Panthers Start Workouts Monday; 16 Lettermen Back

The Gorman Panthers will start two-a-day practice session on Monday, August 10th and Coach Bryan Allen is looking for about 16 lettermen to return for this season from a 5-5 team last season. There are 8-9 starters expected back. It is hoped that about 12 to 14 freshmen will be coming out for practice this season.

Players returning from last season are Kris Scitern, back and linebacker; Chris Laminack, center and linebacker; Noah Landa, offensive and defensive tackle; Rajee Patel, quarterback and defensive back; Kenneth Rainey, off. guard and def. linebacker; Jade Warren, offensive guard and defensive end; Brent Skaggs, offensive guard and defensive end; Jonray Childers, offensive lineman and defensive tackle; Mario Rodriguez, wingback and defensive back; Shane Caraway, wide receiver and defensive end; Don Mauney, offensive and defensive tackle; and Flavio Herrera, wide receiver and defensive back; Daniel Sanchez, wingback and linebacker; Tony Forbus, tailback

and defensive back; Benji Cox, wingback and linebacker; Daniel Reeves, offensive guard and defensive tackle; John Mart Stephens, offensive and defensive tackle; William Rainey, offensive end and defensive back; and Christian Clark, offensive tackle and defensive end.

The Panthers will be working in preparation for the first scrimmage game with Millsap on August 20th at Millsap. Then the Panthers will host Dublin in a scrimmage game on August 27th at Brogdon Field.

Panthers fans are urged to come out and watch the Big Red in their workouts and be ready to support the Panthers in the upcoming season.

Coach Allen stated that he will field seven offensive starters and eight defensive starters from last season, and with the nucleus of incoming hopefuls, he is optimistic about the upcoming season. The Panthers are picked as favorites in District 13A along with the Rising Star Wildcats.

City Commission Approves Budget For 1992-1993

The Gorman City Commission met in a regular meeting on July 2nd with the following present: Mayor Jack Simpson, and Commissioners John Rice, Ann Maxfield, Howard Hagood and Johnny Smith.

The meeting opened at 6:08 p. m. Ann Maxfield made the motion, seconded by Johnny Smith, to approve the minutes as read. Motion carried 4-0.

Joe Williams and Kevin Frizzell gave department reports. Judge Huff was absent. At this time Kevin Frizzell presented a letter of resignation to the commission. Johnny Smith made the motion, seconded by John Rice, to accept the resignation. Motion carried 4-0.

Animal control will be discussed at another meeting after the commission reviews a sample ordinance. Many complaints around the town have been expressed because of stray and wandering animals and pets.

Howard Hagood made the motion, seconded by Johnny Smith, to pass Ordinance No. 317, Budget 1992-93 upon the second reading. Motion carried 4-0.

Mozelle Rhymes informed the City Commission of the leaking roof in the kitchen of the Senior Center and the need for an air conditioning unit. No action was taken at this time.

John Rice made the motion, seconded by Ann Maxfield to approve the bills as on the report.

In millions of families, both the husband and wife now hold full-time jobs. Many of these families are hiring household workers to help them care for pre-school age children or to keep up with daily household chores.

What these increasingly typical American families may not know is that when they hire household help, they are probably required to pay Social Security taxes for the person they employ.

"Family 'employers' may not even realize that they are employers," said Social Security Commissioner Gwendolyn S. King, when she was in Abilene recently. "And even those who are aware of that fact may not know that their household workers are sacrificing valuable Social Security protection when Social Security taxes aren't paid and when the employee's wages aren't reported to Social Security. These workers could lose their eligibility for survivors, disability, retirement, and Medicare benefits—the entire Social Security coverage package."

household help know if they are considered an "employer" under the law?

Generally, if an employer pays a household worker \$50 or more during a three-month period, that employer must also deduct Social Security taxes and report the wages to both Social Security and the IRS.

Why is the issue of coverage so important for domestic workers?

