Scrap Iron Week To Be Observed March 9 to 16

Market Price Assured For All Scrap Brought In

Theater Tickets To Be Given Boys And Girls Bringing Largest Amount

The week of March 9-16 has been officially designated as "Scrap Iron Week" for this county by the Dawson County USDA War Board, of which C. M. Burton is scrap iron chairman.

Audrey Cox, operator of the Palace, Majestic and Tower Theatres is offering free theatre tickets to the two boys and two girls who bring in the largest loads of scrap iron during the week, and will also give theatre tickets to the boy and girl bringing a load from the farthest distance.

Mr. Burton assures all persons in this county, that the top market price will be paid by local buyers for all scrap brought in during the week, and says that they will buy every bit of scrap iron brought in.

The USDA War Board estimates that there are several thousand tons of scrap metal on the farms of this county, and if brought in will be put to some useful purpose in the war effort.

The full cooperation of all persons in the county is requested in this scrap iron drive, and every one is urged to "Slap a Jap" by bringing in their scrap some time during the week.

WAR FLASHES!!!

(By The Associated Press)
Bandoeng, Java, Friday, March 6 — Holding out the hope that "at any moment the attack on the enemy will be launched from another side" by the allies, the lieutenant-governor-general of the Dutch East Indies urged Java's inhabitants to continue their stout resistance to the Japanese in an address last night before the people's council.

BANDOENG, Java, March 5 — The Japanese invaders drove forward with pinners movements today against Batavia and Bandoeng, having cut the railway linking those centers of resistance to the third focus of defense, Soerabaja, port and naval base of eastern Java.

The enemy was within 10 miles of Batavia on the west of that former capital and 25 miles from Bandoeng, present seat of the government, at three points to the north which included a good airfield to base his fighters and dive-bombers.

DON BOLT

Don Bolt, traveler, journalist and commentator will speak to the people of Lamesa, Wednesday evening, March 11, at 8:30 o'clock. He is brought here by the Lamesa Rotary Club, through their Institute of International Understanding.

Mr. Bolt has served in the British Merchant Marine and in the British and American forces during the first World War. Subsequently he traveled extensively throughout the United States and around the world, his latest adventure being the spending of the summer of 1939 in Continental Europe, especially in Germany.

During his newspaper career he served the staff of the Chicago Herald and Examiner; the Indianapolis News, and the St. Louis Globe Democrat. His career with the Indianapolis Post was highlighted by special assignments he was privileged to receive to "cover" mine wars of West Virginia and Illinois, and the renowned "evolution" trial in Dayton, Tennessee.

Following the metropolitan newspaper career he became radio commentator for the National Broadcasting Company and later served as news editor and staff commentator for station WAAF, Chicago.

Because of a special interest in and aptitude for understanding international events and their meaning for the United States, Mr. Bolt has recently entered upon a career of free lance writing, commenting and lecturing on foreign affairs.

Mrs. Sammie Tate Pitman, Home Economics Instructor of the Union Public School, was the principal speaker, and gave some very interesting and valuable information on gardens and gardening.

Mrs. Pitman recommended that every family in Dawson County should have a garden, either of the frame type or field garden. For persons living in town she recommended the use of a frame garden, stating that it would grow sufficient vegetables to supply the family's daily needs.

Following her talk, various Lions asked her a number of questions relating to gardens, and a number of them signified their intentions of growing a garden of some sort.

Co-operation Of Parents Asked In School Census

Scholastic census time is here again, and with it the concurrent reminder of the fact that our local schools always need all the help they can get.

State aid of \$22.50 per capita is granted school districts on the basis of total scholastic registration. It stands to reason that the more complete the annual census, the more state revenue will be forthcoming to the local systems.

Cooperation by the public in the enumeration of every child between the ages of 6 and 18 becomes more than a mere formality. It is a civic responsibility to see that the local district gets all the state apportionment it is entitled to.

Parents who have children whose names have not heretofore appeared on the roll are especially requested to be on the look-out for Mrs. Leslie Pratt so that all children may be properly enumerated.

If you have reason to believe that some eligible scholastic has been overlooked, you are requested to notify the school authorities.

