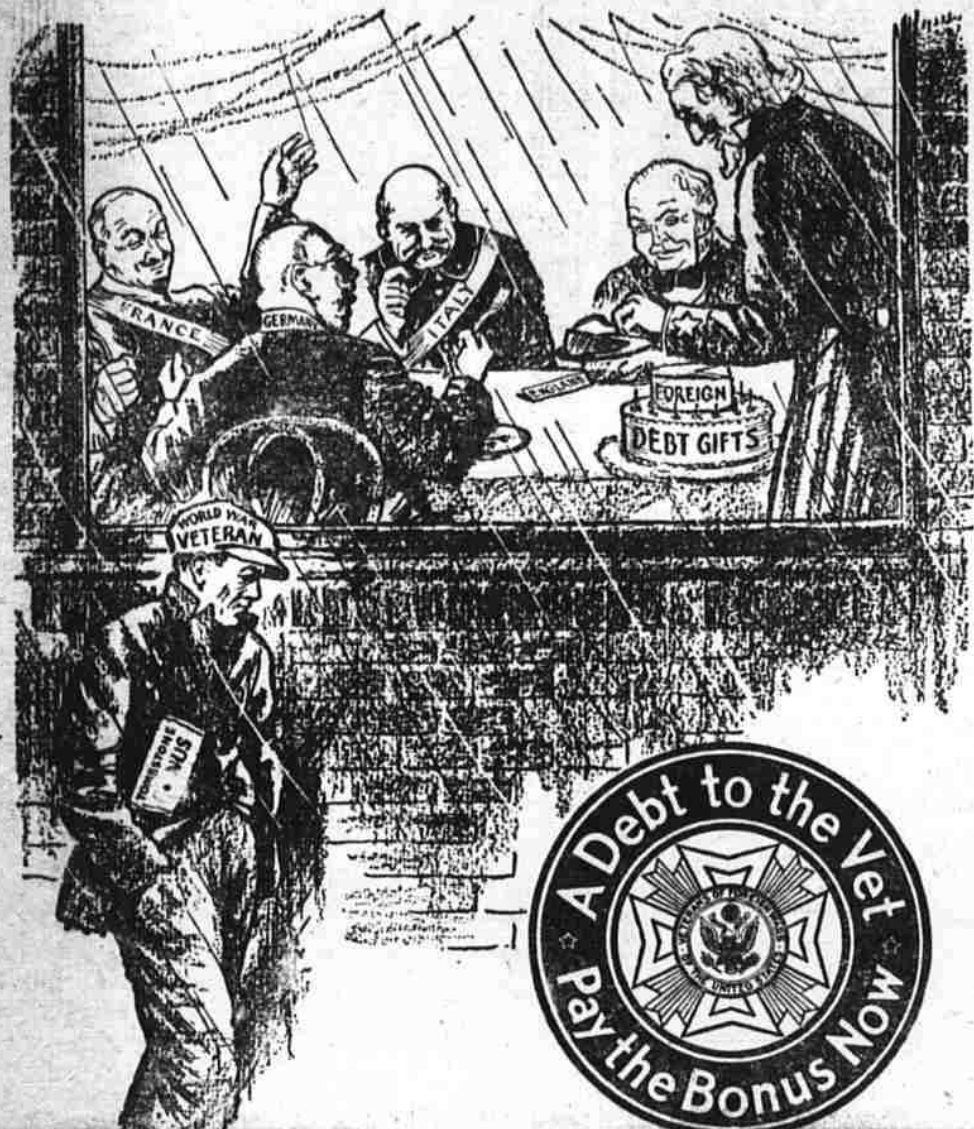

Higher Tax On Incomes Above \$8,000 Voted

Veterans Of Foreign Wars To Be Organized Here This Evening At Installation Service

65 Per Cent County Taxes Paid

73 Per Cent Is Collected By Rural Schools

65 Per Cent Also Is Rate Of Payment Here For State Treasury

Sixty-five per cent of state and county taxes levied in Howard county for this year had been paid March 1, according to final check of reports in the office of Loy Acuff, county tax collector. Collection of common district school taxes totaled 73.01 per cent. Total collections of state ad valorem taxes had reached \$75,121.09, of the \$114,807.01 assessed. Collections of county ad valorem taxes to date \$76,618.31 compared with \$116,263.15 assessed. The county rate this year is 75 cents and the state rate 74 cents. Last year the county rate was 96 cents and the state rate 69 cents.

