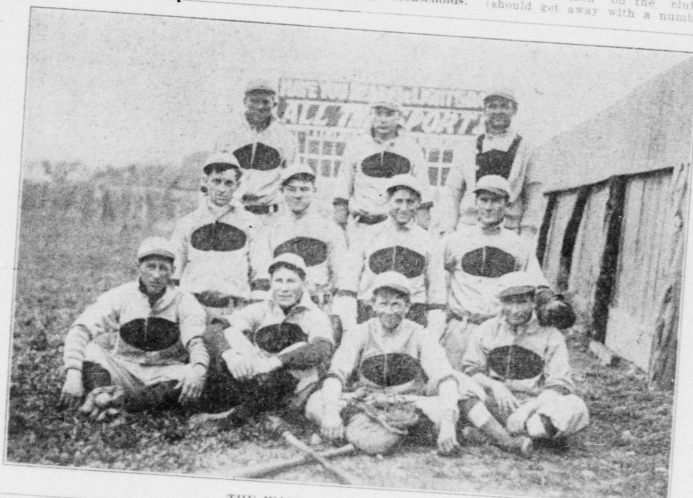
Mr. Leitner has also had much experience in amateur baseball, having played successively with the King Drug Company, the Dalkowitz Bros. and the Crescent baseball teams.

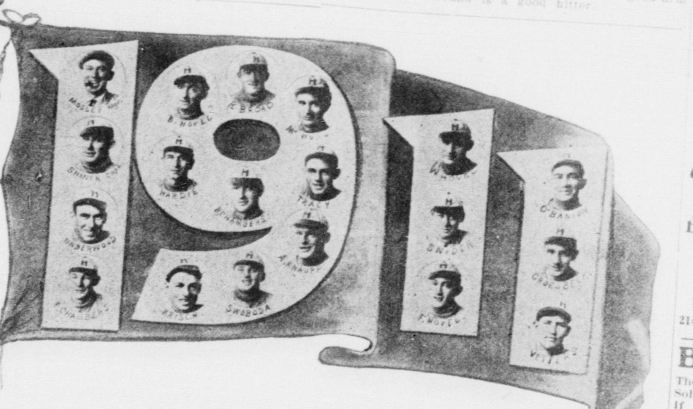

**Big Irrigation Project**

A large and enthusiastic meeting was held at the Court house in Junction on the night of the 26 to listen to the proposition submitted by W. C. Linden in reference to the construction of an irrigation dam and ditch near Junction and to consider the advisability of the land owners of the Llano valley accepting the same.

Mr. Linden in addressing the audience stated for several years it had been one of his constant dreams he one day expected to see realized that of applying the water of the Llano river to the fertile valleys bordering it and in this manner converting comparatively unproductive land into the most productive in the State. Mr. Linden gave some of his experiences in running the necessary levees for the proposed irrigation ditch and in this manner showed to the audience that a large body of land of at least 12,000 acres could be put under irrigation by the gravity system.

To do this it would be necessary to construct a large dam about 10 miles from Junction on the South Llano river, and if it should be necessary, storage dams that would hold a sufficient quantity of storm water to supplement the natural flow of the river. Mr. Linden referred to the irrigation laws of the state showing that no injury would result to the riparian land owners below the dam. To construct the system contemplated Mr. Linden stated that at least \$250,000 or \$300,000 would be required. To obtain this it was necessary to solicit the aid of the citizens of Kimble county to put the money to put the project under way even if they were disposed to do so. Reference was then made to the present irrigation ditch to show that no people with the requisite capital would put their money into it as had done builders of this ditch, because they would be in a position where the land owners could practically confiscate the investment. Mr. Linden was willing to assure the land owners that the system he proposed would be constructed if they would sell to the proposed company one-half of the lands under the water of the ditch for the sum of \$10 per acre. That the same value would be given at this time and that the land owners in this case, and that the price he offered is a fair percent value for the land. This is the way the land owners could get for one-half of the land and that it is well at the present time that we put it in a ditch company in a position to get the money to get the ditch started.

