Airplane Hunting Offers Plenty Thrills For Pilot and Gunner

Using an airplane for a mount two local "cowboys of the skies" have accounted for a total of 111 eagles and three coyotes in Brewster, Jeff Davis and Presidio counties the past 30 days.

The plane is piloted by J. O. Casparis, CAA instructor at Starns Field here, and his gunner is Game Warden Ray Williams. Mr. Casparis hires the plane to ranchmen who want the eagles exterminated and Mr. Williams volunteers as gunner.

All of the eagles, with the exception of two, have been killed on the wing at varying altitudes up to 3000 feet. Mr. Williams uses a shotgun to bag birds and it requires the most skillful handling of a plane by the pilot to out-maneuver them. "It's really a big thrill," Mr. Williams said, "and every time I get one I say to myself, 'I wish that was one of them d--- Japs'."

The Mexican golden eagle is a very destructive bird, preying principally on lambs, although they often kill an antelope or a deer fawn. They are especially destructive at lambing time, it being estimated that an eagle will kill from 10 to 20 lambs per year.—Alpine Avalanche.

AUTO LICENSES FOR THIS YEAR AHEAD OF 1941 REGISTRATIONS

Although it appears that many automobiles being driven over the streets of Sanderson and roads of Terrell County at present will be confined to the garage before many months due to a shortage of auto tires, owners have indicated that they plan to drive them as long as possible by purchasing more licenses than were bought in 1941.

Wednesday, April 8, inspection of records at the office of the local tax assessor and collector disclosed that 478 passenger car owners had purchased licenses as compared with 469 for last year. There were also 148 commercial licenses sold for this year with last year's sales amounting to 122. In the farm license class there were less registered this year with 129 recorded while there were 136 bought last year.

A total of the figures show 727 licenses were purchased to date in 1941 and that 755, an increase of 28, registered for this year.

First Annual Spring Race Meet To Be Held at Eagle Pass

The Quarter Horse Race Meeting Association of America will hold its first annual spring race meet at Eagle Pass on April 16 to 19, according to an advertisement carried in this issue of the Times.

There will be five quarter horse races and one long race run each day. There will be a fifty dollar cash purse for each race with entry fee added. Preserve Those New Automobile Tags; 1942 License Plates to Be Used for 1943

Austin—The War Production Board has issued a general limitation order on metallic license plates, the general effect of which is that Texas as well as other states continue the 1942 motor vehicle license plates in use for an indefinite period. The State Highway Engineer announced that the general limitation order affected not only the states but also any political, administrative, or governmental division, sub-division, corporation or agency of any of the states or of the United States, including counties, townships, villages and special governmental districts of all kinds.

The definition of the metallic license plates as covered by the general limitation order includes any type of plate, tag, emblem, insignia or marker which is or may be used by a governmental unit to evidence licensing or registration of any kind and for any purpose into which metal, either ferrous or non-ferrous, is incorporated to the extent of 5% or more by weight of the finished item. Capt. Duke also stated that his equipment is Federal property and any Guardsman found with it after it should have been turned in will be subject to a severe fine. These belts should be turned in now.

Drivers Are Warned To Renew Licenses

Austin—State police reminded motorists with driver's licenses numbering from 900,001 to 1,350,000 that the permits will expire June 30 and should be renewed as soon as possible.

The time for renewing licenses numbered 450,001 to 900,000 expired with the end of March. New licenses may be obtained by applying to highway patrol district officers.

Benevidez Given 30-Day Reprieve

Emello (Shorty) Benevidez, 29-year-old Mexican, sentenced to die in the electric chair April 10 on charges of murder of Henry Calcut, Eldorado ranchman, was granted a 30-day stay, making execution May 10, warden's offices at the state penitentiary at Huntsville informed this week.

Benevidez was sentenced Mar. 10 in 51st District Court at El Dorado by Judge John F. Sutton after the United States Supreme Court denied the Mexican a petition of certiorari. He was found guilty of murdering Calcut by a jury at El Dorado, October 2, 1940. The verdict was later affirmed by the State Court of Criminal Appeals.

Other members of the Calcut family slain at the same time in September, 1940, were the mother, Mrs. Robert L. Calcut, 69, his wife, Mrs. Dardanelle Calcut, 20, and their daughter, Patsy Irene, 2.—San Angelo Standard-Times.

April 27 Set As Registration Day Of Men, 45 to 64

President Roosevelt has set April 27th for the registration of men aged 45 to 64, inclusive. It will be the fourth registration during the current war emergency and the second since the war actually engulfed the United States.

