Amarillo struggles to handle influx of refugees

State's 14th largest city receives highest ratio of new refugees to existing population

For the last five years, Titus Pa Thawng has lived thousands of miles from his native Myanmar in Amarillo, where he is a Christian pastor for a congregation of fellow refugees.

"God has sent us here," said Thawng, 45, a married father of three daughters.

More international refugees were resettled in Texas in 2012 than in any other state, according to the federal Office of Refugee Resettlement. And one of the leading destinations is Amarillo, where members of Thawng's church and other newcomers from places like Myanmar and Iraq often work in meatpacking plants.

Now local officials are worried that Amarillo's refugee population is straining the Panhandle city's ability to

respond to 911 callers who speak numerous languages and to help schoolchildren learn English and adapt to a new culture.

"We've raised some red flags and said this isn't good for some entities in the city or for the refugees themselves," said Mayor Paul Harpole.

Amarillo, the state's 14th largest city, with 195,000 residents, receives a higher ratio of new refugees to the existing population than any other Texas city, according to 2007-12 State Department data from U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry, R-Clarendon. And the only Texas cities that receive a larger number of refugees than Amarillo (which received 480 in 2012) are also the state's largest: Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth, Austin and San Antonio.

But those numbers show only a refugee's initial placement and do not account for secondary migration, Thornberry said. Many refugees who initially settle elsewhere relocate to Amarillo for jobs or to join family members.

The State Department decides how many refugees are resettled in an area, and states review those recommendations. Last fall, the department, the Texas Health and Human Services Commission and refugee placement organizations agreed that for 2014, placements in Amarillo should be limited to family reunifications, said Stephanie Goodman, a spokeswoman for the commission.

"We cannot keep going at the rate we've been going," Thornberry said.

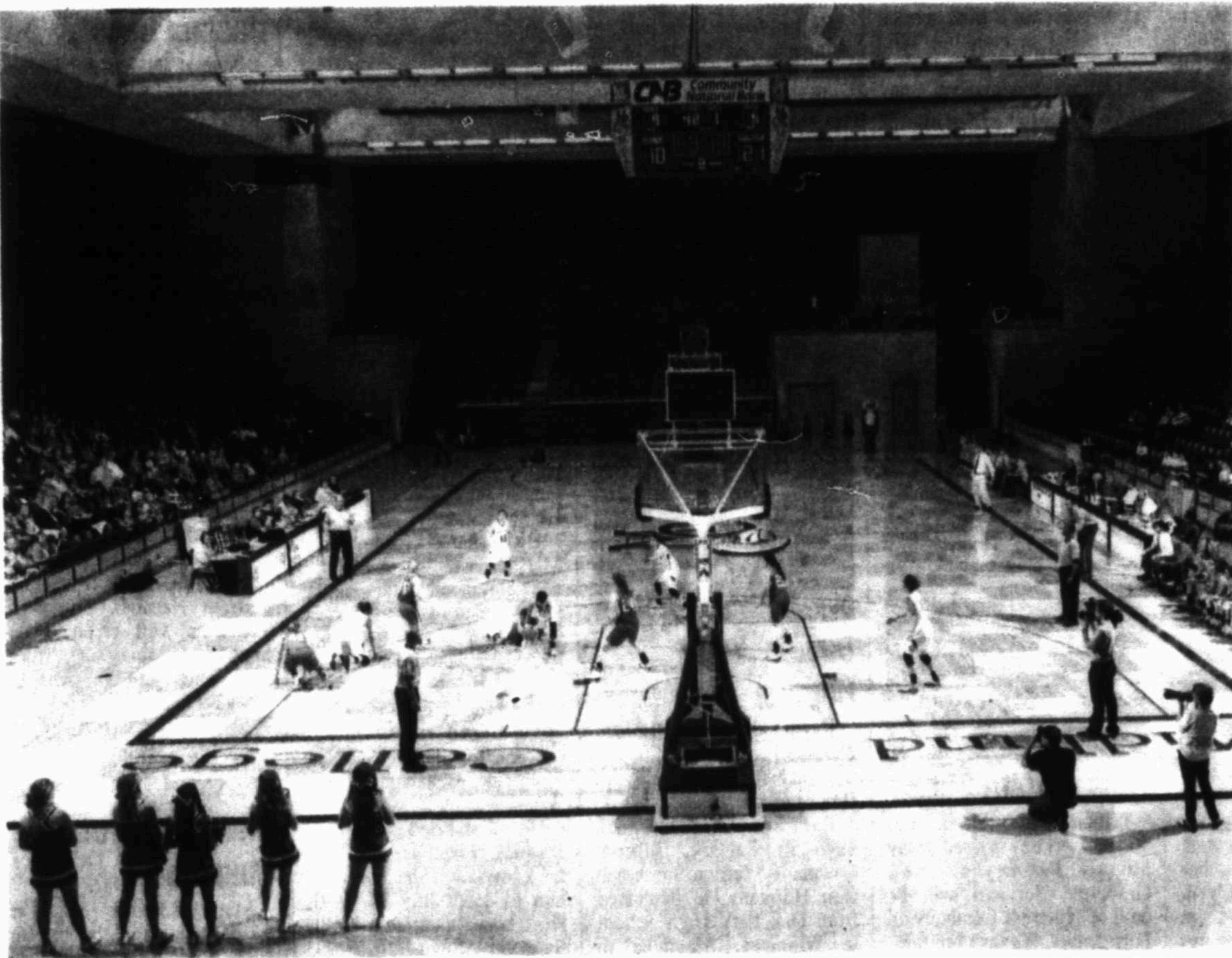
For Thuraya Lohony, who came to Texas seeking political asylum from Iraq, learning she was going to Amarillo came as a shock. She had never heard of the city.

"It's totally different from my country," she said. "We have mountains, rivers and hills, and it's green. But when we came, we found everything was just plains."

Even so, she soon considered Amarillo her home, and

Sporting events in Midland bring big money

While high school athletes get hyped about the chance to travel to Midland to compete with their sports teams, local businesses also get revved up.

Between this weekend and next, the Tall City will host two regional basketball tournaments, two golf tournaments, a track and field meet, a tennis tournament and baseball and softball tournaments — all of which will bring to Midland visitors from all over the Lone Star State.

Each event can bring Midland businesses between about \$200,000 and \$1.3 million in revenue from visitors spending money at hotels, restaurants, stores and gas stations, according to Brenda Kissko, a spokeswoman for the Midland Texas Convention and Visitors Bureau.

The CVB estimated that the sporting events hosted in Midland between Feb. 13 and March 2 will bring in about \$3,029,100 from direct visitor spending, which also includes \$212,400 that came from the Midland College Classic Softball Tournament that took place last

weekend.

The estimate does not include money brought in from either of the basketball tournaments or the boys' golf invitation. Kissko said the CVB only keeps track of direct visitor spending from events that it helps finance with funds from the Sports and Entertainment Association of Midland, or SEAM.

The Schlumberger Tournament of Champions, a baseball tournament, is expected to bring in the largest chunk of cash — totaling more than \$1.3 million, according to the CVB. The West Texas Classic Softball Tournament is projected to contribute \$875,000 in direct visitor spending — the second highest of the events.

There are more sporting events coming to Midland this year than in 2013, said Sarah Marston, CVB sports sales manager.

Three softball tournaments were canceled last year because there weren't enough teams that could afford to stay in Midland, likely because of the hotel rates in town, Marston said.

But those tournaments are back this year, she said.

"We're really excited this year that they're back and business is good," Marston said. "Hotels are affordable and we have availability."

Kissko said the increased number of hotel rooms in Midland has really helped to drive down rates, allowing more teams to afford to stay here. More than 1,600 hotel rooms were built last year, according to CVB statistics.

SEAM funds were not used to help pay for the cost of hotels for any of these sporting events, Marston said. The association used its funds to make the cost of hotels more affordable for teams as recently as last October, she said.

The Wall High School Hawks girls' basketball team on Tuesday qualified to play in the Region 1-2A tournament at Chaparral Center for the third consecutive year, and Head Coach Tate Lombard said he noticed the hotel rates were lower this year compared to the previous two.

Lombard said the team had to pay about \$140 a night in 2012 and about \$120 per night last year. But this year,

Nugent backlash reveals rare misstep for Texas GOP

AUSTIN — Mitt Romney rallied with Kid Rock and President George W. Bush had a fan in Alice Cooper. But a Ted Nugent encore in the Texas governor's race is growing unlikely after blowback from Republican Greg Abbott's embrace of the ultimate shock rocker.

Call it a rare case of veering too far right in Texas this election year.

Abbott, the leading Republican candidate to succeed Gov. Rick Perry, acknowledged Friday that Nugent calling President Barack Obama a "subhuman mongrel" last month merited an apology. The brash gun-right activist made two campaign appearances with Abbott this week.

Nugent, who has also suggested treating immigrants like "indentured servants," had apologized earlier Friday for the Obama slur after it was disavowed by Gov. Rick Perry and Republican U.S. Sen. Rand Paul of Kentucky.

But Abbott, who until now had claimed ignorance about Nugent's divisive comments, didn't back away from inviting Nugent to rallies in the first place.

"This is not the kind of language I would use or endorse in any way. It's time to move beyond this, and I will continue to focus on the issues that matter to Texans," Abbott said in a statement.