From the increased value of the land which their efforts would give to the land owner would mean a return to them from their investment. From the sale of their lands they would get at the present time Mr. Linden then proposed the order to protect the land owners under the contract he proposed for them to give that a committee of the citizens of the county should be appointed to draft such reasonable statutes as they might require from Mr. Linden, and those representatives to be elected to thoroughly protect them.

The speech of Mr. Linden was received by with intense interest. Following him the meeting was addressed by Mr. M. E. Blackburn, who highly commended Mr. Linden, and by Mr. Horace E. Wilson, who called the attention of the meeting to the wonderful returns secured from the irrigated lands in Kimble county.

A committee of Nat. Sandberg, G. W. Dodson, E. E. Holt, J. S. Durst, W. A. Quisenberry, J. A. Conner, Horace E. Wilson, M. E. Blackburn, J. B. Randolph and J. F. Reid was appointed by the meeting to prepare a contract for Mr. Linden to sign for the protection of the land owners.

It was the sentiment of the meeting that if the proposition submitted was a liberal one and that the time would soon be when the valleys of the Llano near Junction would resound with the work of constructing the great enterprise, and that Junction would soon be the center of one of the most populous and prosperous parts of Texas.

**LEANOR**  
**WANTED FOR MURDER**

Arrest of Bencho Alfonso Reyes, a Mexican, and Annie his wife, was made here Tuesday by Sheriff Alan and Deputy Snow, of Tom Green County, assisted by Deputy Cox of this place.

On or about March 5, Pando Alfonso Reyes and his wife left Morris ranch in Schleicher county in company with one Mexican Antonio with a pack and team which belonged to the latter. They went to San Angelo and on the way banked in the case of San Antonio, Antonio was killed by a party with him with an axe. A grave was then dug and the dead man buried. Pando and wife then took the pack and team and over-staying belonging to the dead Mexican. Ten or twelve days later Antonio's body was found by a freighter. The Sheriff of Tom Green County followed Pando and his wife into Kimble County; they were located by the Kimble authorities and arrested near the W. R. McKee ranch near Junction Tuesday. The officers with their prisoners left Wednesday morning for San Angelo.

Pando has a reputation as a "bad embryo." It is said that he has killed several men. From present indications it is thought that he will not likely hold any more.

## TEXAS STATE NEWS

**Rockland**—Jesse Patrick and Lewis Ferguson are dead here as a result of injuries sustained when the boiler of a logging locomotive exploded. Jack Best, the engineer, is expected to recover, although severely scalped.

**Dallas**—Case of Burrell Oates, negro, convicted for killing Sol. Aronoff in Dallas in 1924, will be acted on by the court of criminal appeals at Austin. Oates has been convicted of the charge seven times and has been given the death penalty on six occasions. At this time he is under death penalty. The last trial of the case being tried in Ellis county on a change of venue.

**Waco**—While waiting to be called as juror in the County Court C. L. Gunn was suddenly seized with the idea that he was God, and with a yell he warned those near him to not touch his sacred garments. He was overpowered by Deputy Sheriff Moore and Tilley and placed in jail.

**Bryan**—Hamp Palmer, colored, charged with murder in the second degree and who defended himself, was convicted in the District court, the jury assessing his punishment at 20 years in the penitentiary.

**Denison**—Considerable mystery surrounds a murderous assault made on Miss Gladys Richardson Monday night at the home of her parents in the cotton mill addition, south of the city. As the result of the assault the young woman is suffering from three broken ribs, one of which is believed to have penetrated the liver. Her condition is serious.

**Pleasanton**—Two wagon loads of scrapers belonging to the San Antonio, Valverde & Gulf Railroad passed through Pleasanton. They will be utilized in throwing up the grade that is being constructed both ways out of this city. It is no uncommon sight to see teams and wagons on the main street of the city these days.

**Georgetown**—Deputy Sheriff Wayne Magill went to Gatesville to take Ramon Adcock and Jim Weatherly to the State Reformatory. Young Adcock is only 14 years of age and confessed to robbing the Corn Hill Mercantile store at Janel and afterward burning the building and contents. He was given seven years in the reformatory. The boss was about \$15,000.

