PERRYTON SCHOOLS ALL OPENED MONDAY

Schools of the Perryton Independent School District opened on Monday of this week with an unusual attendance in all schools. In the exercises were held at practically all schools which were well attended by the patrons of the district. The attendance of the Perryton town almost reached the 450 mark, a 25 per cent increase in the school department. An information program was given in the auditorium which was attended by the large audience ever assembled in the district since it was erected last year. L. L. Price, Superintendent of Perryton District started the program with a talk which outlined the accomplishments of the past year. He sounded the key note for a year of co-operation by the patrons of the pupils and their instructors. Coffee followed Prof. Price's short talk on the advantages of education which was well received. Very able informal remarks were made by B. B. Kent, Wallace, Judge J. M. Grigsby, T. P. and a number of other prominent citizens. Miss Carmen Brewer and several piano selections were enthusiastically received. Closing remarks were made by W. A. Hitchcock, pastor of the district church.

One of the marked features of this enrollment is the fact that the work of the local school is being aided by outside patrons. A very large number of boys and girls have come from outside this district and several coming from Beaver, Oklahoma. The teachers were on hand at the opening of the school and all well pleased with the way the work has started off. Classes are all held on schedule time. The directors have had several improvements made about the buildings and campus. Drinking fountains have been installed on the grounds.

Attendance in all the rural schools, with one or two exceptions is much better than last year, according to Superintendent Price. Prof. Price says that all the rural teachers at a good interest manifested in the part of pupils and patrons. A number of boys and girls who did a part of the high school work in some district have enrolled for higher work in this school. Prospects for a winning football team are very bright for Perryton. A number of last year's winning team are back in school and men have entered, some of whom are experienced players. J. F. Meade has charge of the coaching end of the game this year and he expects to have two full squads in the field this week.

INDEPENDENT SCHOOL TAX LEVY LOWERED

At the regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Perryton Independent School District on last Tuesday afternoon, it was decided that the tax levy for this year would be lowered from 75c to 55c on the one hundred dollars valuation. This means that the taxes of all property holders in this district will be considerably lower this year. Approximately \$20,000.00 less will be raised for school purposes than was collected last year. We think that the present board and managers of our school system deserve much credit for the economical way in which our school affairs have been administered. This is what we call real efficiency for no one doubts but what our school is getting better every year.

Bids were opened at this meeting from the various banks desiring to serve as official depository for the school funds of this district, the First National Bank of this city offering the highest rate of interest, consequently they were designated as the depository for another year.

PERRYTON BANK ENDORSED CO-OPERATION MARKETING

The following circular letter was signed last week by the Farmers & Stockmen State Bank of Perryton, Texas:

We the undersigned bank having studied the principles of co-operative marketing, and believing in same, do hereby agree to co-operate in every way possible with the Texas Wheat Growers Association, and

We further agree that any wheat that we have mortgage over, where it is at all possible, to let the wheat be pooled by the grower in the Co-operative Texas Wheat Growers Association, and we realize that Orderly Marketing will tend to stabilize the price, and that a stabilized price will net the grower more money for the products grown; and

We further agree to aid, assist, and further the cause of Organizing the farmer into their own selling Agency.

This is the first one of the banks of this city to endorse the principles of co-operation marketing. It appears to this farmer that this is identification enough to let the farmer know who is the friend of the farmers needs. When all the banks see the light and further the cause then the farmers will not hesitate to perfect a selling agency of their own by joining the Texas Wheat Growers Association. It is a known fact in this immediate country that eighty-five per cent of those who have not already signed are holding back because of the banks attitude. The banks are looked upon by the farmers as financiers of the community and we farmers have also willfully shoved over on the bankers shoulders the responsibility of being the general advisor of the community also. So in holding these two positions it behooves the banks to make a thorough investigation of co-operative marketing and announce their decisions. The above named bank herewith has announced its decision.

The Texas Wheat Growers Association stands the best opportunity this year to make a profit to its members in the history of the co-operative movement in this state. Because of the fact of the low price of wheat at the time of delivery, the slump of the market, and the already visible advance in price, it stands to reason that the pooler of wheat this year will be benefitted in dollar and cents. If the loss that is sustained on wheat sold on the open market were profits put back into the hands of the producers this country would be many dollars in cash better off. If the producers of the wheat had the final purchase price instead of the glutted Perryton market price for their wheat then the banks long past due paper would be paid and old accounts settled. The farmer needs the profits for the farmer is the man who did the work and grew the wheat. Boost for co-operative marketing and get your neighbor to sign the Texas Wheat Growers Contract.

