WIDOW OF HOLMES FLAYS OFFICIALS AT BORGER

SLAIN LAWYER NOT AIDED IN WORK, CHARGE

CLUE FOUND IN DEATH OF PROSECUTOR BUT ARREST NOT MADE

(By Associated Press)
BORGER, Sept. 19.—Accusation of the young widow of District Attorney John A. Holmes, slain from ambush, that local officers did not aid him in his campaign against criminals was followed today by Sheriff Joe Ownbey's statement that he had "located" a suspect but would make no arrest until more evidence had been obtained.

After Texas Rangers had asserted they had affidavits in their possession concerning an alleged plot between city and county officers, Mrs. Holmes declared to newspapermen that only one man, whom she did not name, had made any effort to aid her husband in fighting crime here.

"The rest of them," she said, "were afraid. When there is no one to help, you have to play a lone hand. Mr. Holmes never had any fear. He was all I had, and now they've taken him."

The Rangers in discussing the affidavits declared they knew the motive for Holmes' slaying and intimated they expected to make an arrest soon.

FAIR BOOTHS ARE PREPARED

BOWER IS ASSEMBLING MATERIAL FOR SHOW AT AMARILLO

Prof. H. J. Bower, agronomist of Texas Technological college, is assembling material today in preparation for placing exhibits advertising the college and Lubbock county at the Tri-State Fair and Exposition in Amarillo, Sept. 22-28, inclusive.

Professor Bower, accompanied by Robert Burdett, agronomist student of Texas Technological college, will leave tomorrow morning for Amarillo, where they expect to have exhibits relative to display Sunday.

An unusually attractive exhibit will be that of Lubbock county. In the center will be "Lubbock, the Hub of the Plains," showing the section with its six roads composed of mile main leading into the city. Between the roads will be leaves to represent forest crops, and the outer rim will consist of wheat. Cartoons placed on the roadway designations will portray the dairy industry of the area.

Don L. Jones, superintendent of the state experiment station, three miles east of this city, is assisting Professor Bower in gathering agricultural products representative of the county.

Tex Technological college's education exhibit, featuring departments of the college, in the background will be a soil map of Texas.

Bromley cracked up his first ship in taking off from Tacoma last summer. Fahy had circled the test field once yesterday and was pulling out of a figure eight maneuver when the air ground fluttered loose and fell.

Ford Tells Hefflin He Will Not Offer To Buy Property

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—Henry Ford is not interested in again bidding for the gigantic Muscle Shoals, Alabama, power project and has so advised Senator Hefflin, democrat, Alabama, who recently wrote the Detroit manufacturer requesting that he do so.

In reply to the Alabama Senator, E. G. Leibold, general secretary to Henry Ford, wrote "We have no plans at this time whereby the power at Muscle Shoals could be utilized."

The letter of Mr. Leibold follows: "In reply the writer has been instructed to advise you that we have no plans at this time whereby the power at Muscle Shoals could be utilized and that it would be beyond the question for Mr. Ford to again make an offer."

"He has also suggested that in his opinion other interests are in a better position to develop and utilize the power and it might be more practical to solicit an offer from them."

Trotzky's Nephew Held On Swindling

EL PASO, Sept. 19 (AP)—Dr. R. N. Trotzky, who claims to be a nephew of Leon Trotzky, exiled Russian Soviet leader, has been arrested here on a charge of swindling.

Dr. Trotzky said he first took out naturalization papers in Austin following a conference with Governor Dan Moody. Later, he said, he served a term in the Leavenworth penitentiary for violation of the Dyer auto act.

Liquor Conspiracy Found; Two Are Held

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 19 (AP)—Fraudulent withdrawals of large quantities of bonded liquor from government warehouses today resulted in the arrest of two men and a search for another man and a woman alleged to have conceived the conspiracy.

Warrants charging conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws were issued against the four persons. They are: Agnes A. Gross, confidential clerk for the state liquor commission; Daniel J. Cottrill, former cashier of the United States Customs service here, Charles Schmitt, customs broker, and R. N. MacWilliams, proprietor of a pharmacy.

Bankruptcy Plea Filed By Farmer

HEARING OF TESTIMONY IS STARTED IN MURDER CASE

LEVELAND, Sept. 19.—Three persons were placed on the witness stand this morning, as hearing of testimony was started today in the trial of B. A. Foshee, Hockley county young farmer, charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting on September 7, of Elmer Wright, 23.

Austin King, Miss Ona King, and Frank Baggett, all residing in the vicinity near the Foshee farm testified during this morning's proceedings.

