No. 1 Wolf fan honored

"Everybody thinks I'm really crazy," said A. M. Holman, "just about high school football."

Those were the words of Colorado City's No. 1 Fan Friday afternoon following a Lions Club luncheon in his honor at the Civic Center Friday-officially proclaimed A. M. Holman Day by Colorado City Mayor Elmer Martin.

An honor roll of former Colorado High School standouts made the trip home to help honor Holman on his day. They shared memories that included their recollections of having Holman support them—whether

in victory or defeat.

Holman himself had to jolt a few of their recollections—including when he once was run over at practice.

Holman, born Sept. 20, 1909 in Windom of Fannin County Texas, moved to Colorado City in 1939 shortly after marrying Alayne Carmichael Jan. 29, 1937.

He watched CHS games since 1939 but "started being a real Wolf fan in 1963."

"The first 14 years if I made the game I did and if I didn't I didn't."

And he studies more than the Wolves' playing ability.

"I study their character and

their attitude. At first I didn't know one player from the other but after getting involved I've really enjoyed it."

"The young 'uns are my first love. I love to see them compete and athletics are the best place to compete. The night before the games probably bothers me more than it does the coaches and players because I worry about how we're going to do. I don't like to criticize. It burns me up when somebody does criticize."

Among those in attendance in his honor were Colorado City

Loraine gets housing funds

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm has announced the award of a \$108,330 Comprehensive Improvements Assistance Program contract for the Housing Authority of the city of Loraine.

The funds will be used to physically modernize and upgrade management of low-income housing units. The CIAP is a program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The contract obligates the federal government, through annual contributions, to pay the principal and interest on project notes sold by the local housing

authorities over a period of 20 years.

"I am pleased that, once again, we have been able to return some of the money Texans have paid in federal taxes to make permanent improvements that will directly benefit Texans," Gramm said in announcing the program.

Fifty one Texas cities were earmarked for contracts totaling \$13.2 million.

Each loan is subject of field office approval of the final application by the local housing authority.

Write-in campaign launched

Mitchell County Pct. 4 Commissioner Bill Preston has launched a write-in campaign for the Nov. 4 general election.

Preston was defeated in the May 6 Democratic primary by 26 votes by Herman Mitchell. There is not a Republican candidate.

Preston said his name will not be on the ballot, but his name will be posted at polling places as a write-in candidate.

He said he decided to seek re-election as a write-in candidate for a number of reasons.

"First, the primary election was fairly close with only a 26-vote difference," he said. "I think that a lot of people who did not vote would have voted for me if they had voted."

He said statements made in the primary campaign against him, especially concerning attendance at county commissioner meetings, were untrue.

This is Preston's eighth year as a county commissioner and he said he thinks his knowledge and experience qualifies him for the job.

"With the times we're facing, I feel we need a knowledgeable and experienced man," said Preston.

Shooting victim critical

A 21-year-old Colorado City man remained hospitalized in critical condition at Shannon Hospital in San Angelo Friday suffering from a gunshot wound to the head.

Police Chief Bobby Sparks said that Karl Dean Stephens was first taken to Mitchell County Hospital Thursday night after

the shooting before being transferred to San Angelo.

Sparks said the victim was shot in the left temple with a 22 caliber revolver and the bullet lodged in the brain. He said the shooting appeared to be self-inflicted.

The shooting occurred at 9 p.m. on South Dallas Street.

greats Dan Steakley, Hollis Gainey, Jim Windham and Don Maynard.

Steakley, who played through 1969 as an All-State and All-Star speedy runningback, went on to letter three years for the University of Texas. "He was the greatest fan when I was here whether we won or lost. He congratulated you when you won and patted you on the back when you lost."

Gainey, an All-District and All-Star for a 1955 district championship team, said Holman also went to track meets. At one time he was caught up in the middle of a wager. Gainey also revealed the time Holman was run over at practice. "I can't think of any place I'd rather be," said Gainey. "Mr. Holman is what athletics and education is all about. It's an honor and a privilege to me to share in your honor. I wish you well and keep after it."

