## Local Agriculturists Agree To Pay 40 Cents To Farm Laborers And Aid Veterans

At a meeting in the local AAA office, a group of Dawson County citizens congregated at 2 p. m. Saturday, June 3, to discuss farm labor prices and labor problems. Lee R. Pool, county agent, acted as chairman of the meeting.

Payment of farm laborers was the first problem discussed, and the county agent suggested to the group that they establish an agreed price for Dawson County farmers to pay laborers for hoeing cotton and doing general farm work, and observe this set price strictly. The group favored the suggestion and decided that farmers pay a laborer 40 cents an hour for hoeing, and pay a crew leader \$5.00 for hauling 10 or more hands to the field and overseeing the work.

The group also discussed family labor going out in one crew, and agreed to pay 40 cents an hour for their work, and 50 cents to the person who hauls the crew, who must also work in the field.

Other topics discussed were child farm labor, and methods of acquiring hands for hoeing. No plans were set up concerning these problems, as it was the general opinion of the group that no steps should be taken relative to this matter.

Plans were made at the Saturday session to organize an agricultural advisory service in Dawson County to help war veterans who have been released from the service for various reasons, return to farming. A committee was set up, which will meet at intervals to discuss problems and to give advice to the returning war veterans and to acquaint them with opportunities available. Jack Broyles was elected chairman of this rehabilitation committee, and M. E. Boren, Lee Pool, O. Richardson, Fred Rainey, O. H. Morris, Ebbie Lee, D. W. Massengale, Frank Harris, Spurgeon Motley, and Carson Echols were elected to serve with him on the committee.

### Restriction Lifted On Slaughter Of Farm Livestock

According to a telegram received by C. E. Tarter, local AAA administrative officer, from B. F. Vance, administrative officer in charge of the state AAA, all restrictions on farm slaughter of livestock and delivery of meat has been removed by WFA.

Word of the new ruling was received Wednesday, May 31.

The telegram from Vance stated that amendment 15 to WFA-75, effective May 25, revokes requirement that farmers must have permit to slaughter livestock and deliver meat to persons not living on farms. The memorandum stated further that OPA instructions are not effected.

Earnest; and that they will work up a program to promote the selling of bonds over Dawson County.

The chairman of the drive also states that the Rotary Club has charge of advertising for the drive. Rotary Bond drive chairman is Audrey Cox. Earnest has suggested that the club have local stores decorate their windows for the campaign; put posters on trucks and delivery cars, and hang posters and signs above banks concerning the bond drive. It was also suggested that one of the streets in this city have its name changed to War Bond Drive.

Local boys scouts have also indicated that they will enter in the campaign. Joe Spikes, local Scoutmaster, has reported to J. R. Earnest that the Scouts will make arrangements to take part in the drive.

Ministers all over Dawson County have been asked to emphasize the bond drive in their church work. J. R. Earnest has a suggested plan for churches which includes setting aside Sunday, June 11 as "Church-At-War-Day," and dedicating that day to the Chaplains of the Army and Navy and to men and women of the congregation in service.

The bond drive will open next Monday, and with an intensive effort and with complete cooperation from every citizen, Dawson County hopes to go over the top quickly.

## Space In Garden Can Be Filled In With Some Plants

Spaces are appearing in the rows of early planted gardens and gardeners are giving thought to suitable selections for replanting. With the idea of simplifying this problem, J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, suggests setting out or planting peppers, okra or late tomatoes in the skips in cabbage rows.

Summer tomatoes can be planted

directly in the row, sowing three to four seed per foot. When six to eight inches high thin the plants to one about every three feet. Porter, Bison, Denmark or Cherry are the best hot weather tomato varieties. The plants should not be pruned or staked because the foliage is needed to protect the fruit from hot sunshine.

Late roasting ear corn may be planted between the row of potatoes which are about mature. If desired late green beans, or black-eyed, cream or purple hull peas may be planted in the space after the potatoes are dug.

Reminding that recent rains made an ideal season for setting sweet potato slips, Rosborough recom-

mends rows three and one half feet apart and bedded nine inches high in loose, well prepared soil as best adapted for Texas. Where commercial fertilizer can be used, 300 to 600 pounds an acre of 5-10-5 or 4-8-8 will increase yield and improve quality. For smaller plantings, five pounds per 100 feet of row space is the right proportion. Slips should be planted 14 to 16 inches apart.

The best sweet potato slips are six inches long. Where disease and insects are troublesome slips should be allowed to grow 10 inches high, then cut above the surface of the soil. With plenty of moisture vine cuttings will live equally well as slips and produce high yields, Ros-

borough quotes Experiment Station July. A planting of 100 feet of row records that slips set in May will space properly fertilized and cultivated approximately one third more vated should yield about 150 pounds than those set in June or early of sweet potatoes.

JUNE 1ST TO JUNE 15TH

## SUGAR:—

Stamps No. 30 and 31, Book IV, good for 5 pounds indefinitely. Stamp No. 40, Book IV, good for 5 pounds sugar for 1944 home canning.

## MEATS AND FATS:—

Book IV, red stamps A8 through T8 good for 10 points valid indefinitely. Stamps U8, V8, and W8 valid June 4, good indefinitely.

## PROCESSED FOODS:—

Book IV, blue stamps A8 through V8 good for 10 points each, valid indefinitely.

## SHOES:—

Book III, stamps one and two with airplane pictures, each good for one pair shoes indefinitely.

## GASOLINE:—

(Coupons must be endorsed on front.) "A" coupons, 3 gallons each, with No. 11 expiring June 21. In B-2, B-3, B-4, and C-2 and C-3 rations, the coupons nationally have a value of 5 gallons each. "R" 5 gallons. (valid for bulk delivery only); red "T" designated "Second Quarter," 5 gallons; "D" one and one-half gallon; and "E" one gallon each.

## TIRE INSPECTION:—

"T" book holders every six months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first. Tire inspection record still required to obtain tire replacements and gasoline rations.