Foshee's 19-year-old wife who is alleged to have confessed to intimate relationship with Wright was not in the crowded court room this morning. She will be placed on the witness stand probably this afternoon.

Defense attorneys have not yet indicated what their plea will be. Weldon F. Johnson of Leveland and George Dupree and C. C. Henshaw, of Lubbock, are attorneys for the defendant.

A special prosecutor, Attorney Raliff, of Oklahoma, has been hired by relatives of the deceased to assist District Attorney Durwood Bradley in the prosecution.

"Family trouble" is blamed as responsible for the shooting in the statement given by Foshee to officers upon his surrender.

HOME TOWN BOY MAKES GOOD!

LONDON, Sept. 19 (AP)—The city of London corporation has decided to present the freedom of the city, traditional center of banking and conservative British wealth, to Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald, who has risen from an obscure socialist campaigner to the highest political office in the British empire.

The city's freedom is to be given to the man who was practically ostracized in England in the latter years for pacifist utterances, in recognition of the "indomitable courage, energy and ability by which he raised himself to the high office" and of his efforts by visiting the United States to promote better understanding and to arrive at agreement regarding the limitation of naval armaments.

END IN SIGHT FOR PANTAGES MURDER TRIAL

ATTORNEYS FOR STATE PREPARE REBUTTAL ARGUMENTS

(By Associated Press)
LOS ANGELES, Sept. 19.—Trial of Mrs. Lois Pantages on a second degree murder charge growing out of the death of Juro Rokumoto, Japanese, after an automobile accident, rapidly approached its climax today as the state prepared to launch an attempt to refute defense testimony that the man's death was due to other causes.

Counsel for Mrs. Pantages yesterday the defense to a sudden close yesterday with testimony of five physicians that Rokumoto died of asphyxiation after an anesthetic had been administered during an operation.

The defense previously had produced witnesses who swore the wife of Alexander Pantages, theater magnate, was not intoxicated when her automobile struck Rokumoto's car at an intersection last June, as the state had contended, and that the operation performed upon the Japanese after the accident was an emergency one.

RAINS HALT FOREST FIRES

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 19.—Rain and storms which quenched four major fires, including the disastrous \$3,500,000 Ventura county conflagration had washed out railroad tracks and stalled passenger trains today.

Efforts of the firefighters to quell the blazes which had scorched 25,000 acres of Ventura county watershed, destroyed 126 oil derricks, five school houses and scores of homes, were successful when the storm wrapped a heavy blanket of moisture over the countryside. A large section of the Ventura triangle tract, bounded by the cities of Santa Paula, Ventura and Ojai, became a sodden mass of wet ash and steaming embers.

2,500 men at one time mustered to battle the flames 200 remained to guard the smoldering remnants. Two hundred and fifty persons, chiefly oil workers and their families, were homeless.

FRENCH HURL WRENCH INTO NAVY ACCORD

SUSPICION IS AROUSED OVER U. S. BRITISH NEGOTIATIONS

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Sept. 19.—French apprehension regarding the character of the prospective Anglo-American naval accord is increasing to such an extent as to constitute a real threat to the complete success not only of the preliminary agreement between the United States and Great Britain but of the larger issue of a general move for reduction of armament.

French fears voiced on public platforms, in the press and by authoritative circles are echoed from other parts of the continent, chiefly Geneva. From Geneva has come full-hearted approval of the trend of affairs regarding armaments, but French spokesmen intimate lesser continental powers share concern regarding developments which it is feared might be beneficial to former enemy nations of the world war, or which would, by means of a far-reaching Anglo-American political entente, strengthen British political power in Europe and other parts of the world at the expense of legitimate French development as a great world power.

posals before the League of Nations that the question of trained army reserves, always a delicate point on the continent, must be ultimately considered in the general disarmament scheme.

In forceful language the newspaper "Le Temps" stated that the question of limitation of trained army reserves as a bold effort to weaken French national defense.

French view is supported by the Journal de Geneve which goes so far as to express doubt whether a five power conference will take place, saying it is not at all sure France and Italy, which refused to participate in the 1927 Geneva conference, will agree to be represented.

The Geneva paper says that in France, and no doubt in Italy and Japan, it is believed that Great Britain and America in expressing the desire to eliminate submarines from naval armaments are trying to reach an agreement at the expense of their partners.

HEADQUARTERS SAYS BOAT WOULDN'T STOP

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19 (AP)—Coast guard headquarters announced today a coast guard patrol boat fired on the Canadian motor ship Shawnee off Ambrose light off New York harbor, on the night of Sept. 11 after the vessel failed to stop.