Windham was a 1967 graduate of CHS who garnered All-American and All-Star honors and played for the North in the annual North-South Shrine All-Star game. Windham, a former captain for the University of Houston, said he "was just an

old lineman."

"There were a lot of good times. I just want to thank you for coming to the ball games."

Maynard, who held the National Football League record for receiving yardage until Monday night, gave further insight to the greatness of CHS past and small towns and the importance of having fans like Holman.

Maynard graduated in 1963 and completed his NFL career with 634 catches and 11,834 yards—a record broken by San Diego's Charlie Joiner in Monday night's game against Seattle.

Maynard was the first to make it 10,000 then again to 11,000.

"It's always great to come back. Colorado City's probably the greatest place in the world. Mr. Holman it's great to see people such as you that have been loyal. You're one of the unsung heroes that live and die with the team more than the players and coaches."

Maynard talked proudly about Gainey and some of the track performances he remembers—one that included five world records and a second fastest time in the nation while still in school.

"The tradition is still here. The people that turn out have a lot to do with what the school does."

Maynard said even though records are meant to be broken he was sad when Joiner erased his name—if not his accomplishments. "I try to look at it realistically. It's part of life. It's sad but the memories go on."

Maynard, who fumbled only once in 17 years of play, said of Holman, "It's great to know that somebody's always there."

"There's been a lot of good ones (teams)," said Holman. "Some have been better in some respects but as far as I'm concerned they're all good."

Mrs. A. M. Holman received applause for being such an understanding and believing wife.

Court justice campaigns here

Supreme Court Justice Robert M. Campbell brought his campaign for re-election to Colorado City on Thursday.

Campbell, who was making a swing through the area, is opposed in the Nov. 4 general election by Republican Nathan White Jr.

Campbell, 50, emphasized the importance of returning him to office because of the current budget crisis facing the citizens of Texas.

"I spent the entire first called session working with the Legislature in an attempt to adjust the judicial budget so that the judiciary would make its fair contribution toward reducing the impending deficit without wrecking the civil and criminal justice system," Campbell said.

Campbell, a resident of Waco, has served as chairman of the

Judicial Budget Board, which prepares and oversees a unified budget for the entire state judiciary, for the past three years.

Campbell is seeking re-election to the Supreme Court after eight years of service. He is the author of 126 formal legal opinions and if re-elected will become the senior justice of the court Jan. 1.

"The only issue in my race is experience and qualifications," he said. "I have the experience of eight years working with some of the finest judges in the nation and I have learned from that experience. I serve as the only chairman of the Judicial Budget Board has ever had, and I am dedicated to continue my work in that capacity to maintain our judiciary in the manner which the citizens of this state deserve," said Campbell.

My son came home with a list of rules from his soccer coach recently.

Parents were to read them closely, then sign the paper, committing themselves to supporting the ideas of the coach.

Near the head of the list was the rule disallowing facial hair. Also near the top was the rule forbidding hair to drop below the collar.

The other rules were familiar, too. No alcohol. No cigarettes. No drugs. No profanity. No bad manners. Gentlemanly behavior at all times.

I signed the note and he returned it to his coach without a moment's thought or comment. If lack of facial hair makes a coach feel more in control, then so be it. Besides, my kid couldn't grow facial hair if he tried.

Such rules are taken for granted these days. They did bring back some aging memories of the late sixties, though. A list similar to the one above was reason enough then to set the university library on fire.

The problem with individual expression in athletics, according to coaches I know, is that it relegates teamwork to second-class status. The individual is everything. You wind up with a lot of show offs expressing themselves to the crowd instead of working together for the good of the team.