On a 74-cent rate collections of state taxes here amounted to 65.02 per cent leaving \$39,655.92 delinquent compared with total delinquencies of \$22,813.65 last year on a 69-cent rate.

On last year's 96-cent county ad valorem rate all save \$29,856.10 was collected; this compared with collection of \$76,618.31 or 65.08 per cent of the \$116,263.15 assessed this year on a 75-cent rate, leaving \$39,744.94 delinquent on the current tax rolls. Total of district school tax collections to March 1 was \$43,400.23 of \$59,425.66 assessed; collections amounted to 73.01 per cent. Of the \$59,425.66 assessed only \$19,925.43 is delinquent, compared with total delinquencies of \$12,621.96 last year.

Tax rates on the various school districts were practically unchanged this year with exception of Midway where the rate was reduced from \$1 to 65 cents.

Politicians' payments to March 1 were: state, \$2,833 county, \$480. Poll tax assessments amounted to \$7,707 for the state and \$1,284.50 for the county.

Grand total of all current tax collections by the county collector—state and county ad valorem, common district school and poll taxes—to March 1 was \$108,902.63 of \$299,487.32 assessed for all purposes, leaving total delinquencies at \$100,984.69.

Total of all delinquencies last year was \$65,094.71.

Lot 4, Fed Ground Milo Heads, Shows Greatest Weight Increase In Beef Feeding Test At Government Farm

The fourth 28-day period of the cattle feeding experiments being conducted at the U. S. department of agriculture experiment station here ended March 11 and Fred Keating, superintendent, has announced results of the feeding tests so far. Sixty head of Hereford calves have been on feed 112 days. They are divided into four lots of 15 head, each lot being given a different ration. Facilities at the government farm for carrying out these tests have been greatly improved this year. A barn with all modern features and a specially designed feeding lot were built. The cattle will be fed 60 days longer. Object of the tests is to determine the best method of feeding locally grown feedstuffs. Lot No. 1 is fed white thrasher's

Webber Heard In Address By Kiwanis Club

String Orchestra Gives Selections At Luncheon Session

A classification talk by D. W. Webber, on the history and development of the J. C. Penney Company and selections by a string orchestra composed of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Pinkston, Frank Martinez and Fred Whitaker featured Thursday's program of the Kiwanis club, which was in charge of Willard Sullivan. Four of the 55 club members were absent. The 'Whites' one of three teams in an attendance contest now being waged, reported perfect attendance. Ray Wilcox is the captain. The 'Reds' reported one absent, the 'Blues' three.

Chairman Sullivan announced that the orchestra playing for the program would be heard over Station WFAA, Dallas, at 6:45 a. m. March 30. It will be entered in a contest among Texas musical troupes, the winner to be decided by the number of votes mailed to the station for it. Local people were asked to listen in on the program and support the local group in the contest.

In 1919 Mr. Webber, who joined the service of the J. C. Penney Company since March 26, 1919, at Flagstaff, Arizona, reviewed the origin of the concern from the opening of the first store by J. C. Penney at Kemmerer, Wyoming.

Mr. Penney had been employed in a small store in the northwest. With his \$500 savings and \$1,500 which he borrowed for one year from his employer he opened his store in 1912 by 20-foot space. He paid the loan off at the end of the year. In 1914 he opened a second store, with a loan for one year. From the first he flourished if he could get men working for him sufficiently interested in the business they would be of better service to all concerned. This policy he has followed to the present time.

Tough sledding was encountered by the future merchant prince in the early years of his activities. But by 1910 he had 14 stores, with offices in Salt Lake City. He kept expanding. Mr. Webber said that when he joined the company in 1919 there were 207 stores. The policy of giving the manager of each store a third interest in it, the cost of that interest coming out of the store's earnings had been continued. During 1919 eighty stores were opened. Due to general business conditions the company opened none in 1920 but expansion was resumed after that year. By 1924 there were 575 stores, by 1927, 875.