A brief statement said the vessel was running without lights and appeared to be an American craft. In the chase, the coast guard patrol boat at first held the Shawnee in the beam of her searchlight and repeatedly blew whistles for the Canadian craft to stop, according to the statement. The patrol boat then fired three blank warning shots without bringing the Shawnee to a halt and followed with two shells after which the vessel stopped.

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BECKY COSTS STATE \$5,000

LEGAL PATH PROVES TO BE EXPENSIVE IN TRIALS

(By Associated Press)

NEW BRUNSWICK, Sept. 19.—The legal path which Mrs. Rebecca Bradley Rogers took through her courts in an effort to win freedom from bank robbery charges cost the state approximately \$5,000, a clerk of records revealed today.

First in the examining trial in 1934, then in the robbery trial in 1935, the legal path was called on for the act, again at La Grange in December, 1937, back at a Grange after a reversal and finally here.

For the trial here \$1,196 was spent in paying the mileage and \$2 daily fee of 48 state and defense witnesses, and for the \$3 daily remuneration of jurors.

On Rogers' defense attorney, estimated the first La Grange trial, using 13 days, resulted in an expenditure of \$1,500, although the number of witnesses was smaller.

The expense in sheriff's fees and mileage in bringing Rogers to the second trial in Fayette county, supplied with the bills of the first hearing, boosted the final figure to nearly \$5,000.

Colorado Bank Man To Talk In Gotham

DENVER, Sept. 19.—John E. Rosen, deputy Colorado state bank commissioner, is on his way to New York City to testify before the federal grand jury investigating the slayings of which C. D. Waggoner, "Hurricane" Colorado, banker, killed two New York banks of half a million dollars.

He was reported to be carrying with him all the collateral which Waggoner withdrew from New York banks by means of checks drawn against a fund built up by fake telegrams from Denver.

State Inspection Of Gins Ordered

AUSTIN, Sept. 19.—Representing an appeal by the state board of insurance commissioners asking ginners to take precaution against fire, a state inspection of cotton gins will be made shortly by the gin division of the department of agriculture. C. P. Calhoun, chief of the division has announced.

Three inspectors will do the work, emphasizing to owners that gins should be kept free of inflammable trash.

The insurance department recently asked ginners to provide waste water from sparks by checking boiler equipment and prohibiting smoking on gin premises.

'Flatfeet' Are Rapidly Waning

HOUSTON, Sept. 19.—Police men, at least those on the night shift in Houston, can't be called "flatfeet" any more.

After examining 50 patrolmen who foot specialists representing a club maintained by one of the country's largest shoe manufacturers, reported that 99 per cent of them had "good" feet. Corrective measures were recommended for the remainder.

One of the specialists, who is making like tests throughout the country and the foot rating of the Houston cops was unusually high.

The Crime of Women in Business

Alice Foote MacDougall.

One of the Most Successful Wives and Mothers to Seek A Career and Win Success. Declares Fame and Fortune An Empty Glory for Her Sex. For the Price of Achievement Is Loneliness in Old Age



"The bugle of business exacts from every woman the triple penalty of loneliness, lack of leisure, inability to relax."

IT'S an old story for men to tell women to stay home. And it's just as old a story for women who have always stayed at home to tell ambitious young flappers that it's all a mistake for a girl to mix in the world of business.

But when a woman who has achieved an enviable success in business comes along and tells these same flappers that the life of the professional woman is all a mistake, then you have something new and worth listening to.

Alice Foote MacDougall, whose string of New York coffee houses has become one of the city's best known legends, is such a woman. Arrived now at the age when her cup of happiness should be running over—she is running over—she nevertheless insists that the fame, the fortune, the position she has attained is more or less an empty glory. And she advises girls and young women to forget all this chatter about self-expression and careers, tells them that in the long run it's a better gamble to stay home, have babies, and then mind them.

Old stuff? Not at all. Listen to this, her own confession about the squirrel cage of business:

"Why do I say that women should not go into business?" she asks. "Because I think they would want to stay out of it, if possible. If the price of success came first, and after that the years of struggle, the crime of a woman's going into business unless she is forced to would seldom be committed. 'If women could have their babies first, more of them would know that babies always give far more than they take from a woman, and that business always and forever takes from a woman and never gives.'"

WHEN Mrs. MacDougall was younger, she had a desire to fill but one cookie jar and make raspberry tarts and apple dumplings for one family alone, but fate and life insisted that she feed the multitude to secure money to buy the stockings and books and cough syrup that growing boys and girls demand.