**Timpsom**—Mrs. Selma Pike, 84 years of age, died in this city. A few days ago, while walking around in the house, her strength gave way and she fell, breaking her left leg and dislocating her hip.

**Lampasas**—Tom Hunt, who has been in jail here since the night of March 12, charged with killing his brother, Fluis Hunt, has been released on bond of \$5000. The case will probably be tried at the approaching term of the district court which will convene in April.

## 25 ARE KILLED IN EXPLOSION

Horrible Death Overtakes Round-house Employees When Fragments of Exploding Locomotive Fly in all Directions.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 25.—Twenty-five men were killed by the explosion of a locomotive boiler in the Southern Pacific round house here. Many more were injured. Most of the dead and injured were strikebreakers who took the places of Southern Pacific shovemen who went on strike several months ago.

So fearfully mangled were several of the bodies that it is thought they never can be fully identified. The railroad shops were partly wrecked.

First reports from the scene of the explosion were that nine men had been killed. Ambulances were rushed to the round house, and when they arrived many of the injured were dying.

Bodies of the workmen who stood nearest to the burst locomotive were torn almost beyond recognition. The shock of the blast was felt for miles, and at first it was believed to have been an explosion of dynamite.

Several men outside the round-house had almost miraculous escapes. Without warning they were caught in the midst of a shower of bricks and twisted iron. Debris falling about them struck many, but others ran from the scene without a scratch.

The cause of the accident has not been ascertained. All who were near when the blast came are either dead or dying, and the other men in and near the building at the time were taken unawares.

## "My Hat Is In The Kitchen"

Expression Col. Roosevelt Is Believed to Have Had in Mind.

Despite the many explanations of Colonel Roosevelt's utterance "My hat is in the ring," Edward Brink, chief of police of St. Paul, says he has the only real story. According to Chief Brink, Colonel Roosevelt learned the remark in North Dakota.

"It used to be the custom of the rancher," said the chief, "after he had been to town and had acquired a 'load' to ride up to the house open the kitchen door a little and toss in his hat. If after a reasonable wait the hat was allowed to remain the man knew his wife was willing to let him come in, but if the hat sailed out again he knew that danger awaited."

"I am sure that Colonel Roosevelt had that in mind when he made that statement. It was an invitation for the people to make known to him whether they wanted him for president. In other words, if they allowed his hat to remain in the ring he would follow it in."

## Quick Trial Saves Negro

Tried, Convicted and Sentenced, All in Five Minutes.

SALISBURY, Md., March 25.—Indicted, secretly tried, convicted and sentenced, all in five minutes, and then hurried in an awaiting automobile and rushed off to the State prison prevented the probable lynching of Emmons Walker, a negro, who confessed to attack upon Miss Ella Bailey, a 16-year-old white girl and daughter of Justice of the Peace William H. Bailey.

The attack occurred in a woods near Hebron on Monday afternoon. It was rumored that a lynching party was being formed in the country near the home of the girl, and that an effort would be made to take the negro from the county jail. The record-breaking trial and conviction of Walker started when Sheriff Roy Smith received a telephone message to the effect that the party was being organized.

Not over five minutes elapsed from the time the negro was brought from the county jail until he was sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary and was on his way to a place of safety.

Georgetown—K. E. Barnhart of Edna in the contest of the Southwestern University Prohibition league, held here, won first place. Barnhart will represent Southwestern at the State intercollegiate prohibition oratorical contest at Greenville April 4 and 5.

Comfort—On Wednesday night Dr. C. C. Jones, chairman of the railroad committee, called a meeting for the purpose of discussing the Fredericksburg railroad, which will be built by R. A. Love. Mr. Love was present beside about fifty of Comfort citizens.

## OPERATION CHANGES HIS MENTALITY

Desperado Who Terrorized West Twenty Years Ago Transformed Into a Kind and Gentle Man by Operation.