This public assistance in the enumeration is a simple thing, but it is a vital thing to the operation of our educational system. Help all you can.

Cotton Insurance Deadline Near

Cotton Crop Insurance guarantees a cotton crop in 1942. Have you insured your interest?

Twenty five hundred notices have just been mailed to operators and landlords in this county. Your notice shows, first, your 75 per cent seven year average production; second, your premium rate in pounds of lint cotton per acre. The two principal questions asked are: How much will it insure? and how much will it cost?

If you will check the following example, you will be able to work out the answers for your farm. Assuming the farm yield is 172 pounds and the premium rate is 22.1 pounds and assuming the price of cotton is 20c, this would amount to \$4.42 per acre. If your allotment is 50 acres, then the total cost would be \$221. Now multiply 172 pounds times 50 and you will have 8,600 pounds, which is the total amount insured. Assuming that cotton will be 20c, and a total loss results, then you would receive \$1720 plus 19 per cent for cotton seed, which would total \$2,046.80 collected for total loss.

Since March 15, 1942, is the final date for taking advantage of Crop Insurance, all cotton producers should make application as soon as possible. No time extension will be made inasmuch as fixed dates have been previously set by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

This amount, together with the \$1,836.25 previously reported, makes a grand total of \$2,075.00 worth of Defense Stamps purchased by the Elementary School children.

The Fourth Grade room, taught by Miss Billie Crausby, still leads the school this week, with total purchases of \$488.10 in stamps. Miss Vivian Cook's room in the primary building still leads in that part of the school with total purchases of \$66.60 worth of stamps.

Farmers of America—Uncle Sam Needs Your Scrap Iron!

Makes Appeal For Prompt Action By Citizens In Buying Defense Bonds And Stamps

Our country is in immediate danger. So many American citizens have not yet realized that their country is in the most serious plight in its history. Our errors of the past have been many and need not be blamed on any one person or group of persons. Our duty now is to fight our way out of the circumstances that threaten to destroy our very life and civilization.

This is no time to haggle over the cost, or to console ourselves with self-pity over economic disadvantages. Dawson County Fall Short On Feb. Bond Quota

F. T. McCollum, county chairman of the sales of Defense Bonds and Stamps for Dawson County, reported Wednesday that this county had not reached its quota for the month of February.

Mr. McCollum stated that this county's quota was approximately \$45,000 per month, and that sales amounted to \$57,000 for January. However, during February it was a different story, with sales totaling only \$32,000, which is about \$13,000 short of the quota.

Many counties in this area went far above their quotas for February, and it is thought and hoped that Dawson county will do as well during the balance of the year.

Mr. McCollum recommends a systematic buying of bonds by every person in the county, and as soon as this is done the county will be in better shape to meet its quota.

It was also reported that teachers in the Lamesa schools have signed up one hundred per cent to buy a bond a month.

Home Guard Unit Calls For Recruits

The Dawson County Home Guard Unit, which has been drilling twice a week for the past several months, is this week issuing a call for new recruits.

Due to the army draft and enlistments in the armed forces, the company roster is considerably below standard, and unless some new recruits sign up, it is likely that the company will have to suspend work.

A permanent organization of non-commissioned officers has been established, and these men are expected to carry on with the work as long as sufficient members continue to attend. They are especially interested in having all persons who expect to see army service within the next few months attend the drills, as they believe it will help them considerably after induction into the regular army.

Meeting nights are still Monday and Thursday of each week, and all interested persons are cordially urged to come out.

Plenty Of Sugar Promised For Home Canning

Housewives are going to have plenty of sugar for home canning this summer and every effort is being made to have it available. That is the assurance of J. B. Joyce, acting manager of the War Production Board's Southwest priorities field office in Dallas.

Mr. Joyce emphasizes that monthly allocations of refined sugar are taken into account the sugar that will be needed this summer for home canning.

"The supply may be somewhat limited," he explained, "just as the supply for daily consumption is limited, but it will be sufficient to enable housewives to can what they need."

He added that reports have come to his office that some housewives are buying more sugar than they need for normal family use, and are explaining that they want to be sure of having enough for home canning this summer.