Now, as one of America's successful women, she shakes her head at those who would try to ride shoulder to shoulder with men, down the highways of the world, for the thrill of the conquest. Rather, if they were wise, she believes they would prefer story hours at candle-lighting time and a song in the twilight, for life's gifts to women are unchangeable.

"In one sense business has given me a great deal," she maintains. "But I had no other choice. I've paid the top price for everything business has given me and I would have had to pay it, even if I had known about the cost in the beginning."

"What I'm talking about now is the woman who goes into business for self-expression whatever that is, or as a sort of occupational therapy; the woman who could stay peacefully at home and make something of that home. I don't want women to stay in the home and be lumps there. If they only have the wit to see it, they have handed to them on a platter the biggest and most satisfying sphere of influence imaginable, but the home has fallen into disrepute. It needs publicity."

Mrs. MacDougall believes that women's home tasks have become hum drum only because she has made them so; but instead of putting the lilt of living into them, she too frequently turns to the novelty that business will afford.

"She meets energetic, interesting people, and this amuses her and gives her the illusion that she is energetic and amusing, too. She may be, and she may not be. Time of course will tell. If she has natural capacity for growth, business will afford her the opportunity to grow. But so would her home if she only saw its possibilities."

KEEPING house and making a home are two essentially different things, Mrs. MacDougall would have the women of the land understand. One requires only brooms and scrub brushes and dust cloths, and a cook stove and cupboard of dishes. But the other requires initiative, courage, love, ingenuity, sympathy, understanding and pride. Pride, not because the curtains are whiter than those of the next door neighbor's but because people like to gather at her fireside, and when they come they stay and stay!

"Nobody can be more bored than I am by the 'dear little home body' when she is also the dear little nit-wit," she continued. "But why be a nit-wit any more in the home than in business? Why shouldn't women make their homes the center of amusing and energetic people instead of going into business to find them? It requires good technique to do this, but so does any business endeavor that goes beyond the primary grade."

"Very few women who go into business for reasons other than sheer necessity ever get beyond a job. Their self-expression does not demand the real thing. Most of them are content with men bosses who do their thinking for them."

"But at home women rarely think they can be instructed. Most American husbands are too indulgent to boss their wives, though they may have to do all the thinking that's done. If they were less chivalrous things might look up in the home. A good bawling out on Tuesdays and Thursdays might galvanize into action the hidden capacities of many a wife who thinks her home-making job too small for her and so slights it. There's another side, of course. Every second Friday should be the wife's day to tell her husband the unwelcome truth if he himself doesn't measure up."

A GREAT many things happen to women after they stay in business 20, 30 or 40 years," Mrs. MacDougall maintains. "These things happen because they are inherent in the business itself and cannot be avoided."

In the first years, while a woman is young, she has the energy and physical stability to follow the dual career she has more or less unconsciously chosen. Women love homes, whether they do or not.

"Sufficient evidence to this is given by business women's apartments. Before they begin to feel the strain of trying to ride two horses at once, they have their own apartments where they entertain, lead a charming social existence and get enough sleep to enable them to be on the job the next day. They distinctly do two things: lead the life of woman with its normal social influential contacts, the thing for which they are greatly gifted, and besides they go to business."

"But as years go on, when they are successful—and I am talking about that kind of woman—when the real burden of responsibility begins to tell, exactly the kind of burden successful business men have all the time, they simply have not the energy of body or spirit for both."

long ago on the well-known road, but when they begin to tell the matters of great import in their lives, simply little nothings about Johnnie and Minnie, it wears her more than a revolt of her whole staff.

"She has made herself alien to her kind, mentally choosy, not because she wants to be but because business has made it inevitable. If she had devoted the same intelligence to her home life and all its contacts she might have lifted her own circle into a higher level. But that technique has never been worked out as office management has, for example, and it's infinitely harder anyway. That kind of thing is a big job, and no mistake."

BUSINESS, according to Mrs. MacDougall, is merely dealing with people on a large scale, according to their wants, and she cannot conceive that anyone who does not like contacts with others, could belong in the world of business. Being a mother, to her, is the most splendid calling which woman shall ever know. No blare of bugles and waving of crimson banners can compensate for whispered secrets she has learned.

"No matter what reason pushes a mother into business, the conflict is great and the cost to her and her children, monumental. I know of long experience that the qualities each vocation demands are mutually irreconcilable."