Philosophical consistency was a problem of that time, though. In the classroom you had the coach teaching a history class and explaining to his longhaired students why their country kept getting into wars. The idea, he would explain, was to preserve freedom so U.S. children wouldn't have to live by the choices of dictators, as once did the children in Nazi Germany - not to mention current children in communist Russia.

Students reminded him that American children weren't even allowed to choose their own hairstyles, so how could he stand up there and talk about U.S. freedom?

Coaches spent a lot of time telling students to shut up and sit down.

The athletic field was seen as a slightly more civilized battlefield. The rules were similar, though, and in the students' mind, once again we were putting democracy - unnecessarily - on the shelf.

The coach explained, if you want to be successful - in a foxhole or on a football field, you can't take polls. You name a commander and everyone does what he's told and doesn't ask why.

Coaches in the late sixties and early seventies found themselves in a "Catch 22" situation. If they allowed their athletes to wear their hair like their classmates, the coach across the field would spread the word through the coaching fraternity that Coach Doe could not maintain discipline on his squad.

You might as well shoot a coach as have him convicted of such an offense.

We had two opposing factions, both being directed by very strong peer groups. Kids "had to" wear their hair long. Coaches "had to" make their kids wear their hair short - or at least shorter.

A maverick coach could defy his peers, of course, and a few did. When Jack Mildren was at Oklahoma, he had a healthy flock of hair protruding from behind his helmet. Several coaches shook their heads in disgust - especially after Jack rammed the new wishbone offense down their collective throats.

Even as coaches decried the breakdown in American values, their hair codes became more liberal. Nobody wanted to lose a potential Mildren - who in reality was a Roger Staubach in long hair. Rationalization became the order of the day.

A few resisted to the end, and a few even succeeded in talking the players into defying their peers.

The issue was never really settled, though. Only a new generation of teenagers, who learned about Vietnam and racial riots and assassinations from textbooks, has diffused the issue.

Today's teenager has a clean-shaven face most of the time, but he's probably just as rebellion prone as his predecessors.

If you could get a coach today to tell his players they must wear their hair at least shoulder length, and they must try to grow some kind of facial hair, doesn't it seem probable that teenagers would protest and declare their constitutional rights to look like their classmates?

In a world where everything else is in constant change, for better or worse, teenagers seem to stay the same. Not even the so-called turbulent sixties could change that.

Versatile vegetable adds color, flavor

Sweet potatoes make delicious treats. They are a versatile vegetable that has long been known for making rich delicious desserts as well as tempting side dishes for dinner. Sweet potatoes can be served baked, french fried or mashed with a bit of orange juice and nutmeg. They can be served leftover in a wonderful tasting chicken stew. However they are served, sweet potatoes are a delicious treat.

The Texas sweet potato harvest is currently underway, running from August to November. The heart of the sweet potato country is located in Tyler, Texas. About 80 percent of the state's production comes from East Texas. This season growers there are expecting a good quality harvest. Belinda Boshell, Texas Department of Agriculture Marketing Specialist, says that this year's crop production looks good. Boshell says "Texas produces a large percentage of the nation's sweet potatoes, as a state we rank about 4th in the nation."

Sweet potatoes are one of the most nutritious foods found. Their carbohydrate, protein, vitamin and mineral content makes them a well balanced food. A medium boiled sweet potato contains around 140 calories, providing twice the recommended daily allowance for vitamin A. It is also high in vitamin C, fiber, iron and thiamine.

Sweet potatoes are graded by size, with top grade uniformly shaped and about the size of a baking potato with no nicks or blemishes. Grade two includes smaller, less regular shaped potatoes that may have cuts in the peel. Jumbos or grade three are very large with irregular shapes. These are the least expensive sweet potatoes.

Store sweet potatoes in a cool place away from direct sunlight. Once they are cooked they can be held in the refrigerator from 5 to 7 days.