"That sort of buying is unnecessary and it is also unwise," Mr. Joyce warns. "It aggravates a situation that already is difficult. We are making every effort to see that sugar is made available for home canning next summer and Washington advises us that the Office of Price Administration will handle its distribution."

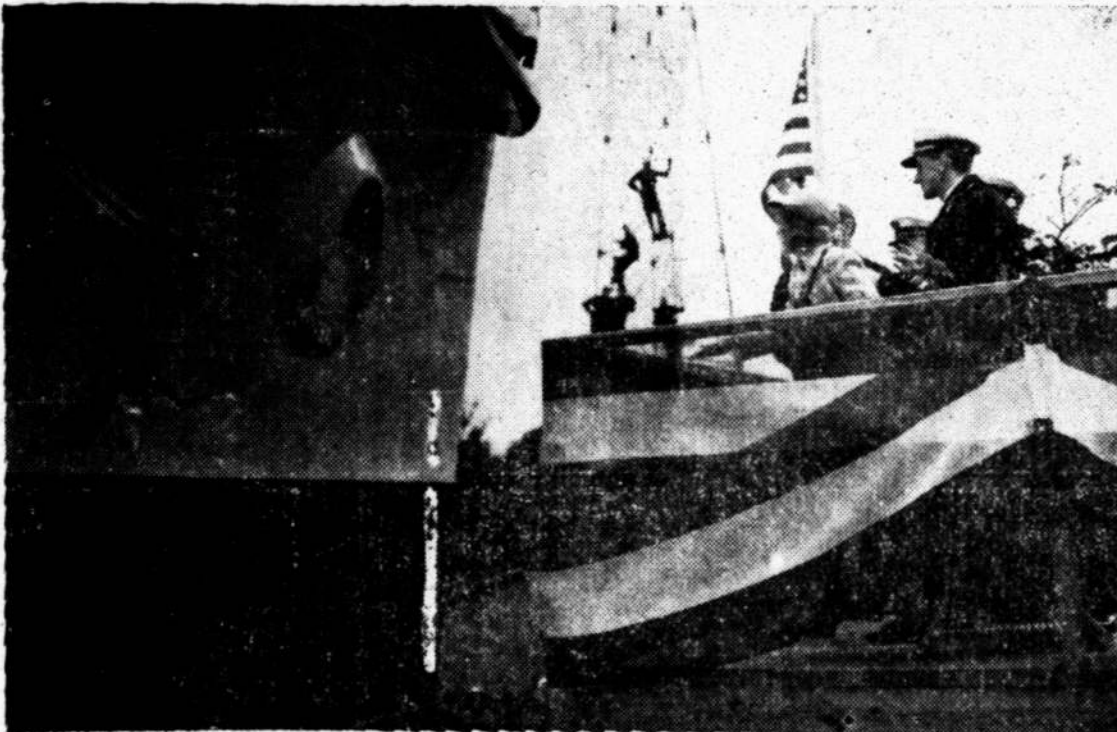
Mary Lu Murray Has Highest School Average

Texas Hens Are Doing Their Part

Texas hens are doing their part in the short war effort, judging by announcements from the USDA War Board today that over 1,900,000 pounds of dried eggs at prices between \$1.06 and \$1.10 per pound were purchased from egg drying plants in the state during January by the Surplus Marketing Administration, U. S. D. A. for Lend-Lease shipment and other purposes.

Since about three dozen medium-sized eggs are required to make one pound of dried eggs, purchases last month represent around 5,970,000 dozen small eggs. It was pointed out dried eggs are especially important during these days because they take

Poultry Industry In Texas Valued At Sixty Million

Poultry in Texas is a sixty million dollar industry and still is growing, according to Geo. P. McCarthy and H. H. Weatherby, poultry husbandmen of the A. and M. College Extension Service. Eggs alone accounted for \$46,250,000 in 1941, turkeys for \$10,000,000 and the remainder from the hatchery stock and sale of poultry meat, ducks, geese and breeding stock.