The Nugent flap was the latest example of GOP candidates staying unabashedly to the right as they approach the state's March 4 primary, which will move Texas closer to its biggest power shakeup in a decade. Every statewide office could change hands this November. Perry and U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz could also present two potential 2016 presidential candidates from Texas.

The tone of the GOP race contrasts with assertions by Democratic gubernatorial candidate Wendy Davis and her party that Texas is becoming a broader political battleground as its demographics change.

Provocative conservative proposals to repeal the 17th Amendment, which lets voters — not state legislatures — pick U.S. senators, have been kicked around in the race for lieutenant governor. One of the candidates called the flow of immigrants from Mexico an "invasion." Anti-abortion credentials are discussed as freely as energy ideas among Republicans vying to regulate the state's oil and gas industry.

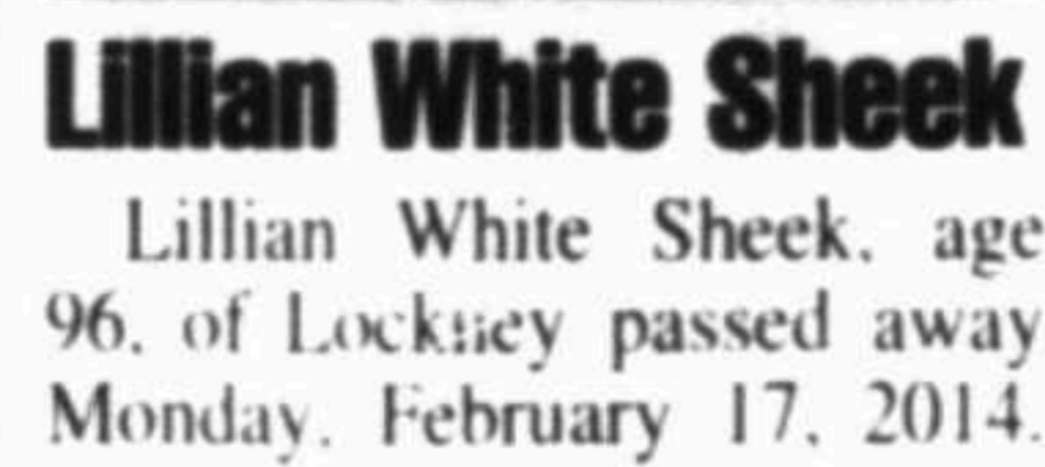

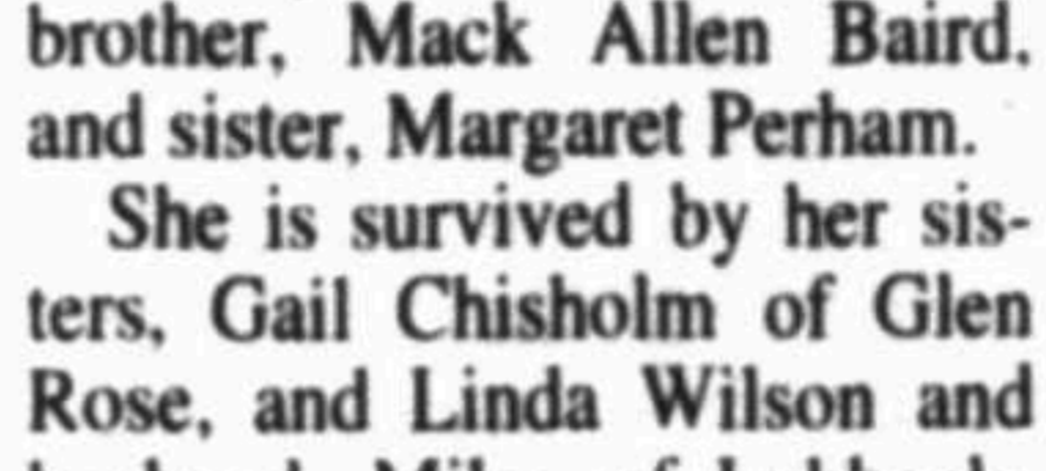

"Meet the Press." He later worked for ABC News and CNN.

Utley began his career auspiciously, rising from office clerk to Vietnam War correspondent in one year. In 1964 he became one of the first network reporters based in Saigon, joining newspaper and wire-service correspondents. Like some of his colleagues, he strived for meaningful reporting, offering longer perspectives on political issues and

battlefield developments and bringing a little-known war home vividly to Americans.

In 1968, Utley covered the invasion of Czechoslovakia as Soviet and Warsaw Pact forces crushed the so-called Prague Spring political reforms. He covered the 1973 Yom Kippur war, interviewed the Nazi leader Albert Speer in 1976, reported on the Cold War from Berlin and Moscow and, in 1987, interviewed the dissident physicist

Andrei D. Sakharov as he emerged from years of internal exile. He covered a summit of Presidents George H.W. Bush and Mikhail S. Gorbachev in 1989, the fall of the Berlin Wall that same year and the Persian Gulf war in 1990.

Utley was no swash-buckler in a trench coat: He was a 6-foot-6 scarecrow with gentle eyes and a wry smile who slouched beside his small German-born wife. He loved opera and for years was the host of the Metropolitan Opera broadcasts on PBS. He was also a workhorse on assignment, an aggressive voice in the studio and a

critic of the networks when they cut back international news coverage and in-depth reporting.

Serious television reporting has largely been replaced by "interminable talking heads," he told The New York Times in 2004, when he joined a State University of New York graduate program in international relations in Manhattan. "Since television can now report live from anywhere in the world, television reporters sometimes become color commentators who narrate news events rather than carrying out in-depth news reporting."

Garrick Utley, NBC anchor and foreign correspondent, dies at 74

Garrick Utley, a former anchor for NBC News who for many years was one of a rare breed in television news reporting, a full-time foreign correspondent, died Thursday night at his home in Manhattan. He was 74. He died of prostate cancer, his wife, Gertje Utley, said. From the battlefields of Vietnam and Iraq to the Soviet-led invasion

The kids refused to admit the officer, who was forced to break down the door with his shoulder, the document said.

A teen, later identified as Losoya, was the first person the officer grabbed, but he reportedly pushed away and ran out the back door. The officer then tackled the teen and tried to arrest him, the affidavit said.

The teen continued to resist and punched the officer in the ribs and then in the face, the report said.

The officer consequently pulled the teen's shirt over his head and punched him in the chest and the face, according to the affidavit.

The back door of the house then was shut and locked, allowing Losoya to roll away from the officer, jump a fence and run down an alley, the document said.

After an investigation, the officer identified the teen as Losoya and arrested him on Friday.

If convicted, Losoya could face between five and 99 years in prison.

17 years later, she's still there. She is now interim director of refugee resettlement at Catholic Charities of the Texas Panhandle, which helps people who have fled war and persecution find homes and jobs. Many find work at area meatpacking plants, which often pay \$14 an hour, Lohony said.

But Harpole said demand for workers at the plants was declining. "We just think it's going to be more difficult for the refugees to do well here," he said.

For schools, challenges include educating students who sometimes cannot read in English or in their native language, Thornberry said.

"You look at the burden you're placing on the school system not only to meet the testing requirements but to help integrate these kids into modern American life," he said.

Cultural differences are also an issue outside schools, he said. Recently a refugee was found on a local ranch hunting for

food. "Obviously, it was quite a shock to some of the ranchers," Thornberry said.

Some local churches work to help Amarillo's refugees. Trinity Fellowship last year created a refugee outreach position. Since Russ Pennington started the job, he has taught English to refugees from Somalia and Myanmar and has worked with Refugee Services of Texas to help new arrivals settle into apartments.

"Sometimes there's fear associated with refugees coming into a community," Pennington said. "But the more we get to know each other and interact with each other, the less we'll see challenges and the more we'll see opportunity."

Harpole said Amarillo had a decades-long history of welcoming refugees and would continue to do so.

"We don't want to get the idea out that we are not supportive of refugees," he said. "We've been very accepting. But we also need to keep it in a ratio that's healthy for the refugees as well as the residents."

Texas candidate sees roadkill as food, not waste

SAN ANTONIO — A candidate for the Texas House wants to see the state offer up a new kind of roadside dining.

Rack of raccoon or smidgen of pigeon would be on the menu if legislators were to take up a call by Tink Nathan to allow motorists to collect and consume roadkill. Gathering it currently is a misdemeanor.

"That meat goes to waste. Why not utilize it?" asked Nathan, 72. The suggestion to expand the state's culinary options sets Nathan apart from the four other Republicans looking to succeed longtime state Rep. Harvey Hilderbrand in District 53, which extends northwest of San Antonio to the border.

Nathan pointed out that harvesting and eating roadkill is legal in other states.

The Center Point resident told the San Antonio Express-News that each dead

deer could yield about 80 pounds of usable meat and cited records that show 1,450 deer were removed from state highways in Kerr County alone in 2006.

"Certainly not all of it could be saved. Nobody will take it if it's stinking," Nathan said, adding, "Axis (deer) venison sells for \$26 a pound."

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department spokesman Tom Harvey said the agency has no stance on the idea, but added that there are public health and safety issues. "People stopping on roadides to harvest dead animals could be struck by vehicles. Eating dead animals found on roadides could make people sick," he said.