At the close of 1931 the J. C. Penney company had 1469 stores doing business in every state of the Union.

Plan Changed The partnership plan became unwieldy after the business grew to such huge proportions, Mr. Webber pointed out. To meet this condition and effect the needed change the company was reincorporated. Until then the relation between the local manager and the company had been that of a partnership. The new plan provides for their interest in individual stores, and common stock for them based on the earning power of their stores.

Crowded conditions in the New York office led to erection of a 15-story warehouse and office building in New York and in 1929 another large building of this type was erected in St. Louis.

"The object and policy of the J. C. Penney Company is to reap small profits with quick turnover by pricing merchandise at every dollar below the cost," said Mr. Webber. "We handle several hundred articles of our own trademarked merchandise, so that our line does not conflict with those of any competitor. We have never antagonized competitors in this manner."

Rural Schools Greatly Benefitted By Additional Tax Receipts, Payment Of \$3.50 Per Child From State Fund

As a result of additional collections of district taxes and receipt Friday of \$3.50 per capita of the state apportionment rural schools of Howard county will with few exceptions, be able to continue through the full session without curtailing the work or having to operate on a deficiency basis. Pauline Cantrell Brigham, county superintendent of public instruction, said Friday. All of the state apportionment of \$17.50 per child will not be received by the time the schools close this spring but teachers will not have to take deficiency warrants. They will merely have to hold their regular salary warrants until the final payments of the \$17.50 are received during the summer months. However, this will not be necessary in most districts. In a few cases where schools otherwise would have to be dismissed a half-month before end of the expected session the teachers may, if they desire in order to prevent premature closing of school, take deficiency warrants. R. Bar, Gay Hill and Moore were the only schools that were expected to have to close two weeks early. The Friday payment by the state of \$3.50 per capita brought the total from the state thus far this school year to \$2.50, with \$9 per capita to be received by September. Supplemental tax collections and redemptions were reported Friday. They total \$3,034.96 for the entire county and these receipts are divided among the districts as follows: R. LaGuardia Amendment Raises Rate To 7 Per Cent; Sales Tax Hit

WASHINGTON (AP)—The house Friday accepted an amendment by Representative LaGuardia, Republican of New York, to the new revenue bill raising the tax on incomes of more than \$8,000 from five to seven per cent.

The bill as drafted increased the rate to six per cent. It was considered a victory for opponents of the manufacturers' sales tax, who were attempting to supply the revenue by other means.

Well, Dan Moody was right when he said the famous river bed bill, the "Small anti-land grabber" bill was unconstitutional.

Dan might not have been right in voting bill on that contention; always has seemed to us it would have been better for all concerned, especially Dan, if he'd just let the thing go to the courts for a test.

But it was passed over his veto anyway and now it has been given a court test and the state supreme court has ruled it null and void.

The court decision places more than \$8,000,000 acres of mineral lands in West Texas in the same status as it was prior to enactment of the bill and makes land owners liable to the state for half of lease bonuses and rentals.

Senator Clint Small of Wellington, author of the bill, said the entire question of school laws was thrown into an uncertain state by the court's decision. Constitutionality notwithstanding something will have to be done about a condition that allows a bunch of Austin guys to snoop around in the land office records, find so-called "vacancies" keep track of places where oil has or might be discovered near or in dry stream beds and then get the State of Texas to sue some citizen who has developed the land, paid taxes on it for years—and perhaps rob him of the land.

