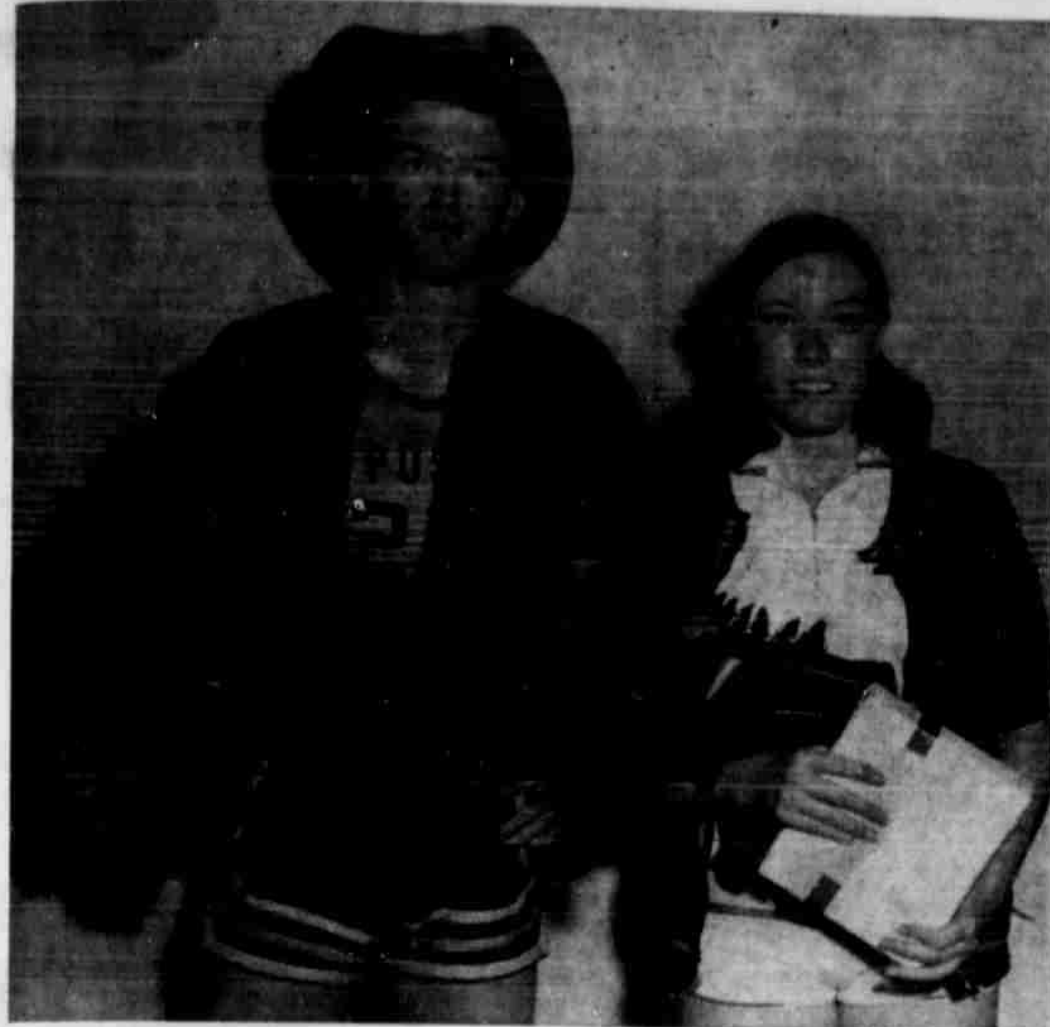




BASKETBALL SWEETHEARTS NAMED

Mayor, three councilmen to be chosen

City officially calls election for April 4

The City Council officially called the city election for Tuesday, April 4, and appointed a new election judge at Monday night's regular February council meeting.

In other action, the council extended the cable TV franchise of the Garza County Broadcasting Co. for one year, passed an ordinance for the appointment of a joint air-

port zoning board, reviewed the police department's January report, and authorized payment of the January bills.