Allowing the retrieval of animals accidentally killed could encourage poaching with cars, Harvey added. Hunting white-tailed deer by striking them with a motor vehicle is punishable by a fine of up to \$500.

Abbott: Nugent 'rightly apologized' for Obama slur

AUSTIN — Republican Attorney General Greg Abbott said Ted Nugent "rightly apologized" for degrading comments that resurfaced after welcoming the polarizing rocker to his campaign for Texas governor.

But Abbott in a statement Friday didn't back away from inviting Nugent in the first place. He said "it's time to move beyond this" after his appearance with Nugent this week put Abbott on the defensive for one of the first times in his campaign.

Nugent last month called President Barack Obama a "subhuman mongrel" in an interview. He apologized earlier Friday after Gov. Rick Perry and U.S. Sen. Rand Paul of Kentucky disavowed the remark.

Abbott said Nugent's comment was "not the kind of language I would use or endorse in any way." He said he believed Nugent recognized his language was wrong.

Within the last year, Texas passed a divisive 20-week ban on abortions, imposed cuts that caused Planned Parenthood clinics to shutter and enacted one of the nation's most stringent voter ID laws. That hasn't protected the Republican House speaker, however, from a far-right group that has collected six-figure donations for primary challengers against him and top lieutenants.

The tack reflects a clear judgment about Republican voters' tastes. "All they seem to argue about is who's the most conservative — which is good for me," said voter Bob Baker after taking his seat at a Republican primary debate near Austin. "Just as normal as they shouldn't have any conservatives in New York, we shouldn't have any liberals in Texas."

But the Nugent episode isn't the first time a leading Republican may have touched a nerve. State Rep. Jason Villalba, a rising Republican star in Texas, sharply urged his party's four lieutenant governor candidates to stop using harsh rhetoric about immigrants in the country illegally and "acknowledge the humanity" in an open letter this month.

"They're not war-mongering adversaries. They're seeking the American dream," Villalba said.

Abbott, who's been state attorney general since 2002 and boasts of suing the federal government 30 times, has essentially run a general-election campaign from the start. Abbott said inviting Nugent magnified a contrast with his Demo-

cratic opponent, who has made her pitch for conservative voters by coming out in favor of "open carry" gun laws before qualifying her stance.

But the Nugent appearance left Abbott on the defensive for one of the first times in the race.

"I don't know what he may have said or done in his background," Abbott said following a rally with Nugent on Tuesday. "What I do know is Ted Nugent stands for the Constitution. He stands against the federal government overreaching and doing what they're doing to harm Texans."

Perry, who isn't seeking re-election after 14 years in office, said Thursday he's "got a problem" with calling the president a mongrel and called the language inappropriate. But he predicted voters would not be distracted from Davis' "liberal" record.

Davis spokesman Bo Delp blasted Abbott's statement Friday for excluding "anything about his poor judgment" to embrace Nugent.

Nugent told Dallas radio station WBAP that he apologized "for using the street fight terminology of subhuman mongrel." But he maintained that Obama was a "liar" violating the Constitution.

Nugent, who's also treasurer of a Republican candidate for Texas agriculture commissioner, said Texas must defend its brand of ultra-conservatism.

"This is special. There is no other Texas anymore," Nugent said while introducing Abbott this week. "This is last bastion of rugged individualism, of true independence."

AUSTIN Feds grant protection for Central Texas species

Federal officials have granted "endangered species" status to two salamander species unique to Central Texas.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced Friday the listing of the Georgetown salamander and the Salado salamander. It said the small amphibians are endangered by habitat degradation and changes in the flow and quality of water in the springs where they live.

The agency also proposes adopting a new Georgetown city ordinance aimed at reducing contamination from spills and creation of buffer zones around the salamanders' habitat.

Man charged with shining laser at aircraft

Authorities said a West Texas man has been arrested and charged with shining a laser on a helicopter flying overhead.

Don Ray Dorsett was arrested Friday in El Paso. If convicted, the 28-year-old El Paso man faces up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

No one was injured in the Jan. 4 incident. How-

ever, U.S. Attorney Robert Pittman said in a statement issued Friday that pointing lasers at aircraft poses a risk to flight crews, passengers and people on the ground.

Texas agency using bonuses to hire prison guards

AMARILLO — Bonuses of \$4,000 are being offered to boost recruitment of state corrections officers as Texas prisons contend with short staffs.

Prisons across the state are in need of guards but the situation is particularly acute in the Panhandle, where nearly 150 guards are needed to fill vacancies at three facilities, according to a report by the Amarillo Globe-News.

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice recently announced the signing bonuses are being increased from \$3,000 for those who sign one-year contracts. The department wants the new hires for rural prisons and areas where the agency competes for workers with the booming oil and gas industry.

"The agency is aggressively recruiting


applicants not only for these units but for correctional facilities across the state," TDCJ spokesman Jason Clark told the Globe-News. "The recruitment bonus is another tool the agency is using to attract applicants to apply for positions at units that are facing staffing challenges."

Full-time prison guards start with a salary of \$29,220, which can rise to \$38,880 after 7½ years.

There are 15 prisons offering the bonuses, including those near the Panhandle towns of Dalhart and Pampa. Dalhart has 205 authorized positions and 70 are open. The two units near Pampa have 234 combined positions and 79 openings, according to TDCJ.

Employees must repay the bonus — or a prorated amount, depending on how long they work — if they leave the job.

Cellphones on planes? Don't ask the feds

WASHINGTON — It looks like the government is more conflicted about cellphones on planes than most travelers. Even as one federal agency considers allowing the calls, another now wants to make sure that doesn't happen.
 Passengers — particularly those who fly often — oppose allowing calls in flight, polls show. In line with that sentiment, the Transportation Department signaled in a notice

posted online Friday that it is considering retaining the 23-year-old ban on the calls and asked for public comments. But the notice comes just two months after the Federal Communications Commission voted to pursue lifting the ban.
 The Transportation Department regulates aviation consumer issues. The FCC has responsibility over whether the use of cellphones in flight would interfere with cellular networks on the ground.
 Echoing some travelers'

concerns, the Transportation Department said it believes allowing passengers to make cellphone calls "may be harmful or injurious" to other passengers.
 This is because "people tend to talk louder on cellphones than when they're having face-to-face conversations," the department said. "They are also likely to talk more and further increase the noise on a flight, as passengers would not be simply talking to the persons sitting next to them but can call

whomever they like."
 Some planes already have seat-back phones in place, but they are rarely used, it said.
 The "concern is not about individual calls, but rather the cumulative impact of allowing in-flight calls in close quarters," the department said.
 The FCC has already received more than 1,200 public comments on its proposal, almost all of them opposed to lifting the ban.

Oil train wrecks spur railroad safety measures

BILLINGS, Mont. — Railroads that haul volatile crude shipments have reached an agreement with U.S. transportation officials to adopt wide-ranging, voluntary safety measures after a string of explosive and deadly accidents.

ping terminals along the Mississippi River and other major waterways.

The deal signed Friday calls for oil trains to be slowed from a maximum of 50 to 40 miles per hour through major cities, more frequent track inspections and better emergency response planning along routes that carry trains hauling up to 3 million gallons of crude each.
 The new safety steps would begin going into effect in late March and be fully in place by July 1.
 After a boom in domestic drilling in recent years, oil trains now travel thousands of miles from oil producing areas, including the Northern Plains, to coastal refineries and ship-

The agreement does not resolve concerns over another hazardous fuel, ethanol, involved in a spate of rail accidents in recent years. It also does not address an estimated 78,000 flawed tank cars that carry crude and ethanol and are known to split open during derailments.

The U.S. Department of Transportation said it would address the tank car issue separately.

By taking voluntary steps, the railroads will be able to act more quickly than if they waited for new safety rules to be drafted and approved by the government, said Robert Chipkevich, a former director of rail accident investigations at the National Transportation Safety Board.

But regulators will have little leverage to enforce the industry's commitments, he added.

the team was able to snatch up \$109 a night rates. The prices can take a toll on the traveling experience, he said.

"From past experiences, if we have some down time, kids always like to go to the mall, look around and shop," he said.

The CVB estimated the tennis tournament alone would bring \$255,000 of direct visitor spending to Midland.

Midland also landed another big tennis tournament scheduled for May. The U.S. Tennis Association — Texas Junior Team

Tennis Spring Section Championships is estimated to draw about 750 people to the city, according to the CVB.

The event is expected to also create \$700,000 in direct visitor spending between two nights.

"It's a huge deal," Marston said. "Midland has never hosted it before."

Marston said she expects Midland to get even more events this year, citing the benefit of having more available hotel rooms.

"We need sports to stay alive in Midland and I think our community knows that," she said. "We're ready to roll out the red carpet."

US rig count up seven this week to 1,771

HOUSTON — The number of rigs exploring for oil and natural gas in the U.S. increased seven this week to 1,771, according to a report released Friday by Houston-based oilfield services company Baker Hughes.

There were 1,425 rigs listed as searching for oil, up two; 342 as searching for natural gas, up five, and four as miscellaneous, unchanged. A year ago this week there were 1,329 oil rigs and 428 gas rigs.

By trajectory, there were 392 vertical drilling rigs, up 12; 1,182 horizontal drilling rigs, down one; and 197 directional drilling rigs, down four.