SWEET POTATO CREAM PIE
2 cups cooked, mashed sweet potatoes

1 (14 oz.) can sweetened condensed milk.
2 eggs
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ginger
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 (9-inch) unbaked pie shell
1 cup whipped heavy cream
3/4 cup chopped pecans

In large bowl combine sweet potatoes, milk, eggs, salt and spices. Pour into pie shell and bake at 425 degrees F. for 15 minutes. Reduce oven to 350 degrees F. and continue baking 25-30 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Cool and garnish with whipped cream and chopped pecans. Refrigerate until ready

to serve. Makes 8 servings.

SWEET POTATO PRALINES

1 cup buttermilk
1 cup butter or margarine
2 1/2 cups sugar
2 1/2 cups chopped pecans
2 tablespoons mashed, cooked sweet potatoes
1 tablespoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
Mix buttermilk, butter and sugar in 2-quart saucepan. Cook, stirring over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Add pecans and cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until candy thermometer reads 238 degrees F. Add mashed sweet potatoes, vanilla and soda. Stir rapidly just until mixture is creamy and thickened. Quickly drop mixture by tablespoon onto lightly greased baking sheet or waxed paper to form patties. Let stand until cool and set.

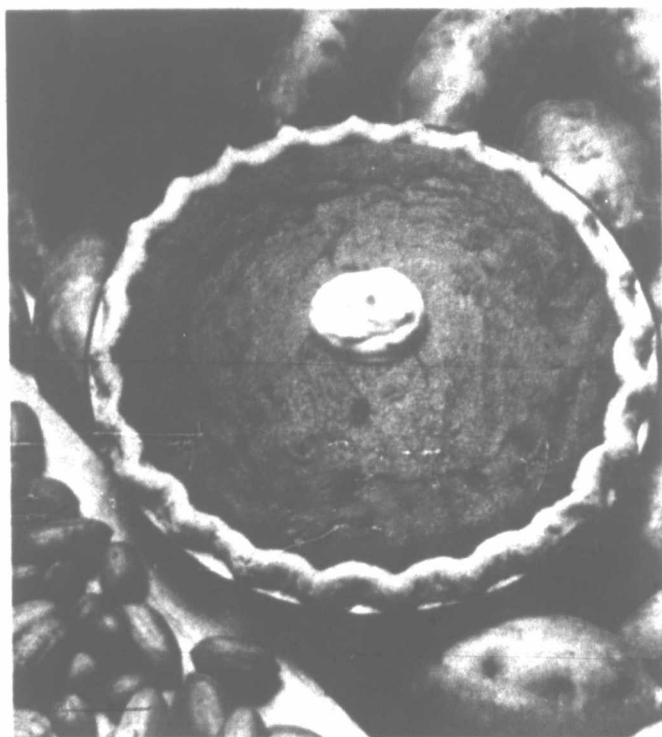
SURPRISE SWEET POTATO CANDY

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 cup evaporated milk
1/2 cup finely grated raw sweet potato

2 cups miniature marshmallows

1 cup graham cracker crumbs
2 teaspoons vanilla (optional)
2 cups chopped pecans

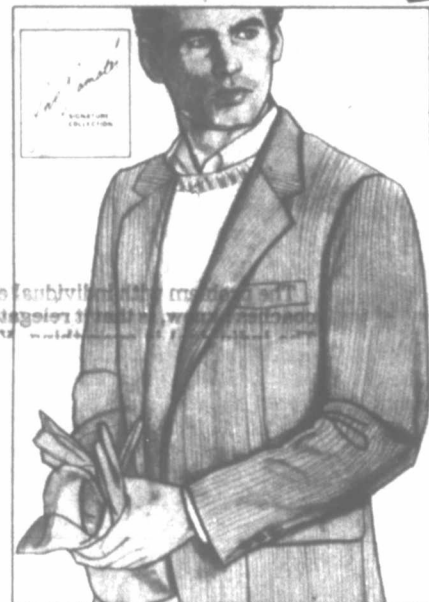
Combine sugar, butter and milk in large saucepan. Stir frequently over medium heat until mixture boils. Add sweet potato. Continue to boil over medium heat, stirring frequently, until mixture reaches the soft ball stage of 235 degrees F. on candy thermometer. Remove from heat. Add marshmallows and graham cracker crumbs. Stir until marshmallows are melted and blended well with crumbs and candy mixture. Add vanilla and pecans. Mix well. Pour into buttered 9-inch baking dish. Cool well before cutting.