Sexton Huntley was appointed city election judge to succeed T. L. Jones, who asked that he not be reappointed. Huntley has been serving as assistant city election judge.

A mayor and three city councilmen are to be elected in the April 4 election, which will be held at the City Hall. The terms of Mayor Harold Lucas and Councilmen Bob Collier and Lewis C. Herron are expiring along with the appointive term of D. C. (Billy) Hill, whose appointment late last year to replace Leo M. Acker runs only until the April election.

For mixed drinks

No election would be required in wet areas

Gov. John Connally's liquor by the drink plan would automatically legalize mixed drinks in Garza County's wet area, Commissioner's Precinct 3.

According to a wire service story in Sunday's newspapers, no local option election would be required in areas where both beer taverns and package stores already are legal. Mixed drinks would be legal in these areas until voted out by a local option election.

Previously it had been assumed that no mixed drinks could be served until a local option election was held, but an official source who has read Connally's bill said that assumption is wrong.

Elections would be required only in areas that are completely dry, or which have only beer taverns, the official said.

The net result of the governor's proposal, the UPI said, is that Texans could have liquor by the drink in the open and legally before summer gets here.

New airport is opened to planes well ahead of paving completion

Initial landing is made Tuesday

The new Post-Garza County municipal airport, although its two runways and other areas will not be paved until April or May, this week was opened to airport use.

Located two miles east of Post on US-380, the airport received its first plane landing Tuesday when two engineers of the Texas Aeronautics Commission flying from Austin to Lubbock, stopped to look over the new airport facilities here.

TOM GAMBLIN, chairman of the joint airport board, said the two were "very impressed."

Gamblin said the Thomason Construction Company of Denver City, which has been busy with the airport's construction for the last several months, is still responsible for the airport until the paving is completed, but that the firm has agreed to permit planes to use the airport as long as there is no flying off the runways during snow or rain periods.

The Denver City firm will return in April or early May, depending on the weather, to do the paving of the runways, parking apron, access roads, and auto parking area.

A GRAND opening is planned for the new airport, probably in late May, after all work is completed and the airport accepted by the airport board.

The airport will have two paved runways. The longer north-south runway is 3,500 feet in length. The east-west runway is 2,150 feet long.

Gamblin said the longer runway can accommodate company-sized jets, Burlington jets, bringing Burlington officials here on business at their Postex Cotton Mills, are expected to land here in the future.

THE AIRPORT board met Tuesday afternoon to officially adopt airport rules and regulations, approve the hangar area plat, and adopt rental rates and lease terms for hangar sites.

First Brown test for 1967 drilling

George R. Brown's City of Post 36, Well No. 1 was drilling at 2,592 feet yesterday morning.

This is the first 1967 start for the Houston oil man's continued Post area development to five new pay zones in the Gloria and San Andres.

E. R. (Buster) Moreland said today if the test is successfully developed as a triple producer and oil shows are found in either or both of the other new pay zones a No. 2 well will be drilled 30 feet north of the No. 1.

A notice of hearing for a city permit for the drilling of this second well appears in today's edition of The Dispatch.

The No. 1 is being drilled on vacant lots at the west end of the 400 block on West 13th and 14th streets.

Industry hunter job still open

The Post Industrial Foundation is back looking for an experienced "industrial hunter" to head up its efforts to attract new industry to Post.

M. L. McFarlin of Oklahoma City, who was announced last week as coming here March 1 to fill the position, is now out of the picture.

Bryan J. Williams, chairman of the industrial foundation's board of directors, has announced that due to mutual problems which couldn't be solved, McFarlin will not be taking over the foundation's executive job.

Lions hear program on Texas Kerrville camp

Lion Bud Davis was in charge of a program on the Texas Lions Crippled Children's Camp at Tuesday night's Lions Club meeting.

After showing a film, Davis announced that applications are being taken to the camp now. Any interested applicant is asked to contact a member of the Lions Club.

Lion Weaver Moreman reported that \$72 was spent by the club last month on eyeglasses for needy Post school children.