The industry was ranked only by cotton, beef cattle and dairying in agricultural income. It put more money in farmers' pockets than did wheat, oats, rice, barley or peanuts. In Texas, poultry is a small flock business. Farmers carry an average of 46 laying hens, while those in Iowa, for example, carry an average of 137. The large producing counties lie in a wide north-south strip through central Texas, with the Western Plains area becoming more important yearly. There is a mark trend toward intensive areas with large flocks adjacent to metropolitan centers, the specialists say, but development of trucking services has tended to spread out such areas.

Your Farm Can Help

State Commission To Accept No More Road Bonds

AUSTIN, Feb. 23 — To prevent a possible default in payment of county and road district bonds previously assumed by the state where used in the construction of State highways, the Highway Commission has announced that it will decline to take advantage of the provisions of the bond assumption law passed last September under which several millions of dollars of county and district bonds could not be used for new state highway construction.

The action of the commission was taken in anticipation of a heavy decline in revenues from the gasoline tax due to restricted travel during the war emergency. The Commission stated it was impossible to calculate accurately the amount of income to the road bond redemption fund from the one cent of the gasoline tax set aside to service obligations made eligible by previous legislation and that it was unwilling to place additional burdens on the road bond fund in the face of declining revenues.

The law permits the Highway Commission to accept county and road district funds from bond issues where the issues were voted prior to Jan. 2, 1939. Proceeds from these bonds, when used on state highway construction, would be eligible for payment from the road bond fund on the same basis as bonds assumed under the original law passed in 1932 and its subsequent amendments. The statement of Commission

sion policy was issued by D. C. Greer, state highway engineer, who also is chairman of the Board of County and District Road Indebtedness.

It was also pointed out that as a result of the war there was a critical deficiency in many of the materials needed in heavy highway construction and that highway construction costs had increased substantially. More economical construction would be obtained after the war when prices return to their former levels, the Commission indicated.

"Restrictions on the motor industry will necessarily bring about a substantial reduction in the gasoline tax revenues at least for the duration of the war," the Commission stated. "It appears that such reductions in revenue will present a most serious problem to the Board of County and District Road Indebtedness in providing funds for servicing of bonds heretofore assumed by the state. Therefore, it shall be the policy of the Commission to refrain from the acceptance of funds from bond issues and insofar as the Highway Commission is concerned all future construction of highways shall be on a 'pay as you go' basis from funds currently available."

The Commission directed that a copy of its statement of policy be sent to all county officials with the suggestion that "a similar study in the individual counties be made with the expectation that such studies will reveal to the county officials that bond issues for the construction of roads are not advisable, at least under present conditions."

Military Spending To Be Boosted Rest Of Year

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 — Administration leaders disclosed today that a 30 per cent increase in war production had been charted for the next four months in a progressive speedup that is expected to boost military expenditures to nearly \$5,000,000,000 monthly by the end of the year.

Senator McKellar, (D-Tenn.), floor manager for a \$32,762,737,900 military money bill pending before the Senate, said the appropriations committee had been informed that a total of \$13,684,000,000 would be spent for war purposes in the five-month period from January 31 to June 30. This would compare, he said, with \$16,000,000,000 spent from July 1, 1940 up to February 1, 1942.

The treasury reported that national defense expenditures for January were approximately \$2,100,000,000 and this amount would have to be raised to an average of \$2,737,000,000 for February and the next four months, or an increase of 30 per cent, in order to attain the new goal.

Committee members said they expected much more rapid acceleration of expenditure in the latter part of the year, in keeping with President Roosevelt's \$56,000,000,000 war budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

"Price Administrator Leon Henderson, speaking in New York last night, said that 1942 war production would cost the nation more than \$50,000,000,000 and so far at least \$75,000,000,000 in 1943. Because of the vast outlay necessary, Henderson predicted the "level of living" in the United States would sink quickly below the lowest point of the last depression."

McKellar told the Senate yesterday that "practically all" of the \$23,485,000,000 allocated to the War department in the pending money bill would be poured out in this calendar year. There were some exceptions, such as ordinance items, that could not be completed until later, he said.

Second Class Is Getting Started At Air School

MIDLAND Army Flying School, Texas, March 2 — The greatest of all assembly plants for turning out Uncle Sam's secretly trained aerial warriors has been in operation here less than a month, and already it's ahead of schedule.