into groups of two or more to
simplify administration and cut
down the overhead is one of the
devices advocated by some tax-
payers who have made it
study of the situation.or two of its weaker neighbors, for
mutual benefits.The county consolidation plan
differs materially from the county
home-rule amendment proposed by
Senator Walter E. H. Beck. The
Beck plan, which passed the house
but died in the senate at the last
session, called for a constitutional
amendment. It would authorize
counties with more than 60,000 popu-
lation to administer their own af-
fairs without running to the legis-
lature every time they wanted to
change the course of a brooklet. It
would likewise empower such
counties to consolidate public of-
fices into one coordinate city-
county government, thereby elimi-
nating much useless duplication of
work and expense. The Beck bill
would affect only 14 counties in
Texas, leaving the other 240 un-
affected—and unrelieved.The county consolidation plan,
whereby two or more counties
could group themselves together
for administrative purposes, prob-
ably could be affected by a simple
legislative enactment, cancelling
the present organization arrange-
ment, and by authorization of the
voters affected, setting up a new
organization.Such consolidation would make
possible the elimination of a num-
ber of useless offices—and officers.
In some of the larger counties of
the state constables and justices of
the peace draw salaries in the
form of fees, amounting to as much
as \$12,500 a year. Other county of-
ficers make from \$20,000 to \$25,
000 a year—all of which comes from
the pockets of the taxpayers and
the litigants, mostly the taxpayers.By abolishing the fee system—a
task of Herculean proportions—
cutting down the number of office-
holders who live off the taxpay-
ers, the long suffering people would
get some relief from the paralyzing
effect of high taxes.Consolidation of counties is noth-
ing new. It is a political device that
has been in use in Texas from the
time of its founding as a state un-
til last year, when the last un-
organized county detached itself
from its sponsor and launched its
own political bark—with a full set
of officers, offices and tax levies

Leaders of the Citizens League,

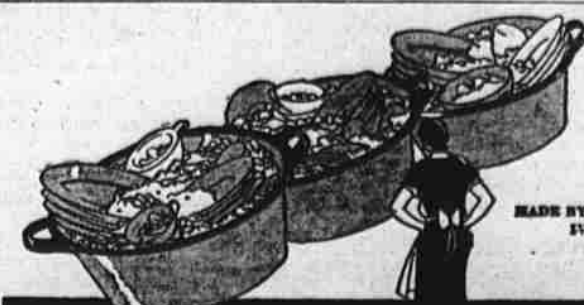

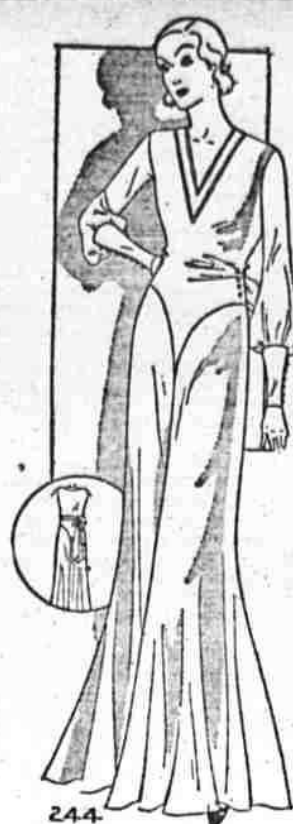

Beans, Spaghetti Form Basis
For Children's Quick Lunch

By JOSEPHINE GIBSON

"What shall I have for the children's lunch?" This is a winter long problem confronting busy mothers. The morning speeds away almost before we realize, and it is time for the children to come romping in, hungry and ready for a good substantial lunch. The menu must be well-balanced and appealing, yet for mother's sake it must be simple and not require too much time for preparation. Main dishes should be nourishing, and may frequently be varied by giving a few simple touches to familiar and often served foods. Children enjoy usual touches just as grown-ups do, and the school-day lunch should be a gay, cheerful affair so the child will go back to school refreshed and happy.

The following simple menus contain dishes that children enjoy, they offer an abundance of milk and are planned with an eye to ease of preparation.

Puree of Oven Baked Beans*
Grape Jelly
Whole Wheat Bread Toast
Baked Apple with Milk

Cooked Spaghetti in Tomato Sauce
Apple, Nut and Celery Salad
Whole Wheat Bread
Peanut Pudding*

*Indicates recipes given below.
Puree of Oven Baked Beans: 1 small can Oven Baked Beans (with Pork and Tomato Sauce), 4 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons flour, 1-1/4 teaspoons salt, dash of pepper 1-4 teaspoon paprika, 1 teaspoon juice scraped from a cut onion, 4 cups milk, 3 tablespoons Tomato Ketchup. Mash baked beans or force through a coarse sieve. Melt butter in saucepan, blend thoroughly with flour, add seasonings and milk, and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add mashed beans and ketchup and stir until smooth. Serve very hot with crackers or toast. An easily prepared, nourishing and flavored main dish for the children's school lunch.