At this time last year there were 1,761 rigs in the U.S.

The number of rigs exploring for oil and natural gas in Texas increased six this week to 846. There were 843 rigs in Texas a year ago this week.

The Permian Basin added one rig to end the week at 487. The Eagle Ford added five rigs for a total of 221. The Granite Wash had 54 rigs, down one. The Barnett was unchanged at 30 rigs.

The top five basins by rig count this week were the Permian, the Eagle Ford; the Williston with 174, down two; the Marcellus with 82, down two; and the Mississippian with 74, down four.

The top five states by rig count this week were Texas; Oklahoma with 181, down one; North Dakota with 166, down two; Louisiana with 105, down two; and New Mexico with 81, down two.

In the U.S. there were 1,696 rigs listed as on land, up four; 18 as in inland waters, unchanged; 57 as offshore, up three; and 55 in the Gulf of Mexico, up three.

The number of rigs exploring for oil and natural gas in Canada increased eight this week to 632. There were 422 rigs listed as searching for oil, up seven; 210 as searching for natural gas, up one; and zero as miscellaneous, unchanged. A year ago this week there were 662 rigs in Canada.

The total number of rigs exploring for oil and natural gas in North America — which includes the U.S.

and Canada — increased 15 this week for a total of 2,403. At this time last year there were 2,423 rigs in North America.

Crude oil remains above \$102

The price of oil fell slightly but remained above \$102 on Friday, underpinned by U.S. demand for heating oil during a winter that does not seem to want to end.

Benchmark U.S. crude for April delivery fell 55 cents to close at \$102.20 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. On Thursday, the contract fell 9 cents to close at \$102.75.

Oil is up 2 percent for the week, however, on higher demand for heating oil in the U.S. as forecasters predicted a return of more cold weather in the coming weeks after a brief warm spell.

"Market players are now looking at weather conditions in the U.S., it's quite cold and heating oil demand is getting tighter so that is supporting the crude oil prices," said Tetsu Emori, commodity markets fund manager at ASTMAZ Futures Co. in Tokyo.

Analysts said the recent rising trend in oil prices, which climbed for the sixth week in a row, could be about to reverse, however, because of tempering global demand and ample supplies.

A report on manufac-

turing activity in China released Wednesday suggested global economic growth could weaken, which would reduce demand for gasoline, diesel and jet fuel.

Also, supplies appear to be relatively strong in the U.S., despite the higher demand, according to this week's oil report from the U.S. Energy Department.

"Crude stocks in the U.S. were up week-on-week, while the draw in distillate inventories was lower than expected," said a report from JBC Energy in Vienna. "Together with the weak Chinese data from Wednesday, this took a part of the enthusiasm out of the recent rally."

Brent crude, a benchmark used to set prices for international varieties of crude used by many U.S. refineries, was down 45 cents to close at \$109.85 a barrel in London.

The average retail price of gasoline in the U.S. rose for the 14th straight day, to \$3.39 per gallon. That's the highest level for the year, but it is 39 cents below where it was last year at this time.

Texas man wants to withdraw plea in pipeline blast

A Texas man who pleaded guilty to trying to blow up a natural gas pipeline with a homemade bomb last year in a Dallas suburb wants to withdraw that plea.

A hearing Wednesday is scheduled for Anson Chi in a federal court in Plano.

The 34-year-old Plano man had pleaded guilty June 3 to maliciously attempting to destroy an Atmos Energy natural gas pipeline in Plano. He also pleaded guilty to possessing an explosive device not registered with the National Firearms Registration and Transfer Record.

Prosecutors and defense attorneys agreed that Chi would be sentenced to the maximum 22 years in prison, but that sentence hasn't been imposed yet. Chi doesn't explain in his handwritten motion the reason for his change of heart.

ALASKA

Senate Resources unveils version of gas line bill

JUNEAU — The Senate Resources Committee on Friday unveiled a version of a gas pipeline bill that largely remained true to what Gov. Sean Parnell proposed, with some clarifications.

The draft said confidential information related to contract negotiations shall be shared with the Legislature in executive session or under confidentiality

agreements. The original version said "may." Chairwoman Cathy Giessel, R-Anchorage, said she wanted to make sure lawmakers were involved.

The draft also said the fixed royalty rate for gas cannot fall below 12.5 percent, and it incorporated an idea proposed by Sen. Lesli McGuire, R-Anchorage, that a plan be developed that would recommend how Alaskans could invest in the pipeline with their Permanent Fund dividends.

Additional amendments were expected to be discussed Friday afternoon.

State officials have signed a commercial agreement with TransCanada Corp., the Alaska Gasline Development Corp., or AGDC, and the North Slope's major players, BP PLC, ConocoPhillips and Exxon Mobil Corp., spelling out terms for pursuing a major liquefied natural gas project capable of overseas exports. The agreement anticipates a state stake of about 20 to 25 percent.

The state has separately signed an agreement with TransCanada in which the company would carry Alaska's interest in the pipeline and gas treat-

ment plant. While the state would have an equity buyback option, the arrangement is seen as a way for the state to not have to shoulder as much in the way of upfront costs as it would without TransCanada in the picture.

The agreement also would serve as a transition away from the Alaska Gasline Inducement Act, the law under which TransCanada has been pursuing a pipeline for years with Exxon Mobil but which Parnell has said no longer fits with the current situation, which features a change in project type and players.

The bill under consideration is aimed at moving the project into a phase of preliminary engineering and design. It would, among other things, allow the Natural Resources commissioner to negotiate terms for proposed project contracts that would be brought back to the Legislature for approval. It would allow certain leases to pay production taxes with gas, and it would move from a net tax to gross tax on gas, with a rate set at 10.5 percent beginning Jan. 1, 2022. That rate, combined with royalties, would determine the state's participation rate.

Transcripts show Fed at times slow to grasp crisis

WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve agonized in 2008 over how far to go to stop a financial crisis that threatened to cause a recession and at times struggled to recognize its speed and magnitude.

"We're crossing certain lines. We're doing things we haven't done before," Chairman Ben Bernanke said as Fed officials met in an emergency session March 10 and launched never-before-taken steps to lead to teetering Wall Street firms, among a series of unorthodox moves that year to calm investors and aid the economy.

"On the other hand, this financial crisis is now in its eighth month, and the economic outlook has worsened quite significantly."

The Fed on Friday released hundreds of pages of transcripts covering its 14 meetings during 2008 — eight regularly scheduled meetings and six emergency sessions. The Fed releases full transcripts of each year's policy meetings after a five-year lag.

The 2008 transcripts cover the most tumultuous period of the crisis, including the collapse and rescue of investment bank Bear Stearns, the government takeover of mortgage giants Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, the fateful decision to let investment

bank Lehman Brothers fold in the largest bankruptcy in U.S. history and the bailout of insurer American International Group.

For all its aggressive steps in 2008, the transcripts show the Fed failing at times to grasp the size of the catastrophe they were dealing with. Bernanke and his top lieutenants often expressed puzzlement that they weren't managing to calm panicky investors.

As late as Sept. 16, a day after Lehman Brothers filed for bankruptcy, Bernanke declared, "I think that our policy is looking actually pretty good."

The Fed declined at that meeting to cut its benchmark short-term rate. Yet just three weeks later, after the Fed had rescued AIG, Bernanke felt compelled to call an emergency conference call. In it, he won approval for a half-point rate cut.

Early in the year, some Fed officials had yet to appreciate the gravity of the

crisis. In January, Frederic Mishkin, a Fed governor, missed an emergency conference call because he was "on the slopes."

"I think in Idaho somewhere," Bernanke said.

The crisis had been building for months. In the Jan. 21 conference call, Bernanke rallied support for a deep cut in interest rates. He warned that market turmoil reflected investors' concerns that "the United States is in for a deep and protracted recession."

Bernanke apologized for convening the call on the Martin Luther King holiday. But he felt the urgency of the crisis required the Fed to act before its regularly scheduled meeting the next week. It approved a cut of three-fourths of a percentage point in its benchmark for short-term rates.

The transcripts show that Bernanke enjoyed the support of Janet Yellen, who succeeded him this month as Fed chair, for

the unconventional policy actions he was pushing. At the time, Yellen was head of the Fed's San Francisco regional bank.

At an Oct. 28-29 Fed meeting, Yellen noted the dire events that had occurred that fall. With a nod to Halloween, she said the Fed had received "witch's brew of news."

"The downward trajectory of economic data," Yellen went on, "has been hair-raising — with employment, consumer sentiment, spending and orders for capital goods, and homebuilding all contracting."

Market conditions had "taken a ghastly turn for the worse," she said. "It is becoming abundantly clear that we are in the midst of a serious global meltdown."

Yellen had downgraded her economic outlook and was predicting a recession.

with four straight quarters of declining growth. The recession was later determined to have begun in December 2007. It lasted until June 2009.

The Fed's moves failed to prevent colossal damage from the crisis. The U.S. economy sank into the worst recession since the 1930s. But Fed officials and many economists have argued that without the Fed's aggressive actions, the Great Recession would have been more catastrophic, perhaps rivaling the Great Depression.

