant County Courthouse. They opened in 1887.

One of the investors was Louville Niles of Boston, whose primary business was meatpacking. He convinced the investors that instead of shipping the cattle to other markets to be processed, they should build meatpacking plants. So by 1900 both Swift and Armour started building facilities. They were completed in 1902. That same year the Livestock Exchange Building was built which housed livestock commission companies, telegraph and railroad offices and other support businesses. It became known as the Wall Street of the West.

In 1911 the stockyards and packinghouse area became a little village called Niles City, which at the time was known as the richest little city in the world with a property value of 30 million dollars. In 1923 it was annexed as part of Fort Worth.

The stockyards needed a show facility, so in 1907 construction began on the Cowtown Coliseum. It became home to the first indoor rodeo.

Five million head of livestock passed through the Stockyards. In 1917, during World War I the stockyards were the largest horse and mule market in the world. Military officers came from allied countries to purchase animals.

The peak year for the stockyards was in 1944. Then began the decline of the railroads, which brought about the decline of the stockyards. After WWII, newly paved roads gave rise to the trucking industry, so the market moved to ranches and feed lots. Armour closed in 1962, Swift in 1971. The Armour plant was demolished, but Swift became the Old Spaghetti Warehouse. Now it houses an energy company.

In 1976 some citizens established the North Fort Worth Historical Society, which helped organize the Stockyards National Historical District. They built a museum in the Exchange Building. The area is one of the state's most popular tourist attractions. Visitors enjoy a little bit of the old west with the twice daily cattle drives at 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. when cowboys on horseback guide a herd of longhorns down exchange avenue.

Election integrity adjustments to be considered by committee

In a few days, Republicans across the state will come together to modify their platform at the State Convention in San Antonio. The Platform and Resolutions Committee was called to order on Monday, June 11 and for three days undertake the arduous work of going through the hundreds of resolutions submitted from the County/SD Conventions that took place in March. With topics that range from immigration to raw milk, three resolutions in particular seem to stand out when it comes to election integrity.

Senate District 7 which is in Harris County submitted resolutions that could completely change the current election integrity plank.

Currently Plank 59 of the platform states:

FAIR ELECTION PROCEDURES- We support modifications and the strengthening of election laws to ensure ballot integrity and fair elections. We support the Secretary of State strictly enforcing printing of Results Tapes for electronic voting for early voting and Election Day at polling locations after the polls close for all counties. We support increased scrutiny and security in balloting by mail, prohibition of internet voting and any electronic voting lacking a verifiable paper trail, prohibition of internet voting, prosecution for election fraud with jail sentences, repeal of the unconstitutional Help America Vote act, and assurance that each polling place has a distinctly marked, where possible, separate locations for Republican and Democrat primary voting. We support all means of protecting the integrity of our elections, including the optional use

of paper ballots. We oppose county-wide polling locations due to heightened potential for fraud.

Submitted for consideration:

FAIR ELECTION PROCEDURES- We support modification and the strengthening of election laws to ensure ballot integrity and fair elections. We support the Secretary of State strictly enforcing the Administrative Code, including printing of Results Tapes for electronic voting for early voting and Election Day at polling locations after the polls close for all counties. We support increased scrutiny and security in balloting by mail including a change to the Wisconsin system for voting in nursing homes and assisted living residences, prohibition of internet voting and any electronic voting that cannot produce a paper cast vote record, prohibition of mobile voting, prosecution for election fraud with jail sentences, repeal of the unconstitutional Help America Vote Act, and assurance that each Primary polling place has a distinctly marked, where possible, separate location for Republican and Democrat primary voting. We oppose county-wide polling locations due to heightened potential for fraud and the disengagement of Texas citizens from the election process.

Notice that the allowance of the optional use of paper ballots has been removed from this revision. In addition to these revisions of the current plank, two plank additions were submitted.

Submitted plank 59A states:

PAPER TRAIL FOR ELECTRONIC VOTING- If the legislature believes that voter confidence in electronic voting can be improved by a "paper trail", we support a format emulating the transac-

tion summaries used by major banking institutions, as opposed to a detailed vote record which can be used by unions or school districts to intimidate voters.

Submitted plank 59B states:

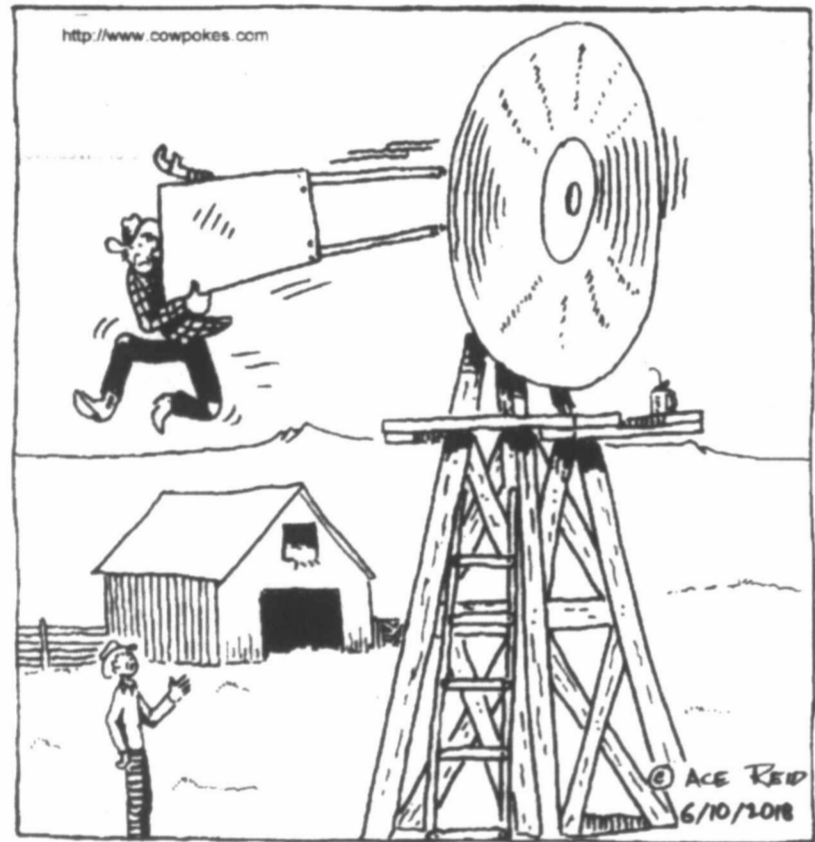
PAPER BALLOTS- Because paper ballots are the voting method most vulnerable to counterfeiting and alteration, we oppose expanded use of paper ballots without failsafe technologies to prevent repeats of these historically documented forms of voting fraud.

Currently in Texas, each county decides whether they want to use paper ballots or electronic voting machines. Some counties even use a combination of the two where the ballots are marked either by hand or electronically and then counted by a machine. If these resolutions pass without modification and the legislature sees this as the will of the Republican Party of Texas, it could alter voting procedures in our state. It could also add unneeded cost to small rural counties that are currently conducting their elections in an efficient and cost effective method as laid out by current law.

At the time of this article, these resolutions have been submitted to the Government & Foreign Affairs Subcommittee which is composed of Roman Klein SD17-Chair, Alan D. Vera SD7, Jerry A. Madden SD8, Todd Gallaher SD18, Warrington Lee Austerman SD19, Paul D. Perry SD22, Mark Dunham SD29, and Dusty Gallivan SD31. This subcommittee met Tuesday, June 12. Public testimony started at 9:00 am.

I am Orand Carroll, 510 Washington Blvd. in Big Spring, cell number 432-466-4565, and my late lady friend, Bonnie Cushing, and I had held several star parties at the beautiful Ruddick Park there in Colorado City before. We loved every minute of the intensive planning and presentations for the folks in Colorado City, Loraine, Westbrook, and all in between.

On July 27 the planet Mars will be the closest to Earth than it has been for centuries, only 35.8 million miles away. It will be magnitude -2.8, equaling the brightness of Jupiter at its brightest. At that time Mars will be in the southern part of the evening sky as a bright red-

As always at my star parties everyone, the adults, the little children, the handicapped, especially those in wheelchairs, are lovingly welcome. So that adults won't have to hold the little children up to the eyepiece of the telescope, I shall

have a very nice step ladder with handrails so that the little children can just hold onto the handrails and take all the time in the world to look at the wonderful objects. (And I shall spend all the individual consultation with everyone on their comments and questions. Joe Wheelock at McDonald Observatory is the consultant with the Celesta Fiesta Observatory.

If any of you folks in Mitchell County have the interest and opportunity, you may want to take a look a Mars in a few weeks. It will be a beautiful event. If you have binoculars or if someone has a telescope, the opportunity to enjoy the beauty is yours.

If anyone has any questions, I shall be very available to all you wonderful people in Mitchell County.

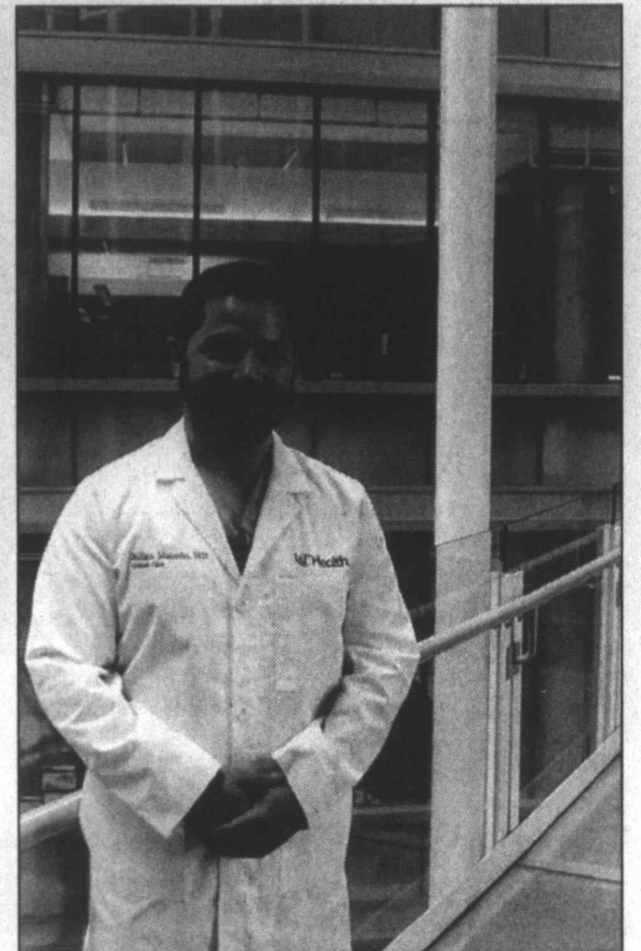