The Chief Executive issued a proclamation, under terms of the Selective Service Act, which provides that:

"The registration of male citizens of the United States and other male persons who were born on or after April 28, 1877, and on or before February 16, 1897, shall take place in the United States and the territories of Alaska and Hawaii, and in Puerto Rico, on Monday, April 27, between the hours of 7 a. m. and 9 p. m."

The usual exceptions were made for persons already in the armed forces and for registration in exceptional class prior to or after the prescribed date. The men registering April 27 will not be liable to compulsory military duty nor will another group, men of 18 and 19, still to be registered.

This Man Tells You How Much to Buy; How Much to Sell

This war has introduced a new volunteer to America—the man on your local rationing board—there are now more than 21,000 like him throughout the country—almost enough for two modern army divisions. His station may be Park Avenue in New York, the ranch country of Montana, the Texas Panhandle.

You may not have seen him, because he works quietly, frequently at night. He doesn't make many speeches. He doesn't wear a uniform. But the public is aware of him because since January 1 he has kept it from getting new tires as usual. It is his job to say who can and who can not, have the less than half a million new cars now on reserve. He decides who is eligible to get new tires now that there are only a few million in stock. He is also Uncle Sam's agent in the rationing of sugar, which brings him in contact with every man, woman and child in the country.

The job these men do to conserve rubber, metals and other vital materials for guns, tanks, ships and planes, could not be done in Washington. It takes a field force, a big one organized to execute plans and instructions almost the day they are made. Such a force is now in operation.

How does it operate? And who see that the operation runs so smoothly? How was the organization of so vast a force created so quickly?

After Pearl Harbor there was no longer any question of business as usual. Factories had to be turned over to war production. Rubber had to be saved. Overnight it became necessary to make sure that the cars and tires on hand were not dissipated in "pleasure as usual."

The job of the rationing board member can't be summarized with the "Yes" and "No" he tells the applicant for a tire, or a car. He has to be able to say "No", of course—but, and this is important—he must make people like it.

Most of Needed Land For Big Bend Park Has Been Acquired

All but 150,000 of the nearly 800,000 acres needed for the Big Bend National park is now in the process of acquisition. Eugene Thompson, appraiser for the State Parks board, said this week. He added that approximately 75 percent of the acres required for the tourist magnet will be obtained within the next 60 days and that land will be ready for delivery to the National Park service prior to August 31.

Deals have actually been closed with private landowners for more than 300,000 acres at prices in keeping with the appraisals made by the board's forces. The bill enacted by the Legislature in appropriating \$1,500,000 for the land purchasing program limited the price to \$2 to an acre.

Only 150,000 Acres Needed. Negotiations for more than another 100,000 acres to be acquired from private owners are about to be concluded, Thompson said. The lands to be acquired in these deals along with what already is owned by the state and school fund, will reduce to about 150,000 acres the land still needed to complete the park area of 788,000 acres. At least one-third of this will have to be obtained through condemnation proceedings since present owners cannot be located, Mr. Thompson explained.

In reporting the progress being made in obtaining the land for the international vacation land on the Big Bend of the Rio Grande, Mr. Thompson declared that virtually all of the landowners with whom he had negotiated for the purchase of land exhibited willingness to cooperate so that Texas might obtain its first national park. He expressed the belief that there will be few if any condemnation proceedings necessitated because of the inability of landowners and the board's appraisers to reach an agreement on prices.—Alpine Avalanche.

Victims of Amnesia?

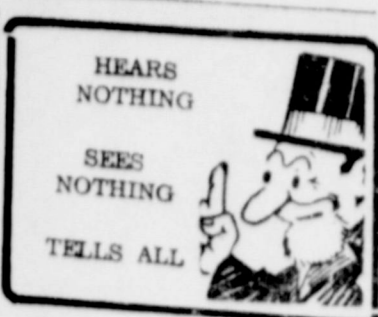

There is one especially good thing about biographies. You can read one without wondering what it would be like if the book were true. It is true. From a large family which hardly knew the use of napkins, the writer, who was too modest to sign her name, tells how she came blundering up in the social world to meet the demands required by her husband's position. This is the kind of a book you could pick up any time, turn to a page, and find something you like. When you finish, you feel that you have known young Abe Lincoln all your life.