GOOD THRESHING RUN

Having had excellent weather for the past six weeks, we have enjoyed a good threshing run.

We threshed 74,341 bushels of wheat, oats and barley in 30 and 3-4 days, making an average of 2,417 bushels a day.

We made the entire run without a break, that stopped us. We feel we are safe in saying that one hour would cover all the time we were stopped, during the entire 30 3-4 days, other than moving from one stack yard to another.

Our crew was the best we have ever had. The pitchers made an average of \$5.42 per day.

We wish to thank our patrons for kind treatment and prompt remittance. Hope the rain that fell last Saturday and Sunday will be the start of an excellent crop for the following year.

WHEAT GROWERS ASSOCIATION MET LAST THURSDAY

There was a meeting of the Texas Wheat Growers Association held at the Court House on Thursday night of last week with an attendance of some fifty members present. Much interest was manifested in the meeting and many good prominent questions were asked and answered. There was unusual good attention paid to the speeches delivered by the president of the Association, Judge L. Gough of Amarillo, and the Association's State Secretary, E. Bass Clay also of Amarillo.

A local organization was perfected and L. R. Connor of Farnsworth was elected the local secretary of the organization. It is the purpose of the organization to meet once a month or every two months to talk over the different problems that confront the members of the Association and to perfect the signed up to the limit, as near the one hundred per cent mark as possible. Meetings will be called by Mr. Connor and it behooves every member to attend the meetings. True co-operation commences when the contract is signed and never ends. Then if each member would pledge to get a member now the membership of the organization would be doubled in a short time.

ENTHUSIASTIC AUDIENCE GREETED AMARILLO MEN

One of the most enthusiastic audiences possible greeted the railroad boosters from Amarillo at the High School Auditorium on last Friday evening. We are sorry to report that it was not near as large a crowd as should have assembled for a meeting which was of such importance to the citizenship of the entire trade territory, but then many people are prone to neglect the more important things of life for frivolous amusements.

The meeting was presided over by Judge R. T. Correll who voiced the sentiment of the people in regard to the excessive freight rates charged us by the Santa Fe, when he said, "We want to put a stop to this, it means that we have paid enough penalty during the past three years to build a railroad from here to Amarillo." Judge Correll introduced O. V. Vernon, Secretary of the Board of City Development of Amarillo, who introduced the other Amarillo visitors, A. S. Stinnett, J. N. Riggs, C. B. Pash and T. E. Johnson.

A. S. Stinnett in a very able manner told the citizens of the North Plains "How the railroad could be built." He reviewed progress already made by Amarillo on preliminary work, went into freight rates now existing on the North Plains and told what the new line would mean to the whole North Panhandle.

He predicted that the greatest colonization movement in the history of the southwest would follow should the new line be built into the "great counties lying north of the river, which in some instances are 90 to 95 per cent tillable." Mr. Stinnett said that the road would be of great benefit to Amarillo.

UNDERTAKER WILSON MOVES SEVEN BODIES

While on a visit to his old home in Missouri, Undertaker G. R. Wilson of this city moved seven bodies from a country cemetery to the family lot of the Wilson family in a St. Joseph cemetery. Most of these bodies had been buried for over sixty years and one had been in the ground for almost eighty years. Following are the names and dates of burial of the bodies moved:

Robert Wilson, died November 12, 1864, age 50 years, 9 months and 18 days.

Lucinda Wilson, wife of Robert Wilson, died June 8, 1882, aged 64 years, 5 months and 27 days.

Cyrus Wilson, died June 1, 1864, aged 20 years, 4 months and 24 days.

Joseph G., son of R and L. Wilson, died February 3, 1847, aged 5 years, 7 months.

Mary, daughter of R. and L. Wilson, died December 9, 1857, aged 24 days.

William Wilson, died August 20, 1845, aged 25 years, 11 months and 4 days.

ANNOUNCEMENT STORY

Introduction of a higher radiator, bringing new and improved body lines to all types of Ford Cars, is announced today by the Ford Motor Company. The changes have just gone into effect and the various types are now in production.

While the larger radiator has been made standard on all types and while it has made possible other betterments in body design, there is no radical departure in construction, but rather a general improvement which has resulted in more graceful lines.