Hundley, treasurer, Giles Dalby, Julian Smith, and Gamblin with County Judge J. E. Parker and Mayor Harold Lucas as ex-officio members.

Victor Hudman, local flyer, already has the first private hangar under construction at the new airport. Gamblin said the board already has received applications for leasing of space for five planes.

Annual lease rates for hangar area space are 75 cents per foot

plus 50 cents per depth foot with frontage leased in multiples of 45 feet, and depth space in multiples of 30 feet.

The leases are for five years with renewal options subject to adjustment in rental rates.

GAMBLIN SAID when all work is completed the airport will cost virtually exactly the amount of available funds—\$38,248.

Half of this amount was provided by federal aid with state aid pro-

viding an additional \$12,000 and the city and county dividing the remaining balance of the cost, slightly over \$16,000 apiece.

Gamblin said the Thomason firm has yet to put up the fence around the entrance road and auto parking area, besides doing the paving.

He said the board is seeking to negotiate with an oil firm to provide aviation fuel and oils for plane use at the airport.

THE BOARD is hopeful of at-

tracting a variety of aviation services to the airport in the months ahead with the possibilities including a charter flying service, a plane repair firm, flying instruction, etc.

Both the city and county have budgeted small amounts for annual airport maintenance. All airport revenue will be held in the airport fund and cannot be spent until properly budgeted, Gamblin pointed out.

Power progress cited to Rotarians

The electrical power industry in the United States will increase seven times what it is today by the year 2,000 Glen Barley told Post Rotarians Tuesday noon in a National Electric Week talk.

He pointed to some of the "exotic power sources" now being sought — such as the fuel cell, which transforms chemical energy directly into electricity, and the thermionic tube, which converts heat directly into electricity.

The Post manager of the Southwestern Public Service Co. said his firm with nine other power companies in the Southwest, are conducting an atomic energy research program.

If the program eventually is successful, then some day seawater will become the fuel source for the generation of electric power.

The heavy hydrogen, known as deuterium, in one gallon of seawater from the Gulf of Mexico contains the energy equivalent of 350 gallons of high octane gasoline.

"This is the fuel source we are seeking to harness," Barley said.

Clark is executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission and one of the foremost experts in the field.

It was also through Clark's invitation that a group of local business leaders went to Austin in the fall for a one-day industrial clinic conducted specifically for them by Clark and his TIDC professional staff.

Dinner will be served at 7 p.m. Dick Dickson, personnel manager of Postex Cotton Mills, will serve as master of ceremonies.

Post's man and woman of the year also will be honored. Their identities will be revealed at the banquet.

Glen Barley, retiring Chamber president, will turn over the gavel to Verno nScott, incoming Chamber president, at the end of the banquet program to launch a new club year for the civic organization.

The wholesome influence of Scouting

The Boy Scouts of America — over five and three-quarter million of them — are celebrating the 57th anniversary of their organization this week, Feb. 7 to 13. Scouting is dedicated to teaching boys how to do things for themselves and others.

Working to build friendship and understanding between the people of all countries, scout associations of 86 nations now coordinate their efforts through the Boy Scouts World Conference. Although each national association is independent in its organization and methods, the World Conference works to establish common ground in thinking and action among all its member associations.

One of the major highlights of 1967 will be the Twelfth World Jamboree to be held at Farragut State Park in Idaho next August. The first to take place in the United States, it will bring together more than 15,000 scouts from 100 free nations. Although they will speak many dozens of different languages and come from widely varying religious, economic and cultural backgrounds, they will for a time share common experiences and pleasures and be united in the purpose of building world friendship.

Every society in every nation has vested its hope for tomorrow in the caliber of its youth. For youngsters without purpose or inspiration will grow into a generation without leadership or concern.

Young men must be well trained in the duties and opportunities of citizenship. They must develop strength of character and an intense loyalty to the institutions of freedom. They must be physically fit and mentally keen. The Boy Scouts of America adopt these qualities as goals.