Peanut Pudding: 3 tablespoons honey, 3 tablespoons cornstarch, 3 tablespoons Peanut Butter, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 2 cups milk. Scald milk. Blend other ingredients and add to scalded milk. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened; place in double boiler or over hot water and cook for 15 minutes. Pour into molds, chill, and serve with cream or whipped cream.

History, Legend, Romance Figure In Naming Of Panhandle Towns

AMARILLO (AP)—History, legend and romance figured in the naming of Panhandle towns, creeks, lakes and rivers, says Mrs. Carolyn Deason Timmons of Amarillo, who has made a study of the names.

Amarillo, she claims, got its name from Amarillo Creek, and the creek was named by the Spanish explorer, Coronado, for the many yellow flowers that grew along the banks of the stream. The Spanish word meant yellow.

Colonel B. B. Groom founded the Diamond F ranch in the early 80's, just north of the present town of Groom, and the town was given his name when it came into being. Panhandle was so named because its founders believed it to be near the center of the Texas Panhandle.

Goodnight was named for the pioneer cattle baron, Colonel Charles C. Goodnight, who selected the townsite and planted the first trees. It is located at the headquarters of his famous old ranch.

An Indian legend of a "white deer" that lived at the head of a small creek led to the naming of White Deer Creek, and later the town of White Deer. Claude was named for Claude Alras, the first engineer to pull a through passenger train into the town on the Fort Worth and Denver.

Vega, the Spanish word for meadow, was the name given the little town that sprang up among the shallow, meadow-like beds west of Amarillo, in Oldham county. Bushland was named for James A. Bush, who cut up into farms part of the old Frying Pan ranch.

The similarity of the surrounding terrain to the pampas of South America gave Pampa its name. Deaf Smith county has long been noted for its purebred cattle, hence the town of Hereford.

The old town of Plemmons, in Hutchinson county, was named for Judge Plemmons, the founder of Amarillo. Tule Creek got its name from the tall grass that grew along its banks, and the town of Tulla was named for the creek.

"Old freighters tell many tales of the blue lake on the plains that was five miles wide and sometimes required 21 days to cross," Mrs. Timmons said. "The freighters were always overjoyed when they got across the lake, so when a post office was set up at the edge of the lake they named it Happy. The present town is not located on the original site, but it still retains 'the name'."

Farwell got its name from John V. Farwell, president of the Capitol Land Syndicate. Washburn was named by General Dodge, former president of the Union Pacific Railroad, for a General Washburn, a close friend during the Civil War.

"The little community of St. El Paso, northeast of Amarillo, was named for the Franciscan order, which had a big part in saving the way from Spain to Santa Fe, N. M. Many combination words appear among Panhandle towns. Dalhart, near the line of Dallas and Hartley county, Texline on the boundary line between Texas and New Mexico, Texoma on the Texas-Oklahoma line, and Texico on the New Mexico line are examples.

Newer towns have been named for individuals. For example, Borger for its founder, A. P. Borger, and Stinnett, for A. S. Stinnett who promoted the building of the Rock Island line from Amarillo to Liberal, Kansas.

A mistaken belief that a stream they crossed had its head in Canada led the Spanish explorers to name the river the Canadian. The town was later named for the stream.

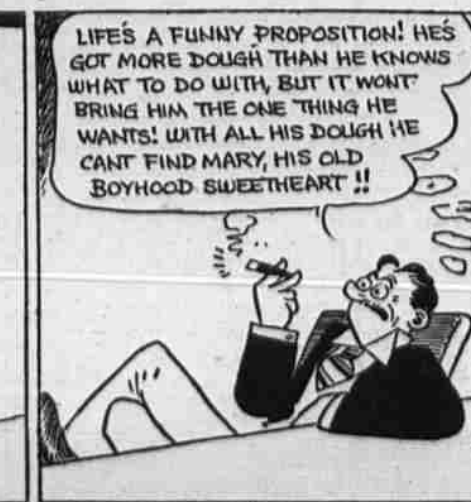

raising the devil when we have to pay 'em no matter how low or high the rate; its just something that's been 'one through the generation.

Not that we do not think taxes are too high in a lot of places. But, after all is said and done, the towns or counties with the lowest tax rates are usually the poorest ones in which to try to make a living. Nope? Well, just look around and learn for yourself.