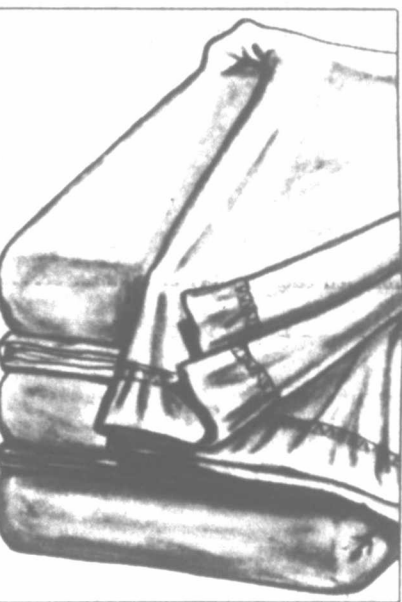

County Oil News

Bruce A. Wilbanks of Midland has revealed plans to drill an 8,200-ft. wildcat well in Mitchell County. The operator has 320 acres leased, with drillsite in the T&P Survey.

The venture has been designated as the No. 1 Womack, with drillsite eight miles northwest of Westbrook.

GCO Drilling has completed a plug-back operation at the No. 1 McCabe "C", a developmental well in the Dixon Field, Mitchell County. The operation is located 25 miles southeast of Colorado City in a 40-acre lease in the H&TC Survey.

The well showed ability to pump ten barrels of oil per day. Production will be from perforations in the Strawn Formation at 6,144 to 6,164 feet into the wellbore.

The operator originally completed the well July 23 of last year. It produced from perforations in the Odum Lime at 6,889 to 6,893 feet into the hole. The original total depth was 7,285 feet. The operator plugged the well back to 6,179 feet.

Testing for potential is underway at the No. 1A Preston Burchard "A", a developmental well in the Coleman Ranch Field, Mitchell County. The op-

erator is Robert G. Cox & Associates.

The well was perforated at 2,711 to 2,864 feet in the Upper Clear Fork Formation. It was bottomed at 2,990 feet after having been spudded March 12. Location is nine miles northwest of Westbrook in the H&TC Survey.

Possible production intervals have been perforated at two developmental ventures of W. D. Morris in Mitchell County's North Istan Field. The wells are

designated as the Nos. 2 and 3 Terry "B", and are located eight miles southwest of Westbrook. The No. 2 well was spudded July 30, while the No. 3 well was spudded Aug. 3.

The No. 2 well has been perforated at 2,595 to 2,697 feet in the Permian Formation, and the No. 3 well has been perforated at 2,572 to 2,686 feet in the same formation. Total drilling depths are 2,830 and 2,790 feet, respectively. No details have been revealed regarding production potential.

Brady spoils CHS homecoming, 33-12

It rained on Colorado City's 1986 Homecoming Friday, but the real storm didn't arrive until the third period of the Wolves 5AAA football game against Brady when the Bulldogs scored five touchdowns in a five minute span to post a 33-12 victory.

The Wolves fumbled the ball over three times in the third quarter and coughed up the ball a total of six times as they saw only their second lead of the season quickly dissipate.

Colorado City dropped to 1-4-1

on the year and to 1-3 in district play. The Bulldogs improved to 5-1 and 3-0.

After gaining five first period first downs to Brady's one, the Wolves were only able to make one more in the second and third periods and didn't make one at all in the final quarter.