The new radiator sets an inch and a half higher than the former and has an apron at the bottom which joins a similar apron effect on the fender on either side, giving a highly finished appearance to the front of the car. The larger radiator also increases cooling efficiency.

Most conspicuous among the new types is the Ford Coupe which is of entirely new body design and construction, resulting in a more trim exterior appearance, more comfortable seating arrangement and a greater luggage carrying capacity.

From the dash there is a graceful sweep in the cowl to the radiator bringing a pleasing effect to the front. The doors are wide and open forward making access and exit easy. They are heavily framed for rigidity and strength. The compartment at the rear has been enlarged to afford increased carrying capacity. The gasoline tank is under the seat, with divided cushions to afford easy filling of the tank from the right side making it unnecessary for the driver to leave his seat. Ventilator in the cowl and a visor over the windshield add much to the attractiveness of the car. A new rear fender, of more sturdy character also is a feature.

Interior fittings are of choice material and the arrangement of the deeply cushioned seat has been effected so that at the rear there is a small recess shelf for carrying parcels. The rear vision window is much larger and oblong in shape. Door windows have been equipped with revolving type window regulators and door locks are provided. Side windows are equipped with the lever type window lifters.

Marked, too, is the improvement in the Four Door Sedan. Highly popular since its introduction a year ago, because of its low, graceful lines, the car now presents even much better lines and a sturdier appearance.

This has been brought about by the installation of an entirely new cowl with a graceful sweep from the dash blending into the larger hood and radiator. The change also affords an increase in leg room for occupants of the front seat.

In the open types, the Touring Car and Runabout, the cowl has been enlarged and flows in a graceful curve to the higher hood.

The result brings a most pleasing effect to the exterior appearance of both types. The improvement in the Touring Car which came when the one man top and slanting windshield were introduced, is greatly enhanced by the larger radiator, the car appearing lower and more attractive than ever. The effect on the Roadster is likewise most appealing, giving it a more rugged and sturdy appearance.

The new radiator also is extended to the Ford Truck chassis, affording improved appearance and better cooling to delivery services.

These new Ford types and the generally recognized performance ability of the Ford under all motoring conditions, promise to bring a greater demand than ever before as the public becomes more fully acquainted with the higher standards and greater values which have been incorporated. No changes are contemplated in prices.

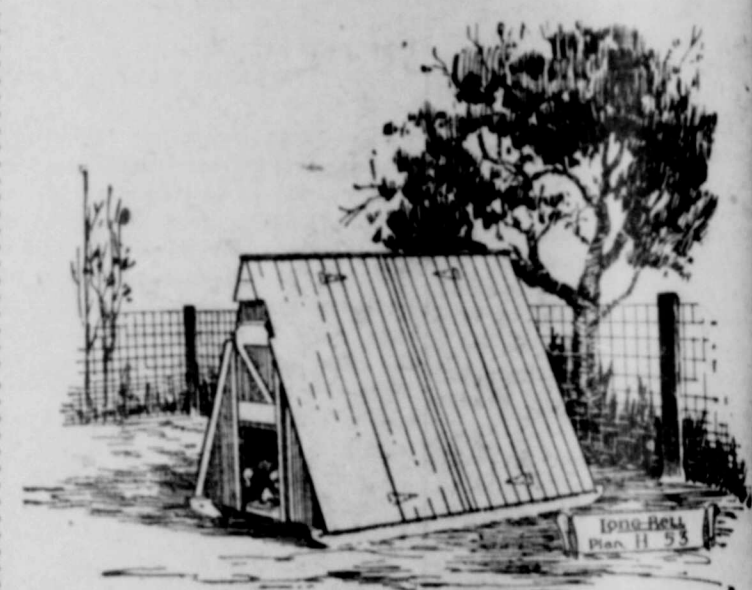

KANSAS WHEAT GROWERS
ARE UP IN ARMS

"The Kansas Wheat Growers' association has too much 'overhead.' It has magnificent quarters in the First National Bank building. Its 20 board members cost the farmers \$12,000 a year. It has a lawyer which it pays \$6,000 a year. It cost the farmer six and one-fourth cents a bushel for the association to handle his wheat last year. No organization can continue and do business on this basis," declared Senator Carr W. Taylor, a Hutchinson attorney, in an address to 200 farmers at Garden Plain Wednesday night.