Indicative of the smoothness and speed of operation at this flying field, latest of the schools developed exclusively to teach tyro bombardiers the art of dropping hell from the heavens, were two announcements made here today.

School officers disclosed that the second class of cadets, which arrived here over the week end from "processing" stations, already has plunged into its intensive program of training. Also revealed was the fact that members of the inaugural class will be graduated weeks ahead of schedule.

The war time tempo is felt here.

Food For Victory Means Canning More Products

By Miss Mattie Phenix
County Home Demonstration Agent

Food Preservation

Canning in wartime: We may expect shortages in the supply of aluminum pressure cookers, metal lids and rubber rings for screw type glass jars, and tin cans. Dealers still have a considerable stock of cookers on hand, and the manufacturers have designed equipment made of substitute metals which we hope will be satisfactory. There is already enough equipment in the hands of Texas farm families to process a tremendous volume of food. Shortages in a chemical used in the manufacture of glass is expected; people who intend to preserve food will do well to start collecting glass containers. There are enough tin cans for normal needs, but lend-lease commitments call for more processing than America has ever done before. Commercial packers will get first call on cans. At the same time we may expect a big increase in home canning, both in the number of families canning and in total volume of food processed.

The Extension Service will recommend increased storage of fruits, vegetables and meats in cured and dried form as one step in relieving any possible shortage of tin and glass containers.

Check Pressure Cookers: Pressure cooker gauges should be checked before each canning season and after any hard jar. This check is especially important now that many people will wipe the dust of years off their canning equipment and start processing food again. Petcocks and safety valves should be cleaned each time food has been cooked or upon containers exhausted in the cooker. To clean, unscrew, take apart and wash in boiling water. Exercise care to see that the parts are not scarred. Use a toothpick or needle to check the openings in the bottom of the cover. Dry carefully and put back together again before storing.

For Odors and Stains in Pressure Cookers: To remove stains and odors from pressure cookers, wash with soap and water and rinse well. Cut up a lemon, put it in the cooker add two cups of water, and hold the pressure at five pounds for five minutes. This will aid in cleaning as well as deodorizing. A double handful of potato peelings may be substituted for lemon to remove the

Poultry

The production goal for Dawson County for eggs, in 1942 is 17,687 eggs. The following are suggestions offered by George P. McCarty, extension poultry husbandman:

1. Buy chicks from reliable hatcheries or breeders who are carrying out an improved program.
2. Feed complete ration of high quality ingredients.
3. Provide succulent green feed.
4. Use sanitary methods and protect birds against internal and external parasites.
5. Fill houses to capacity.
6. Remodel old laying houses and idle buildings to increase efficiency and hen capacity.
7. Increase poultry work among rural young people—4-H Club boys and girls, FFA students, etc.

It will take good hens to do the job. Figures based on a ration of equal parts mash and grain; mash figured at \$3 per hundred and grain at \$2 per hundred, or \$2.50 for the combined feed.

Hen No. 1. Lays 112 eggs per year and consumes 75 pounds of feed—8 or 9 pounds of feed to produce one dozen eggs. Feed cost per dozen is 20 cents.

Hen No. 2. Lays 160 eggs a year and consumes 80 pounds of feed—6 or 6 pounds of feed to produce one dozen eggs. Feed cost per dozen is 12.5 cents.

Hen No. 3. Lays 210 eggs per year and consumes 88 pounds of feed—5 or 5 pounds of feed to produce one dozen eggs. Feed cost per dozen is 12.5 cents.

Wishful Thinking (By The Japs) Is Revealed

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 — If wishful thinking won wars, the Japanese would be far along today on the road to final victory.

A large section of the west coast would be shambles, the Pacific fleet would be little more than a memory, and the native peoples everywhere in the western Pacific would be welcoming the Nipponese invaders with garlands of flowers instead of bullets and bombs.

That, at least, is the broad outline of the radio propaganda picture which Tokyo has been painting since the beginning of the war—presumably for a public it hopes it has in the United States and other United Nations.

The serious purpose of the broadcast claims, officials said today, is to create questioning, uncertainty, lack of confidence and suspicion in this country. While they may also be put out for the benefit of Japanese morale and the morale of Japan's Axis partners, it is not definitely known that all the reports are given to the Japanese people.