"I really am extremely nervous about the current situation," Mishkin said at a July meeting. "We've been in this now for a year, but, boy, this is deviating from most financial disruptions or crisis episodes in terms of the length and the fact that it really hasn't gotten better. We keep on

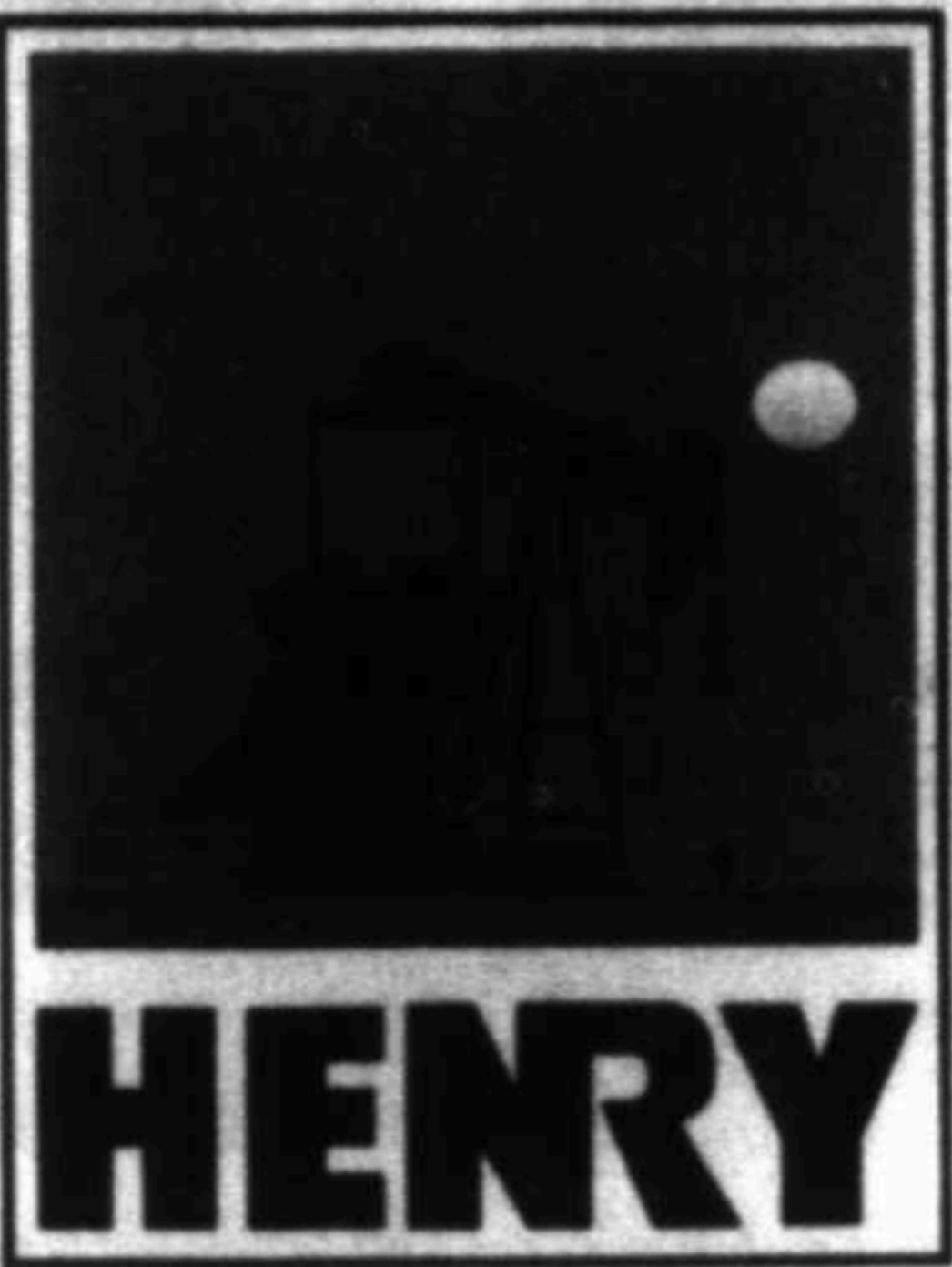
having shoes dropping."

Even as they grappled with a floundering financial system and an economy in freefall, Fed policymakers wondered how history would judge them. Bernanke, acknowledging that they were operating in "the fog of war," said in late October: "I would defend what we've done in terms of the general direction, acknowledging that execution is not always perfect, and that communication is not always perfect."

But Bernanke wrestled with doubts, too. At an April meeting, he said: "I play Jekyll and Hyde quite a bit and argue with myself in the shower and other places."

By the end of 2008, the Fed had made seven rate cuts, leaving its benchmark short-term rate on Dec. 16 at a record low near zero. It remains there today.

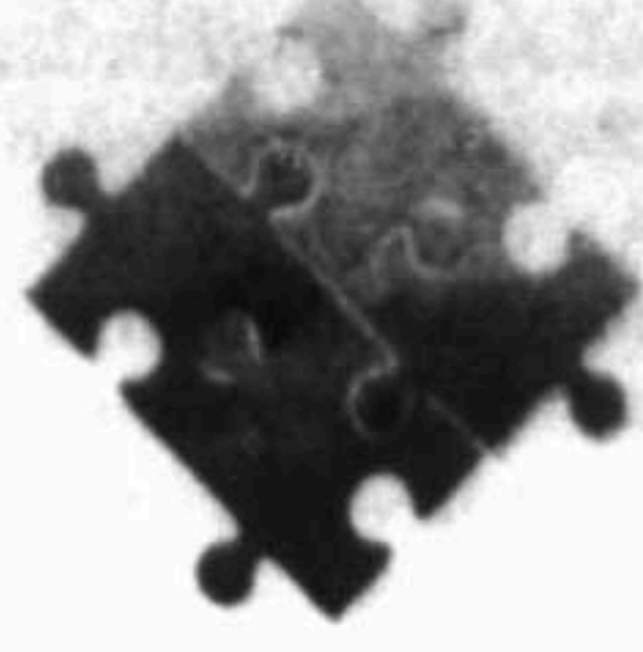

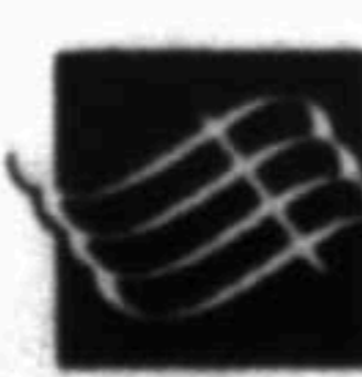

One of those injured was junior pitcher Kassie Maddox, who is playing in her first games of the season this weekend at the Freddie Ezell Softball Complex. With Maddox out, Price had to pitch some at the beginning of the year away from her usual position as the team's first baseman. But that's a role Price was already used to as she did it last year and will do so from time to time, Greenwood head Lee Ann Curry said.

"I don't mind pitching," Price said. "I enjoy it, and I've gotten better than I was in the past couple of years. But as long as Kassie is up there and

Canada beats US to reach gold-medal game

SOCHI — For the rematch, Canada skipped the overtime and shelved the theatrics.

One slick goal and 60 minutes of stifling defensive hockey kept the Canadians firmly on top of the U.S. and moved them to the brink of gold again.

Jamie Benn scored in the second period. Carey Price made 31 saves, and Canada beat the United States 1-0 Friday night in the semifinals of the Olympic men's hockey tournament.

Canada advanced to the gold-medal match Sunday against Sweden, which beat Finland 2-1 in the earlier semifinal at Bolshoy Ice Dome.

With an unbeaten run through Sochi, the Canadians are a win away from their third gold medal in four Olympics, and they're guaranteed their first medals outside North America in 20 years.

Although it was fast-paced and well-played, this win had none of the flair of Sidney Crosby's overtime goal to beat the U.S. four years ago. The Canadians didn't care.

"We didn't score a lot of goals, but we didn't have to," Canada forward Jonathan Toews said. "The next game will follow that work ethic. We can check, we can work our tails off, and we can make things real tough for the other team."

After its first loss in Sochi, the U.S. will face Finland for bronze on Saturday. The Americans were hoping for redemption from their gut-wrenching defeat in 2010, but they only got a businesslike reminder of Canada's clout.

"We didn't show up to play," U.S. defenseman Ryan Suter said. "It's too bad. We sat back. We were passive. You can't play scared. I thought we sat on our heels and just didn't take it to them at all."

Indeed, the defending Olympic champions left little doubt about their North American hockey dominance in a rematch of the finale of the Vancouver Games. Although the Canadians had no signature moments and never pulled away, they also never appeared seriously threatened.

From faceoff to final buzzer, Canada was in control thanks to Price, Benn and defenseman Jay Bouwmeester, whose pass created Benn's goal. All three play-

However, playing this well hasn't always been the case.

A combination of injuries, illness and personal tragedy caused her to take some time away from tennis. Anderson continued playing at the high school level for the Dragons, however she stopped playing in some of the other tournaments outside of high school.

"I was playing a lot of USTA

tournaments and a lot of Super Champ tournaments and ITF tournaments, and then about freshman year I had some family stuff come up and stopped playing pretty much altogether," Anderson said Friday at the Bush Tennis Center. "That's why my play kind of declined a little bit — because I wasn't practicing as much. I then got hurt because I wasn't practicing as much."