Dissatisfaction with the association was responsible for the meeting being called, the farmers said. The five-year contract which recently was validated by the Kansas supreme court, is too binding and too exacting, according to "Nick" Reichenberger of Mt. Hope, who was said to be responsible for the meeting. An open forum was held after Taylor's address and it was found that the crowd was divided on the issue. At a vote taken by George Kahmann, Mt. Hope banker who presided, many were found who said they would stand by their contracts and the association.

Says Constitution Violated
Mr. Taylor declared that any contract which gave any class of persons the right to form a combination, intended to eliminate competition and thereby make it possible to fix an exorbitant price, was a direct violation of the constitution of the United States. The contract of this association has been declared void by Texas, Colorado and Iowa, Mr. Taylor said. The following agreement was read at the meeting:

We, the undersigned persons, who entered into contracts with the Kansas Wheat Growers' Association covering a period of five years, and who are desirous of having said contracts vacated and set aside, and

Whereas, several of our members have been sued by the Kansas Wheat Growers' association and enjoined from selling their wheat to any but the Kansas Wheat Growers' association, and

Whereas, litigation is necessary in order to determine the legal rights of all the parties to said agreement, and also for the purpose of vacating and setting aside said contracts for divers and sundry reasons not necessary to be set out herein, we, the undersigned, do mutually agree to and with each other to pay the respective sums set opposite our names for the purpose of paying the expenses of and carried through to the United States supreme court for final decision, if necessary.

"Nick" Reichenberger, Ben Robben, J. Reichenberger, and M. Wast signed the agreement and pledged \$25 each. Pete Loeb, Beda Blasi, P. Paterson and Peter Lees each subscribed \$10. Several other names for various amounts, were secured. It was estimated by some that \$1,000 would be necessary to fight the case. The money is to be handled by "Nick" Reichenberger. The meeting began about 9 p. m. and was session two hours.—Wichita Eagle.

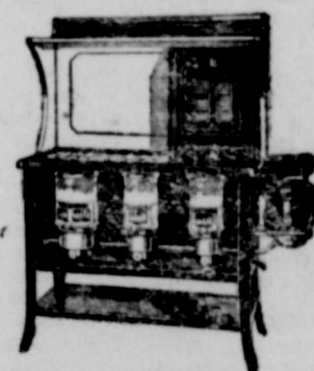

FOREWORD

The Perryton Fair Association takes pleasure in announcing its first Free Fair, beginning on the 2nd day of October, and extending over the 3rd, 4th, and 5th, of said month. This Fair is promulgated by citizens of the City of Perryton, Texas, and is being financed by them so far as may be required, and intended to bring together all the various interests of the trade territory adjacent to Perryton, with a special invitation to all people interested to attend and be one of us through the full three days of the fair.

It is hoped that a properly and well conducted Fair will mean much to those engaged in the various industries of the Panhandle of Texas and Oklahoma. There can be but little question that this is a new country, still undeveloped, groping to some extent to find its bearings, and that one of us in our average daily life must and do learn something from the experiences of each day and year that we pursue our respective vocations, and that those with the widest experience and meeting the greatest success may still learn something of value from the most humble of us all. With this in view, it was hoped that by bringing all the varied interests of the country together in a common cause with one view in mind, and that to improve on the past, each, in common with the rest, seeking to learn and improve, and to teach and assist all, would and must be of lasting benefit to the body politic. That the spirit of community co-operation offers the best solution to most of our present difficulties and seeming handicaps.

This is a great country that we are yet to learn much about. It has proven itself beyond question to be adapted to agriculture and stock raising, yielding the greatest return for the effort put forth of any country on the map today.

It will bring together the farmer, stockmen, merchant and every line of industry who, may in common discuss one with the other their respective problems. It ought to stimulate better co-operation, better understanding and a common brotherhood between the varied and allied interests of the whole. It gives the farmers a chance to discuss their experiences, their failures, their successes, and to each, analyze and discuss the methods of his neighbor. It affords a chance to congregate the good for the benefit of all, to eliminate the bad, and all to come into possession of the experience of each. And if properly attended and supported can not fail to be of lasting and permanent good.

The success of this Fair, as with all other projects of a community nature, will depend upon the interest manifested and the support given it by the general public. With this view, every limit has been attained to make the premium list as high as the stringency of the times will permit, and in fact, many have contributed far beyond their means just to make it a grand success.