MARUETTE, Mich., March 25.—A surgical operation on the brain has changed from a dangerous criminal to a kind and gentle man, Reimund Holzhay, the bandit, known as "Black Bart," who terrorized the west twenty years ago, and a year from next November he will be freed from the state penitentiary. Holzhay received a life sentence in 1880 for holding up a stage coach and incidentally, shooting and killing A. E. Fleischbein an Illinois banker, near Lake George.

Twenty-two years old when captured, Holzhay declared at his trial that his mind had been deranged and perverted by reading so-called dime novels. The court decided that he was a victim of delusional insanity and accordingly he was sentenced to prison for life instead of to death.

In the March following his incarceration he smuggled a table knife to his cell. One day he refused to leave his cell and Warden Tompkins found "Black Bart" holding a guard by the throat and menacing him with the sharpened knife. The warden drew his revolver.

"Let that man go or I'll shoot you," Holzhay laughed. "Go ahead, shoot!" he retorted, holding the pinioned guard between himself and the warden. So they faced each other for two hours. Finally the warden fired and the bullet went through four fingers of the convict's hand.

Holzhay, when he recovered, continued to be intractable. Recalling his plea of delusional insanity, the officials had him examined by alienists. They declared him to be insane and he was transferred to the asylum for the criminally insane at Iona. It was there his brain was operated upon. The operation consisted in removing a piece of bone that had been pressing on the brain.

## Interrupts His Own Funeral

Missing Man Calls Up to Tell Coroner He's Got the Wrong Corpse.

NEWBURGH, N. Y., March 25.—The body of a man found in the woods at Mount Airy, near this city, was believed to be that of Frank Clark of New Windsor. A revolver at his side and a bullet hole through his skull, indicated suicide. The man had been dead all winter, and the only identification possible was by articles in his pockets and clothing.

From there it was determined that the corpse was that of Clark, who disappeared months ago after declaring he would go into the woods and shoot himself. His wife and four children had arranged for a funeral. Just before the service began the telephone bell rang and Deputy Coroner Zellig was informed that the speaker was Frank Clark, who stated he was very much alive.

Clark would give no information as to where he was when speaking, but it is understood he was in Tacoma, Pa.

## BEE KEEPERS' DEPARTMENT

We have made arrangements to have this column devoted each week entirely to beekeeping. We have secured the services of Mr. E. G. LeSturgeon, secretary of the Bexar County Beekeepers' Association, and one of the best known beekeepers in the State of Texas, to conduct this department for our readers. We trust that every one of our readers will take advantage of this opportunity because beekeeping is rapidly becoming one of the most extensive industries in our part of Texas.

The bee is a little insect belonging to the family of which the scientific name is apids. Thus the place where bees are kept is sometimes called an apiary taken from this word apis. The bee gathers nectar from the flowers, which, after undergoing a chemical process in the hive, becomes honey, and is carried to the home of the bees, called a beehive. Each hive of bees is known as a colony. Honey is the main food of the bee, and after enough is carried to the hive for it to live on, the balance is taken from the hive by the bee keeper to serve as food. While

## FARM NOTES

The Date and Citrus Fruits. Very few people know much about the dietary value of the date. The principal use on the table is in the raw, dried state, and it might be used far more frequently, even in this state, to advantage. The date is rich in food value, with its easily digested sugar, and is very energizing. It can be used in many dishes, and is good in all of them. It can be used with oranges, rice, apples, lemon, and in other ways. puddings, stews, meringues, sauces, cake fillings, and an excellent bread is made by its introduction among the ingredients. A very excellent quality of dried dates can be bought for ten cents a pound. It should be fresh, and not too dry from standing exposed in the store.

The citrus fruits are all valuable as foods. They are sources of energy, rather than as nourishers and mineral producers, as containing mineral salts and acids in a form readily assimilated by the digestive organs. The citrus fruits are oranges, lemons, limes, pineapples, citrons and kumquats. Pineapples are marketed under the name of grape fruits, and are not very generally used, but are valuable in their place; they make delicious salads and may be used in various preserves, such as marmalade, jellies, etc.