In her freshman year, Anderson was the state runner-up. In her sophomore year, Anderson finished third. Last year Anderson made it to state again but lost in the first round.

"I was sad," Anderson said. "I knew the level I could play at, and I wasn't playing at that level. I was frustrated."

Southlake Carroll tennis coach Corey Aldridge said he could see

some of the personal struggles she was facing affected her play.

"She had some personal turmoil," Aldridge said. "In her freshman year she was one of the top players in the country. She was playing really well, one of the top two kids in Texas, and then she went through that turmoil, and that kind of set her back a lot."

Among the most tragic events was the death of her 20-year-old brother Aaron, who died in a car wreck during Anderson's sophomore year. The Baylor signee said to this day she still misses him.

"I signed to Baylor in November, and that's one of the things that I wish I could tell him," Anderson said. "It's always there in my mind that he's not there. It's

definitely still fresh in my mind. It still doesn't seem real even though it's been two years."

Injuries have also hampered her ability to recover and get back into playing shape.

"I started and stopped playing too much," Anderson said. "I would try and hit too hard and too fast, and so I hurt my shoulder. I got hurt because I wasn't practicing. I wasn't playing. I'm training a lot more, and I'm better prepared than I have been in the past. I'm going into it with a better mental state."

Last summer Anderson put more focus on tennis. She started playing in USTA tournaments again last June. She is also working with a personal coach, who volunteers his time.

"A lot of these kids, they go to these big academies and train, and she hasn't really had a lot of that," Aldridge said. "To see her at this level is really special."

Both Aldridge and Anderson say the adversity Anderson faced has changed her for the better. "It's made me stronger," Anderson said. "I've had

to rely a lot on God and in my faith, and I think that has gotten me through a ton of it. I've learned to take things one day at a time and to try to stay positive when I can. The way you look at life dictates how you feel, so I try to stay positive and have a good outlook on life."

Anderson now has her sights set on finally winning that elusive girls singles state championship, and she's off to a great start: Two weeks ago she won a tennis tournament in Keller.

"In the whole tournament, she dropped two games," Aldridge said. "She was winning 6-0, 6-1, 6-0, 6-1; she was just dominating. After having won that tournament, as we were getting ready to head out I saw her running sprints on the track. She knows she's got a rough road and knows what it's going to take to get back to Austin."

Everything that she has gone through has made her even more motivated to win.

"I really want it this year," Anderson said. "I think I'm more ready than I've ever been in the past."

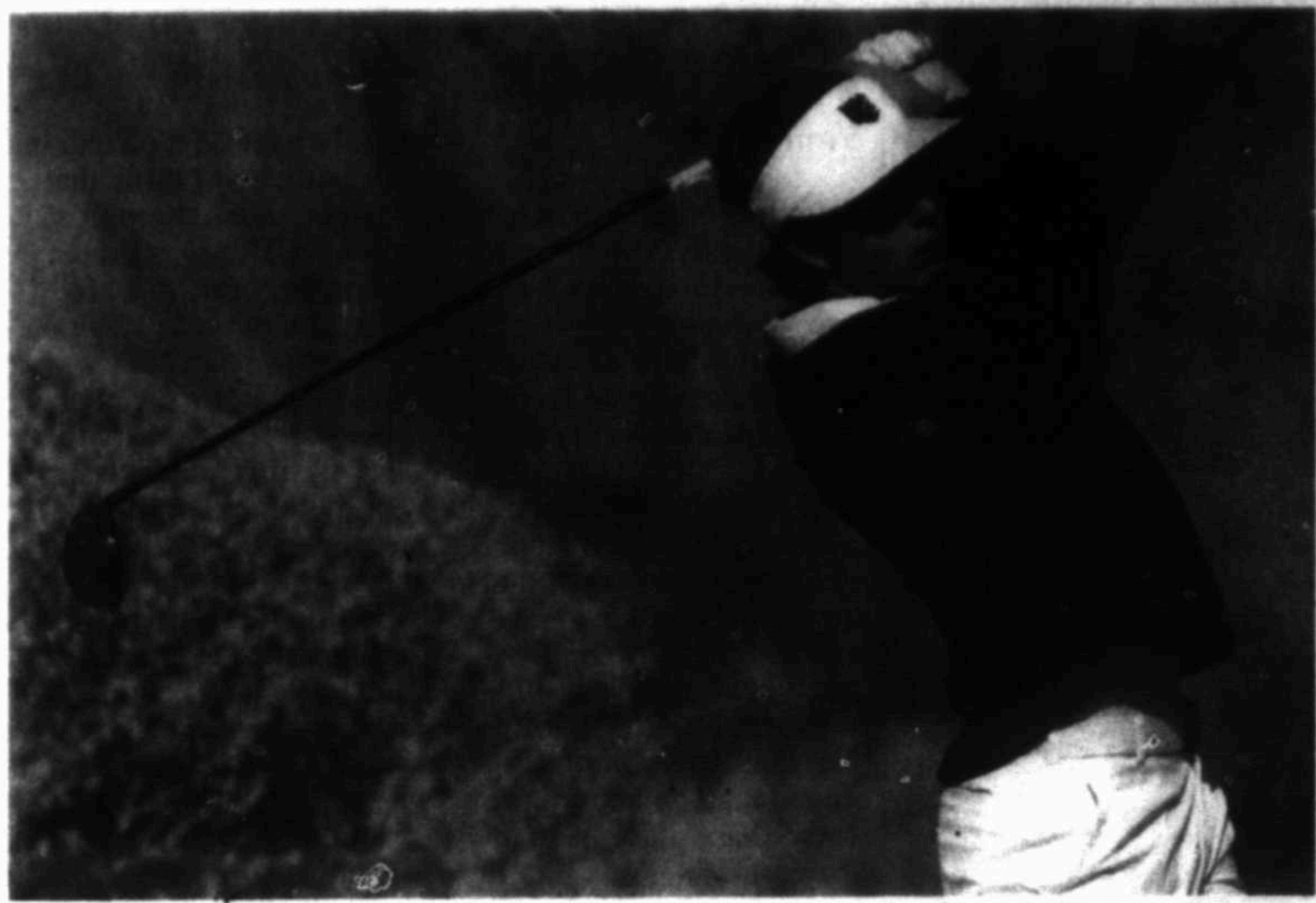
And it seemed Johnny Football had suddenly transformed himself into Johnny Business.

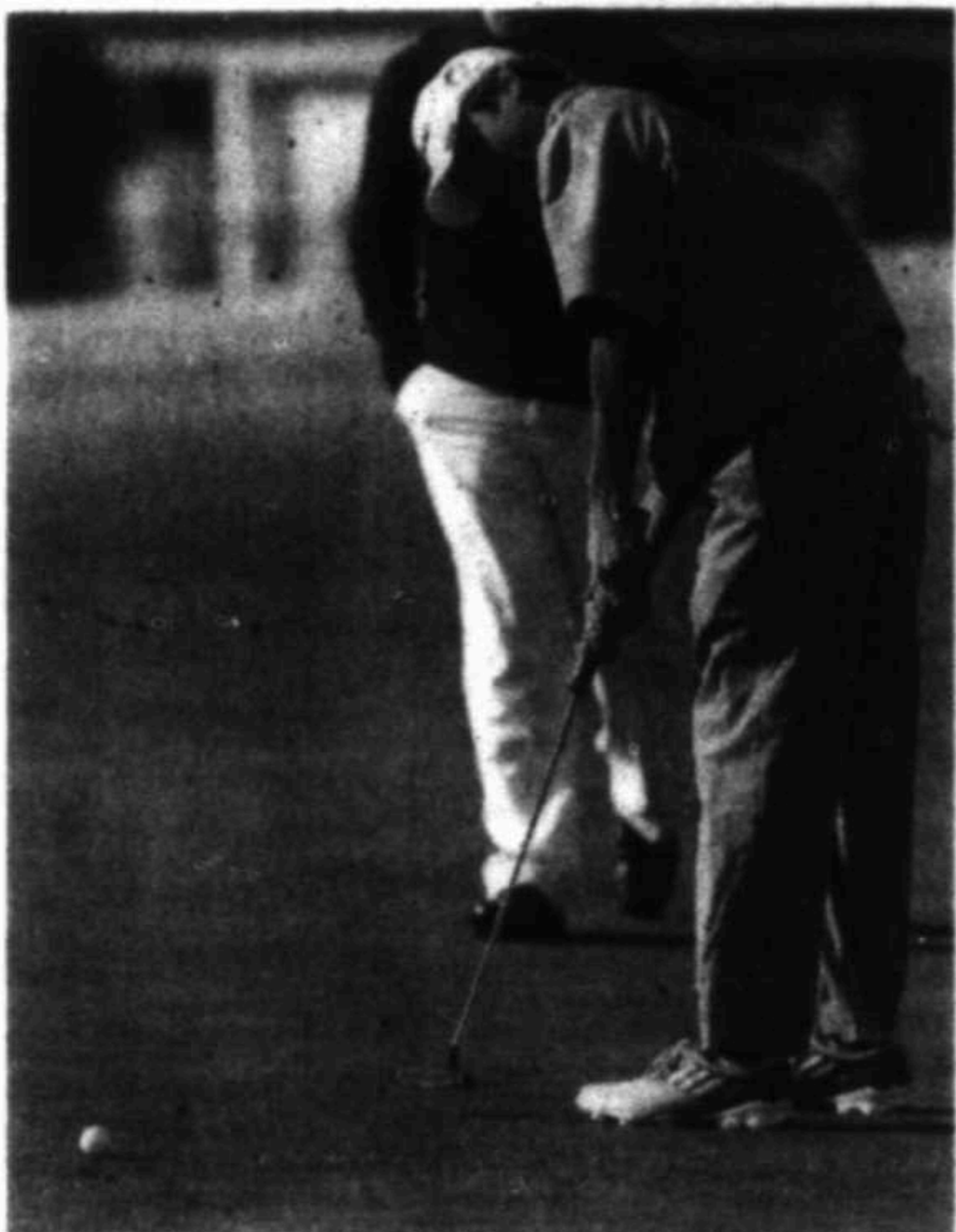

 Jonathan Quick stopped 36 shots in a strong performance for the Americans, who had trailed for just 7:19 in Sochi before Benn's goal put them in a hole they never escaped.