The major portion of taxes in Texas comes from ad valorem levies on real and personal property and the tax on gasoline.

In the gasoline tax law we have the most equitable method of taxation in use in Texas—3 of the 4 cents per gallon go to maintain and improve highways. In other words the traffic pays for the roads which is as it should be.

But, the taxation system will not be what it should be until we have completely done away with the ad valorem tax. There are other methods that equalize the tax bill more effectively.

In our own county the ad valorem duty is being used as fairly as possible; that is, the owner of farming or grazing land is given the lowest assessment of any county in this section. Five dollars per acre is the highest valuation placed

on any farm land, no matter how well improved.

Thus, most of the taxes—in fact almost all—paid Howard county come from property within the city of Big Spring and that in the oil field in the southern part of the county.

Farmers of Howard county are provided a system of lateral, county roads second to none in West Texas. And they pay less in taxes for those roads than farmers of most any other county.

It is fortunate, after all, that as this time, when farmers can not make the cost of producing their crops, that they are not called on to pay a greater portion of taxes.

Judge Fisher Heads Victory Drive Of Dems

Pleas Of Privilege In Royalty Suits Set For Monday

AUSTIN (UP).—District Judge J. D. Moore will hear pleas of privilege in the state's suit to recover \$575,000 in oil royalties for the University of Texas here Monday. Attorney General James V. Allred said today.

Continental Oil and Refining Company and Reagan Co. Purchasing company, two of the defendants, have pleaded they are foreign corporations with Texas offices in Fort Worth, and therefore privileged to stand trial in Tarrant county.

Allred contends that all oil royalties are paid to the land commissioner at Austin, and therefore the suit was properly filed in Travis county.

The suit is based on a contract which provided that oil from university lands be purchased at a "fair market price," determined by averages, the posted prices of five major mid-continent purchasing companies.

The state contends the price was improperly computed. The university's one-eighth royalty interest would have been increased by \$575,000 had the proper average been used, the petition claims.

The Humble Oil and Refining company, also named a defendant, contends it is improperly joined because it had no contract with the state. This plea of misjoinder will be argued next week. Actual trial of the case will not start before the April term of court, since all defense answers will not be filed until the court has ruled on dilatory pleas.

Harry Powers Nears Noose For Murder Of Women

MOUNDSVILLE, Va., (AP).—Harry P. Powers, was to be hanged at 9 o'clock Friday night for the murder of Mrs. Dorothy Pressler Lemke of Northboro, Mass. He is also accused of killing Mrs. Asta Buick Elcher and three children of Park Ridge Ill., after mail order shipments.

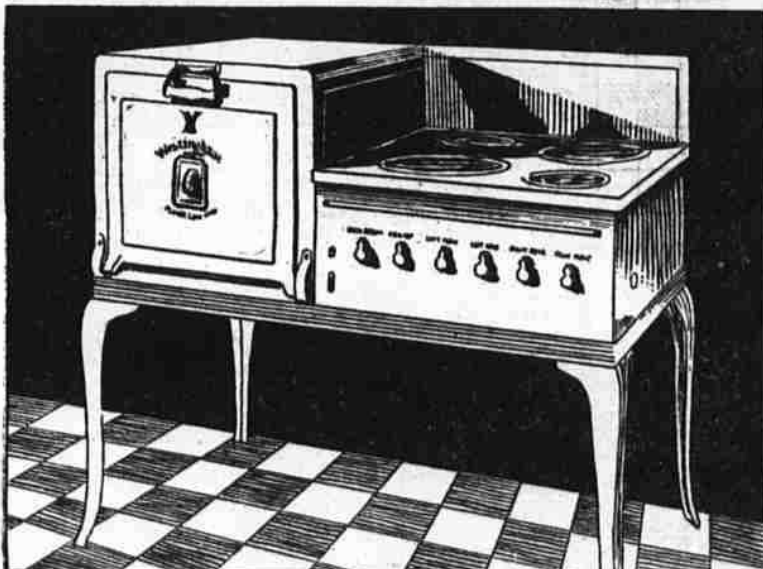

TODAY and TOMORROW

By WALTER LIPPMANN

The Economic War

LONDON, March 15.—The president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Silas H. Strawn, is in Europe at this moment expressing the horror of what he declares to be amount of a particular commodity some 800,000 American business which may be imported at no mat-

ter what price. Mr. Strawn's horror is justified. The quota system, as it is now being operated, is the worst instrument yet devised for running international trade.