The Wolves scored on their second possession of the ballgame with a drive that started on their own 46. An 18 yard pass from Ritchey to Michael Swann and a two yard run by Beau Rees on a fourth and two at the Bulldog 16 were big plays.

Colorado City got the 6-0 lead

on a 13 yard pass from Ismael Silva, who made a complete spin before hitting a streaking Swann over the left side at 11:26 of the second period. Silva's extra point kick sailed wide right.

An interception by Larry Mayes resulted in a missed 26 yard field goal attempt.

The Wolves went ahead 12-0 on a 7 yard interception return by Ritchey at 5:27 of the second period.

Reese Moore made a fumble recovery for the Wolves in the second period but that opportunity ended when the Bulldogs' Abel Ledezma intercepted an

errant Silva pass. He returned the steal 43 yards to midfield.

A 25 yard run on a draw play by Brady's Brad Wallace and a 15 yard pass from Michael Shields to Warren Sanderson put the Bulldogs at the four. From there Wallace carried to cut the Wolves lead to 12-6 with 1:26 left in the half.

After crowning Queen Sally Mendoza, the Wolves found out just how much the missed scoring chances hurt.

Ritchey fumbled to end the Wolves first second half drive and James Barnhill recovered for Brady. It spelled a one yard

score by Shields at 6:54 of the third period. Shields' pass to Ledezma for the extra points put the Bulldogs ahead for good at 13-12.

Reggie Gardner mishandled a punt snap to set up Brady at the Wolves 8 yard line. Two plays later Shields passed to Sanderson for a 5 yard score in the right corner of the endzone to make it 20-12 at the 3:21 mark of the third period.

On the next play from scrimmage the Wolves Ralph Gonzales fumbled a ball recovered by Brady's Tate West. Two plays later Shields recovered his own fumble and rambled 27 yards around the right side for a score

at 1:36 of the third quarter. Michael Sillemo's kick made it 27-12.

Two plays later Ledezma caught a midair fumble by the Wolves Rees and returned it 34 yards for the final score at 1:10 of the third period.

The Wolves suffered an interception by Brady's Ty Solsbery in the final quarter.

State law decrees that to be

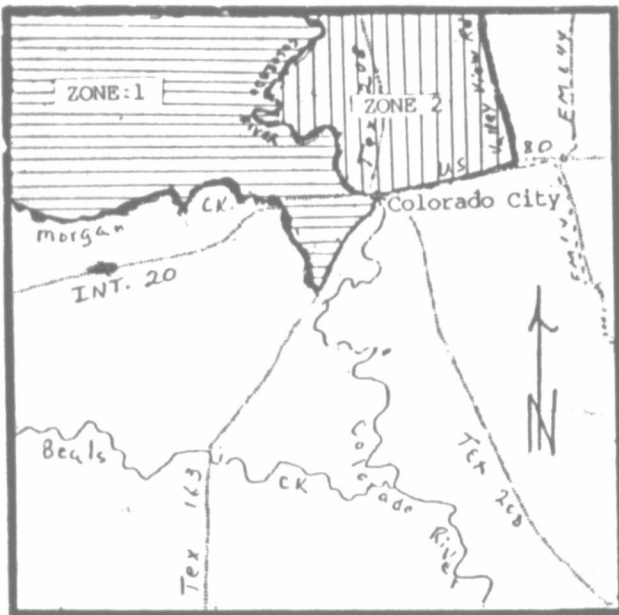

The purpose of the Mitchell SWCD, with headquarters in the G-Kell building is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

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Loraine students hear drug program

On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of last week, Crime Prevention Officer Vince Ariaz of the Colorado City Police Department, assisted by Mitchell County Deputy Sheriff Tony Pantoja, presented a drug education program to 106 Loraine High School and Junior High School students.