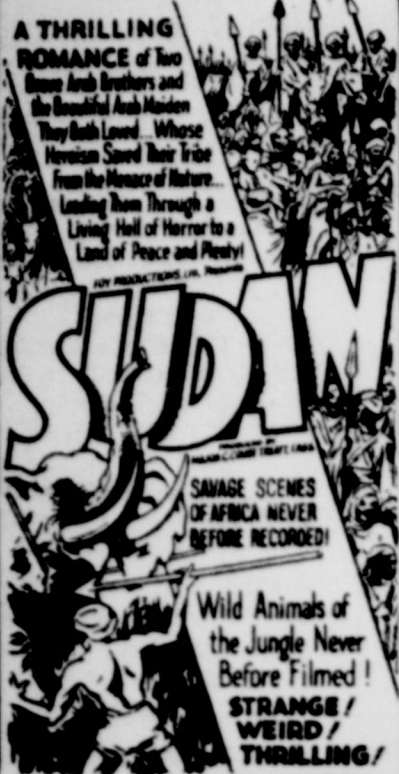

This Sergeant Acts Dual Role With Carrier Pigeons and Bayonets

A worker of miracles is Master Sergeant Max Bronkhorst. At Fort Sam Houston, Texas, he is engaged in the dual capacity of training homing pigeons for the Signal Corps and in teaching New York clerks, Pennsylvania steel workers and young farmers from half a dozen states in the dexterous use of the bayonet.

He has been breeding carrier pigeons since his boyhood in Rotterdam, Holland, nearly half a century ago. He brought a basketful of his Dutch birds to America long before the first World War and with him they entered the United States Army. Both made good. Nearly everybody knows how pigeons are used in modern warfare for auxiliary communications and for pilots of airplanes whose radios go wrong. Parachute troops and military intelligence agents also need the courageous feathered messengers.

Very few are downed by gunfire, the sergeant says, but a good many are killed by hawks and cats. He declares that with the best of food and care a pigeon will serve the Army and the nation for as long as 10 years.

Bronkhorst is equally enthusiastic in his work as an instructor in bayonet practice. He acquired his skill with the steel weapon while serving in the Dutch army and majored in its use in the A. E. F. He is especially proud of his bayoneteers in the squads at Fort Sam Houston.

I have never seen anything like them, he says. These men are just superior, and that's all there is to it. I've seen bayonet fighters of all races but none will be able to stand up against these American boys.

Soldiers from the farms, adept in handling the pitchfork, are handy with the bayonet but he singles out the Pennsylvanians for the highest praise.

"Especially these Polish boys from the steel mills," the sergeant grins. "The Poles have a perpetual resentment of the wrongs suffered by their native land. They can come to grips."

Officers' Training Program For Navy To Change May 1

The Navy Department has announced that the V-7 program for Midshipmen will be closed on May 1, 1942, thus eliminating juniors, seniors and college graduates who are single and under 28 years of age.

The V-7 program is for deck and engineering officer training and graduates from the training schools located at Northwestern, Notre Dame, Columbia University and aboard the Prairie State in New York will be commissioned Ensigns in the Naval Reserve.

"After May 1 only men between the ages of 17 and 20 will be eligible for this program and will be enlisted in Class V-1 to complete their college courses under the Naval Accredited College program," it was announced.

The Navy stressed the need for college men for this program, saying, "If America is to build a two-ocean Navy we must have the qualified officers to man the ships, and college students who are physically and otherwise qualified will be encouraged to help defend their country by enlisting in this program."

Men from this district are sent to Notre Dame for their indoctrination training.

Sugar Worry Nil To Housewives Who Can Use Substitutes

College Station—With rationing of sugar in the offing, many housewives will have to manage well to have enough for the week-end breakfast, dinner, and supper.

According to Hazel Phipps, specialist in food preparation of the A. & M. College Extension Service, people can get along with less sugar and still have tasty, nutritious meals. Any reduction in food energy which sugar furnishes easily can be supplied by increased serving of starchy vegetables, cereals, and dried fruits.

Prepare only the amount of sweetened food needed for each person, Miss Phipps suggests, and avoid waste by thoroughly stirring the sugar in iced tea and coffee.

Fresh fruits which carry their own sugar make nutritious desserts and dried fruits are a good source of natural sugar. Honey, cane syrup, molasses, sorghum, and corn and maple syrups make good sugar supplements. Several of these are sources of calcium and iron.

When substituting honey, use approximately the same quantity as the sugar called for by the recipe. But on account of moisture in honey, decrease the liquid normally required by about one fourth cup for each cup of honey used. Usually one eighth to one fourth teaspoon of soda is used for each cup of honey in products which are leavened.

It takes about one and one half times as much sorghum or molasses to give the same sweetness as the sugar the recipe calls for. Add one fourth teaspoonful of soda for each cup of syrup in leavened products, and decrease the liquid given in the recipe one fourth to one third for each cup of sweetener in order to equalize the moisture in sorghum or molasses.

Miss Phipps cautions that the baking temperature should be lowered when honey or molasses is substituted for sugar in a recipe.