Boy Scout Week calls our attention to the wholesome influence of Scouting on the lives of millions of Americans — and thus on our progress as a nation. It is also an occasion for commending the volunteers and sponsors who sustain the Boy Scout movement.

The Dispatch especially salutes the Boy Scouts of Post and the newly-reactivated Cub Scout pack, their sponsors and volunteer leaders. In the work they are doing, the Boy Scouts and their adult leaders deserve the respect and support of all of us. Building character in boys today shapes men of whom the world can be proud tomorrow. —CD

With modifications. (Will be shipped to you in kit form; put together — if you can — yourself. Glue optional.)

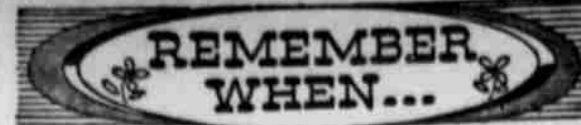
To give someone the picture. (A long, confused and inaccurate statement to a newcomer.)

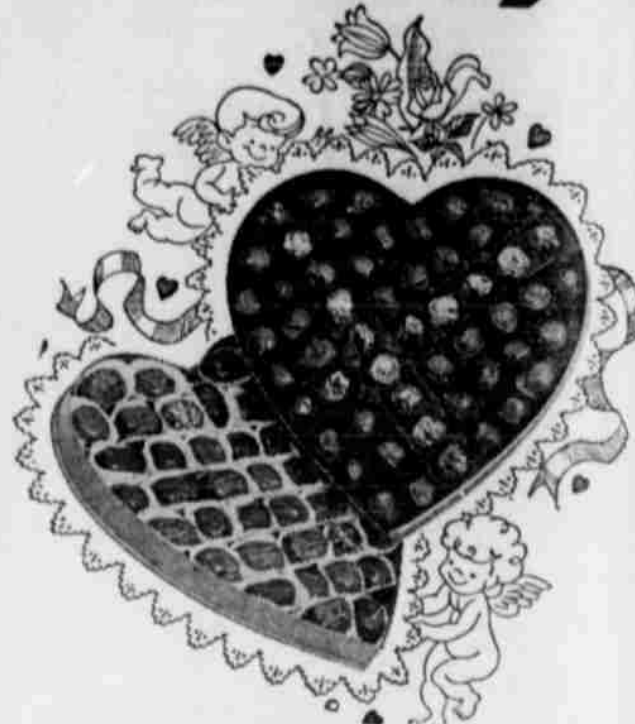

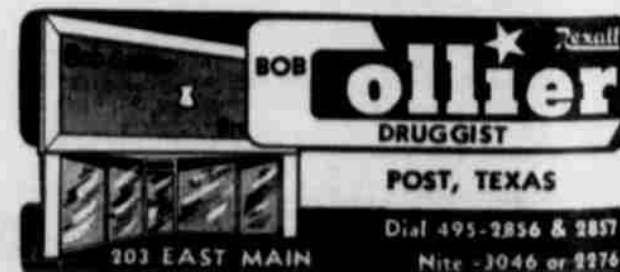

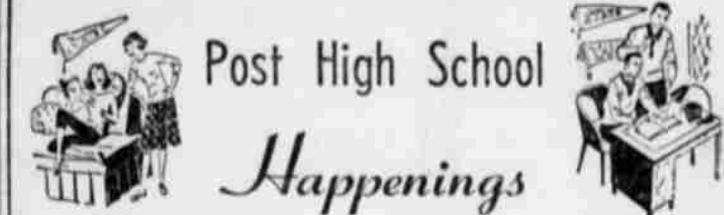
The Language Arts classes were privileged to hear Mr. Dave Sanford, local radio station owner, speak to the 8th grade classes on communications.