Students heard Ariaz talk about driving under the influence of alcohol. Ariaz also showed a film of alcohol-related traffic accidents, including one that claimed the life of a four-year-old boy. Ariaz further read a newspaper article about a man who arrived home drunk one night only to discover the next morning the body of an eight-year-old girl embedded in the front grill of his car. The man reported himself to the police explaining that he did not remember anything that had happened the night before.

Ariaz told the group of stu-

dents that getting behind the driver's wheel of a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol or drug is just as deadly as pointing a loaded gun at a person and pulling the trigger.

Ariaz also spoke to the group about teenage suicide. He noted that some teens who get hooked on amphetamines such as pep pills, cartwheels, beehives or methamphetamines such as speed get so dependent on the drugs that they view suicide as the only way of getting off the drug. Ariaz also showed the film, "The Back Side of an Amphetamine Trip" along with the police department's drug paraphernalia display and then answered questions.

Ariaz will be at the middle school in Colorado City Monday through Thursday of this week and Monday and Tuesday of next week presenting his program.

Bentsen fights for right to keep cafe open

In 1928, Walter Glover and his wife opened a cafe in Pine Springs, a small community in the Guadalupe Mountains about 90 miles east of El Paso.

Little could they have imagined that more than half a century later their daughter would have to battle the federal government to keep the cafe open.

Some 384 acres of Glover family land—including the cafe site—was taken by the government to create Guadalupe Mountains National Park. The Glovers were allowed to continue operating the cafe for the remainder of their lives.

Their daughter, Mrs. Mary Glover Hinson, assumed management of the cafe when her mother died in 1982. When the park superintendent tried to evict Mrs. Hinson only ten days after the funeral, there was considerable public protest.

The Secretary of the Interior at the time, James Watt, called Mrs. Hinson and assured her that the National Parks Service could lease the cafe to her on a year-to-year basis indefinitely and that he saw no reason why she could not stay as long as she wanted.

This year, though, the National Parks Service tried again to evict her. I thought this was totally unjustified and took some fast action to stop it.

The Pine Springs Cafe supports Mrs. Hinson—now 71 years old—and her daughter, who is totally disabled from a back injury. At the same time Mrs. Hinson took on the Parks Service, her daughter was fighting efforts by the Social Security Administration to end her disability payments.

Mrs. Hinson has continued to operate the Pine Springs Cafe in the spirit and manner of her pioneer parents and she has become a recognized institution in the area.

When the Texas Sesquicentennial wagon train came through Pine Springs and needed a place to camp overnight, and when the Boy Scouts needed a camping area, they were denied use of the park. It was Mrs. Hinson who came through with accommodations on land she owns nearby.

Likewise, when visitors need information and park employees are not on duty, Mrs. Hinson is always available—saving the cost of adding an extra employee to the federal payroll.

Mrs. Hinson made a reason-

able proposal to the Parks Service. She offered to put a new roof on the cafe at her own expense. Since her daughter is unable to take over from her, Mrs. Hinson asked to continue operating the cafe for only five more years before she retires. After that, she said, she will be too tired to fight the Parks Service any more.

I wrote to Secretary of the Interior Donald Hodel advising him that I would introduce legislation in the next Congress to permanently resolve this situation in a way that would spare Mrs. Hinson the uncertainty of a year-to-year lease, which could be canceled at the whim of the current park superintendent. And I am doing all I can to help restore her daughter's disability status.

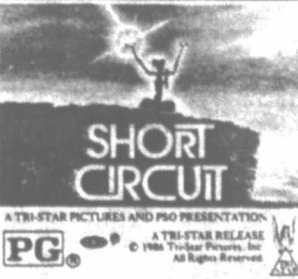
I asked the Secretary to personally review the case and allow Mrs. Hinson to stay until Congress could act on my legislation. He agreed with my assessment of the situation and took immediate action.

Mrs. Hinson now has a five-year permit issued by the Secretary to continue operating the Pine Springs Cafe—in the same manner as her family has done for more than half a century.