They are judged here, therefore, on the theory that they are designed primarily to upset Allied and particularly American morale. In the light of what has actually occurred as compared with what the Japanese reported, officials here have been amused by some of the extravagant claims.

One broadcast purported to deal with the historical background of Wake, the island outpost which the

Japs later captured. Tokyo charged that when American Marines first occupied the island, they killed off all the natives. Actually, until the marines arrived with their own supply of fresh water, the island never supported human life for any prolonged period.

Then there was the matter of the "great west coast panic" after the war's outbreak. The Japs claimed the panic extended all the way from Mexico to the Canadian border.

On another occasion soon after war began they reported that San Francisco, which actually had been blacked out by an air raid warning, was in flames from bombing.

The first damage resulting from enemy action on the west coast mainland occurred only this week in California when a bombardment by a submarine with 5-inch guns caused a total property loss of \$500.

Announcing this action, the Japanese said that the city of Santa Barbara had been devastated.

Other claims included the report, put out through round about Axis channels, that Admiral Thomas C. Hart, chief of the Asiatic fleet, had been killed in action early in February. Secretary Knox disclosed last Wednesday that Hart, officially described as in ill health, is now on his way to Washington.

The aircraft carrier Lexington has become a sort of ghost ship for the Japanese. They have "sunk" her several times. Shortly after the last such report, an aircraft carrier which the navy did not identify participated in the now-famous raid on the Gilbert and Marshall islands.

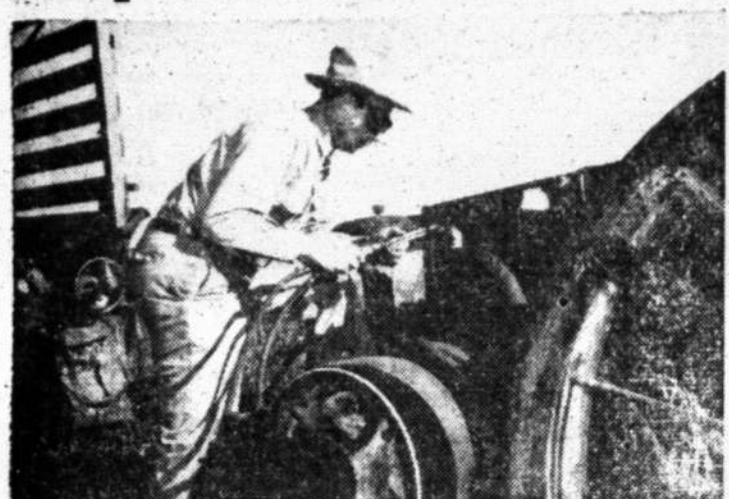

Agriculture Is Ready To Do Its Part In War Program

When war struck the United States, agriculture, unlike so many other industries, already was well underway with its program of conversion to war-time production and thus was well prepared to do its share towards winning the war and writing the peace.

For agriculture started its conversion to war production a year ago when Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard asked for greater production of certain foods which are needed by nations at war. A little later, in July, 1941, he ordered the setting up in every state and every agricultural county in the nation, U. S. Department of Agriculture Defense Boards and to these boards he assigned the task of helping the farmers of America shift from peace time production to war time production.

But, as a matter of fact, agriculture's preparedness goes back much farther than 1940. It goes all the way back to 1933, nine years ago this month, when the then Secretary of Agriculture, Henry A. Wallace, called to Washington a group of farmers with the idea in mind of formulating a program for agriculture. Out of that conference came the National Farm Program which helped agriculture through the depression.

The National Farm Program was more than an emergency measure.

and the people of the United States today can be thankful that they already have in operation a program which has made the conversion of agriculture to war production a comparatively simple matter. Many of the people remember the agricultural measures taken in the last war — measures which resulted in irreparable damage to our soil, and which did their part in so damaging the farmer's economic status that it took 20 years to bring him back to a comparable level with the other groups.

In this war the situation is entirely different. The American farmer already has a program which protects him, which keeps him informed as to what crops are needed and which guarantees him fair prices for the products he raises.