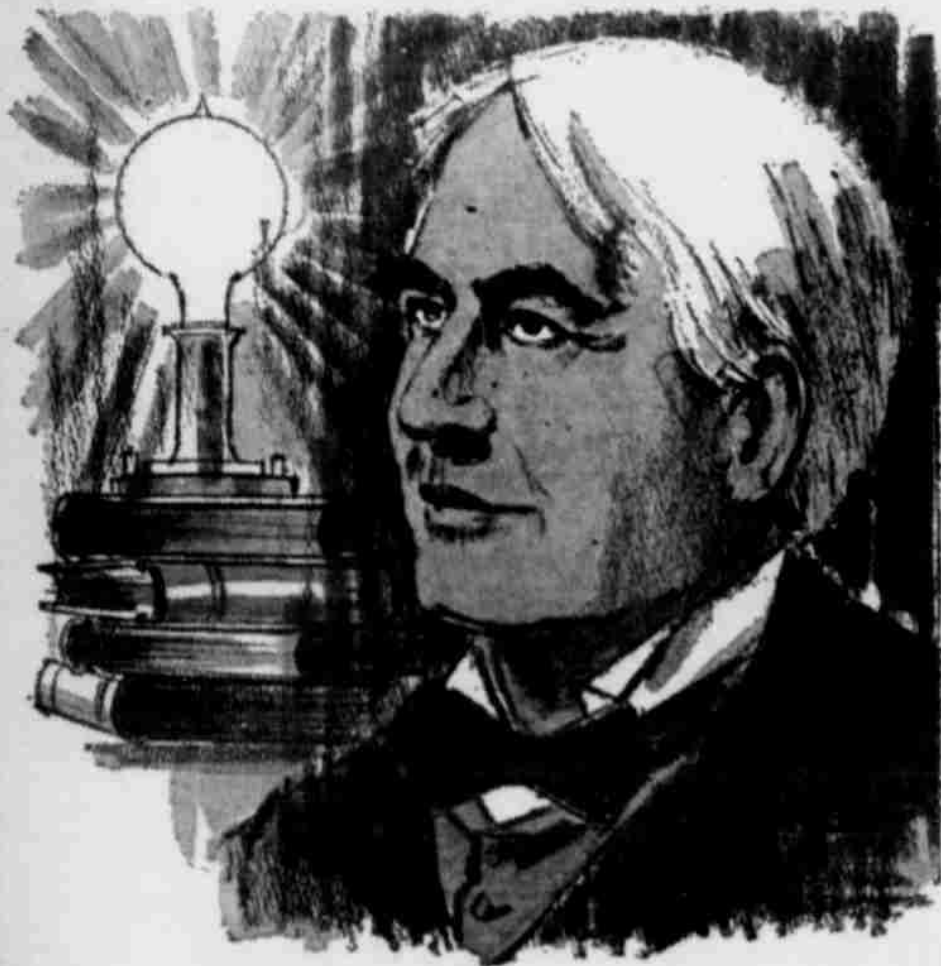

Quarterly clinic for crippled children is to be held Sunday

LUBBOCK — The quarterly session of Cripple Children's Clinic for South Plains children will be conducted Saturday, Feb. 11, from 1 to 5 p.m. at St. John's Methodist Church, 15th & College Avenue, Lubbock.

The clinic is free to crippled children of Lubbock and the surrounding area through the cooperation of doctors and the sponsors, Fellowship Class of St. John's Church. Four orthopedic surgeons will be present to examine the children Saturday. City-county nurses from several counties are to assist.

The clinic has been financed by contributions. Clinic personnel will arrange for braces and further care when necessary. Braces and appliances for 75 different patients and approximately 320 pairs of shoes have been donated.

More than 400 children have received free examinations since the first clinic in April, 1963.

Children being taken for the first time are to be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

trip are expected to stay for dinner, not just the coffee.

The Stran steel building, trimmed in beige brick, is located on a point overlooking the lake and the dam. It is 40 by 58 feet with the main dining room approximately 40 by 50 feet. There also is a private party room seating 20 with a fireplace for added atmosphere. The main dining room seats 76.

Thick red carpet covers the dining room and the red cloth-covered dining tables are accented by wrought iron Spanish candleholders. The rich pecan paneling on the interior wall of the dining room (the other three sides are of glass for maximum viewing) is also used throughout the building.