"A mother must be full of gentle understanding. She must have leisure for the small concerns of childhood. One can't enjoy a child by the clock, nor can a child have the sense of protecting love of a mother who in the midst of a confidence must dash out to keep an appointment. The very necessity of being on time—which is of the essence of business—and which means rushing, of course, is incompatible with the atmosphere in which a child should develop."

"When a mother must reach her office by eight every morning as I had to, for years and years, what is she to do when the baby falls down—and for all she knows may be seriously hurt—just as she is leaving the house to catch the last elevated that will enable her to make it by eight? The minute one introduces children into this question its difficulties become concrete."

MRS. MACDOUGALL admits that there are situations and conditions which make women desire to go outside their homes, sometimes, in order to have touch

with large affairs, but she does not think that they should always choose the money-making world for this purpose. She gives Ruth Pratt, Ruth McCormick and Winifred Holt Mather as examples of women who did not try to capitalize their ability, although they put it to the sharpest test.

"Each of these women has worked as hard as any business woman would dare to do," New York's well-known hostess declares. "Each has outstripped her former self, decade by decade, just the thing business women think they will do and rarely may."

"Business seldom offers opportunity for creation that other fields may have. Mrs. Mather created out of sheer idea, and a deep pity for the blind, a solution of their problem. They needed remunerative occupation and she created it for them. Could anything in business, no matter what the deal, be more adventurous than that? Is any tangle of conditions harder to unravel than the one she attacked, work for blind fingers that could be sold in quantity, and then money to make the venture live?"

"Mrs. Pratt, representative for the Twelfth District, New York City, and Mrs. McCormick, congressman-at-large for Illinois, likewise have had hard battles to fight and have given citizenship to politics. Each is representative of the new ideal of public service Mr. Hoover has already made felt throughout the country."

Mrs. MacDougall contends that when women are capable of being broadened by life, they will find ways to use and develop extraordinary capacities, basing it on the belief that the personality that demands an outlet also has the brains to find the most suitable outlet.

THE price which business demands is more than a period of concentrated hours, Mrs. MacDougall has learned. There is the inevitable routine and also the habit of thinking of business first, which keeps a gnawing question persistently in one's mind, no matter how rhythmically the orchestra may be playing and how soft the candles shine. It becomes impossible for one's mind to relax and play, the famous business woman acknowledges. She can only meet her home half-way for she cannot extend her spirit to it in the old gracious, graceful manner.

This loss of home is paralleled by loss of friends, old friends, the kind who have remained wives or mothers actively in the profession," Mrs. MacDougall continues. "These friends of one's childhood may bore one but I do not for a moment imply that any business woman has done or can do more than they. The matter is simply that one speaks a different language which is not at all necessarily a better one."

"Then, too, the fact that thinking about business may mean more money, tricks a woman into thinking that the little things that she once delighted to do about her home are no longer important. Maybe they're not, but they are part of her feminine heritage, and if she gives them up completely, there come many times when she feels she has sold her birthright for a mess of pottage."

"And so in the end, the joyful end of a business career when one has at last begun to make money—if one has gone out on one's own—in that golden time when one can meet big issues and settle them and take the joyful responsibility and the punishment like a man—in that time one goes out alone, goes to theaters alone, travels to Europe alone—life becomes very much a thing lived along within one's self, without the warm human companionship of one's fellows. Why? Who's fault? No one's fault. It is inherent in being a business woman for 20 or 30 years."

IN return for this loss, one has a comfortable amount of money, and people praise one and want to be nice to one's face and these things anything to be compared to the deep profound wisdom necessary to rear a child?

"Honestly know that in rearing children with their hearts and souls and minds, and in giving these children an intelligent setting in the world, women have a gigantic task, one bigger than they or anyone else can comprehend, for in it lies the destiny of mankind. No one can dispute that, of course. It is not new to recognize it, but I am stating it now because I want to point out that rearing children wisely and lovingly offers a field of larger opportunity to women than business can ever offer."

"But I have a beautiful time," she adds, "for I have learned to take my medicine. I just let life come, now—of course, it's a trick it takes many years to learn."



"A bawling out on Tuesdays and Thursdays might galvanize into action a wife who thinks her home-making job too small."

"At the very peak of their careers, when the thing they have worked so hard to attain comes to them—success in their own endeavors—they scarcely have the physical power to enjoy it. Certainly in these climax years they go home and 'go to bed' for they must be ready for the next day. No stimulating evening dinner parties, no sparkling contact of mind on mind, but sleep. It's a pathetic picture but it's true."