 Crosby still has no goals through five games in Sochi, but the Canadian captain has his best overall game as Canada beat the Americans for the fourth time in five Olympic meetings since the NHL players joined the party in 1998.
 The showdown might have been the last Olympic meeting of these nations' best players for a long while if the NHL keeps players out of the 2018 Pyeongchang Games, forcing the rivalry to move to a World Cup or world championship.

18-year-old Mikaela Shiffrin wins gold in Olympic slalom

 KRASNAYA POLYANA, Russia — Normally so composed, so in control, so not-very-teenlike on and off the slopes, Mikaela Shiffrin suddenly found herself in an awkward position halfway through the second leg of the Olympic slalom.
 Guilty, perhaps, of charging too hard as she swayed this way and that around the course's gates, Shiffrin briefly lost her balance. Her left ski rose too far off the snow. Her chance at a gold medal in the event she's dominated for two years was about to slip away.
 "Yeah, that was pretty terrifying for me. There I was, I'm like, 'Grrreat. I'm just going to go win my first medal.' And then, in the middle of the run, I'm like, 'Guess not,'" the American said with a laugh Friday night. "So like, 'No. Don't do that. Do not give up. You see this through.' My whole goal was to just keep my skis moving."
 Somehow, she did just that. Shiffrin stayed upright, gathered herself and, although giving away precious time there, was able to make a big lead from the first leg stand up. She won by more than a half-second to become, at 18, the youngest

slalom champion in Olympic history.
 "It's going to be something that I chalk up as one of my favorite experiences for the rest of my life," Shiffrin said. "But my life's not over yet."
 No, Mikaela, it's not. It's only just beginning. Think about this for a moment: How might a typical American teenager have spent her Friday night? At the mall with friends? At a movie? At a high school dance?
 Shiffrin spent hers outracing the best skiers in the world down a floodlit Rosa Khutor course, knocking aside gates with her neon yellow pole handles. She was fastest in the first run, then sixth-fastest in the second, for a combined time of 1 minute, 44.54 seconds.
 A pair of Austrians won silver and bronze: Marlies Schild was 0.53 behind Shiffrin, and Kathrin Zettel was 0.81 back. At 32, Schild is the oldest Olympic slalom medalist ever — old enough to have been someone Shiffrin looked up to as, well, even more of a kid than she is now.
 "I won my age class," Schild joked.
 She holds the record with 35 career World Cup slalom wins and now owns three Olympic medals in the discipline, two silvers and a bronze.

BIATHLON: Ukraine's team of twins Vita and Valj Semerenko, Julija Dzhyma, and Olena Pidhrusna missed five targets but avoided penalty loops to finish in 1 hour, 10 minutes, 2.5 seconds. Russia was 26.4 seconds behind to take silver, and Norway trailed by 37.6 to win bronze.
ALPINE SKIING: Shiffrin became the youngest Olympic slalom champion, male or female, with her win. That mark was previously held by Paoletta Magoni of Italy, who won gold at the 1984 Sarajevo Games when she was 19. Austrian teammates Marlies Schild and Kathrin Zettel took silver and bronze.
FREESTYLE SKIING: Thompson and Serwa gave Canada its third 1-2 finish in freestyle skiing events in Sochi. The others came in men's and women's moguls. Canada also won gold and bronze in women's slopestyle skiing, and picked up a silver in the men's halfpipe, for a total of nine freestyle medals. In the skicross final, Ophelie David of France wiped out about two-thirds down the course, giving the bronze to Sweden's Anna Holmlund.
CURLING: Canada's championship gave the country a sweep of the curling titles in Sochi. The Canadian women won their first-ever curling title on Thursday. Sweden won the bronze in men's curling, taking

McDowell makes stunning escape

 MARANA, Ariz. — Graeme McDowell figured his luck had run out Friday at the Match Play Championship.
 After two remarkable rallies to even reach the third round, McDowell missed a pair of 8-foot putts to fall 2 down with two holes to play against Hunter Mahan, who had lost only four times in 18 matches at the Golf Club of Dove Mountain.
 "My head went down as I walked off the 16th green. I really thought I blew it," McDowell said after yet another improbable comeback. "I genuinely thought I was done this time. I really didn't think there was any way back from that."
 Even he couldn't believe what followed.
 McDowell won the next two holes to extend the match. He made a 20-foot par putt on the 20th hole to stay alive and then won the next hole with a 15-foot birdie putt.
 Ernie Els is 5-over par in 57 holes over three matches and he reached the quarterfinals. Jim Furyk has been at least 2 down in every match and he advanced to the quarterfinals for the first time in 14 appearances. Rickie Fowler won a match that featured an 18-foot par putt conceded to him by Sergio Garcia, who felt bad because of a ruling that had taken too much time on the previous hole.
 The Accenture Match Play Championship always has its share of wild tales. McDowell tops them all. How else to explain how a guy can play 58 holes over three matches without ever hitting a tee shot with the lead? Most players are relieved with every match they win. McDowell felt a tinge of guilt.
 "Embarrassed is the wrong word. I'm not embarrassed," he said. "But I just feel like I'm robbing these guys."
 Perhaps it's only fitting that his quarterfinal match is against Victor Dubuisson, of France, who took out Bubba Watson. Dubuisson has never trailed at any point this week. He plays the guy who has never led a single hole while the match was going on.
 In other matches:
 ■ Furyk, getting plenty of support from his college days at Arizona, rallied from an early deficit to beat Harris English on the 18th hole. He next plays Fowler, who made birdie on the 18th for a 1-up win over Garcia.
 ■ Jason Day, who played 40 holes over the opening two rounds, had a relatively easy time in beating George Coetzee, 3 and 1. Day will play the quarterfinals against Louis Oosthuizen, who was stellar in a 5-and-4 win over Webb Simpson.

MATCH PLAY NOTES

FATHER KNOWS BEST: Mike Furyk gave son Jim some good advice about playing Dove Mountain.
 "I think Dad was just kind of telling me not to get out of my own game, not to try to change my style or try to hit the ball higher or farther, just stick with what got me here, do what I usually do well and just try to shoot a number and see what happens," Furyk said.
 The 43-year-old former University of Arizona player advanced to the quarterfinals, beating Harris English 1 up on Friday. Furyk chipped in for birdie on the par-3 16th to take the lead, matched English with a birdie on 17 and halved the 18th with a par.
 "That's a difference in the match," Furyk said about the chip on 16. "That ball doesn't go in, it might go 10 feet by and I might be 1 down going to 17 rather than 1 up. I feel fortunate it hit the center of the pin and went in."
 He reached the quarterfinals for the first time in 14 appearances in the event.
 "I've never made it to the weekend at this event, so new territory for me," Furyk said. "I went to school here. I've got a lot of support out there. Finally, this week, I'm giving them something to cheer for."
 Furyk will face Rickie Fowler, a 1-up winner over Sergio Garcia.
STILL STANDING: Jim Furyk, Rickie Fowler and Jordan Spieth were the lone Americans to reach the quarterfinals.
 With Furyk facing Fowler on Saturday, at least one American will be in the semifinals. U.S. players were 1-2 against European opponents on Friday and are 15-9 in the first three rounds.
 Defending champion Matt Kuchar and 2012 winner Hunter Mahan dropped out Friday along with Harris English, Bubba Watson, Jason Dufner and Webb Simpson.
American players have swept the first 13 events in the PGA Tour's new wraparound season that started in October.
 Only two of the 19 newcomers — Spieth and France's Victor Dubuisson — reached the quarterfinals. Spieth will face Ernie Els, and Dubuisson will play Graeme McDowell.
DIVOTS: Jordan Spieth ended Matt Kuchar's event winning streak at eight matches, beating the defending champion 2 and 1. Kuchar dropped to 17-4 in the tournament. ... The third-round losers received \$148,000. The winner will get \$1.53 million from the \$9 million purse. Second place is worth \$906,000, third \$630,000, and fourth \$510,000. The quarterfinal losers will get \$280,000.