No pains will be spared to make this Fair entertaining as well as instructive. We do not advertise the event as a gaily day, but as an educational institution with just enough entertainment to make it enjoyable. It is hoped that it will be well attended, well supported, and well received, and that much of lasting good may come from it.

This is free. There will be no admission charged to any of the several departments of this Fair, meet all the expense of the exhibition. No tax money will be spent directly or indirectly on this Fair. Come, look it over, it will cost you nothing, it can't hurt you, it ought to help you. Make your plans now to be with us and let us give you free three days of real enjoyment and instruction, learning of and instructing your neighbor.

We will have on display several unique departments that will interest the young as well as the old; come and see it all. PERRYTON WELCOMES ALL AND PROMISE THE BEST IT HAS TO EACH OF YOU WHILE WITHIN ITS GATES. HERE'S HOPING TO MEET YOU AT THE FAIR.

PREMIUM LIST

The Annual Premium List has been carefully prepared and special attention given to each department. 1,500 copies have been published and will be distributed in this and adjoining counties. Study the list carefully and prepare an exhibit for the Fair. After you have read it through carefully, pass it along to your neighbor.

GENERAL RULES

1. The Association will keep an efficient police force on the grounds day and night to take care of all articles on exhibition and keep good order generally, but in no case will the Association be responsible for any damage.

2. No gambling or betting will be permitted under the jurisdiction of the Association.

3. Exhibitors of stock will be required to keep their stalls open, in good order, and their stock accessible to visitors at all reasonable hours during the Fair.

4. Pedigrees must be furnished animals claiming to be registered when requested.

5. All property of every character entered for competition or display, or any other purpose, or being anywhere in the Fair grounds, shall be subject to the control of the Board of Directors, but in no case shall the Fair Association or any of the officers be held responsible for any loss, damage, or injury of any character to any such property while same is under their control, or at any other time or place. If the property owners or others interested in property desire protection against loss, damage or injury from fire, or from any other cause, they must make their own arrangements, therefore.

6. No animal can be entered or exhibited as purebred unless the same has been recorded or application made for registry in the recognized books of record of their respective breeds, except animals under 1 year of age, whose dam and sire have been registered. Exhibitors must produce certificate of registry at the request of the Superintendent in charge, any time during the fair. All aged animals must be approved breeders.

CLASSIFICATION OF PREMIUMS

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Section 1—The Board of Directors of Perryton Free Fair Association reserve the right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle all questions arising in connection with the Free Fairs that shall be held under the management of these Boards.

Section 2—The management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as they, in their judgment, deem advisable. In the event of conflict of general and special rules the latter will govern.

Section 3—Any person who violates any of the special or general rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the Board of Directors may order.

Rule 2—Entry Requirement

Section 1—All entries to the Perryton Free Fair are free, but no unworthy entry will be received.

Section 2—All entries to the fairs must be made and in place not later than 12 o'clock a. m. of the first day of the fair and shall remain in

place until 4 o'clock p. m. of the last day of the fair, but to facilitate the work of arranging the exhibits the exhibitors are advised to place them on the afternoon of the day preceding the opening of the fair, provided that livestock and poultry should not be in place until the morning of the first day of the fair.

Note—The application of this section is left to the discretion of the General Superintendent.

Section 3—All property of every character entered at the fair for any purpose shall be subject to the control of the Secretary or Superintendent in charge.

Section 4—Separate exhibits must be provided for each entry, and no person will be permitted to make more than one entry in each class, except livestock. Individual ownership must be established if more than one entry in any class is made from the same farm or home.

Section 5—Entry forms will be provided for listing all entries and exhibitors are required to see that their exhibits are properly listed on same.

Rule 3—Exhibitors Duties and Privileges

Section 1—All exhibits of crops must have been raised by the exhibitors during the year of 1923 and all exhibits of livestock must be owned by the exhibitors at the time of exhibiting same, except the get of sire.

Section 2—The Superintendent of the Livestock Department will assign spaces or stalls and exhibitors will be expected to keep their space or stalls in a cleanly condition at all times during the fair.

Section 3—Any officer of the Fair Association shall have access to all premises of any character on the fair grounds or concessions at any time during the fair.

Section 4—If it be ascertained that any exhibitor has made or caused to be made any false statement in regard to any animal or article, or if any exhibitor shall attempt to interfere with the judges in the performance of their duty, he shall be excluded from all competition or exhibition on the grounds of the association of any fair, and any awards that he may have received may be forfeited at the discretion of the Board.