"Business men would be in the same dilemma, or an almost similar one, except that men of marked business success usually have wives who make their home and social lives for them. And women who make unusual places for themselves in business almost never have husbands who do that for them, if they have any at all. It isn't the normal role of husbands."

MONEY does not compensate for the joys which one must miss, in the eyes of this woman whose name is a byword in New York City. Happiness isn't measured in silver and gold, she insists, for there are so many things that money will not buy. Love and laughter, a heart of youth and the zest for living!

"It may not be an appalling picture for a woman to work 16 hours a day and sleep seven, if the routine brings her in money. At least some people will think she ought to feel lucky to be paid for this starved, sterile existence. I don't agree with them."

"The successful woman in business not only is physically shut off from new and old friends by the demands of her business. She has become a mental stranger to the friends of her childhood. Years of deciding issues and sticking by her decisions, wrong or right, have made her mind incisive. She automatically casts off loose ends and trifles in conversation and goes right to the heart of a matter."

"Is that good table technique? Ask any man who sits beside one. She feels loyal to her old acquaintances partly for the sense they give her of reality. She can look at them and realize that she is the same woman who started out so

The Texas Christian University eleven that comes to Lubbock on October 26 for its fourth annual game with the Tech Matadors will be a veteran aggregation, capable of making a smashing bid for the Southwestern Conference championship.

Unlike the majority of coaches, Francis Schmidt and "Bear" Wolf have already announced the personnel of their starting line. While the positions on the TCU forward wall have been filled, the T. C. U. backfield still remains a question. Clyde Robertson and Buster Walker will be the ends; Red Moore and Buck Barr, the tackles; Captain Scrimble and Phil Handler, the guards; and Noble Atkins, the center. Six of this number are letter men.

In the backfield, the T. C. U. mentors are likely to start Howard Brubbs at his old position at quarterback. Austin Griffin, who played a larger part of last season at fullback, will probably be back at this position, but the halfback positions are still open. Cy Leland, former Lubbock high school star, is the leading candidate among the army of halfbacks out for the first eleven. "Football" Moore, "Grassy" Hinton and Vance Woolwine are certain to make strong bids.

Down at Elctra, Coach Henry Stanford is putting in extra time in developing a forward wall to replace the one lost by graduation last year. Only one letter man is back from the 1928 Tiger line, but recent scrimmages have brought to light a number of promising line-men. Roy Curfman, the lad who started the training season with the local high school squad and later returned to Elctra, has practically clinched his position at center. Three powerful backs from last year's eleven are back and going strong. These are Bill Cross, H. White and Ocho Loftin. Yesterday's opening game of the Texas League playoff at Wichita Falls showed plainly the chief difference of the Dallas and Wichita Falls. Although packing the hardest punch at the plate, the Spudgers are far from the defensive club that the Steer outfit is. 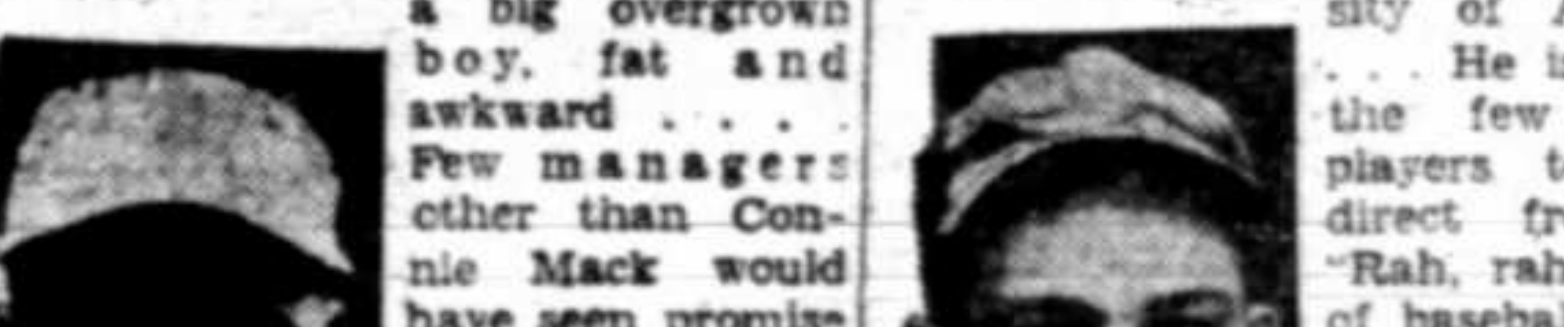