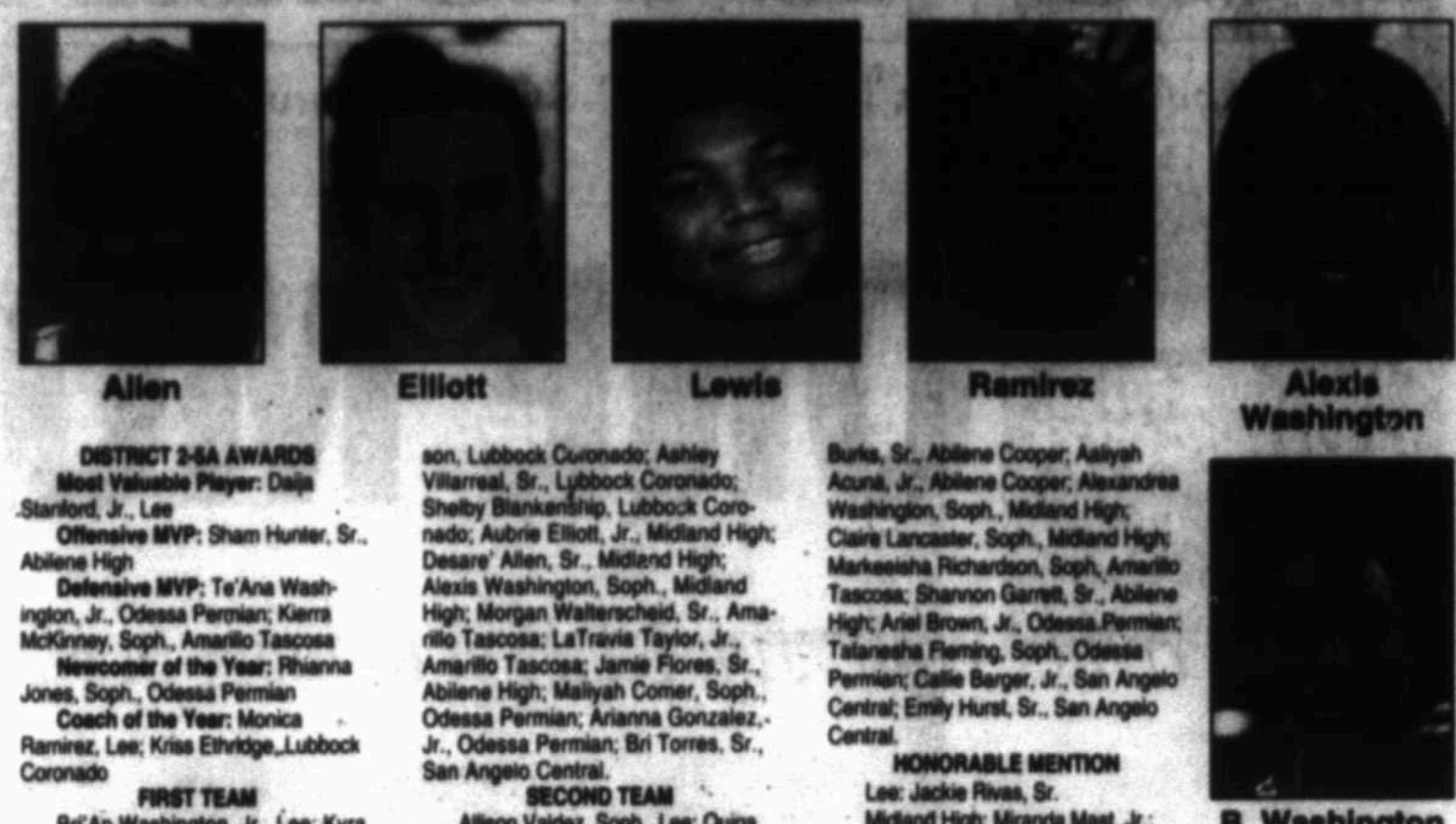

on to face District 6-2A rival Jim Ned in the Region I-2A final at 1 p.m. today at Chaparral Center. The Lady Eagles shared the 6-2A title with Jim Ned and today will mark the fourth time this season the two teams have played one another.
 Wall holds a 2-1 advantage in the three previous meetings, although the most recent regional tournament history between the two programs is in favor of Jim Ned. The Lady Indians defeated Wall 35-27 in the 2012 Region I-2A championship game.
 "We're as familiar as two teams can be with one another," Wall coach Tate Lombard said. "It's tough anytime you play a good team, but especially when you play one that many times. We're so familiar with one another it's going to come down to who executes the best and hits their shots."
 Wall was in control of Friday's game with Canadian almost from the very start. The Lady Hawks were up 16-4 by the end of the first quarter and led 28-13 at half. Sophomore post Maddi Chitsey dominated the first half, scoring 15 of her game-high 17 points in the first two quarters. Chitsey finished the game with nine rebounds, including four offensive boards.
 "I just wanted to step up

for my team, and play my role," Chitsey said. "I feel like scoring in the paint, playing good defense is my role. I think it takes some pressure off of them, when I can score. It was definitely important to get in the right position and fight through."
 But Wall's length didn't only help them on the boards. It also made it difficult for Canadian to pass around the Lady Hawks' zone defense. At times, Lombard was able to have four girls who are at least 5 feet, 8 inches tall, including two 6-footers in Chitsey and her older sister Bobbi.
 That length forced Canadian to settle for long jumpers and resulted in shooting just 25.7 percent from the field, including 33 percent from behind the arch.
 "Their zone is so big there's just not a lot of places to go with the ball," Richardson said. "We knew they were big coming in and it's tough to move the ball anywhere around. They were great about keeping their hands up and they took away our shooters for sure. They're no slouch. They're a great team."

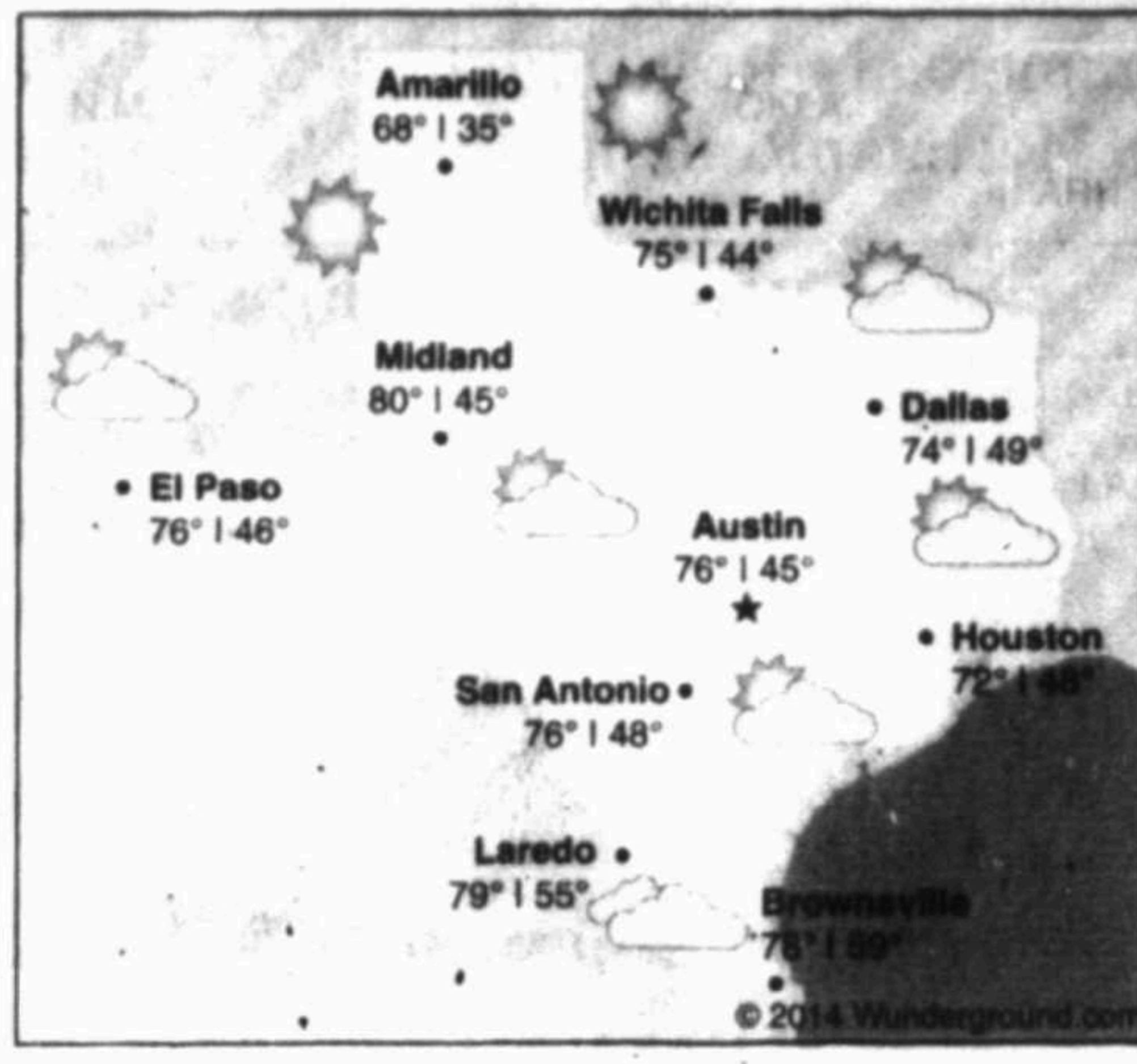
Local forecast