The peace time regulations of the AAA were not perfectly adapted to the war time job, but the basic principles of the program are adapted to any type of economy—war or peace. Regulations which do not fit into the war program are being changed constantly so as to encourage greater production of the foods needed in the war.

Ever since the farm program got underway in 1933, it has been said that it was an "adjustment" program and not just a "curtailing" program. The problem was to find markets for the crops we already were raising. The only adjustments which needed to be made were downward — and the farmers were willing to make them.

But when war began in Europe, the situation changed. Besieged England needed vast amounts of food — enough to feed one-fourth of her population. As the war began to spread, other countries were hard waste, other countries cried out for food.

American agriculture was ready. It had the farm program to help in its conversion to war time production. Agriculture will do its war time job by producing in plenty for the armed forces, for the workmen

who are making implements of war, for the rest of the people and for our allies who need our food if they are to carry on to Victory.

When Secretary Wickard called for a survey of the agricultural plant of the nation, the job was handed to the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, since the AAA had the machinery with which to make the survey.

Thus, last fall the AAA conducted a production pledge sign-up all over the nation, asking each farmer what he could produce to help win the war. Such a sign-up was possible on short notice only because the AAA program is built of, by, and for the farmers. In each agricultural county and community, the AAA is represented by committees themselves to administer the program. These men, working with their neighbors, were able to complete the sign-up and report to Secretary Wickard the amount of food which would be produced this year.

The sign-up was only one of the many which the AAA is carrying out as its share in helping agriculture's war effort, but this is no place to enumerate the various changes which have been made on the program. Suffice it to say that any and all changes which will contribute to the war effort and at the same time not deprive the farmer of his rights are being made.

The people of this country are in this war until Victory and the American Farmer will do his share towards winning that Victory. The United States has the land to produce the foods which are needed, and the country has the Farm Program to help the farmers produce them.

Pilots Wanted For Have You Filed Lighter Than Air Your Tax Return? Naval Training

A class of 80 aviation cadets will convene May 1 at the Naval Air Station at Lakehurst, N. J., for lighter than air training. The Navy announced today.

Requirements for the training in handling lighter than air craft will be the same for students enlisting in Class V-5 for the regular Navy pilot training, according to word received at Eighth Naval District headquarters.

These requirements are a minimum of two years of college for young Americans between the ages of 19 and 27 who can pass the necessary physical examination and present sufficient recommendations.

Additionally, those aviation cadets now on active duty with the Navy will be eligible for transfer to lighter than air training, the announcement said. However, those students who have failed Navy flight training will not be eligible.

Students now undergoing flight training who are nominated for lighter than air instructions will be held at Naval Reserve Air bases pending further instructions.

All requests and applications for the May 1 class at Lakehurst must be forwarded not later than March 20, and final selection of students for the class will be made by the Bureau of Navigation, the announcement said.

Upon successful completion of the course at Lakehurst, the student will be commissioned an Ensign in the Naval Reserve and designated as a Naval aviator with the same pay and allowances as heavier than air pilots.

The Naval Aviation Cadet Selection Board at New Orleans announced concurrently that students wishing to apply for the training could do so at the nearest recruiting station. If considered qualified by the recruiting officer, he will be sent at government expense to the closest flight selection board for a complete physical examination, after which he will be returned home at the expense of the Navy.

Applications for the training will be taken also at the Naval Aviation Selection Board, 910 Canal Bank Building, New Orleans.

Graduates of the course will be assigned to operate the blimps and other lighter than air craft used in coastal defense and observation.

Stimson withheld details of the reinforcements, and also was guarded in comment on the air force which General Douglas MacArthur employed to inflict heavy losses on the Japanese in a surprise raid on Subic Bay in the Philippines.

WASHINGTON, March 5. — Gen. Douglas MacArthur reported to the war department today his belief that thousands of Japanese soldiers were drowned in the surprise raid of his little air force on Subic Bay north of the Bataan fighting front in the Philippines.

Three large vessels which were sunk were identified later, a war department communique said, as transports loaded with enemy troops. Those killed met death by drowning or as a result of explosions of ammunition aboard, the communique said.

Meeting no aerial opposition for the first time since the Pacific war started, none of the American planes were damaged.