The ordinary protective tariff, provided it remains fixed for a reasonably long period of time and then is not changed suddenly or drastically, is an obstacle to which the trade of the world can adjust itself. What business can not survive is sudden and arbitrary change in its access to markets. Thus, while it is undoubtedly true that under lower tariffs the volume of trade is greater and the world richer because of a more efficient division of labor, the supreme necessity is not that tariffs should be low but that they should be stable. Now the devilish thing about the quota system is that it introduces a radical instability into all the international markets.

A government department, responding to no one knows what considerations or what kind of hidden pressure, suddenly fixes the amount of a particular commodity which may be imported. Under this system prices cease to regulate international trade and in its place there is barter regulated by bureaucratic fiat. Since the quotas can be changed almost without notice, or turned into embargoes mitigated by license of exemption, the international market for goods is decisively controlled by the arbitrary action of officials. The mere existence of such power is in itself destructive of all systematic economic foresight; a power of this kind can not be exercised intelligently since there is no intelligent principle which can guide the officials in exercising it. The system must develop into gross favoritism and almost certainly into corruption. Tariff legislation is a scandalous process in every country; but quota fixing by administrative decree can hardly fail to be more scandalous still.

Mr. Strawn, representing his 800,000 American business men, is, of course, in a rather ridiculous position when he comes to Europe complaining about protectionism. We do not have the quota system in the United States, but in the last ten years we have certainly done all we could to prevent international trade. We have had two general upward revisions of the tariff and we have developed a quite masterly technique for preventing imports by administrative rulings. There can be little doubt that the enactment of the Hawley-Smoot tariff in 1930 destroyed the movement under way for a tariff truce. For ten years Congress and the administrations have done their best to stop imports into America. In view of this record, it is embarrassing to find the president of the United States Chamber of Commerce lecturing the European on the wickedness of interfering with trade.

But, though there is scarcely a nation which is in a position to criticize any other in matters of this sort, there is a very good reason why France and the United States should help each other to realize the insanity of the policies they are pursuing. They are the only two great nations left on the gold standard and both profess to have a vital interest in the restoration of the gold standard in the world. The simple fact is that the gold standard is unworkable under arbitrary tariffs, embargoes, administrative embargoes and exemptions. Unless the gold countries, France and America, are willing to let imports come in under the stimulus of higher domestic prices, the gold standard can not be made to work. It can be made to work under high tariffs, after a time of readjustment, but it can not be made to work under a system which arbitrarily destroys imports regardless of price.

It is no exaggeration to say that if France and America wish to see the currencies of the world stabilized again in relation to gold, they must lead the way to tariff stability by enlightening themselves on the subject of protection. Their present behavior, the recklessness of their protectionism, is bound to postpone indefinitely the kind of stabilization which Messrs. Hoover and Laval proclaimed as their objective last November.

For the countries which are not on gold are a powerful aggregation and they are quite plainly in no hurry to come back to gold. They will have to be shown the advantages and they will have to be provided with assurances that the world has not gone permanently mad on the subject of protection.

Thousands Pay Final Homage To George Eastman

ROCHESTER, N. Y., (UP)—Thousands of persons lined East Avenue and paid homage to the memory of George Eastman, millionaire kodak manufacturer whose enterprises and philanthropies extended to the far corners of the world.

Six of Eastman's most intimate friends carried the casket of the man who, at the age of 77, ended his life because he felt his work was completed.

The pall-bearers were Dr. George H. Whipple dean of the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry; Dr. Audley D. Stewart, Eastman's personal physician and friend; Charles F. Hutchinson, general superintendent of film at Kodak Park; Martin B. Johnson, big game hunter, who accompanied Eastman on his African expeditions; Dr. Albert K. Chapman, kodak company production manager, and Dr. Albert D. Kaiser, who was Eastman's companion on a trip to the African jungle lands.