All Social Security benefits are based on a combination of how long an individual works and the amount of wages reported for him or her by each employer. Even part-time, seasonal or temporary work can increase the future benefit amount for workers and their families. It also may provide current insurance against loss of income if the family breadwinner is disabled or dies before retiring.

Household workers should make sure that they are getting proper credit for work and that Social Security taxes are paid on their behalf. They can check their wage records regularly by asking the Social Security Adm. to provide a free Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement that shows year-by-year figures of the actual wages reported to the agency by employers since 1951.

This statement also projects what an employee's retirement benefits may be and estimates what Social Security benefits may be payable to his or her family in the event of a disabling injury or death.

To receive this Personal Earnings

and Benefit Estimate Statement, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, business days between 7 a. m. and 7 p. m.

Social Security benefits are perhaps even more important to domestic workers than to other workers

because they are so much less likely to have a private pension program or other financial resources to draw on.

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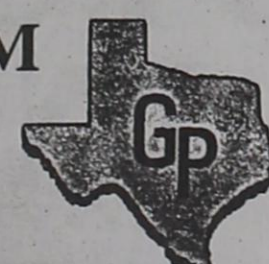


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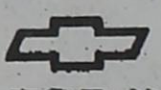

AGRICULTURE VIEWPOINT

PRIVATE APPLICATOR TRAINING

A Private Applicator Certification School will be held in Baird on August 10th, according to Greg Grengross, County Extension Agent. The three and one-half hour course will begin at 8:30 a. m. in the County Courtroom and testing by a Texas Dept. of Agriculture representative will follow. Completion of the training and the examination will enable agricultural producers to purchase restricted use chemicals and supervise application of restricted use products. Study materials for the exam are available from the Extension office. Producers who plan to attend the certification training are asked to pre-register by August 5th. The Extension Office phone number is 915-854-1518.

FEWER FED CATTLE TRANSLATE INTO HIGHER PRICES

Retail beef prices could take a slight jump in the fall due to fewer cattle in feedlots now. Texas and Nebraska, the two largest cattle feeding states, cut May placements from a year ago by 11 percent and 5 percent, respectively, said Dr. Ernest E. Davis, a livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "It will help the ranch-level cattle market, definitely," Davis said. "If the fed cattle market goes, everything else will, too." However, he doesn't expect retail prices to rise drastically because the retail price spread, or the difference between what the retailers pay for beef and sell to consumers, currently is large.

Traditionally, if retailers have a large price spread, they do not immediately lower prices when wholesale beef prices decrease. Conversely, the price spread acts as a cushion. "If wholesale prices increase, retailers are rather reluctant to raise their prices immediately," Davis said. "The price increase would depend on the retailers and how much they want to push their price up," he said.

However, the price should not go up much more than 6 cents, to \$2.94 per pound (average retail price), for the remainder of the year, he said.

The June Cattle on Feed report from the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture indicated that cattle feeders still are cautious about placing cattle on feed due to record losses felt last year, he said. Wholesale prices for 400- to 500-pound steers, for example, dropped from highs of \$115 per hundredweight in June of 1991 to \$94 per hundredweight in December.

During May, the seven major cattle feeding states placed 1.72 million cattle in feedlots, down 3 percent from a year ago and down 6 percent from the 5-year average of May placements.

At the beginning of June, the last date for which figures are available, it appeared that the second half of 1992 would parallel the 1990 fed cattle market in an upward trend in price and downward trend in numbers. The quantity of cattle on feed is very similar to those of 1990, he said.

But he warned against making too many comparisons. First of all, feedlots have been placing heavier cattle on feed in 1992 than on 1990, requiring fewer days on feed and faster turnover. Therefore, number comparisons may not be that accurate.

Additionally, the beef cattle market will continue to face increased competition from larger pork and poultry supplies during the second half of 1992, which may make producers and feedlots reluctant to expand production greatly, he said.