Mrs. Hash has incorporated her interest in astrology into the Spanish decor of the restaurant, using a wall piece of the symbols of the Zodiac as a principal decoration. Signs of the Zodiac also appear on the menus and in accent pieces.

Black leather is used on the captains' chairs in the party room and on the dining room chairs. All of the tables are square, but have rounded leaves which may be raised around the table to seat a party of six.

Another conversation piece is the entrance sidewalk to the restaurant which is covered with indoor-outdoor carpet.

Atmosphere lighting in both dining room and party room may be brightened or dimmed as the occasion demands. The building also is equipped with stereo for soft music and has central heating and air conditioning.

A ventilator runs almost the length of the efficiently designed kitchen and covers the large charcoal grill and the stainless steel grill. There are a large stainless steel refrigerator and freezer opposite the cooking area with a walk-in refrigerator and extra storage space situated at the rear of the building. All fixtures are raised in order that the entire floor area may be easily cleaned. The automatic dishwasher both washes and sterilizes the dinnerware in three minutes.

Carpeted lounges and the office are located in the center of the restaurant building.

The restaurant is the second brand new facility offered the public at the lake. The new White River Marina Store, also a steel building, was opened last summer.

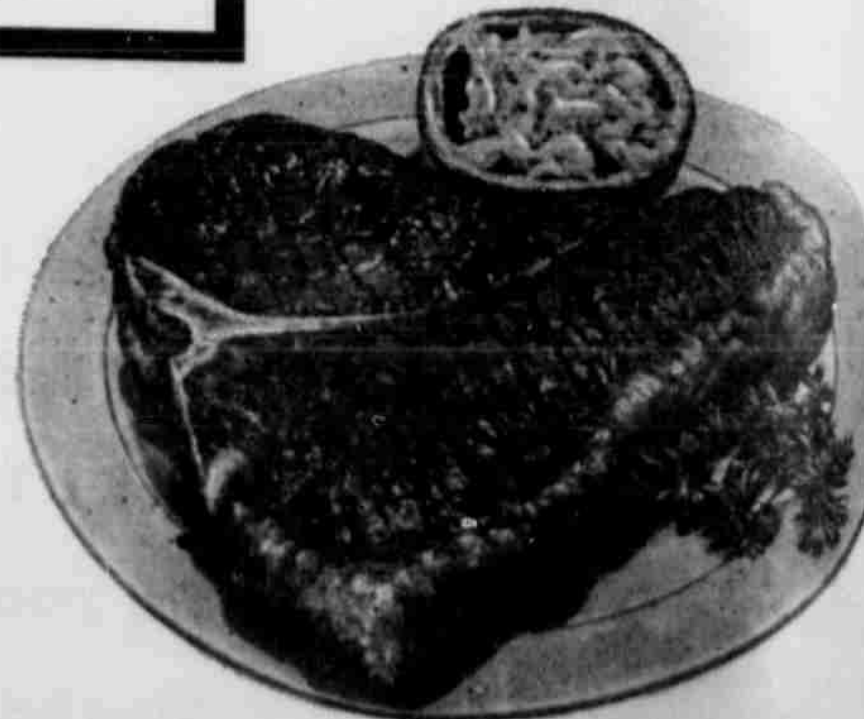

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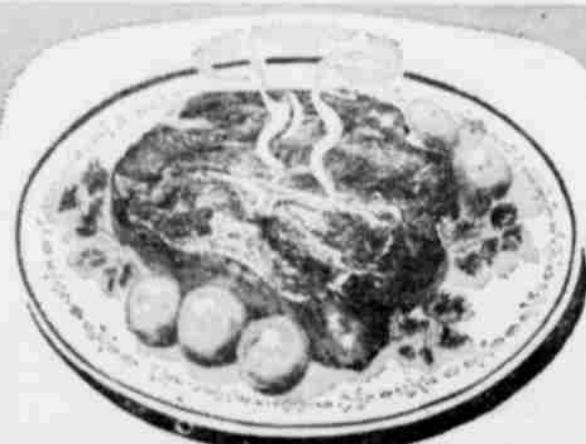