Within the church of which Eastman's mother was a devout member—St. Paul's Episcopal—1,200 of Eastman's friends, including some of the nation's best known men, heard the Rev. Dr. George Edward Norton read the last rite. An amplifier carried his words to 300 more assembled in the parish house and to thousands of others who thronged the streets.

Jack Dempsey Comeback Is Boxing's Hope

NEW YORK (UP)—The shadow of Jack Dempsey, greatest figure in boxing's golden days fell across the fight picture again as the year 1931 slipped into history.

For the game at large Dempsey is the symbol of prosperity, the chief hope for a New Year that should surpass in every respect 1931 and its small purses, scarcity of attractions, and public apathy.

The start of another Dempsey comeback campaign along the trail that ended disastrously against Gene Tunney and the long count in Chicago in 1927 opened during the past fall with a series of exhibition matches against routine sparring partner opposition in the west.

But even these popover festivals, designed merely to fight Dempsey back into shape at 37, outranked in interest to the paying clients the ordinary doings among the heavyweights, busiest of all the divisions during 1931.

Mauler Twins May Meet The natural that looms for the coming summer season is a battle of the old Dempsey and the new, Max Schmeling, the German who looks enough like the old man mauler to be related.

Schmeling's activity during 1931 consisted of losing championship recognition in New York state, where he was first crowned titleholder for failure to give Jack Sharkey a return match, and truncating Bill Stribling the night before the Fourth of July in Chicago.

Schmeling scored a technical knockout over the southerner in the 15th round on an engagement that was the "big money" shot of the year. It grossed \$273,710.91 with a paid attendance of 30,830, and yet Madison Square Garden lost at least \$200,000 on the deal.

The rise of Walker, former middleweight king, Tommy Loughran's comeback and recognition of Primo Carnera as something more than a circus freak, provided what other excitement there was in the division.

With the light heavyweight, mid-

dweight, bantamweight and flyweight divisions stagnant, Loughran provided the brightest action of the year. Fighting his way back after Sharkey knocked him out two years ago, Tommy in succession outpointed Max Baer, Tuffy Griffiths, Victorio Campolo, Joe Sakya, Johnny Risko and Paulino Uzcudun, but was decisively beaten by King Levinsky as the year drew to a close.

Discarding the policy of whipping tankers in tank towns, Carnera beat Jimmy Maloney in Florida to earn reinstatement by the New York commission, but lost an exciting 15 round engagement to Jack Sharkey at Ebbets Field October 12.

This engagement returned Sharkey, held to a 15 round draw earlier in the year by little Mickey Walker to the front ranks again just as Carnera's two round knock-

out of the lanky Argentine, Victorio Campolo, made more evident the giant Italian's possibilities.

Only two title changes took place during the year, but in the welterweight division, Tommy Freeman of Cleveland, who had beaten Young Jack Thompson for the crown, lost it to the negro in April, Lou Brownard, Worcester.

Southward, moved into the select circle by outpointing Thompson in 15 rounds in Boston October 23. Brilliant Tony Canzoneri, best of the fighting champions, kept the excitement high in the lightweight class and Christopher "Bat" Battalino, featherweight ruler, stamped himself a real titleholder among the 125 pounders.

Canzoneri three times defended his title, knocking out Jackie Kid Berg in three rounds in Chicago,

outpointing him here in a return match, and completely the turn by whipping Kid Chocolate in 15 brilliant rounds in Madison Square Garden November 20.

After beating Kid Chocolate to wind up 1930, Battalino took on the two strongest challengers in his division, Fidel LaBarba and Earl Mastro, beating Fidel here in 15 rounds in May and Mastro in Chicago November 4.

Inactivity cost Maxie Rosenbloom his light heavyweight crown as far as the National Boxing association was concerned. The other divisions developed little important action.

AUSTIN (UP)—A huge cat-fish and a "catch" of bass received here today indicated the prowess of State Comptroller George H.

Sheppard as an angler. The fish were caught in Mexico. A business trip took Comptroller Sheppard to South Texas. At Laredo he was joined by Amadeo Ligarde, Webb county tax collector, for a fishing excursion. The "catch" received here today by Mrs. Sheppard was sent from Laredo. The fishing hole was not disclosed. Sheppard is expected back early next week.