There are several Farmers' Bulletins sent out by the Department of Agriculture, which give valuable information about these fruits and the methods of preparing them. These bulletins are free for the asking, through the secretary of agriculture, or by application to your senator or congressman.

## POULTRY DEPARTMENT

**MIX YOUR POULTRY FEED THOROUGHLY.** In the profitable operation of a poultry business the mixing of the feed is a factor of great importance. In fact, the whole success of feeding depends upon the mixing. That is to say, a balanced ration is impossible where the ingredients of a ration are not thoroughly inter-mingled. To illustrate, if you were combining 50 pounds of one strain, 10 pounds of another and 25 pounds of still another in order to secure a ration containing a certain per cent of protein, carbohydrate and fat, and they were not thoroughly blended so that the bird ate the proportion of each as intended, it would not have a balanced ration. The results would accordingly. In other words, if the feed is not thoroughly blended, there is little need of using mixed feeds at all, for the chickens would eat practically all of one or another of the ingredients.

The full value of mixed feeds has not been realized by poultrymen, perhaps, as fully as feeders of other live stock. The probable causes are two. First, the results

from mixing have not been what they should have been, because the mixing was not done thoroughly; second, because the labor required was too great. Every feeder of poultry must study closely his problems of feeding and bear in mind this fact—a balanced ration is nothing more or less than one containing the exact amount of each ingredient needed by the fowl to bring about certain results. Then remember this further fact, the full benefit of a ration cannot be realized without its thorough mixing.

## WHITE SLAVES OF THE NORTH

The (Memphis) News-Scimitar (ind.), March 2.—When black slavery became unprofitable in New England, and was transferred to the more salubrious climate of the South, it became odious in the eyes of New Englanders, as it was becoming odious in the eyes of the Southern people. We fought, not to perpetuate slavery, but to resist and drive back invaders who had come before their time. Had they waited, their coming as enemies would never have been necessary. The negroes were freed. The black cloud has been removed and we thank God and our erstwhile enemies and present friends for it. It is all over. Now we can recede. We can do the North a service. We can help her to free her white slaves. We can improve conditions in Lawrence, Mass., and other places where slavery exists, even in the rich iron and coal fields, where poverty and suffering run riot. We will not invade their country with armed legions and hired Hessians. We will not kill and destroy. We will not make a desolation and call it peace. We will not leave their country so lean and spent that a crow flying over it will have to carry rations. We will bid our firm in the faith of Lincoln that no nation can long remain half bound and half free. We know that the cry of "For shame!" is more powerful than sabers and cannon balls when sent against a brave and temporarily unthinking people. We will scourge them, if we must, in love and not in hate. As black slavery passed away, so must white slavery pass away. We will recede, but we will render our service differently. We may not be a better people, but we live in a better era. Our country must not be marred, spotted and mangled by such conditions as exist in the textile and coal regions. We are not too far from it. But we can bring light to those who sit in darkness. We can call them to themselves, and white slavery will become only a horrid memory—a troubled dream.

**DISORDER IN CHINA** Breaking Up of Country by Successive New Thought Probables—At Least Six Hostile Armies Are in the Field—Diplomats Are Perilous—Bismarck of No Real Head to Republic. PEKING, China, March 25.—It would seem that there is no government force, present or prospective, capable of terminating the prevalent disorder. There is little hope among the legations that the coalition government will be successful in ending the mutinous pillaging which is sweeping over the north. One minister said, "It must burn itself out, like a prairie fire."

It is the general belief that order cannot be restored within two years. The breaking up of the country by successive is considered not merely a possibility. There are now not less than six hostile armies in the field. These comprise the northern and southern armies, which the present disorders show are not agreeable to the forced compromise that their leaders are now negotiating; the Manchou troops, which remain a distant body apart from the others; the Mongols, who in large bands are fighting the Chinese garrisons in the north; Gen Steng-Yun's army, composed largely of Mohammedans, and in the province of Yun-nan, an army of independents.