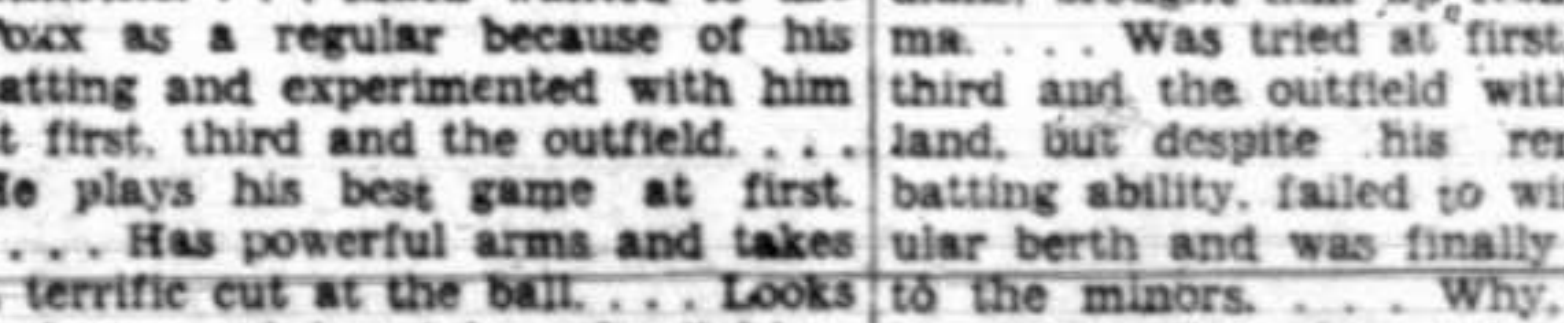

BOSTON MAKES WIN SURE FOR CHICAGO CLUB

GIANTS DOWN CHAMPS AS BRAVES WHIP PIRATES TWICE

CHICAGO, Sept. 19.—The 1929 champions of the National League, Chicago's Cubs today faced the business of going through motions of 11 ball games before engaging the Athletics in the battle for World title acclaim.

Although no championship has come to Chicago since 1919, and none to the Cubs since 1918, almost no excitement accompanied actual triumph of the team assembled by William Wrigley, Jr., and maneuvered to the title by Joseph V. McCarthy. Virtually "in" for two weeks, the Cubs had only to wait for the law of averages to go to work for them, and finally missed the thrill of making the deciding gesture themselves when Boston administered the coup de grace to Pirate hopes in the first game of yesterday's doubleheader.

Only a half-hearted cheer greeted the news when the Boston victory over Pittsburgh was posted at Wrigley Field where about 7,500 fans sat shivering as the New York Giants defeated the champions, 7 to 3.

McCarthy, Wrigley and President William L. Veech were smilingly happy. For McCarthy it was his first championship as a major league manager, earned after four years of effort. For Wrigley the title was his first as the owner of a major league club.

COTTON PRICE EASIER TODAY
FIRST TRADES REVEAL LOSSES OF FROM 1 TO 4 POINTS

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 19 (AP).—
The cotton market opened easier today in sympathy with lower cables than due. First trades showed losses of 1 to 4 points, and prices eased a point or two additional in sympathy with a like decline in New York. October traded off to 18.30 and December 18.61, or 3 to 4 points under yesterday's close. Cool weather induced some support towards the end of the first hour and the market was steadier with values 4 to 8 points above the loss.

The market ruled steady due to an improved export demand for medium grades of spot cotton with a resulting hardening of the basis. October 18.30 up to 18.30. December 18.73 and January 18.79, or 10 to 15 points above early lows. This was 7 to 9 points above yesterday's close. At mid-session the market was steady and at or near the highs.

DECLINE IS FROM 1 TO 6 IN GOTHAM
NEW YORK, Sept. 19 (AP).—The cotton market opened steady at a decline of 1 to 6 points with December selling off to 18.75, or into new low ground for the present movement under liquidation and southern selling evidently influenced by relatively easy cables and a more favorable view of the weather. The decline appeared to bring in increased trade demand, and the market eased. Early losses were about recovered by the end of the first half hour with active months selling a point or two above yesterday's close.

Reports trade buying had been largely responsible for absorption of early offerings and failure of better weather reports to bring in a greater volume of selling appeared to stimulate covering and some commission house buying later.
Trading was not active, but the market held very steady with prices showing net advances of about 5 to 7 points at mid-day when December was selling at 18.84.