Section 5—The decision of the judges shall be final and no appeal will be considered except in case of protest.

Rule 4—Protests and Appeals

Section 1—All protests shall be made to the Secretary in writing within four hours after the decision is made, and shall be accompanied by a deposit of \$10.00 which shall be forfeited in case the protest is not sustained. Said protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal.

Section 2—The Executive Board reserves the final and absolute right to determine all questions regarding the awarding of premiums.

Section 3—In addition to the right of protest herein guaranteed to exhibitors, the Directors reserve the right to take cognizance of fraud, consummated or attempted in connection with an exhibit, and take such action as they may deem just and proper.

Rule 5—Powers and Liabilities of Association

Section 1—The management will use every precaution to guard against extortion in any form upon the fair grounds, and any violation of this rule will result in the forfeiture of every privilege contract or money paid, and expulsion from the grounds.

Section 2—The management reserves the right to remove from the grounds any exhibit, animal, concession or show that may have been falsely entered, or may be deemed unsuitable or objectionable, or to remove any sign, banner, identification mark or signature, or advertising matter of any kind which may be deemed objectionable by them without giving any reason therefor.

Section 3—No diseased animal will be permitted to be exhibited or to occupy the exhibit stalls at any of the fairs in this county and every precaution will be used to enforce this rule, but the management will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may be sustained by anyone through any violation of this rule.

Section 4—No claim for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted or suit instituted or maintained against the Free Fair Association, its officers or their agents, on behalf of any person firm or corporation or their agents, representatives, servants or employees, having a license or privilege to exhibit on the Fair Grounds or to occupy space thereon.

Rule 6—Premiums and Awards

Section 1—The following colors shall be used in designating awards:

Championship or Sweepstakes—Royal Purple.

First Premium—Blue.

Second Premium—Red.

These ribbons will be attached only by the Superintendent of each Fair or his assistant.

Section 2—Where there is no competition the judges shall award first, second, third premiums according to the merits of the article and the premium shall not be awarded to unworthy articles.

Section 3—No premium will be awarded on articles not mentioned in the schedule of premiums, but ribbons will be placed on such exhibits.

Section 4—All premiums will be paid as soon as possible after the close of the Fair. In paying premiums the evidence of reward will be the Committee Book and checks or warrants will be mailed to the address given by the exhibitor when entry was made.

Section 5—When special premiums are offered they shall be paid directly by the donors upon the presentation of orders from the Secretary or by the Superintendent of the special premium department.

SPECIAL RULES

Section 1—All rules that are applicable shall be made a part of all contracts made with concessionaries.

Section 2—A Superintendent and two assistants will be appointed to each Department, whose duty it shall be to receive the exhibits, properly classify and place them, and to assist the judges.

ENTRIES

1. No animal or article will be allowed to be entered in the name of any other person than the bona-fide owner or agent. If this rule should be violated, the managers of the Fair Association will withhold the premium if such should be awarded by the judge.

2. Any article of fruit, vegetable, (except canned goods) grains or seeds to compete for the premium, must be owned by the exhibitor and grown during the year 1923.

3. The right is reserved by the Perryton Free Fair Association to interpret, revise, or add to the rules as its interests may require.

4. Entries should be made on or before October 1st and will close at noon October 2nd. All entries to be in place for exhibit and judging by 8 o'clock A. M., Thursday, October 3rd.

AWARDING COMMITTEE

1. All judges and awarding committees must be wholly disinterested directly or indirectly in the decision which they may have voiced. The Free Fair Board reserves the right to substitute judges in case of necessity.

2. Exhibitors must be promptly on time at the calling of the marshal, and according to published program.

3. No interference with the judges will be allowed. Exhibitors shall give all the desired information correctly and may call attention and explain, without argument or persuasion, the special merit claimed for articles exhibited, when requested to do so by the committee.

4. When the judges have carefully examined all articles entered for a given premium and marked his decision, the superintendent of the class will properly mark the committee book and attach ribbon to articles according to catalog.

5. After all awards have been made all premium stock shall on the call of the marshal be brought into the ring and join the grand procession. Failure or refusal to appear at this call, unless excused by the general superintendent, shall be sufficient cause to withhold the premiums awarded.

6. The judges in all departments will be appointed by the Executive Committee of the Free Fair Association. No one will be allowed to act as judge in the class or ring in which he exhibits.

7. When animals or articles are not of sufficient merit, second, third, or no premiums will be awarded at the discretion of the judge.