EASTERN BANKS CREATE GIANT CORPORATION; MANY FIRMS JOIN

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—The New York Herald Tribune today said it has learned that formation of the world's first billion dollar investment trust under the leadership of powerful eastern banking interests has just been completed.

The new corporation, which will have twice the capitalization of the largest investment company now in existence, is sponsored by Stone and Webster, Inc., investment unit of the worldwide engineering and banking house of New York, Schoonmaker, Hutton and Pomeroy, banking pioneers in New York state power developments; the New York investment house of White, Weld and company, and Marine Union Investors, Inc., investment subsidiary of the Marine Trust company of Buffalo.

The new company, known as the Marine Midland corporation, has been formed to acquire controlling ownership in banks and trust companies in New York state, and ultimately in other states.

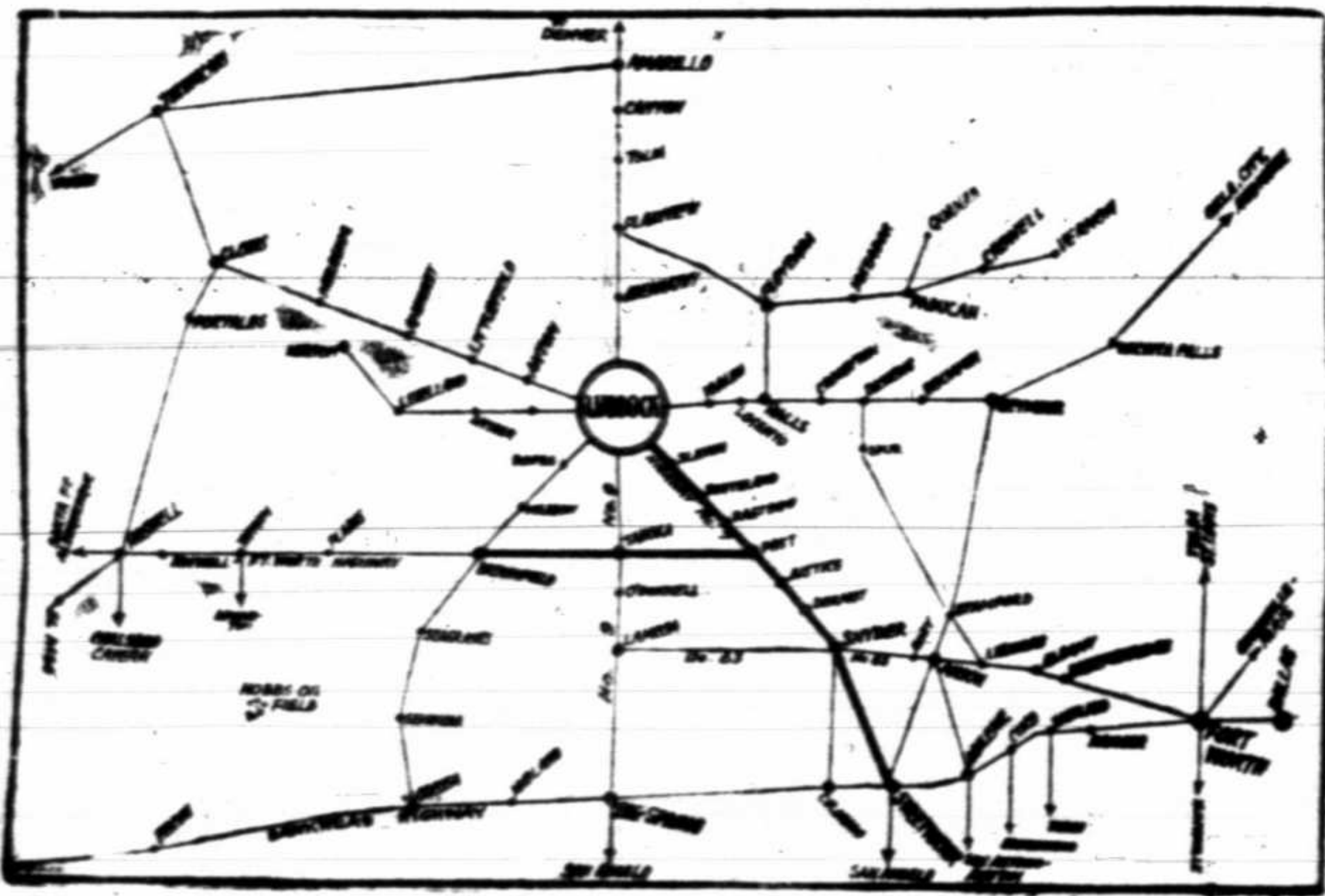