8. Communities having a general exhibit, shall furnish a man to look after the exhibit, and display the same at the request of the superintendent of that department.

DEPARTMENT "A"—HORSES, MULES AND JACKS

Geo. T. Leatherman, Superintendent

Rule 1—All rules governing the live stock department as well as the General Rules and Regulations governing the 1923 Annual Perryton Free Fair will apply in this department.

Rule 2—Only first and second prize winners in the respective classes shall be eligible to compete for championship prizes.

Rule 3—All horses, mules and jacks must be shown at halter.

Rule 4—All animals competing for premiums in this Department should be properly groomed and in show shape.

Rule 5—Each breed of its kind will be exhibited against each other, and any breed not mentioned here will receive the same consideration and the same premiums will be awarded as below outlined.

Rule 6—Any entry without competition will be left to the discretion of the judges as to place and premium.

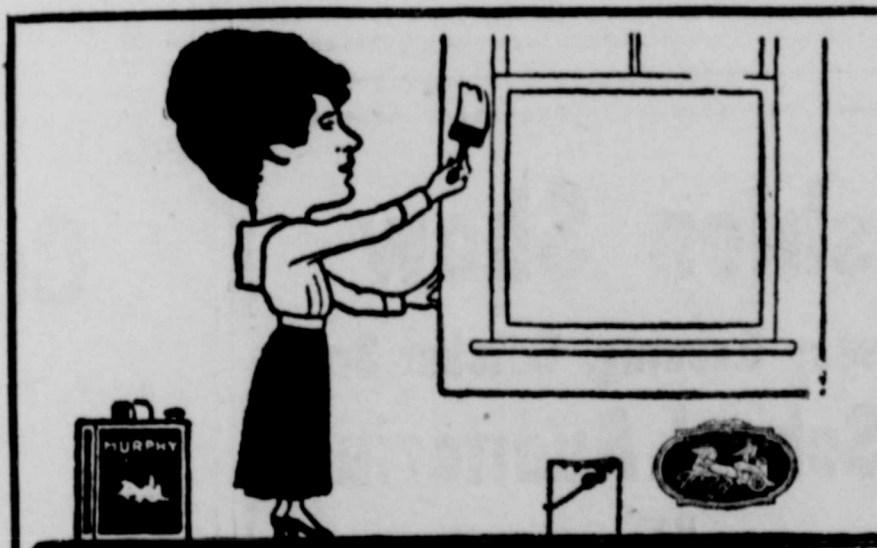

WATER SUPPLY AND NORTH PLAINS RAIL LINE NEEDS

An adequate water supply for Amarillo and a railroad to the North Plains are the two outstanding needs of Amarillo at the present time and will be the two most vital factors for its future greatness, says H. E. Smith, city commissioner, in a communication to the Daily News. Mr. Smith's letter read as follows:

Amarillo, Tex., Aug. 18th, 1923
I take this means of placing myself on record with reference to my views on public service improvements for Amarillo. My faith in Amarillo growing into a populous and prosperous city has never wavered and it is a hundred per cent at this writing.

Nature has dealt us a salubrious climate and given us a radius of one hundred and fifty miles of soil with a productive capacity probably greater than surrounding any other city. Dame Nature has done her part to the full. It is now up to the citizenship of Amarillo to do its part. Cities, like individuals, are in a race with each other for supremacy and those that loiter on the way will be found left and taking an inventory of slighted opportunities. City building has a history. It was the cock-sureness of Leavenworth, Kansas, that lost that place the great metropolis that stands as a monument to public spirit and vision of the pioneers of Kansas City. If Waggoner, Oklahoma had not gone into a profound sleep there would be no Muskogee. If sapulpa had been alive to her opportunities, Tulsa would turned out to be the village. These are just reminders and mentioned to indicate where I stand in doing my part individually and officially in making Amarillo a great City.

There are two public service improvements that take precedence, in my opinion, above all other and both are right up to us now. One is to get an ample water supply for Amarillo and the other is to get a railroad to the North Plains. Both projects have been initiated. The office I hold makes it premature at this time to discuss the water question. The railroad project has been launched, in my opinion, in the most practical and business like way under the auspices of the Board of City Development, and the management of an Executive Committee composed of J. N. Riggs, H. Walter Blackburn and Will N. Thompson, prominent citizens and leading business men, in whom the people have the utmost confidence.
